



STATE AID FOR HIGHWAYS.

Under Chapter 29 of the Laws of 1899, towns are required to raise one-fourth of one per cent. of their valuation for maintenance of roads, provided, however, that no town is required to raise an amount exceeding \$50 per mile of road. The valuation of the towns for 1911 and the actual mileage of roads in each town cannot be definitely stated at this date, hence the amounts opposite A and C below are approximate only. Subject to the above statement, the following amounts relate to Warner:

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

During the year 1910 the general health of the town of Warner has been above the average. Early recognition, prompt quarantine and effective treatment have prevented the spread of the few cases of contagious disease occurring during the year.

Our water supply, although of excellent quality, seems deficient during the summer months. The Board wishes again to recommend the further excavation of the upper part of the present reservoir, thereby increasing its capacity one-third, also the establishment of a secondary reservoir for storage of water on the meadow land owned by E. H. Carroll & Son. Let us be up and doing on this vital and too long neglected subject. By clean reservoirs, improved water shed, proper filtration, increased capacity for storage, and by better attention to piping and wasting of the supply, let us obtain one of the best, if not the best, water supply for a village in the state.

Several times the Old River has been talked over and legislation passed thereon with but little result. Let us follow the example of two or three of our citizens and do something to improve this eyesore. By a well-directed filling-in, by improvement of the surrounding banks and by at least an attempt at drainage, we can eradicate this evil and thus better our sanitation, health and environment. No better advertisement as to the health and general advancement of the town can be made than by the renovation of the Old River.

The Board believes the inhabitants of the precinct should all connect their buildings with the sewer, abandon their wells which are at best none too good, and put in Silver Lake water, install bath tubs and water closets and thereby add materially to the public health and their own lives and comfort.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

— —

We respectfully submit this our first annual report to the citizens of the town of Warner.

The new environment and conditions have made very rapid work almost impossible. We were able, however, to get on the field early and make a few plans to put into operation at the opening of the fall term. What we have done has been suggested by the needs observed, and made possible through the co-operation of the teachers, school officials, and the people interested.

Eight rural one-room schools and the village school at Warner have been maintained during the year. 168 pupils have been generally regular in attendance. Of these, 83 are girls and 85 are boys. 69 are in grades one to three inclusive, 65 in grades four to six, and 34 in grades seven and eight. There are a few retarded pupils, generally due to poor attendance and found for the most part in the rural schools. We have been trying to bring up the worst cases by increasing the attendance and by individual instruction, wherever the teacher has had time for the added work, with, we believe, some success. For the most part, the pupils are doing the work given in the program of studies and are keeping up with their grade. We believe the teachers are preparing the pupils in the essential subjects for good high school work. To give the pupils more cultural training and to direct their self-activity along lines intended to fit for life in the community, it seems advisable to increase the work of the grades and to give the teachers who have the larger schools more time, that they may be able to cover the program of studies more fully and carefully.

All of the teachers, we believe, have been graduates of high school, and three from normal school. Some of those who have not had the opportunity for normal training have ability and successful experience to make their work efficient. We appreciate the spirit manifested by the teachers in giving their sup-

port, and that of the school board also in favoring a progressive educational policy. A new school building has been completed in Warner village, a modern structure in every particular. Some needed repairs have been made on other buildings, and improvements in text books and materials are well under way.

From our observation in the schools we have noted an increase in the interest of both pupil and teacher in their work. The teachers have been willing to work for the development of their schools.

The teachers have been aided by advice given at the time of our usual visit, once about every three weeks, and growing out of the needs of teacher and school. Much of the help has been in the form of personal interview, but illustrative teaching has been used whenever it has seemed advisable. The circular letter has been distributed when the need has been general. A new edition of the program of studies has been distributed to the teachers. It has helped in systematizing the work and in grading the pupils.

The text books introduced have been principally material for reading, both basal and supplementary. At the beginning of the year the work was seriously hindered by the lack of text books due to the burning of the books with the old village building. The regular texts for the use of the pupils have been quite well supplied. There is a need yet, however, of reference books for the teachers' desk and a few books in each school for home reading to create a desire for good literature and to supplement and broaden the work.

A record of the text books is being kept in each school. A record book showing the progress of each pupil as given on their report cards has been started and some of the written work of the pupils being kept as a record of progress.

It is best that the work done should show in the schools themselves. That is of but little value which will not show in the pupil at home or on the street. Trusting that the work of the year as shown in the product will meet with your approval, we hope for greater progress in the future.

SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

Our high school continues to maintain its high rank as a factor in the prosperity and welfare of the town. The attendance, owing to natural causes, has been somewhat smaller this year than last, but the same high standard of excellence has been maintained in the several departments and as satisfactory progress has been made along all lines. We were obliged to lose the valued services of Mrs. Davis in the commercial department at the close of the last school year owing to her being called to a larger and more remunerative field elsewhere. Her successor, Mrs. Harriet D. Lufkin, has done acceptable work. With this exception, the corps of teachers has remained the same, with Prof. Clarence L. Joy as principal and Miss Marian D. Leach, assistant.

The sermon before the graduating class was preached in the Baptist church on June 5th by the Rev. Wm. V. Sweetland, assisted by the Rev. James E. Enman. The graduating exercises were held June 10th in the new town hall. The graduating class numbered nineteen—the largest in the history of the school. Of this number five were in the Latin-Scientific course, eight in the English course, and six in the Commercial course. The eight prizes for scholarship, two and one-half dollar gold pieces, given by Mrs. J. D. Bradley, were awarded as follows: Seniors, Anne Gilmore, Linnell Frost; Juniors, Elsie Gove, Shirlie Cummings; Sophomores, Jennie Whytock, Edith Smith; Freshmen, Effie Merrill, Nellie Roby. A special prize, a fancy inkstand, given by Mrs. Florence T. Davis, was awarded to Nellie Roby for the greatest improvement in penmanship and general excellence.

The annual alumni entertainment and reunion was held in the evening. The Barleben trio of Boston, composed of Karl Barleben, violin virtuoso and director, Plato Barleben, 'cellist, and Maud Paradis Lane, pianist, Mrs. Elvie Burnett Willard, reader, and Miss Ruth Skeel, contralto, also of Boston, rendered an interesting program. Stewartson's orchestra, six pieces, of Concord, furnished music for the dancing.

At the annual examinations in June and September three candidates were admitted to the school. Two others have since been admitted by certificate.

There is a growing feeling that our high school should furnish advantages to our boys for acquiring some degree of knowledge and skill in the use of hand tools, and the addition of a manual training department should be contemplated. This need not entail a large expenditure. The small building at the rear of the schoolhouse, formerly used for a woodshed, could be equipped at small cost for this purpose. The sum of one hundred dollars would probably put it in good shape for a boys' workshop. An additional fifty dollars would doubtless purchase the necessary tools, at least to begin with. We understand that a part of this sum is already in hand, so the tax will not necessarily be burdensome. The scheme is one that we heartily approve of.

There is a crying need for the publication of a new school catalogue, some four years having elapsed since the printing of the last one, and it is now entirely worthless as an advertising medium.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Trustees of Pillsbury Free Library:

The statistics for the year just closed are as follows: Cards issued, 501; books loaned for home reading, 8284; magazines, 854. 191 books have been purchased, 13 added by binding, 31 given by individuals and the usual amount of public documents and miscellaneous matter received.

Class of books used—1st, fiction; 2nd, juvenile; 3d, biography; 4th, history; 5th, general literature and poetry; 6th, travel; 7th, miscellaneous; 8th, science and education; 9th, religion.

The book stack planned and made during this last year by Mr. Fred Harris has proved highly satisfactory and is not only useful but ornamental. It has long been needed as there was a lack of space, the 4141 volumes with which the library opened, having increased, according to the accession catalogue, to 10394. From this last number, however, some slight deduction should be made, for loss of books contained in two well-filled cabinets burned in the schoolhouse fire, a few destroyed on account of scarlet fever and diphtheria, and some duplicates (given to the library with the understanding that any disposition could be made of them which was thought best), which have been sent to two different towns, whose parties interested, were wishing to build up their libraries. These gifts were highly appreciated and it was a great pleasure to lend a helping hand, acting upon the principle, "freely ye have received, freely give." In addition to the above, it may be as well to say that some of the journals which have been in constant use from the beginning and no longer fit to go out, instead of being put in the fire, or sent to a junk shop, were given at their request, to some of the boy readers, who delighted to get them.

Many valuable books, travel, biography, etc., have been added, among them, Argentina, Romantic Corsica, Manor Homes of England, Charm of the English Village, Life and Letters of E. C. Stedman, Carthage and Tunis, Lake George and Lake Champlain.

Notwithstanding the many changes made by death and removals from town, the average number of readers continues about the same. The records show that since the opening of the library 2,240 different persons have taken out 155,018 books. Unfortunately, there is not so good a showing for the reading room. For years, certain of the older residents, both men and women, were sure to be seen at the library table afternoon or evening, once or twice a week; as they have passed away, their places have not been filled.
