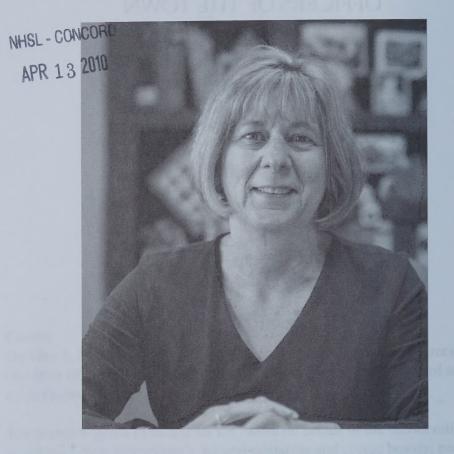

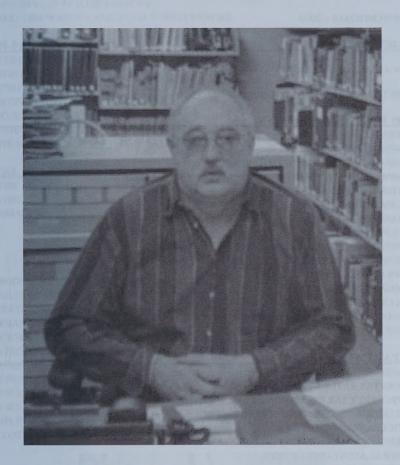
It is with much appreciation that we dedicate this year's Annual Town Report to Margaret Marschner, Director of the Conway Public Library from 1970-2009.

Once again this has been a very busy year for all of the boards, committees and commissions within the Town of Conway. The people who serve on these boards, committees and commissions are to be commended for all the work they do, with the best interest of the town being their main objective. Many times they are only recognized when someone disagrees with a decision that has been made, when in fact they probably have made a lot more that the majority agrees with and never say a word about. My point is, they are trying, so once in awhile tell them you appreciate them and thank them for serving the community and for making it what it is.

The building of a new Town Garage is the hot topic for this year. While there is no doubt that the need for a new building exists, the cost is the big issue. I encourage you to support the Warrant Article that is on the ballot asking for the passage of a \$600,000 bond to build the new garage. Should the bond fail, we will have to put approximately \$150,000 to \$200,000 into the old building to make it safe and bring it up to code. That would be like trying to make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. Thank you in advance for your consideration of this matter.

Taxes will always be a top priority of the Board. The balancing of needs and expectations is not an easy endeavor. We work diligently to provide the best possible services with the monies available to do so. Through the excellent work of town staff, we are able to

achieve this goal. Once again we remind you that the Board of Selectmen has no statutory authority allowing it to intercede in educational issues. When approached, we have offered suggestions and services to try and reduce expenses for the taxpayers of the Town of Conway.

Recycling continues to be a success, with the addition of certain electronic items. The process continues to move forward with the volume being moved to the Landfill significantly reduced, and the recycled materials going to market on the rise. We thank you all for your efforts in making this happen.

The past year once again has been a very busy one, for all involved with the day to day operations of Town. The dedicated individuals who make it all come together are to be both thanked and commended for making this community what it is. The Board of Selectmen continues to rely heavily on them for input and direction when dealing with matters that are governed by the ever changing Federal and State Laws. This Board would like to thank the citizens and taxpayers of Conway for their continued input and support.

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

I would first like to recognize the work that our Executive Secretary, Karen Hallowell, does each year in overseeing the publication of our Town Report. I am sure you will all agree that each year she has consistently produced an attractive and informative report.

The past year was very challenging from a financial perspective. As we began the new year, we were confronted with a global economic depression and a resulting decline in non-tax revenue. Facing the same challenges, the State of New Hampshire, began to look at balancing its budget by, among other things, reducing financial support to municipalities. In particular, the State was considering eliminating the portion of the Room and Meals Tax remitted to local communities. All in all, the potential reductions amounted to over \$600,000 (although there were offsets proposed in the form of additional school funding).

Responding to the general economic situation and to the potential reduction in state aid, the Board of Selectmen decreased the operating budget significantly. This was done largely by reducing funding to Capital Reserve Accounts. These are accounts that are used to fund current year projects and to save money for future projects and capital equipment purchases. Reductions in these funds for one year will have little effect on the ongoing construction and vehicle replacement plans provided funding is restored in subsequent years (The Board has, in fact, proposed increases to these funds for 2010). In addition, the Board placed a number of road projects on hold until the State budget was adopted and we were sure of the level of funding we would receive. As it turned out, the State funded an amount equal to the Room and Meals Tax but did reduce other aid by a little over \$100,000. The Board then directed staff not to spend approximately \$100,000 of the total funding that had been budgeted for paving projects. This meant that we paved fewer roads than had been planned. The intention of the Board of Selectmen was to leave this \$100,000 unexpended so that it would be deposited in our fund balance at year end. This would then mean that it would be available for use in funding the 2010 budget.

As luck would have it, mother nature smiled on us (at least from a non-skier/non-snowmobiler perspective). From the late winter of 2009 to mid-December 2009, we had the longest period without needing to plow or salt roads in years. This led to significant savings in labor and materials in the Public Works Department. Overall (including the \$100,000 paving reduction,) we ended the year about \$175,000 under budget. In addition, our revenues exceeded projections by over \$312,000 (I should note that about \$220,000 of this was a result of an amount reserved to fund potential settlements in tax appeal cases that did not settle in 2009).

What this means is that close to \$500,000 will be contributed to the Town's Fund balance for the 2009 budget year. These funds will potentially be available for the Board of Selectmen to use to offset the 2010 tax rate and to again fund a reserve for tax abatement cases.

One of the highlights of the year was certainly the work the town crew did in rebuilding Mechanic Street. I know that this was something I have been looking forward to for the ten years that I have lived in Conway and I know there are many of you that have felt that way for much longer. This project had been scheduled for some time to coincide with the utility work

that the North Conway Water Precinct had planned. The utility work occurred this past summer which meant we could then undertake the reconstruction project. Paul DegliAngeli, Andrew Smith, and the entire crew did a great job in creating a new street profile and overseeing paving, drainage, and sidewalk construction. Our crew did a great job on the granite retaining walls as well. Their efforts have made for a safer and more attractive addition to our community.

Our Assessing staff (Tom Holmes, Assessor, Dale Schofield, Assistant Assessor, and Crawford Butler, Field Technician) saved taxpayers hundreds of thousands of dollars by successfully completing a state mandated revaluation of all taxable property in town entirely in-house without having to hire specialists and contractors. This was especially challenging in view of the declining market and weak economy.

Rhoda Quint, our Town Clerk/Tax Collector, was elected by her peers as president of the New Hampshire Association. It is nice to know that her fellow tax collectors hold her in as high regard as do we, her fellow residents. Not to be outdone, Nancy Leavitt, our Deputy Clerk/Tax Collector completed several years of study and training and became a certified Town Clerk/Tax Collector through the state association. And last but not least, after two years of hard work, Finance Director Lucy Philbrick, has completed the Leadership Institute training offered through the New Hampshire Local Government Center.

This past year also saw the retirement of Margaret Marschner after 39 years as our town Library Director. She will be missed by all. On the upside, however, we can now look forward to working with Tara Thomas as she embarks on her career as Library Director for the Town of Conway—she only has 38 years to go!

And finally, I must point out that Mike Lane our Assistant Recreation Director not only managed to help John Eastman and the Recreation Department do their usual great job putting on an exemplary Recreation Program but managed to coach the Kennett High School Hockey Team to a State championship as well.

Our thanks to all of these people and to our entire staff for their dedication and hard work during the last year.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.1.6.10.1.2.1; §147.13.2.6.10.1.2.1; §147.13.3.6.10.1.2.1; §147.13.4.6.10.1.2.1; §147.13.5.6.7.1.2.1; §147.13.6.7.7.1.2.1; §147.13.7.6.7.1.2.1; §147.13.10.6.7.1.2.1; §147.13.10.6.7.1.2.1; and §147.13.12.7.10.1.2.1, to increase the sign permit application fee from \$35 to \$60. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Planning Board (0-6-0). FAILED 240-938.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 4 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.5.2.5.3 to reduce the number of dwelling units per acre from 12 to 8 and to allow the property to be serviced by an approved NHDES sewerage and waste disposal system. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Planning Board (6-0-0). PASSED 855-309.**

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 5 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.19.2 to exclude from the Special Highway Corridor Overlay District the land within those phases of the Conway Bypass that the State of New Hampshire has removed from the ten-year highway plan. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Planning Board (2-4-0). FAILED 206-936.

ARTICLE 8: BOND ARTICLE. To see if the Town of Conway will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) (gross budget) for the construction and original equipping of a new **PUBLIC WORKS SERVICE**

GARAGE and to authorize the issuance of not more than Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000) of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and other municipal officials to apply for, obtain and accept federal, state or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto; and to authorize the withdrawal of Zero Dollars (\$0) from the Buildings Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. A 3/5 ballot vote is required to pass this article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-5-1). FAILED 330-881.

ARTICLE 9: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant or amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Nine Million One Hundred Ninety Nine Thousand, Three Hundred Forty Three Dollars (\$9,199,343)? Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Three Hundred Thirty Three Thousand Seven Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$9,333,776) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. **NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-0-3). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-2-1). PASSED 899-294.**

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the **TWO-YEAR** (2009-2010) **COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT REACHED BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION AND AFSCME LOCAL 3657, POLICE DEPARTMENT** which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2009 and 2010. This means that the contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-1). PASSED 1038-169.**

ARTICLE 11: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 9). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to be added to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 9, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-1). PASSED 819-390.**

ARTICLE 12: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$115,000.00) from franchise fees to add to the PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. This sum to come from franchise fees and no amount to be raised from taxation. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-1). PASSED 921-315.

