## **SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL REPORT 2005**

This has been a very busy year for all of the boards, committees and commissions within the Town of Conway. The people who serve on these boards, committees and commissions are to be commended for all the work they do, with the best interest of the town being their main objective. Many times they are only recognized when someone disagrees with a decision that has been made, when in fact they probably have made a lot more that the majority agrees with and never say a word about. My point is, they are trying, so once in awhile tell them you appreciate them and thank them for serving the community and for making it what it is.

Some of the highlights of 2005 are as follows:

One of the biggest issues to come in front of the board was the development along the North-South Road. The issuing of building permits for Lowe's and Home Depot made for the need to look at the impact on traffic flow in that area and the best way to deal with it. The conclusion of the board was no more traffic lights, but instead, after intense research and studies, to try something new to the area: roundabouts. They seemed to the board to be the sensible way to go in light of the other solutions.

The streetscape project in North Conway Village got a lot of attention from the Board. The attempt to bury all the utilities along Main Street was a noble one, and all involved are to be commended for their efforts. When the cost of doing so became prohibitive, the plan was changed to focus on items within the village that were achievable, such as lighting, sidewalks, crosswalks, new benches, and landscaping.

Taxes will always be a top priority of the Board. The balancing of needs and expectations is not an easy endeavor. We work diligently to provide the best possible services with the monies available. Through the excellent work of town staff, we are able to achieve this goal. Once again, we remind you that the Board of Selectmen has no statutory authority allowing it to intercede in educational issues. When approached, we have offered suggestions and services to try and reduce expenses for the taxpayers of the Town of Conway.

Recycling continues to be a success, with the volume being moved to the Landfill significantly reduced and the recycled materials going to market on the rise. We thank you all for your efforts in making this happen.

Dick O'Brien passed away January 1 2005 while holding the office of Selectman and School Board Member. He will be greatly missed. In May, the Board moved to name the newly lighted sports field at the Conway Recreation Complex, The Dick O'Brien Memorial Field, in honor of Dick's service to the Town.

Governor John Lynch visited Conway in November for a round table discussion on the traffic situation in and around Conway. The discussion was quite productive with the Governor hearing concerns ranging from the southern terminus of the bypass to the timeline of the actual bypass. The meeting was very informative for all who attended.

The board also heard concerns from citizens and developers, about accepting roads as town roads once the town's criteria have been met. They expressed concern with the process by which this happens. The board stated the policy has long been to leave it up to the legislative body.

The past year has been a very busy one for all involved with the day-to-day operations of the Town. The dedicated individuals who make it all come together are to be both thanked and commended for making this community what it is. The Board of Selectmen continues to rely heavily on them for input and direction when dealing with matters that are governed by the ever changing Federal and State Laws. This Board would like to thank the citizens and taxpayers of Conway for their continued input and support.

## **TOWN MANAGER'S ANNUAL REPORT 2005**

As you will see from reading the various departmental reports, the Town has accomplished a great deal during the past year. As I have stated in the past, this is a result of clear policy and direction established by the voters and the Board of Selectmen and the dedication and hard work of our staff and many volunteers throughout the community.

This year, I would like to focus on financial management. As we have discussed during many presentations during the budget preparation cycle, we do not include contingencies or "padded" areas in the budget. While the inclusion of a contingency in project planning or business management is not unusual in the private sector, in our annual budget, every expected expense is detailed and justified. This tight budget policy has been established in the past through the combined efforts of the Budget Committee, Board of Selectmen and Town staff and I believe it is expected and appreciated by the voters.

This approach ensures that the money expended on behalf of the taxpayers is tightly controlled and the purpose of the expenditure is clearly understood by the community. In fact, after all is said and done, we are required by law to have an annual outside audit conducted to make sure that all funds have been handled in an appropriate manner. This report is received by the Town in the late spring and includes any recommended changes and identifies any short-comings, reportable conditions or violations of the law. I am proud to note that our annual audits have been consistently "clean" and have reflected conscientious and appropriate management. These reports are made available to the public each year.

But what happens when the unexpected occurs? We do a number of things that are common sense. For example, we do not make capital purchases until late in the year if we can avoid it. This preserves funding for unexpected situations. It also demands very close budget management and expenditure control. This past year, natural disasters and international situations impacted our national economy. These impacts were felt at the local level by community residents and municipal governments alike. The primary impact of course was increases in fuel and materials costs. In the early Fall, these spikes in costs were projected to continue and perhaps rise through the end of 2005. Based on projected increases in September, we projected that our budget might be over expended by approximately \$75,000 (less that one percent of the total budget). Why worry you might ask? Well--state law prohibits the over expenditure of the approved budget bottom line and local Boards of Selectmen are held accountable. So to ensure that we could finish the budget year at or under the approved appropriation, we presented the Selectmen with a list of items that could be reduced or deferred until the coming year. The Board of Selectmen chose instead to seek permission from the State to over expend the budget by this amount. This request required the approval of the Budget Committee. The Budget Committee subsequently reviewed the situation and supported the request and the request was approved by the State. As things sometimes go, the dire predictions of very drastic fuel increases combined with moderate late

year weather resulted in things not being quite as bad as expected. I am happy to report that as of this writing (our final audit figures are not in as of yet), we predict that we will end 2005 at just less than one percent of the approved appropriation of \$8,480,181 or \$78,000 under budget. The point here is that our budget management requires very close attention and as an example we were managing with a variance of less than one percent for 2005. Such tight control requires the cooperation of all our town employees and managers alike. Particular credit is due our Finance Director, Lucy Philbrick. And yes-- the rumors that she uses both sides of her adding machine tape are true! It also demands the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen in setting the annual budget policy and the Budget Committee for reviewing commenting and critiquing the budget. Communication between these two boards is essential.

The entire process for assembling and approving the budget takes six months to complete. It includes the Town Manager review of proposals submitted by the Department Heads, review of the Town Managers proposed budget by the Board of Selectman, review of the proposed Selectmen's budget by the Budget Committee, the Budget Committee public hearing, and both sessions of Town Meeting.

We believe we are being diligent in managing our town funds and we believe the budget accurately reflects the wishes of the majority of the community. We encourage all residents to become involved in this process either as an elected official or simply by attending the many budget meetings and hearings. Your input will help us to continue to create appropriate budgets and manage them in an effective and responsible manner.

ARTICLE 2: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Articles 147.13.1.4. and 147.13.8.4. to increase the front setback along the North/South Road between the extension of the centerline of Barnes Road and the centerline of Depot Road from 25 feet to 100 feet. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-0). CARRIED 1033-276

ARTICLE 3: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147.13.14.3.11. to lower the ten-year flood elevation around Pequawket Pond from 464.6 feet to 464.1 feet and lower the one-hundred year flood elevation from 461.5 feet to 460.5 feet. ARTICLE 5: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Articles 147.13.1.6.13.1., 147.13.2.6.13.1., 147.13.3.6.13.1., 147.13.4.6.13.1., 147.13.5.6.10.1., 147.13.6.7.10.1., 147.13.7.6.10.1., 147.13.8.6.10.1., 147.13.11.6.10.1., and 147.13.12.7.13.1. regarding FLAGS, BANNERS, PENNANTS, ETC. to increase the permitted flag angle from 30 degrees from vertical to 45 degrees from vertical. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-0). CARRIED 1084-241

ARTICLE 6: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Articles 147.13.16 and 147.13.17 by consolidating the Wetland Conservation Overlay District (WCOD) and the Wetland and Watershed Protection Overlay District (WWPOD) into a single Wetland and Watershed Protection Overlay District. The amendment also adds a provision to facilitate municipal trail network improvements within wetland buffers. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-0). CARRIED 1060-227

ARTICLE 7: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as petitioned by Kristine M. Cluff and others to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147.13.8.1.3 to expand the Highway Commercial District on the east side of

Route 16 to include all of the properties identified as 2004 Tax Map 235, Parcel 78 (a.k.a. Staples), 2004 Tax Map 235, Parcel 77 (a.k.a. Yankee Clipper/Blueberry Muffin) and 2004 Tax Map 235, Parcel 78.01 (a.k.a. Puddin' Hill Drive/Barnes Road). Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-0). CARRIED 718-561

ARTICLE 8: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 7 as petitioned by Catherine A. Woodall and others to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147.11. to insert the following language: "The following may be allowed by Special Exception: The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) may approve helicopter operations for construction and survey work, where no other practical method is available to do the work, and for special events such as: the visit of a dignitary, recreational events such as ski, tennis, equine or golf events, or some other events of short term nature. No approval for a special exception under this amendment shall be granted unless the ZBA makes a finding that the helicopter use will not constitute a nuisance or hazard to the town residents and their property." Recommended By the Conway Planning Board (4-2-0). CARRIED 811-484

ARTICLE 9: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 8 as petitioned by Catherine A. Woodall and others to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147.13.2. to insert the following language: "The Center Conway Village Commercial District shall have the same permitted uses and limitations otherwise provided in the in the Village Commercial District under this ordinance except the additional following limitations shall apply:

- (a) mobile homes shall be prohibited:
- (b) mobile home parks shall be prohibited: and
- (c) retail uses in excess of 3,000 square feet shall be prohibited;
- (d) wholesale and light industry shall be prohibited except as provided in Home Occupation 147.13.2.7
- (e) any size underground or above ground on site storage tanks for classified or hazardous materials are prohibited. This does not include storage tanks used for heating fuel for commercial or domestic use or an approved use;
- (f) garage and filling stations shall be prohibited."

