RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 9, 1943

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 9th day of March 1943 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by the Moderator Alfred Osborne.

Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors. Whole number of names on the Checklist 873.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted to keep the polls open until 6 o'clock.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for Town Officers.

The Moderator called a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast 166-Blanks 5.

For Town Clerk

Frank H. Peaslee had 152 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Town Treasurer

Henry T. Osborne had 150 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Selectman for Three Years

Clarence S. Still had 142 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

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For Road Agent—North Division

Charles F. Bennett had 150 and was declared elected by the Moderator.

For Road Agent—East Division

Bernard L. Phelps had 146 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Road Agent-South Division

Frank A. Philbrick had 147 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Overseer of the Poor

Samuel D. Chase had	31
Harold E. Dean had	121

and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

For Auditors

Theodore W. Flanders had	138
Charles F. Eastman had	139
Gordon F. Boynton had	137

and were declared elected by the Moderator.

Upon motion of James L. Hills, the Moderator requested the voters present to unite in silent prayer, as evidence of our respect to our late Horace O. Chase which request was then reverently and universally respected.

Article 2. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted to raise the sum of \$8,500 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, Voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Alfred Osborne for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Alfred Osborne elected a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, Voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Eva M. Sawyer, Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Eva M. Sawyer elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Upon motion of Gerald H. Hight, Voted to raise the sum of \$6,000 for repair of Highways and Bridges, reserving 50% for Winter Roads.

Article 6. Upon motion of John H. Prescott, Voted to raise the sum of \$100 for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 7. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, Voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

Article 8. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.

Article 9. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, Voted that we accept State Aid and raise the sum as stated in the Article.

Article 10. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 11. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted to raise the sum of \$800 for the Weare Fire Department.

Article 12. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, Voted to raise the sum of \$100 for the repair of water holes.

Article 13. Upon motion of Gordon F. Boynton, Voted to raise the sum of \$100 for the East Weare Fire House.

Article 14. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, Voted to raise the sum of \$200 for Band Concerts.

Article 15. Upon motion of Harold E. Dean, Voted to raise the sum of \$200 for new books for the Library.

Article 16. Upon motion of Franklin Flanders, Voted to raise the sum of \$300 for the police and health departments.

Article 17. Upon motion of George A. Waterman, Voted to use the balance on hand from the amount raised last year.

Article 18. Upon motion of Harold E. Dean, Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 19. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of three to get data for a supplement to the Town History and raise the sum of \$100 for the same.

The Moderator appointed the following named committee, Scott F. Eastman, Marion L. Hardy, and Arnold T. Peaslee.

Article 20. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, Voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 21. Upon motion of Franklin Flanders, Voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 22. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, Voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 23. Upon motion of George M. Gunn, Voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 24. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, Voted that the sense of this meeting that water bars should be built on the hills that wash out badly. George C. Sawyer offered an amendment that it be done this year. The amendment was lost.

Article 25. Upon motion of Frank H. Peaslee, Voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 26. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted that the Selectmen have printed in the town report next year the names of all residents in the Armed services with rank of service.

Upon motion of Theodore W. Flanders, Voted that the Moderator appoint a committee to erect a temporary honor roll with the names of all in the Armed services on the lot at the Memorial Building. The Moderator appointed a committee consisting of Marion Hampton, Theodore W. Flanders, Harold E. Dean and Clarence S. Still.

Mrs. Marion Hampton offered to donate \$25.00 to help pay for the expense of erecting the Honor Roll. Harold E. Dean offered to paint the names on the Honor Roll.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, Voted that we give a rising vote of thanks to Mrs. Marion Hampton and Harold E. Dean for their generous offers.

Upon motion of Theodore W. Flanders, Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to employ council to retain the B. & M. R. R. Trucking for Freight and Express in and out of town.

Charles F. Eastman offered an amendment not to spend over \$200. The amendment was lost.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: also to elect Delegates to the National Conventions:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the Fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, and continue balloting until 6:00 P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of Highways and Bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

7. To make provision for the collection of Taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$708.18 to be used with the sum of \$2,832.73 to be furnished by the State.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the benefit of the Weare Library.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Police and Health Departments, due to the emergency.

14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for use at Chase Recreation Park. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

16. To see if the Town will set aside the amount required by law for State Aid Roads, for Post War Projects. If they receive T. R. A. each year.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds. 19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries, especially soldiers' graves.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs and improvement of the Town Office.

21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the plowing of driveways to be paid for by the owners or agents of the property.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on Water Holes.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to build a Bridge across the Piscataquog River to the so-called Kiley Land.