ARTICLE 13: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-1). PASSED 972-273.

ARTICLE 14: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (level funded from last year) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-2). PASSED 1092-160.

ARTICLE 15: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-1). PASSED 934-308.

ARTICLE 16: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. ARTICLE 19: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #9). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-2). PASSED 859-337.**

ARTICLE 24: Shall the Town of Conway vote to adopt the provision of RSA 32:5,V-a as follows: Any town may vote to require that all votes by an advisory budget committee, a town budget committee, and the governing body or, in towns without a budget committee, all votes of the governing body relative to budget items or warrant articles shall be recorded votes and the numerical tally of any such vote shall be printed in the town warrant next to the affected warrant article. **Recommended by the Board of**

Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-1). PASSED 1004-185.

ARTICLE 25: To see if the Town will vote TO RECLASSIFY A PORTION OF HENDERSON RD. FROM A CLASS VI TO CLASS V HIGHWAY. The portion to be reclassified runs from the intersection of Henderson and Davis Hill Roads southeastward for approximately 1,050 feet and as depicted on the plans and specifications for the Lebach Realty Trust/Royal View Subdivision (S06-14) approved by the Planning Board on 12/11/07 and recorded at CCRD BK 220 PP 4 and 5. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (0-11-1). FAILED 339-842.

ARTICLE 26: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution:

Whereas, the constitution of New Hampshire, specifically Part First, Article 28-a, "The state shall not mandate, or assign any new, expanded or modified programs or responsibilities to any political subdivision in such a way as to necessitate additional local expenditures by the political subdivision unless such programs or responsibilities are fully funded by the state or unless such programs or responsibilities are approved for funding by a vote of the local legislative body of the political subdivision", and

Whereas, from time to time the state has shifted the cost of certain programs that have previously been funded by the state, and

Whereas, examples of such acts are recorded in both 1998 and 2007 sessions of the legislature, wherein the state did shift the cost of Medicaid from State Government to the property tax supported County Government, and

Whereas, the state is currently facing a deficit of at least a \$200 million and may resort to relying upon the property tax payers of the state as means to cover either the deficit or the expansion, modification or newly established state programs. Therefore, be it

Resolved that the people of the town of Conway, by vote of the 2009 town meeting, do express to the Governor, the members of the Honorable House and Senate, our objection to any legislation or provision of the state's operating budget that would result in the increase of local property taxes, and be it further

Resolved, that this resolution and the outcome of the vote of this resolution by the voters of the town be provided to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House, and the members of the legislature who represent the town of Conway, and to the New Hampshire Municipal Association. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-2-0). PASSED 902-263.**

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

2009 was a revaluation year in Conway. Revaluations are mandated by the State to occur at least every five years. While I have done in-house revaluations before, most recently in 2004, I cannot recall ever having done one as stressful as this most recent one. The combination of a declining real estate market, the lack of sales and the economic uncertainty permeating every aspect of life here in the valley made revaluation work much more difficult.

Work began in earnest late last year as we tried to get a jump on our building permit data collection so that we would have more time in the summer to tackle the necessary analysis and review work. We reviewed exemptions and credits ahead of time for the same reason. We relied heavily on building plans and third party information to compensate for our limited manpower. We are grateful to the valley's real estate professionals who are invaluable sources of guidance and information as we attempted to quantify what was happening out there.

By law, properties are assessed as of April first in each year. These assessments are tested by State inspectors who analyze sales six months either side of that date. Of course, we (the assessing staff), must finalize many decisions well before the last few months of this period or else we couldn't get tax bills out on time. We find ourselves making key decisions based on sales data through June. The accuracy of those values will be checked against sales all the way through September. To some extent, we must anticipate what the market is going to do and then calibrate our software to imitate real life. We look to make our software generate assessments that not only approximate what we know has sold but also predict, to a certain extent, what is about to sell.

When we have a period of few sales, as we had in the past year, the chance for errors in this predictive model is increased. Fewer sales means a greater risk that the sales relied upon are not representative of the market. This translates into longer hours and sleepless nights for the assessor who must make assessment decisions interpreting this activity knowing that the data is thin and in a state of constant change.

Property values are down significantly from their 2006-2007 peaks. Our analysis showed that, in most areas, they had retreated back to their 2004 levels. The average single family sale price last year, for example, was within a few thousand dollars of where it was in 2004. This allowed us to be conservative and not change many assessments just "for the sake of change". Where sales indicated that we could leave them as they were, we did just that.

Some properties saw increases in assessments. It was a tough thing to do in this down market but, when this happened, it was because both local and statewide sales indicated that it was necessary to maintain fairness and equity with everyone else. Some individual properties saw increases because our re-inspection program picked up property characteristics that were not previously assessed. Either our earlier inspections were faulty or some level of work had been done since our last visit. Again, in order to be fair, we had to account for it. We hope to continue our re-inspection program. If the market continues its decline, it would be my recommendation to the Board of Selectmen that we adjust assessments to follow it downhill, even in interim years between official revaluations.

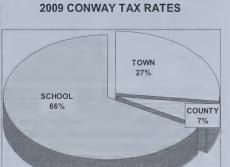

BUILDING INSPECTOR/CODE ENFORCEMENT REPORT

The year 2009 maintained a decrease in new residential and commercial construction; in 2008 the total number of single family homes constructed within the town was thirty four (34) & one (1) new duplex, for a total of thirty six(36)new residences. This past year or 2009, the total number of single-family homes constructed was fifteen (15) and one (1) new duplex, for a total of seventeen (17) new residences.

Commercial construction showed a continued decrease in the size and value of new construction and renovations; the total number of permits for commercial activity is slightly below last year's numbers of (2008 - 123 permits) 2009 - 108 permits)

There were 356 building permits issued in 2009, this is lower than the 430 issued the previous year of 2008. This number reflects the total of both residential and commercial permits.

The entire permits for 2009 total to an estimated assessment value for the completed work at just over \$ 12.546 million dollars which is down from last year's total (2008) of \$28.012 million dollars.

The fees paid to the town to obtain these permits for 2009 totaled \$36,783.58 down considerately from the fees paid for last year of \$98,922.94. This decrease in the permit fees paid to the town is due the economy and lack of commercial permit activity.

This next year is going to be very hard to predict, but is starting slower than last year within the early planning stages. This will most likely show maintenance and smaller activity permit numbers with few major projects for the start of the year.

I continue to serve as building inspector for the Town and still look forward to each coming year.

CODE COMPLIANCE OFFICER'S REPORT

The primary responsibility of the Code Compliance Officer for the Town of Conway is assuring compliance with the Town's zoning and site plan regulations. Signage is a large part of this and with hundreds of commercial properties in town, businesses and their signs are constantly changing. Most new signs require permits and each one is reviewed carefully to make sure that it complies with the town's regulations. Permits are also issued administratively for Changes of Use, Home Occupations, Temporary Events, Vending Carts and tree cutting in certain restricted areas. The Planning & Zoning Department also follows up on complaints received involving the zoning and site plan regulations.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT DIRECTOR'S REPORT

I took over as the Town's Emergency Management Director early in 2009. I had planned on spending my time tying up the loose ends with the Emergency Operations Plan and continuing Ed Duffy's excellent preparedness work.

In April of 2009, the World was introduced to a new strain of influenza. Conway was affected by this illness no differently than anyone else. In fact, it rapidly became the item that consumed my time. At first there was public concern and limited information. I fielded multitudes of phone calls from our emergency management partners and the public. As the pandemic progressed, efforts were moved to targeted vaccination then finally mass vaccination. We participated in vaccination clinics that allowed thousands of local residents the opportunity to receive the H1N1 vaccine. We are confident that the high risk population was well covered and that others were afforded the opportunity to get the vaccine if they desired it.

As I write this, things are returning to normal from the massive effort put forth to vaccinate the high risk population. I will be returning to planning for events such as flooding and ice storms, updating our shelter plan, and coordinating with our emergency management partners.

I would like to thank the Conway School District, Conway PD, the five Fire Departments, and North Conway Ambulance for all their help this last year.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER'S REPORT

General Assistance trends are consistent across the state:

- Applicant volume is high.
- Higher cost of need in terms of time and money
- We are seeing more families that are unfamiliar with the process and/or social service system.
- Employment opportunities are harder to find, yet necessary to keep up with basic household needs.
- Payment arrangements are harder to negotiate without a source of income.
- All agencies are overwhelmed; decisions take longer; fees add up;
- With instability and crisis, we see more substance abuse, crime, and violence.

How will Conway's General Assistance Officer handle these challenges?

- We are aggressively seeking a reliable, consistent volunteer.
- Workshops will be offered once a year, instead of "on demand."
- Requests from other towns for help with local welfare administration are being deferred to Local Government Center.
- Community involvement will be reduced significantly.
- Program administration practices will be modified to simply and streamline the process.
- People needing information about where to get help will be deferred to appropriate town and/or 211.

What have we done?

- Amended, proposed and introduced legislation.
- Graduated from MWV Leadership class.
- Safety concerns are being re-addressed; options researched.
- Updated guidelines for Allowable Levels of Assistance.
- Began researching options for the administration of local welfare.

How is Conway doing so far?

- We budgeted for \$40,000.
- We spent \$26,419.51
- Percent of budget remaining was nearly 34%!

How can that be?

- This community is incredibly supportive and generous.
- Donations
- Recovery from liens
- Individual, town and state reimbursement.
- Incredible community support!

Many of you know that 2009 was a tough one for me personally. The support received from this community was tremendous and it would be impossible for me to thank everyone or thank you enough for your patience and understanding.

Conway's goal is to protect people in town from being unsafe while protecting taxpayer dollars. Traditionally, we have worked hard to educate the community and help people navigate the system, however, we will unable to provide as much of that type of assistance and still meet the needs of taxpayer and applicant alike. Conway has grown and times are hard but we will do the best we can with the resources we have.