ARTICLE 10: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 9 as petitioned by Jonathan Goodwin and others to the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance which amends the Town of Conway Zoning Ordinance Articles 147.13.1.6.11.4., 147.13.2.6.11.4., 147.13.3.6.11.4., 147.13.4.6.11.4., 147.13.5.6.8.4., 147.13.6.7.8.4., 147.13.7.6.8.4., 147.13.8.6.8.4., 147.13.10.6.8.4., 147.13.11.6.8.4. and 147.13.12.7.11.4. to read as follows: "Flashing/blinking,

Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Eight Million Three Hundred Eighteen Thousand Nine Hundred Thirty Eight Dollars (\$8,318,938) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. ARTICLE 12: (Separate-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #11) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost of items of a one-year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2005 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for an increase of Nine Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$945.00) in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal year 2005. This means that the 2005 contract results in Nine Hundred and Forty Five Dollars (\$945.00) in additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. ARTICLE 13: (Separate-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #11) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in a one year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2005 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT which calls for an increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal year 2005 of One Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$1,423.00) and further to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$1,423.00) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. The management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information are not a required part of the basic financial statements, but are supplementary information required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. We have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion on it.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Conway's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. They have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements take as a whole.

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Conway for the year ended December31, 2004, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities caused by error or fraud, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above. We noted no material weaknesses during the review of the internal control.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management, the board of selectmen, and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

# ASSESSOR ANNUAL REPORT 2005

After the daunting task of revaluing Conway to market value in the midst of a booming market in 2004, tax year 2005 seemed relatively calm. This was probably fortunate for we were busier than ever assessing new construction and new subdivisions. There never seems to be enough daylight or good weather to get such work done in time to set the tax rate in the fall.

The real estate market continued its torrid pace through most of the year but seemed to slow noticeably after August. Ordinarily, Assessors measure appreciation from tax year to tax year, that is, from April 1 to April 1. The traditional way to measure this is by developing a ratio from assessed values and sale prices. Because sale prices move either up or down through the course of time, their movement can be measured against their assessments. By developing these ratios, one can measure whether the market is going up or down and by how much. Assessors usually calculate this by using sales that occur six months either side of the April 1 tax date.

When this was done for 2005, we found about a 13% to 14% appreciation rate from April 1, 2004 to April 1, 2005. This is down from 15% a year earlier but not by much. However, as I noted, things seemed to have slowed down some this fall and when I reviewed such ratios on a calendar year basis, it appears that the market reached a peak in June and July and then fell back a bit towards the end of the year. What conclusions can we reach from this data? Well, it's really too early to tell. For five years, the market has maintained double digit annual appreciation in spite of rising interest rates, doubling land values and skyrocketing construction costs. Perhaps spikes in fuel costs as a result of multiple hurricanes in the Gulf of Mexico and Caribbean were finally able to tap the brakes on the super heated housing market.

Before becoming unduly concerned, it should be noted that month-to-month comparisons involve much smaller sample sizes and lack perspective. It might be that the pullback is seasonal in nature. Maybe the last quarter represents a healthy retracement, a breather if you will, before the market takes the next leg up. Only time will tell.

Anyway, as of April 1, 2005, Conway was comprised of 8,100 parcels of which 7,574 were taxable. We had 3,269 single-family homes with an average sale price hovering around \$200,000. In the non-residential market, a Hampton Inn is being constructed on the strip in North Conway. Also on the strip is a new building being placed next to last year's new Blue Canoe convenience store. The two-tenant structure will supposedly hold a retail store and a bank. The Economic Council is developing a multi-tenant business incubator in Conway. Two competing home centers, Home Depot and Lowe's have both been proposed but have yet to begin construction. The State Line Store on Route 302 was torn down and a larger one put in its place.

This up tick comes after a few years of lackluster commercial development. It may represent pent up demand that was formed while the state worked to widen Route 16. Once upon a time such an expansion in the tax base would have a noticeable lowering affect on tax bills. Conway is now well over a billion dollar community and such growth as mentioned above is negligible in light of the town's total assessed value.

The year 2005 turned out to be an excellent year for me personally and professionally. On a personal note, I was happily married in March to Ms. Wendy James. In November, my fellow assessors elected me as President of the New Hampshire Association of Assessing Officers. It is quite humbling to be held in such regard by people whom I respect a great deal. I will work hard to deserve the honor in the coming year.

# PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

### **VETERAN SERVICE EXEMPTION: RSA 72:28-36**

Amount=\$500 Regular Veteran, \$2000 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

### **OPTIONAL ADJUSTED ELDERLY EXEMPTION: RSA 72:43-H**

Must be a resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly (if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.).

Net income of \$19,000 or if married \$25,000.

Asset limitation of \$50,000, excluding the value of residence.

Amount of exemption:

65-75 years of age: \$37,500 75-80 years of age: \$60,000

80 years or older: \$75,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

### PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED: RSA 72:37-A

"Physically handicapped person" means a person who by reason of physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him/her to propel himself/herself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

### **BLIND EXEMPTION RSA 72:37**

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department. Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his/her residential real estate equalized.

# BUILDING INSPECTION AND CODE ENFORCEMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2005

The year 2005 showed some minor reduction in new residential construction. In 2004, the total number of single-family homes constructed within the town was one hundred twelve. This year, the total number of single-family homes constructed was ninety-five and three new duplexes equaling six residential units, for a total of one hundred and one new residences.

Commercial construction however, showed a substantial increase in new construction and renovations, and it looks to be as busy or busier for the next building season.

In the building inspection department, there were 532 building permits issued in 2005, which is the exact same as last year. This number reflects the total of both residential and commercial permits.

These total to an estimated assessment value for the completed work at over \$42.98 million dollars up considerably from last year's total of \$30.77 million. The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits were in excess of \$84,127.00 up, dramatically from the fees paid for last year of \$34,800.00. This increase in the permit fees paid to the town has contributed to the increase of revenues obtained through commercial permits.

Now in my sixth year as Building Inspector, I feel the helpfulness of the positive relationship with the town's people and the local contractors assisting me in my day-to-day operations.

I thank you for the opportunity to serve the Town of Conway and I hope to continue to do so.

# CODE COMPLIANCE ANNUAL REPORT 2005

The primary responsibility of the Code Compliance Officer is Sign Permitting and enforcement of the town's Zoning Ordinances and Land Use Regulations. I am also involved in the administration and enforcement of other planning and zoning matters including: Site Plan Regulations, the Outdoor Display of Goods, Temporary Event Permits and the review of Zoning Permit applications for anything from tree cutting in the shoreline buffer to home occupations.

In 2005, Sign Permit Applications continued to increase. The number of Sign Permits approved was up 12% (111 in 05'vs. 99 in 04') from the previous year. In addition, there were eight permits denied for various reasons. This increase is a result of Conway's position as a business hub, the re-construction of the northern section of Rt. 16, and several lending institutions changing their corporate ID's in 2005.

Zoning complaints were actually down considerably with only 51 for 2005 vs. 86 complaints in 2004. Most of these were related to signage, however, there were also a few (non-signage related) Zoning and Site Plan violations reported. Three of these remain pending and none of these have resulted in court action. The town's 2004 decision denying "grandfathered" status to a helicopter-landing site was upheld in Superior Court. The defendant has now appealed to the NH Supreme Court and the case will be heard sometime in 2006.

Home Occupation permits were also on the rise in 2005, indicating that the small business climate in the Conway is still very active.

In a continuing effort to closely monitor building activity on Conway Lake, The Planning Department conducted a survey of the shoreline checking for any alterations made to the shore zone and other man-made changes potentially affecting the lake.

# GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 2005

This year proved to be another successful year for the General Assistance Department. With an approved budget of \$26,000, we spent \$20,553.86 leaving a balance of \$5,446.14 or 20.95% of the total. This was \$4,567.32 less than 2004 expenses, which were \$4,880.81 less than 2003! Net expenditures reflect \$1,845.45 in reimbursements and \$650.00 paid to Vaughan Community Service for food pantry services. There were sixty-two vouchers issued of which thirty-four were for housing purposes, nine for utilities, five for heat, five for medical needs and nine for miscellaneous requests. One fair hearing was held and ruled in favor of the town.

