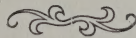

# Record of Town Meeting

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Weare, N. H., March 13, 1934.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 13th day of March, 1934, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Forrest Dearborn, Moderator. Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 856.

ARTICLE 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast, 468.

ART. 2. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to  
raise the sum of \$6,000 to defray town charges.

ART. 3. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Frank Tucker for Trustee of the Trust Funds. This being done, the Moderator declared Frank Tucker elected Trustee for three years.

ART. 4. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer, Trustee of the Library. This being done, the Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

ART. 5. Upon motion of George M. Slack, voted to raise the sum of \$3,000 to reduce the existing deficit.

ART. 6. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman to raise the sum of \$8,000. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Denton Dearborn to raise the sum of \$5,000. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$7,500, for highways and bridges, reserving 25 per cent of this for winter roads.

ART. 7. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to dismiss the Article.

ART. 8. Secret ballot was taken and the results are as follows: Yes, 275; No, 137.

ART. 9. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of \$100.

ART. 10. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

ART. 11. Upon motion of Edward T. Breed, that the town allow 4 per cent June 1st, 3 per cent July 1st, and 2 per cent August 1st. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted to give a discount on all taxes paid on or before June 1st of 5 per cent.

ART. 12. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted to dismiss the Article.

ART. 13. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property which may be acquired through Tax Collectors Deeds.

ART. 14. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

ART. 15. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth to raise the sum of \$50. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Geo. M. Gunn, voted to raise the sum of \$200.

ART. 16. Upon motion of Frank P. Gregg to raise the sum of \$150. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for Band Concerts, which are to be given in villages of the township on evenings to be chosen by the residents.

ART. 17. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to raise the sum of \$550 to buy a plow for truck plowing.

ART. 18. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, to raise the sum of \$1,250 for a pump for the Fire Truck. Frank H.



Peaslee offered an amendment to the motion, that a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to buy the pump. The motion as amended was carried.

The Moderator appointed the following Committee :

Gerald H. Hight, Charles F. Eastman, Gordon W. Porter, George M. Slack and Fred C. Jones.

ART. 19. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to discontinue further use of its tractors on the summer roads only in case of emergency.

ART. 20. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth, voted to dismiss the Article.

Voted that this meeting be dissolved.

# Notice

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the town of Weare in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, March 12, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate to cover the existing deficit.
6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, including winter roads.
7. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II road known as the road from North Weare to East Weare, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of seventeen hundred thirteen

(1,713.00) dollars or will accept State Aid for construction of class V roads, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of thirteen hundred sixty-five dollars and 23 cents, the State to give the sum of fifty-four hundred sixty dollars and ninety-four cents (5,460.94).

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars, to be used with the sum of four thousand dollars to be furnished by the State, this money to be used for the permanent improvement of the highway between North Weare and East Weare.

9. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

10. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

11. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand two hundred fifty (4,250.00) dollars, to be used with the amount of eight thousand five hundred (8,500) dollars to be furnished by the State, this money to be used for the permanent improvement of the highway leading from the Deering line to the State road at South Weare.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any property which may be acquired through tax collectors deeds.

16. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred (200) dollars for the Weare band.

17. To see if the town will vote to buy a blade snow plow, raise and appropriate money for same, not to exceed two hundred ninety (290) dollars.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to buying a pump for pumping wells, raise and appropriate the necessary money, not to exceed one hundred (100) dollars.

19. To see if the town will vote to deduct 25 per cent of checks, paid by town, to apply on taxes.

20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the amount necessary to secure State Aid.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a Community Hall or Gymnasium, and purchase a piece of land, if necessary, to be coordinated with a P.W.A. project, if possible and advisable.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate sum of money for blister rust.

23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## First Annual Report of the Weare Volunteer Fire Department

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The Weare Volunteer Fire Department was organized April 12, 1934. Its personnel is thirty-four men: the two head officers, namely, the Chief and Deputy Chief, necessarily residing in Weare Center; and each of the four subdivisions, Weare Center, North Weare, East Weare, and South Weare, furnishing a company of eight men. In addition, the department has the co-operation of five town fire wards appointed by the Board of Selectmen.