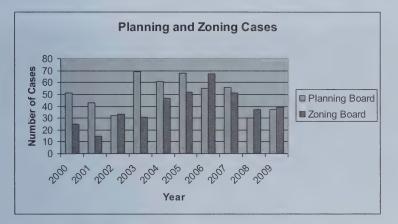

PLANNING DIRECTOR'S REPORT

As was 2008, 2009 has been an economically challenging year for everyone. The recession continued having a significant affect on development activity. There was only a slight increase in the number of applications that were processed by the Planning Board and the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Those generated only a handful of new building lots and less than 20,000 square feet of new commercial floor space. Most of the activity was relative to renovations and reuse of existing space. Still the Department was kept busy during the construction phases for those large projects which were approved in previous years. Another symptom of the weak economy was the lingering hesitation on the part of the developers to exercise the conditional approvals that they had been granted. The reduced volume of applications and appeals provided time for the Department and the Planning Board to update the Subdivision Regulations.



The legislative body adopted a small wind energy system ordinance at the April Town Meeting in 2009. This provides the Building Inspector tools for regulating the development of such energy sources. However we have not received any applications under that regulation. The department also participated in the LUCA (Local Update of Census Addresses) program in preparation for the 2010 Census. This took a significant amount of effort and time.

In 2010 we hope to revise the Site Plan Review Regulations relative to site lighting. There has been some discussion amongst a few business owners regarding more signage opportunities. However, the Planning Board has not yet recognized a substantive signage issue that needs attention. We will continue to monitor signage and pursue funding for a comprehensive rewrite, if warranted.

It also appears that the economy is improving and leaning towards growth. Getting traction in the positive direction will likely stimulate renewed vigor in development activity. This Department will continue with its endeavors and commitment to making

the process better and providing the tools necessary for building a healthier and happier community.

PUBLIC WORKS & ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT REPORT

The Highway Crew reconstructed Kearsarge from Main Street to the North-South Road this spring while the North Conway Water Precinct installed new water and sewer on Mechanic Street, from the North-South Road to the intersection with Kearsarge Road. After the Precinct completed its work, the Highway Crew reconstructed that same portion of Mechanic Street. Intervale Crossroad and the section of Kearsarge from the Crossroad to Skimobile Road were reconstructed as part of North Conway Water Precinct Contract 7.

Conway Village Fire District has completed approximately 85% of Phase I of the water/wastewater project. New water mains were installed along Route 16 from the bridge over the Saco River north to the intersection of Route 16/302. A new gravity sewer system was installed from the Saco River north to Eastern Slope Terrace. The work on Phase I will continue south of the Saco River this spring.

The Engineering Department has been working on the Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct wastewater-interconnect study. The results of that study are that there is more than enough capacity at the existing plant in North Conway to service the needs of both precincts and it would be less expensive than building and operating a second sewage plant in Conway. This was the second time this topic has been studied; each time the Conway Village Fire District used different engineering consultants. The results of both studies were the same. The Engineering Department is also working with the Garage Committee formed by the Board of Selectmen to review the needs of the Service Department and propose a design to suit those needs. The Garage Article was defeated last year and will be before the voters again this year.

An emergency repair of the Tasker Hill Road Bridge took place this past fall. The Town has secured 80% federal funding to replace the bridge this coming summer.

The 2009 recycling rate was 51%. The four prior years ('05-'08) it was 53%+/- 0.5%. Here is the interesting part: the total amount of recyclables did not go up as a result of enforcement, but the total amount of trash went way down. Trash went from 8,000 tons to 3,500 tons while the recyclables went up only a couple hundred tons. The increase in recycling tonnage is attributed to an increase in junk mail recycling and the introduction of electronic waste recycling.

The decrease in trash is attributed to recycling enforcement. People started to receive fines for not recycling so they avoided the issue by paying to have their trash hauled out of town. They increased their expenses and convenience. The people who are participating today were already recycling prior to enforcement.

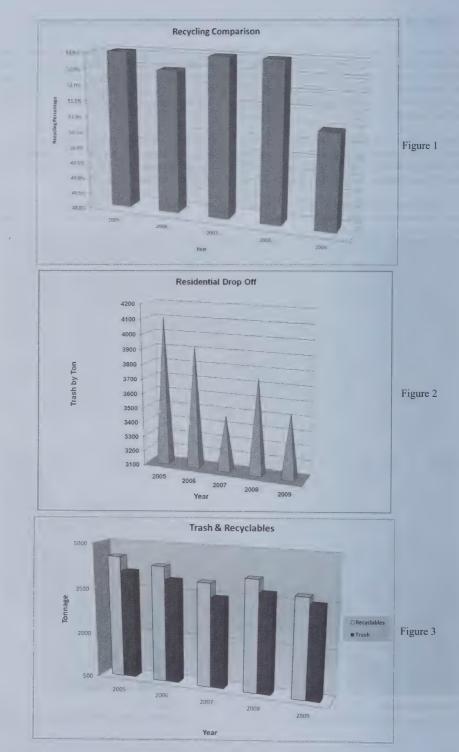

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RECREATION DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building, 1808 East Main Street in Center Conway. Our facility includes a gymnasium, game room, kitchen, art room, audio visual room & television lounge. The outdoor facility features a playground, outdoor basketball court and a multi-purpose athletic field equipped with lights.

The Conway Recreation Department is responsible for the maintenance & scheduling of outdoor parks and recreation areas for various community uses. Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith-Eastman Recreation Area, Davis Park, Schouler Park, Washington Street Park, Whitaker Homesite Field, Connie Watson Davis Park and Shedd Woods. Included with these parks are various cemeteries which are maintained also by the Conway Parks & Recreation Department. These sites listed above provide recreational activities such as Nordic skiing, biking, hiking, swimming, skating, canoeing, tennis, basketball, softball/baseball, volleyball, picnicking and various other activities conducted on our multi-purpose fields.

Our children's programming for 2009 included t-ball, girl's softball, Red Cross Swim program, summer program, soccer, flag football, field hockey, basketball, biddy basketball, pond hockey & children's playgroup. Other special events sponsored by the recreation department included our annual Easter Egg Hunt, Halloween Party and Turkey Trot Race.

Adult programs in 2009 were strong and very active. We offered men's softball, over 40 men's softball, open gym on Tuesdays & Thursdays and an adult basketball league. Along with these adult programs we continued to offer special programming to our senior citizen population. Bingo and Scrabble were a popular activity and will continue to be part of our programming in 2010.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Testimony to the continued high level of our management of the Town Forests, the American Tree Farm System, N.H. Tree Farm Program has recertified Town's 1580 acres of forests as having been maintained according to accepted standards. The certification is good through 2015.

While much of the work agenda of the Conservation Commission is determined by nature, prioritization has become more dominant in this time of budget reductions. Each year a proposed work agenda is developed based on the Forest Stewardship plans for the conservation lands. The items on the agenda are prioritized and then used as the basis for budgeting. The 2009 budget was twice reduced; first by the Commission and second by the Board of Selectmen. Prioritization was more used than ever.

Ongoing trail work at Whitaker Woods, although scaled back, continued to follow the long range plan of reducing the number of maintained trails and improving existing trails. A multi-year project of constructing a 5k loop trail there was pursued. Some tree removal resulted in the recovery of about \$1,000 of the expense through the sale of the harvested wood.

The White Mountain Chapter of the New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA) is responsible for maintenance of the popular Red Tail Trail, which they built in 2001, located in the Common Lands off Hurricane Mountain Road. NEMBA provided over 65 volunteer hours in 2009 while maintaining this trail.

A planned timber harvest at the East Conway Common Lands earned a little over \$10,000 plus several hundred dollars in timber tax revenue for Town. The goal of this harvest was to release white pine regeneration from a previous good white pine seed year. Mature overstory timber was harvested. It should be about ten years before another similar harvest will be needed there.

Conservation Land Rules and Regulations, approved by the Board of Selectmen, were published and are being posted on affected properties. Both The Nature Conservancy and the Ski Touring Foundation are assisting in posting.

The Abenaki Site Conservation Land was investigated with representatives of the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources. Our plan is to stabilize the site and makesafe, preserving some of the structures and aesthetics. While very interested in the site, the Division has no funds for restoration or cultural development of the site. Grants or other funding is needed to pursue long-term preservation of this historic encampment.

Although the Upper Saco Valley Land Trust has begun work on the joint Strategic Conservation Planning Project and principals have been hired, funding for it has not been required as yet. In the meantime, the Commission is investigating the task of placing Town Conservation Lands under Conservation easements to protect them.

Members of the Conservation Commission are: Paul Pinkham, Chair; Rob Adair, Vicechair; Carol Lyman, Treasurer; David Weathers; Selectman's Representative, Phil Haynes, Dan Lucy, Chuck Broomhall, Connie Briggs and Alternate; Linda Kearney. Jean Simon provides administrative support to the Commission and Gail Currier records meeting minutes.

The Commission's Consulting Forester is Don Johnson of Forest Land Improvement.

CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION

2009 was a challenging year for the Conway Police Department in many ways. As the National and local economies slowed, businesses and individuals had to make adjustments. As an agency, we too had to adapt to these changing times. As you can see by Chief Wagner's year-end report, a noticeable increase in criminal activity, arrests and calls for police service, had the police working harder than ever. Although regularly rising to these challenges, tough decisions about staffing and service need to be made soon.

As your Board of Commission, we are obligated to take into account, not only the needs of the Department, but also of the taxpayers ability to afford the services they demand. To that end, we have sought and received several federal and state grants for police services this year. In 2009 we received over \$76,000 in grants which helped pay for a number of enforcement programs, safety patrols, and needed police equipment. Combining this amount with the \$109,000 of revenue that the police department generated, the Conway Police Department was responsible for over \$185,000 of unanticipated income directly to the Town. This is not only a real testament to the efforts of the men and women that work here, but a prime example of how hard this agency works to provide quality service at the lowest cost.