Consistent reduction in expenditures is great but may lead citizens to question whether services are being provided. The answer is yes, absolutely! I attribute low expenses mostly to the tremendous community support we receive. Other influential factors may include the fact that we place liens on any real property (RSA 165:28 and 165:28a) and we also ask family (RSA 165:19) and friends to take part in caring for the applicant. We do a lot of referring and networking, and lastly, we require people to use any and all public or private benefits available to them as a condition of continued assistance and if necessary, we help them to access those services. Utilizing all programs is vital in preventing repeated emergency episodes and hence, the need for local assistance.

Office contact statistics were kept this year for the first time and revealed that 38% of my time is spent assisting people from other towns. Represented were 132 households composed of 139 adults and seventy-two children. Only twenty-two of these households eventually applied for local assistance. Request type was overwhelmingly housing related at sixty-nine requests. There were sixteen requests for fuel, fourteen for medical needs, thirteen for utilities, six for food and twenty-six for information. The remaining seven were for miscellaneous reasons. This year we will continue to keep office contact records and we will create a spreadsheet to record assistance provided to our clients by other organizations so we will be able to quantify community support.

Worth noting is the hot topic of fuel costs. It is virtually impossible to predict future costs because of the volatile market. We hope to receive supplemental funds to support the Energy Assistance Program that should provide some relief for electric bills and in some cases, heat. This program pays a percentage of the electric bill but lacks funds to continue and has a long waiting list. Additionally, we were chosen to receive a donation from the Rotary and Kiwanis Clubs to offset fuel costs. This generous donation has enabled us to help residents that might not have qualified for town assistance under our income guidelines.

As indicated by the statistics above, this office sees a lot of people throughout the year and we were able to keep costs down because of the individuals and small organizations that share in the responsibility of caring for financially challenged people. The love and commitment this community demonstrates throughout the year is amazing!

# PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Once again I must report that the past year has been extremely busy for the Planning Department, the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The Planning Board considered over sixty-eight cases in 2005. A 10% increase over 2004. Thirty-nine site plan cases that addressed over 500,000 square feet of new or redeveloped commercial floor space, over 150 new or renovated lodging units, over eighty restaurant seats and twenty-nine apartments. The Planning Board also addressed twenty-nine subdivisions relative to over seventy new lots or units. The Zoning Board of Adjustment was also very busy as it addressed fifty-three appeals. Also a 10% increase over 2004.



The number of applications and amount of development activity stretched the Department's resources to the limit and we were forced to out-source the engineering review components of several projects. Several of the larger projects have not yet commenced construction. So, in 2006, you can expect to see a lot of these developments moving from plans on paper to construction activity on the ground.

In 2005 we were successful in amending the fee schedules for site plan and subdivision applications. Based on the new fees it is expected that developers will now be paying for the services needed to review their applications. Thus reducing the tax-payer cost of the Planning Department by nearly 50%. A rough estimate is that for a typical \$100,000 property owner the cost of the department has been reduced from two cents to a penny a day.

Given the pace of development review activities this past year, we were unable to rewrite the subdivision regulations. That project has been deferred to 2006 along with revisiting the Master Plan to ensure its currency and that we are on track with the implementation strategy. This Department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

# PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR/TOWN ENGINEER ANNUAL REPORT 2005

Last year's report reviewed the success of recycling enforcement. To summarize, the waste going into our landfill was reduced from ten thousand tons a year to four thousand. As a result of this success, the Selectmen were able to reduce the annual amount set aside for the expansion of the facility by sixty thousand dollars. Since less trash is going in each year, the facility will last longer which in turn leaves more time to save up for the expansion cost.

Road construction seems to be on everyone's mind. At least that's the question I'm asked most frequently. The State will continue its project on Route 16 in Intervale this season. The project is still currently scheduled to finish this fall. The Town and the North Conway Water Precinct worked on two joint projects this past season. They were the reconstruction of Seavy Street and Mechanic Street. The Seavy Street project went from Route 16 to the North South Road and the Mechanic Street project went from Route 16 to Pine Street.

This year the Town and the NCWP plan to continue the work on Mechanic Street from Pine Street to the North South Road. The Conway village Fire District has recently completed water system upgrades in Hillside Avenue and Muster Road. The Town will reconstruct both roads and add drainage this season.

The North Conway village reconstruction will commence this spring. The sidewalks, curbing, drainage, water main and roadway will all be replaced. This is a significant project that will last the entire season. Also included in this work will be the addition of ornamental lights in the Village.

Finally, just to make sure we will stay busy, the road way improvements needed to facilitate the Home Depot and Lowes developments are also planned for this season. This construction will take place on Barnes Road, McMillan Way, Common Court and the North-South Road.

Don't forget to beep and wave when you see us working on these projects this season.

# RECREATION DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2005

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building, 1808 East Main Street in Center Conway. Our facility includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, computer lab, art room and television room. The outdoor facility features a playground, outdoor basketball court and a multi-purpose athletic field with newly installed lights. This past year, our athletic field was named for Richard "Dick" O'Brien who served the Town of Conway as a Selectman, School Board Member and sports enthusiast.

The Conway Recreation Department is responsible for outdoor parks and recreation areas for various community uses: Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Nasby King Field, Schouler Park, Washington Street Park, Whitaker Homesite Field and Shedd Woods. These sites provide recreational activities such as Nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, tennis, basketball, volleyball, picnicking and various other activities conducted on our multi-purpose fields.

Our children's programming for 2005 included T-ball, girl's softball, Red Cross Swim Program, Summer Program, soccer, flag football, bowling, field hockey, basketball. A new children's sports program was added in 2005. Hockey with a Pond Hockey Theme was added. This program was offered to kids who were looking to try the hockey experience without the cost. It was offered to more than eighty kids at the Ham Arena and played with small groups to give all newcomers to the sport a chance to learn to skate and handle a puck in a fun and relaxed atmosphere. Other special events offered to the children were the Turkey Trot Race, Easter Egg Hunt and the annual Halloween Party. For the second year in a row, our girls and boys basketball program continued to grow in numbers and we expanded from fourteen teams to sixteen teams.

Our newest programs in 2005 saw a playgroup established for moms and dads of infants through toddlers who wanted a place for their young children to play and for the parents to visit with one another. This program is offered throughout the school year, two mornings per week.

Adult programming has not only increased but has become ever so popular with the adult population of our town. We offered women's softball, men's softball and over 40 men's softball. Our newest expansion in adult programs was our winter and fall adult basketball program. We experimented with this as a pilot program to see if it was popular enough. We were able to have a total of ten teams combined involved in the winter and fall league.

Senior adult programming continued to be popular. In 2005 we offered weekly BINGO and Scrabble. Each one of these programs was offered one day per week and designed for older adults to have a consistent program that they could count on for their recreation. In addition, monthly bus trips were offered to various locations for site seeing, lunch and entertainment.

The Teen Center saw some changes in 2005. Michael Lane, Teen Coordinator was promoted to the Assistant Recreation Director and Jim Rozzell took over as Teen

Coordinator. The Teen Center has been inexistence for more than ten years and offers a safe drop in center for middle school age children. The Teen Center is open four nights per week including weekends. This gives teens the opportunity to hang out and enjoy their friends in an environment that is safe and healthy for them.

The Friends of Conway Recreation Inc. was very active in its fundraising efforts in 2005. This group is a non-profit organization committed to the children of Conway and the Conway Recreation Department. Its biggest contribution in the 2005 year was providing lights at the Dick O'Brien Field in Center Conway. This will pave the way for night games in girl's softball, Cal Ripkin Baseball, women's softball and practices for our soccer and flag football programs. I cannot thank the Friends of Conway Recreation for their tireless efforts and the hard work of our Board of Director's.

Our 2005 programs would not have so successful without the support of our community and dedication of our coaches and volunteers. Though too many to mention them all, you know who you are and what you mean to our organization. We have been fortunate to have over ninety adults involved in coaching our youth sports and more than fifty others volunteering at various Conway Recreation Department functions.

A special thanks goes to the businesses and civic organizations of our community. These groups continue to support us through their in kind giving and always come

through for us whenever we need them.

In closing I would like to thank Todd Gallagher who dedicated the past ten years of his life to the Conway Recreation Department and all the children. Todd left the Conway Rec. after ten years to become the Athletic Director of Fryeburg Academy. We could not have become the department we are today without Todd's hard work, understanding and sacrifices that he made for us. Not only was Todd a role model to kids but a dedicated person who deeply cared for his job, community and a friend to us all.

It has been a pleasure to serve the citizens of Conway as your Recreation Director and I hope that you get involved in one of our many recreation programs.

# 2005 REPORT OF THE CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

In 2005, the Commission revitalized the leadership of the Police Department by unanimously voting to appoint Edward Wagner as Chief of Police in May and promoting Joseph Faia to Lieutenant. Together they have proven to be a management team that is capable of handling the wide variety of duties and responsibilities that their respective positions demand. Promoting from within the Department is a tradition we are proud of and feel fortunate to have the caliber of employee working for the Department that makes that possible.

