REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

During the past year the Board of Health has had its customary duties to perform, although no serious epidemic of contagious disease has been brought to its attention within the limits of the town. Clean out, clean up and keep clean is the message the Board brings to you this year. Clean out the wall, clean up the stable and outbuildings, keep clean your surroundings and thus enjoy more freedom from disease and as a consequence longer life and happiness.

By complaint the attention of the Board has been called to the proper disposition of dead animals. The law in this case is rather strict, quoting from the Public Health Laws, Sect. 12, Chapter 108 as follows: "If any person shall leave, or cause to be left, in or near a highway, street or public place, or shall allow to be exposed or unburied any animal or other substance liable to become putrid or offensive, or injurious to the public health, he shall be fined not exceeding twenty dollars." This means the early interment of horse, cow, cat, or other animal that may die from any cause about your premises.

Of late much has been said and written about the common house fly as a menace to the public health. This little insect is the filthiest and most dangerous of all living creatures. His filthy habits enable him to spread all kinds of germs of disease as the fly is as much at home in the stable as in the dining room. The fly breeds in filth, lives in filth, and carries filth everywhere with him. He wipes his feet on the food eaten, sips milk in the glass from which you drink and at the same time leaves the germs of typhoid or worse behind him. Considering the number of flies, the rapidity with which they multiply it may seem useless to try to destroy them but much can be done to eradicate this little pest. First screen up all places of entry. All food should be carefully screened or kept under cover. Not only the food for immediate use in the home but the food in the grocery and meat market should be well protected from flies.

Second, clean up the stable as the breeding place of most flies. The manure accumulated in the stable should be kept under cover by means of a closed shed into which through a window the manure could be pitched and the window closed in the interval. The refuse and garbage of the back yard should be carefully burned and all garbage pails sprinkled frequently with chloride of lime. This plan has been tried and the breeding of flies reduced to such an extent as for them to be hardly noticeable. We know not to what importance the fly may become as a carrier of disease and for our own protection and health let us consider the matter fully and "swat the fly."

Our attention has recently been called to an epidemic of acidosis or acute acid poisoning in a neighboring city. This disease seemed to attack all ages but particularly the young. A large number of cases were observed with many deaths among the children. The causation is obscure but the symptoms seem to indicate an interference with metabolism with the production of too much acid in the system. The early manifestations are sudden drowsiness, recurrent attacks of nausea and vomiting, diarrhoea, with cynosis, varying from a blueness about the mouth to a general blueness of the skin with a mottled appearance. Nervous symptoms from a restlessness and muscular twitching going on to convulsions and coma in the severe cases. Thirst, rapid wasting of tissues, fever and increased pulse rate are common. These symptoms when recognized early usually submit to the natural treatment of neutralizing acid with an alkali, by the administration of sodium bi-carbonate in large doses, accompanied by citrate of potassium, and thus a cure may be accomplished and dire results avoided.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

We herewith submit our report of the elementary schools of our town for the year ending July 15, 1913.

The financial accounts follow this report—the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1914.

Twelve schools were maintained the first two terms and thirteen the third term—a school being re-established at Joppa to better accommodate the young children of that section.

Thirty weeks constituted the school year. The aggregate number of pupils attending was 182. The work of the year was generally progressive and successful. The teachers were faithful in their work and earnestly used their best efforts for the benefit of the children. The discipline was generally good. The teachers should not allow or tolerate to any extent disorderly or insolent conduct on the part of any pupil, but should use her most tactful methods to suppress all acts of disobedience and disturbing influences and win over to herself the friendly spirit and harmonious relations of her pupils. Parents also should co-operate with teachers in training their children to be obedient, courteous and respectful at all times and instill into their minds that there is a time for play and a time for work and that these occupations should be kept separate to be enjoyed and bring the best results.

Teachers and parents should get acquainted and keep on friendly terms and use their combined efforts for the healthy growth of the children physically, morally and mentally during their school life.

Fifteen of our eighth grade pupils were admitted to the high school on examination at the beginning of the current school year and we understand that they are doing satisfactory work.

The schools have been provided with a better outfit of text-books this year. The new reading books are highly appreciated. The courses of study for all of our grades in all of our schools have a full day's work for every pupil for every school

day of the school year. Therefore pupils who are absent, or if present, fail to do their day's work, they must put in extra time and effort to do their neglected work or they may fail to be promoted to the next grade at the end of the year. We sometimes wonder if parents understand the extent of the hardship, the disappointment and discouragement they cause their children by keeping them out of school for trifling matters.

We now have in our schools efficient, earnest, progressive teachers and with the friendly co-operation of all our citizens we are hopeful for best results.

SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The past year has been one of the most successful and satisfactory in the history of the school. Under the management of the new principal, Prof. George H. Harmon, who began his work with the new school year, Simonds Free High school has taken a new and a long step forward. The enrollment of the school has never been larger, and there has been a marked improvement in the general status of the school. Mr. Harmon came to us with the best of recommendations which he is excellently sustaining. He is a born teacher, and the committee made no mistake when they secured his services. Miss Burdett and Mrs. Davis appear to be doing their part in their respective departments.