Recently, a great deal of local discussion ensued regarding the staffing report presented at the request of the budget committee. This report clearly demonstrated that staffing levels at the Conway Police Department have not kept pace with an ever increasing demand. Decades of growth, changing demographics in the community, and sharp increases in the need for police services, are tapping all of our available resources. We need to put serious thought, and have productive discussions, about the level of service the community demands and the level of police staffing needed to fulfill that demand. Protection of life and property is our number one priority and this can only be accomplished by having a well equipped and properly staffed police force.

The people of the Town of Conway can be very proud of the Department that serves them. Under the leadership of Chief Ed Wagner we have one of the most productive and professional police agencies in the State. We, as your Police Commission, are proud to be a part of this team of dedicated men and women. We are honored to serve you, and we continue to strive to keep Conway a safe and healthy community for all of us to enjoy.

CHIEF OF POLICE

The challenges that were before the Conway Police Department in 2009 were the same as the previous year, but only worse. I am certainly concerned about the ever increasing criminal activity that is happening in our Town. The 810 arrests that the men and women of this department made last year is the most by the Department as far back as records are kept. The increase in crimes of all types is a disturbing trend that keeps growing year after year. Robberies, serious assaults, burglaries, and sexual assaults, to name just a few, are some of the more serious crimes that continue to be prevalent. Along with the increase in arrests for the year, the Department handled 72,682 calls for service. This is an increase of 4,449 calls for service over the previous year. Included in the calls for service are the 626 accidents that we responded to, which is a slight decrease from the 658 that we responded to in 2008. Hopefully the decrease in accidents is a byproduct of the vigorous motor vehicle enforcement and efforts by the Department to improve motor vehicle safety.

There was some turnover in the Department this year as four employees left for different reasons. One dispatcher retired and three officers left to pursue either different career opportunities or to advance their law enforcement career. We wish them all well in their endeavors. With the departure of those employees, we were able to hire two officers to fill the open positions. First we hired Patrolman Richard Theberge in June. He attended the 150th Police Academy graduating in December. Even though Rich came to us with no law enforcement experience, he excelled in his studies and graduated in the top 5% in his academy class. Secondly, we hired Patrolman Suzanne Scott in November. Suzanne came to us as a certified officer from a local Town and had about two years of experience. Both Rich and Suzanne have been fine additions to this department and are doing an excellent job.

As in years past, this Department was the recipient of several grants. The largest Grant was the FY 09 Recovery Act Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant - Local Solicitation. This Grant alone was for \$95,602.00 and was shared with several other departments in Carroll County to include the Carroll County Sheriff's Office, Wakefield Police Department and the Wolfeboro Police Department. The Conway Police Department received \$56,867.00 from this Grant. We also received the FY 09 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant in the amount of \$13,554.00. We received \$6,777.00 of this Grant as it was also shared with the Carroll County Sheriff's Office. The Department would once again this year like to thank the New Hampshire Highway Safety Administration for giving us several grant funded law enforcement opportunities Those grants included DWI Patrol (\$3,406.11), Sobriety Checkpoint this year. (\$1,433.42), DWI Hunter Patrol (\$1,293.17), Enforcement Patrols (\$3,219.62), Bike Patrol (\$1,793.99) and New Hampshire Clique (\$1,281.67) for a total amount of \$12,427.98. That, along with the JAG Grants, is a total of \$76,071.98 in grants for 2009 with no tax impact on taxpayers.

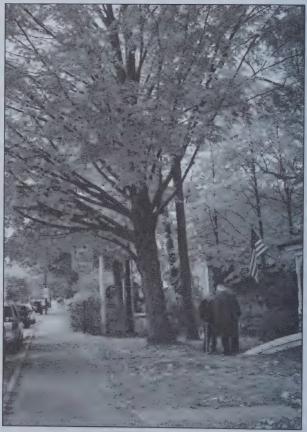
Along with the Grants that brought money to the Town, we also generated \$91,816.15 in revenue. This revenue was generated by pistol permits, report copies, alarm fees, fingerprinting, witness fees, commercial detail fees and DARE donations. We also

generated \$17,350.15 from underage drinking fines from the State of New Hampshire bringing the total revenue to \$109,160.30

I will again say that I am very proud of the men and women of the Conway Police Department as they have throughout the year served the community well and will continue to do so in years to come.

She has had excellent experience in several public libraries in Pennsylvania and has earned a Masters Degree in Library Science. She also founded and managed a small theater company which encouraged child literacy though interactive performances. She comes to Conway highly recommended by her library colleagues and the trustees feel fortunate to have her join the staff.

The Friends of the Conway Public Library organized a wonderful reception for Margaret in late June. The word from Wolfeboro is that Margaret is thoroughly enjoying her retirement, but does miss all her friends in Conway.

This fall brought a sadder loss to the library. David Emerson, our much beloved historian of the Henney History Room, lost his long battle with cancer. In recent years, he had adjusted his schedule in response to his health status. The trustees received the news of his final resignation with respect, gratitude and sadness.

Ed possesses a knowledge of library science which will enable him to better organize the materials of the room and make them more broadly available in digital form. He loves to pursue the answers to the types of questions brought to the history room.

The Conway Public Library experienced a record increase in the use of its services during 2009. The circulation of books and materials increased by 13% to a record total of 88,283 items. There was an amazing 114,185 visits paid to the library by its patrons and friends, an increase of 44%. When you consider that the Town of Conway has approximately 9,000 residents, the visit total is a wonderful reflection on the value and interest our residents place on information and in intellectual stimulation. Use of the computers increased by 56%. The staff and Friends of the Conway Public Library organized 376 programs for adults and children including weekly story hours for infants, toddlers, and preschoolers, reading groups for teens and adults and a variety of speakers and performers for all ages. This was a 19% increase over 2008. As always, the library's summer reading program, designed to encourage children to beat the "summer slump" was extremely successful with 342 children participating. This year's participants should be proud of their achievements over the course of the nine week program as 11% more children achieved the final goal of reading for a total of 900 minutes, Finally, Conway Public Library's dedicated volunteers continue to be an inspiration to us all with their generous donation of time and skills, This year there was an increase of 340 volunteer hours to a new record of 1,700 hours. This is a wonderful contribution to the running of our library. The aforementioned types of increases in utilization are being seen in many public libraries during this period of economic challenges; but the increases experienced by our library are greater than those generally being reported by other New Hampshire public libraries and speaks of our community's need for its public library.

As trustees, we continue to be very proud of the quality of our staff and their dedication to providing excellent patron service. We see the library as one of the most valued assets of our town and we pledge to work to continue to maintain our tradition of quality.

Report to the People of District One By: Executive Councilor Ray Burton

2009 was indeed the year of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA)/Stimulus Funds in New Hampshire!

As of November 4, 2009, \$579,305,870.00 had been allocated in New Hampshire in nine areas: business/community; education; employment; energy; health; housing; safety; technology and transportation. Of that \$181,463,876.00 went to Council District One towns and cities and the counties of Belknap, Carroll, Coos, Grafton and Sullivan.

The ARRA money has enabled local, state and county government to work on projects that have been in process and planning for years. For a complete listing of these projects go to: www.ed.state.nh.us/education/recovery/index.htm or write to my office.

Governor Lynch has now submitted the New Hampshire Transportation Plan to the New Hampshire House and Senate. Highways/bridges, rail, aviation and public projects are among the proposed recommendations. Contact your local State Senator and Legislator for details about what projects you believe to be key ones for your region.

As Councilor, I do not see new revenues being raised in New Hampshire State Government. With the decline in existing revenues leading to cut backs in services, only time will determine what the law making branch has in mind for new dollars. Keep in close touch with your local State Senator and Legislator to make sure costs are NOT passed on to county and local government.

The Governor and Council are required by law to fill dozens of boards and commissions with volunteers. REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

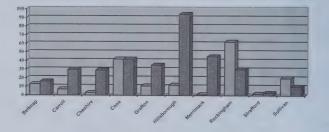
Your local Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and the State of New Hampshire Division of Forests & Lands work collaboratively to reduce the risk and frequency of wildland fires in New Hampshire. To help us assist you, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden or Fire Department to determine if a permit is required before doing <u>ANY</u> outside burning. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are enouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or <u>www.des.state.nh.us</u> for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at <u>www.nhdfl.org</u>.

Spring fire season was unusually short this past year, with wet weather beginning the third week in April and lasting virtually all summer long. Consequently both the number of fires and the number of acres burned were below the last five year average. Due to state budget constraints, the staffing of our statewide system of 16 fire lookout towers was limited to class III or higher fire danger days. Despite the reduction in the number of days staffed, our fire lookout towers are credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. The towers fire spotting capability was supplemented this year by contracted aircraft and the Civil Air Patrol when fire danger was especially high. Surprisingly the largest single fire this year occurred in late November during an unusual dry spell, in the northern Coos County town of Clarksville. This fire burned 17.1 acres and is presumed to have been caused by a careless hunter. Many homes in New Hampshire are located in the wildland urban interface, which is the area where homes and flammable wildland fuels intermix. Several of the fires during the 2009 season threatened structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of filmmable materials. CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC.

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. Our mission is to provide quality, comprehensive developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child (ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child (ren) with special needs is a priority.

Professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers, staff the program. Program services include: developmental screenings, evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, inclusive play groups, parent support groups, "fussy baby" assessments/consultations and interagency networking. Fifty five (55) Conway children and families received services in 2009.

