



At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 9th day of March, 1937, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Alfred Osborne, Moderator. Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist 881.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

Charles F. Eastman addressed the meeting as follows:

"I feel at this time at the request of several different people in town that it would be right and proper at this time to bring to your attention the great loss which has come to this town recently, the death of Mr. Frank Tucker, who has been our Town Treasurer for the past thirty odd years.

"Mr. Tucker was a man we all respected and thought a lot of and in view of this fact I would ask this meeting be in silent prayer for one minute." Immediately following the address, the Moderator requested the voters present to unite in silent prayer, as evidence of our respect to our late Frank Tucker for his services to the town, which was then reverently and universally respected.

Art. 2. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the sum of \$9,000 to defray town charges.

Art. 3. Upon motion of Cleves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Alfred Osborne for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Clerk declared Alfred Osborne elected Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Art. 4. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer, Trustee of the Library. This being done the Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Art. 5. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$7,500 for repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.

Art. 6. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the amount stated in the Article.

Art. 7. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, that we raise the sum of \$2,000. Motion was lost.

Chair sustained by the house.

Art. 8. Upon motion of Clarence S. Still, voted that we raise the sum of \$100 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Art. 9. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that it be left with the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes. Art. 10. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.

Art. 11. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Informal motion. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that the Selectmen confer with the Trustees of the Trust Funds in regard to hiring money from the Funds.

Art. 12. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the sum of \$200 for band concerts.

Art. 13. Upon motion of Cleaves G. Ellsworth that the Article be indefinitely postponed. The motion was lost.

Upon motion of Henry Reade, voted that we raise the sum of \$400 for Blister Rust Control.

Art. 14. Upon motion of Clarence S. Still, voted that the building be sold by the Selectmen.

Art. 15. Upon motion of John H. Prescott, voted that we raise the sum of \$500 for repair of the Town Hall.

Art. 16. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that we raise the sum of \$100 for books for the Library.

Art. 17. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the sum of \$700 for the Fire Department.

Art. 18. Upon motion of George M. Slack, that the land used for a dump at No. Weare be sold back to George M. Slack for \$1.00. Frank H. Peaslee offered an amendment to the motion that the Selectmen be authorized to procure a piece of land for a dump and the present dump not to be discontinued until the new one is put in use. Edith Slack offered an amendment to the amendment that the Selectmen procure a piece of land and put the new dump in use within one month. The motion and amendment as amended was carried. Yes, 67; no, 1. Art. 19. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the sum of \$50 for restoring soldiers graves, and transfer the fund to the Treasurer's account.

Art. 20. Votes cast, 411. Yes, 108; no, 119; blank, 184.

Art. 21. Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted that the town cease to pay for transportation of Selectmen and laborers.

Informal motion. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that the Selectmen use the sum of \$50 for the Dental Clinic.

Upon motion of Franklin Flanders, voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of five persons to see what can be done to form a board of trade.

Upon motion of Harold E. Dean, voted that the Selectmen appoint a committee to make recommendations in regard to repairs to the Town Hall.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the celebration of the Ratification of the Federal Constitution, by the State, June 21, 1938.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of thirteen hundred and seventy dollars and sixty-four cents (\$1,370.64) to be used with the sum of fifty-four hundred eighty-two dollars and fiftynine cents (\$5,482.59) to be furnished by the State.

9. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

10. To see if the Town will vote to allow the same discount on taxes as last year.

11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see if the Town will take action regarding the completion of the Town History since 1887, or anything relative to the History of the Town.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred (\$200.) dollars for band concerts.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for new books for the Library.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used with a W. P. A. Project to repair the dam at Moody Pond to provide water for fire protection at Weare Center.

17. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the maintenance of watering troughs.

18. To see if the Town will vote to move the tramp house and raise and appropriate money for same.

19. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money for Blister Rust Control.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,686.00 to be used with a like amount by the State for State Aid road.

21. To see if the Town will vote to license and regulate junk dealers in the Town.

22. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Department answered thirty-five alarms during 1937, classified as follows:

- 16 Chimney
 - 9 Building
 - $5 \operatorname{Brush}$
 - 2 Automobile Truck
 - 1 Dump
 - 2 Minor

Building fires increased in number over previous years, and were in several cases quite serious. Chimney fires continued to rank first in number and proves again the need for good construction in chimneys.

During 1937, the Department held twelve monthly meetings and four drills. The number of men responding to alarms averaged six. Response to alarms was very good, the men reporting quickly and in sufficient numbers to meet the needs.

Having our equipment at East and South Weare mounted on the trailers, proved of great value at several fires. This led to the purchase of two trucks to further build up our efficiency. Two pumps and equipment for them were installed on these trucks giving greater pumping capacity and better protection for these villages. Long extension roof ladders were added to the Center truck and 200 feet of $1\frac{1}{2}$ inch hose was purchased.

At present, the number of water reservoirs is being increased by Federal funds provided for fire protection purposes. The Mill Dam at Riverdale is being restored and several water holes are being dug.

Only one brush fire of a serious nature occurred, and the loss from brush fires was very small. We appreciate the splendid co-operation we have received. With the additions made in equipment and advances in training, we hope to be of greater service than before.

WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL

At the 1937 Town Meeting, the town of Weare appropriated the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State Forestry and Recreation Department in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust. To this sum the State added \$100.00. An experienced foreman was assigned to handle the local blister rust project. The personnel making up the crew proper were taken from our local unemployed and they were given steady employment for a period of one month.

In addition to this, a total of \$595.24 of Federal WPA funds was allotted for use in Weare by the District Blister Rust Agent, Mr. Thomas J. King of Concord. This money gave employment to another group of Weare unemployed for a period of three months. General supervision was given both these projects by Mr. King at no cost to the town. Blister rust accomplishments for 1937 are shown in the financial statement.