The Town of Conway has seen tremendous growth in many areas. There is now a major retail store here with others following. There has been a lot of construction to build new and bigger roads and these new roads allow for more traffic. We have also seen an increase in the number of people attending events here as well as visiting year round throughout all of our beautiful seasons. All of these elements are placing more and more burden and workload on the current number of employees of the police department. The time to consider increasing those numbers is quickly approaching. We have managed to serve the Town of Conway well with the same number of Officers for many years. We would be remiss if we did not acknowledge an increased risk of a decline in service by continuing to ask these employees to do more with less.

For the 2006 budget, the Commission is unanimously endorsing two major changes. The first is a creation of a revolving account for Commercial Duty. This account is designed to allow the Town to pay Officers for Commercial Duty without having to raise and appropriate the money first. The second major change involves the way the Department would purchase their police vehicles. We currently lease/purchase vehicles by making three annual payments, which incur interest costs of approximately 4,000-5,000 per year. Our proposal is to establish a capital reserve fund that would allow us to purchase versus leasing; saving the taxpayers interest costs.

The Conway Police Department is made up of men and women the townspeople can be proud of. They remain one of the most respected departments in the State and we are equally proud to serve with them as your Police Commission.

# 2005 REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

This past year was a rewarding but challenging year for the Conway Police Department. Many changes took place to include me taking over as Chief of Police in May. I would first like to mention how grateful I am to the men and women of this department for making my transition into this new position any easy one. If it weren't for your professionalism and dedication to this department, the transition would not have been so easy. Thank you! The department also changed with several other promotions to include Joseph Faia being promoted to Lieutenant, Russell McLauchlan being promoted to Sergeant and Alan Broyer being promoted to Sergeant in charge of the Detective Division.

The department was the recipient of several grants during 2005. We received a grant from the U.S. Attorney's Office in the amount of \$13,917.00 for the purchase of new handguns. The old weapons were at or nearing their age limit so the purchase of the new weapons was a necessity. We were also awarded the Edward Byrne Memorial Grant from the Department of Justice in the amount of \$14,281.00. The department shared \$2,975.00 from this grant with the Carroll County Sheriff's Office and we will use the remaining funds for new digital recordings systems and any other major purchases. The other major grant we received, from the Department of Homeland Security and the Department of the Army, was for new surveillance equipment. The cost of this new technology was approximately \$25,000.00. Last but not least, we received several smaller grants for the State of New Hampshire, Highway Safety in the amount of \$4,800. These grants included motorcycle patrol, bicycle patrol, seat belt patrols and DWI patrols. The total amount of grants received during 2005 was nearly \$58,000.00 with no impact to tax payers.

2005 also brought the retirement of our K-9 Thor. Thor was a vital part of this department and we will sorely miss him. During his tenure here, he made several article searches and tracks. In 2003 Thor and his handler, Sgt. George Walker, were named the New Hampshire Working Dog Foundation K-9 team of the year. We are looking to continue the program in 2006 through grants that are available.

The department continues to struggle with staffing issues and staying competitive in today's market. Like many other departments within the State, we are finding it difficult to find qualified applicants who can meet the demanding job requirements. Point in case, for the year, we were understaffed by one patrol officer the whole year and for part of the year, two dispatchers. We are hopeful that all those positions will be staffed during the first month or two of 2006 and will stay that way for years to come.

As my predecessors have said and I will continue to say, the residents and visitors of the Town of Conway can be very proud of the men and women on this department who serve the community. They are consummate professionals and dedicated to "serving and protecting" all who live or visit here.

# CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2005

The popularity of our improved library facility is reflect by the fact that there were over sixty-four thousand visits made by patrons to the library this year, an increase of 58%. The circulation of printed materials remained steady from the year before. The increase in visits can be attributed to an increase in usage of Internet access by 10% and by the fact that the Ham Community Room is booked every night for the next two months as of the January Trustees meeting. One of the best ways to gauge the value of a community resource is to look at its utilization rate; by that measure, our library is an invaluable community resource.

In the course of this busy year, several projects completing the renovation project were accomplished. A very generous donation funded the landscaping of the library park. The trustees were assisted by a landscape architect who designed a sequence of outdoor reading areas graced by ground coverings and flowering trees and bushes which will require low maintenance while providing seasonal beauty to all who pass our facility.

The face and hands of our building's tower clock were restored. The bricks on the original building were re-pointed. And a number of pavers on the new sidewalk were replaced at no cost when they proved not to be able to withstand the challenges of their first New Hampshire winter.

Our dedicated, professional staff continues to receive many compliments for their warmth as well as their competency. Demonstrating their commitment to lifelong learning, all the staff members have embraced our new computer software package which has enabled them to manage the library collection more efficiently. Each staff member participated in several days of training and they are discovering all the ways the new software enhances their abilities to respond to the needs of all library patrons.

The library continues to enjoy wonderful support from a wide range of volunteers with over 1520 hours of labor donated this year. The Friends of the Conway Library, having been a significant help in the capital fundraising efforts which enabled the library to build its new addition, are now focusing their efforts on providing a rich range of events and reading activities. Karla Wight provided superb leadership as the Friends' past president and she has been succeeded by Connie Brown and Ginger Blymeyer as the new co-presidents. The Friends arranged for a wonderful concert by the new Mountaintop Community Orchestra of Baroque Christmas music which was very well attended and deeply appreciated. The Friends are quite receptive to new program suggestions and welcome anyone who would like to join in their activities.

The library continues to offer reading groups for adults, story times for preschoolers, and a variety of events for children including the summer reading program, known this year as "Camp Wannaread"

The Trustees continue to appreciate all of the support given to the library, both in terms of financial supports as well as donated time. We are proud of our library and pleased to see that its resources are well used.

# CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 2005

Forest management work this year focused on Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods and the Common Lands off of Hurricane Mountain Road.

The White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA), in conjunction with the Commission, replaced the deteriorated Pudding Pond Trail footbridge crossing the Pudding Pond outlet. The group also constructed a mountain biking trail there called "Sticks and Stones" that quickly became popular with a wide variety of riders. NEMBA also performed annual trail maintenance on the Red Tail Trail off Hurricane Mountain Road. They built that trail in 2001.

The Trail work in Whitaker Woods reflected public input, user recommendations, and Commission objectives. Trails were widened and regarded to improve grooming for Nordic skiing. Steep and eroded sections of the Schuss and Quarry Hill trails were repaired or stabilized and closed. Some of the trail work done was the result of the closing of two of four railroad crossings. The closings were required by the NH Department of Transportation.

An inventory of trail sign needs for Whitaker Woods was prepared and an initial batch of signs is being prepared and installed. Regular and heavy public use of trails there, particularly during the cross-country ski season, calls for the replacement of missing signs.

At Shedd Woods we continued to remove undesirable saplings in the understory to encourage the growth of deciduous trees that will shade the site and reduce the annual maintenance work there. The Commission is pursuing the repair of damage at Shedd, the result of work done rebuilding Route 16. Landscaping and the planting of a buffer along Route 16 are needed to restore the popular picnic and view site.

The Town received a grant of \$1,050 from NH Fish & Game Department for the Commission's wildlife habitat improvement work done on the Common Lands off Hurricane Mountain Road. A similar grant will be pursued for additional work planned there in 2006. Work to encourage the growth of desirable trees at several management compartments in these Common Lands continues annually.

Any landowner who plans to construct any project in or adjacent to a wetland or drainage way must apply for a NH Department of Environmental Services permit. The Conservation Commission is responsible for the review of all applications to the Town as part of the Dredge and Fill permit process. While not an enforcement agent, by RSA definition, it is responsible for the protection of watershed resources for the Town. David Weathers is the lead participant in this facet of Conservation Commission work.

Members of the Conservation Commission are: Paul Pinkham, Chair; Dan Lucy, Vice-chair; Carol Lyman, Treasurer; David Weathers; Selectman's Representative, Rob Adair, Phil Haynes, Chuck Broomhall and Alternates, Connie Briggs and Linda Kearney. Lisa Vertigen provides administrative support to the Commission and Gail Currier records meeting minutes.

Anne "Nancy" Earle

Nancy Earle contributed in many ways to her community throughout the years. Mrs. Earle was a member of the first Planning Board in the Town of Conway and was part of drafting the original zoning laws. Also among her many contributions, Mrs. Earle was elected president of the Walkers' Pond Water Conservation Society in the late 1960's and held the position for thirty-nine years. During her time with the Society, Mrs. Earle helped to develop the practice of lake water testing, loon protection on the lake, as well as lake-shore protection laws. In 2004, the New Hampshire Lakes Association awarded Mrs. Earle the John F. Morten Memorial Award for Exemplary Lake Stewardship. Mrs. Earle had been an instructor with the Junior Ski Program, a member of the Eastern Slope Ski Program and introduced French to students at the Pine Tree School. Mrs. Earle was also a board member of the Peqauwket Foundation for several years and a member of a local chapter of the American University of Women.