GIBSON CENTER

The Gibson Center is a busy and expanding place, but everything we do is an extension of our Mission Statement:

Our mission is to enable seniors to remain in their homes, while maintaining quality of life with purpose and dignity through an evolving array of services. Our services are designed to meet the needs of seniors through nutrition (home delivered meals, congregate meals and nutrition education); transportation for the elderly and disabled to help meet their daily living needs; social/educational programs to keep them actively involved in their communities; and referral/networking with related community service agencies. We encourage good health, knowledge and active participation in the community.

There is no way we could do what we do without the support of our community. This past year, we served over 57,000 congregate and home delivered meals. Over 77% of our meals go to Conway residents. Over 90% of our van riders came from Conway.

We are fantastically lucky to have our dedicated volunteers. These are the people who really make our funding work responsibly. It may be hard to believe, but again last year

over 12,000 volunteer hours were given to the Gibson Center. We ALWAYS have room for more volunteers.

Last year we were intensely focused on a potential community crisis because of the soaring price of fuel oil. Fortunately, prices decreased and the problem did not become as dire as was thought. However the recoil of national economics is now being felt locally. We all have neighbors and friends who are hurting and may not be vocal about it. The Gibson Center and the entire community need to be watchful so we can be helpful.

Everyone at the Gibson Center has been working hard to keep costs low. We will continue to do this. Our request to Conway is \$32,000 as it has been for the last several years.

The Center oversees the management of Silver Lake Landing in Madison; 20 low cost, independent senior apartments. It is important that the taxpayers of Conway know that Silver Lake Landing is owned and operated by the Silver Lake Senior Housing Corporation, a separate 501(c) (3) corporation. No Town funds are used for the operation and management. Silver Lake Landing is completely separate from the day-to-day activities of The Gibson Center.

We appreciate your continued support and look forward to serving this amazing community.

NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE CENTER

This is a NH licensed daycare program that provides care for children ages 13 months to 12 years of age. The program employs well qualified staff specifically trained to work with children in this setting.

Services include a toddler room, daycare (with a pre-school component for age 4), 1/2 day for Kindergarten students, before and after school and summer day camp. Transportation is available to and from John Fuller School on the AM and PM school bus as well as, for a small fee, at mid-day for the kindergarten program.

There is a CACFP supported meal program included in the daily rate which is comprised of a well balanced breakfast, lunch and afternoon snack. Food is prepared by our own staff cook.

STARTING POINT

Program Description: Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence is a private, non-profit organization dedicated to ensuring quality services are provided to victims of relationship violence and sexual abuse, preventing future relationship violence, promoting social change and encouraging accountability and education for perpetrators and stalkers.

Begun in 1981 as a grassroots response to domestic victims in Carroll County, the agency has grown from an impromptu group of volunteers to an incorporated non-profit agency with four full time and one part-time staff member, a governing board of directors and a network of over 27 extensively trained volunteers.

In fiscal year 2009, Starting Point's staff and volunteers provided advocacy and support to 634 primary and secondary victims. 38% of Starting Point's overall services were provided to Conway residents.

Our services are available 24 hours a day, 365 days / year and are offered at no charge. Our crisis services include: 24-Hour Support Line, Emergency Shelter, Hospital Advocacy, Police Advocacy, Transportation and Resources and Referral.

In addition to our crisis services, we offer follow up support through court advocacy, accompaniment to the Child Advocacy Center, peer led support groups, case management and social service advocacy. We promote social change through community outreach and prevention activities.

<u>Program Evaluation</u>: Program effectiveness is evaluated through written surveys provided to service users. The surveys are reviewed by the Executive Director and Board of Directors and program changes are made when appropriate.

Benefits to Town of Conway Residents: Residents of Conway benefit from Starting Point's programs in numerous ways. First, Conway's Police Department has access to 24 hour, 365 day case consultations and resource assistance. Second, any victim living or working in Conway may access Starting Point's confidential services free of charge.

Third, individuals living in Conway (such as the town welfare officer) who have concerns about an individual who is or maybe a victim of domestic violence, sexual violence and or stalking can access consultation services and resource assistance. Finally, Conway's school system has the ability to access Starting Point's prevention education program <u>Healthy Relationships: It's Elementary</u> free of charge.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

Tri-County Community Action Carroll County is a private non-profit agency that was established in 1965. The Resource Center is located at 448 White Mountain Highway in Tamworth.

During the fiscal year July 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009, our agency has provided services to Conway residents that total \$854,800. The services provided include; Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, Weatherization Home Energy Conservation and Homeless Prevention. In addition, we are the conduit for the distribution of USDA Surplus Food to all the food pantries in Carroll County.

Tri-County Community Action provides necessary services for the most vulnerable and less fortunate citizens in our communities who would otherwise have to seek help from the town. We are depending upon funding from your town and neighboring communities countywide. These local funds are used to make available local intake and support for federal and state programs including Fuel Assistance, Electric Assistance, Homeless Prevention, Weatherization, and electric utility conservation programs.

We greatly appreciate your support and look forward to a continued cooperation and partnership with your towns' residents, elected officials and staff.

VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC.

Vaughan Community Service, Inc. (VCS) was established in 1965 for the purpose of alleviating unmet and undermet needs in the community. VCS is an outreach program of the First Church of Christ, Congregational, however there is no religious affiliation associated with the services provided. VCS is a non-profit501-C3 organization incorporated in the State of New Hampshire and is financially supported in a variety of ways. Since its inception VCS has provided for a great number of health and human service needs in the Mount Washington Valley.

Assessment Referral Help for those who are not sure what they need or where they need to go. In this program we look at each individual situation and help to assess what the true needs are and where the best place is to have those needs met. This may include, but is not limited to, navigating the social service system, applying for government assistance, FREE SERVICE

WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER

White Mountain Community Health Center is a nonprofit health care center located in Conway. The mission of the center is to provide medical care to the underinsured and uninsured. The center provides reduced fees to these residents. This ensures that everyone can receive the health care they need to stay healthy.

The center provides medical outpatient services for men, women and children. This includes a children's program that provides physicals, sick call visits, diagnosis and treatment, inoculations, and many screens to assess the child's or infant's health status. The prenatal program provides care beginning with pregnancy, deliveries of babies with a nurse mid-wife, and post natal care. Adults and teens are also seen for physicals, screenings, sick calls, diagnosis treatment and family planning.

The value to the town includes services offered and <u>not</u> funded by the town:

- In 2008 WMCHC is proving mental health counseling services to our patients.
- *Healthy Smiles* program provides dental services provided by a dental hygienist and a dentist. Dental Hygiene education is provided in the Conway elementary schools and at the health center.
- *Partners in Health* is an outreach program focused on families of children with chronic illnesses.
- The health center assists in the application of Healthy Kids for those children who quality.
- *Employee Prepay Program* is a program that employers prepay for our services at a discount. This offers small businesses an affordable way to provide out patient healthcare to their employees.
- *Patient Assistance Funds* includes funds to help patients with medication, transportation, and medical testing.

The health center gives away over \$34,000.00 a month in free care to patients. We are asking for only 6% of what it costs us to serve a Conway resident. Again this year we are seeing an increased number of people who have lost their jobs.

We rely on various sources of revenue to assist us in serving these patients. The Town appropriations are an important part of how we can offer free and reduced services to those Conway residents in need. If White Mountain Community Health Center did not exist, Conway could have a larger tax burden. While our visits and services continue to grow each year, we only ask for level funding. *We appreciate the support of Conway residents and we look forward to your support again this year.*

RESULTS OF THE 2010 DELIBERATIVE SESSION OF TOWN MEETING

The deliberative session of the Town Meeting was held on March 3, 2010. With only one exception, all articles on the warrant were approved and forwarded to the ballot. Voting will be held on April 13, 2010. Deleted language is shown in strikethrough and added text is shown in bold.

The amended article is:

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Twenty Three Nine Thousand Thirty Eight Three Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,923,038 \$8,929,327). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Two Hundred Forty Seven Thousand Four Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$9,247,446) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0) (8-0-0).

Those proposing this amendment stated that their intention was that this money be earmarked for Starting Point, a local non-profit organization that provides services to victims of domestic abuse and that it should be added to the General Assistance Budget.

OPERATING BUDGET NARRATIVE

Introduction

The following narrative presents the proposed operating budget for the municipal government of the Town of Conway to be voted upon on April 13, 2010. This budget has been forwarded for consideration by the voters through action by the voters attending the Deliberative Session of town meeting which was held on March 3, 2010. In addition the budget is supported by the Conway Municipal Budget Committee with a vote of 8-2. The Board of Selectmen supported this budget with a vote of 5-0.

The budget is composed of three distinct components:

- Town Departments under the purview of the Board of Selectmen and Town Manager
- Police Department as overseen by the Police Commission and Police Chief,
- Library which is managed by the Library Board of Trustees and the Librarian

This budget supports the existing level of service for town departments. While no new programs, employees or services are proposed, further reductions in funding will necessitate reductions in service.

The total proposed operating budget is \$8,929,327 which amounts to a decrease of \$270,046 or 3% over the 2009 adopted budget (see page 115). The default budget will be \$9,247,446 Dollars. The fact that the default budget is higher than the operating is unusual and is a result of the fact that a number of Capital Reserve funds previously included within the operating budget were removed from the operating budget and placed on the warrant as separate articles (see Page 104).

The default budget calculation is found on page 116.

Increases in the proposed operating budget:

- Employee Benefits increase by approximately \$125,000 due primarily to a 9% increase in health insurance.
- An increase of \$106,029 in the Police Budget resulting largely from increased costs associated with existing employees.

Significant decreases are as follows:

• Based on new Division of Revenue Administration guidance, all Capital Reserve Funds have been removed from the operating budget and will appear this year as warrant articles. This amounts to a decrease of \$680,500.

• A decrease of approximately \$124,000 occurred in the Long Term Debt accounts due to the retiring of two bonds.

