REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

In accordance with law, the school year embraced in this report closed July 15, 1912. The treasurer's report, however, is for the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1913.

Eleven schools have been maintained an average of thirty weeks. The largest enrollment of pupils in any of these schools was thirty-seven, and the smallest, five. The total enrollment for the year was 182. The per cent. of attendance has not been as high as it should have been in some of the schools. Every pupil should make an effort to be in school and do his work every day the school is in session. Parents should see to it that no child is kept from school unless health conditions demand it. Tardy and irregular attendance results in loss to the scholar and is a hindrance to the advancement of others.

The result of the year's work was very satisfactory. The supervision of the schools for the year this part of our report covers was under the care of Supt. E. J. Best, who was faithful and competent in the discharge of his duties and who left the schools in good condition for the following year's work.

Mr. H. S. Willis resigned his position on the school board at the close of the school year, and the other members of the board appointed Mrs. Kate S. Hill to fill the vacancy until the next annual school meeting.

We feel that the time has now come when some changes can be made in our school work that will result in the acquirement of information on new subjects that will be practical and useful. We would not advocate any innovation that would lessen the efficiency of our pupils in the subjects of reading, spelling, language, writing, numbers, history and geography. Our children need all the proficiency they can gain in these subjects during the time spent in our schools. Nothing will stand out so prominently to the credit of the teacher and to the ability and faithful work of the pupil as a ready knowledge of the fundamentals of education.

When we consider that human beings are created with dual natures, the animal or physical, and the mental or spiritual, and that a symmetrical development of these fundamental existences is essential to the highest proficiency of the individual, it is the rational thing to do for our school children to provide them with work that will develop and educate their muscles as well as their minds.

The courses pursued in our schools now are good, but let us round them out. As a beginning, let us add elementary agriculture in the spring. Let the boys and girls alike take part in this work under the direction of their teacher. A small plot of land on the school lot or near by it should be obtained and prepared for planting. It should then be staked out into small rectangular sections, one of these sections to be allotted to each pupil. The variety of vegetable and flower seeds should be decided upon and procured and at the proper time the planting done, each child doing his own planting and caring for his own section. Further details need not be entered into here.

Later, manual training might be introduced for the boys and needlework for the girls. Something in the line of needlework has already been done in some of our schools. The children were delighted with the work and their parents were pleased to see how well they could do it.

Our children stay in the elementary schools at least eight years. We should make these school homes healthful and attractive, and so direct the work that it will be pleasurable and profitable and never become drudgery.

On account of not receiving state aid for school purposes this year, we were obliged to close our schools at the end of eighteen weeks. This means that our next term, which is the last term in this school year, must continue twelve weeks in order to maintain our standing of former years.

The schoolhouse on Tory hill, which had been closed eight years, was opened at the beginning of the current year and a school established there for the nine children then living in that locality—five boys and four girls. Four of the children under six years of age had not attended school before. The progress made by these children in reading in eighteen weeks is convincing evidence of the superiority of the new methods of starting beginners.

To obtain best results in all our schools it needs the co-operation of parents, pupils, teachers and school boards.

On our visits we found the schools orderly, the pupils busy

and reciting intelligently, the teachers animated and following well arranged programs. In fact, we feel that all of our citizens may cherish a just sense of pride in the quality of our children and in the ability and faithful work of their teachers.

SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

During the past year, judging from results, work along all lines has been most gratifying, and our high school is keeping pace with the time. At the close of the school year in June we were deprived of the services of Prof. Joy, who had been with us for six years, and who left us much to the regret of the town and the friends of the school. But the new principal, Prof. W. Lewis Roberts of Goffstown, is proving himself the right man in the right place. He has already given us assurance that the school is not to fall back but is bound to go forward under his management. He is ably seconded by the new assistant, Miss Myrtie M. Burdette of Lynn, Mass., who succeeds Miss Marian D. Leach, and by Mrs. Florence T. Davis, who is completing her fifth year as instructor in the commercial department.