The department's equipment is stationed at different points of the town as follows:

Stationed at Weare Center: Fire truck with its main equipment being a 150-gallon-per-minute portable pump, together with 1850 feet of 1½ in. hose, 60 feet of 2 in. suction hose, Siamese connections, nozzles, etc.; a 135-gallon Booster tank and pump (driven by truck motor), together with 150 feet of ¾ in. hose; ladders, pike poles, shovels, other small tools, and a siren for alarm purposes.

Stationed at East Weare: Portable forest fire pump; 500 feet discharge hose; 20 feet suction hose; and accessories.

Stationed at South Weare: Same type of equipment as at East Weare.

Distributed throughout the town are twenty-seven soda and acid extinguishers; twelve knap-sack pumps, and eleven pump tanks.

During 1934 there were calls for a total number of seventeen fires: seven of them, chimney fires; five, building fires; and five, brush or grass fires.

As an unemployment relief measure, the State Forestry Department made appropriations to the town for the digging of water holes for fire protection. The appropriation allotted to Weare enabled the town to locate eight water holes as follows: One site each at Weare Center, Clinton Grove, Slab City, Sugar Hill, East Weare, South Weare, Dearbornville (pond), and South Weare (pond).

On motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted to raise the amount of money asked for by the school board \$17,357.38.

On motion of E. T. Breed, voted that it is the sense of this meeting that hereafter school meeting shall be held on Saturday afternoon.

On motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted that the school warrant be printed in the Town Report.

On motion of Frank L. Eastman, as amended by motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted that all the school driveways in town be repaired.

On motion of Bernard Gunn, voted that the School Board be instructed to remove the pump on the Center school lot, or put it in shape to be used.

# Report of School Nurse

Weare, N. H.

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Before submitting my annual report for the year 1933-1934 I wish to thank the superintendent, members of the school board, the teachers and the different organizations for their interest and kind cooperation in the health work of our schools, especially those who helped finance and make our dental clinic possible this fall.

The correction of physical defects has always been a source of concern to our school physicians and school nurses.

Many homes where the family income cannot be stretched to include extra attention to children aid has been given for remedial work on teeth, tonsils and eyes.

The Child Health Recovery Program was made possible

July first, through an allotment of Federal funds to the New Hampshire Relief Administration for the purpose of providing treatment for needy children suffering from these defects. Hot lunches were provided in many of the rural schools, also milk and cod liver oil.

It might be interesting to know that through the Relief and other sources this Union consisting of Goffstown Independent, Goffstown Town School District, New Boston, Bedford, Dunbarton and Weare, that 71 defective vision cases have been corrected, 57 have had their tonsils removed, 475 have received complete dental care through the seven dental clinics held since June, 1934.

At the Weare dental clinic in October, 102 received care, total number of dental operations, 264.

A typhoid clinic has been given in three of the towns since last report.

## Report of the Superintendent of Schools

---

*To the Citizens of Weare:*

The current year is my twelfth as superintendent of schools in this supervisory union. When I came the union consisted of the following districts: Goffstown Town, Goffstown Ind., Bedford, and New Boston. There were three towns and four school districts and so remained until two years ago.

The following table will indicate—regarding each district—the number of teachers, pupils, and buildings in which schools were carried on. The figures given hold generally for about the first five years.

During the years from 1922 to 1933 the towns and districts remained the same. Forces at work everywhere, were bringing changes in the schools of the Union.

Bedford, in these years, moved with the tendency which led to the closing of one-room schools. As the table above



shows, there were nine buildings in use up to ten years ago—all but one were the usual one-room rural buildings. First a two-room building at the center which brought together pupils from two or three other buildings. Following that, in order to take care of the increasing school population at another section adjoining Manchester, another two-room building was erected. A few years later, a third building, a three-room, was erected near the Country Club. These three modern buildings eliminated all the old one-rooms and provided increased school advantages to all.

New Boston, which had eight buildings in use in 1922, has now but one. All of the school population of the town comes to the village. The building, after changes, and remodeling, provides amply and comfortably for all with modern conveniences. The chief advantage, however, is in the educational opportunity in providing in so far as is possible, equal privileges for all. There are three elementary groups, Primary grades, one to three—Intermediate, four to six, Junior High, grades seven to eight—and Senior High School.