This is the second year in which Weare has been favored with grants of WPA funds by the Forestry Department. In 1936 a total of \$1,948.89 was spent and gave employment to a substantial group for a period of five months. These combined funds have permitted not only the completion of the initial control work in the town, but also the starting of the essential work of re-examining the town's land area. Thus is one of the town's basic and valuable assets being protected from the dreaded Blister Rust. The Forestry Department has recommended an appropriation at the coming town meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Weare:

There is scarcely a year but what brings changes in the teaching force in your schools. This year has followed the rule.

It has been difficult to work out a teaching program in the high and junior high schools offering a unified but varied program which seems adapted to the needs here. Teachers have been required to teach a variety of subjects carrying a heavy load. Sometimes during the year English was taught by two or more teachers, which illustrates one of the problems. But at present, adjustments have been made so that some of the troubles have been eliminated.

For the first time the English is now taken care of by Miss Elizabeth Harris, who graduated from Keene last June. Her "major" subject was English, and this, Miss Harris teaches all the way through. The advantage is apparent. As an aid, some new reading materials have been provided, carefully selected, and consisting of varied types of literature. The intention is to complete this series of books while both the junior and the senior high have a carefully worked out correlated and unified plan. Also, for the first time we have been able to add a full time trained man, Mr. Edward Currier, a graduate from New Hampshire University, who majored in social science and mathematics. Mr. Barton took charge of the shop work for grades seven and eight. This made it possible to engage an instructor with regular University training. Mr. Currier, in addition to teaching, has developed outdoor sports and games for all pupils, in which nearly all pupils participated.

At the Christmas vacation Miss Helen Foss after more than three years of teaching was released to accept a position in the Peterborough schools. To take up the work in history and French, Miss Eleanor Peabody of Westfield, Mass., a graduate of Brown University, was engaged. Miss Peabody has had teaching experience before coming here. Her training supplemented by experience fits her splendidly for the work.

For the first half year a cadet teacher from the State University worked under the direction of Mr. Barton in the agricultural program.

During the summer vacation Mr. Barton attended the summer session at the University of New Hampshire, Miss Foss studied at Bates College, Miss Schellenberg at Cornell University, and Francis Downing at Keene Normal School. Educational requirements for teachers are constantly being made more exacting, and summer study enables them to train while in service.

Dr. Fraser of New Boston has examined all basketball players, both boys and girls. While most young people are physically strong enough to engage in this rather strenuous business of basketball, yet, now and then there are those who should play with moderation, and in some cases, not at all. Such an examination is a safeguard for the pupils and a precaution on the part of the school authorities against the charge of carelessness.

Vocational Training

Under this head the courses in Home Economics and Agriculture are classed.

There are thirty-five girls in the class in Home Economics, including girls of junior and senior high schools. Under the direction of Miss Schellenberg, this work is being put on a sound basis of thoughtful planning, and careful direction and is now recognized by the State Department as qualifying for certain federal money for vocational training.

The Home Economics exhibit won third place at the Hopkinton Fair.

Thirteen boys are enrolled in the classes in Agriculture.

The following items are of interest:

1. At the Hopkinton Fair, the "aggie" boys won the cup for the best agricultural exhibit with eight schools contesting. They also won the milk-judging cup against fourteen contesting schools.

2. At the University of New Hampshire, Weare boys took first place in fruit judging; second place in poultry judging; and second place in dairy cattle judging.

3. At the Egg Show in Concord "Weare" won the cup for the best high school exhibit of eggs, with eight schools contesting.

4. Woodrow Wilson was third high scorer in poultry judging, in the State.

5. Winburn Eaton was third in the State in dairy cattle judging.

Albert Reade went as a representative of the "Future Farmers" to their National gathering last fall in Kansas City, where 12,000 met to confer on "Future Farmers" concerns.

Of the nine schools only two attained the State average. It may be said that epidemics, "colds" and "scares" on the part of parents, are responsible for this unsatisfactory record. All schools are subject to these same interferences. There is always a certain amount of unpreventable absence due to sickness, accident, or weather. But outside of these, there are various cases of tardiness and absence that are entirely unnecessary. They result usually from carelessness and indifference. For instance cases like these:

1. Twenty-eight days absence, mostly unnecessary.

2. Forty-three days absence in 28 weeks.

3. Thirteen days out, scattered through, for no acceptable reason. There were only eleven weeks in 36 of perfect attendance.

Tardinesses, too, were and are still too many. Last year two families involving six pupils piled up 94 tardinesses. But while the absence or tardiness is bad enough in itself, yet the effect on the morale of a room or a school of the habitual stragglers or absentees, reacts seriously on the work of those who do make it a point to take their work as though it were worth doing well.

A substantial help to pupils, and to teachers, would be for all to take it upon themselves to put Weare Schools into the upper class according to the schools of the state, rather than below.

The record for the whole school reflects, too, upon those who are regular in attendance and conscientious in their work doing all they can. May we not have concerted and complete co-operation on the part of parents and pupils in this phase of our work.

Out of a total enrollment in the schools last year, of 264, there were only 21 with a perfect attendance record or about 8%.

The 21 were from these schools: South Weare 8, East Weare 6, Junior High 3, North Weare 2, Clinton Grove 1, Sugar Hill 1.

There are many in the town who by understanding school problems, by speaking favorably of teachers and their work, by "lending a hand", doing and saying many things which do not come to our attention — do help. To them we give the appreciation of the teachers and all who are responsible for the direction of the schools.