# CONWAY PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 2005

The Planning Board with the support of the Town Staff have in the past year, or are in the process of reviewing nine major projects and four major subdivisions in the Town of Conway. This is in addition to numerous smaller projects and subdivisions. Members have worked hard to ensure development occurs in a manner consistent with the Master Plan and in the best interest of the Town of Conway and the citizens.

The Planning Board submitted four articles for voter approval and recommended four voter petitioned articles all of which were approved by the voters in April. On July 28, the Board amended the site plan and subdivision review application fee schedules to cover the actual costs created by development as these had been subsidized by taxes. The Planning Board has requested an article for the funding of a Capital Improvements Plan. This is to allow the Board to complete said CIP as voted on last April.

The Board is always looking for direction from the public and encourages your involvement at meetings or by contacting Board members. We currently have three openings for alternates and encourage anyone interested to apply by writing to either the Director of Planning or to the Chair of the Planning Board. Please include background, experience and any other pertinent information as to why you wish to be appointed an alternate.

# ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2005

This has been the first full year since a court ruling established two different hardship test criteria that distinguish the difference between use and area variances. The Board heard twenty-three variances. Eleven of these were use variances of which four were granted, five were denied and two were withdrawn. Twelve area variances were heard, of which seven were granted and five were denied.

The Board also heard eighteen special exceptions. Of these, seventeen were granted and one was withdrawn. There were also seven appeals from administrative decisions of which two were granted, two denied and three withdrawn. In addition, there were four motions for rehearing; all were denied. There was also one request for an equitable waiver, which was granted. The Board had a total of fifty-three applications in 2006.

As a Board we still are in need of individuals that are interested in volunteering their time for community service and are interested in land use. A full Board consists of five members with five alternates. We would welcome anyone with any interest to contact the Board of Selectmen or member of the planning staff.

# AMERICAN RED CROSS MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER

The Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross is proud of its 79-year history of service to the residents of the Mount Washington Valley. "The Mission of the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross is to improve the quality of human life; to enhance self-reliance and concern for others; and to help people avoid, prepare for, and cope with emergencies."

The American Red Cross is not a government agency and depends on the financial support of the community to continue its mission of providing the following services to the community: Armed Forces Emergency Services, Blood Services, Disaster Services, Health, Safety & Community Services and International Services.

Armed Forces Emergency Services provides immediate messaging between families and loved ones in the Armed Forces. Blood Services provides the basis for being able to donate blood to help save someone's life. Disaster Services provides temporary emergency shelter, clothing and food, as the most common disaster is a house fire. Disaster Services also includes providing information on prevention and preparedness to the community. Health & Safety Services provides individuals with life saving skills, such as Adult CPR, Infant & Child CPR, First Aid, Water Safety, and Babysitter Training.

Each year, the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross strives to find new funding to improve the many programs and services available to the community. However the Chapter still depends on the generosity of the community to keep growing and achieving its goals!!

## CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC.

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child(ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child(ren) with special needs is a priority.

The program is staffed by professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers. Program services include: developmental screenings, evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments/consultations and interagency networking. 66 Conway families received services in 2005.

### **GIBSON CENTER**

The Gibson Center is a busy and expanding place, but everything we do is an extension of our Mission Statement:

Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

This embraces the core of what we do. Every weekday before dawn, our staff begins the preparation of a wholesome, balanced and tasty meal to serve in our dining room or to be delivered throughout the community by Meals on Wheels volunteer drivers. In 2005, we served 51,000 of these meals. For those who do not drive, or would prefer not to, our vans head out daily for trips to the Gibson Center, the doctor, the pharmacy or shopping. Over 500 people took part in our social and educational programs. These range from yoga and exercise classes to computer training to field trips for concerts and sporting events.

Our best estimates suggest that we will serve our ONE MILLIONTH MEAL this year, probably a month or two after Town Meeting.

Our work is made possible in part by appropriations from the town, state and federal governments. But we also rely on the continued support from individuals, businesses and foundations that keep us going. This past year over 11,000 volunteer hours were given to the Gibson Center. That is an astounding number and we are very grateful.

A big event for 2005 was the purchase of Silver Lake Landing in Madison. With this purchase, 20 low cost, independent apartments for seniors were preserved. It is important that the taxpayers of Conway know that Silver Lake Landing is owned and operated by the Silver Lake Senior Housing Corporation, a 501(c)(3) corporation. No Town funds are used for the operation and management. Silver Lake Landing is completely separate from the day-to-day activities of The Gibson Center.

If you would like to know more about the Gibson Center and our programs, please come by and we'll be happy to show you around.

We appreciate your continued support and look forward to our second 25 years of service to this amazing community.

### NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER

The North Conway Community Center has been serving our community since 1948. The Community Center has gone through many changes in the 58 years it has been in the Valley. The Center has expanded from the land which the building occupies by acquiring land that includes the playground area and Mud Bowl property. The Harvey Dow Gibson Playground has been upgraded and improved at least 3 times in our history to meet the needs of the families in our Valley. The Center is looking to the future by writing grants to continue to improve the playground by adding more equipment. Other improvements include; the tot pool has been upgraded to a Spray ground and the summerhouse has changed into the snack shack. Obviously the Center could not be in existence without the dedicated support of many organizations and volunteers who have provided financial and physical support.

A twelve-person volunteer Board of Directors runs the Center. These Directors are the main fundraisers; they are the people you see flipping burgers at concerts, running games at the Fourth of July, and standing up to support the Center at Town Meetings. These hard-working volunteers raise over \$100,000 a year, which is used to pay the bills at the Center. The Board is proud of their accomplishment of providing a safe recreational facility, which was built with donations and grants, and is dedicated to continuing to serve the recreational needs of our community.

The Center's main focus is youth programming. Our programs have continued to grow in attendance every year. We offer soccer, flag football, basketball, field hockey, cheering, t-ball, and softball programs, as well as a summer day camp for children. We are open after school everyday for kids to drop in and play basketball or play in the game room. The Center is a busy place year round. The Center has been a huge supporter of the Eight Grade Washington DC trip and Key Club.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Conway, Deryl Fleming and the Board of Directors and Roger and the army of volunteers who help coach and fundraise throughout the year.

### NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER

Your childcare center is busier than ever. As of last February we are now licensed to have children from 13 months up through 12 years of age. We continue to staff according to the number of children to keep our expenses in line but also trying to maintain quality. Presently our total enrollment is 80 children.

Since the beginning of our fiscal year, which is October 1, we have served 2311 lunches and 3338 snacks. **Kathy Haynes**, cook, has been extremely busy and we are now covering dining rooms. One in each of the classrooms upstairs and one in the lower level where our preschool moved last January. The room downstairs has been made very warm and age appropriate for the four year old group. Many thanks to **Lynn Hartford**, teacher, and **Tanya Munro**, assistant teacher. The parents all seem very pleased.

The staff is continuing to attend workshops and we were re-certified in Infant/Child CPR in July. **Lori Lusky**, teacher, continues to work with the really little ones. I am even beginning to enjoy the group that doesn't talk that well. **Leslie Schasel**, assistant teacher, from our three-year-old group will be attending a two-day intensive workshop on "Implementing the Creative Classroom" in the spring. We

have two students from Kennett High School who work as aides in the afternoon and will be getting one more now that our classrooms are getting so full.

Last year's Mud Bowl was the most successful yet. I have already had my first planning meeting for 2006. Speaking of fund raising we have a couple of other events in the planning stages. Both events will be at local restaurants. Friendly's will be in March and Flatbreads will be in April. Also, we are going to publish a cookbook with Kathy's favorite recipes for a fundraiser.

We will soon be in the planning phase for our summer program for school age children. Lynn will have all the field trips planned and fun things in between before school gets out in June.

During the school year our pre-school has been very busy with weekly learning activities that Lynn and Tanya plan. There have been trips to the North Conway Library and Mountain Top Music has come to us for a pre-school music introduction class. We are now in the middle of our second session with them. The past two years we have tried hard to keep our field trips and school activities closer to home and even within walking distance. The Mount Washington Observatory is especially good for the school age group in the summer. The last two summers we have had a small garden and worked with The Cooperative Extension Service to expand upon the benefits of knowing where our food comes from and eating healthy food. Our classes also do some cooking of their own. I am signing up to attend a "Growing a Green Generation" all day workshop in March at UNH.

Our staff is also meeting monthly to keep up with all that is going on because we are so busy with the many children that we care for every week.

I am sure that I have left many things out but I invite you all to come and visit. We also have been very lucky to have two very faithful volunteers who have come in on a regular basis to let one of the staff have their break during the day. Our wonderful volunteers are **Lynn Runne** and **Ellie Perkins**. This is during naptime; more volunteers are needed and welcomed.

