#### AUDITORS' REPORT.

P. S., Chap. 43, Sec. 23. "Every town at the annual meeting shall choose one or more auditors, who shall carefully examine the accounts of the selectmen, town treasurer, and collector of taxes, at the end of each fiscal year . . . . and report to the town whether the same are correctly cast and well vouched."

We have to report we have attended to the duties assigned us and have made a careful examination of the accounts of the selectmen, the town treasurer, and the collectors of taxes for 1900 and 1901, and we find them "correctly cast and well vouched."

We find a balance of \$839.34 in the town treasury, as shown by the treasurer's bank account, and funds in his hands as per his report. The collector for 1900 has paid into the treasury of the town \$675.24. His abatements and rebates were \$21.49. Balance uncollected. \$3.59. The collector for 1901 has paid the town treasurer the sum of \$11,920.13. He is credited with abatements and rebates for errors the sum of \$232.33, leaving uncollected for the year 1901 the sum of \$194.50 as shown by the collector's book, his receipts from the treasurer, and the list of abatements as per the report of the selectmen.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

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The work of local boards of health, like that relating to all other public interests, develops and broadens as society progresses in a knowledge of better sanitary conditions and purer hygienic practices.

There are conditions over which health officers who are awake to their duties and alive to public interests have control. They can maintain quarantine in case of contagious diseases, make regulations for the prevention and removal of nuisances, cause the analysis of water suspected of being polluted by matter dangerous to health, and if the analysis shows the water to be unfit for drinking purposes, they may with the approval of the state board of health prohibit its use. In fact boards of health have cognisance and control of innumerable conditions which are offensive and injurious to the public health. Severe penalties are attached in many cases for the violation of the public health laws.

A matter of vital importance is protection against smallpox. High authority tells us that this protection depends upon the value placed upon vaccination. Children attending any public or private school should not be permitted to do so longer unless they have been vaccinated. The law is imperative in this matter.

In previous annual reports, we have called attention to the necessity of a sewer system for the center village. This is needed for two essential reasons. First, to receive the surface water that accumulates in the streets, washing and damaging them and collecting in the lower depressions, impeding travel to an extent that causes great annoyance to pedestrians and oftentimes making it impossible for them to make their way to the schools, churches and places of business without wetting their extremities and clothing in the cold, slushy water in winter and spring, a serious menace to health and life. Again there are residences on our principal streets at the time we are making

this report that are so surrounded by water that the occupants can neither come out nor go in without wading a long distance in deep water. This condition has been made worse by recent grading of the streets. This state of things should not be tolerated longer. Second, we need the sewer system to take care of the sewage which at present, as it ever has been, is emptied upon the surface of the earth close by dwellings and the public streets, throwing off noxious odors and disease-breeding gases; or the cesspool has been made the receptacle of superfluous filth for so long a time that contamination has reached its limit, and no one can feel safe from its direful effects if dwelling in their locality. What is the remedy? A plan for a thorough sewer system. An appropriation by the town sufficient to take care of the surface water and another appropriation by the Village Fire District to be used in connection with the town appropriation to construct a part of this system this year, and further small appropriations to complete the system next year. This can be done upon a systematic plan and cost no more than the patchwork policy that is being pursued at present, giving no satisfactory results. Consider it, act upon it, and it will be accomplished.

The work of the board the past year has been directed to removal of nuisances, disinfecting some of the schoolhouses, quarantining during an epidemic of measles, fourteen cases of which were reported by physicians and other cases have come to our knowledge where no physician was employed, to the analysis of suspected water with results showing that the suspicion was well grounded, and many minor details.

The work at the Laboratory of Hygiene has revealed the fact that all old wells may be regarded with suspicion until the character of the water is determined by analysis. Also a high per cent. of the water supplied through lead pipe has been found to contain lead in quantities that make it dangerous for domestic uses. Of a large number of pond and stream waters from all sections of the state examined at the laboratory 91.6 per cent. were of good quality and none were bad. The board will assist any parties in determining the quality of the water used for domestic purposes in regard to which suspicion exists.

## TOWN SCHOOL REPORT.

In submitting this report we do not claim that the public schools of Warner are perfect, but we do claim that much hard, earnest work is being done by teachers and pupils. While some of the schools have not met our expectations, the most of them have been satisfactory.

Fifteen schools have been maintained during the year and 203 pupils registered, giving an average of over 13 for each school when worked by arithmetic, but in fact some of our schools are pitifully small—five and even three pupils.

The most painstaking and conscientious teacher cannot do her best work in these small schools. Children need to be brought in contact with one another; they need the stimulus of emulation, and the general teasing down which only comes from contact with their fellows. If the average size of our schools could be as easily arranged in reality as with the pencil, we should soon see great improvement.

