## RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

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At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 10th day of March, 1936 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Charles F. Eastman, Moderator. Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 854.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast.

### For Town Clerk

and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Cleaves G. Ellsworth had .....	90

and was declared elected by the Moderator.

**For Overseer of the Poor**

and was declared elected by the Moderator, and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Art. 2. On motion of Charles A. Drewry to raise the sum of \$8,000 to defray town charges. George A. Waterman offered an amendment to the motion to raise \$6,000. The amendment was carried.

Art. 3. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Elwin L. Hardy for Trustee of the Trust Funds. This being done the Moderator declared Elwin L. Hardy elected Trustee for three years.

Art. 4. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Helen E. Dearborn, Trustee of the Library. This being done

the Moderator declared Helen E. Dearborn elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Art. 5. Upon motion of Charles A. Drewry, voted to raise the sum of \$7,500 for repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.

Art. 6. Upon motion of Charles A. Drewry, voted to raise the sum of \$2,000 for the improvement of the highway between North Weare and East Weare, to be used with the sum of \$4,000 to be furnished by the State.

Art. 7. Upon motion of Charles A. Drewry, voted to raise the sum of \$3,500 for construction of Class 5 highways.

Art. 8. Upon motion of George M. Slack, voted to hire the winter roads plowed.

Art. 9. Upon motion of Clarence Still, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 10. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted that it be left with the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

Art. 11. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

Art. 12. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property which may be acquired through tax collectors deeds.

Art. 13. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, voted to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 14. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to raise the sum of \$200 for the Weare Band.

Art. 15. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, to raise the sum of \$800 for snow removal equipment. A ballot was



taken. Eighty-nine voted in the affirmative and 141 in the negative and the motion did not prevail.

Art. 16. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn to raise the the sum of \$400 for control of blister rust. 157 voted in the affirmative and 53 in the negative and the motion prevailed.

Art. 17. Upon motion of George M. Slack to rescind the action taken to pay the Overseer of the Poor a salary, and allow the same rate of pay as the Selectmen receive. The motion was lost.

Art. 18. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted that the Article be indefinitely postponed.

Art. 19. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth to reduce the Selectmen's salary from \$4.00 to \$3.00 per day. The motion was lost.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads.
6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen hundred and sixty-nine dollars and fifty-seven cents (\$1,369.57) to be used with the sum of fifty-four hundred seventy-eight dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$5,478.27) to be furnished by the State.



7. To see if the town will accept the Legislative Special for improvement of the highway on the Deering Road from Grants Garage to Perkins Corner and raise and appropriate two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars to be used with the sum of four thousand (\$4,000.00) dollars to be furnished by the State.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

9. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

10. To see if the town will vote to allow the same discount on taxes as last year.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred (\$200) dollars for band concerts.

13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for Blister Rust control.

14. To see if the town will vote to sell or repair the the snow roller house in the East Division.

15. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate to repair the Town Hall.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for new books for library.

17. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to the public dump at North Weare.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifty (\$50.00) dollars for restoring soldiers' graves and the fund be transferred to the Town Treasurer's account.

20. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

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Twenty-four alarms were answered by the Department during 1936, classified as follows:

15 Chimney	1 Automobile truck
4 Building	1 Tar barrels
2 Brush	1 Dust explosion

The building fires were few but of a more serious type than usual. In only one case, however, was the main part of the building or buildings destroyed. Two of these were, no doubt, caused by defective chimneys. These, together with the large number of chimney fires, show again the hazard of a poor or defective chimney.

We have tried to distribute our equipment through the town and to this end, the company constructed, at no expense except for materials, two trailers to carry the equipment housed at East Weare and at South Weare. Ladders (extension and roof), 200 feet more of 1½ inch hose, one length additional suction hose, pails, knapsacks, extinguishers, axes, shovels, lanterns, canvas covers, etc., have been provided for each of these trailer units.

A separate shed to house this equipment has been provided at South Weare and such a place is under way at East Weare.

Added to the equipment at Weare Center was 350 feet 1½ inch hose, one length suction hose, 6 rubber coats and 12 hats.

Brush and grass fires were very few, only 2 alarms having been received.

The company held 12 monthly meetings and 6 drills during the year. The average number of men responding to alarms was seven. Quick response by the men and excellent work of the telephone operators made possible quick runs in almost every instance.

We are striving to give more efficient protection and feel that through splendid support and cooperation, this is being accomplished.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Citizens of Weare :

This season finds three new teachers in the total of thirteen. There are about 45 pupils in Junior High and approximately 70 in High School.

