

RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

Weare, N. H., March 14, 1939.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator Alfred Osborne.

Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to adjourn to Saturday, the 18th day of March, 1939.

RECORD OF ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

Weare, N. H., March 18, 1939.

Met according to adjournment of March 14, 1939.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 18th day of March, 1939, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by Alfred Osborne, Moderator. Also the posting of the checklist by the Supervisors. Whole number of names on the checklist, 837.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast, 391. Votes blank 21.

and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Slack had 311 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed. For Road Agent - North Division Clarence R. Hall had 148 Charles F. Bennett had 205 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed. For Road Agent — East Division Bernard L. Phelps had 1 Bryan W. Sargent had 169 Sidney E. Bean had 188 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed. For Road Agent — South Division Earl Emerson had

Upon motion of John F. Tierney, Rev. Wilber W. Kamp offered prayer.

- Article 2. Upon motion of Chester W. French, voted to raise the sum of \$9,000 to defray town charges.
- Article 3. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that that the Clerk be authorized to cast one ballot for Elwin L. Hardy for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Elwin L. Hardy elected a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
- Article 4. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk be instructed to cast one ballot for Helen Dearborn, Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Helen Dearborn elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.
- Article 5. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that we raise the sum of \$6,500 for repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads.
- Article 6. Upon motion of Clarence S. Still that we raise the sum of \$100 for observance of Memorial Day. Mrs. Grace French offered an amendment that we raise the sum of \$20. On a division vote the amendment was lost: Yes 45; No 67. The motion was carried.
- Article 7. Upon motion of Peter I. Hooper, voted that we raise the sum of \$1,374.44 to be used with the sum of \$5,482.59 to be furnished by the State.

Article 8. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted that it be left with the Selectmen to make provision for the collection of taxes.

Article 9. Upon motion of Clarence S. Still, voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.

Article 10. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. Upon motion of Gertrude W. Osborne, voted to dismiss the article.

Article 12. Upon motion of Frank L. Eastman that we raise the sum of \$600. Charles H. Stafford offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$800. The amendment was lost. The motion was carried.

Article 13. Upon motion of Roland A. Barnard that we raise the sum of \$5,000. Paul J. Dumm offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$13,000. Frank H. Peaslee offered an amendment to the amendment to strike out the amount of \$13,000 and when the business of this meeting is over it adjourn to the 3rd day of June at 2 p.m. for further consideration of this matter. The amendment to the amendment was carried. Division vote: Yes 71; No 14.

Article 14. Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee that we raise the sum of \$700 to build a temporary bridge at North Weare and in case a permanent bridge is built to use this amount of money to help build a bridge across the river between Howard Goves and the foot of Paiges Hill at Ernest Paiges. George A. Waterman offered an amendment that this money if available to be used to repair or build the road between the foot of Paiges Hill and the end of the detour above the reservoir. The motion as amended was carried.

Article 15. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to dismiss the article.

Article 16. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to indefinitely postpone the article.

Article 17. Wilbur W. Kamp offered the following resolution and moved its adoption: Be it resolved in Town Hall assembled request the Commissioner of Insurance for a revaluation of the fire insurance rates in the Town of Weare on the basis of its improved fire fighting equipment. Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Commissioner of Insurance by the Town Clerk.

Frank H. Peaslee offered the following resolution: Resolved that the town petition Gov. Murphy and the General Court to consider aiding counties in their relief tax load. The resolution was adopted.

Informal motion: Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted to authorize the Selectmen to buy settees for seating 100 additional people in the town hall.

Informal motion: Upon motion of James G. Nichols, voted to instruct the Selectmen to have a telephone installed into the fire house.

Informal motion: Upon motion of Alfred Osborne, voted that the duties of the Finance Committee be extended to include the School District.

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
- 4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,383.99 to be used with the sum of five thousand five hundred thirty-five dollars and ninety-eight cents (\$5,535.98) to be furnished by the State.

- 8. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to allow the same discount on taxes as last year.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,518.00 to be used with a like amount, furnished by the State, for State Aid on the Deering Road.
- 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the Weare Fire Department.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to repair water holes damaged by the flood, and to clean out others.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to have a Committee appointed to contact the Insurance Underwriters and Commissioner to obtain a reduction in insurance rates.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for W.P.A. projects.
- 16. To see what action the town will take in regard to the State, or Water Resources Board, to rebuild the Weare Reservoir Dam.
- 17. To see if the town will authorize a new appraisal of real estate and elect appraisers; to raise money to defray the expense and take any other action thereto.
- 18. To see if the town will give the Selectmen power to sell the Mead-Morrison Tractors.

- 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.
 - 20. To see if the town will vote to elect a Fire Chief.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1939, alarms answered by the department totaled thirty-six. These fires are classed as follows.

