#### STATE AID FOR HIGHWAYS.

Under Chapter 29 of the Laws of 1889, towns are required to raise one-fourth of one per cent. of their valuation for maintenance of roads, provided, however, that no town is required to raise an amount exceeding \$50 per mile of road. The valuation of the towns for 1910 and the actual mileage of roads in each town cannot be definitely stated at this date, hence the amounts opposite A and C below are approximate only. Subject to the above statement, the following amounts relate to Warner:

A Amount required to be raised under the law of

1899, one-fourth of one per cent, 1827 21

B Additional amount if town applies for state aid 365 00

C Total minimum amount required to be raised for highway purposes if town applies for state aid, 2192 21

If no application for state aid is made in 1910, the town is required under Section 3 of Chapter 35, Laws of 1905, to set apart and expend for permanent improvement the sum of 8730.

If the town does apply for state aid under the above-mentioned law of 1905, a joint fund for the town is formed, the items of which are as follows:

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

During the year 1909 there have been reported to the board of health three isolated cases of diphtheria and one case of scarlatina. By prompt, close quarantine, the use of disinfectants during convalescence and proper fumigation after recovery, the spread of these diseases has been prevented. The use of diphtheria antitoxin, both as curative doses to the patient and as immunizing doses to the members of the afflicted family, has materially aided the physicians and the board of health in limiting this disease. By state law the request of a citizen compels the town to furnish antitoxin in any case of diphtheria. This is a step in the right direction, only one more being necessary and that the obligatory use of antitoxin in all cases of this disease.

The education of the people as to the nature and course of tuberculosis has been the theme of most boards of health during the past few years. The fact having been well demonstrated that this disease can be cured has given much impetus to the public to become acquained with the details of its prevention and cure. So-called tuberculosis exhibitions have been held in all parts of the country, and by lectures, magazine articles, newspaper comment, and pamphlets, the public in general has been taught to regard this disease as communicable, not contagious, chiefly by inhalation of the dried sputum, and that a proper destruction of this sputum will in a large measure act to stamp out this disease by prevention of infection. A consumptive should not be looked upon nowadays as a leper, to be shunned and avoided, but as a sufferer from a curable disease, who can be substantially aided in his recovery by kind words, abundance of fresh air, good nourishing food, pure water, and large doses of rest. Only two eases of tuberculosis were reported to the board of health as existing in town during the past year.

Our town has many natural and artificial advantages, but

none of more importance than its water supply. Silver lake gives us an abundance of pure spring water from a practically uninhabited and uncontaminated watershed. In dry seasons the supply has at times been low and of a consequent poorer character. The board wishes to recommend the further excavation of the upper part of the reservoir, thereby allowing the storage of one-third, at least, more water, and preventing the draining off of land overflowed in the high water of spring.

The necessity of improved sanitary conditions about our residences is apparent to all. Sewer connection is urged where practical, and if not proper drainage must be established for the public good.

The board heartily commends the installation of ventilating systems in the schools. Although the system in the high school is of recent date, yet the percentage of attendance is appreciably raised, and the general health and school work of the students improved.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board of Warner:

I have the honor herewith to present my first annual report of your schools. Having served your schools in the capacity of superintendent only a part of the year, my report can not be so complete as it otherwise might.

Some time was necessarily consumed in the fall in ascertaining locations of schools, the general trend of the work, and the attitude and capacities of the teachers. I desire to express satisfaction on the general conditions of the schools, the methods in use and the zeal of the teachers. All this reflects credit upon my predecessor, not forgetting that these conditions were made possible by the active co-operation of the school committee and the attitude of the patrons and taxpayers towards the schools.

I have been pleased to see that the public library is made available to all the pupils of the town by the system of distributing the books among the schools, and to know that the pupils avail themselves of the privilege. I have been pleased also to see that nearly every school is furnished with a musical instrument and that the teachers are able to use it. Music adds much to the school life and its influence is beneficial and ever increasing.

It has not been my policy to upset existing policies or methods or to make radical changes in the work, but rather to intensify the work as I found it, to aid and encourage the teachers, sometimes to more thorough work and hence better progress.

