RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 10, 1942

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 10th day of March 1942 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by the Moderator Alfred Osborne.

Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisor.

Whole number of names on the Checklist, 829.

Article 1. Upon motion of George A. Waterman, voted to keep the Polls open until 6 o'clock.

Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast 360 — Blanks 6.

Frank H. Peaslee had 314 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

Sawver, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Theodore W. Flanders for Auditor. Upon motion of J. Arlene Porter, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Charles F. Eastman for Auditor. Upon motion of J. Arlene Porter, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Gordon F. Boynton for Auditor. This being done the Moderator declared Theodore W. Flanders, Charles F. Eastman and Gordon F. Boynton elected Auditors for the Town of Weare. Upon motion of James L. Hills, the Moderator requested the voters present to unite in silent prayer, as evidence of our respect to our late Frank L. Article 2. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to raise the sum of \$9,000 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the clerk cast one ballot for Elwin L. Hardy for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Elwin L. Hardy elected a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Helen E. Dearborn, Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Helen E. Dearborn elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones to raise the sum of \$6,000 George A. Waterman offered an amendment to raise the sum of \$5,500. The amendment was lost. The motion was carried.

Article 6. Upon motion of Clarence E. Leeds, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 7. Upon motion of Wilbur W. Kamp, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

Article 8. Upon motion of Chester W. French, voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.

Article 9. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of \$1,504.00. Provided that the road be

built between South Weare Village and Perkins Corner. Beginning near the South Weare Garage.

Article 10. Upon motion of J. Arlene Porter, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of \$400 for W. P. A. projects.

Article 12. Upon motion of Chester W. French, voted to raise the sum of \$800 for the Weare Fire Department.

Article 13. Upon motion of John Walsh, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for the repair of water holes.

Article 14. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of \$200 for Band Concerts.

Article 15. Upon motion of Wilbur W. Kamp, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for new books for the Library.

Article 16. Upon motion of Denton Dearborn, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 17. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for the police and health departments.

Article 18. Upon motion of J. Arlene Porter, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for use at the Chase Recreation Park.

Upon motion of Frank E. Davis, voted that the town accept the Deed for a piece of land bought by subscription joining the land at the Chase Recreation Park.

Article 19. Upon motion of Chester W. French, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to administer or dispose

of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collectors deeds.

Article 20. Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted that we raise the sum of \$200 to finish the toilet system in the Town Hall. The job to be in perfect working order before it is paid for. To be let by contract and finished within sixty days from the date of the contract.

Article 21. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 22. Upon motion of Channing Rowell, voted to raise the sum of \$150 for use in erecting a Fire House at East Weare.

Article 23. Informal motion. Upon motion of Samuel D. Chase, voted to relocate the road at Nichols Hill, so called, to its original route of travel.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
- 4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
 - 7. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1414.92 to be used with the sum of \$5659.66 to be furnished by the State.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of water holes.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to complete the East Weare Fire House.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.
- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for new books for the Library.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for police and health departments, due to the emergency.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for use at the Chase Recreation Park. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 19. To see what action the Town will take to have the Moderator appoint a committee to get data for a Supplement to the Town History, and raise and appropriate the money for same.
- 20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the care and improvement of Town Cemeteries, and raise and appropriate the money for same.

- 21. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to establish a Canning Center, and take any other vote relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Pine Blister Rust.
- 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to establishing "Water Bars" on the hills that have been repeatedly washed out by floods.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to repeal the Australian Ballot system now in use by the Town ,and adopt the new Non-partisan Ballot as passed by the 1943 legislature.
- 26. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

During 1942, nineteen calls were answered by the department as follows: 15 chimney fires; 3 building fires; 1 truck fire.

The fire which destroyed William Lahey's barn was the only fire of the year to do any appreciable damage. The remainder of the fires were all small and damage was only slight in all instances. Prompt reporting of fires and quick responses were responsible for keeping these fires small.

Loss of property from fire is a serious matter and is more so today under the war conditions when materials lost cannot be replaced. Everyone should be doubly fire-conscious and careful so that fires may be prevented.

During 1942, the Department held twelve monthly meetings and twelve drills. Attendance at meetings has been good. Firemen have responded well to fires but we have been seriously handicapped by the loss of ten of our regular men to the armed forces.

