ARTICLE 2: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-19.C(5) by limiting the time of a sign erection permit to one year, and if not erected within the year term the permit expires; and deleting the completion of construction requirements now in the Ordinance.

ARTICLE 4: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-6 by inserting alphabetically a definition for "Wetlands" and establishes new provisions for a new overlay district controlling wetlands by insertion of new provisions in said Ordinance at 147-11.1.1 setting forth the District, its boundaries, permitted uses, lot sizes, density, setback, lot coverage, buffer and other detail uses and special exceptions and modifying present setbacks in said Ordinance at Article 147-17 by adding new subparagraphs D. and E. and fixing its boundaries in said

Ordinance with a new Article 147-25 integrating into the District Boundaries Article the 1997 Wetlands Composite Map to indicate presence of wetlands, and other details of certain uses and key word definitions within the District.

ARTICLE 5: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-6 by inserting alphabetically a definition for "Special Highway" and establishes a restriction applicable to all Districts requiring that all utility systems shall hereafter be placed underground by adding subparagraph C. to said Ordinance at Article 147-10.1 and by establishing a new provision for a Special Highway Corridor District in said Ordinance at Article 147-14.2 along the proposed Conway Bypass stating the purposes, it boundaries, applicability, development standards, permitted uses, lot sizes, yard setbacks, buffer strips along lots and intersecting streets, development density and density credits for protective buffer strips, lot coverage, signs, lighting, building heights, parking lots and other details of certain credits and uses within this District and with insertion of new Article 147-26 to establish the actual boundaries of the District which are within 500 feet of the edge of the right-of-way and intersections of the Conway Bypass per the State of NH Bypass Plan (1993).

ARTICLE 6: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which creates new definitions within the Conway Zoning Ordinance at Article 147-6 for buffer, buffer for the Special Highway Corridor District, buffer for wetlands, building footprint, development (deleting the present definition and inserting a new one), footprint, parking space, scenic view or vista, sediment, shoreline, storage shed, slope, soil type, state highway, street, wetlands and wetland buffer.

ARTICLE 7: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as petitioned by Rosalie F. McGee and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District in the Town Zoning Ordinance at Article 147-22.A(3) which is in the Conway Area so as to extend the Commercial District boundary northerly along Route 16 on its westerly sideline changing the Liberty Santa Maria property which is now in the Residential/Agricultural District into the Highway Commercial District.

ARTICLE 8: (Bond to be acted on by Separate Ballot) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Million Six Hundred Seventy One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,671,500) for the purpose of constructing an addition to the Conway Public Library, to include improvements to the existing structure; and to authorize the Selectmen to raise through borrowing up to One Million Three Hundred Thirty Seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars

(\$1,337,200) under the Municipal Finance Act, with the Selectmen authorized to arrange all terms and conditions of such borrowing and its repayment, to be acted on by separate ballot of the Town; with the balance of Three Hundred Thirty Four Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$334,300) to be raised through grants, gifts and other fund raising activities of the Conway Public Library Trustees and the Friends of the Conway Public Library. (2/3 vote required.)

ARTICLE 9: To see whether or not the Town will vote to amend the first sentence of the Charter of the Town of Conway, Part II, Legislative Form of Government, Section XXII, Commissions, Subsection D, Conway Planning **Board**, by inserting the following:

.... RSA 674:5, 6, 7 & 8 (Capital Improvements Program)

The purpose of this Charter amendment is to give the Planning Board authority and responsibility of preparing and maintaining a Capital Improvements Program. This authority requires legislative approval.

ARTICLE 10: To see whether or not the Town will vote to amend the Charter of the Town of Conway, Part II, LEGISLATIVE FORM OF GOVERNMENT, Section XXII, Commissions, Subsection D, Conway Planning Board, by deleting the second sentence and last paragraph and inserting therefor as follows:

The Planning Board shall consist of seven (7) voting members with one (1) member to be one (1) designated Selectman as a voting ex officio member and six (6) members who are residents of the Town to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, per RSA 673:2(a) as may be amended from time to time.

No Planning Board member may be appointed to more than two (2) full consecutive three (3) year terms or serve in said office more than eight (8) consecutive years, whichever is greater. Nothing shall prohibit reappointment of said person to the Planning Board after being out of office for one (1) year.

This Amendment to become effective the second Tuesday of March in the vear 2000.

The purpose of this Charter amendment is to appoint the Planning Board members instead of electing them. This change is allowed by Town Charter and is in accordance with RSA 673:2, II, (c).

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be used to repair a foundation drainage problem at the Conway Library. If the Library Bond Article #8 passes, this Article shall be deemed null and void. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Six Million Two Hundred Eighty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$6,288,423). Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Six Million One Hundred Eighty Three Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Two Dollars (\$6,183,982) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to be used to implement the Whitaker Properties Four Year Master Plan construction. The monies in 1999 shall be used primarily for the relocation and renovation of the barn on the property. Any unexpended funds shall be carried over to the year 2000 to be used to offset the cost of the second year of the plan. This will be a non lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the Implementation Master Plan construction is completed or in five (5) years whichever is less.

ARTICLE 14. (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a one year Collective Bargaining Agreement for the calendar year 1999 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME #93, Local #859, Department of Public Works, having a total estimated contract cost for 1999 of Five Hundred Seven Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Nine Dollars (\$507,359) which amount is included in Warrant Article #12, the Operating Budget Article. No further amount of money is required to be raised and appropriated as there are no additional increases in total salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year.

ARTICLE 15. (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a two year Collective Bargaining Agreement for the calendar years 1999 and 2000 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME Local #3657, Police Department. The total estimated contract cost for 1999 is Seven Hundred Seventy Three Thousand One Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$773,176). No further amount of money is required to be raised and appropriated as there are no additional increases in total salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. The total estimated contract cost for the calendar year 2000 is estimated to be Seven Hundred Ninety Three Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$793,960). Proposed by the Conway Police Commission. By vote of the bargaining unit membership, the contract terms were not accepted (not ratified), thereby requiring negotiations

to continue with no new contract for the voters to act on. The yes/no vote, therefore, shall have no legal status or be binding in any way.