Departmental Summaries

This following discussion provides a summary of each department budget. The spreadsheet on page 115 presents a summary of the changes in each budget from 2009 to 2010.

Executive

The Executive Budget includes staff and operating expenses for general town administration. Included in the budget are supplies and materials for administrative departments and compensation for the Board of Selectmen/Town Manager's Office. Compensation for some elected officials is also included. This year, the budget increases by 1.4%. Increases are due to employee compensation and net changes in other expense lines.

Election and Registration

This budget funds elections and voter registration.

The budget increases by 2.9% and reflects the fact that three elections will be held in 2010.

Financial Administration

The Finance Department maintains fiscal records for the town. The Finance Budget includes expenses for Finance Department salaries, the annual external audit, the elected Town Treasurer, and the Budget Committee. The budget increase of 4.8% is due in part to staff increases but primarily due to the increase of \$10,750 in the Information Technology Line. This is necessitated by the fact that some equipment purchases have been deferred during the last two years.

Assessor

The Assessor's office is responsible for valuing all real and personal property, including mobile homes, residential and commercial properties, and agricultural land.

The Assessor's Budget includes assessing department staff salaries, outside mapping services, and other costs for property assessment. The budget increases by 2.4% due largely to increased staff costs.

Legal Expenses

The Legal Budget contains expenses for Town Counsel and other outside legal expenses. Town Counsel provides legal counsel to the Board of Selectmen and town staff. In addition, Town Counsel defends or prosecutes actions in court on behalf of the Town. The amount budgeted for legal expenses increases from \$50,000 to \$60,000 based on projected needs for 2010.

Employee Benefits

Employee Benefits includes health insurance and other employee costs mandated by the federal or state government such as FICA, social security and retirement. An amount for sick leave incentive for non-union employees is also included.

This budget shows an increase by 17%. Of particular significance is the fact that health insurance increased by approximately 9%. In July 2009, state retirement contributions were mandated to increase from 8.74% to 9.16% for administrative employee and from 11.84% to 13.66% for certified police officers. In addition, Workers Compensation insurance increased by approximately 9%.

Planning and Zoning

The Planning Department is responsible for advising the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Adjustment, and the public on land use and development issues. The planning staff oversees site plan and subdivision applications and amendments to the Site Plan, Subdivision and Zoning Regulations, as well as the Conway Master Plan. The Code Compliance Officer issues sign permits, home occupation permits and enforces the zoning codes.

This budget increases by 2.1% due mainly to staff compensation increases. It should be noted that the salary for the Project Administrator includes overtime for taking minutes at night meetings for the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment.

Government Buildings

Government Buildings includes operating expenses for a variety of Town buildings and facilities. These include: Town Hall, the Conway Recreation Center, the Public Works Garages, and the Whitaker Meeting House. For 2010, this budget stays level.

Cemeteries

This budget carries \$1.00 to hold the account open for future contingencies.

Insurance

Liability insurance for Town property and vehicles is funded within this budget. The amount presented is an estimate of actual premium costs for 2010 based on the maximum the premium can increase under our current contract.

Police Department

The Police Department preserves the public peace, reduces the opportunity to commit crime, and provides a high level of safety, security and service for all members of the community.

The Police Department Budget increases by 4.3% or \$106,029. This increase is due largely to labor costs.

Ambulance

The Ambulance Budget funds a contribution to local ambulance providers. The providers are Conway Village Fire District and the North Conway Ambulance Service. This budget remains level based on the current contract.

Fire and Rescue

The primary expense within the Fire and Rescue Budget is the provision of fire protection for areas of the Town that are not located within a fire precinct. Conway Village Fire District and North Conway Water Precinct provide these services under contract. This expense is funded by property taxes paid only by residents of non-precinct areas of the Town.

The budget is expected to increase by 1.2%. This increase is due to a relatively minor increase in the estimated cost of the Non-Precinct Fire Contract which funds fire service to non-precinct areas of the Town.

Inspections

The Building Inspector reviews building permits, building plans, inspects buildings and enforces the building codes.

This budget increases by 3.2% due to salary expenses for the existing positions.

Highway

The Highway Department is responsible for the maintenance and construction of Town roads and bridges as well as other related activities such as snow removal and ditch and culvert repair.

An increase of 1% is proposed for the Highway Budget. This increase is a result of a number of factors including personnel costs. In addition vehicle maintenance costs are projected to increase based on recent experience.

Solid Waste

The Solid Waste Department manages the disposal of solid waste for the Mount Washington Valley Solid Waste District, which includes the towns of Conway, Albany,

and Eaton. The member towns reimburse Conway for this service. The department operates both a transfer station and landfill.

The proposed budget represents an increase of 1.5%. This is due primarily to labor costs and the need to engage an outside engineer to deal with landfill odor issues.

Health

The Health Budget includes funding for the services of appointed Health Officers as well as kennel fees for impounded animals. The budget is up 8.3% (\$250.00) based on a minor increase to projected kennel fees.

Welfare

The General Assistance Department relieves and maintains those who are unable to support themselves. This office assists with basic necessities such as medication, housing, electricity, food and heat for those who qualify. All assistance is in the form of a loan and not a grant. This budget carries operating expenses associated with providing economic assistance to residents and non-residents alike. Included are payments for housing assistance, food and medical needs. The Deliberative Portion of Town Meeting added \$6,289 for Starting Point. The budget increases by 8.3% based on staff costs and the addition made at the Deliberative Portion.

Parks and Recreation

The Recreation Department is responsible for elementary school age youth sports and recreation programs and activities as well as a Teen Center for junior high age students. The Department also offers a variety of adult and senior citizen programs.

The budget decreases slightly. As for 2010, an additional \$50,000 in Recreation Department expenses is projected to be funded through fees collect in the Recreation Department Revolving Fund.

Library

The Conway Public Library provides community residents of all ages access to information sources, the opportunity to borrow materials in a variety of formats to meet their cultural, educational, and recreational needs, and a place to gather. From story hours to guest presenters, the Library offers numerous programs that encourage lifelong learning. The Library's professional staff strives to be accessible and helpful to all and is committed to providing excellent service.

The recommended budget represents a decrease of 2%.

Patriotic Purposes

This budget provides funding for the Town Fourth of July celebration and for commemorative activities that occur on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day. The budget increases by 4.5% (\$500) due to an increase in projected expenses associated with the Fourth of July Celebration.

Conservation Commission

The Conservation Commission oversees the planning and long-term use of Town common lands and open space properties. The proposed Conservation Commission Budget remains level and is based on planned projects for the year.

Debt Principal

Included here are principal payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by just over 21% based on the fact that payment schedules of existing long term debt reduce over time and, more importantly, to the fact that the courthouse bond was retired in 2009.

Debt Interest

Included in this budget are the interest payments on long-term debt incurred by the Town. The budget decreases by a net amount of approximately 28% and results from the changes in the payment schedules for the remaining bonds which were most heavily affected by the retirement of the courthouse bond.

Interest on TANS

This budget includes projected interest expenses on Tax Anticipation Notes (TANS). Simply put TANS are short-term loans available to municipalities from the state that assist in supporting cash needs during the year. Based on the current reserves retained by the Town, this amount remains the same as the prior year at \$2,500.

WARRANT ARTICLES

NOTE: Some warrant articles are followed by brief explanations to help the voter more fully understand the intent of the article.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 1 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) which amends §147.13.1.9 to allow "...yard sales to run for no more than 12 calendar days in a year in the Residential/Agricultural District.". Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

<u>ARTICLE 3</u>: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 2 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to allow "...yard sales to run for no more than 12 calendar days in a year in all zoning districts." Submitted by petition. **Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).**

<u>ARTICLE 4</u>: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 3 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.19.2 (the Special Highway Corridor Overlay District) by excluding from the district "...that portion of the limited access right of way as so depicted as it runs northerly from the centerline of N.H. Route 113/U.S. Route 302 in the Village of Center Conway to its Northern terminus at the centerline of N.H. Route 16/U.S. Route 302 to the north of the Village of North Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Planning Board (3-2-0).**

ARTICLE 5: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 4 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to permit balloons in the Conway Village Commercial District as follows: "§147.13.6.7.12.2 Banners, pennants, search lights, twirling signs, balloons (greater than 12 inches in diameter, numbering more than six) or other gas-filled figures, and other such materials shall be prohibited, except as specified herein." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 6: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 5 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to permit balloons in the North Conway Village Commercial District as follows: "§147.13.7.6.12.2 Banners, pennants, search lights, twirling signs, balloons (greater than 12 inches in diameter, numbering more than six) or other gas-filled figures, and other such materials shall be prohibited, except as specified herein." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 7: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 6 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to permit balloons in the Highway Commercial District as follows: "§147.13.8.6.12.2 Banners, pennants, search lights, twirling signs, balloons (greater than 12 inches in diameter, numbering more than six) or other gas-filled figures, and other such materials shall be prohibited, except as specified herein." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 8: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 7 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.6.7.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record business is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 9: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 8 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.7.6.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record business is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the **Planning Board (0-5-0).**

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 9 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.8.6.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record business is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the **Planning Board (0-5-0).**

ARTICLE 11: BOND ARTICLE: To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000) (gross budget) for the construction of a new **PUBLIC WORKS SERVICE GARAGE**, such sum to be raised through the issuance of not more than Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) of bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and other municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. Any such funding received will offset and reduce the total bond amount; and furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) from the Buildings Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose to be used to fund the garage construction. A 3/5 ballot vote required. **The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0). The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation (8-2-0).**

This article asks the voters to support the construction of a new Service Garage. The project and proposed financing is fully explained in the Garage Fact Sheet on page 111.

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Twenty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,929,327). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Two Hundred Forty Seven Thousand Four Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$9,247,446) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town

of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-2-0).

This article will approve the annual operating budget for the town. The operating budget is fully explained beginning on page 96 of this Narrative.

