RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 12, 1940

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 12th day of March 1940 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by the Moderator Alfred Osborne.

Also posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 878.

Article 1. Proceed to ballot for Town Officers.

Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to keep the polls open until 6 o'clock.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers. The whole number of ballots east 528. 12 votes blank.

Article 2. Upon motion of Clarence E. Leeds to raise the sum of \$7,500.00, Fred C. Jones offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$9,000.00. The amendment was lost.

Gordon W. Porter offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$8,500.00. The amendment was lost.

The motion to raise the sum of \$7,500.00 was carried.

Article 3. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk be authoried to cast one ballot for Alfred Osborne for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Alfred Osborne elected a trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted that the Clerk be authoried to cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer, Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Upon motion of J. Hardy Legge that we raise the sum of \$5,000.00, Frank H. Peaslee offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$5,500.00. The amendment was carried.

Article 6. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that we raise the sum of \$75.00.

- Article 7. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted to raise the sum of \$1,374.44.
- Article 8. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.
- Article 9. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.
- Article 10. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 11. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted to dismiss the Article.
- Article 12. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the Weare Fire Department.
- Article 13. Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted to raise the sum of 100.00.
- Article 14. Upon motion of Gerald H. Hight, voted to have a committee of three appointed to contact the Insurance Commissioner and Underwriters to obtain a reduction in insurance rates. Gerald H. Hight, Charles F. Eastman and Theodore W. Flanders,, committee appointed.
- Article 15. Upon motion of Charles H. Stafford that we raise the sum of \$898.00. John F. Tierney offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$600.00. On a division vote, 127 voted in the affirmative and 123 in the negative and the amendment prevailed.
- Article 16. Upon motion of George A. Waterman to approve of the Water Resources Board rebuilding the Reservoir Dam.

Charles F. Eastman offered an amendment to the motion, that we approve of the Water Resources Board rebuilding the Reservoir Dam according to the blue prints as submitted last fall and the conditions drawn up by the Selectmen, and the Selectmen are to inspect the Dam at least once each year.

The amendment was carried.

Article 17. Upon motion of George M. Slack, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 18. Upon motion of J. Hardy Legge, voted to sell the Mead-Morrison Tractors.

Article 19. Upon motion of J. Hardy Legge that we raise the sum of \$50.00, Fred C. Jones offered an amendment to the motion to raise the sum of \$100.00. The amendment was carried.

Article 20. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 21. Upon motion of George M. Gunn to compel the Road Agents to get the grade from the nearest bank to where it is going to be put onto the road.

The motion was lost.

Upon motion of John F. Tierney, voted to allow the Taxpayers Association to ask for a hearing on flood control at East Weare.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Weare Town Hall, in said Weare, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
- 4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.
- 6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,414.14 to be used with the sum of \$5,656.55 to be furnished by the State.
 - 8. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,515.00 to be used with a like amount furnished by the State, for State Aid on the Deering Road.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to tar the two miles of black top road.
- 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the repair of Water Holes.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to erect a Fire House at East Weare.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for W. P. A. projects.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to build a foot bridge at Rockland.
- 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Forest Fires.
- 20. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Pine Blister Rust.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to appoint a committee to serve on the plan of the State Forestry Department.
- 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for new books for the Library.

- 24. To see if the town will vote to adopt the State Budget Law as a principle for Town expenditures.
- 25. To see if the town will order the Road Agents to keep a daily work sheet, showing where the work was done, the number employed, and the truck mileage, and the estimated cost. These records to be available for public inspection. The necessary books to be furnished and owned by the town.
- 26. To see if the town will recognize and order that its Road Agents shall be held strictly and solely responsible for both summer and winter roads.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to cut its own wood, for town purposes, at prevailing prices.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the "CHASE RECREATION PARK" at Weare Reservoir, as per agreement between Horace O. Chase, and Mildred Moultrop and the Town of Weare, and raise and appropriate money for the same; also to take any other vote relating thereto.
- 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1940 the department answered 20 calls: 13 chimney fires, 4 building fires, and 3 brush or grass fires. This is the least number of fires in any one year since 1934. Chimney fires make up the large majority and caused two of the four building fires. We have, when called to chimney fires, brought to the attention of owners or occupants of the buildings, defects and dangerous conditions existing in chimneys and stovepipes and have urged them to remedy these possible causes of fires.

Chimneys should be tight; have a clean-out door at the extreme bottom; and all unused thimble holes cemented up. It is important that chimney be kept free from accumulations of soot either on the sides of the flue or in the bottom.

