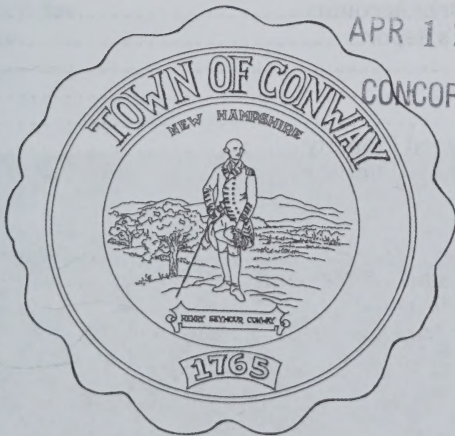

BOARD OF SELECTMEN ANNUAL REPORT 2006

Once again this has been a very busy year for all of the boards, committees and commissions within the Town of Conway. So I reiterate my sentiments of last year when I say the people who serve on these boards, committees, and commissions are to be commended for all the work they do with the best interest of the town being their main objective. Many times they are only recognized when someone disagrees with a decision that has been made, when in fact they probably have made a lot more that the majority agrees with and never say a word about. My point is, they are trying, so once in awhile tell them you appreciate them and thank them for serving the community and for making it what it is.

Some of the highlights of 2006 are as follows:

One of the biggest issues to come in front of the board was the northern roundabout at the intersection of Common Court and the North-South Road. The board struggled with the issue of eminent domain for the taking of the land necessary to build the northern roundabout, and decided instead to go with a different approach. This is the installation of a right hand turn only when exiting from Common court on to the North-South Road.

The Board put many hours into the ambulance contract; between the two providers and the Town of Conway. The results were a dollar amount thought to be fair to both parties, while continuing the service the people have grown accustomed to. This issue will more than likely be settled by the legislative body after much discussion at the deliberative portion of Town Meeting and the vote at the polls.

The establishment of a recreation revolving fund was another big position taken by the Board. The fund would be used for new fees charged to participants in recreation programs including the summer program. These fees are in line with what other recreation departments in the area do. A key point according to the recreation director is no child will be left out if they cannot afford the fees. There is a program in place to assist those in need. The new fees will only happen if the voters approve the revolving fund.

Taxes will always be a top priority of the Board. The balancing of needs and expectations is not an easy endeavor. We work diligently to provide the best possible services with the monies available to do so. Through the excellent work of town staff, we are able to achieve this goal. Once again we remind you that the Board of Selectmen has no statutory authority allowing it to intercede in educational issues. When approached, we have offered suggestions and services to try and reduce expenses for the taxpayers of the Town of Conway.

Recycling continues to be a success, with the addition of certain electronic items. The process continues to move forward with the volume being moved to the Landfill significantly reduced, and the recycled materials going to market on the rise. We thank you all for your efforts in making this happen.

The past year once again has been a very busy one, for all involved with the day to day operations of Town. The dedicated individuals who make it all come

together are to be both thanked and commended for making this community what it is. The Board of Selectmen continues to rely heavily on them for input and direction when dealing with matters that are governed by, the ever changing Federal and State Laws. This board would like to thank the citizens and taxpayers of Conway for their continued input and support.

TOWN MANAGER'S ANNUAL REPORT 2006

I invite you all to review the various reports from town departments, boards, and commissions. I believe you will be pleased with the work that has been accomplished during the past year. As has been the case in past years, I must compliment our staff on the job that they have done. Each departmental report reflects a dedication to public service that is something for which we can all be proud. In addition, I am pleased to report that we have completed the year approximately \$200,000 under budget. This was due in large part to the relatively dry winter weather and the reduced expenses for snow removal and winter road maintenance.

One of the things about our community that I believe we all appreciate is the fact that we are relatively insulated from events and problems that are more common in urban areas. It is, however, a fact of life, that world and national events, emergencies, and disasters can have an impact on even small rural communities. And as we all know, no community is absolutely safe from natural or manmade disasters.

With that in mind, I wanted to let you know that emergency preparation and planning has been a major focus of our efforts during the last year. This was prompted by a number of things. First, our previous Emergency Management Director-Conway Village Fire District Chief Larry Wade resigned in the spring. His service over the years did much to help our community prepare for and respond to emergency situations. His efforts are greatly appreciated and he, like the many other emergency service providers in the community, continues to be involved and to make valuable contributions to our efforts. Other reasons for the focus on emergency planning have to do with planning for a "bird flu" outbreak or other pandemic disease that is being required by the State of New Hampshire. In addition, the federal Department of Homeland Security is requiring more of local communities.

To begin this effort, the Town was fortunate to hire Ed Duffy as our Emergency Management Director. Ed has been on the job since last September and he details the progress he has made on a variety of projects in his Annual Report. These efforts include: revising our Local Emergency Operations Plan and implementing training exercises involving the schools and local emergency responders (scheduled for later this year) as well as organizing the Pandemic Flu Planning effort on behalf of seven communities in Northern Carroll County. Ed has also been establishing procedures and taking steps to ensure that governmental operations will continue during an emergency by preparing backup files and materials and outfitting the Conway Recreation Center to be used as an alternate business location for town hall. In addition, the Center is being prepared to serve as an emergency shelter if needed.

While we are fortunate to have a variety of resources and well trained personnel that can respond to disasters as they may occur, there is no substitute for personal preparedness. You are the best resource for preparing your family, business, or organization. A basic recommendation of agencies such as FEMA and the American Red Cross is that families be prepared to be self sufficient

during the first hours or days of an emergency. They recommend that we create an emergency kit and an emergency plan to prepare our loved ones for the unexpected. The town has a variety of information available for businesses and families to help them prepare. And our town website (www.conwaynh.org) also has links to a variety of agencies and information.

Finally, much of our local emergency preparedness and response planning is based on substantial involvement of local volunteers. There are a variety of ways that you can volunteer including:

Citizens Volunteer Corps

- traffic control
- shelter support
- record keeping
- transportation services
- public relations and education

Medical Reserve Corps

- acute care center staffing
- shelter staffing and medical support
- shelter supply management

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 88 (Building Construction) to increase the Building permit Fees as follows: 1. One or two family residential structures: ~~twenty-five~~ twenty five dollars (\$ ~~20 25~~ 20 50) plus five cents per square foot. 2. ARTICLE 4: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amount set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant Article for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Seven Hundred Nine Thousand, Two Hundred Thirty Two Dollars (\$8,709,232). Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Eight Million Five Hundred Eighty Three Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Three Dollars (\$8,583,373) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). ARTICLE 8: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Seven Thousand Three Hundred Forty Dollars (\$97,340.00) from franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. **No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1074-301**

ARTICLE 9: To see if the town will vote to establish a **REVOLVING FUND FOR POLICE COMMERCIAL DUTY** for the purpose of providing public safety services by municipal employees or volunteers outside of the ordinary detail of such persons, including but not limited to public safety services in connection with special events, highway construction, and other construction projects as allowed pursuant to RSA 31:95-h. All revenues received for police commercial duty will be deposited into the fund, and will be allowed to accumulate from year to year, will not be part of the town's general fund surplus, and may only be expended for police commercial duty purposes. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund. **No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. The Police Commission supports this article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1160-233**

ARTICLE 10: To see if the town will vote to establish a **REVOLVING FUND FOR RECYCLING SPECIAL WASTE** for the purpose of recycling construction and demolition debris and other special waste as allowed pursuant to RSA 31:95-h. All revenues received from special waste disposal fees will be deposited into the fund, and will be allowed to accumulate from year to year, will not be part of the town's general fund surplus, and may only be expended for purposes related to the recycling of special waste. The Board of Selectmen shall be authorized to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund. **No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1230-171**

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to establish a **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purchase of Police vehicles and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw and disburse funds in accordance with the purpose of the fund.

Further, to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Four Thousand Dollars (\$44,000.00) to be placed in this fund. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 4, the Operating budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). (Majority vote required). CARRIED 1021-367**

ARTICLE 12: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the **TRAFFIC AND ROAD IMPROVEMENTS CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** created in 1989. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1164-227**

ARTICLE 13: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the **LONG TERM SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** created in 1981. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1164-202**

ARTICLE 14: To see if the town will vote to discontinue the **SURVEY OF STREETS AND TAX MAPS CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** created in 1963. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the Town general fund. (Majority vote required). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-0-0). CARRIED 1172-205**

ARTICLE 15: (Special). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) to support the operation of the **EAST-ERN SLOPE AIRPORT**. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #4). These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on the financial statements based on our audit.

The combining and individual fund financial statements and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

ASSESSOR ANNUAL REPORT 2006

After six straight years of strong annual appreciation, local residential real estate prices seem to be taking a breather. While Conway has not, as of the end of the year, seen any significant decreases in the sale prices of properties, there is plenty of evidence that the bias has changed from a sellers to a buyers market. It is my understanding, from talking to other assessors, that the southern part of the state is experiencing a more drastic correction. It remains to be seen whether Conway will follow suit. Conway has a lot going for it but, we are tied to the health of the regional economy.

In the past year, the question I have most often been asked is if there will be any effect on the tax rate from the addition to the tax rolls of the Home Depot and Loews building centers. In my opinion, this is unlikely for a couple of reasons. First, the land under both projects was already being assessed so we are really only adding the buildings. In the case of Loews, a significant portion of the Mountain Valley Mall was demolished to make way for its building. The old structure was being assessed and that will offset, somewhat, the addition of the new. On the other side of the scale, part of the remaining portions of the old mall have been renovated and that should help a bit, as will some of the extensive site work done on the Home Depot lot. But, in the end, it is Conway's current valuation that mitigates any major effect these two buildings may have.

As of the setting of the last tax rate, Conway's 7,599 taxable properties had an assessed value of approximately 1.27 billion. That's billion...with a "b". It will take twelve million, seven hundred thousand dollars (net) of big box store construction to drop the tax rate just one percent and that assumes no increases in any of the budgets. So, I'm afraid, the answer is no, the addition of these two projects will have little effect on our taxes.