ARTICLE 13: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in a TWO-YEAR (2010-2011) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2010 and 2011. This means that the proposed contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal years. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1).

This article asks voters to approve a two year contract between the Town of Conway and its unionized employees in the Public Works Department. The contract has no changes that would result in additional costs to the Town. In fact, for the first year, the employees have accepted a decreased maximum raise (maximum of 2%) and a lower level of coverage on their medical prescription plan. For the second year the pay plan reverts to the 2009 salary plan.

CAPITAL RESERVE FUNDS

Articles 14 through 20 are Capital Reserve Funds. These are special town funds that can pay for current year expenditures but are also allowed to be used to save for future expenditures. This allows the town to purchase equipment and vehicles without having to incur finance charges. These funds are also important in that they support multi-year plans that enable the efficient management of town departments and enable the town to undertake large construction projects.

For example, we plan our vehicle replacements on 10 or 12 year schedules so that we have a dependable fleet and avoid excessive maintenance costs. Monies are saved for a number of years in some cases before the actual purchase is made. The Infrastructure Fund is used to accumulate funding for relatively large road and street construction projects.

While these funds have been included within the general town budget in the past, this year the State has advised the town that these funds need to be approved via special warrant articles.

ARTICLE 14: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$325,000) to be placed in the **INFRASTRUCTURE RECONSTRUCTION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This

appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended** by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).

This fund accumulates money to support road and street construction projects. Projects scheduled for 2010 include:

- Road reconstruction and paving on Kearsarge Road from the North South Road to Skimobile Rd.
- Reconstruction of Tasker Hill Bridge
- Street drainage reconstruction on Duprey and Ledgewood Roads

ARTICLE 15: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$155,000) to be placed in the **HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).**

This fund accumulates money to replace equipment and vehicles that are used for all public works activities such as snow plowing, road construction, drainage work and other critical functions. Because we save money up front, the Town avoids financing costs and keeps the budget level by making equal payments to this fund over a period of years thereby saving up for the purchase. Actual annual expenditures are based on equipment to be purchased that year. Currently equipment and vehicles are on a 10-12 year replacement cycle.

ARTICLE 16: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to contribute to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1).**

This fund accumulates money to purchase vehicles for the Police Department so that financing costs can be avoided. On alternating years, the Police Department purchases either one or two vehicles. This year the department plans to purchase two patrol cruisers. **ARTICLE 17:** (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) to be placed in the **MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).**

This fund provides for the on-going maintenance of our town buildings. Projects such as replacing heating systems or installation of a new roof are funded from this source. Projects for 2010 include the repair of the roof on the existing vehicle storage garage.

ARTICLE 18: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) to be placed in the **SOLID WASTE EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0).**

This fund accumulates money to support the replacement of equipment and vehicles that are used at the landfill and transfer station. By saving money up front, the Town avoids financing costs and keeps the budget level by making equal payments to this fund over a period of years. Actual annual expenditures are based on equipment to be purchased that year. Currently equipment and vehicles are on a 10-12 year replacement cycle.

ARTICLE 19: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) to be placed in the **LANDFILL CLOSURE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).**

The Town of Conway is required by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services to contribute to this fund which will be used to pay for the eventual closure of the existing landfill. If the town does not contribute to this fund, the landfill operating permit may be jeopardized.

ARTICLE 20: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$80,500) to be placed in the **LANDFILL EXPANSION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0).**

This fund provides for the accumulation of funding for the future expansion of the landfill which is scheduled for 2014. The annual contributions are necessary to ensure that the Town has adequate funding for the expansion of our municipal landfill.

ARTICLE 21: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$12,400) to purchase a **ROADSIDE SICKLE BAR MOWER FOR PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).**

This article proposes the purchase of a new mower that fits onto the tractor that mows the sides of town roads. Currently, we use a "flail mower" which is a drum type spinning mechanism that is pulled behind the tractor. It whips vegetation, knocking it down as much as cutting it. It is approximately 10 years old and has had multiple repairs. It has not been the best alternative for mowing as it often leaves stubs and small brush standing. Also, since it is a dragged behind the mower, the operator must look back to follow mowing progress, potentially paying less attention to what is in front.

The sickle bar mower is a reciprocating blade much like an electric hedge trimmer that cuts brush and small trees. Not only does this equipment do a better job, it is safer because the operator can pay better attention to his forward progress. In summary, the reasons for requesting the equipment are:

- The existing equipment is reaching the end of its useful life
- This blade will do a better job
- This blade will improve operator safety

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to purchase a **COMMERCIAL LAWN MOWER FOR THE RECREATION DEPARTMENT**. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-0).

This article requests authorization to replace an existing lawn mower in the Recreation Department. The existing mower is six years old and has close to 500 operating hours on it. It has had to be repaired on a regular basis during the last two seasons. Repair costs for the 2008-2009 seasons were \$1200.00. We believe that it is more cost effective to replace the mower with a newer more heavy duty model rather than to continue to repair the existing mower. The proposed purchase is a high grade commercial mower

that has a use life of 10+ years. The mower will be used to mow all of the town maintained parks, cemeteries, recreation fields and green spaces.

ARTICLE 23: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Six Thousand Dollars (\$306,000) (gross budget) for the construction of the **KEARSARGE ROAD PEDESTRIAN WAY/BIKE LANE** and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. The entire project funding amount shall be raised by grants and contributions such that no funds shall be raised by local property taxes. The **Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0).** The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation (9-2-0).

This article asks the voters to authorize the Town to accept grant money and local donations to fund the construction of a bike and pedestrian lane along Kearsarge Rd. in North Conway Village. This article approves spending monies received by the Town from grants and donations. Consequently, this article has no impact on the tax rate it will all be paid for with grants or donations.

ARTICLE 24: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Two Thousand Thirty Eight Dollars (\$122,038.00) from franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).**

This article asks the voters to place all of the Cable TV franchise fees received by the town into a trust fund to be used only for purposes related to Public Education and Government (PEG) television. PEG TV is currently broadcast on cable channel 3 and is provided for the Town of Conway by Valley Vision, a private non-profit organization. If the voters approve the placement of these funds in the trust, the Board of Selectmen intends to use \$92,000 to fund Valley Vision services for the year. The remaining monies will be deposited into the account for use for equipment purchases of other PEG related services, programs, or expenses.

ARTICLE 25: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (level funded from last year) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by **THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC.** Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).**

ARTICLE 26: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the **NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER** for programs of the

North Conway Community Center. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).

ARTICLE 27: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) in support of **CARROLL COUNTY TRANSIT** for the following transportation services; Public Transit Fixed and Commuter Routes, Demand Response Senior Transportation and Long Distance Non Emergency Medical Transportation. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-5-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-7-0).

ARTICLE 28: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for **TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION** for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0)**. **Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0)**.

ARTICLE 29: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-4-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).

ARTICLE 30: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars (\$4,128) (\$.45 per resident) in this fiscal year for the **AMERICAN RED CROSS/GRANITE CHAPTER**, to help support disaster preparedness, response and recovery; blood services; Armed Forces emergency services; international aide; and health and safety training to the benefit of residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1).** Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-10-0).

ARTICLE 31: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-3-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-0).

ARTICLE 32: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for **NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE**. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-2-1). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-5-1).

ARTICLE 33: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 34: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Twenty Five Dollars (\$2,025) to benefit those residents from the Town of Conway who need to participate in the MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY ADDICTION TREATMENT SOLUTIONS SLIDING SCALE FEE PROGRAM, which is established to provide access to treatment for individuals in the community who cannot otherwise pay full price for the addiction treatment program. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-4-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-8-2).

<u>ARTICLE 35</u>: To see if the Town of Conway will to vote to accept and maintain Robert Morrell Drive. (Submitted by Petition). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0).**

<u>ARTICLE 36</u>: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representative(s), our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President.

Resolved: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage".

(Submitted by Petition).

ARTICLE 37: To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SERVICE GARAGE FACT SHEET

Why is the Service Garage important to our community?

All vehicles and heavy equipment for town departments (Highway Department, Solid Waste, Town Hall, Recreation, and the Police Department, and Conway School District school buses) are maintained at the garage. This includes 58 vehicles, heavy equipment like road graders and plow trucks for Public Works, 20 school busses, and 17 vehicles for Police, Town Administration and Recreation. Garage employees make sure that our trucks and equipment are available for town projects and that our snow plows can keep the streets passable for travelers and emergency vehicles. Here in the "north country", plow drivers are truly "first responders" because they keep the roads clear for not only the general public but more importantly for other emergency responders (Police, Fire, and Ambulance).

Why do we need a new garage?

The garage is sixty years old, obsolete, deteriorated, and it no longer provides a safe, efficient workplace. Inspections by the Town Building Inspector, Fire Chief, liability insurance consultants, and independent engineers confirm that the building should be replaced or significantly rebuilt.

Structural problems: The mortar joints in walls are cracked in numerous places from the roof to the foundation (see Photos 3 and 4). The roof, doors, and windows all need replacement.

Life Safety concerns: The electrical system is undersized and has been repaired in a haphazard manner over the years. It does not meet current codes and must be replaced. A smoke/fire alarm system must be installed and the air handling system needs upgrading.

Energy efficiency: The building was constructed without regard for energy conservation. The roof is uninsulated and the windows are single pane casements and the block around the windows is crumbling creating drafty conditions (see Photo No 4).

What will the new garage look like?

The new garage will be about the same size as the current structure (6,000 square feet). It will have three bays with six work areas, an office, and storage areas. It will be a steel building with three doors on either gable end to create three drive through bays. The building will have radiant floor heat which is efficient and cost effective. It will also be well insulated to save on energy costs. It will be located at the Town Public Works yard in Center Conway adjacent to other public works buildings. The building will be consistent with all applicable workplace safety requirements.