The waterholes at Fessendenville and at the Burnett place were used with excellent results on building fires at these locations.

A survey was made of the condition of all the waterholes in town and with one or two exceptions they needed only brush cutting and fence repairs. The waterhole at Chase Village corner was cleaned out and enlarged and fences on other holes repaired with the appropriation for this work. More waterholes are needed.

It was decided to insure the three trucks and this was done. Protection was felt necessary for the men driving the equipment.

No new hose has been purchased for the past two years and as some of our hose is fourteen and fifteen years old, 500 feet of hose should be purchased this coming year.

The department held twelve monthly meetings and eight company drills in 1940. Average attendance at meetings was seventeen. That the people of the town are fire-minded is shown by the decreased number of fires and the small proportions to which the fires have been confined. This is very encouraging as we feel that fewer and smaller fires are a sign of the increased efficiency of the department. Cooperation makes this better protection possible and we wish to thank all who have helped achieve 1940's improved record.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

Three teachers are teaching in the district this year for the first time. Miss Margaret Schneider of Worcester, Massachusetts, came to take charge of the Home Economics course, and take over some other classes. Miss Schneider had taught two years before this present one.

Miss Doris Eckhardt of Manchester was graduated last June from the University of New Hampshire. Also, she has attended two summer's sessions at Middlebury College, Vermont, and is teaching English and other subjects.

Miss Gertrude Harney, of Melrose, Massachusetts, was graduated last June from the Massachusetts Teacher's College, and is teaching at the Center School.

The "Friends" School, and Riverdale School have been closed this year. In both cases, at the beginning of the year, the number of pupils in those districts did not warrant keeping them open when transportation was possible. Small schools always mean for pupils in those schools a very high "per capita" cost. A school costs about \$1,000 to operate whether there are 8 pupils or 28. The large group has other values which are not in the books, and which nothing can supply except experience in and with a larger group.

A state law requires that "physically handicapped" pupils who cannot attend school, shall receive at least two hours per week of instruction at home. This requirement is being carried out in the only case in the town.

The use of "Surplus Commodities" available for schools, has made possible substantial noon lunches for all who are at the high school building at the lunch period. The plan is carried out in a cooperative way. Miss Schneider, and the "Home Economics" girls plan menus, help in preparation and serving. Mrs. Elsie Purington has general charge. Pupils pay a nominal amount which helps to supply added articles of food and some bits of new equipment.

The response of pupils to this lunch, is rather convincing evidence that they really want a warm substantial lunch—or more.

Hot noon lunches are also provided at East Weare. As only one of the two rooms there is used for school purposes, the other is fitted out as a kitchen. The Grange has kindly loaned tables which are rather necessary. Miss Hazel Leach has direction of this group of about thirty pupils.

The entering age for Grade I follows a very general practice in this state. To enter Grade I in September, a child must be five years and eight months of age September first, or six years old on or before December thirty-first.

Practically all schools are using library facilities that are possible now. Your local library has cooperated in this. In addition to the books in the library here, books may be secured from the State Library Commission—also from the library at Plymouth Teachers' College, and also from the Manchester Public Library. Upon request by a teacher and affording information regarding grades and number of pupils, an assorted shipment of twenty or thirty or thirty-five books will be sent for a period of three months if desired that long. When those are re-

turned, another collection may be had. Some of the schools have made liberal use of this privilege. Sugar Hill, in the course of the year will have had approximately three hundred books—most all schools have had some. Their books include history, science, travel, and selected fiction. Of greater value than the books read, some children acquire a love of reading which may become a lasting habit.

During Book Week, at the Manchester Public Library in the fall, Miss Malfet and her pupils from Sugar Hill went in. They took a few compositions written at different times on different subjects, and a poem, and entered them in competition with others, from over one hundred contestants from elementary schools. Three prizes were to be awarded. Two of them came to the pupils of Sugar Hill School, besides honorable mention for another. It was a proud day for "Sugar Hill" and deserved recognition for this splendid work.

It is hardly possible for one who has not been following rather closely the work of schools in recent years, to realize what changes have come. How often the few parents who "visit schools" remark about the "attractive"—books there are today. This attractiveness naturally is the first thing to be noticed. But the difference from years ago is not merely in the attractiveness of books and their "covers."

In beginning reading years ago, it was felt almost necessary to know most if not all the letters of the alphabet before a child could think of reading. Today, a child may learn to read before ever hearing of the "A—B—C's". Some may still say it just can't be done. But not only can it be done, but is done everywhere. Children can soon build up a vocabulary so they can read simple stories about boys and girls like themselves, about pets and animals in which they all have an interest. The "word-list" gradually grows, increasing the range of the stories. As they go on they become accustomed to certain forms and sounds of

letters or combinations of letters. The ones most needed are learned as needed. After a time it comes about the alphabet has almost taken care of itself. Children are not interested in the "A—B—C's" as such. They are interested in the interesting stories.