### STARTING POINT

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups, resources and referrals and community education programs. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

Conway residents benefit both from Starting Point's direct services and ongoing educational programs. In 2004, 156 Conway residents received Starting Point services. Conway residents were provided with 870 bednights of emergency shelter to 19 individuals. Starting Point provided court advocacy to 64 Conway residents. In addition, all Conway students attending Kennett High School participated in Starting Point's three hour program, Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know as part of the school's required health curriculum. Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary, our 8-week elementary school program on creating a positive school environment was offered at John Fuller and Conway Elementary Schools.

With only five full-time staff members and a limited budget, the vast portion of Starting Point's services were provided by approximately 35 trained volunteers. These volunteers donate approximately 12,766 hours of service to our community each year. The financial support contributed by towns to our agency is used for educational programs and direct services to Starting Point clients. Money received through town funding and our own fundraising efforts enable Starting Point to qualify for State and Federal grants which comprise 86% of our budget. Without the assistance of towns such as Conway, Starting Point would not qualify for the funds that keep us in operation.

### TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

The Tri-County Community Action/Carroll County is a private, non-profit agency that was established in 1965. The Carroll County Resource Center is located at 448 White Mountain Highway, Tamworth, NH. We have had **contact with 3,486 of Conway's citizens, processed 489 Fuel Applications, 143 elderly, 141 disabled and linked 2713 with other programs.** 

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$602,750. 00 ON CONWAY'S CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 2004 AND JUNE 30, 2005.

Tri-County Community Action is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities countywide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, EFSP, McKinney and private and corporate benefactors. We are the conduit through which USDA Surplus Food is distributed to the 14 Food Pantries and three dinner bells, a group home and a nursing home throughout the Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact has successfully partnered with individuals and families to assist them to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency

We have provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than <u>15,985 contacts</u> in Carroll County last year.

We greatly appreciate the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff and residents.

### VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC.

In 2005, Vaughan Community Services, Inc. continued to serve the citizens of the Mt Washington Valley who were in need. The services provided included the food pantry, the clothing depot, assisting people who needed help in navigating the social service maze, bereavement support, a class on living wills and medical powers of attorneys and support required by anyone who had no place else to turn. We are truly grateful for all of the support that we receive from the community. Without your help we could not continue to provide service to the needy in the valley.

Vaughan continued an active fund raising program and once again teamed up with Jen's Friends to host a Golf Tournament in June. Although the black flies were out, this in no way deterred the golfers from enjoying the day on the links and supporting these two very worthwhile non profit organizations. We also must thank the Morrill Family Foundation for their hosting of the Storyland After Dark fundraiser which resulted in \$39 for each Golden Goose ticket we sold. These two fund raisers netted over \$14,000 toward the programs and operation of Vaughan. We want to thank the many volunteers and business in the community for their support of these two fundraising activities.

The food pantry has been busy again this year. We served over 750 families this year providing almost 9000 meals. In November, we again teamed with WMWV, Mt Washington Radio Food Drive to collect canned goods and turkeys for distribution to eight area food pantries. The generosity of the community resulted in over 400 bags of food collected and 150 turkeys. The turkeys were included in Thanksgiving baskets, as well as for the congregate meals served both Thanksgiving and Christmas. Thank you for your support. On Thanksgiving Day, over 80 people were served dinner at our congregate meal and 30 meals were delivered to shut ins. This is truly a community outreach program and we want to thank the many volunteers who helped serve, deliver meals, bake pies and of course do the dishes and clean up. A special thanks goes out to Levitt's Bakery for providing wonderful homemade rolls, the folks at Memorial Hospital for preparing the turkeys and Tim George, Jay Donabedian and Lionel Tetreault for their gracious donations of food to support the dinner. Brian and Rita Hill provide flowers for the tables which makes the dinner a special occasion for all who attend. In addition to the meals served we also distributed food baskets to 50 local families at Thanksgiving and provided gift certificates for 12 families for Christmas dinner.

The Vaughan Clothing Depot continues to serve the folks in the community with free clothing and household goods. Pat and Jim Johnston, Depot managers, volunteer many hours to keep the place neat. We also cannot thank the folks in the valley enough for there generous donations of clothing and household goods which enable us to offer this service to the community.

This past year we offered an information session on living wills and medical power of attorney. The program was well received and over thirty people attended this informative session.

Sara Bechtold, Vaughan Administrator resigned in September. She had provided leadership to Vaughan for four years. The Board of Directors wants to wish her well in her future endeavors. Christine Dias was hired as the Interim Administrator on a part time basis in late December.

### WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

White Mountain Community Health Center is a nonprofit health care center located in Conway. The mission of the center is to provide high quality health care to residents without discrimination. The center provides reduced fees to residents with no health insurance or insurance that does not pay for out patient health care. This ensures that everyone can receive the health care they need.

The center provides services to men, women and children. This includes a children's program that provides physicals, sick call visits and treatment, inoculations, and many screens to assess the child's or infant's health status. The prenatal program provides care beginning with pregnancy, deliveries of babies with a nurse midwife, and post natal care. Adults and teens are also seen for physicals, screenings, sick calls, diagnosis and treatment.

The value to the town includes new services offered and not funded by the town:

- *Healthy Smiles* program provides dental services provided by a dental hygienist are provided both in the Conway elementary schools and at the health center. Prevention through patient education is provided to all patients seen by us.
- Partners in Health is a program focused on children with chronic illnesses.
- *The Umbrella Program* assists in the application of Healthy Kids for those children who quality.
- *Employee Prepay Program* is a program that employers prepay for our services at a discount. This offers small businesses an affordable way to provide out patient healthcare to their employees.

The health center gives away over \$20,000.00 a month in free care to patients. We are asking for only 18.5% of what it costs us to serve Conway residents. Due to the service based economy in this area, many employees do not have health insurance coverage.

We rely on various sources of revenue to assist us in serving these patients. The Town appropriations are an important part of how we can offer free and reduced services to those Conway residents in need. If White Mountain Community Health Center did not exist, Conway would have a larger tax burden. While our visits and services continue to grow each year, we only ask for level funding. We always appreciate the support of Conway residents and we look forward to your support again this year.

### Results of the 2006 Deliberative

The deliberative session of the 2006 Town Meeting was held on March 8, 2006. With only two exceptions all articles on the warrant were approved and forwarded to the ballot. Voting will be held on April 11, 2006. Deleted language is shown in strikethrough and added text is shown in bold.

The two amended articles are:

ARTICLE 6: (Separate). To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to continue to provide enter into a three year contract for EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE between the Town of Conway and Conway Village Fire District beginning January 1, 2007. Funding for each contract year shall be included in the annual operating budget.

ARTICLE 6: (Separate). To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to continue providing EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE on the same terms as presently exist and to enter into a one (1) year contract consistent with current practices to be effective January 1, 2007.

ARTICLE 15: (Separate). Special. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) to support the operation of the EASTERN SLOPE AIRPORT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (6-7-0).

### **BUDGET NARRATIVE**

### Introduction

The total recommended operating budget is \$8,709,232, which amounts to an increase of \$229,051 (2.7%) over the 2005 adopted budget (see Attachment 1, page 97). The approved default budget for 2006 is \$8,583,373 (Attachment 2, page 98), which is \$125,859 less than the proposed operating budget.

The proposed budget does not include funding for new regular staff or significant new initiatives or programs. In the Recreation Department, funding to extend the hours of the existing part time administrative aide position has been added and two summer counselor positions have been added as well.

The proposed increase in the operating budget is attributable to increases in specific line items within the larger budgets supporting town government. These include Employee Benefits, Police, Fire, Highway, Solid Waste, and Library. These increases are balanced by decreases that resulted from several significant changes involving the recalculation of Capital Reserve Funds and the proposed establishment of two Revolving Funds.

Attachment 3 (page 99) provides a chart illustrating the distribution of proposed expenditures and Attachment 4 (page 99) presents projected revenues. Attachment 5 (page 100) presents the calculation of the projected 2006 tax rate of \$3.89. Attachment 6 (page 101) shows the tax rate trend since 1994.

Following the narrative is a draft of the 2006 Warrant.

### **Significant Budget Issues**

Significant budget issues include the following:

Two revolving funds are proposed. One of these will be for Police Commercial Duty and the other for Special Waste Recycling. If approved by the voters, these funds would move revenue and expenditures in an estimated annual amount in excess of \$250,000 from the operating budget into revolving funds. The Board of Selectmen has proposed these funds for consideration because these activities are not funded by tax revenue. Rather, they are fully funded through fees charged to construction project contractors for activities such as police traffic control and to the producers of certain recyclable waste; therefore, their inclusion in the operating budget exaggerates the budget total with respect to tax rate impact.