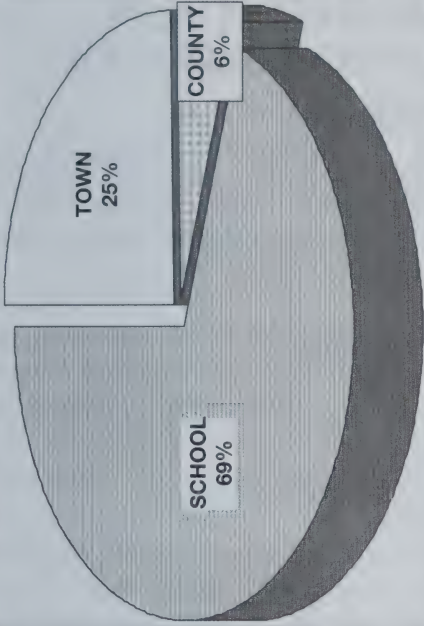
Recently, I have been getting a lot of questions about "the view tax". This is due to a current statewide controversy regarding the assessment of beneficial views. Do assessors consider such views when determining an assessment? Absolutely! We try to incorporate those items that are important to buyers and sellers. Real estate ads invariably show how important views are. If a property has a beneficial view, it is prominently mentioned and often photographed. However, assessors are not assessing properties to market value and then adding something "extra" for a view. There really is no such thing as a "view tax". It is just another component, like a finished basement or an extra bath, which is considered when making a fair assessment. Barring any changes in the law, assessors will continue assessing beneficial views until such time as buyers stop paying extra for them or sellers stop expecting more for them.

It is important to understand that those advocating for the removal of the value of beneficial views from assessments are asking to be assessed at a lower level than their non-view neighbors. In effect, they are asking for a view discount. The local government would still have to collect the amount authorized by the voters at town meeting. The taxes attributable to that portion of the tax base representing the value of beneficial views would have to be made up by everyone else in the form of a higher tax rate.

BUILDING INSPECTION AND CODE ENFORCEMENT ANNUAL REPORT 2006

The year 2006 showed a significant decrease in new residential construction. In 2005 the total number of single family homes constructed within the town was one hundred and one. During 2006, the total number of single-family homes constructed was sixty four with one duplex equaling two residential units, for a total of sixty six new residences.

Commercial construction showed an increase in new construction and renovations and was our busiest year to-date.

In the building inspection department, there were 433 building permits issued in 2006. This is considerably lower than the 532 issued last year. This number reflects the total of both residential and commercial permits.

All of the permits total to an estimated assessment value for the completed work at over \$36.88 million dollars which is down from last year's total of \$42.98 million. The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits were in excess of \$152,408.00 up dramatically from the fees paid for last year of \$84,127.00.

This increase in the permit fees paid to the town is partially contributed to the increase of revenues obtained through the last Aprils increase in permit fees and the size and value of construction involved within the commercial permits.

Now in my seventh year as Building Inspector for the Town of Conway, I still enjoy dealing with the public and the contractors and look forward to many more.

CODE COMPLIANCE ANNUAL REPORT 2006

My primary responsibility as Conway's Code Compliance Officer is Sign Permitting and the administration of the town's Zoning Ordinances & Land Use Regulations. I am also responsible for the enforcement process (when necessary) in planning/zoning matters including: Signage, Site Plan regulations, the Outdoor Display of Goods, Temporary Event Permits and the review of Zoning Permit applications for anything from tree cutting in the Shoreline Buffer to Home Occupations.

In 2006 the number of Sign Permits approved was 100 (down from 111 in 2005) and there were nine other Sign Permit Applications denied for various reasons. Several of these denials resulted in Appeal and/or Variance applications to the Zoning Board of Adjustment.

In 2006 I documented thirty six formal zoning complaints that required follow-up and some form of enforcement action. The majority of these were related to signage. To date, none of these have resulted in court action and most have been resolved.

In 2006, the town's 2004 decision denying "grandfathered" status to a helicopter landing site on the back side of Birch Hill, was upheld by the NH Supreme Court.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2006

The Emergency Management Director position was established for Conway on September 16, 2006. The position in Conway is that of facilitator, planner, coordinator, document and grant writer.

The Emergency Management Director (EMD) reports to the Town Manager. The EMD has no reporting staff and works closely with police, fire, emergency medical support, public works, planning, The Memorial Hospital, American Red Cross, NH State Bureau of Emergency Management and other groups that provide assistance to the community in time of disaster.

Following is a list and brief explanation of each of emergency preparedness plans under development for the Town of Conway. These plans are designed to protect people who live and work in the town, along with part time residents and visitors.

- **Emergency Operations Plan (EOP)**

A plan for Conway designed to save lives and protect property in the event of a man-made or natural disaster. Establishment of shelter locations and plans.

- **Pandemic Influenza Plan**

The plan is being developed to care for public health emergencies that could be caused by natural disasters, biological terrorism, chemical terrorism, or naturally occurring communicable disease outbreaks.

- **Continuity of Operations, Government, and Lines of Succession**

These plans are designed to insure that in the event of a loss of an individual or work place that the business of government will continue with a minimum of disruption to the general public.

- **Emergency Operations Center & Procedures**

Establishment of a command center along with procedures that would be activated in the time of a major emergency where department heads would work together to make unified decisions to care for the situation at hand.

- **Resource Inventories**

Develop lists of equipment available to the town to call upon in the event of an emergency. The list would include town resources as well as those of contractors and suppliers in the area.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 2006

This year's statistical analysis revealed that the amount of assistance provided in 2006 was quite similar to that provided in 2005. In fact, when variables (donations and reimbursements) were removed from the equation we spent only \$292.94 more this year than last year! Like last year, the majority of funds were spent on housing needs followed by heat, utilities and medication respectively.

The Special Fuel Fund was established using a generous donation of \$3,700.00 from the North Conway Rotary Club that was to be used to offset high fuel costs for residents of Northern Carroll County. We received referrals from the Town of Madison and the Town of Bartlett, the Gibson Center, Bureau of Elderly and Adult Services, and Vaughan Community Service. Funds were spent on thirteen households composed of twenty-three people of which three were children and sixteen were elderly, injured or ill and wouldn't have been able to get fuel assistance from any other agency.

Reimbursements from assistance clients was higher in 2006 than in 2005 by \$2,466.50 for a total of \$4,311.95. It is hard to predict how much assistance will be reimbursed from year to year because payments come from a variety of sources including social security, individuals, and volunteer work hours.

Unlike towns that require recipients to work off their assistance (at a site chosen by the local welfare officer) as a condition of continued eligibility, we give recipients the option to pay in cash or to volunteer in lieu of payment. Recipients can choose which non-profit organization to work for (within the Conway area) and we give them credit at an hourly rate that is consistent with NH Employment Security's Economic and Labor Market Information Bureau's Occupational Employment and Wages publication. Unfortunately, recipients do not usually take advantage of this offer. I am of the opinion that if more people took advantage of this, we would all benefit. Recipients would learn job skills and get work references while providing non-profit organizations with services that reduce operational costs; the town provides recipients with basic necessities and in turn, receives support from organizations.

Please allow me to extend our gratitude to all of the individuals, churches, and organizations who share in the responsibility to care for economically challenged people in our community. I, solely, cannot take credit for a job well done. People are getting the services they need and we, together, are doing it affordably. This could not be done without compassion, communication, and the ability to compromise and negotiate with one another.

In closing, I would like to publicly thank Christine Dias and Vaughan Community Service for their willingness to assist my department over the last year. Christine covered my office while I was on medical leave in August, she processed cases that were a conflict of interest, and she continues to offer excellent resource and referral information. Vaughan continues to provide food pantry services to nearly 300 Conway residents and often accommodates our needs on demand.

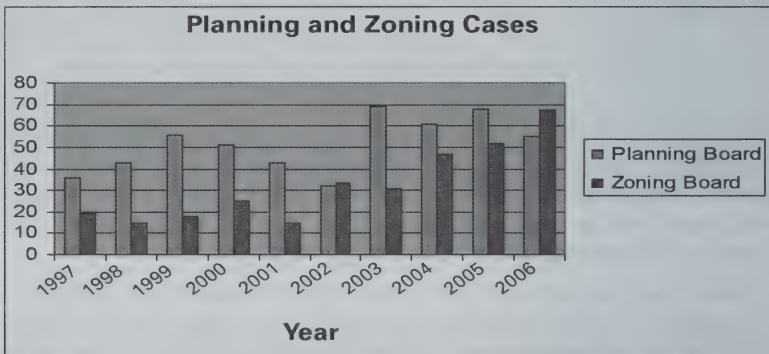

PLANNING DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2006

Once again I must report that the past year has been extremely busy for the Planning Department, the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The Planning Board considered over fifty five cases in 2006. They addressed nearly 200,000 square feet of new or redeveloped commercial floor space, thirty three new lodging units, forty four restaurant seats and seven apartments. The Planning Board also addressed thirty subdivision applications relative to over 150 new lots or units. The Zoning Board of Adjustment was also very busy as it addressed sixty seven appeals.



Once again the number of applications and amount of development activity stretched the Department's resources to the limit and we were forced to out-source the engineering review components of several projects. Moreover, the department did not have sufficient resources to address many forward planning tasks or substantial ordinance revisions. If the rate of development does not decrease, the outsourcing practice will have to continue. It will also be necessary to outsource other tasks or add staff if the Department is expected to keep up with development and maintain our growth management policies and regulations. Several large projects (Lowes and Home Depot) commenced construction in 2006. These among other projects, road construction and the new High School will likely label 2006 as the most active construction year on record.

