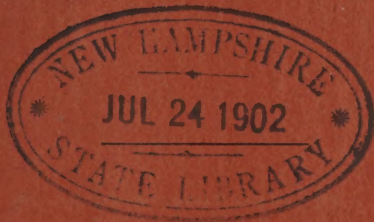

Report of Library Trustees.

TO THE CITIZENS OF NORTH HAMPTON :

There is nothing of very special interest to be reported in connection with our public library during the past year. It has been no less beneficial to those who have taken out books than in the past. It is apparent that ours is becoming more and more a reading community, and that books of reference are sometimes consulted. This would be more frequently the case if we had a reading room, where those who are studying particular subjects could, at the same sitting, consult different authors. That can be brought about only by a new library building, which we devoutly wish might be in sight.

Ninety-one books, including a wide range of subjects, have been purchased and put into the library at a cost of ninety-nine dollars and eighty-eight cents, leaving twelve cents in the hands of the trustees. One volume has been donated by Mr. John C. Haynes, of Boston, Mass., for which we have expressed thanks. Mrs. C. H. Bell, of Exeter, by continuing her long established custom, has donated Harper's Magazines for 1901. These are widely read and highly appreciated. Six large volumes have been received from the State, which are of great value for reference.

We recommend that the town appropriate one hundred and fifty-five dollars for the library the present year, confident that it will be a profitable expenditure.

Report of School Board.

TO THE CITIZENS OF NORTH HAMPTON:

If the children of to-day are to be the men and women of to-morrow, then the training which they receive in the present will be a large factor in determining their social position, usefulness and happiness in the future. In the public schools they receive much of the discipline which will prove their manhood and womanhood. Not only are they expected to learn to think along the line of the few studies which they are called to pursue, but to acquire control of all their faculties and powers, so that they may be evenly balanced, as well as forceful. This has been the aim of our teachers in their work during the year. The full success of those labors will be known only in the years to come, for child training is like the period of seed-sowing—much of the work appears to lie buried, but it is of primal importance, for it determines what the harvest shall be.

During the year there has been a change of teachers in three of our schools. Miss Smith, of the East Grammar, and Miss Bryan, of the Center Primary, left at the close of the Spring term, and Mr. Akeley resigned soon after the commencement of the Fall term to accept a more lucrative position. We have been fortunate in supplying those places. Miss Florence E. Rollins, of Stratham, has proved to be highly satisfactory in the East Grammar, and Miss Edith M. Child, of Bath, this State, has done most excellent work in the Center Primary, while Mr. Charles F. Edmands, of Westboro', Mass., in the Center Grammar, and as teacher of music in all the schools, has proved himself to be fully fitted for his position. We also have been fortunate in retaining Miss Dalton, who has been efficient in years past, and no less so during the present, and whose excellent work will long be a blessing to those who have been under her charge. We are much pleased to be able to say that all of our schools are under good management.

The average attendance of the scholars has not in all cases been what could reasonably be expected. In this respect the blame must rest upon the parents, as well as the scholars. There are frequent occasions when the scholar's absence is justifiable, but there were many times when it should not have been allowed.

During the year the grammar schools have had their first graduation, and with both it proved to be a success. Seven graduated from the East school and one from the Center. There would have been more from the Center school had it not been for sickness. It is hoped there will be a larger number the present year.

The new edition of Hyle's Grammars has been put in the schools by exchanging the old ones at a moderate expense. The wisdom of this has been proved. The Standard system of writing, which is the medium slant, has been introduced in place of the Vertical, with good success. Several wall maps, giving the expanded territory of our country, have been purchased. These are essential in the study of our national domain.

A much needed change has been made in the Center Primary school room by turning the desks so that the light is more favorable for both teacher and scholar. The room has also been thoroughly cleaned and varnished. And the two rooms in the East school house have been repainted and otherwise improved. It will soon be needful to have both houses reinsured.

Much to our regret, Mr. Albert Bachelder, who has served you devotedly for more than six years, saw fit to resign his connection with the School Board, not for want of interest in the work, but because of the multiplicity of other cares, which were heavily pressing. The schools will long feel the good effects of his faithful labors. T. V. Haines was appointed treasurer and chairman, while Mr. George A. Boynton was appointed to fill the vacant office for the remainder of the year.

A considerable number of our young people have availed themselves of the recent State law which requires that the town, because of having no high school, must pay the tuition of those who wish to go, and are capable of entering a high school or academy in another town in the State, provided such institution has been approved by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Some of our

young people have attended the Portsmouth high school, some have entered the Robinson Seminary at Exeter, and a larger number have availed themselves of the privileges of Hampton Academy. While the design of the law is to encourage a higher education, it seems to us that it ought to allow the School Board to select the high school or academy where the scholars of the town shall attend. It ought to be kept in mind that "the parent or guardian of the child shall notify the School Board of the district in which he resides of the high school or academy which he has determined to attend." This law involves considerable additional expense for educational purposes in the town, but we believe that because of it more of our young people will be better fitted for citizenship. As the standard of education increases in the land it becomes necessary to offer increasing educational advantages to all of our children. Because of this offer we hope that more of our boys will pursue some higher course of study.

There are 37 weeks in the school year.