With the work in agriculture and Home Economics, four teachers cannot adequately care for the various classes, study groups, and conference periods. The "conference" periods are a regular part of the Home Economics and Agricultural Courses. Certain regularly scheduled periods are set aside to meet individuals to talk over work and projects. This cannot be done in connection with classes. In agriculture additional federal allowance is made for the conference period.

Miss Priscilla Garrett, who had been re-elected as teacher of Domestic Science, resigned to accept a similar position in Connecticut. Miss Helen Upton carried on until about the middle of November, when Miss Helen Schellenberg, having completed work at Keene Normal, came. Miss Schellenberg spent her first two years of training at LaSalle Junior College in Boston, and completed four years of training at Keene. Gilbert Wyman, graduate of Keene, has taken over some shop work as well as junior high and some high school work.

Miss Louise Pihl, a graduate of Lowell, is at Friends following Miss Downing, who was transferred to the Center.

Buxton School was closed and Mrs. Chute came to South Weare.

There are changes and alterations that need to be made at Clinton Grove, Friends, South Weare, North Weare

and the Center. As this modernizing is done, it should be made in those buildings which are certain to be kept in use for some time, such as the North Weare, South Weare and the Center buildings. Such alterations would include some kind of sanitary toilets. Those now in use are not so and cannot well be made so.

By beginning with larger buildings, which will house more pupils — buildings which will be in use for years, the chance of repairing the small schools, only to find them closed soon after, will be avoided.

For the first time this year all basketball players, boys and girls, were given a thorough physical examination by Dr. Gallander of Henniker. This examination was concerned primarily with heart, lungs, hernias, and any other defects which should not be subjected to the strain and stress of basketball. It can be, and usually is, a strenuous affair. The game provides exercise and recreation, but should be played for the sport of it, and never with the idea of winning by any means, fair or foul. This unfair and unsportsmanlike manner has been talked against and coached against until there is very little by way of intentional undesirable "tactics." When the game cannot be played in a fair and decent manner, it should be barred out entirely. While this sport is not at all considered as a main reason for conducting a high school, it may have a wholesome place. As matters are, your young people are very much handicapped by the "Gym" quarters, a small playing floor, and scarcely any room for spectators. This lack of room of course keeps many from attending games, consequently keeping down "gate receipts," which is one of the sources of funds. The expenses for uniforms, balls, and transportation do not come out of school funds.

The enrollment this current year is as follows: High School 71, Junior High 40, South Weare 33, Center 25, Sugar Hill 22, East Weare 24, North Weare 20, Riverdale 11, Friends 10, Clinton Grove 9.

The number of different pupils enrolled is approximately 200. There are three schools classed as small schools, Riverdale, Clinton Grove and Friends. A school of 9 or 10 pupils costs almost as much to operate as one with 25. The "State Aid" is determined largely on what are considered "Necessary schools." Since the demand on State Aid funds has increased, it seems that Weare's amount may be decreased, because of "small schools" which could be provided for otherwise.

This year, twice monthly, on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays, a Public Forum has been conducted at the high school. The speakers have been men of travel, study, and various contacts, who have presented in a non-political and non-partisan way, a number of questions that are before the public. Economic problems, governmental questions, international issues, arguments for and against propositions are followed by open discussion. These have been made possible through the Department of Education at Washington, the local community assuming no obligation of any kind. The attendance has been small. Those who have attended have found it more than worth while. It is to be hoped that a larger number might find it possible, or make it possible to attend. Weare has probably never before had an opportunity of this nature and quality.

The public schools of today are taken as a matter of course. They are considered a source of heavy expense, and it is sometimes felt, yield a questionable return. They are far from perfect, managed and directed by men and women who are imperfect, and with pupils, almost, but not quite, perfect. But the idea underlying these schools, schools supported by public funds for all children, had to be fought for. It did not just happen. One of the Pioneers of "schools for all, paid for by all" was Horace Mann. One hundred years ago in 1837, the Legislature of Massachusetts created a "State Board of Education", and Horace Mann was appointed secretary. From his vantage



point he waged successfully, the struggle for "free schools for all." Horace Mann's belief in education is given here by himself.

"If ever there was a cause, if ever there can be a cause worthy to be upheld by all of toil or sacrifice that the human heart can endure, it is the cause of education. The common school is the greatest discovery ever made by man. A patriot is known by the interest he takes in the education of the young."

Again, this year, the high school has been saddened by the sudden death of one of its number. Austin Drewry, a member of the Sophomore Class, a diligent student, a favorite among his school mates, went out, never to return. No word of ours can express our sorrow — or bring him back to his place with us.

To all parents, and those who do not have children in school but who have cooperated in the school work, to the School Board, and teachers, I extend once more my sincere appreciation.