ARTICLE 16. (Separate - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) to be used to supplement the Conway Village Fire District Winter Sidewalk Maintenance Operations. In future years this amount shall be contained in the Town's Highway Department Operating Budget. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 17. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be used to construct a fence at the Town's Recreational Community Building property in Center Conway on the easterly property line. ARTICLE 18. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000) to be used to stabilize and correct the river eroding banking of the Conway Village Cemetery, During 1998 the Town was granted \$3,656 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to stabilize the bank, but not the funds necessary to correct the situation to prevent further occurrences. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 19. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Four Hundred and Fifty Four Dollars (\$7,454) for the purchase of a key control system for the Police Department (Town's) gasoline storage, located at the Police Department. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 20. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety One Dollars (\$12,791) (Gross Budget) for a federal local law enforcement block grant. Of the total amount, One Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Nine Dollars (\$1,279) shall be raised by taxes as the Town's grant match, and the balance of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$11,512) shall be received as revenue from the block grant. The block grant is to buy radio equipment and to set up a repeater system for the Police Department radios. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the program money is expended or in two years, whichever is less. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 21. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred and Fifty Six dollars (\$16,456) for the purpose of complete connection of wiring to the existing generator transfer switch, relocation of existing electronic striker control box, exterior cameras for outside the Police Station building and a monitor and time lapse recorder and multiplexor for video taping the cell blocks. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 22. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,527) for the purchase and installation of an updated Telephone/Communications System for the Town Hall. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by Board of Selectmen (4-1-0).

ARTICLE 23. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to build a Public Restroom Facility in North Conway Village with the Selectmen proposing to construct the same on Seavey Street at the site of the old North Conway Water Precinct building. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways Program. If the grant is approved, the Town will raise \$16,000 of the \$80,000 appropriation; otherwise, the entire \$80,000 will be raised. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:17, VI, and will not lapse until facility construction is completed or in two years, whichever is less. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 24. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to build a Public Restroom Facility in Conway Village with the Selectmen proposing to construct the same adjacent to the Conway Village Chamber of Commerce Building. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways Program. If the grant is approved the Town will raise \$8,000 of the \$40,000 appropriation; otherwise, the entire \$40,000 will be raised. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:17, VI, and will not lapse until facility construction is completed or in two years, whichever is less. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 25. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to be used to do a cost engineering analysis to remove the utility poles and place all services underground from Route 16/302 intersection to Barnes Road/Route 16 intersection. A portion of the funds will be used to hire a third party consultant to review the data provided by the utility companies. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways program for which the Conway portion of Route 16 qualifies, and has received a letter of commitment for five gifts and grants of \$500 each totaling \$2,500. If the Federal grant is approved, the Town will raise through taxes \$500 of the \$15,000 appropriation, if not approved, \$12,500 will be raised. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 26. (Separate - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) for the purpose of compensating elected or appointed Planning Board members One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) a year, exclusive of the Selectmen's representative and Alternates. (Majority vote required.)

ARTICLE 27. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance regarding Septage:

CHAPTER 106 SEPTAGE

106-1. Legislative authority; intent.

This Article is adopted pursuant to RSA 31:39 and RSA 147 for the purpose of better regulating and promoting the general health and welfare of the public and toward more prudent operations.

106-2. Authority to adopt rules and regulations.

A. The Selectmen are authorized to establish and/or amend reasonable rules and regulations from time to time controlling hauling and disposal and land application of septage. Such rules and regulations may encompass fines for violation of the rules and regulations and all other reasonable rules and regulations necessary and/or appropriate toward the prudential management of said solid waste activity.

$106\hbox{-}3.\,Manner\ of\ adoption\ of\ rules\ and\ regulations;}\ amendments.$

A. The Selectmen may adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations from time to time, provided that at least two (2) public hearings shall be held, with each hearing having published notices therefor at least two (2) weeks prior to such hearing; after the second hearing, the Selectmen shall vote to adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations and record the rules and regulations so adopted and/or amended with the Town Clerk of Conway, and thereafter the same shall be valid and enforceable. In the notice of the second hearing, the entire proposed rules and regulations or amendments thereto shall be published, and only nonsubstantive changes may be made after the last hearing.

106-4. Violations and penalties.

A. Any violation of any provision of the Article or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder shall be subject to civil fines and actions as follows:

- (1) First offense: Written notice of violation.
- (2) Second offense: a fine of five hundred dollars (\$500).
- (3) Third offense: a fine of one thousand dollars (\$1000) and revocation of permit for one (1) month.
- (4) Further offenses: revocation of permit for one (1) year.

B. Failure to comply with the penalties, as prescribed above, within five (5) days of notification shall result in the immediate revocation of the permit until such time as the penalty has been complied with.

C. Civil fines or actions assessed for a violation more than one year prior to a subsequent violation shall not be considered for purposes of determining whether or not a second or subsequent violation has occurred under this ordinance. The date of payment of a civil fine or revocation of the permit shall determine the date of a violation hereunder.

D. Should the town find it necessary to take court action regarding any violation of this article, the cost of court action, including the Town's reasonable Attorney's fees, shall be paid to the town upon conviction. The town may also enforce this Article and the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder by injunction, restraining order or other appropriate action where such remedy is appropriate.

106-5. Amendments by Town Meeting and by Selectmen.

A. This Article or any rules and regulations promulgated by the Selectmen may be amended by majority vote of the town at any Town Meeting, the warrant for which gives notice of the proposed change. This shall not be deemed to otherwise limit the authority of the Selectmen to adopt and/or amend rules and regulations consistent with the powers and procedure hereunder established or as may be amended at any such town meeting.

106-6. Regulations.

A. All rules and regulations governing septage shall be in accordance with the most current version of New Hampshire Code of Administrative Rules Env-Ws 1600 Septage Management, hereafter referred to as the State Rules.

B. In addition to the State Rules, the Town shall require that all septage be screened prior to land application. Screening of the septage shall be performed such that no visible or identifiable plastics or other non biodegradable materials shall be applied to the land.

106-7. Permits.

A. All septage haulers are required to file a copy of their State permit with the Town of Conway. It shall be the haulers' responsibility to insure that current permits are on file with the Town. Permits are to be filed with the Town's Health Officer.

106-8. Enforcement.

A. The Town's Health Officer shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance. **106-9. Origin.**

A. Only Domestic Septage from the following towns shall be permitted for land application in the Town of Conway:

Albany, Bartlett, Chatham, Conway, Eaton, Hales Location, Jackson, Madison.

The Town's financial condition continued to improve in the year 1999 and for the first time in many years it was not necessary to borrow in anticipation of tax collections. The General Fund balance at year-end was lower than at the beginning of the year due to the need to raise less from taxes because of the Claremont decision by the State Legislature. Rising market rates generally and the utilization of a favorable deposit product interest rate wise at our principal bank resulted in a \$30,000 increase in interest income over the prior year.