- The required annual contribution to the Capital Reserve Fund for Landfill Expansion has been recalculated and decreased by \$45,000
- © Employee Benefits increase by almost \$70,000 based on a 7.2% increase in health insurance and changes in employee status.
- Based on the proposed creation of the Commercial Duty Revolving Fund, the labor line in the Police Department actually decreases. There are still however, significant increases in the salary and benefit lines within this department.
- The Fire budget increases by approximately \$33,000 due to increases in contract expenses for fire service to non-precinct areas of the town (only those in non-precinct areas are taxed for this service).
- The Ambulance budget increases by \$15,740 based on the terms of the existing contract.
- In the Highway budget, increases (\$104,774) are attributable to labor and materials such as fuel, salt and asphalt.
- ① In the Solid Waste Budget there are increases in significant line items totaling \$84,039 (labor, fuel and materials).
- ① The Library budget increases by approximately \$29,000 due to employee and utility cost increases.

### **Departmental Summaries**

The following discussion provides a summary of each department budget. Attachment 1 presents a summary of the changes in each budget from 2005 to 2006.

### Executive

The Executive Budget includes staff and operating expenses for general town administration. Included in the budget are supplies and materials for administrative departments and compensation for the Board of Selectmen/Town Manager's Office. Compensation for some elected officials is also included. This year, the budget is essentially level. Increases in employee compensation are offset by a reduction of \$2,000 in the Town Reports line based on the need for fewer reports. In 2005, reports were not mailed to all mail addresses in Conway. Instead they were made available for pick up at various locations throughout the community. This approach to distribution resulted in an excess of several thousand reports.

### **Election and Registration**

This budget funds elections and voter registration.

The budget increases by 2.1% and reflects staff costs and various adjustments in operating lines and the fact that three elections will be held in 2006.

### **Financial Administration**

The Finance Department maintains fiscal records for the town. The Finance Budget includes expenses for finance department salaries, the annual external audit, the elected town Treasurer, and the Budget Committee. The budget increase of 3.1% is due mainly to increased staff costs and increases in the audit and information technology lines.

### Assessor

The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing all real and personal property, including mobile homes, residential and commercial properties, and agricultural land.

The Assessor's Budget includes assessing department staff salaries, outside mapping services, and other costs for property assessment. The budget increases by approximately 1.4% due largely to increased staff costs.

### **Legal Expenses**

The Legal Budget contains expenses for Town Counsel and other outside legal expenses. Town Counsel provides legal counsel to the Board of Selectmen and town staff. In addition, Town Counsel defends or prosecutes actions in court on behalf of the Town.

The amount budgeted for legal expenses decreases from \$40,000 to \$35,000. This decrease is based on projected needs for 2006.

### **Employee Benefits**

Employee Benefits includes health insurance and other employee costs mandated by the federal or state government such as FICA, social security and retirement. An amount for sick leave incentive for non-union employees is also included.

This budget increases by 12.9%, which results from an approximate 7.2% increase in health insurance expenses as well as changes in employee status.

### **Planning and Zoning**

The Planning Department is responsible for advising the Planning Board,

the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the public on land use and development issues. The planning staff oversees site plan and subdivision applications and amendments to the Site Plan, Subdivision and Zoning Regulations, as well as the Conway Master Plan. The Code Compliance Officer issues sign permits, home occupation permits and enforces the zoning codes.

This budget decreases by 4.2% due to the fact that the funding for the receptionist position was moved from Planning to Building Inspection. This more accurately presents the allocation of the receptionist time. Line item increases occur in the other labor lines and are consistent with the town compensation plan. Other minor increases are found in the Postage and Printing lines. These adjustments are reflective of the volume of activity being experienced by the department. It should be noted that the salary for the Project Administrator includes overtime for taking minutes at night meetings for the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment.

### **Government Buildings**

Government Buildings includes operating expenses for a variety of Town buildings and facilities. These include: Town Hall, the Conway Recreation Center, the Public Works Garages, and the Whitaker Meeting House.

For 2006, this budget increases by just over 10.1%. The increase is due to projected increases in utility and fuel costs.

### Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

### Insurance

Liability insurance for Town property and vehicles is funded within this budget. The amount presented is an estimate of actual premium costs for 2006. This amount will need to be adjusted somewhat once the actual premium is received in July.

### **Police Department**

The Police Department preserves the public peace, reduces the opportunity to commit crime, and provides a high level of safety, security and service for all members of the community.

The Police Department Budget decreases by 1.3% due to the proposed creation of a Revolving Fund for Police Commercial Duty. This fund would serve to receive and disburse payment for traffic control duty conducted by local police personnel. Such funds are allowed under state law for certain

self-funding activities, commercial duty being one of these. The budget has been reduced by \$160,000 in anticipation of the fund being approved by the voters at the 2006 town meeting. The line still carries \$20,000 to fund commercial duty through the April meeting.

While the overall budget decreases, there are significant increases in salary and benefits primarily in health care and annual wage adjustments based on existing staffing levels. The Gasoline line increases from \$30,000 to \$49,000 in anticipation of continued high fuel costs. The Operations line increases by \$8,778 due to increases in heating costs and computer purchases as well as other relatively minor line item increases.

It should be noted that the original departmental request included funding for an additional patrol position. This proposal has been withdrawn by mutual consent. It should also be noted that a warrant article has been proposed that would establish a capital reserve fund for the purchase of police vehicles. If approved by the voters, this fund would accumulate monies on a year-to-year basis for the outright purchase of vehicles. In this way significant financing charges will be avoided.

### **Ambulance**

The Ambulance Budget funds a subsidy to local ambulance providers. The local providers include Conway Village Fire District and the North Conway Ambulance Service. The line item for these services has been increased by 8.4% or \$15,740 as per the terms of the existing ambulance services agreement.

### Fire and Rescue

The primary expense within the Fire and Rescue Budget is the provision of fire protection for areas of the Town that are not located within a fire precinct. Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct provide these services under contract. This expense is funded by property taxes paid only by residents of non-precinct areas of the Town.

The budget is expected to increase by 18% due to an increase in the estimated cost of the Non-Precinct Fire Contract which funds fire service to non-precinct areas of the Town. A decrease of \$1,000 is found in the Fire Pond Maintenance line.

### **Inspections**

The Building Inspector reviews building permits, building plans, inspects buildings and enforces the building codes.

This budget increases by 29.6% largely due to the addition of salary expenses for the existing receptionist position. These expenses were moved from the Planning and Zoning Department to more accurately reflect the allocation of time for this position. There are other increases in the Building Inspector salary line and minor increases in other operational expenses.

### Highway

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance and construction of Town roads and bridges as well as other related activities such as snow removal and ditch and culvert repair.

An increase of 6.8% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This is due in large part to increases in materials and fuel costs. Most significantly, fuel is projected to increase from \$80,000 to \$102,000. This increase is especially significant when it is understood that beginning in 2006, the School will pay directly for fuel rather than reimburse the Town for its expenditures. Even after removing the projected School fuel costs, the Town estimates an increase of \$22,000. Other materials cost increases are found in the Sand and Gravel, Asphalt, Salt, and Signs and Posts Lines.

Employee compensation resulting from the union contract provisions also results in increases in the labor lines.

### **Solid Waste**

The Solid Waste Department manages the disposal of solid waste for the Mount Washington Valley Solid Waste District, which includes the towns of Conway, Albany, and Eaton. The member towns reimburse Conway for this service. The department operates both a transfer station and landfill.

The proposed budget represents an increase of 3.9%. This is due to wage and benefit increases under the compensation plan as well as operating items such as utilities and fuel. A significant increase is found in the Landfill Materials line because landfill cover material must be purchased to cover a recently completed cell at the landfill.

A significant change in the solid Waste Budget is found in the Special Waste Line that is reduced from a requested \$84,000 to \$25,000. This reduction is possible based on the proposed creation of a Revolving Fund for Special Recycled Waste. This fund would serve to receive and disburse payment for certain recyclable waste such as construction and demolition debris. Revolving funds are allowed under state law for certain self-funding activities such as recycling. The \$25,000 included in the operating budget is intended to fund special waste recycling through the 2006 town meeting when it is hoped that the voters will adopt the fund.

### Health

The Health Budget includes funding for the services of appointed Health Officers as well as kennel fees for impounded animals. The budget decreases by 8.3%. An increase of \$250 for expense reimbursement for the Assistant Health Officer has been made. These expenses will be paid based on receipts submitted to the Town. Offsetting this increase is a decrease of \$500 in the Kennel Fees Line. This reduction is based on actual experience during the last few years.

### Welfare

The General Assistance Department relieves and maintains those who are unable to support themselves. This office assists with basic necessities such as medication, housing, electricity, food and heat for those who qualify. All assistance is in the form of a loan and not a grant.

This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget is increased by 7.1% based on projected increases in required fuel assistance resulting from projected increases in energy costs for the 2006. Wage adjustments for the single departmental employee are also included.

### **Parks and Recreation**

The Recreation Department is responsible for elementary school age youth sports and recreation programs and activities as well as a Teen Center for junior high age students. The Department also offers a variety of adult and senior citizen programs. The budget increase of 6.9% due to increases in the personnel line associated with compensation plan increases and increases in seasonal staff.

