Record of Town Meeting

WEARE, N. H., March 10, 1931.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 10th day of March, 1931, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Charles F. Eastman, Moderator, also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist: 819.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of vote given in: 433.

Necessary for choice: 222.

For Selectman for three years. George E. Dodge had 2; Wesley C. Hodge had 175; Fred C. Jones had 258, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Town Clerk. Frank H. Peaslee had 439, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agents. North Division: Lewis C. Ilsley had 177; Charles F. Bennett had 249, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

South Division. Thomas G. Wood had 62; Frank A. Philbrick had 364, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

East Division. Charles E. Bowen had 1; Guy H. Boynton had 82; Elwin T. George had 169; Fred E. Purington had had 180.

Second ballot for Road Agent, East Division. Whole number of votes cast: 294. Necessary for choice: 148. Guy H. Boynton had 39; Elwin T. George had 110; Fred E. Purington had 145.

Third ballot for Road Agent, East Division. Whole number of votes cast: 223. Necessary for choice: 112. Elwin T. George had 78; Fred E. Purington had 145, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor. Stella Jameson had 1; John F. Tierney had 2; Frank Tucker had 430, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Treasurer. Sadie Quinn had 1; Blanche E. Gunn had 1; Don H. Putnam had 1; Frank Tucker had 430, and was declared elected by the Moderator and, in open meeting, took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to adjourn until 1 o'clock tomorrow.

March 11, 1931. Met according to adjournment.

ART. 2. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of two thousand two hundred fifty dollars (\$2,250) to defray town charges.

ART. 3. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Frank Tucker for Trustee of Trust Funds. This being done the Moderator declared Frank Tucker elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 4. The Clerk was instructed to cast one vote for Eva M. Sawyer Trustee of the Library. This being done the

Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 5. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to raise the sum of five thousand nine hundred ninety-two dollars (\$5,992) for the repair of highways.

ART. 6. Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted to raise the sum of three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500) for the permanent improvement of the highway between Weare Center and the Henniker line.

ART. 7. Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted to raise the sum required by law to obtain State Aid. Ernest A. Paige offered an amendment to the motion not to raise the amount required by law if the amount called for in Article 6 is raised. The amendment was carried.

ART. 8. Upon motion of Elwin G. Smith, voted that it be left to the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes. Gordon W. Porter offered an amendment to the motion: That it be let to the lowest responsible bidder that can furnish bonds. The amendment was carried.

ART. 9. Upon motion of Maurice J. Grant, that we raise the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for White Pine Blister Rust control. The motion was rejected.

ART. 10. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, that the town raise $\frac{3}{4}$ of two hundred dollars (\$200) for band concerts. The motion was rejected.

ART. 11. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to buy a Fordson Tractor and Snow Plow. Frank H. Peaslee offered an amendment that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to retire and bring in three names to act as a committee to investigate and buy a Tractor and Snow Plow. The amendment was rejected.

Ernest A. Paige offered an amendment to buy the small Tractor. The amendment was rejected.

Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to raise the sum of three thousand three hundred fifty dollars (\$3,350).

Upon motion of Edward T. Breed, voted to raise the sum of one thousand three hundred fifty dollars \$(1,350) this year and one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each of the following two years.

ART. 12. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for the care of Soldiers' Graves.

ART. 13. Upon motion of Ernest A. Paige, to dismiss the Article. The motion was rejected.

Upon motion of Clarence C. Still, to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000). The motion was rejected.

ART. 14. Upon motion of Alfred Osborne, voted that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to collect material that may be used in a later edition of the History, this material to be kept in the vault at the Town Office. The Moderator submitted the following names to serve as a History Committee to comply with the vote taken in Article 14: Hiram E. Grant, Edward T. Breed, Allen W. Sawyer, Mabel D. Eastman and Lucie E. Clough.

Upon motion of Frank N. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for the observance of Memorial day.

Informal motion: Upon motion of Lindley H. Farr, voted to close the polls next year at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

Upon motion of Hiram D. Nichols, voted to reconsider Article 10. Voted to rescind the vote taken in Article 10.

Upon motion of Edward T. Breed, voted to raise the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for band concerts.

Upon motion of J. Lewis Hills, that the town have an article in the Warrant next year to use the Australian Ballot System. The motion was rejected.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare, on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways including winter roads and how much will be reserved for winter roads.
6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
7. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
8. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of 3% on taxes paid on or before May first; 2½% on taxes paid before June first; 2% on taxes paid by July first; 1½% on taxes paid by August first; and 1% on taxes paid by September first.
10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars (\$400) for white pine blister rust control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
11. To see if the Town will vote to use the Australian ballot at all Town Meetings.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200) for band concerts.

13. To see if the Town will vote to elect or appoint one Road Agent at the Town Meeting in March, 1933, this Agent to have charge of all roads in town listed as class five.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for a resident physician.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of payment of taxes.