My thanks again to the Board of Selectmen, the professional staff at Town Hall and especially to the Finance Manager, Lucy Philbrick for their dedicated and prudent management of the Town's affairs this past year.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1998 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraphs, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Government Accounting Standards Board Technical Bulletin 98-1, *Disclosures about Year 2000 Issues*, requires disclosure of certain matters regarding the year 2000 issue. The Town of Conway has included such disclosures in Note 6C. Because of the unprecedented nature of the year 2000 issue, its effects and the success of related remediation efforts will not be fully determinable until the year 2000 and thereafter. Accordingly, insufficient audit evidence exists to support the Town of Conway's disclosures with respect to the year 2000 issue made in Note 6C. Further we do not provide assurance that the Town of Conway is or will be year 2000 ready, that the Town of Conway's year 2000 remediation efforts will be successful in whole or in part, or that parties with which the Town of Conway does business will be year 2000 ready.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Conway has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, along with the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to examine evidence regarding year 2000 disclosures, as noted above, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material

respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway, as of December 31, 1998, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Conway Conway, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of The Town of Conway for the year ended December 31, 1998, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the Town's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to those individuals involved during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

Veteran Service Exemption: RSA 72:28-36

Amount = \$100 Regular Veteran, \$1,400 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption: RSA 72:43-h

Must be resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1 of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly, if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.

Net income of \$14,000 or, if married, \$21,000.

Have assets of \$50,000 or less, excluding the value of residence.

Amount of exemption:

65 to 75 years of age, \$25,000 75 to 80 years of age, \$40,000 80 years or older, \$50,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

Physically Handicapped: RSA 72:37-a

"Physically handicapped person" means a person who by reason of physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him to propel himself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

Blind Exemption: RSA 72:37

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department.

Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his or her residential real estate equalized.

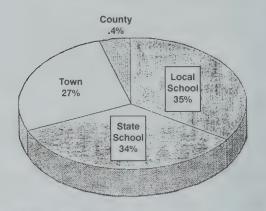

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Last year was our busiest year since the 1994 revaluation. This was mostly due to the new tax mapping project and the computer hardware and software upgrades to avoid any Y2K problems.

The mapping project, contracted out to Cartographics Associates from Littleton, resulted in over 5,000 changes to land areas. Most of these changes were minor and they were usually due to the improved accuracy of present day computerized mapping equipment. Some land area changes were the result of catching up to and correcting errors that had crept into the assessment records over the years. Other differences seemed to have been tied to bodies of water! Deed descriptions are often copied verbatim from deed to deed over a period of decades with no thought to actual changes in the lay of the land. However, the Saco River, for example, changes course over time, eroding land here and depositing it there so that actual riverfront boundaries might be quite different from their historical deed descriptions. Wherever possible, the intent of the deed language was given priority. For instance, if a deed read "approximately 1,000 feet to the river", it was determined that the intent of the grantor was to sell property to the river, even though the actual distance today might be significantly more than or less than 1,000 feet.

Property boundaries were determined through a combination of deed research, recorded survey plan review, aerial photography and satellite determination (GPS) of fixed points throughout the town. Whenever there was a discrepancy between records or descriptions, survey plants took precedence, then deeds, and then prevailing physical evidence. Because the undertaking is so massive and complex, quality control is still ongoing.

Another time consuming project this year was the upgrade of our assessment software to a graphical user interface (Windows) for improved ease of use. Unfortunately, our vendor decided to combine their Y2K compliance upgrades with the promised "Windows" upgrade and the resulting product was rushed into service prematurely. We spent the better part of the summer detecting and correcting aggravating software glitches.

Of course, no discussion of 1999 would be complete without mentioning the major changes in the state's property tax structure. A new statewide property tax was instituted in an effort to comply with a State Supreme Court mandate that public school funding somehow be more equalized between communities. This tax, and its effects, is still evolving and there are probably more changes to come before the issue of school funding settles down once and for all. At present, the effect on our assessing department has been increased oversight by the State's Department of Revenue. Our current policies of adjusting assessments annually to market value, where warranted by sales analysis, appears to have anticipated this new environment.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The Board of Adjustment heard sixteen cases in 1999. Six were variance requests; four, which were denied, and two were withdrawn. There were six requests for Special Exceptions of which all six were granted. The Board heard three Appeals from Administrative Decision with two overturned and one withdrawn by the applicant. The Board denied one motion for Rehearing.

Most controversial of our hearings this year was the denial of the planning board for a rehearing on the Zodiac, Inc. special exception. The Board denied the request of the Planning Board for a rehearing based on the fact that they did not have the standing to bring the request, only the Selectmen have that authority for the Town. The Court upheld this. Rehearing may be granted for technical errors such as insufficient notice of hearing or if there was evidence that was unavailable at the time of the original hearing. Application for rehearing may be brought by the applicant or any abutter or other party affected directly by the decision of appeal. Denial of the rehearing allows the applicant to take the case to court. A rehearing allows the Board to correct mistakes in procedure but does not necessarily mean any change in the decision by the Board. We were sorry to see Dawn Emerson leave the Town and wish her well in her new endeavors. We look forward to working with Tom Irving and the other new members of Town staff.

CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1999 - (Building)

Still another year has come and gone. 1999 was a year of change within the structure of staff at Town Hall. With the leaving of Shawn Bergeron and his first replacement Mark Moulton, the strain was on for the Assistant Building Inspector, (Tom Smith) and other town staff, trying to fill the gap and still do their own jobs as well. As of November 15, 1999 I took over the job of filling the shoes of Mr. Bergeron and Mark Moulton as full time building inspector, and have been doing so ever since. The job presents a welcome challenge that I enjoy and feel will last many years. The internal workings of the town office are much different than I had anticipated; the harmony, assistance and support received from the other staff are a great help and truly appreciated.

In the building inspection area, 383 building permits were issued with an estimated valuation for the completed work of over \$24.5 million dollars. The fees paid to the Town to obtain permits for this work was in excess of \$68 thousand dollars. As in past years most of the inspection time was spent on commercial projects. The number of permits issued in January of 2000 is up considerably over January 1999, probably due to the warm weather at the start of the winter.

I truly hope to keep a good relationship with all of the contractors that do work within the Town of Conway, and intend on doing my best to work with and assist them in any way that my job allows, so long as the outcome of all building, commercial and residential is safe and up to current code!

In the Health and Zoning area, 1999 had a complete turn around with two new individuals taking over. Tinker Kiesman took over as Health Officer, and Sandy Stowell took over as Zoning Officer. The health issues have mainly involved day care and educational facility inspections, complaints, septic failures, unsafe housing issues and many more.

Zoning issues have been busy, the normal items dealing with the Sign Ordinance, vending permits, tent sales, etc. A new format has been proposed for governing the tracking and overall enforcement of both zoning and building issues. Tracking has gone into effect already and enforcement procedures will be soon to follow.



This will be my first year at Town Hall and I look forward to serving as Building Inspector for many years to come.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The Commission met monthly to attend to the routine business of overseeing the many public lands in the Town that we are entrusted with.