In the "Readers" too the type of material has changed. You may remember or may have seen the Reader which began:

"In Adam's fall We sinned all."

The early readers had a large portion of religious material. The New England Primer had about 75% religious material, 13% moral material, and 12% secular material. A modern reader has about 2% religious material, 23% moral material, and 75% secular material. The religious material has become less and less until now it has almost disappeared. This is not an argument for or against its return. Rather a statement to illustrate this change in material.

Not only have the Readers changed in appearance, what's in them has just as radically changed.

Histories have changed. The long list of dates—the "facts"—or alleged facts—the data concerning campaigns and battles—ad infinitum—have pretty much passed as such. The emphasis now shifted to the meaning of it all, what idea was in it or through it, what outcome, what contribution has this individual or that movement made? The emphasis is on the importance and place of individuals, and ideas, that have become a part of our heritage.

Biography, re-written, as one we have of "Lincoln," a book, read and reread, until it's worn out. That biography, and others, have more inspiration than a memorized list of dates and unimportant happenings. Books come now, for schools, with such titles as "We, the Guardians of Liberty,"—a Lowell Thomas book—"Stand Fast for Liberty," reminding young people of the cost of our "rights"

and privileges," and the challenge, of real men, to safeguard them—and another "America My Home."

There is no "subject" in schools, that has not changed both in content and in method. Whether we like it or not, these changes have come. Material for children's books is not selected because adults feel it is "good for them"—but rather on the basis of child interests and abilities. "Methods" too have changed, not merely for the sake of change, but because trial and experiment have indicated the new or revised way is more effective.

Modern books—and modern ways—are in your schools. These are no "fads" certainly. But teachers in the elementary grades still teach reading and writing—and spelling and arithmetic and geography. The so-called "fundamentals." Not that all pupils acquire a high level of proficiency in these. Pupils vary in ability. For those who are able to accomplish additional work—more is provided. For those who find the subjects "hard" the endeavor is to adopt materials to their differing ranges. The emphasis now is more on what the pupil can do—rather than attempting to force them all into identical molds. And in all and through all to promote qualities of character that will lead young people to think of their responsibilities as well as to claim unyieldingly their rights and duties.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WEARE HIGH SCHOOL

February 20, 1941.

Mr. J. Byron Tarney, Superintendent of Schools, Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my report as Headmaster of Weare High School. This report deals briefly with the following topics:

Registration and Attendance, Student Council, Agriculture, Home Economics, Physical Education and Health, Music and other activities.

Registration and Attendance:

Our percent attendance for last year in both groups was a fraction of a point below the state average.

This year, in spite of the recent epidemic of the grippe, our percent attendance is to-date 95 and 93.6 in the two groups respectively. Last year our tardinesses per pupil in grades 9-12 were a fraction of a point less and in grades 7-8 slightly higher than that for the state. I believe that in most cases absence and tardiness has been unavoidable—a condition for which pupils and parents should be commended.

Pupils not absent or tardy last year were: Phyllis Ilsley, Marjorie Berry, Evelyn Perkins, Ruth Gregg, and Allen Ilsley.

Perfect attendance this year to-date includes, Phyllis Ilsley, Allen Ilsley, Ellen Bean, Evangeline Powers, Helen Greggs, Robert Rice, Virginia Rice. Present indications show that the total enrollment for next year will be considerably higher.

Student Council. In an effort to encourage the pupils to practice the basic fundamental principles of our Democracy we have a student council which is composed of representatives from each of the six classes within the school. The council members are encouraged to express the opinions of the group relative to our school government.

Agriculture. There are at present twenty-eight boys in the agricultural department which number includes all but three boys in school in grades 9-12. The agricultural supervised practice programs include: poultry, dairy, sheep, swine, bees, small fruit, potatoes and general gardening enterprises. Instruction trips to surrounding farms have made possible our judging activities as well as practical experience in various farm operations. For example, various class groups have actually performed the following operations: pruned apple trees, controlled apple tree borers, set and mulched strawberry plants, set forest seedling and shrubbery, slaughtered and dressed swine, beef and poultry, docked sheep, handled and packed bees.

The new bench saw in the shop in addition to considerable remodeling of benches, etc., has made possible a continuation of farm shop work which should prove to be very beneficial to the fifty boys who use these facilities.