The Auxiliary Fire Department which was organized and trained this past year has proved very valuable at fires. The Auxiliary held twelve meetings and numerous drills and has reached a high degree of efficiency. At present about thirty active members are enrolled in the auxiliary force.

With our appropriations and the cooperation of the Selectmen we now have a fire station at East Weare. While not completed, this building greatly improves the housing of the equipment stationed at that village.

The waterholes at Fessenden's and Berry's were cleaned out and brush removed and fences repaired at most of the holes. Our present method of improving several holes each year keeps these sources of water in very good condition.

The river at both North and East Weare presents a problem of getting near enough to it in the winter season to draw water with our pumpers. We are trying to maintain the best service possible in spite of the loss of many men and the difficulties resulting from the gasoline and rubber shortages, and appreciate the cooperation we have received this past year.

Article 11. On motion of Chester W. French, voted that the budget for next year be submitted to the Finance Committee, and recommendations be brought to the School Meeting.

On motion of Harold E. Dean, voted that the School Board be instructed to hire married teachers if they have higher qualifications, for the duration of the war.

On motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted that this meeting give a rising vote of thanks to Frank H. Peaslee for offering to give the district the old North Weare depot.

The minutes of the meeting have been read.

Moved by Harold E. Dean, and seconded, that the School Board be instructed to submit a minimum and maximum salary schedule to the next School Meeting, and make the budget in accordance with that schedule. Motion lost.

On motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted that this meeting be now adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Several changes in our teaching staff have occurred since last year. In Weare High School Miss Charlotte Dunbar of Newport, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, was engaged to teach Home Economics in place of Miss Hope Lincoln who left during the summer to accept a business position in Springfield, Vermont.

Miss Mabel Kendall of Antrim, also a graduate of Keene Teachers College, replaced Miss Margaret Robinson at the Weare Center School after Miss Robinson resigned to be married.

In East Weare, Miss Josephine Peary replaced Miss Ruth Stafford when the latter resigned to accept another teaching position in Massachusetts. Miss Peary is from Woburn, Massachusetts, and is a graduate of Lowell Teachers College.

At Sugar Hill, Miss Evelyn Conway replaced Miss Mildred Irving. Miss Conway, whose home is in Manchester, is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College and has had teaching experience at Webster and Newbury.

In November, Headmaster Johnathan A. Osgood was elected to the position of Superintendent of Schools in the Epping Supervisory Union. He left with the best wishes of all his associates. During the time he was in Weare High School he made a real contribution to the school and to the community.

We were fortunate in securing John A. Dodds, Jr. for our new Headmaster. Mr. Dodds is a graduate of the University of Vermont and has had five years experience as teacher of Agriculture at Stowe High School, Stowe, Vermont. He is married and has two children. He assumed his duties December 7, 1942.

The enrollment last year as will be seen by the table at the end of this report was 239. This figure compares with 259 the year before. The largest drop in enrollment was in South Weare, with smaller decreases at Weare Center, East Weare and Sugar Hill. The Weare High School membership increased slightly.

The lunch programs which operated so successfully had to cease at the end of December when W.P.A. projects terminated. A hot lunch program is now operating at the high school under the sponsorship of the Weare Parent Teachers Association. The other schools are receiving what surplus commodities are available.

Modern reading materials for the second and third grades have been furnished all schools. Language books for the elementary grades have been purchased and worn books have been replaced. Several repairs or replacements of equipment have been effected.

The age for entrance to Grade I is five years and eight months September 1, or six years on or before the next January 1. This is a standard generally recommended in New Hampshire and followed in most school districts.

Detailed information concerning Weare High School will be found in Headmaster Dodd's report. Conditions in the high school are good and work is progressing smoothly.

Schools continue to be affected by war conditions. The shortage of teachers grows more acute in rural districts. What teachers are available seek positions first in larger communities or in consolidated schools where pay is better, where work is in single grades or subjects, and where transportation facilities are available. Many schools in the state opened last September with substitute teachers. Many others have lost teachers during the school year, replacing them with great difficulty. The situation facing us for another school year will be even more serious.