The annual graduating exercises of the class of 1912 occurred at the town hall on June 14th. The class consisted of but two members, Misses Edith M. Smith and Jennie V. Whytock. The following were the winners of the \$2.50 gold pieces, offered as prizes for scholarship by F. M. Colby: Edith Smith, Marguerite Goodhue, N. Grace Roby, Bernice Sawyer and Vada Whytock. Esther Davis was awarded a gold pen and holder for showing the greatest improvement in penmanship.

The annual reunion of the alumni association was held at the town hall in the evening. The larger part of the program was furnished by the Colonial Orchestral club of Boston, assisted by Miss Rosel'ih Adams Knapp, reader, of Boston.

Fourteen new pupils were admitted at the beginning of the school year, and the average attendance of pupils has been 42. Of these about the usual number are non-resident. The graduating class for next June numbers seven, four girls and three boys.

In the manual training department needlework and wood-working have received special attention. Mrs. Davis has given the young ladies daily instruction in all kinds of stitches in hand sewing, and considerable work has been done in making aprons, handkerchiefs, pillowslips and towels.

The boys have accomplished quite a good deal in the little shop. All the native woods have been studied, numerous articles for the home have been constructed, and tools put in good shape, such as knives, axes, saws and hammers. In addition to this, some of the boys, a little more ambitious, made fine oak bookcases and mission desks, and one boy made a large, swinging, porch couch or settle.

We are trying to keep up the school to the same high level it has always maintained. It is necessary to maintain a high standard of scholarship in order to keep the name of the Simonds Free High School on the list of secondary schools approved by State Superintendent Morrison, and to retain the privilege of admission to colleges without examinations. To aid in doing this it has been deemed best to adopt the rule followed in many other institutions of learning, namely to drop from the school enrollment the names of pupils who at any time fail to pass on two or more subjects where such failure is due to lack of application or lack of ability.

To allow a pupil to continue in school in the former case is encouraging the formation of habits which will be a hindrance to him in after life. In the latter case it is a loss of time for the pupil to try to do high school work before he is prepared for it.

The effect of this rule in the case of the half-year course in commercial arithmetic is very encouraging. Before the adoption of this rule there were several members of the class who were not doing work of the required standard. The work of these pupils improved after the adoption of the rule and all successfully completed the course except one. So satisfactory a result has not before been attained since the present teacher has been in charge of the commercial department.

The Simonds Free High School is our most valued institution. To preserve it, to sustain its high character, and to make it best conserve the objects designed by its founders should be a sacred duty and a trust to every citizen of Warner. What it has accomplished in the past cannot be measured; what it may accomplish in the future is beyond conception.

PILLSBURY FREE LIBRARY.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Trustees of the Pillsbury Free Library:

The statistics for the year ending Feb. 11th are as follows: Cards issued, 502; books taken out, 7645; magazines taken out, 666; books purchased, 231; added by binding, 21; gifts from individuals, 34; received from fines, \$4.31; class of books borrowed, 1st fiction, 2d juvenile, 3d biography, 4th miscellaneous, 5th literature and poetry, 6th travel, 7th history, 8th science and education, 9th religion.

Donors of books: Doubleday, Page & Co., New York; Mrs. Harriet Prescott Spofford, Amesbury, Mass.; L. M. Zimmermann, Baltimore; Slason Thompson, Chicago; Miss Frances M. Abbott, Concord; Miss Helen F. Sawyer, Boston; Wm. S. Carter, Lebanon; Mrs. Tillie K. Angus, Mrs. M. T. Ela, Andrew J. Hook, Paul T. Page, Dr. George T. Page, Fred Myron Colby. The largest gift was from Wm. S. Carter—\$25.00 worth of new books in memory of his mother. Mrs. Ela, Mr. Page, Dr. Page and Mr. Colby always remember the library. Mr. Hook's gift was the History of Cornish, in two volumes, a valuable work. Town histories are always most acceptable. Public documents have also been received.

The publishers have continued to send the Semi-Weekly Statesman, N. H. Farmer, Mirror and Farmer, Newport Argus and Spectator, N. H. Issue, Bulletin N. H. Public Libraries, Our Four-footed Friends, Kearsarge Independent and Times.