In 2006 we were successful in amending the Subdivision regulations and eliminating the need for many of the waivers that were being addressed by the Planning Board. This increased the Planning Board's efficiency when reviewing the plans. Both the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment worked very hard this year and they did an admirable job. I thank them for their valuable service.

If the pace of development declines in 2007 we hope to rewrite the subdivision regulations and revisit the Master Plan to ensure its currency and that we are on track with the implementation strategy. This Department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR/TOWN ENGINEER ANNUAL REPORT 2006

To recap the 2006 Public Works/Engineering department doings, let's start with the Solid Waste Department. I am pleased to say that the statistics from the Transfer Station show that the amount of household trash going into the landfill has continued to decrease as the recyclable materials have increased. Please see Figures 1 & 2. Figure 3 shows that the predominant increase in recyclables is in paper products.

New construction projects consisting of the new Home Depot on Barnes Road, reconstruction of Barnes Road and McMillan Lane, and reconstruction at the Mountain Valley Mall for the new Lowe's began late last spring, which prompted the beginning of the construction of the roundabout at Mountain Valley Mall Blvd. and the North/South Road.

Road construction continued to progress along Route 16 on the north end of North Conway Village, and is expected to be complete by June 2007.

The Town and NCWP completed the reconstruction of Mechanic Street to the North South Road. The remainder of Mechanic Street is schedule to be complete within two years.

The Conway Village Fire District and the Town completed the reconstruction of Hillside Ave. and Muster Road.

The North Conway Village reconstruction project began as scheduled this past spring, which included installation of new water main, brick sidewalks, curbing, drainage and roadway. We anticipate completion of the project in June 2007.

The Engineering Department worked on a number of residential subdivisions and the interest in this type of development appears strong with another four projects on the books for this season.

Finally, the Town Hall received a much needed facelift by the installation of new siding and the Police Station was also refurbished with new carpeting and interior painting.

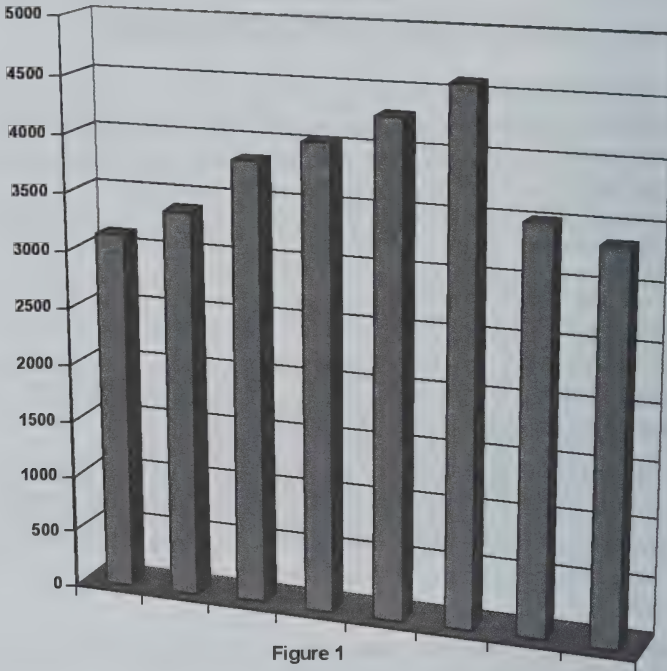

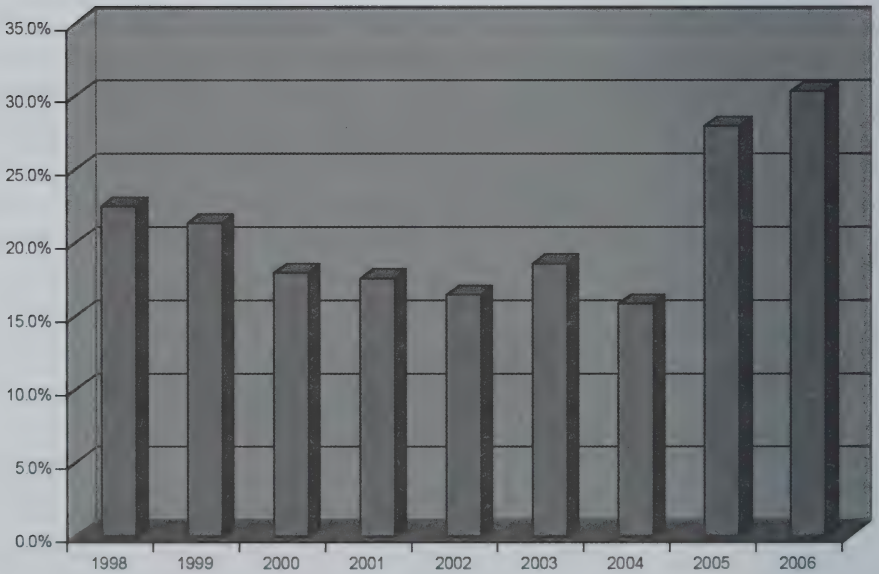

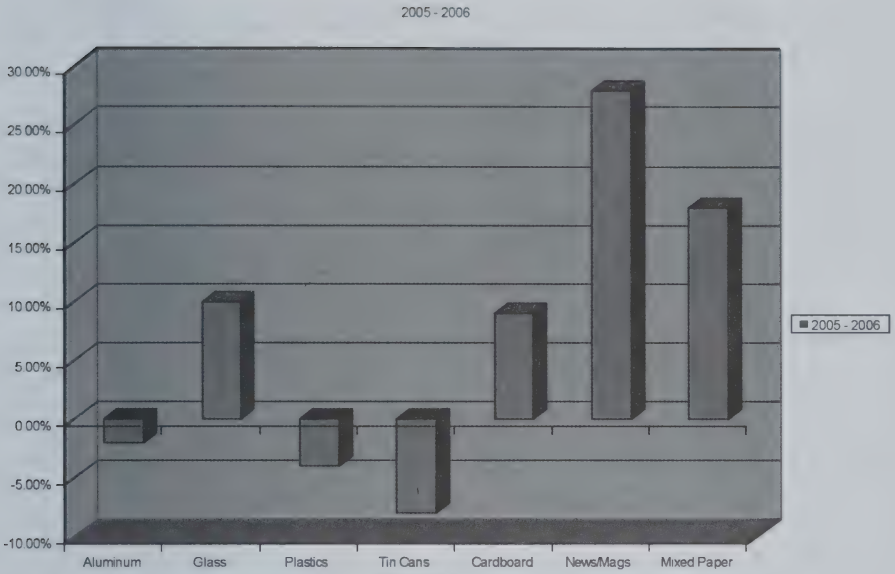

RECREATION DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2006

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building, 1808 East Main Street in Center Conway. Our facility includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, computer lab, art room and television room. The outdoor facility features a playground, outdoor basketball court and a multi-purpose athletic field with newly installed lights. This past year, our athletic field was named for Richard "Dick" O'Brien who served the Town of Conway as a Selectman, School Board Member and sports enthusiast.

The Conway Recreation Department is responsible for outdoor parks and recreation areas for various community uses: Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Nasby King Field, Schouler Park, Washington Street Park, Whitaker Homesite Field and Shedd Woods. These sites provide recreational activities such as Nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, tennis, basketball, volleyball, picnicking and various other activities conducted on our multi-purpose fields.

Our children's programming for 2006 included T-ball, girl's softball, Red Cross Swim Program, Summer Program, soccer, flag football, bowling, field hockey, basketball, pond hockey & children's playgroup. Other special events offered to the children were the Turkey Trot Race, Easter Egg Hunt and the annual Halloween Party.

Adult programming has continued to be popular with the adult population of our town. We offer men's softball, over 40 men's softball, fall & winter adult basketball leagues and our newest programs adult dodgeball & ballroom dancing.

Senior adult programming continued to be popular. In 2006 we offered weekly BINGO and Scrabble. Each one of these programs was offered one day per week and designed for older adults to have a consistent program that they could count on for their recreation. In addition, monthly bus trips were offered to various locations for site seeing, lunch and entertainment.

The Teen Center has been in existence for more than ten years and offers a safe drop in center for middle school age children. The Teen Center is open four nights per week including weekends. This gives teens the opportunity to hang out and enjoy their friends in an environment that is safe and healthy for them.

The Friends of Conway Recreation Inc. was very active in its fundraising efforts in 2006. This group is a non-profit organization committed to the children of Conway and the Conway Recreation Department. Its biggest contribution in the 2006 year was providing lights at the Dick O'Brien Field in Center Conway as well as much improved landscaping to the grounds of the Conway Recreation facility. This will pave the way for night games in girl's softball, Cal Ripkin Baseball and practices for our soccer and flag football programs. I cannot thank the Friends of Conway Recreation for their tireless efforts and the hard work of our Board of Director's.

Our 2006 programs would not have so successful without the support of our community and dedication of our coaches and volunteers. Though too many to mention them all, you know who you are and what you mean to our organization. We have been fortunate to have over 90 adults involved in coaching our youth sports and more

than 50 others volunteering at various Conway Recreation Department functions.

A special thanks goes to the businesses and civic organizations of our community. These groups continue to support us through their kind giving and always come through for us whenever we need them.

It has been a pleasure to serve the citizens of Conway as your Recreation Director and I hope that you get involved in one of our many recreation programs.

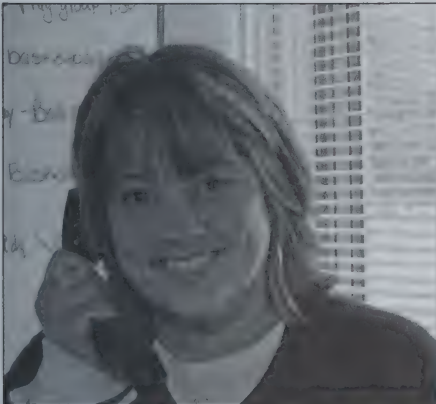

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 2006

Forest management and wildlife habitat improvement work by the Conway Conservation Commission (CCC) this year again focused on Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods and the Common Lands off Hurricane Mountain Road.