What happens if we don't build a new garage this year?

Garage planning began in 2004 when the Town started setting aside construction funds through a Capital Reserve Account. If the garage is not built this year, the Town can no longer ask its employees to work in an unsafe situation. Consequently, safety issues must be addressed in 2010 and the Town will have to invest in the old building to fix the electrical system and install a fire alarm. In addition, immediate repairs are needed including new heaters and doors. The Town will have to spend somewhere between \$80,000 and \$120,000 to fix these problems in the near term. In addition, in a few

years, a new roof will be needed and heating system repairs are likely. Building now makes sense because we avoid these costs and a new building will be cheaper to construct now than in 5-10 years.

How much will it cost and how can we afford it in these tough economic times?

The Board of Selectmen understands that many people in our community are facing difficult economic times, and we understand that each member of the community will have to judge both what is best for them as well as the community in deciding whether to support the garage project. Consequently, we have worked hard with the Garage Building Committee to reduce the cost of the garage to a minimum and to provide a financing plan that is as affordable as possible while addressing this critical community need. The total project cost will not exceed \$600,000 (reduced from an estimated \$800,000 in 2009). To pay for the garage, we would spend \$200,000 in existing funds from the Capital Reserve Account and borrow up to \$400,000 for the total of \$600,000. The Board is also applying for a federal grant that could reduce the project cost by up to \$200,000. If this grant is awarded, then only about \$220,000 would be financed through a bond or loan.

Depending on how much is financed and the term of financing, the town will have to make annual payments of between \$30,000-\$50,000. This would result in an increase in the annual tax rate over the term of the bond of between 3 cents and 5 cents per thousand dollars of value. This means that for every \$100,000 in property value a taxpayer owns, their tax bill would increase by about \$3.00 to \$5.00 per year. The average tax payer's taxes (home valued at \$183,500) would increase by an estimated total of between \$5.50 and \$9.20 a year.

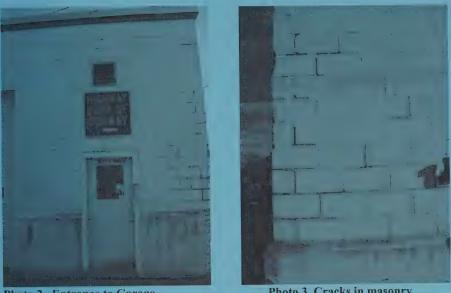

<u>ARTICLE 9</u>: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 8 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.7.6.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record <u>business</u> is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 10: To see if the Town will vote to adopt amendment No. 9 to Chapter 147 (Zoning Ordinance) to amend §147.13.8.6.7.6 as follows: "One (1) portable a-frame sign per lot of record business is permitted in the district, it may be displayed during business hours only, it shall have a message area of six square feet or less, no illumination of the sign is permitted and no appendages to the sign are permitted." Submitted by petition. Not Recommended by the Planning Board (0-5-0).

ARTICLE 11: BOND ARTICLE: To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000) (gross budget) for the construction of a new PUBLIC WORKS SERVICE GARAGE, such sum to be raised through the issuance of not more than Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000) of bonds or notes under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and other municipal officials to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon; furthermore, to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. Any such funding received will offset and reduce the total bond amount; and furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000) from the Buildings Maintenance Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose to be used to fund the garage construction. A 3/5 ballot vote required. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0). The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation (8-2-0).

ARTICLE 12: (Operating Budget) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an **OPERATING BUDGET**, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Eight Million Nine Hundred Twenty Nine Thousand Three Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,929,327). Should this article be defeated the default budget shall be Nine Million Two Hundred Forty Seven Thousand Four Hundred Forty Six Dollars (\$9,247,446) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. NOTE: This operating budget warrant article does not include appropriations contained in ANY other warrant articles. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-0).

ARTICLE 13: (Separate - not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town of Conway will vote to approve the cost items included in a **TWO-YEAR (2010-2011) COLLECTIVE BARGAINING AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF CONWAY AND AFSCME #93, LOCAL 859, DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS** which calls for no increase in benefits or costs to the Town for fiscal years 2010 and 2011. This means that the proposed contract results in no additional costs attributable to the increase in benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal years. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1).**

ARTICLE 14: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$325,000) to be placed in the **INFRASTRUCTURE RECONSTRUCTION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).**

ARTICLE 15: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Fifty Five Thousand Dollars (\$155,000) to be placed in the **HIGHWAY EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).**

<u>ARTICLE 16</u>: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). (Police Vehicles Capital Reserve Fund) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Eight Thousand Dollars (\$38,000.00) to contribute to the **CAPITAL RESERVE FUND FOR POLICE VEHICLES** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1).**

ARTICLE 17: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) to be placed in the **MAINTENANCE OF TOWN BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES CAPITAL RESERVE FUND** to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article12, the Operating Budget Article. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).** ARTICLE 18: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000) to be placed in the SOLID WASTE EQUIPMENT CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0).

ARTICLE 19: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand (\$30,000.00) to be placed in the LANDFILL CLOSURE CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 20: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$80,500) to be placed in the LANDFILL EXPANSION CAPITAL RESERVE FUND to be used according to the purposes for which the fund was established. This appropriation is in addition to Warrant Article 12, the Operating Budget Article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0).

ARTICLE 21: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$12,400) to purchase a ROADSIDE SICKLE BAR MOWER FOR PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-2-0).

ARTICLE 22: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to purchase a COMMERCIAL LAWN MOWER FOR THE RECREATION DEPARTMENT. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-0).

ARTICLE 23: (Special-not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Six Thousand Dollars (\$306,000) (gross budget) for the construction of the KEARSARGE ROAD PEDESTRIAN WAY/BIKE LANE and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for and accept any grant funding or other revenue in support of the project. The entire project funding amount shall be raised by grants and contributions such that no funds shall be raised by local property taxes. The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation (4-1-0). The Budget Committee recommends this appropriation (9-2-0).

ARTICLE 24: (Special - not included in Budget Appropriation Article 12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Twenty Two Thousand Thirty Eight Dollars (\$122,038.00) from franchise fees to add to the **PEG EXPENDABLE TRUST FUND**, to support the operations and equipment needs of the Public Education and Government station. No property tax funds will be raised to support this warrant article. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 25: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Two Thousand Dollars (\$32,000) (level funded from last year) to support the Conway home delivered meals (Meals on Wheels), congregate meals, transportation and program services provided by THE GIBSON CENTER FOR SENIOR SERVICES, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-1-0).

ARTICLE 26: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).

ARTICLE 27: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) in support of CARROLL COUNTY TRANSIT for the following transportation services; Public Transit Fixed and Commuter Routes, Demand Response Senior Transportation and Long Distance Non Emergency Medical Transportation: Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-5-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (4-7-0).

ARTICLE 28: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for **TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION** for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0)**. **Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-0)**.

ARTICLE 29: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Five Thousand Five Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$35,565) for the support of WHITE MOUNTAIN COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTER to help meet the healthcare needs of the uninsured and underinsured residents of the Town of Conway. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-4-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-0).

ARTICLE 30: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand One Hundred Twenty Eight Dollars (\$4,128) (\$.45 per resident) in this fiscal year for the **AMERICAN RED CROSS/GRANITE CHAPTER**, to help support disaster preparedness, response and recovery; blood services; Armed Forces emergency services; international aide; and health and safety training to the benefit of residents of Conway. Submitted by petition. **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-0-1)**. Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-10-0).

ARTICLE 31: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirteen Thousand Dollars (\$13,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of CHILDREN UNLIMITED, INC. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-3-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-0).

ARTICLE 32: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) for NORTH CONWAY DAY CARE. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-2-1). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-5-1).

ARTICLE 33: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for VAUGHAN COMMUNITY SERVICE, INC. Submitted by petition. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 34: (Special – not included in Budget Appropriation Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Twenty Five Dollars (\$2,025) to benefit those residents from the Town of Conway who need to participate in the **MOUNT WASHINGTON VALLEY ADDICTION TREATMENT SOLUTIONS SLIDING SCALE FEE PROGRAM**, which is established to provide access to treatment for individuals in the community who cannot otherwise pay full price for the addiction treatment program. Submitted by petition. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-4-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-8-2).

<u>ARTICLE 35</u>: To see if the Town of Conway will to vote to accept and maintain Robert Morrell Drive. (Submitted by Petition). **Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0).**

<u>ARTICLE 36</u>: To see if the Town will vote to approve the following resolution to be forwarded to our State Representative(s), our State Senator, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate President.

Resolved: The citizens of New Hampshire should be allowed to vote on an amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution that defines "marriage".

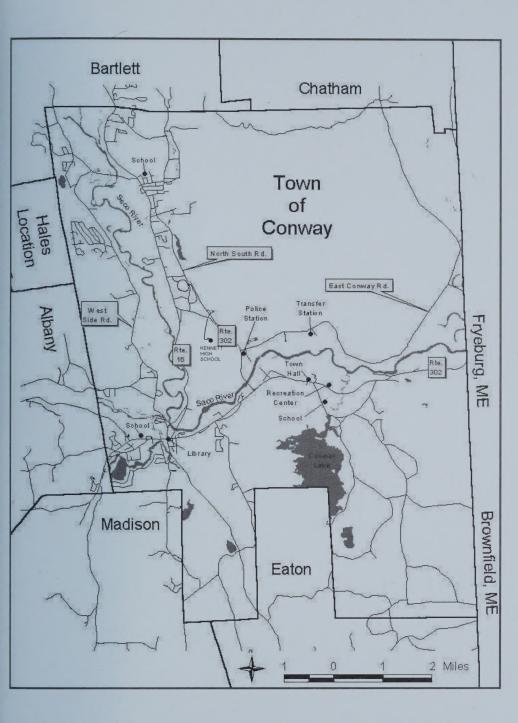