From individuals we have: Brown Alumni Monthly, Alfred Cloues; Our Dumb Animals, Miss Harris; Youth's Companion, Miss Martha Oliver; Christian Science Monthly, J. W. Clement; Bulletin Tilton Seminary, Prof. Plimpton; Our Paper, Lawrence Mitchell.

Periodicals furnished by the library: American Magazine,

Atlantic Monthly, Century, Country Life, The Dial, Granite Monthly, Harper's Bazar, Weekly and Monthly, Ladies' Home Journal, McClure's, New England, Outing, Review of Reviews, Scientific American, Scribner's, St. Nicholas, World's Work.

It is hardly necessary to say that the library is in a prosperous condition as usual. Since February, 1911, there have been 195 new readers, making the total number of different borrowers since the library was started 2437. Of course, as every librarian knows, the number of books taken out does not show how many have been read. The remark is sometimes made, "I didn't read it," and again, from more than one, "I have read it twice I liked it so much." In many families about town there is a good deal of reading aloud.

There have been no special changes in methods. The library clubs suggest various things at their meetings, but we find that the best of them we have already proved; others it is hardly advisable to adopt. For instance, some library workers advocate getting rid of books that have gone by, perhaps "best sellers" of their day, and replacing them with new publications—not let the shelf room be taken up with old-fashioned books, in fact have an occasional "clearance." If that idea was carried too far perhaps Cooper and Scott would sometime be eliminated. That plan would not work in this library. Very often some educated, cultivated person wishes for some of the books they used to read, like Mrs. Wister's translations or Miss Mulock's novels. One of this class takes Dickens instead of one of the new novels—another Jane Austen's works. We have recently been asked to buy one or two of Miss Bremer's. One never knows what will be called for; it may be Pollok's *Course of Time*, *The Shepherd of Salisbury Plain*, *White's Selborne*, or *George Meredith's Letters*, or *Winston Churchill's latest*—whatever it is, we like to say we have it. A public library should not be a mere circulating library, but so far as practicable a storehouse of the best literature of the past, as well as the best of the new.

Another subject which has caused much discussion in library circles is the large amount of fiction read, and how to reduce it, but most people know best what they wish to read. One man reads nothing but novels, another travel or history. One earnest, hard-working minister asked for "a good novel to read Sunday night." One man, thoroughly informed on all the topics of the day, never read but one novel in his life.

It will be observed in the statistics that aside from fiction,

and what the young people read, biography has made an advance—coming next.

Before closing this report a word must be said about the boys, our future citizens, who feel so much interest in the library. Quiet, gentlemanly, obliging, ready and eager to help if anything is wanted of them. No matter what entertainment is "coming off" on "library night" they come for their books first, and they read good books and recommend them to one another.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The general health of the community for the year 1912 has been above the average and as a consequence the duties of the board of health have not been necessarily arduous. Quarantine has been established in a few sporadic cases of measles and chicken-pox, but has not been of a serious nature.

The water supply of our village has occupied the attention of the board to a great measure. The small capacity of the reservoir for storage purposes caused the installation of a drilled well located near the North Village schoolhouse as an aid to the present supply. A depth of three hundred feet was reached, most of the distance being through solid rock. A plentiful supply of water was obtained as was evidenced by a convincing pumping test. Water stands in the well at a distance of fourteen feet from the surface and will probably be added to the reservoir by pump or siphon. This we hope will insure abundance of water at all times of the year. The board however still advocates the excavation of the upper one-third of the present reservoir the better to insure quality as well as quantity.

The attention of the board has been called to the disposal of sewage by means of surface drains and the prevalence of earth privies in the closely settled sections. These evils are best remedied by sewer connection and the installation of water closets, which has been done in many instances at our recommendation. Those remote from our sewage system can best attend to this oft neglected matter by the arrangement of cess-pool and closet which must drain away from the well which is too frequently not the case.

Our town abounds in natural and artificial advantages. Let us then by means of good food, proper exercise, suitable clothing, and excellent care of the individual, particularly during changeable weather, prevent illness and thereby improve the public health of the town of Warner.