To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Weare Department answered 28 calls during 1943: 23 chimney fires; 4 building fires; and 1 brush fire. All fires were small and the resulting damage slight. As always chimney fires made up the big majority. The few fires which involved buildings all resulted from defective chimneys or from sparks coming from chimneys while burning out or from stacks of mills.

Owners or occupants of buildings are urged to have all defective and dangerous chimneys repaired without delay. Keep your chimneys clean and have all unused flue openings cemented up. Have a clean out door at the bottom and keep it cleaned out.

Investigate at once any smoke or smell of burning soot or creosote. Buildings are frequently set on fire from soot in the base of the chimney smoldering for long periods and heating the brick through.

Don't delay in calling aid when you have a chimney fire.

During 1943 the Department held twelve monthly meetings and several drills. The Auxiliary Fire Department has been active holding several meetings and drills during the year. Valuable assistance was given on several fires by the Auxiliary. We appreciate the assistance and interest of these Auxiliary members.

This past year a compressed air horn was installed on the garage at South Weare which makes us a quite satisfactory alarm for that village. A booster tank holding 60 gallons of water was installed on the South Weare truck also 150 feet of booster hose and a shutoff angle nozzle.

The East Weare fire station was painted and it is hoped that this building may be completed at some future time.

We purchased 4 additional firemen's coats and the unexpended balances of our appropriation were used in part to purchase a much needed power well pump. The water holes throughout the town were brushed out and fences repaired. The water holes are in quite good condition.

We hope that the exceptional record of 1943 may be continued and that the strength and efficiency of the department may be further increased during 1944.

The fine cooperation the department has received during the past year is deeply appreciated.

Art. 10. On motion of Clarence S. Still, voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

Art. 11. On motion of Chester W. French, voted that the School Board be authorized to sell the Rockland school house, so-called.

Art. 12. On motion of Norman Chase, voted that this article be indefinitely postponed.

The minutes have been read.

On motion of Wilbur W. Kamp, voted that this meeting be now adjourned.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Schools opened last fall with eight new teachers. In Weare High School Miss Catherine Chace of Southbridge, Massachusetts, a graduate of the New Jersey College for Women, replaced Miss Lunt who left to assume a position in Brattelboro, Vermont. Miss Joan Hall was engaged to teach Home Economics after Miss Dunbar resigned. Miss Hall is a graduate of Keene Teachers' College. Miss Rosella Smith, also a graduate of Keene, with previous teaching experience and graduate study at the University of Vermont, assumed the position of mathematics and biology.

At South Weare, Mrs. Helen Gutterson of Goffstown, a graduate of Keene with teaching experience, replaced Miss Charas on the latter's resignation.

At Weare Center, Mrs. Frances Gaffney, a graduate of Keene with teaching experience in Weare, succeeded Miss Kendall who left for another teaching position.

In North Weare, Miss Margaret Walsh of Medford, Massachusetts, a graduate of the Leslie Kindergarten School and Boston University, replaced Miss Miller who resigned to teach in Exeter.

In East Weare, Mrs. Eunice Drewry, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with teaching experience in Weare, succeeded Miss Peary who resigned to enter the armed services.

At Sugar Hill Mrs. Nellie Perrigo, a graduate of Keene with teaching experience in Weare and Beverly, Massachusetts, replaced Miss Conway who left to teach in Auburn. The enrollment last year, as will be seen by the table accompanying this report, was 235 as compared with 239 the year before. It is gratifying that the usual high school enrollment is being maintained at a time when many high school students in other communities are leaving school for employment.

Through the encouragement of the Parent Teacher Association and cooperation of others, lunch programs are being maintained at Weare High School and the Center. These are financed in part by the Food Distribution Administration.

The age for entrance to Grade I is five years and eight months September 1, or six years on or before the following January 1. This is a standard generally recommended in New Hampshire and followed by most school districts.

Headmaster Dodds describes details of the work carried on in Weare High School. I commend it to your attention. The addition of another teacher to the high school faculty has brought about a distinct improvement in the work of the school.

Teachers and pupils have cooperated in a fine manner to meet the increased demands of war and to prepare our students for the peace which will follow. The aims and objectives of instruction have been the training of youth for the immediate tasks at hand as well as to equip them with the knowledge and experience needed to live in the world of the future as worthy citizens.

Immediate demands for assistance in the war effort have been efficiently and cheerfully met in our own and in neighboring schools. These include help in planting , and harvesting farm crops, sale of war stamps in an ever increasing volume, issuance of Ration Book Four, Junior Red Cross activities, salvage collections and the like.