Whitaker Woods is a real gem, in that it offers such a variety of uses and still has a great potential for expanding its recreational facilities. Over 800 residents took advantage of our partnership with the non-profit Mount Washington Valley Ski Touring Assn. where they groom our trails as part of their network, and in return, Conway residents get to use their entire network of trails free. This arrangement also assures the ESSC Jr. Ski Program and the Kennett Ski Teams of top quality skiing and racing conditions.

Shedd Woods, on Rte. 16 opposite the Memorial Hospital, now boasts a delightful picnic area with vistas of the Moats and its ledges over the Intervale. This is a result of extensive work by the State and the Conway Public Works Depts. after our timber cut in 1998.

The 900 acre "Conway Common Lands" off Hurricane Mtn. Road became our primary concern in 1999 because of the ice storm of Jan. 1998 and the availability of grants to assess the damages and make up a Forest Management Plan. With this accomplished through cooperative efforts with the Green Hills Conservancy and the State of NH Forestry Dept. we were able to make the first of a series of timber harvests. These harvests are a win-win situation. The forests are improved, wildlife is encouraged, and income is generated. In this case, enough to cover our entire budget for the coming year!

Now that we have Forest Management Plans in place for most of our town owned forests, the Conservation Commission can now generate income from timber harvests to not only maintain and improve these properties, but cover all the anticipated expenses of the Commission.

This past year Holly Meserve, our able secretary, has been compiling a history of town owned lands; Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods, Puddin Pond, Walker's Pond, the Hubbard-Davis Forest, Abenaki Lands, Saco River Overlook, and the Conway Common Lands. In the coming year we hope to assemble this material in booklet form so that Conway residents and visitors can better enjoy them.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER ANNUAL REPORT 1999

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Fire permits are required for any open burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are eleven Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. During the 1999 season Forest Rangers were busy assisting communities with suppression of difficult and remote multi-day fires. Forest Rangers have also investigated numerous complaints regarding violations of the timber harvest and forest fire laws, and taken enforcement action to ensure compliance. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. The 1999 fire season was a challenging but safe year for wildland firefighters in New Hampshire. The severe drought conditions throughout the spring and summer months combined with residual effects of 1998 Ice Storm, resulted in a dramatic increase in wildland fires. In addition to burning in excess of 452 acres, 35 structures were also impacted by wildfire. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for both landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

Please contact your local fire department before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The General Assistance Department's projected budget for 1999 was \$40,000.00. Actual expenditures totalled \$41,744.43. Categorically broken down, the Town of Conway spent \$23,033.75 for housing, \$11,111.55 for heat and electricity, \$5,073.13 for medication, \$1,960.72 for food and personal care products, and \$330.28 on miscellaneous expenses.

Total expenditures decreased by \$6,082.57 from 1998. Housing, electricity and fuel collectively decreased by \$1,854.70. In addition, the General Assistance Department budget was overspent by 4.36% in 1999 compared to 40.67% in 1998! The budget request for the year 2000 is \$36,000.00 which is \$4,000.00 less than 1999 and represents a 10% decrease.

As a result of Welfare Reform, staff, and schedule changes, the General Assistance Program is in a time of transition. I was hired in August as a part-time employee, however, on January 1, 2000, my position became full-time. We anticipate caseload increases by the year 2001 when the 60-month TANF (Temporary Assistance to Needy Families) limit takes effect so it is imperative that we start preparing well in advance. I am working diligently to update forms, improve the food pantry to include essential non-food items, build positive rapport within the community and provide clients with a repertoire of services so that they may become self-sufficient. My goal is to accomplish all of this while staying within this year's budget allocations.

On behalf of my clients and the Town of Conway, I would like to extend a note of thanks and genuine appreciation for donations received. I cannot begin to express how much your continued support has done for our clients. Since August, people have donated money, food, essential non-food products, winter clothing, toys, furniture and their precious time to this program. One local business matched a \$100.00 individual donation enabling us to purchase twice as many essential non-food items for the pantry. Another individual who wanted to donate furniture paid storage fees until I could arrange to pick up and store the items. We should be proud to belong to such a thoughtful, kindhearted and generous community. Thank you so much!!

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT, 1999

The Conway Public Library had a busy year in 1999. The library's popular programs continue to generate interest and expand. The pleasure of reading includes all age groups and remains our focus.

During 1999, 36,082 visitors to the library checked out 64,786 items ranging from adult and children fiction and non-fiction to videos and audio books. The library registered 459 new borrowers. There were 7,454 reference questions answered during the year.

The library continues to offer free Internet access to the public. Training is available on how to use the Internet as a research tool. Use of the four computers continues to grow. Internet usage increased from 844 in 1998 to 7,224 in 1999. The library continues to offer reference databases on CD-ROM.

The Mystical and Mysterious, More Experiences in Nicaragua, A Visit with Sarah Orne Jewett, Mountain Biking on the Continental Divide, Your Career in Crafts, were some of the programs offered in 1999. The popular story times for children continued to grow with attendance reaching 1,752. Throughout the summer, 227 children read 6,617 books in the "Once Upon a Summer Reading" program. Other programs included poetry and writing contests, guest authors, Conversational French Workshop and the New Hampshire Humanities discussions series. The Literacy Center at the library was moved to the Adult Tutorial Office in North Conway.

Researchers who visited the Henney History Room in 1999 numbered 512, while several hundred more took advantage of The Henney Room's on-line services. Our long-term project of indexing 1000 pages of Eastman family genealogy was completed in December. Thanks to a grant from the Henney Historical Fund, several file cabinets have been purchased. The funds will also be used to purchase the MountainEar and the Conway Daily Sun on microfilm. Both the vertical files and genealogy files have been reorganized for ease of use. A number of genealogies and reference books were donated this past year.

The Conway Public Library volunteers contributed 543 hours of service shelving materials, covering books, assisting in mending materials, interlibrary loans and sending overdue notices. The library wishes to thank Barbara Hoyt for yearly maintenance of the library's flower gardens.

The library received gifts in memory of Audrey Irene Clark and Norman "Bud" Blake. Funds were also given anonymously to purchase a computer table. A generous bequest from the Elizabeth Frunzi estate was made to the building fund.

Amy Gardner retired from her full time position as assistant librarian in April to assume a part time cataloging position at the library. Carol Kennett retired in September, after more than 14 years as a library assistant. Betty Parker, formerly technology coordinator, has been hired as assistant librarian. The library welcomes library assistants Glynis Knox and Roberta "Bobbie" Frasier.

The Friends of the Conway Public Library were busy with fund raising activities in 1999. Their cake auction raised \$560 and the summer book sale raised \$1,420. They organized a Library Clean Up Day, a Y2K program, and honored the library volunteers at a Silver Tea. The Friends purchased six utility tables for the library.