The trail work in Whitaker Woods continued to follow the plan developed and put in place in previous years. Trails were widened and regraded to reduce erosion and to improve grooming for Nordic skiing. A timber harvest there had no impact on existing trails.

The goal of the timber harvest in Whitaker was to improve white pine regeneration started ten years ago. Another goal was the establishment of more white pine seedlings, taking advantage of an abundant white pine seed year. The harvest resulted in \$13,000 of income to the CCC's account and generated \$1,324 in timber tax revenue for the Town.

The White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA) contributed over 280 man-hours of trail maintenance and new trail construction. The work was planned in conjunction with the CCC, and consisted primarily of rerouting and maintaining sections of the Red Tail Trail in the Hurricane Mountain Road Common Lands, and building an extension to the Sticks & Stones trail in the Pudding Pond Conservation Area. These trails have proven to be popular with runners and hikers as well as cyclists. The ongoing efforts of NEMBA are a valuable contribution to the recreation component of the Town's conservation lands.

The CCC developed criteria for conservation land acquisition. Its first application was the decision to support the West Side Road, Farmland Protection Act Conservation Easement. Ten thousand dollars was committed to support the acquisition through the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust.

The CCC also agreed to join with the NH Department of Transportation in the acquisition of over 150 acres of by-pass recreation mitigation property in Redstone. The property abuts other mitigation property at Puddin Pond connecting to the Town's Pudding Pond Conservation area. Twenty-thousand dollars of Conservation Land Acquisition Account funds was committed.

Both conservation easement acquisitions were the subject of a public hearing on October 11, 2006.

At Shedd Woods we continued to remove undesirable growth in the understory to encourage the growth of deciduous trees that will shade the site and reduce the annual maintenance work there. The Commission developed a plan for the repair of damage at Shedd, the result of work done rebuilding Route 16. Fencing and the planting of a tree buffer will be needed restore the popular picnic and view site. Work will be done in 2007.

The Town received a grant of \$600 from NH Fish & Game Department for the Commission's wildlife habitat improvement done on the Common Lands off Hurricane Mountain Road. A grant of \$1,050 for similar work was received in 2005. Work to encourage the growth of desirable trees at several management compartments in these Common Lands continues.

The CCC, with The Nature Conservancy and the NHDOT rebuilt the much used and badly deteriorated parking lot at the Black Cap Trail on Hurricane Mountain Road.

The CCC reviewed NH Department of Environmental Services permit Dredge and Fill permit applications. While not an enforcement agent, it is responsible for the protection of watershed resources for the Town. David Weathers continues to manage this facet of Conservation Commission work.

Members of the Conservation Commission are: Paul Pinkham, Chair; Dan Lucy, Vice-chair; Carol Lyman, Treasurer; David Weathers; Selectman's Representative, Rob Adair, Phil Haynes, Chuck Broomhall and Alternates, Connie Briggs and Linda Kearney. Jean Simon provides administrative support to the Commission and Gail Currier records meeting minutes.

Originally a farm of 300 acres of forest and pasture dating back to 1830, the Town of Conway purchased 100 acres of what is now known as Whitaker Woods from Charles W. "Chub" Whitaker, a life-long resident, in July of 1971. Thirty-six more acres, the Rye field lot, was purchased in 1979. An additional 44 acres was acquired from Edith Bancroft (the sister of C. W. Whitaker) by the State of New Hampshire and deeded to the Town in 1998. Known as the Bancroft property, the acquisition was given to Conway to mitigate the taking of a portion of Whitaker Woods land for State highway construction. The deed for the first purchase stated that the land be "used for public recreation purposes and shall be maintained forever in a wild and natural state. All cutting of timber shall be consistent with good forestry practices ..."

CONWAY PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 2006

The Planning Board and Town Staff recommended, and the voters approved, an article to increase building permit fees to help cover the actual administration cost of development previously subsidized by tax dollars. Currently the Board is proposing a zoning amendment to clarify that the ordinance is constructed as a permissive zoning ordinance. This to clarify that if a use is not identified as permitted in a zoning district then the use is not permitted in that district. The second Board proposed amendment is to create consistency to the size requirements for apartments in “older homes” and “accessory apartments”.

The capital improvements planning effort is currently awaiting responses from other units of local government (school, precincts, etc.). To date that information has not been forthcoming and staff is again requesting said information.

Development continues at a brisk pace as the Planning Board and Town Staff have approved four major projects, two large subdivisions, and a combination of twenty four smaller projects and subdivisions with others in the planning stages.

Again, I'll take this opportunity to encourage public involvement by attending meetings and contacting Board members with your thoughts and concerns. I also remind the public that we still have openings for three alternates on the Board. For an alternate position please apply in writing to either the Planning Director or to the Chair of the Planning Board at Conway Town Office.

2006 REPORT OF THE CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

In the year 2006, the police department was able to fill the personnel vacancies that plagued the department for much of 2005. Chief Wagner completed his first full year and did so with resounding success. The 2006 police department budget closed with a small surplus. That surplus is the direct result of a well-managed budget despite the variances such as energy fuel costs and rising health insurances. The police department is being lead by strong, young leadership with Chief Wagner and Lt. Faia and the Commission voiced their ardent support of them with a vote of confidence at a recent Commission meeting. We feel fortunate to have a department that attracts highly qualified candidates that residents can be proud of.

The Town of Conway's growth in 2006 is evident with the construction of the two new box stores. While the exact impact of the large "box stores" is unknown, it cannot be ignored that there will be an impact on the responsibilities of the police department. The Department has not had any changes in personnel since 1992 when three positions were eliminated. Traffic volume increased nearly 15% from 2004 to 2005 per statistics gathered from the state traffic counter on Route 16 near Duprey Road. The functions of the police department have changed over the years to include one of the patrol officers spending September through June at the school as the School Resource Officer (SRO). The Commission and the Chief are reviewing what the demands will be with the new school and the possibility of a second SRO. The Commission feels the growth of the department is not only inevitable but an absolute necessity in order to maintain the level of service the town's people have come to expect from their police department.

The Police Commission and Chief of Police successfully negotiated a two-year contract with the police union. The cost of the contract is minimal at \$2,900 for the two-year period. This contract, if ratified by the voters, would be the first since 2003 and would be a positive step forward for the police department.

The Conway Police Department is made up of a group of men and women dedicated to the service and protection of the visitors and residents of the Town of Conway and the Commission is proud to be part of this team.

2006 REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

2006 proved to be a good year for the Conway Police Department. Some changes took place in personnel to include the promotion of Brian McGrath and Sean McGrath to the rank of Corporal. Both Brian and Sean have been with us for several years and the promotions were well deserved. Staffing in patrol is now full with the hiring of two full-time officers, Sean Mask and Jessica Hollenkamp. We were also able to fully staff the dispatch center with the addition of three new dispatchers, Rachel Fecteau, Roberta Roth and Lynne Cota.

Officer Hollenkamp graduated from the Police Academy this year and received the highest honor a graduating recruit can receive, the Arthur D. Kehas Outstanding Achievement Award. Jessica is the first Conway Officer to ever receive this award and we are all very proud of her.

The department was again the recipient of several grants during 2006. Thanks to New Hampshire Highway Safety we were once again able to secure several smaller grants to help keep our roadways safe. These grants included a DWI Patrol and a Seatbelt Patrol, which totaled approximately \$2,500.00. New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council awarded us a grant for \$2,000.00 for Brian and Sean McGrath to attend a Command Training Course at Roger Williams University in Rhode Island. We also received a grant from the Department of Homeland Security to train all of our personnel in the National Incident Management System. Once again this year we were able to qualify for a grant from the Office of National Drug Policy for equipment to upgrade our surveillance capabilities. This equipment also includes training and totals approximately \$48,000.00. The final grant we received this year was a LAWNET Grant to upgrade our dispatch center. We now have a state-of-the-art dispatch center with all new equipment valued at \$104,000.00. These grants totaled over \$157,000.00 with no impact to tax payers.

We are still actively seeking to revive our K-9 program after the retirement of Thor. We have been in constant contact with the New Hampshire Working Dog Foundation and hope to have the program up and running as soon as possible. Our new K-9 will be trained in the detection of narcotics and will be a vital component of the police department.

As I mentioned earlier, the department is now fully staffed with 21 officers, 7 dispatchers, one office manager and one administrative clerk. As always, we can be very proud of the men and women who serve our community and keep it safe. They will continue to serve all those who live and visit here with the utmost respect and professionalism.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT 2006

The second full year after the completion of the library's building and renovation project proved the adage that "if you build it, they will come." Our public library experienced a sixteen percent increase in patronage visits: there were 74,658 visits in 2006. This is an extraordinary number of visits for a town the size of Conway. For those who thought that the growth of the Internet would result in fewer people using a public library, the popularity of our town's beautiful resource is proof that this truly is the information age.

It is especially reassuring to see the increased number of children making use of the library. They checked out a total of 21,978 items and participated in a wide range of reading and pre-reading programs. The main summer event, "Treasure Reading" had 125 children participating who spent 2117 hours reading. An additional 42 pre-readers participated in the "Smart Start Skills" and spent 80 hours on literacy skills.

The adult patrons participated in a new cooperative literature initiative called "One Book, One Valley," among eleven libraries, sixteen book clubs, community book stores and local schools. More than 200 individuals participated in group discussions or author presentations of *A Stranger in the Kingdom* by Howard Frank Mosher. The participants greatly enjoyed the event and look forward to sharing the experience again next year.

The Friends of the Library continue to provide wonderful support to the library. They paid for four staff members to attend a national conference, hosted by the Public Library Association, which was held in Boston this year. The staff members gave a report to the Trustees after their conference attendance and stated that the information they had gathered will be quite valuable in the running of our library.