Teaching of the basic skills is the essential task of the schools and it is our policy to see that the job is thoroughly done by means of the best accepted methods. In order for pupils to succeed in school work it is necessary that they possess a good foundation in reading habits and abilities. For this reason the major part of book expenditures has been to equip elementary grades with a good reading system supplemented by workbook exercises for reading growth with correct language habits in writing and speaking.

We as citizens owe our gratitude to the teachers who have remaind loyal to their profession of teaching and to the married women who have assumed teaching positions which otherwise could not have been filled. Like their sisters in the armed forces, the Wits, our Women in Teaching Service, are protecting our social structure from danger. What our civilization may be tomorrow depends in large measure upon what the present generation becomes.

The future offers a great challenge. The shortage of teachers was acute last year; now it is alarming. It will remain serious even after the war, because new teachers are being trained in smaller and smaller numbers. Teacher college enrollments now are the smallest in many years. Consolidated schools and better salaries are measures which will be adopted in the most progressive towns to provide better advantages for children and to secure the best of available teachers.

The cooperation of parents, other citizens, and members of the school organization is greatly appreciated.

REPORT OF HEADMASTER WEARE HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Harlan Atherton, Superintendent of Schools,

Dear Mr. Atherton:

As I make this report I am more aware than ever before of how much effect the education, supervision and guidance of young people has upon their lives and upon the type of citizens we will have in the future. Within the last year and especially the last few months I have repeatedly heard and read reports of the increased number and severity of our youth problems. In each of these reports the thing which seems to stand out is the influence of the home or, as is so evident in these times, the lack of that influence. Reviewing the problems that we encounter at Weare High School, I am sure this loss of home guidance enters into very few of our cases. The people of Weare are fortunate in that they can exert their full share of effort in the war without making this sacrifice and we at the high school realize that our problems would be much more frequent and severe if it were not for the good home life that our students have in their out of school hours.

Our school has been effected by war conditions but not to the extent of many schools. Our enrollment is about the same and the percentage of students lost to the armed forces or to war industry has been small. Walter Turner a member of the class of 1944 was inducted into the army in January to become our only loss to these causes thus far.

Attendance seemingly is suffering compared with a state average which I notice has not dropped below 93% during the last nine years. Our average last year was slightly over 89%; for the first half of this year it is

91.4%, not including absence due to agricultural labor. I know that many of our students have been unable to get the most possible out of their classes because of the frequency of their being absent.

The most marked improvement in our high school this year is without question I think our addition of three basic courses in mathematics to the curriculum. Over 90% of the high school students are enrolled in at least one of them and the help these courses are and will be can not be over estimated.

I feel that the faculty of our school is making a determined effort to attain a high standard of scholarship and citizenship so that the young men and women leaving Weare High may be compared on any basis and found to possess the abilities and character to make him or her, not a future problem but a future asset to any community.

I feel especially indebted to you, Mr. Atherton for the help and inspiration you have been and to the others who by their cooperation have helped to make a successful school year.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Every child should make a regular annual gain; therefore, each pupil is weighed and measured at the beginning of the school year, then several times before the close of school in June, so that we may ascertain their rate of growth according to the scale prepared by the State Board of Health. The normal weight is judged according to the height and age of the child.

About 225 pupils were examined the first of the school year, and the parents notified of any weakness or defect found.

Frequent use of the clinics affords an opportunity for an early diagnosis, treatments and corrections without any or but little expense.

Due to the shortage of doctors in the fall of 1943, we have been unable to take advantage of the heart clinics usually held once a month at the Elliot Hospital.

This same condition exists in the dental profession, and we regret that we have been unable to hold our usual dental clinics this year.

We have been more fortunate with the orthopedic clinics for treatment by appointment only was given to several of our physically handicapped children in this Union,

This fall we have been unusually free from any kind of an epidemic, whereas in the fall of 1942 there were 18 cases of chicken pox and 12 cases of scarlet fever.

The audiometer test was given in February, 1943.

Toxoid treatments were given by Dr. Reiner to 31 school children and several pre-school children November, 1943.

Dr. Fraser examined all of the high school, giving special attention to those who were to play basketball.

I gave a demonstration on the blood bank to the High School at the time the Red Cross was asking for blood donors.

One hundred fifty-one home visits were made during this school year.

The school lunch program will reach all of the pupils in the High School and the Center School this year. This is especially beneficial to the children who cannot go home for a noon meal or who would have very little lunch if they did go home. This means better health records and better scholastic records, because their lunch will include at least one square meal a day.