New sheds have been built at Burnt Hill and Lower Village, while minor repairs have been made at Davisville, Joppa, and other places. The schoolhouse at the Lower Village needs new seats, paint, and paper, while if schools are maintained at Howe, Burnap, North Village, and Joppa, repairs are imperative. Repairs are expensive. So is anything worth having, and the best is none too good for the children of today who will be the men and women of affairs tomorrow. Our schoolrooms should at least be comfortable and attractive. There is not much inspiration in the four walls of the average schoolhouse where our children are confined for six hours a day, five days in a week, twenty-eight weeks in a year, during the period of school life, which is the time when impressions are strongest and most lasting.

One of the greatest obstacles the teacher has to contend with is the frequent and repeated absence of pupils. This important subject of continuous attendance does not receive due consider-

ation. A well-known worker and writer says "it is one of the greatest crimes one can commit to rob a child of his school-days." Don't keep a child at home to work a week or a month after school begins and thus greatly discourage and handicap him when he does begin. Each day has its own work and there is no time to go back and do the work of days past. If there is anything in the world a man can afford to make a sacrifice for, it is the education of the children dependent on him. Education is better than money. A boy is better off for earning his own money, but he needs good training and schooling, and there is but one time to get it—while he is young.

It is hoped that parents will keep this matter of absence in mind during the next year, and try to give the children the benefit of all the schooling the town, at so much expense, provides.

The plan adopted three years ago of grading the grammar school as a preparatory course for the high school was a wise one and has shown good results. The second class, consisting of nine pupils, was graduated last spring, while another class is coming on to graduate this spring.

This graduation, which is held at the close of the spring term, is under the supervision of the superintendent of the high school and the school board, jointly, and those passing a satisfactory examination receive diplomas which admit them to the high school without further examination. This movement is of great value to both teachers and pupils, and must be of benefit so long as the school board rigidly maintains the standard of requirements for admission.

Candidates for the preparatory class must pass a satisfactory examination in reading, spelling, writing, geography, grammar, including parsing and analysis, arithmetic, including common and decimal fractions, compound numbers, percentage, and simple interest.

#### PREPARATORY COURSE.

FALL TERM—Arithmetic, English Grammar, Reading, Spelling.

WINTER TERM—Arithmetic, English Grammar, United States History, Reading, Spelling.

SPRING TERM—Arithmetic, English Grammar, United States History, Reading, Spelling.

Pupils who do not take this course at the preparatory school will be required to pass an examination by the superintendent of the high school before entering it.

The second year of the Children's Branch Service of the Pillsbury Free Library shows that much good has been accomplished. In fact this movement brings the children in contact with good books as nothing else could. The children outside the village now enjoy the same privileges as those in the village, and the Friday afternoon hour which has been devoted to these books has proved one of the pleasantest and most profitable of the week. Through the indefatigable efforts of Mr. C. S. Pratt, the originator of this scheme, the cabinets are now left in the districts through vacation, being taken home and cared for by some one who appreciates the benefits of this movement.

A threatened epidemic of measles caused the closing of the Lower Village school when it had kept but half the term. Tory Hill had but seven weeks this winter owing to the illness of the teacher. Howe and Liberty Union also had but seven weeks each. All other schools have had their full term of twenty-eight weeks.

Again this year the grammar and primary schools have, by the efforts of parents and friends, been lengthened so as to give each two additional weeks in the winter term.

The relation of parents and teachers is very close and requires co-operation for the best advancement of the children. Harmony in a district is as necessary as a good teacher, and a good teacher can do much better work where there is unity of feeling.

## SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

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Your superintendent, elected last March, took up the duties of the office with a great deal of diffidence. For many years she had been unacquainted with the school, and Mr. Pattee, her predecessor, was ill, so that often it was difficult to obtain information which was needed. She wishes, however, to extend to all with whom she has been connected in the work her thanks for the unfailing courtesy with which she has been treated.

During the spring term, Mr. William Goldthwaite was the principal, having been elected to fill out the year in place of Mr. Arthur R. Webster, who, having been offered a more desirable position, had resigned. There were felt, somewhat, during the term, the disturbing effects incident to the changes of teachers and methods, which were unavoidable. Prof. Goldthwaite labored hard for the prosperity of the school, however.

In June, a class of eight, five young ladies and three gentlemen, was graduated, doing credit to themselves and to their instructors. A class of nine, from the grammar schools of the town, passed the examinations required for the High School, ready to enter in the fall. From the experience of her first year in the work, your Superintendent is of the opinion that the examinations for admission to the High School should be a little more difficult, or the rank required, somewhat higher than seventy-five per cent. With but two teachers in the High School no preparatory course is possible there, and the admission of students to classes for which they are ill prepared is a detriment to themselves, while at the same time it lowers the standard of the school.