The Friends donated two new granite benches to the library park and organized a very successful spring grounds clean up day, planting a wonderful selection of summer annuals and then provided the volunteer labor to keep the flower beds well tended all summer. It should be noted that Glynis Knox and Bobbie Frasier, two wonderful members of the library staff, also donated volunteer time to the maintenance of the flower beds. The fruits of their labor received recognition when the library was awarded the honor of first place for public properties in the 2006 Mount Washington Valley Garden Trail competition. In addition, this year, the library was the recipient of the special distinction as the recipient of the Dorry Gray Award.

The popularity of the library as a community resource is further illustrated by the fact that the library has many wonderful volunteers who assist in the daily chores of running the library. This includes shelving books and helping in their

repair. This past year the volunteers logged 1823 hours of service which is equivalent to a full time staff member.

In addition to the donation of labor, the library received memorial donations in memory of Ida Maybe, Ada Fuge and Mitchell Johnson. New trust funds were received from the bequest of the Frederick Lewis Estate and from Theodore and Holly Sares, and Memorial books were received from the White Mountain Garden Club in memory of Judy Durkee and Paula Young. These types of donations helped finance an increase of 2% in the library's collection. The trustees met with professional investments advisors this year to ensure that the trust funds are being invested in prudent and productive investment vehicles.

There were a wide variety of community programs in the course of the year. There were two Christmas Concerts and 138 community programs on a broad range of subjects as well as 152 library programs. A lecture by Dick Brown was so popular that there was standing room only in the Ham Community Room. The staff and Friends continue to welcome each person who brings ideas for new programs or activities as they are dedicated, ensuring that the library can continue to address the broad interests of its patrons.

Our reference librarians are generally able to help the library patrons articulate their questions and find the information they seek. The library's internet access continues to meet a major need of our community as evidenced by the fact that the library web site was visited 146,196 times.

The trustees want to thank each staff member for their fine service this year. We are proud of our library and the broad range of services it provides to its many patrons. We also want to thank Margaret Marschner, our Head Librarian, for her continuing excellent leadership.

The Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross is proud of its 80 year history of service to the residents of the Mount Washington Valley. The American Red Cross is not a government agency and depends on the financial support of the communities it serves to continue its mission and to provide the following services: Armed Forces Emergency Services, Blood Services, Disaster Services, Health & Safety education, and International Tracing services.

Armed Forces Emergency Services provides immediate messaging between families and loved ones serving in our military around the world. Another 800 attended Red Cross sanctioned aquatics and water safety classes. We also train many of the lifeguards who patrol our local beaches and waterfronts. The local Red Cross chapter also helped six Mount Washington Valley families who needed to contact their family members serving in the Armed Forces, and coordinated 9 local blood drives that collected 692 pints of blood. Lastly, we helped nine individuals and families in their time of need with emergency shelter, food, and clothing.

Each year, the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross strives to find new funding to improve the many programs and services available to the community. However, the Chapter still depends on the generosity of the community to keep growing and achieving its goals. Thank you for your on-going support of the local chapter of the American Red Cross. CHILDREN UNLIMITED

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child(ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child(ren) with special needs is a priority.

The program is staffed by professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers. Program services include: developmental screenings, evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments/consultations and interagency networking. 39 Conway children and families received services in 2006.

Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

There is no way we could do what we do without the support of our community. This past year, we served over 56,000 congregate and home delivered meals; a new record. Over 74% of our meals go to Conway residents. Over 80% of our van riders came from Conway.

We are additionally blessed by our volunteers. These are the people who really make our funding work responsibly. It may be hard to believe, but last year over 12,000 volunteer hours were given to the Gibson Center. And we needed every minute and we can always use more.

The Center's Board and staff are not only busy with the every day operations; we are looking ahead to the decades of Seismic Seniority when more people than ever before will need our services.

The Center oversees the management of Silver Lake Landing in Madison; 20 low cost, independent senior apartments. It is important that the taxpayers of Conway know that

Silver Lake Landing is owned and operated by the Silver Lake Senior Housing Corporation, a separate 501(c)(3) corporation. ***No Town funds are used for the operation and management. Silver Lake Landing is completely separate from the day-to-day activities of The Gibson Center.***

NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER

The North Conway Community Center has been serving our community since 1948. The Community Center has gone through many changes in the 59 years it has been in the Valley. The Center has expanded from the land which the building occupies by acquiring land that includes the playground area and Mud Bowl property. The Harvey Dow Gibson Playground has been upgraded and improved at least 3 times in our history to meet the needs of the families in our Valley. The Center is looking to the future by writing grants to continue to improve the playground by adding more equipment. Other improvements include; the tot pool has been upgraded to a Spray ground and the summerhouse has changed into the snack shack. Obviously the Center could not be in existence without the dedicated support of many organizations and volunteers who have provided financial and physical support.

A twelve-person volunteer Board of Directors runs the Center. These Directors are the main fundraisers; they are the people you see flipping burgers at concerts, running games at the Fourth of July, and standing up to support the Center at Town Meetings. These hard-working volunteers have risen over \$100,000 a year, which is used to pay the bills at the Center. The Board is proud of their accomplishment of providing a safe recreational facility, which was built with donations and grants, and is dedicated to continuing to serve the recreational needs of our community.

The North Conway Community Center also raised just over Twenty Thousand dollars this November to be able to provide a tackle football league this upcoming fall. Fundraisers like these allow the community center to continue to provide new programs to the valley.

The Center's main focus is youth programming. Our programs have continued to grow in attendance every year. We offer soccer, flag football, basketball, field hockey, cheering, t-ball, and softball programs, as well as a summer day camp for children. We are open after school everyday for kids to drop in and play basketball or play in the game room. The Center is a busy place year round. The Center has been a huge supporter of the Eight Grade Washington DC trip, Key Club, and Deca Club.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Conway, Barbara Harmon and the Board of Directors and Roger and the army of volunteers who continue to help coach and fundraise throughout the year.

NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER

Another year and where has the time gone? Well, here at the center we refer to it as child care units be it days or blocks. All rooms are very busy as you can well imagine. The toddler room with **Amy Richardi** and **Tanya Munro** has an enrollment of 12. The three year old room with **Leslie Schasel**, **Kimmy Mehaffey**, **Peggy Dickinson** and pretty regular substitute **Wilma Tchaikowsky** has an enrollment of 16. Both Kimmy and Peggy work part-time. In our lower level we have the pre-school with a total enrollment of 21. Also mixed in this group are a few kindergarten age children totaling 9, between the AM session and the PM session. **Lynn Hartford** is still our lead teacher for the pre-school. She is helped out with **Leslie Schasel** in the morning and **Lori Lusky** in the afternoon. We have a very good size after-school group. This group is only for children attending John Fuller Elementary School during the actual school session. Presently there are 30 children enrolled in this group. The bus comes into our parking lot making this very safe. The other elementary schools cannot do this drop. At different times parents have dropped off their children from a different school if they need the care. Then on school vacations our numbers go up for this age group. Three of the staff are taking an early childhood course at Granite State College for this semester being offered from N.H. Community Technical College Berlin. This will make sure that all of our lead teachers meet the N.H. Licensing requirements.

New this year as part of our food program is that we started serving breakfast in the middle of October. This was a suggestion from the USDA monitor who was here the end of June. She recommended that adding one more component to our morning snack would qualify for breakfast and a higher rate of reimbursement. As a result we offer the breakfast to our before school group and all of our regular groups. It has resulted in a little more work, especially for Kathy, but she has not complained yet. The monitor was correct because it has doubled our reimbursement for the months claimed so far.

We are continuing our pre-school music groups with Mt. Top Music. We had a session in the fall and have just started our winter one. We'll have a short break and then do one more in the spring. The cost of this is billed to the parents but we have had a great response. This session has 15 of the children signed up.

Preschool's Christmas program was a huge success with about 75 people attending the performance followed by a pot-luck buffet breakfast.

Last year's Mud Bowl was not as good as the previous year but we feel it was due to all the construction in town. We have already begun the preliminary steps for this September's event, always the weekend after Labor Day.

Our summer program will run as usual and hopefully we'll have the three senior Kennett High School seniors that are now working after school and some school vacations. There is one Kennett graduate that worked last summer and is now attending the University of Maine in Farmington who worked over her winter break. She is planning on working some this summer for us too. It is wonderful to have staff return for the children really gain from the continuity.

If you remember we started our annual raffle for Polar Express Tickets and raffle items in celebration of our 30th anniversary. Now in our 35th year we have combined with Friendly's Restaurant and this was a great success earning us about \$2500. We will be doing this again next year and thank all those members who supported us and for those who attended the Family Fun Night on December 14.

The days and the past year have been so busy that I'm sure I could go on for days but I do extend all of you an invitation to visit us and ask questions and also volunteer if

you are so inclined. **Trina Jones** has been a regular volunteer in her granddaughter's class and the children love to see her arrive.

Please be sure to vote yes on our article at the 2007 Conway Town Meeting and I truly thank the church and the Vaughan Board for all the support in sponsoring the North Conway Day Care Center in providing the child care services for all the families in our area.