In March of 1999, the Trustees again presented a library expansion plan. The article lacked the two thirds to pass, 958 for to 765 against still a majority in favor. In April, the Trustees met with the Selectman, the Building Committee, and the architect to receive comments on the results of the bond vote. A number of different alternatives and concerns were discussed. The Trustees listened, and throughout the year, looked into these alternatives and concerns in greater detail with the assistance of the architect. As a result, the Trustees and Building Committee voted to accept a scaled down version, 8,308 square feet at a cost of \$1.485 million to be presented in March 2000. The Trustees are committed to raise 20% of the construction costs.

The Friends and Trustees welcome the help of the new Fundraising Chairs, Tom Deans, Betty Newton and Chuck Henderson, and look forward to working with them in meeting their goal of raising \$400,000. The Library is also thankful to have Linda Fox-Phillips putting together a public relations campaign for the new addition.

The Conway Public Library needs this additional space to better serve and meet the changing needs of our community. Please support your library by voting Yes on Article 12 on March 14th.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

The Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council has had a challenging year exploring various projects in the search for sustainability. Brainstorming sessions were held to explore various opportunities. These included a non-profit center, health insurance coop, and a business incubator. Electric Coops and Forestry Coops were among other potential proposals. Volunteer task forces researched the possibilities and potential of these projects.

One of the greatest challenges that lay before the Council was one of choosing one or more initiatives that would indeed generate enough income for the Council to become sustainable while meeting the needs of our community and our mission.

The result of numerous meetings, studies, and grant writing attempts has proven to be both disappointing yet constructive. Although the Council has now narrowed its choice down to pursuing a Technology Incubator, it has successfully brought together many different groups of individuals and facilitated discussions that might never have happened. The non-profit center concept is one that particularly drives this point home. All the non-profits that sat at the table agreed that consolidating services and sharing resources would benefit the group as a whole, yet in reality, the energy required to pursue this seriously simply was not there at this point in time for any number of reasons. However, by sitting down and discussing all of our needs and challenges, the Council did succeed in producing a document that now clearly identifies specific needs, future plans, and organizational structure of a number of local non-profits. It may only be a matter of time before we all come together in some manner to benefit the greater whole. Without this initiative, these discussions may never have happened. Discovering a project is not viable is as much of a success as finding out one is.

The "Mt. Washington Valley Technology Village" may or may not become a reality depending on the outcome of the feasibility study. The study is the first step towards the development of what the Council hopes will be a project/business park that will create an environment that supports the creation and expansion of technology based businesses in the Mt. Washington Valley Region. The study will begin immediately.

Our Revolving Loan Fund has made 6 loans to date to local businesses. Job creation continues to be primary criterion. The fund continues to grow and is available to qualifying new or existing businesses.

Our educational forums have covered a wide array of topics and attendance from all of our area towns continues to grow.

In closing, I want to take this opportunity to thank you for your past support of the Council's warrant article. You will note that this year, the Council did not submit a warrant article in hopes of reducing some of the local tax burden. Instead, we have requested that each town contribute at the same dues structure paid by local businesses, based on number of town employees (or full time equivalent). The average cost for dues should be around \$40 to \$70 (based on \$10.00 per employee), a significant reduction from the past. Membership dues cover the town representative and alternate, and continues the representation that is so vital to keeping a proper perspective on our Valley as a region.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

To the Selectmen and Residents of the Town of Conway:

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit Center for Families and Community Services that was established in 1984, operating from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee, New Hampshire. We have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 2,089 of Conway's citizens, processing 529 fuel applications, 70 being elderly and 99 disabled, and linked 1,391 with other Community Action Programs.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$131,266.33 ON CONWAY CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 1998 AND JUNE 30, 1999

Community Contact is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, FEMA, McKinney, and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food gets distributed to the 11 food pantries and 4 Dinner Bells throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. Our staff has the trust of the entire county. We are able to successfully partner with individual families and assist them one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than 11,000 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff, and residents, as well as other social service agencies, and our clients.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICE NON PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

Starting Point Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence (formerly Carroll County Against Domestic & Sexual Violence) is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups, resources and referrals and community education programs. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

In 1999, Starting Point served 114 Conway residents. Conway residents were provided with 84 bednights of emergency shelter. The agency also provided court advocacy to 46 residents of Conway. In addition, Starting Point provided 22 days of educational programs on healthy relationships to students at Kennett High School and Pinetree Elementary Schools.

With only three staff members and a limited budget, the vast portion of our services were provided by approximately 40 trained volunteers. These volunteers donate approximately 17,000 hours of service to our community each year. The money contributed by towns to our agency is used for educational programs and direct services to Starting Point clients. Money received through town funding and our own fundraising efforts enable Starting Point to qualify for State and Federal grants which make up 90% of our budget. Without the assistance of towns such as Conway, Starting Point would not qualify for the funds that keep us in operation.

Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County

Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, a non-profit, Medicare Certified and state home health licensed agency, provides comprehensive home health care and hospice services. Services include case management, skilled nursing, speech, occupational and physical therapies, IV therapy and other high tech services, home health aides, social worker, support groups, health screenings and flu shot clinics, hospice volunteers and bereavement services. Services are available 24 hours per day, seven days a week to individuals of all ages who meet medical need criteria.

When a person's required home care services are covered by private insurance, we are reimbursed for our services by those payers. Medicare and Medicaid are also reimbursed but do not cover the full cost of providing home care services. We also offer a sliding fee scale to those who are underinsured or uninsured. Town funding helps us to provide services to people who do not have any other payment source, are uninsured or underinsured, and helps us provide our high level of care to everyone we serve.

The agency served a total of 489 clients during 1999. 57% or 282 clients were served in the Town of Conway of which 132 were underinsured or uninsured. Total 1999 home visits for the agency including the Hospice program = 8,988; in the Town of Conway - 5,209 visits; 57% of all clients and 58% of all home visits. The total cost for services provided to underinsured or uninsured Conway residents is \$275,344; Conway town funding contributes \$10,440 (4% of the cost) to these sliding fee and Medicare visits; the agency contributes \$264,908 or 96% of the cost. On a per capita basis, Conway residents contribute \$1.23 per year to have access to these essential services. (Office of State Planning 1998 Population estimate for Town of Conway - 8,481).

Conway town funding support is essential for Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care to continue to provide access to quality home care and hospice services for the frail, elderly and disabled as well as for all residents in the town.

Children Unlimited, Inc.

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child(ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child(ren) with special needs is a priority.

The program is staffed by professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early child-hood educators and parent support providers. Program services include: developmental screening and/or evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments and interagency collaboration.