In the Goffstown Town District, three one-room buildings were in use twelve years ago. Since that time, one has been closed in the East part of the town. Two one-room buildings are still in use, each having more than twenty pupils.

During the school years 1932-1933 and 1933-1934, it became necessary for the State Department of Education to re-group the various towns in the State in order to decrease the number of Unions. This meant that a number of the remaining ones had to be made larger. In this period of change, Bedford was taken from the Goffstown Union and annexed to that composed of Hudson, Merrimack, Litchfield, and Pelham.

In place of Bedford, Weare, which had previously been with Hopkinton, Henniker, and Dunbarton, was assigned to Union 19. This kept the number of towns and districts the same, three towns, and four districts; but increased the total number of teachers by eight, increased the number of buildings by seven; increased somewhat the number of pupils, increased by many miles the travel required.

The following year, 1933-1934, when further reorganization was imperative, Dunbarton was added to Union 19 increasing teachers by four and adding about 80 pupils and three buildings. At the same time Bow was assigned to this Union, adding seven teachers, five buildings, and about 150 pupils. So that during the current year the Union is made up of five towns and six school districts.

The table below, similar to one used previously, gives corresponding data for the Union as it is at present.

The demands upon a superintendent are continuous and varied; the major portion of his time, however, is given to the direct supervision of the work done in the schools. Included in this is the selection of teachers, general supervision of the work, and plan. This can be accomplished only by being where the work is being done—in the class-rooms. Observation may give rise to question or suggestion as to purpose or plan or method of material. Plans may be discussed in teacher's groups, but more often and more effectively by frequent personal conferences.

Each of the fifty superintendents in the state sends a report each month to the State Office, a report of "inspection and supervision." Their monthly summaries indicate that in this particular year the Union ranks among the few highest. The figures for the cities of Manchester, Nashua, and Concord are omitted in the following figures, but include the reports of all other forty-seven superintendents.

For the school year, since last September, and including January, 1935, the "calls" are as follows:

The selection or purchase of books for all schools, the estimated amount of "supplies," (supplies including the materials used by pupils) ordering, distributing books and supplies to all schools, in the five towns requires considerable time. "Supplies" for the Union are usually combined in a "lump" amount, first to secure bids—and then the purchase, from one house in order to reduce transportation charges.

There are six meetings of School Boards each month, sometimes more, seldom less. There is considerable time required in meetings and securing data for reports and information for Boards and teachers.

In the Union now are three Senior New Hampshire schools, Goffstown, Weare and New Boston. New Boston and Weare provide agricultural courses along with the usual ones. Weare also is giving Home Economics for girls.

In last year's "Scholarship Day" competition, for scholastic honors among the graduating classes from High Schools in the state, the two highest places in the English tests came to two schools in this Union. Goffstown tied with Lancaster for first place. Second place, but one point lower, was taken by New Boston. There were seventeen high schools in this group competition.

This year brought an unusually large number of changes in the teaching force.

Mr. Philip Barton, a graduate of New Hampshire State University, having taught successfully for a few years at Colebrook, came to assume duties at the High School as Headmaster. He is teaching agriculture, chemistry, coaching basketball along with administrative duties.

Miss Helen Foss, a four-year graduate of Plymouth Normal, has charge of the English, French, and Music, in addition to other subjects and duties.

Miss Priscilla Garrett, a graduate of the State University, has charge of the girls' work in Home Economics and other subjects. The work in Home Economics now meets the State requirements necessary to receive Federal Aid.

Miss Florence Harris of Concord, normal graduate, with experience, teaches at Riverdale.

Miss Harriet Anderson of Goffstown, normal graduate with previous experience, is teacher at Clinton Grove.

Miss Gladys Miller of Manchester, a normal graduate with previous experience, teaches at North Weare.

Miss Louise Sayward of Manchester graduated from Keene last June, and teaches at Buxton.

The School Census in September showed a total enrollment including all schools of 264.

Many times we may fail. But, in any case—and to be sure—visit your schools—and inform yourself first hand.

For the continued co-operation of the members of the School Board, and the teachers, again I express my appreciation.