STARTING POINT: SERVICES FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC & SEXUAL VIOLENCE

Highlights of clients/services provided to Town of Conway Residents during the time period of January 1, 2006 – December 31, 2006:

- Starting Point worked with the 119 victims of domestic violence, 27 victims of sexual violence and 25 victims of stalking in the Town of Conway representing 30% of Starting Point's overall clients.
- Starting Point staff and/or volunteers had contact with the 172 Conway residents for a total of 760 contacts. These contacts included crisis line advocacy, in-person visits, court assistance, hospital advocacy and support group participation.
- Emergency shelter was provided to 12 women and 8 children for a total of 1211 bednights, representing 91% of Starting Point's total bednights during 2006.
- 186 students at Conway Elementary and 80 students at John Fuller Elementary participated in Starting Point's *Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary* program at no cost to the schools.
- 103 7th grade students at Kennett Middle School participated in our *Healthy Relationships: The Next Step* program which focuses on sexual harassment prevention. 183 8th grade health class participants received *Healthy Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know about Dating Violence*. These were both at no cost to the middle school.
- 181 high school health students participated in our *Healthy Relationships: What Everyone Needs to Know about Sexual Assault* program at no cost to the high school.
- 10 community awareness events were sponsored in the Conway area during the year.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

The Tri-County Community Action/Carroll County is a private, non-profit agency that was established in 1965. The Carroll County Resource Center is located at 448 White Mountain Highway, Tamworth, NH. We have had **contact with 5,109 of Conway's citizens, processed 469 Fuel Applications, 138 elderly, 156 disabled and linked 4346 with other programs.**

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$579,645.00 ON CONWAY'S CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 2005 AND JUNE 30, 2006.

Tri-County Community Action is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities countywide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with Community Services Block

Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, EFSP, McKinney and private and corporate benefactors. We are the conduit through which USDA Surplus Food is distributed to the 13 Food Pantries, three dinner bells and a nursing home throughout the Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact has successfully partnered with individuals and families to assist them to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency

We have provided information, referrals and assisted with advocacy for more than **25,156 contacts** in Carroll County last year

We greatly appreciate the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials, staff and residents.

VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICES, INC.

The first several months of the year consisted of the upkeep of existing Vaughan programs while also looking to define a new job description for the new administrator of Vaughan and determine the future direction of programming.

We served more than 300 people at the food pantry throughout the year and more than 800 in total with all of Vaughan's programs. The food pantry, clothing depot and other general assistance services provided by Vaughan historically were utilized consistently all year. The annual food drive done with the radio stations was a phenomenal success this year and we distributed over 500 hundred bags of food! We again worked with the Realtors to provide Thanksgiving Baskets and handed out a total of 80. The Thanksgiving Dinner was very small this year in comparison to previous years and we will be working on how to address this over the next year. Vaughan also raised about \$15,000 from our annual Golf Tournament with Jen's Friends and the sale of Golden Goose tickets for the Storyland After Dark, hosted by the Morrell Family Foundation. The generous people of the church and community who donate time, products and services make all of this possible. Vaughan would like to extend a sincere thank you to all of them!

One new program that began with great success this past year was the **Prom Boutique**. This event was done in conjunction with the White Mountain Board of Realtors and put on as a benefit to local high school students as well as a fundraiser for Vaughan. We raised about \$200 and made a lot of teenagers extremely happy about being able to attend the prom more affordably. Next year the Realtors have agreed to sponsor the event and pay for any fundraising expense.

We are currently moving forward to open a supervised visitation program and are researching other social service needs in the community such as various counseling and advocacy services. The idea of a Volunteer Program, which has been titled **Helping Hands**, has been slow getting off the ground. However Vaughan will be working with the Missions Committee to move this program forward over the next year.

Additionally, Vaughan received 2 grants this past year, from The Goldberg Foundation and the Connie Davis Watson Foundation, and are replacing the flooring in the entire upstairs of the RFL building (not including the carpets). We have also been working on several alternatives to improve safety and security in the building. As I stated earlier this has been a busy year and we expect 2007 to be even busier!

WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

White Mountain Community Health Center is a nonprofit health care center located in Conway. The mission of the center is to provide high quality health care to residents without discrimination. The center provides reduced fees to residents with no health insurance or insurance that does not pay for out patient health care. This ensures that everyone can receive the health care they need to stay healthy.

The center provides services to men, women and children. This includes a children's program that provides physicals, sick call visits, diagnosis and treatment, inoculations, and many screens to assess the child's or infant's health status. The prenatal program provides care beginning with pregnancy, deliveries of babies with a nurse mid-wife, and post natal care. Adults and teens are also seen for physicals, screenings, sick calls, diagnosis and treatment.

The value to the town includes services offered and not funded by the town:

- *Healthy Smiles* program provides dental services provided by a dental hygienist and a dentist. These oral health services are provided in the Conway elementary schools and at the health center.
- *Partners in Health* is a program focused on children with chronic illnesses.
- The health center assists in the application of Healthy Kids for those children who qualify.
- *Employee Prepay Program* is a program that employers prepay for our services at a discount. This offers small businesses an affordable way to provide out patient healthcare to their employees.
- *Patient Assistance Funds* includes funds to help patients with medication, transportation, and medical testing.

The health center gives away over \$24,000.00 a month in free care to patients. We are asking for only 7% of what it costs us to serve a Conway resident. Due to the service based economy in this area, many employees do not have health insurance coverage.

We rely on various sources of revenue to assist us in serving these patients. The Town appropriations are an important part of how we can offer free and reduced services to those Conway residents in need. If White Mountain Community Health Center did not exist, Conway would have a larger tax burden. While our visits and services continue to grow each year, we only ask for level funding. *We always appreciate the support of Conway residents and we look forward to your support again this year.*

Results of the 2007 Deliberative Session

The deliberative session of the 2007 Town Meeting was held on March 5, 2007. With one exception all articles were approved as submitted for placement on the ballot. Voting will be held on April 10, 2007.

The amended article is as follows:

(Deleted language is shown in strikethrough and added text is shown in bold italicized text.)

ARTICLE 25: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ~~Thirty Eight Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Five Dollars and seventy cents (\$38,635.70)~~ ***Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565)*** for the support of **WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER** to help meet the health-care needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-2-3).**

BUDGET NARRATIVE

Introduction

The recommended operating budget is \$8,706,590, which represents a slight decrease from the prior year adopted budget which was \$8,709,232 (see Exhibit 1). The proposed default budget for 2007 is \$8,672,916 which is \$33,674 less than the proposed budget. This minimal increase in actual dollars is largely the net result of the following changes in the operating budget:

Increases

- Employee Benefits increases by \$111,504 due to a 13% increase in health insurance, changes in employee status, and changes to state mandated retirement contributions.
- The Police Budget increases by \$57,906 due largely to employee costs.
- The Fire Budget increases by \$32,536 due in part to an increase of \$18,720 in the newly established Emergency Management Office. These expenses fund a part time Emergency Management Director and minor office expenses. Formerly, this responsibility was funded through a minimal stipend to one of the local fire chiefs. Funding for the Non-Precinct Fire Agreement also increases by \$12,000 based on the contract formula. These expenses are funded only by owners of property located in non-precinct areas of the town.
- The Parks and Recreation Budget decreases by 3.3% over the prior year. It must be noted however, that the proposed budget was reduced by \$40,000 in anticipation of the adoption by the voters of a Recreation Revolving fund. If approved, fees received by the department will be placed in that account and associated expenditures will be funded from that account. It should also be noted that overall, expenditures in the Recreation Department are proposed to increase by (when taking into account the operating budget and the expenses funded from the revolving fund) by approximately \$34,000. This increase is primarily due to the addition of four summer counselors and an increase in the hours worked by a part time administrative aid.
- The Library budget increases by 8.3% or approximately \$31,000 due to employee and utility cost increases. The Library has included funding for additional staff.

Decreases

- A decrease of \$188,000 is noted in the Debt Principal and Interest budgets. This is largely due to the fact that the landfill closure bond has been paid.

- In addition, the Ambulance Service line decreases by \$152,000. This is due to the fact that the recommended annual funding amount has been decreased from \$203,125 to \$154,000. A total of \$66,780 is included in the operating budget to fund the first four months of operations. A warrant article that would appropriate \$103,370 will be presented to fund the remaining eight months of the year and to approve a new agreement for ambulance contributions.

Departmental Summaries

This following discussion provides a summary of each department budget. Exhibit 1 presents a summary of the changes in each budget from 2006 to 2007.

Executive

The Executive Budget includes staff and operating expenses for general town administration. Included in the budget are supplies and materials for administrative departments and compensation for the Board of Selectmen/Town Manager's Office. Compensation for some elected officials is also included. This year, the budget increases by 2.2%. Increases are due to employee compensation and minor increases in supplies and equipment lines.

Election and Registration

This budget funds elections and voter registration.

The budget decreases by 4.6% and reflects the fact that only one election will be held of 2007.

Financial Administration

The Finance Department maintains fiscal records for the town. The Finance Budget includes expenses for Finance Department salaries, the annual external audit, the elected town Treasurer, and the Budget Committee. The budget increase of 2.5% is due mainly to increased staff costs and increases in the information technology line. The increase in the information technology line is based on annual maintenance contracts and planned equipment replacements. The Seminars line also increases based on leadership training that is planned for Finance staff.

Assessor

The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing all real and personal property, including mobile homes, residential and commercial properties, and agricultural land. The Assessor's Budget includes assessing department staff salaries, outside mapping services, and other costs for property assessment. The budget increases by 5.2% due largely to increased staff costs and some increases in the Mapping and Software lines.

Legal Expenses

The Legal Budget contains expenses for Town Counsel and other outside legal expenses. Town Counsel provides legal counsel to the Board of Selectmen and town staff. In addition, Town Counsel defends or prosecutes actions in court on behalf of the Town.

The amount budgeted for legal expenses increases from \$35,000 to \$50,000 based on projected needs for 2007.

Employee Benefits

Employee Benefits includes health insurance and other employee costs mandated by the federal or state government such as FICA, social security and retirement. An amount for sick leave incentive for non-union employees is also included.

This budget increases by 19%, which results from an approximate 13% increase in health insurance. In addition state mandated increases in retirement contributions account for some of this increase. Unemployment Insurance and Social Security payments also increase.