Vaughan Community Services

For thirty-five years the people of the Vaughan Community Services have been listening and responding to the people in need in our community. While church-based, our services are open to all persons, especially those whose needs are not met by other programs or agencies. We work together with all human service agencies with our programs:

The North Conway Day Care Center [a program listed separately in this report with its own director, staff and budget, under the Vaughan umbrella].

Food Pantry
Clothing Depot
Loan Closet for medical equipment needs
Resource and Referral Screenings
Support for persons affected by and infected with HIV/AIDS, and for
persons dealing with cancer and bereavement
Diabetes Support Group

We are also involved with community programs: Community Shelter Action Committee, Gifts From the Heart, Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services, Sudden Death Response Team, Habitat for Humanity, KIT - the Area Food Pantries Coordinators, and the Carroll North Board of the ACS.

The North Conway Day Care Center

The North Conway Day Care Center has been operating since 1972, the first state licensed group child care center in the area.

The Center provides care for children ages 3-12 for working parents, averaging 75-100 children. Our program includes full time child care, a morning preschool, half day programs for kindergarten students, and before and after school programs. A full time program is available for school age children during the summer and school vacations.

Well balanced nutritional morning and afternoon snacks and lunches are prepared according to U.S.D.A. standards and are serviced by a full time cook.

The center has an agreement with the N.H. Department of Health & Human Services to provide child care assistance for those families who are eligible according to their family income. This enables the families to have affordable child care and stay in the workforce. All of our staff meet state licensing requirements or are in the process of being certified.

We continue to work with other community resources to help meet the needs of our families to avoid duplication of service

Children's Health Center

For thirty-two years Children's Health Center has been providing preventive health care for Conway children. These services include affordable immunizations, physicals, developmental assessments, vision and hearing tests, nutritional counseling, short term family counseling and other important health care. The Center's staff works closely with local physicians, school nurses and local health and social services to enable children to secure a healthy start in life.

Currently, Children's Health Center serves 401 Conway children, a 4% increase from last year's 385 children. The Center requests financial support in order to continue to provide accessible and affordable health care for Conway children. These funds provide direct service to children whose families have little or no health insurance, or access to other health care. At Children's Health Center, no child is refused care for financial reasons.

National health statistics clearly indicate the benefits of early childhood preventive care. Children who receive their immunizations, physicals, developmental assessments and other important health care are much more likely to be better students in school and have healthier and more productive lives as adults. Your support of Children's Health Center assures that Conway families have access to important health care for their children.

Carroll County Mental Health Services

Carroll County Mental Health Services is a private agency that provides professional mental health treatment to the residents of the eighteen towns and locations in our County. The outpatient and emergency services are funded by a combination of patient fees, insurance payments, grants, fund raising and town appropriations.

CCMHS provides treatment to children, adults and seniors. Our clients participate in treatment for symptoms caused by conditions such as depression, anxiety disorders, post traumatic stress disorder, schizoaffective disorder, drug and alcohol abuse or suicidality. Individuals may attend one session to fifty sessions in the course of a year. They may consult with a psychiatrist, a substance abuse counselor, a family therapist or an individual therapist.

Each person is assigned a fee based on family income. We bill their health insurance if they have a policy; more than half of the persons we serve have no health insurance. During the past year we served 509 Conway residents. When CCMHS was incorporated in 1965, our mission was to provide affordable, quality services in our local community. We continue to work very hard to meet this goal.

NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER ANNUAL REPORT 1999

Someone asked me awhile ago, "How old is the Center?" I told him that the Center was 50 years old, but has been serving the community since 1948.

A vacant store was the first home of the Center. Funded by the Gibson Family throughout its early years, the Center has served thousands of local children, adults, Senior Citizens and tourists alike.

As we move into the year 2000, the Center will continue to serve. New programs are being added annually, but unfortunately, some programs are phased out because the children's choices of today are somewhat different than they were in the past.

The old standbys are still popular. Newer programs like Tin Mountain Nature Classes in the Fall and Spring, Dart League, Squeaky Sneakers, expansion of our Grammar School Soccer program to include grades 1 and 2, White Birch Quilters, a special Labor Day Concert, Martial Arts, British Soccer Camp and Art on the playground have been added to the mix of activities in recent years.

New programs add new costs and because of the Charles Sprague Program Fund, the Center can continue to offer quality activities without adding additional costs to you, the taxpayer.

The Center will continue its fund raising efforts. Through these efforts the Board of Directors raise over 50 % of its entire budget.

As this is my last annual report for the Center, I offer my sincere thanks to you, the citizens, for your investment in the youth and adults of Conway.

PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

I joined the Town of Conway staff on December 15th of 1999 so I am not in a position (nor have any desire) to make comments on the goings on for the past year. Instead, this report will focus on what I found and where I hope to lead this office through 2000 and beyond.

I arrived in Conway to find a broken planning machine. Confusion, contradiction and conflict were commonplace in the Planning Board meetings and most other activities related to planning and zoning in the Town of Conway. These are all symptoms of a dysfunctional planning process. It was apparent that the frustration resulted from municipal ordinances, policies and procedures that have been decaying for many years. The result was a house divided. It is time to get the planning house back into order.

My challenge and yours for 2000 is enormous and at first glance overwhelming. So I prefer to look at it as several parallel and complementary themes.

Healing: we must bridge the divides that have left key players at odds.

They should be working in concert with each other. This includes town boards, staff, corporate and private citizens,

neighbors and visitors.

Evaluating: we must identify the flaws and weaknesses in the system and

develop strategies for improving the way it functions.

Legitimizing: we must fix the flaws and remedy the inconsistencies between

our enabling statutes (the RSAs), town ordinances (the rules)

and how we administer the rules.

Planning: we must establish a "master planning process" to guide the Town's growth management policy decisions and provide a vehi-

cle that helps us stay on a positive road to a healthy community.

In short, the Town of Conway needs HELP. My office will work diligently on all of these themes. On that you have my pledge. However, the key to success will be the combined effort of my office, town staff, town boards and you, the citizens of Conway. SUMMARY OF PROPOSED WARRANT ARTICLES OF PLANNING BOARD

2000 Conway Town Warrant Meeting of March, 2000

*The following descriptions are general and readers are advised to refer to the actual proposed amendment for the exact wording. Copies can be obtained at the Town Hall or contact Town Planner Tom Irving at 447-3855.