16. To see if the Town will vote to accept the By-Laws as adopted by the Selectmen regarding Sunday sports.

17. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild the fireplace in the Legion Headquarters in Stone Memorial Building and raise and appropriate \$60 for same.

18. To see if the Town will vote to buy the land and building housing the tractor and plow at East Weare and raise and appropriate eight hundred seventy-five dollars (\$875) for the same.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Weare's attendance record still shows, as for the past two years, an average better than that of the state as a whole. I am glad to note also that the number of tardinesses per pupil are on the decrease. The high school has shown the most marked improvement, having brought the number of tardinesses down from 3.6 per pupil in 1929-1930 to 1.1 in 1930-1931. For the first third of the present year the tardiness record shows less than 0.3 per pupil, and I consider this a remarkable record when we take into consideration the long distances to be traveled daily by many of our pupils over all kinds of roads. Among the one-room schools, Sugar Hill has the best record of promptness, while North Weare, Friends, Clinton Grove and River Road schools have about twice as many tardinesses as the average of the state.

The school at East Weare opened with 36 pupils last September in eight grades. This seemed too many for one teacher, and it was deemed advisable to divide the school into primary and grammar rooms, with two teachers. The extra room was already there, having been built years ago, and needed only minor repairs, a new blackboard and a stove, in order to be made a comfortable schoolroom. The State Board was willing to increase our allowance of state money by the amount of one teacher's salary, in view of the large enrollment at East Weare.

OUR SCHOOL BUILDINGS

The past summer the high school building has been painted on the outside. The South Weare school, which had the poorest lighting of any of our schools last year, now has several new windows on the left side of the children, and the walls have been painted a light buff color. The interior of the Center school also received a coat of paint.

The River Road school is seriously in need of repairs, as the sills on two sides have rotted away, and in places around the room there is space wide enough for one's fingers to be thrust between the floor and the baseboard. These places

have been patched up with moulding, and during the unusually mild weather of December and January of this winter the room has been quite comfortable.

OUR HIGH SCHOOL

For several years Weare has had cause to be proud of the prizes brought home by pupils who have exhibited in various places the results of their work in agriculture and home economics courses. This year the girls won second place with their cooking and sewing exhibit at Hopkinton Fair. The boys in the agricultural department won the Sweepstake Cup in the State Judging Contest held at Durham. At the Baby Chick and Egg Show at Concord the boys won the Sweepstakes Cup, seven ribbons and \$6.25 in cash prizes.

This is the more spectacular side of the agricultural work, and there is much to be done in a more quiet way to improve the effectiveness of this department. Some of our boys need larger projects and greater opportunity to practice their ability as farm managers. The real laboratory of agriculture is at home on the farm, and the boy who is limited in his opportunity to practice and experiment under guidance at home has a limit set on his ability to derive benefit from agricultural study which cannot be removed by class work. There is also need for more and larger cooperative enterprises to be conducted by the class, such as building a farm shop, pruning and spraying an orchard, etc. This type of enterprise gives the boy a chance to assume leadership, work with others, and test his business ability which is difficult to provide otherwise. Parents and friends are encouraged to suggest practical opportunities of this nature in Weare, to the headmaster.

There are few opportunities for a high school to compare results of instruction with other schools in the state; but in those ways which are provided, Weare has made a good record during the past year. Two tests are given annually by the State Board to high school seniors. In 1931 the subjects chosen are geography and English. Out of 97 schools reported, only 12 did better than Weare in geography; and our

seniors did better than the average of the state on the English test. We sent a team of three students to Keene for the scholarship contests last May. Our team competed with fifteen other schools in the chemistry contest, winning eighth place.

It is a source of pleasure to us all to see that our pupils are deriving results from instruction which are more than equal to the average of the schools of the state. Maintaining a high standard of work in any high school, however, depends fully as much upon the willingness of the students to work, as upon the skill and industry of the teachers. An assignment designed to increase the pupil's knowledge or to improve his mental capacity is effective only in the proportion that the pupil accomplishes the work assigned. When boys and girls come to class day after day with lessons not prepared, there is need for greater cooperation between parents and teachers to encourage our young people to take advantage of their opportunities. Parents are urged to visit the school or talk with the teachers outside of school hours, see what is offered, and become better acquainted with the amount and kind of work their children are doing.

MUSIC SUPERVISION

Three districts, Weare, Henniker and Dunbarton, have combined to secure the services of a music supervisor for the present year. We have employed Lucile Thompson, a graduate of Keene Normal School. She spends two days each week in Weare, two in Henniker and one in Dunbarton. She has proved herself a very capable teacher, and her services are much appreciated by the teachers and pupils.

THE GEORGE WASHINGTON BICENTENNIAL