Planning and Zoning

The Planning Department is responsible for advising the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the public on land use and development issues. The planning staff oversees site plan and subdivision applications and amendments to the Site Plan, Subdivision and Zoning Regulations, as well as the Conway Master Plan. The Code Compliance Officer issues sign permits, home occupation permits and enforces the zoning codes. This budget increases by 3.8% due to staff compensation increases and other minor adjustments. It should be noted that the salary for the Project Administrator includes overtime for taking minutes at night meetings for the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment. An increase in the Seminars line is included to fund training designed to help staff develop a more efficient permit tracking system.

Government Buildings

Government Buildings includes operating expenses for a variety of Town buildings and facilities. These include: Town Hall, the Conway Recreation Center, the Public Works Garages, and the Whitaker Meeting House.

For 2007, this budget increases by 5%. The increase is due to adjustments made for increases in utility and fuel costs experienced in the prior year.

Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

Insurance

Liability insurance for Town property and vehicles is funded within this budget. The amount presented is an estimate of actual premium costs for 2007.

Police Department

The Police Department preserves the public peace, reduces the opportunity to commit crime, and provides a high level of safety, security and service for all members of the community.

The Police Department Budget increases by 2.7% or \$57,906. This increase is due largely to labor costs.

Ambulance

The Ambulance Budget funds a contribution to local ambulance providers. The local providers include Conway Village Fire District and the North Conway Ambulance Service.

This budget shows a decrease of 67% from \$203,125 to \$66,780. This decrease is based on proposed changes to the amount contributed by the town to the providers. It is proposed that the annual total decrease from \$203,125 to \$154,000. The amount included in the budget is required to fund the first four months of the contract until the voters consider the proposal. A warrant article that would appropriate \$103,370 will be presented to fund the remaining eight months of the year and to approve a new agreement for ambulance contributions.

Fire and Rescue

The primary expense within the Fire and Rescue Budget is the provision of fire protection for areas of the Town that are not located within a fire precinct. Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct provide these services under contract. This expense is funded by property taxes paid only by property owners in non-precinct areas of the Town.

The budget is projected to increase by 15.4%. This increase is due in part to the increase of the Emergency Management services to \$21,220. These funds will support the part time salary and expenses for Emergency Management Director. This is a new part time position established upon the resignation of the former Director.

Funding for the Non-Precinct Fire Agreement also increases by \$12,000 based on the contract formula. The Non-Precinct Fire Agreement funds fire service to non-precinct areas of the Town. These expenses are funded only by owners of property located in non-precinct areas of the town. It should be noted that a warrant article will appear on the ballot that will ask the voters to approve a five year contract for these services that will begin on January 1, 2008.

Inspections

The Building Inspector reviews building permits, building plans, inspects buildings and enforces the building codes.

This budget increases by just over 8% due to salary expenses for the existing positions and minor increases in other lines. An Assistant Building Inspector Position was requested but not recommended.

Highway

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance and construction of Town roads and bridges as well as other related activities such as snow removal and ditch and culvert repair.

An increase of 1.9% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This is due to labor costs and relatively minor increases in materials and supply costs over the prior year.

Solid Waste

The Solid Waste Department manages the disposal of solid waste for the Mount Washington Valley Solid Waste District, which includes the towns of Conway, Albany, and Eaton. The member towns reimburse Conway for this service. The department operates both a transfer station and landfill.

The proposed budget represents an increase of 3.9%. This is due primarily to wage and benefit increases under the compensation plan. In particular it should be noted that health insurance for employees is included in this departmental budget. Increases in insurance and changes in employee census impact this budget directly.

Health

The Health Budget includes funding for the services of appointed Health Officers as well as kennel fees for impounded animals. The budget increases by \$265 based on actual 2006 expenses for Kennel Fees.

Welfare

The General Assistance Department relieves and maintains those who are unable to support themselves. This office assists with basic necessities such as medication, housing, electricity, food and heat for those who qualify. All assistance is in the form of a loan and not a grant.

This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The budget decreases approximately 7% based on actual expenditures over the last several years.

Parks and Recreation

The Recreation Department is responsible for elementary school age youth sports and recreation programs and activities as well as a Teen Center for junior high age students. The Department also offers a variety of adult and senior citizen programs.

While the Parks and Recreation Budget decreases by 3.3%, it should be noted that the proposed budget was reduced by \$40,000 in anticipation of the adoption by the voters of a Recreation Revolving Fund. If approved, fees received by the department will be placed in that account and associated expenditures will be funded from that account. It should also be noted that overall, expenditures in the Recreation Department are proposed to increase (when taking into account the operating budget and the expenses funded from the revolving fund) by approximately \$34,000. This increase is primarily due to personnel increases. Most significantly, four additional summer counselors have been added to the staff line. This increase is based on the number of children participating in the program and the recommended ratio of staff to participants. In addition, the personnel line has been increased by \$3,575 to extend the hours of the seasonal administrative aide position.

Library

The recommended budget represents an increase of 8.3%. This increase is found in the labor lines and in the utilities line.

Patriotic Purposes

This budget provides funding for the Town Fourth of July celebration and for commemorative activities that occur on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The Fourth of July Line shows an increase of \$500 to cover increased costs for the fireworks.

Conservation Commission

The Conservation Commission oversees the planning and long-term use of Town common lands and open space properties. The proposed Conservation Commission Budget decreases by 18.5% based on planned projects for the year.

Debt Principal

Included here are principal payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by almost 26% based on the fact that the landfill closure bond has been paid off.

Debt Interest

Included in this budget are the interest payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by a net amount of just under 19% and results from the payoff of the landfill closure bond and changes in the payment schedules for the other five remaining bonds.

Interest on TANS

This budget includes projected interest expenses on Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). Simply put TANS are short-term loans available to municipalities from the state that assist in supporting cash needs during the year. Based on the current reserves retained by the Town, this amount remains the same as the prior year at \$5,000.

Capital Reserve Funds

The Capital Reserve Budget includes funds to support ongoing capital equipment purchases and capital construction. The budget increases by just over 1% reflecting slight adjustments in the Solid Waste Equipment and Infrastructure Accounts. These increases are designed to keep pace with increases in vehicle and material costs over time.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.5 INTERPRETATION to add the following language: "This zoning ordinance is constructed as a permissive zoning ordinance; if a use is not identified as a permitted use or a use permitted by Special Exception in a zoning district, then the use is not permitted in that zoning district." Proposed by the Planning Board. **Recommended by the Planning Board (4-0-1).**

ARTICLE 3: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 2 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.1.2.4.1.5, §147.13.2.2.4.1.5, §147.13.3.2.4.1.5, §147.13.4.2.4.1.5, §147.13.5.2.5.1.5, §147.13.6.3.5.1.5, §147.13.7.2.5.1.5; and §147.13.8.2.5.1.5 as follows: "Accessory structures must have at least ~~five~~ three hundred (500 300) square feet of living space per unit suitable for conversion to a dwelling unit and not conflict with the purpose and intent of this section." Proposed by the Planning Board. **Recommended by the Planning Board (5-0-0).**

ARTICLE 4: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 3 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.7 to add the following language: "147.13.7.17 Educational Museums: In that the town is economically dependent upon tourism, the purpose of this provision is to allow educational museums within the North Conway Village Commercial District to incorporate the exterior as well as the interior into their educational purpose. In that regard, with respect to museums operated by I.R.C. 501(c)(3) charitable institutions, the exterior areas of the site, including the setback areas, may be used for museum displays and exhibits in keeping with and to facilitate the educational purpose of the museum, notwithstanding any architectural, landscaping, sign provisions, green-space and buffer area limitations otherwise imposed or established by this ordinance." Submitted by Petition. **Not recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).**

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 4 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.8.6.8.1 as follows: "Illumination. Signs shall not be illuminated from within; signs may be illuminated only by external light. Lighting shall be affixed to the sign structure or the building to which the sign is mounted ~~and, for dimensional purposes, considered part of the sign structure.~~ Lighting shall be located, directed and/or shielded such that it only sheds light downward and, is limited to the message display area. ~~Lighting sources shall be metal halide or halogen and located, directed and/or shielded such that no direct light emissions are visible at any point along the property boundary, nor shall they in any way and they shall not be~~ distracting to vehicular traffic. **The lighting sources shall be of generally white light and be energy efficient fixtures when possible.**" Submitted by Petition. **Not recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).**

ARTICLE 6: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Seven Hundred Six Thousand Five Hundred Ninety Dollars (**\$8,706,590**). ARTICLE 7: (Separate-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items included in the one-year **COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR 2007 BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS** which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal year 2007. This means that the

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Four Thousand Four Hundred Thirty Seven Dollars (\$104,437.00) from franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. **No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (13-2-1).**

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000) to contribute to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (16-0-0).**

ARTICLE 12: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$10,100) to purchase **911 RECORDING EQUIPMENT FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT**. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (16-0-0).**

ARTICLE 13: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,600.00 for **CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY** purposes, specifically, \$2,600.00 for **REPAIRS AND MAINTENANCE** to the façade of the original library building (relettering of CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY) and \$5,000.00 for the purchase of literary, audio, and video materials for the Young Adult and Children's Sections. This Article requires no raising of taxes. The funds to be expended for these purposes have been donated. (Submitted by Petition). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (16-0-0).**

ARTICLE 14: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to approve a five year Memorandum of Agreement for contributions to **EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE** between the Town of Conway and two providers

(North Conway Ambulance, Inc. and Conway Village Fire District) beginning at 12:00 AM May 1, 2007. Further, to raise and appropriate One Hundred Three Thousand Three Hundred Seventy Dollars (\$103,370.00) to be disbursed to the providers in accordance with the provisions of the Emergency Ambulance Service Memorandum of Understanding. This amount is in addition to the Sixty Six Thousand Seven Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$66,780.00) contained in Warrant Article 6, the Operating Budget Article, which is the cost of ambulance services from January 1, 2007 to April 30, 2007. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (15-1-0).**