The break in the village schools and the resultant loss or postponement of the winter term is fully understood by you and needs no comment from me.

Many essays have been written by learned men upon education and what should be the end sought. If we agree that the purpose of education is to enable a man to make the most and

best of himself, I think we shall agree that that kind of an education is best for the individual that will best enable him to adapt himself to his environments. Formerly a course of study was made with the purpose of giving mental training, and studies were selected with little else in view. Now it is generally conceded that if a study has a practical side from the information contained, its disciplinary value is not lessened on that account.

Agriculture is receiving a great deal of attention from scientific men and is becoming a science. There are books on agriculture put on the market by publishing houses that are interesting and instructive. I believe that a book of this kind could be used to good advantage in the common schools. I believe it would put the pupils into sympathy with and increase the intelligence of agricultural life, whether it is going to be the vocation or merely the avocation of the pupil.

In conclusion I wish to express my gratification at the spirit shown by the teachers of the schools of Warner, a spirit that shows an interest in the work and a desire to 'learn if possible to achieve still better results. With the new schoolhouse opened and possibilities of better conditions for grading and everything that tends to better conditions, the people of Warner have reason to congratulate themselves on their schools.

## SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

Owing to the resignation of the Rev. Wm. J. Cloues, after nearly four years of efficient service as superintendent, and at the request of the prudential committee, I herewith make the following report of the Simonds Free High School for the past year.

In order to carry the three long established courses during the year 1908-1909, a fourth teacher, Miss Elizabeth Nixon, was employed. The work was arranged in departments, and each teacher was thus enabled to give more time and attention to the several students. The work of the year was successfully done. The same corps of teachers, with the exception of Miss Nixon, were retained for the year 1909-1910.

The senior class, accompanied by Miss Leach and Mrs. Davis, enjoyed a pleasant week's trip to Washington, D. C.

The sermon before the graduating class was preached in the Congregational church, June 13, before a large audience, by Dr. Roland D. Grant, the Rev. J. E. Enman and Rev. Wm. J. Cloues assisting in the services.

The graduating exercises were held June 18, and a class of 12 were given diplomas in the two departments—Latin Scientific, 5; English, 7.

Mrs. J. D. Bradley of Warner offered prizes to the amount of \$20.00 for excellence in school studies. These prizes consisted of eight \$2.50 gold pieces and were divided among the several classes as follows: Senior, best scholarship, Miriam E. Savory; greatest gain, Paul Cloues. Junior, best scholarship, Annie M. Johnson; greatest gain, Margaret F. Andrew. Sophomore, best scholarship, Elsie M. Gove; greatest gain, Vivian E. Andrew. Freshman, best scholarship, Miles E. Morgan. There being no choice for the second prize in the freshman class, the prize was awarded to Miss Hazel F. Ayer for the best scholarship in the commercial department. Mrs. Bradley has generously offered to repeat this gift from year to year.

The annual alumni entertainment was held in the evening. Stewartson's orchestra furnished music. The Lotus quartet, with reader, gave an interesting program.

The alumni donated \$25.00 to the school for pictures or needed equipment.

In June and in September, by examination and certificate, 22 students were admitted to the school.

The total number of students connected with the school the past year was 86—48 young men, 38 young women. The attendance has been as follows: Spring term, 1909, 63: young men, 34; young women, 29. Fall term, 61: young men, 30; young women, 31; of whom 22 were new students and 30 tuition students. Last year, after carefully considering the cost of instruction per pupil, the tuition was raised from \$30 to \$40.

Five of your recent graduates are attending Brown university and the New Hampshire state college. From the reports to the principal they are doing credit to themselves and to the school. The high school has been placed upon the accredited list of the New England College Entrance Certificate Board for a period of three years, a privilege heretofore enjoyed for only one year at a time.

The lyceum has continued to be of service in its social and literary training. Several good programs have been given under the supervision of the English teacher; Miss Leach. A recital was given by the students of the junior class April 27.