Our teachers as a group have been loyal to their schools and children. They have met ever increasing demands cheerfully with labor on rationing, scrap drives, and many other programs. They have worked hard in the face of petty difficulties, increased costs of living, more taxes and personal worries. Their work is not spectacular and dramatic, but it is basically important to our community and nation. They merit a tribute for their splendid loyalty and cooperation.

Educational opportunities for our children must be maintained to the fullest possible extent. Children grow continuously. They cannot wait. They cannot re-live these years through which we are passing. They must not lose the benefit of good schools. Even though teachers in several fields may be scarce, materials often difficult to obtain, and war demands on the schools ever increasing, all effort will be made to keep school work at as high a standard as possible.

Cooperation of parents, other citizens, and members of the school organization has helped materially during a critical school year. It is thoroughly appreciated.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WEARE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Harlan Atherton, Supt. of Schools. Dear Mr. Atherton:

In submitting the annual report of the Headmaster of Weare High School may I say that due to my short period of contact with the school this year's report will deal more with the present or near past and future than with the larger proportion of the time since last year's report which occurred before my becoming Headmaster.

I can report that the enrollment this year consisted of thirty-one students in the Junior High School and sixty-eight students in the Senior High School. Of this number ninety-six are still officially enrolled, three having either transferred or left for other reasons.

The normally high percentage of attendance has been lowered somewhat this year due to students being excused for special Agricultural labor (not officially listed as an absence) to the persistant danger of scarlet fever during the fall and early winter period and to an increased need for students at home for work usually taken care of by labor from some other source.

It is encouraging to note that in spite of these pressing needs there is every indication that parents generally are making every effort to keep their children in school. The school fully appreciates this attitude and our policy of excusing students who are doing satisfactory work in school for necessary work out of school and helping them with make-up work, will continue.

As we all fully realize there has been a continual increase in the emphasis placed on the one job, that is most important to all of us; that of winning the war.

Schools have felt this increased emphasis in many ways and are making every effort to cooperate.

This effort to cooperate has caused a number of changes

in the regular school program at Weare High School and we expect, will continue to make it necessary to revise.

Besides the effect on attendance already mentioned, there is a decided lessening of most types of school activities. Parties have been and will be very limited; dramatical presentations have had to be postponed or cancelled and inter-school athletic events have been reduced to one day of competition.

Because they are considered more valuable in relation to our present needs we are attempting to substitute in place of these things, courses or programs, which have a more direct connection with the war effort. Among this last group comes our "Physical Fitness" program, which is along the lines recommended by the War Department and State Education Department and emphasizes general physical development especially of our lack of proper facilities for the best type of program we are making considerable progress toward supplying this requested activity.

I would like to extend an invitation to all townspeople to feel free to suggest ways in which we can be of greater service in our common efforts of winning the war and educating our young people.

I would also like to make known my personal appreciation for the cooperation I have had from all, connected with the school.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

In submitting my annual report I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Superintendent, members of the School Board, and the teachers for their interest and kind cooperation in the health work of our schools.

In the work with the school children we have had and continue to have the support and understanding of our teachers who are actively interested in the corrections, at least, of the most outstanding and common physical defects found in the pupils such at teeth, tonsils, vision and hearing. In our districts there may be children with certain other serious defects who may seem to need special attention and the teachers many times bring it to my attention.

Time and service is being given by physicians and hospitals in New Hampshire in an endeavor to bring health to the crippled children of our state. A free orthopedic clinic is carried on each week in Manchester and is financed by the Crippled Children's Service.

Other clinics available to our children are the eye, ear, throat, heart, thyroid, and a tubercular clinic. A dental clinic was held November 6-7, 1941.

Diseased tonsils 27—defects corrected 5.

There were 3 heart cases.

There were 3 scarlet fever cases—Summer of 1941.

There was 1 appendectomy.

There were 9 chicken pox cases.

Accompanied 1 to the tonsil clinic.

Dr. Fraser examined all of the high school pupils also 7th and 8th grades. Doctor also examined all those who wished to play basketball, and this month is examining all who are to participate in the "Physical Fitness Program." Especial attention will be given to the heart, lungs, blood-pressure and to any sensitiveness in the abdomen.

This physical education program is being prepared for all normal boys and girls. It is a war time program planned to contribute to the physical fitness of high school pupils as a part of the war effort.

Hot noon lunches were prepared and enjoyed by the pupils.