ARTICLE 15: To see if the Town will vote to establish a **RECREATION REVOLVING FUND** pursuant to RSA 35-B:2 II. The money received from fees and charges for recreation park services and facilities shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered to be part of the town's general fund unreserved fund balance. The town treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Board of Selectmen (no further town meeting approval required). These funds may be expended only for recreation purposes as stated in RSA 35-B, and no expenditure shall be made in such a way as to require the expenditure of other town funds that have not been appropriated for that purpose. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (16-0-0).**

ARTICLE 16: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the **SWIFT RIVER COVERED BRIDGE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** created in 1991. In 1999 the balance of the funds were used to spray the bridge with fire retardant. No funds remain in the account. (Majority vote required). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (16-0-0).**

ARTICLE 17: To see if the Town will vote to approve the **NON-PRECINCT FIRE AND RESCUE PROTECTION AGREEMENT** between the Town of Conway, the Conway Village Fire District, and the North Conway Water Precinct. The agreement shall be for a term of five years beginning on January 1, 2008 and expiring on December 31, 2012. **The annual cost of this contract will be funded by non-precinct tax payers only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-5-0).**

ARTICLE 18: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) for **TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION** for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (15-1-0).**

ARTICLE 19: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by **THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC.** Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (15-0-1).**

ARTICLE 20: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) for the **CENTER CONWAY CEMETERY** for the purpose of adequately maintaining cemetery grounds. Submitted by petition. **Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-3-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-15-0).**

ARTICLE 21: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for **VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC.** Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (14-1-1).**

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for **NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE**. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-4-0).**

ARTICLE 23: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Eighty Six Dollars (\$2,886) in support of **STARTING POINT** providing crisis services to the victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-2-2).**

ARTICLE 24: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Two Hundred Ninety Eight Dollars (\$7,298) to help defray the costs of Service Delivery of the **MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS**. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-10-1).**

ARTICLE 25: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ~~Thirty Eight Thousand Six Hundred Thirty Five Dollars and seventy cents (\$38,635.70)~~ Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of **WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER** to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (12-0-0).**

ARTICLE 26: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000), said sum to be allocated to the **NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER** for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-3-2).**

ARTICLE 27: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) for the support of the **EASTERN SLOPE AIRPORT AUTHORITY** Master Plan and Matching Grant Funds. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (6-9-1).**

ARTICLE 28: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Six Hundred Dollars (\$2,600) for the **CONWAY VILLAGE AREA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE**. The allocated funds will be spent to purchase new banners for Conway Village Area. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (2-13-1).**

ARTICLE 29: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #6). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of **CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC.** **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-6-2).**

ARTICLE 30: (Separate). To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer ownership of land owned by the Town of Conway to the North Conway Water Precinct. The subject parcel is located at 18 Seavey Street in Conway (Map 218, Lot 124). The North Conway Water Precinct will use the land for public purposes. **In the event that the North Conway Water Precinct ceases to use the property for public purposes, ownership shall revert to the town of Conway.**

ARTICLE 31: To see if the town will vote to establish the **TERMS OF COMPENSATION FOR THE ELECTED TOWN CLERK/TAX COLLECTOR (TC/TC)**. Recognizing that the duties of the elected TC/TC require a full time effort, the compensation for the TC/TC shall be as follows:

1. A newly elected TC/TC, or one appointed to fill a vacancy, shall begin service at a salary level equal to the average salary for TC/TC's as determined by survey of the thirty (30) towns used for pay comparison in the Town of Conway's Non-Union personnel manual. After the completion of each year of service, the TC/TC shall receive an increase in salary equal to the CPI-U 12 month average for the preceding year.
2. The Town will provide and pay for health, life, accident and other insurance benefits for the TC/TC and dependants as are provided for regular employees and in accordance with Town non-union personnel policies.
3. The Town will provide and pay for vacation and sick leave benefits, paid holidays, and retirement benefits to TC/TC in accordance with Town non-union personnel policies and as applicable to regular employees.

Where applicable, all provisions of this article shall be afforded the current TC/TC.

ARTICLE 32: NEW HAMPSHIRE CLIMATE CHANGE RESOLUTION - To see if the Town will go on record in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change which is increasingly harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the future well being of the people of Conway.

These actions include:

1. Establishment of a national program requiring reductions of U.S. greenhouse gas emissions while protecting the U.S. economy.
2. Creation of a major national research initiative to foster rapid development of sustainable energy technologies thereby stimulating new jobs and investment.

In addition, the Town of Conway encourages New Hampshire citizens to work for emission reductions within their communities, and we ask our Selectmen to consider the appointment of a voluntary energy committee to recommend local steps to save energy and reduce emissions.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, to the President of the United States, and to declared candidates for those offices. (Submitted by Petition)

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to accept Heather Hill Road, Highpoint Road, Holly Ridge Lane and Grandview Drive in the subdivision of Hale Estates as Town Roads. (Submitted by Petition).

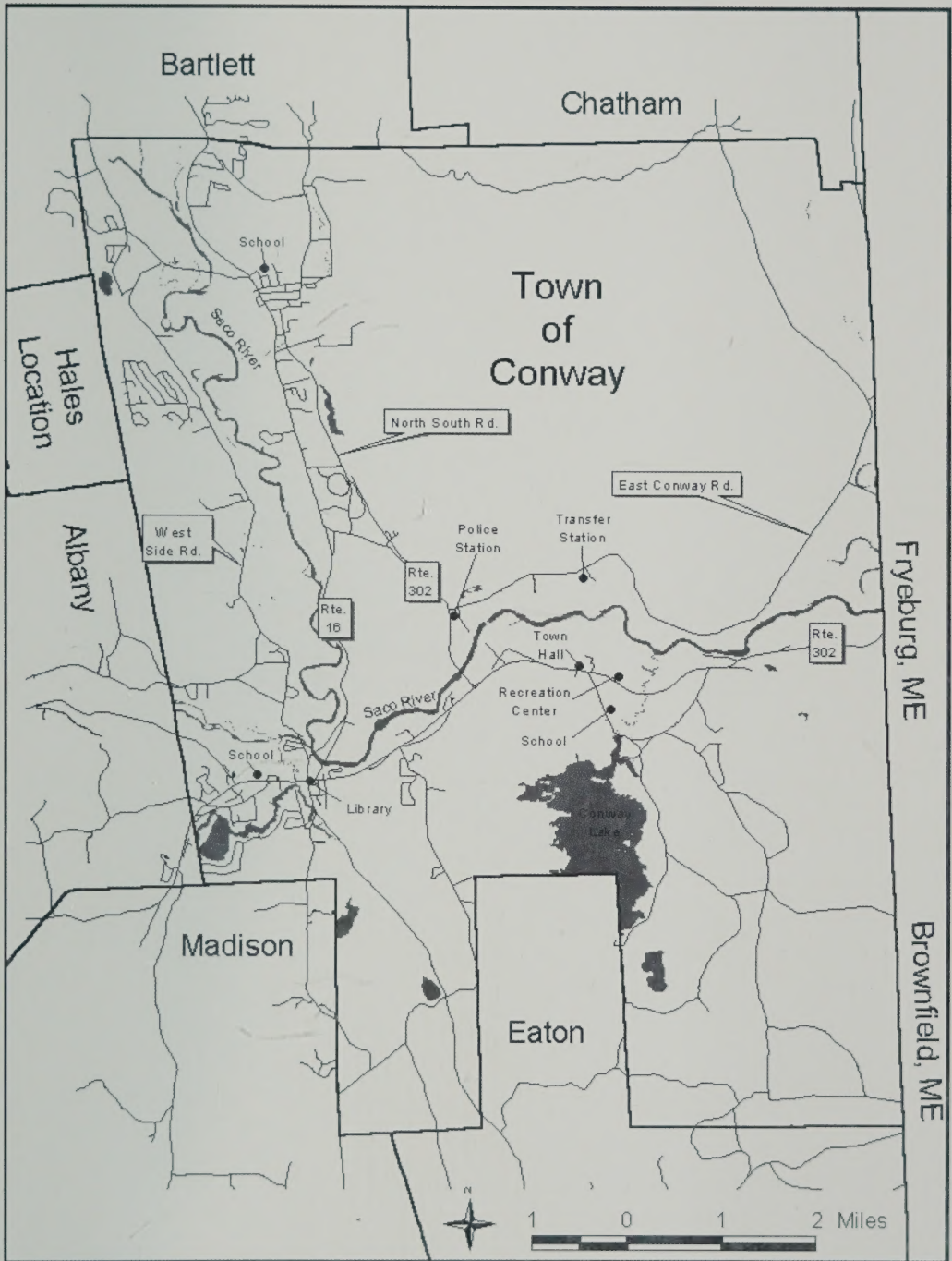
ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will vote to accept Jefferson Road and Lincoln Circle in the subdivision of Lincoln Estates as Town Roads. (Submitted by Petition).

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to totally discontinue completely and absolutely a roughly 605-foot long portion of "Burbank Road", so-called, as originally described in the approved highway layout dated December 13, 1888, located in Center Conway, New Hampshire. The portion of Burbank Road to be discontinued is described as follows: Beginning at the northeasterly corner of the land of E.A.R. Revocable Trust (shown as parcel 8 on tax map 259), thence running generally westerly along the southern edge of said Burbank Road 605.28 feet, more or less, to the northwesterly corner of land of William Greene (shown as parcel 12 on tax map 260); thence turning and running northerly 24.75 feet, more or less, across Burbank Road to the northern edge thereof; thence turning and running easterly along the northern edge of Burbank Road to a point 33 feet, more or less, west of the southeasterly corner of the land of Russell/Shaffner (shown as parcel 7 on tax map 259) and thence turning and running southerly 24.75 feet, more or less, to the point of beginning. (Submitted by Petition)