At the close of the year in June, Prof. Goldthwaite and Miss Carnes, his assistant, were engaged for another year, but, after reaching his home in Goshen, New York, Prof. Goldthwaite sent in his resignation.

During the summer vacation many applicants for the position of principalship thus made vacant, were considered person-

ally and by letter. The unanimous choice of your committee fell at last upon Mr. Fred S. Libbey of Wolfboro, N. H., and he was elected. He came with excellent recommendations from other High Schools in which he has taught, and the present condition of the school proves that our confidence in him was not misplaced. The school has settled down to steady, honest work. One is conscious of a firm, strong hand at the helm. Both the principal and his assistant are painstaking and accurate in their teaching, and both have won the love and respect of their pupils to an unusual degree. We may well rejoice in the present condition of our High School.

During the summer vacation new catalogues were issued. They contained courses of study, arranged by Mr. Libbey. Your Superintendent, believing that few pupils on entering the High School are ready to drop arithmetic, that study was placed in the first two terms of each course.

The school has been placed on the approved list by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

This year, fifteen pupils from Newbury, Bradford, Webster, Contoocook, and Croydon, whose tuition has been paid by their respective towns, in accordance with the last school law, have been in attendance. This is a larger number of out-of-town pupils than usual in one year, we believe, and inquiries regarding the school, sent by school boards to the Superintendent, give prospects of a larger number next year.

In the fall, eight Rand & McNally's maps and physiological charts were hung in the school-rooms. These, with the exceptionally good physical and chemical apparatus of which it was already in possession, make the school very well equipped for classical and scientific work.

Some of the former students of the school are showing a gratifying interest in it, and as this is the year of the triennial reunion we hope that some needs of the school may then be so presented as to meet with generous response.

If the present board of instructors can be retained, we believe that next year will witness an unusual prosperity of the Simonds Free High School. Is it too much to expect of every citizen his loyalty to it, and his strong support in every way he may be able?

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

The past year has been a year of prosperity and accomplishment for the Pillsbury Free Library, as shown by the reports of the librarian and the treasurer. It has also been a year of broadened activities.

The book committee has carefully considered the tastes of the people and the needs of the library. Several valuable periodicals dealing with public affairs and the world's work have been added to the reading room, and a goodly number of important as well as popular volumes to the book department.

The Children's Branch Service, which was so successfully established last year in the schools, has been extended this year to the vacations—in all districts outside the central village—citizens willingly acting as custodians. The good work of the service is larger even than the trustees anticipated. Practically all the children in town are reached, the larger number of whom had not previously taken books from the library. Since the start a year ago last spring, besides the school use, about two thousand, three hundred books and seven hundred magazines have been loaned for home use.

The most important work of the year, perhaps, has been the opening of branch stations of the library at Melvin's Mills and Davisville. These stations are really branch libraries. The citizens of the two villages furnish rooms and custodians. The library sends three hundred books to each station, and divides the periodicals between the two after they have been fur

months at the central library—the branch stations exchanging these periodicals after three months. The appreciation of the branch stations has been most hearty. During the five months from the opening, Sept. 1, 1901, to Feb. 1, 1902, the two stations have served seventy-two borrowers—mostly people out of reach of the central library—and they have loaned five hundred and nineteen books and one hundred and twenty-seven periodicals.

New regulations have also been made for the benefit of those living in isolated neighborhoods at a distance from both the central library and the branch stations.

In conformity with the vote of the town establishing the Pillsbury Free Library, the accompanying reports of the librarian and the treasurer are respectfully submitted.

#### LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE PILLSBURY FREE LIBRARY:

The report for the year ending Feb. 15, 1902, is herewith submitted.

The library has today 7,840 volumes, not including law books deposited by the town, government publications, etc. Of this number 1,052 are absent—600 at the two branch stations and 452 in the children's school district cabinets. Number of pamphlets, 557. 171 books have been purchased; 103 have been given; 38 added by binding. Number of cards issued, 496; books charged, 7,768; largest number in one day, 154. The number of magazines charged is unavoidably incomplete. From Feb. 16, 1901, to Nov. 19, and from Jan. 4, 1902, to Feb. 15, inclusive,—total, 663. Daily average of patrons of the reading room, 27; largest number in one day, 47. Amount received from fines, \$7.90. Visitors recorded, 211.

The record of the class of books taken out is in this order—fiction, books for young people, biography, general literature and poetry, science and education, miscellaneous, travel, history.