Building	5	Brush and grass	10
Chimney	16	Truck	2
Oil burner	1	Bridge	1

The number of fires increased during 1939 and on one building fire, the loss was estimated at \$3,400. Insurance paid on fires in town totaled under \$2,600. The ten brush and grass fires were confined to small areas about two acres altogether.

To our equipment were added 500 feet of 1½ inch discharge hose, coats, a battery charger, and two electric lanterns. Forest fire tools to equip about fifty men were added, consisting of 6 knapsack pump tanks, 6 axes, 6 Pulaski tools, 12 council tools, 12 hazel hoes, 6 shovels, 4 kerosene lanterns, and 36 pails.

Most of our hazardous slash areas resulting from the hurricane have been cleaned up by W. P. A. and Forest Service crews. The remaining areas are now reaching a very high inflammable state and will be a serious hazard for the coming fire season.

The river at North and East Weare is still of almost no value as fire protection, the bridges being practically the only places where pumpers can take suction. We hope this situation can be improved as our most serious fire conditions are in these two villages.

The members of the department have been insured in and are eligible for the death and disability benefits provided by the Fireman's Retirement Act of 1939.

The department held twelve monthly meetings during the year. The companies held several drills on the use of the equipment. Forty men were trained in forest fire line construction. The present efficiency of the organization and equipment of the department should warrant a reduction in insurance rates which could no doubt be done if the right procedure was followed.

Every effort is being made to give the best service possible, at the same time keeping the expenses as low as advisable.

We wish to thank all who have co-operated with us and hope to receive the same fine support in the future.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Weare:

Teachers of last year who are not with us now are Mr. Barton, headmaster for a number of years. Miss Ruth Smith, teacher, Home Economics, for one year. Miss Louise Pihl, teacher at Friends for two years, Miss Muriel Nash at South Weare for one year.

Mr. Barton resigned to accept a teaching position in Agriculture at the State University. Miss Smith accepted a position in the extension work of the 4-H Clubs. Louise Pihl is now teaching in Bow, Miss Nash is in another teaching position in the state.

To fill the headmastership Jonathan Osgood of Pittsfield, New Hampshire, graduate of the State University, with six years experience was elected. The vacancy caused by Miss Smith's leaving was filled by Miss Dorothy Gilman of Keene Teachers College. Miss Mary Charas is now at South Weare. Mrs. Olive Draper was chosen for Friends after it was decided to continue that school.

For the first half of this year Mr. Drew, a "cadet" teacher from the University has been working along with Mr. Osgood in connection with the work in agriculture. For the Cadet training the district will receive reimbursement from the State University probably amounting to about \$225.

Since a year ago, water has been made available at the Center School, for drinking and toilet purposes.

Average attendance 94.2.

This average attendance approached the state average of 95, and is a few points above that of last year. Perhaps another year it can be brought up to or above the average.

Age for Admission to Grade I

No child shall be admitted to grade one in any September unless he has reached the age of five years and eight months on or before the first day of that month.

This year has been unusually favorable from the standpoint of weather and travel. It has been free from epidemics of any kind. For a detailed report of the activities of the school nurse, her report will indicate again the variety of items that enter in.

The schools are operating quietly and effectively. Questions of many kinds occur and it is the practice to try to keep parents informed and also secure from them information which may help the teachers to work with better understanding. There is practically no matter that cannot be adjusted — through mutual interest and willingness to co-operate.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Each child should make a regular annual gain, therefore, each pupil is weighed and measured so that we may ascertain their rate of growth according to the scale prepared by the New Hampshire State Board of Health.

About 260 pupils were examined the first of the school year and the parents notified of any weakness, deformity or defects found. For two years Dr. Fraser gave those pupils in high school who wished to play basketball a thorough physical examination. The heart, lungs, throat, teeth, skin, abdomen, for signs of hernia, and the blood pressure was taken on each.

I doubt if the parents in our town realize the several agencies that play an important part in our school health program. Among the activities that come under this head, some of which have been most helpful, is the cardiac and orthopedic clinics held at the Balch Hospital once a month.

The District Nursing Association has an orthopedic, goitre, dental clinic also a mental hygiene clinic which handles mental and nervous diseases and endeavors to help the problem child, there is also a trained worker here for those children with speech defects. The tuberculosis clinic is held every Saturday with Dr. Kerr in charge. The eye clinic in Hanover is available and one child in our union has been benefited by it.

The County Hospital is always ready to care for tonsil cases or any case needing hospital care.

Free lessons in lip reading is being given by Mrs. Hammon of Manchester to those children who are hard of hearing this being financed by the Rotary Club and the Hard of Hearing Club. Free fruit such as apples, oranges, raisins and peaches are available through the Surplus Commodities Commission this winter for each and every school child.