ARTICLE 2: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-17.2 by adding a new subparagraph D and Article 147-14.2 by adding a new subparagraph P which sets conditions for maximum height for church steeples, and building heights in the Special Highway Corridor District.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (5-0-0)

ARTICLE 3: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-12.2 by adding a new subparagraph B permitting with special conditions sexually oriented businesses in the Industrial - 2 District.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (4-3-0)

ARTICLE 4: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-22 A (1) by changing the District lines for the Highway Commercial District in the Conway area to change the steep bank land along Route 16 now in the Highway Commercial District to the Residential/Agricultural District.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (7-0-0)

ARTICLE 5: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-14.2 by adding a new provision Article 147-14.2 C. (e) exempting the Memorial Hospital land from the applicability of the Special Highway Corridor District provisions under said Article.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (4-3-0)

ARTICLE 6: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as petitioned by Thomas R. Steele and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District at Article 147-22. A (3) in the Conway area so as to expand the Commercial District boundary northerly along Route 16 on its westerly side extending the boundary thereof to the northerly sideline of the present property of Liberty Santa Maria

so as to include a portion of said Liberty Santa Maria property into the Highway Commercial District with the westerly sideline of said District to remain as extending 400 feet westerly of the centerline of Route 16 or to the 100-year flood plain, whichever is less.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (4-2-1)

ARTICLE 7: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as petitioned by Thomas R. Steele and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District at Article 147-22 A. (2) by expanding the Highway Commercial District on the southerly and easterly side of Route 16 to follow the Conway Scenic Railroad tracks from the Albany/Conway Town line to a point where said Conway Scenic Railroad tracks first cross Route 16 thereby expanding the Highway Commercial District between the railroad and Route 16 from the southerly edge of West Main Street to the Albany/Conway town line.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (4-3-0)

ARTICLE 8. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 7 as petitioned by James M. Burke and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the provisions of Cluster Development by adopting a new Article 147-17.4 and deleting the current provisions under Article 147-17.1 D.

Recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (4-3-0)

ARTICLE 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 8 as petitioned by Ethel Morrill and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District at Article 147-22 subparagraph D under Article 147-22 thereby creating a new Highway Commercial District near and at the intersection of Routes 113 and Route 302 in Center Conway thereby removing the same from the Residential/Agricultural District.

Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (2-3-2)

ARTICLE 10. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 9 as petitioned by James M. Burke and others to the Conway Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the Highway Commercial District in the North Conway area at Town Zoning Ordinance Article 147-22 C. (3) so as to expand the easterly sideline of the District back to the former Maine Central Railroad tracks from its existing width of 500 feet and amending Town Zoning Ordinance at Article 147-17 A. (2) for setbacks bordering the expanded Highway Commercial District to require a setback of 75 feet from any residential building constructed on an abutting lot.

Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (1-5-1)

ARTICLE 11: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 10 as petitioned by Roderick Forsman and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Article 147-12 by adding new subsections (4) and (5) limiting commercial buildings to a footprint not greater than 5,000 square feet and provide certain provisions regarding parking areas.

Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board. (0-6-0)

PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The last year of the millennium was a challenging year for the Conway Planning Board. The resignation of the Town Planner and the search for a successor left the Planning Board with a gap in staff support. Despite this difficulty, the volunteer planning board members with the assistance of the able town staff, including an interim town planner, were able to continue providing timely and high quality service.

The Planning Board's responsibility is to review the regulations to insure the Town's needs are being addressed, to take a proactive planning approach to protect the tax base of the community and review the projects for regulation compliance.

To this end, the Planning Board continued its program of clarifying regulations and bringing them into compliance with the RSA's. The Planning Board in keeping with the Vision Statement of maintaining a rural New England community reviewed the height restrictions for church steeples. The Board also tries to identify and find resolutions to problems before they occur. The Planning Board researched and after public hearings decided to present to the voters a proposal to regulate sexually oriented businesses. The nature of this ordinance makes it highly controversial. However, this ordinance is a proactive approach to protect the tax base in the Town of Conway.

The year 1999 saw the approval of diverse projects such as a major hotel, a Catholic Church, a warehouse, a self-storage facility and various size retail buildings. The Board was able to work with a local developer and property owners to restore a major residential subdivision that had been left in limbo. In total, the Planning Board acted on 15 Major Site Plans; 18 Minor Site Plans; and 18 Subdivisions/Boundary Line Adjustments.

The Planning Board welcomed the hiring of the new Town Planning Director.

CHIEF OF POLICE ANNUAL REPORT 1999

In 1999 the Conway Police Department had some major changes to the building and the outside town property as well. The biggest change was preparing for Y2K by rewiring so that most of the building is now on the generator. In the event of a power shut down, the station will remain self-sufficient. Another change for the building is an updated video recording system for the cellblock area.

The changes outside the building have been the installation of video cameras to monitor the parking lots of both the Police Department and the Court for the safety of the public.

The Department has a new computerized fuel management system that services the Police, Town and school vehicles that operate on gasoline. This new system allows the Town to track all gas usage by Town vehicles including mileage information.

A local block grant for the updating of the radio system is still in progress, with the E.C.C. granting us permission to proceed with a new frequency and repeater system to be operational soon.

Traffic Controllers did a very commendable job again this year and delays were kept at a minimum while they were in place. The uniformed personnel, under the Commercial Duty detail account, handled traffic in Redstone on Route 302. While this account is a wash item, \$12,000.00 was raised to pay Officers performing Commercial Duty. The actual expenditure for that account was \$59,749.00, which is an over expenditure of \$47,749.00. The payments made to the Town by the companies that request these Detail Officers appears as revenue, and balances out the over expenditure. Income from the Police Department to the Town totaled \$101,763.00; this includes the Commercial Duty payment, which is put into the General Fund to help reduce taxes.

As we approach this new year, we have several Officers who are of retirement age with the necessary number of years of service and have indicated that they will retire this year; those of us who remain wish them the best in their retirement.

As always, we appreciate the continued support the community extends to the Conway Police Department and its members.

The year of 1999 has been a busy year for the Conway Police Department. We, the Police Commissioners, feel honored and proud to be your elected representatives.

With the election of Commissioner David Doherty to fill the one-year term made available last year, the Commission remains extremely effective. Each of the three Commissioners compliment each other well in the decision making of the Police Department.

During the year 1999, it has been more difficult maintaining an adequate staff of Traffic Controllers due to the available labor market. We were able to keep an adequate force at the intersections by offering overtime and constantly adding personnel when they were available.

The total calls for service have been up this year. Some of this is due to the new computer system being able to track them more efficiently and accurately.

For the last few years, the Police Department has been involved in a more proactive involvement with the Town. This has changed the whole attitude within the Town. There is a healthier atmosphere between the citizens and the Police Officers. With this atmosphere, there has not been the turnover of personnel that we have seen in the past. We have, however, received word from some of our senior Officers that they will be retiring during the year 2000. This will mean there will be openings within the Department and also promotions within the ranks.

