

#### State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Rindge, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Rindge on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year and years ensuing.
- 2. To hear and act upon the reports of the selectmen, overseer of the poor, town treasurer and reports of all agents, committees and officers heretofore chosen, and act in any way relating thereto.
- 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and for any other purposes as mentioned in the budget.
- 4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal Government in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust.
- 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for trunk line and State aid maintenance.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid on its highways or act in any way relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to allow the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see what method the town will adopt to collect the taxes.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be expended in making a suitable town office, or act in any way in relation thereto.
- 10. To see what action the town will take in regard to letting out the Electric Meter readings for bids, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 11. To see what action the town will take in abolishing the Electric Light Commission and of the hiring of a superintendent to have charge of the Electric Light Plant, under the supervision of the selectmen, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to have a property map made of the town, raise and appropriate money for same, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen, or, some other suitable committee to cause to be erected on the Common, a marker commemorating the gathering there of fifty four men of Rindge in response to the alarm from Lexington and Concord, April 20th, 1775; raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the town will authorize and direct the selectmen to lay out and rebuild the old road from Miss Brigham's to the new Winchendon road.
- 15. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to sell at public auction, 3 hearses, 3 snow rollers and one set of double harnesses, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to defray the expense of recataloging the books in the Ingalls Memorial Library.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to repair or replace part of pipe that supplies the watering trough at East Rindge, raise and appropriate a sum of money for same, or act in any way relating thereto.

- 18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the unimproved section of the highway from the Winchendon town line to the road which leads off said road to the residence of Marcus M. Danforth.
  - 19. To allow bills of charge.

- 9. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

- 10. To see what action the district will take towards uniting the schools of the district in one new building, appoint a committee to investigate the matter, or take any action relating thereto.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to have the chimney in school No. 5 torn down and a new chimney built, raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the purpose, or act in any way relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to have a new roof built on the schoolhouse at West Rindge, raise and appropriate a sum of money, or act in any way relating thereto.

# Report of the Trustees of the Ingalls Memorial Library

For the Year Ending January 31st, 1930

The reports for the past year of the two librarians for the Ingalls Memorial Library and the West Rindge Branch Library show that a fair circulation of books has been maintained in spite of the constantly diminishing population, a condition much to be deplored, and the Trustees feel strongly that the value of the Libraries is shown by the number of books in circulation and the appreciation expressed by the teachers of the value of the libraries to the school children.

The Librarians are laboring under great difficulties and feel, as do the Trustees, that it is almost impossible to carry on their work without a very thorough rearrangement of the books under a correct system of card catalogue. When the Libraries were small the printed lists of new books, distributed each year, served moderately well to inform the public of the available books. Now that the volumes number several thousand the present system is wholly inadequate.

Too much gratitude cannot be expressed to Miss Brigham for her unselfish and courageous devotion to her charge, living at a distance, as she is obliged to and her difficulties multiplied by the enforced absence of Miss Ware. At the Branch Library the room is so full that the overflow has to be stowed away in a closet and the addition of new books this year is necessarily limited by the lack of space. Nothing can be transferred to the main library because there is no means of cataloguing and the services of a trained cataloguer would be needed for the work.

The Trustees have consulted the Secretary of the New Hampshire Public Library Commission, Miss Annable, who recommends that she be allowed to come in the spring to study the local conditions and advise what ought to be done to establish the

Libraries on a permanent basis. Miss Annable's services would be paid for by the New Hampshire Public Library Commission but the town would pay for her board and lodging. The charge for the trained cataloguer would be probably from \$125.00 to \$160.00 a month. We should suppose it would take two or three months at least. The work for the Branch Library will be paid for by Miss Ware but for the Ingalls Library the town will be responsible. Whether the Town can undertake this the citizens must decide but the Trustees feel that they are justified in asking for the usual appropriation of \$300.00 for the current expenses and \$500.00 for the card catalogue. It may necessitate even more than that.

We wish also to express our appreciation of the ever faithful and efficient care of Mr. Barrett, our janitor.

# Report of Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of Rindge:

I submit herewith my twelfth annual report, it being the twenty-sixth in the series under union supervision.

We were able to retain the services of Miss Alice E. Belcher at West Rindge and Miss Gertrude Trottier at East Rindge for another year, but both schools at the Center became vacant, as did the position of supervisor of music.

For teacher of the Rindge Center grammar school Miss Kathleen C. Davison of Woodsville was chosen. Miss Davison is a graduate of the three year course at Keene Normal School, and had done some excellent work as substitute in the Jaffrey schools last year.

For the position in the primary school Miss Olive Lynch of East Jaffrey was elected. Miss Lynch is also a graduate of Keene Normal School, and had taught two years in the schools of Antrim.

For supervisor of Music Mrs. F. Emily Stebbins was elected.

The total enrollment for the schools of Rindge is slightly larger than last year. During the first twelve weeks of the year a total of 101 pupils were enrolled as compared with 90 for the same period last year, and 98 for the entire year. The average membership for the term was 99.26, as compared with 85.17 for the same term last year, and an average attendance of 93.34 as against 81.64 last year.

The transportation of pupils from East Rindge and West Rindge to grades seven and eight at the Center has been continued with an enrollment of twenty pupils in these two grades. This consolidation of pupils for upper grade work is in line with the more progressive schools of the state and the results shown are more satisfactory than was possible with two schools of eight grades and one of four grades.

The schools at East and West Rindge have been large during the fall term of the present school year, but conditions have been favorable in both schools and good work has been done. The Center Primrary school, with an enrollment of twenty-nine for the first six grades, has been larger than this school has had for

many years.

Considerable attention has been given to the subject of health in our schools during the past few months. Under the leadership of Mrs. Wilder a dental clinic was arranged during the summer vacation, and Dr. F. P. Bowen of Exeter was present at the town hall on July 15, 16, 17 and 18. At this time fifty-four patients were given attention of whom fourteen were adults. Various organizations contributed \$43.00 toward the expense of this clinic, the remainder of the expense being borne by the patients treated.

Mrs. Warner of Keene, who has been chosen School Nurse for Troy for the present school year, has visited the Rindge schools twice and will make a third visit before spring. With the proper cooperation from the homes this form of health work should prove as successful in Rindge as it has in many other communities.

Instead of attending the State Teachers' Convention, which was held at Littleton, the Rindge teachers attended the rural institute at New Ipswich on October 21st. At this meeting a very interesting program was given under the direction of Miss Phila M. Griffin, assisted by Superintendent Wm. H. Buker of Rochester, Prof. George H. Whitcher of Concord, and Mrs. Amy Hale Golder, formerly of the Keene Normal School.

I wish to thank the school board, teachers, parents, pupils and all citizens who have assisted in the work of the Rindge schools during the past year.