The courses of study have been considerably changed during the past year. The value of the two years' commercial course for the students that come to our school has been questioned. The standard commercial course is one of four years. We cannot fit students for a business career in two years when it requires four years in the other courses. After careful consideration by all interested, two strong courses, the Latin Scientific and a new English-Commercial course, were established. The work of the year in the commercial course, under the supervision of Mrs. Davis, has proved its value. Great interest has been shown and good results have been gained.

A new and modern heating and ventilating plant has been established in place of the old, and has been thoroughly tested during the winter. A temperature of 70 degrees has been maintained with the ventilation in operation. The health of the school has been good. The small per cent. of absences has resulted in little loss of work. This may be attributed in part to the even temperature and better ventilation of the building.

#### REPORT OF LIBRARIAN

To the Trustees of Pillsbury Free Library:

The beginning of a new year finds the library in excellent and satisfactory condition. It is an actual fact that the circulation has increased within the past twelve months, as the report for 1908 gives 7573, the one for 1909, 8908; and this, let it be understood, means the main library only. Taking all things into consideration this is a remarkable and an entirely unexpected showing. There are two ways of accounting for this. Individuals, long residents of the town, who have not been in the habit of taking out books, have become readers in earnest, and find special pleasure in the world of enjoyment opened to them in the wealth of interesting fiction. Besides these there are coming forward boys and girls from seven or eight to sixteen years who are constant readers. Some of these boys take special delight in going into the alcoves to forage for themselves, and there they may be found, long after the librarian has forgotten that they are there, busily engaged looking over the books.

The course of these gentlemanly boys recalls what was once told the writer by a stranger visitor from Philadelphia, that he acquired his great fondness for reading when a child by being allowed by the librarian to "go inside" and handle the books as much as he wished.

These young people will in time come to an appreciation of the best; even now they call for World's Work and the Review of Reviews, and two of the smallest are eager for Scribner's Monthly, to read or hear read Roosevelt's articles. Happily for them the library contains more than 1300 books especially for boys and girls, and the number is receiving additions several times in the course of the year.

Furthermore, these youthful readers are zealous for the reputation of the library, and are most loyal to it. They understand that it is theirs. Sometimes a little lad or lass has asked, "Who does this library belong to?" and the answer is instantly given, "It belongs to you," therefore the pupils from the primary schools know that they have the same right and interest as the most influential and wealthiest of the townspeople.

Some of the above facts are indications that with the passing of time the library can hardly fall behind, but will more than hold its own, will progress in usefulness, for in the nature of things it must be that these young readers will become well informed and intelligent citizens. Such is the outlook. The future of the library is in their hands. If parents, teachers and librarian see it in this light, and work together, its prosperity is assured. There is good reason to believe that in the years to come it will be kept up to its present high standard, and that these boys and girls, when grown to be men and women, will feel their responsibility and give it character and stability.

A word about biography may not be inappropriate here. Not long ago a person who ought to have known better put the question, "Why do they not buy biographies!" Here is the At every order the best biographies available are purchased, and it has been so from the beginning; the alcove devoted to this kind of literature has about 1150 volumes, a condition which is probably hardly equalled by any library of its size in the State of New Hampshire. It is well to keep this statement before the patrons, lest they miss some of the best reading to be obtained. Along towards these the children are gradually being led, and as their tastes develop they will be able to understand the value of life stories—stories that are true, for they all like what is true; and they can be so trained that Abbott's Biographies, the Life of Daniel Boone, and other delightful books of that class will be more tempting than any sensational story. They understand better and appreciate more fully than the majority of people give them credit for. They do not need to be written down to. A scientific man once said that he could read Popular Science Monthly to his little boys of

eight and ten years so they could understand it.

The annual statistics are as follows: Cards issued, 511; books given out, 8908; magazines, 840; books consulted in the library, 262; patrons of the reading room, 824; class of books read—1st, fiction; 2nd, children's books; 3rd, biography; 4th, general literature; 5th, travel; 6th, science and education; 7th, history; 8th, miscellaneous; 9th, religion.