The Personnel line has been increased by \$4,000 to extend the seasonal administrative aide position. This funding has been transferred from the Fourth of July line in Patriotic Purposes. Instead of hiring an outside contractor as has been done in past years, the funding will be used in house and all planning for the Fourth of July Celebration will be conducted by the Recreation Department.

The Personnel line has also been increased by an additional \$5,355 to add two counselor positions to the summer recreation program. The added staff responds to recommendations from the Town's insurance carrier that there should be one counselor for every seven program participants. This will bring the total staffing to nine (including regular Recreation Department staff) for an average participation total of sixty-three kids.

Other minor operating increases are also found in several budget lines.

### Library

The recommended budget represents an increase of 8.4%. This increase is found in the labor lines and in the utilities line.

### **Patriotic Purposes**

This budget provides funding for the Town Fourth of July celebration and for commemorative activities that occur of Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The Fourth of July Line has been reduced by \$4,500. In the past a contractor was used to plan and organize the celebration. This year this will be the responsibility of the Parks and Recreation Department. As is discussed under that budget, \$4,000 has been added to the personnel line to fund additional administrative help. One of the responsibilities of the administrative aide will be to plan the Fourth of July events. An increase of \$200 has been made to cover increased costs in flags and other materials for Memorial Day. Overall, this budget decreases by 32%.

### **Conservation Commission**

The Conservation Commission oversees the planning and long-term use of Town common lands and open space properties. The proposed Conservation Commission Budget increases by 34.4% from \$16,260 to \$21,850. The budget funds land conservation and recreation projects.

### **Debt Principal**

Included here are principal payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget increases by 1.6% due to minor changes in the principal payments for the courthouse, landfill, and library bonds.

### **Debt Interest**

Included in this budget are the interest payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by 15.4%. The decrease is a result of minor changes in interest payments for a number of debt financed town projects.

### **Interest on TANS**

This budget includes projected interest expenses on Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). Simply put TANS are short-term loans available to municipalities from the state that assist in supporting cash needs during the year. Based on the current reserves retained by the Town, this amount remains the same as the prior year at \$5,000.

### **Capital Reserve Funds**

The Capital Reserve Budget includes funds to support ongoing capital

equipment purchases and capital construction. The budget is reduced by 5.5% through a recalculation of the funding needed under the Capital Reserve Fund for Landfill Expansion. This fund was reduced from a \$160,000 annual contribution to a contribution of \$115,000. This was possible because the current recycling program has extended the life of the landfill, thereby extending into the future the point at which a new landfill cell must be constructed. A recalculation of the cost of the landfill expansion and the number of years during which funding will need to be accumulated indicated that this change could be made.

Other funds within this budget remain unchanged reflecting programmed annual contributions to reserve accounts that fund ongoing programs for the replacement of equipment and the funding of road projects. The annual work plans and equipment schedules are presented as detail for this section.

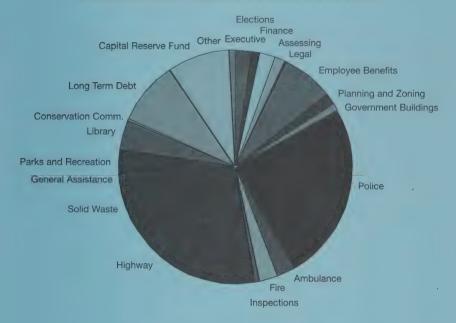

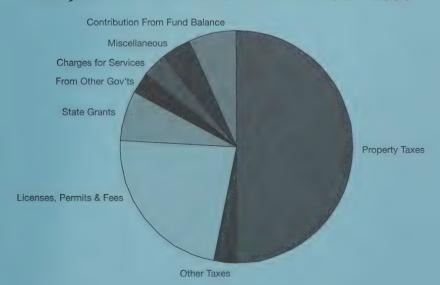

## ATTACHMENT 3 PROPOSED 2006 EXPENDITURES



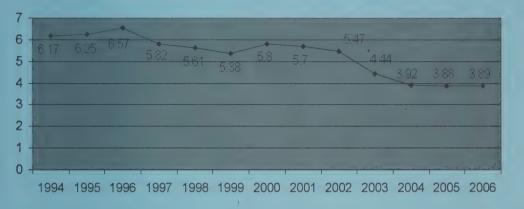
## ATTACHMENT 4 PROJECTED SOURCES OF REVENUE - 2006

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 88 (Building Construction) to increase the Building permit Fees as follows: 1. One or two family residential structures: twenty-five dollars (\$ 20 25) plus five cents per square foot. 2. All other construction: Twenty Fifty dollars (\$ 20 50) plus four six dollars (\$ 4 6) per thousand for each thousand over fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000). Proposed by the Planning Board. ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 2 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to rezone the following properties from Residential Agricultural (R/A) to Center Conway Village Commercial (CCVC): 2005 Tax Map 258, Parcel 29; 2005 Tax Map 258, Parcel 30; 2005 Tax Map 258, Parcel 31; 2005 Tax Map 258, Parcel 48; and 2005 Tax Map 258, Parcel 49. Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-7-0).

ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an OPERATING BUDGET, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant Article for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Seven Hundred Nine Thousand, Two Hundred Thirty Two Dollars (\$8,709,232). Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Eight Million Five Hundred Eighty Three Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$8,583,373) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee by vote of (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 5: (Separate-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost of items of a one-year COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2006 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal year 2006. This means that the 2006 contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

**ARTICLE 6: (Separate).** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to continue providing **EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICES** on the same terms as presently exist and to enter into a one (1) year contract consistent with current practices to be effective January 1, 2007.

<u>ARTICLE 7:</u> (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000.00) to be placed in the MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND. This appro-

priation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-2-0).

ARTICLE 8: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Seven Thousand Three Hundred Forty Dollars (\$97,340.00) from franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 9: To see if the town will vote to establish a REVOLVING FUND FOR POLICE COMMERCIAL DUTY for the purpose of providing public safety services by municipal employees or volunteers outside of the ordinary detail of such persons, including but not limited to public safety services in connection with special events, highway construction, and other construction projects as allowed pursuant to RSA 31:95-h. All revenues received for police commercial duty will be deposited into the fund, and will be allowed to accumulate from year to year, will not be part of the town's general fund surplus, and may only be expended for police commercial duty purposes. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. The Police Commission supports this article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 10: To see if the town will vote to establish a REVOLVING FUND FOR RECYCLING SPECIAL WASTE for the purpose of recycling construction and demolition debris and other special waste as allowed pursuant to RSA 31:95-h. All revenues received from special waste disposal fees will be deposited into the fund, and will be allowed to accumulate from year to year, will not be part of the town's general fund surplus, and may only be expended for purposes related to the recycling of special waste. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to establish a CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purchase of Police vehicles and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund. Further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Four Thousand Dollars (\$44,000.00) to be placed in this fund. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). (Majority vote required).

ARTICLE 12: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the TRAFFIC AND ROAD IMPROVEMENTS CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1989. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 13: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the LONG TERM SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1981. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 14: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the SURVEY OF STREETS AND TAX MAPS CAPITAL RESERVE FUND created in 1963. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0).

ARTICLE 15: (Special). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) to support the operation of the EAST-ERN SLOPE AIRPORT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (6-7-0).

ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Twenty One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$21,500) to be used to fund PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT AT THE CONWAY RECREATION CENTER. This money will be used to purchase and install said equipment. 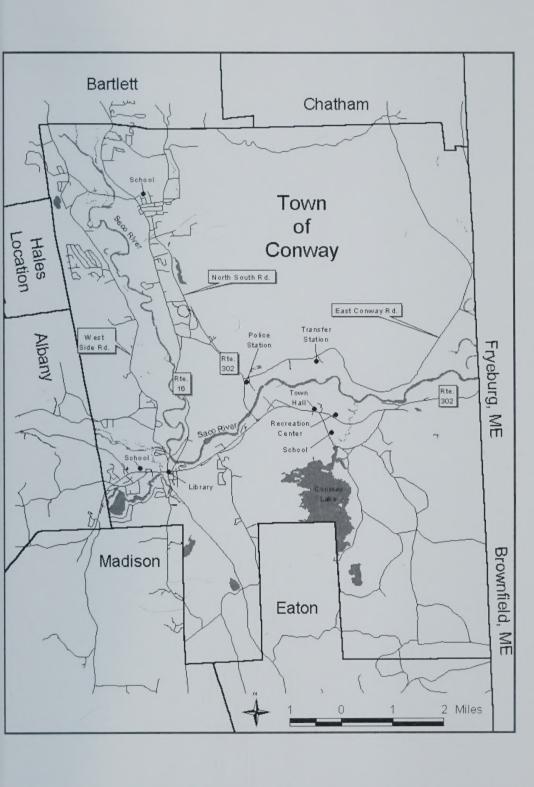