The D.A.R.E. program continues to be working well and the programs within the high school are carrying relationships further.

There has been a plaque dedicated to the Town of Conway, honoring all of the past Chiefs of Police for the Town of Conway. The plaque is on display in the conference room of the Police Department.

We thank you again for your support of the Conway Police Department. It is a proud feeling to know that the Conway Police Department is looked upon as a leading police department in the entire State of New Hampshire.

PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 1999

Who was it who said "the older we get, the faster time goes"? Well this is my eighth annual report so time is evidently marching on. This year's events particularly highlight this progression of time. I recall the first site plan that I reviewed when I first started working for the Town. The plans were for Wal Mart which was just constructed and opened this year. During this same stretch of time we have witnessed commercial growth such as the Holiday Inn, CVS, Rite-Aid, Shaw's, Wendy's, Applebee's, KFC and Settlers' Green, just to name a few. Back in January of 1992, the Town began placing trash in phase one of its newly constructed landfill. In January of 2000 or 69,510 tons of waste later, the first load of trash went into phase two. I watched the annual amount of waste increase from 92 to 95, then decrease from 95 to 98. This season brought us a ten percent increase in trash placed in the landfill. Like the economy, trash generation appears to be cyclic while the recycling percentage has slowly increased from 18% in 92 to 29% in 99. Discussions of a highway by-pass for the valley have been ongoing for decades. Now at the end of the century, early phases of the project have begun. The intersections of Rt. 112/16 and Rt. 16/River Road have been upgraded, the Rt. 302 upgrade is underway and the first of three sections for the North South Local Road has been completed. The Rt. 302 project is scheduled for completion at the end of 2000 and the N/S Local Road by the end of 2002 which is the same year the Rt. 16 widening is to commence. As time has left its mark on these events, so too has its passage been reflected in the people around us. During my tenure I have worked with four planners, three building inspectors, two zoning officers and a town manager. This past year was especially challenging as there was more turnover in personnel than any previous year. With the exception of the Town Manager, all other positions have been filled. The new staff is settling in and with a little luck, we will have a new Town Manager on board before long.

The Highway Department had a very productive season starting with the Hobbs Street reconstruction. The crew moved from that project onto West Main Street where they completed the replacement and upgrade of the existing drainage. This was a two year effort in preparation for this year's reconstruction of West Main Street. This will be a cooperative project with the Conway Precinct and will also include the repair of the sidewalks along that street. After several weeks of annual maintenance and preparation for the paving program the crew tackled the Hiram Philbrook Road. This was a half mile repair from the gravel foundation up to the new pavement including under drain and geotextiles. All of these road repair projects are part of the Infrastructure Capital reserve plan which is now entering its third year.

The phase two landfill expansion was constructed in 1998. This year the capacity for storing leachate was expanded with the installation of two 25,000 gallon tanks. Leachate is generated when rain water percolates through the

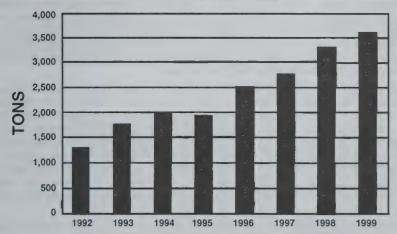
trash. It is contained by the landfill's liner system and is collected in the storage tanks until it is transported to the sewerage treatment plant in North Conway. Prior to the North Conway plant, the leachate was hauled out of town at a cost of up to \$140,000 per year. This year's budget request for leachate is \$35,000.

The entire Solid Waste budget request is 3% greater than last year while the revenue from tipping fees is 14% greater. More specifically the budget request is \$13,915 more while the income increased by \$33,657. The income from solid waste this year accounts for 60% of the 2000 operating budget. The Highway request is 6.6% greater this year or \$75,259. 2.8% of this or \$32,400 is the increased paving cost in accordance with the infrastructure plan adopted three years ago.

Thank you for the opportunity to present this report. So until next year, try not to let time pass you by.

RECREATION DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 1999

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building in Center Conway. The Conway Community Building includes a meeting room for special functions, children's game room equipped with a pool table, ping pong table, various video games, library, computer lab and full gymnasium for indoor sports activities.

The Town of Conway also offers many other outdoor parks and recreation areas for community uses: Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Whitaker Woods, Whitaker Homesite Property, Davis Park, Schouler Park, Nasby King Field, Hussey Field and Conway Skating Rink. These sites provide recreational activities such as biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, cross country skiing, tennis, basketball, playgrounds and multi-purpose fields.

The Recreation Department was very active with elementary, teen and adult programs in 1999. Elementary age programming serves children ages 5-12 in programs such as: T-Ball, girls' softball, summer playground, flag football, field hockey, soccer, bowling, basketball, model building, fun & games, floor hockey and various trips and special events throughout the year.

Adult programs consisted of monthly trips to various sites such as: Foxwoods Casino, Titanic Artifacts Exhibit, Casco Bay Cruise, Strawberry Banke, Victorian Mansion, Belknap Mill, The Boston Flower Show, Disney on Ice, The Mt. Washington Cruise, Portland Symphony Christmas Concert and Boston Trolley Tour. These trips and events proved to be most popular with the older adults and allowed our department to reach adults not normally seen by our department. A special thanks goes to Judy Durkee who with her hard work and dedication to the Conway Recreation Department served as the senior adult liaison to all the men and women who participated this past year.

Teen programs have grown the most extensively over the past year increasing Teen Center hours for kids ages 12-15 from two days per week to four days per week and increasing our Teen Coordinator's position from part-time to full-time. All Teen programs are funded directly from grants acquired from NH Bureau of Substance Abuse Services, PROJECT SUCCEED and PlusTime of NH. These grants provide over \$29,000 exclusively for teenagers to participate in activities at the teen center as well as programs such as educational trips, mountain biking, cookouts, dances, tournaments and homework support. We have been able to provide more options for teens to socialize and recreate in a safe, supervised setting.

1999 was a very busy year for the Friends of Conway Rec. The Friends worked extremely hard on fundraising events such as Kennett High School 75th Anniversary, Carroll County Basketball Tournament & Golden Goose. All fundraising monies went directly into the financial support of the Conway Recreation Department along with the improvements and renovations to the

Teen Center. The Recreation Department is fortunate to have such a hard working group of parents and citizens who care about the quality of recreation their children receive.

All programs provided by the Conway Recreation Department have volunteer service involved. In 1999 we were fortunate to have over 100 volunteers coach our sports teams, chaperone trips & dances and supervise activities. Along with our many volunteers, the local businesses and civic groups once again provided in kind items and financial support to our department to ensure that we could provide better service to the people of Conway. I would like to thank the following for their generous support: Friends of Conway Rec.