The Weare Chapter of Future Farmers of America exhibited its Agricultural and shop work at Hopkinton Fair from which individuals received cash prizes totalling \$35.00 and \$49.00 during the past two years respectively. In 1939 the school won first place in the Agricultural ex-

hibit and third place in 1940. Last fall the Junior High school manual training exhibit won first place. Boys having poultry projects exhibited eggs in the High School class at the annual State Egg and Baby Chick Show. Their combined score won first place in competition with other schools.

Other activities participated in by the Weare Chapter of Future Farmers of America have been: The State Agricultural Prize Speaking Contest, local Father and Son Banquet, various regional F. F. A. get-togethers and the series of F. F. A. radio broadcasts from W. F. E. A. in Manchester. Four boys won two hundred-fifty baby chicks in the State Hubbard Farm Contest which was based on flock records.

In addition to the regular school activities a series of fifteen agricultural evening meetings were held during the winter of 1940 for out-of-school young men. There was an average attendance of fourteen at each meeting. This year, to replace the evening agricultural meeting, a National Defense shop program on auto-mechanics is underway with an enrollment of about 20.

Home Economics. This year the home economics department offered the study of "The Family and Its Members" for the junior and senior girls, and the study of "Foods and Nutrition" for the freshman and sophomore girls.

The "family group" studied the home and its relationship to the community, and vocations for women. Included in the child care unit were the selection and construction of children's garments. The course concluded with a study of home care of the sick.

The class in foods studied the selection and preservation of foods, and the planning, preparing, and serving of nutritious family meals. Some time was spent on kitchen arrangements and meals for special occasions. All this work was accomplished by practical work in the laboratory. These girls have had valuable experience assisting in the preparing and serving of noon lunches. Both groups made field trips as they fitted in with their program.

The laboratory equipment was augmented by many small utensils and a few large kettles for noon lunch purposes. The sewing machines were serviced and put in excellent running condition.

A home economics club called the Future Farmerettes of Weare High School was organized in the fall. This club sponsored a Hallowe'en social, outside speakers, packed a Thanksgiving basket for an ill classmate and did various types of handiwork.

Physical Education and Health. Our physical education program consists of regular out-of-door periods each week during the spring and fall for supervised playground activities including calesthenics for grade 7-8. The usual basketball and baseball schedules have been carried on. This year all members of the basketball squads were given physical examinations by a medical doctor. Periodically, visits and examinations have been made by our school nurse. Ping-pong tables constructed in the school shop provided recreation during the lunch period.

Music. During the past year we have scheduled a regular music period each week for grades 7-8 and elective period for those in grades 9-12. There are about twenty-five in the latter group.

Other Activities. Three public three-act plays are presented each year by the various organizations within the school.

The usual annual school paper "The Reflector" is published each year. School socials are held occasionally for the promotion of desirable group relationship and social consciousness which is so important to the best individual development of the pupil.

Assembly programs are prepared and presented by the various groups under the direction of their respective faculty advisors every two weeks.

Of the thirteen members of the class which graduated last June there are now two attending the State University, one at Plymouth Teachers' College, one at Hesser Business College, one is studying airplane mechanics at Boston, one has enlisted in the army and two are taking post-graduate work in our high school for further preparation to continue their education. Others have gained useful employment in the community.

I am glad of this opportunity to express my appreciation for the generous cooperation I have received during the past two years from the Superintendent, School Board, teachers, pupils and other citizens.

40 pupils were found to have defective vision—32 cases were corrected.

170 pupils were found to have defective teeth—140 received correction.

23 pupils were found to have diseased tonsils—8 cases were corrected.

1 pupil was found to have a nasal obstruction, treatment arranged.

1 pupil suffered a broken arm. There were two with a crippled foot.

1 pupil suffered a broken ankle. There was one with a crippled arm.

1 pupil suffered a broken leg.

There were 6 who had an appendectomy.

There were 3 with a chronic appendix.

There was 1 case of pneumonia; 1 chicken pox; 16 whooping cough cases.

2 pupils attended the heart clinic at the District Nursing Association.

Arranged for a girl to attend the tubercular clinic.

Arranged for a girl to attend the mental hygiene clinic for a nervous disorder.

The Weare High School and East Weare School is taking advantage of the surplus commodities made possible through the Federal Government and hot noon lunches are being enjoyed by over 80 pupils.

The other schools are having fruit furnished through the same source.

A baby clinic was held October 9, 1940. There were no toxoid treatments given the school children at this time.

About 35 children are taking cod liver oil during the winter months.