The graduating exercises of the class of 1913 occurred at the town hall, Friday afternoon, June 13. There were six members in the class—Alvah A. Clark and Vivian E. Andrew of Warner, Nellie G. Roby of Sutton, Marguerite A. Goodhue of Webster, and Reuben S. Moore and Helen J. Richards of Bradford. Misses Roby and Richards and Mr. Moore completed the English Commercial course, Miss Andrew the Commercial course, and Miss Goodhue and Mr. Clark the Latin Scientific course. Miss Andrew had previously graduated from the school, having completed the English course in 1911.

Thirty-one new pupils entered at the beginning of the school year, and the school opened with sixty pupils in attendance. Three of these have since left by change of residence, one has withdrawn to go to work and one is absent on account of illness. The number of non-resident pupils paying tuition is twenty-four. The graduating class for next June numbers four—three boys and one girl.

Work has gone on much the same as usual in the manual training department, and the boys have really accomplished quite a little in the workshop. They have made six dynamometer frames for testing concurrent forces and one frame for

testing parallel forces, two adjustable inclined planes, four pairs of draftsman's triangles, a double track acceleration platform, a barometer standard, a large shelf for neostyle in typewriter room, a chalk tray, and quite a number of useful articles along general lines. There is need among the boys of more instruction and practice in mechanical drawing and design.

I predict that at an early date, possibly in a year or two, there will have to be a change in the curriculum of the school. Some attention will have to be paid to the local demand. This is a rural community, and every boy does not demand or need a classical training, however valuable a knowledge of the classics may be. Individual tastes and talents have got to be considered. Some years ago a commercial department was added. The next step will be an agricultural department. I neither suggest or advise anything, I simply state that sooner or later, to hold our own with other high schools, something in this line will have to be done.

Before closing, I will suggest to the committee and the high school district the advisability if not the necessity of a renovation of the school building. There should be a new floor laid in the general recitation room. The plastering overhead is cracking and falling and should be replaced by new. At least \$500 should be expended in making needed repairs and improvements, and the matter ought not to be delayed. The school room has an old, defaced, worn-out look. An expenditure of the amount named would certainly brighten things up and make it a more cheerful and desirable study room for our young folks.

I have taken the courage to speak of this matter at this time because it will be the last opportunity I shall have to do so in this connection. My work as superintendent will close with this term. An embarrassment of labors, and especially a new duty which will call me out of town more or less the coming year renders this step necessary. I have enjoyed the work, my association with teachers and pupils and citizens have been more than ordinarily pleasant, and it is with regret that I sever the agreeable relationship.

PILLSBURY FREE LIBRARY.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Trustees of the Pillsbury Free Library:

In looking back over the years, I can recall none that have been so pleasant and prosperous, all things considered, as the one just ended.

There have been 484 borrowers, not quite as many as usual owing to the changes by death or removal from town, but more books have been given out than last year, 8,312 volumes; of these, fiction and juveniles head the list, followed by travel, general literature and biography. 519 magazines have been taken out for home reading.

We have purchased 276 books, some of them with the Pattee fund being higher priced than we should otherwise have had—books that will not soon wear out like the “best sellers”—thus carrying out what we feel was Mr. Pattee’s wish. In all our purchases, an effort is made to get those of a high character, and to suit the different tastes of the patrons. 33 volumes have been added by binding, and 58 volumes have been given us. Fred H. Heath, who allowed a choice to be made among his aunt’s books, and a lady, who sent 17 popular novels “which we have read,” have been the largest donors. Gifts have also been received from Mrs. Harry F. Walker of Peabody, Mass., Mrs. Hammond of West Newton, Mass., I. W. Adams of Cold Spring, N. Y., G. P. Putnam’s Sons of New York, Miss Emma F. Goodwin of Roxbury, Mass., H. W. Southworth of London, Slason Thompson of Chicago, Mrs. Nellie Howe Cummings, Mrs. Joel Jenkins, Mrs. L. A. Sherman, Fred Myron Colby, Miss Helen F. Sawyer, Mrs. E. L. Carroll, Paul T. Page, Dr. George T. Page, Mrs. Westervelt, Mrs. Florence T. Chase, Miss Annie L. Sawyer and the Campfire Girls.

Thanks are due here to the above list of donors for the interest they have felt and for the acceptable books they have given.

The periodicals are about the same. It is a matter of regret that more of the citizens do not avail themselves of the opportunities of the reading room.

The most important event of the year has been the making and printing of the new supplement No. 5, containing the books added in the last seven years, from late in 1806 to the middle of October, 1913—1345 titles.

A few months ago a cabinet of books for the little folks was fitted up and placed in the back part of the stack room. It has proved to be very successful and has given a great deal of pleasure to the happy children. They have their cards and are allowed to go in and select for themselves, and they always know what they want. One little girl, miles away, heard her cousin speak of "Old Mother West Wind" and sent for the book, and has been a constant reader since. If Mr. Burgess, the author, heard the inquiries, not only in the library but on the street, if "Mother West Wind's Neighbors" and "Johnnie Chuck" were in, he would feel that his work had not been in vain. Some who have read them are now getting advanced in their reading, and take out "The Boyhood of Lincoln," "Historic Boys," "The Children of History," "The Story of Lincoln's Mother," etc. One little fellow said to his grandmother, "I will get you a book. You must read 'Lincoln's Mother,' the greatest woman that ever lived!" Most of them could pass an examination in what they have read better than most of us. They are getting started in the right direction, with this taste for reading, and in future years will not be able to remember the time when they did not "take books from the library."

In concluding, let me here express what some of you have often said, that the trustees' meetings are so enjoyable that "we wish we could meet oftener."

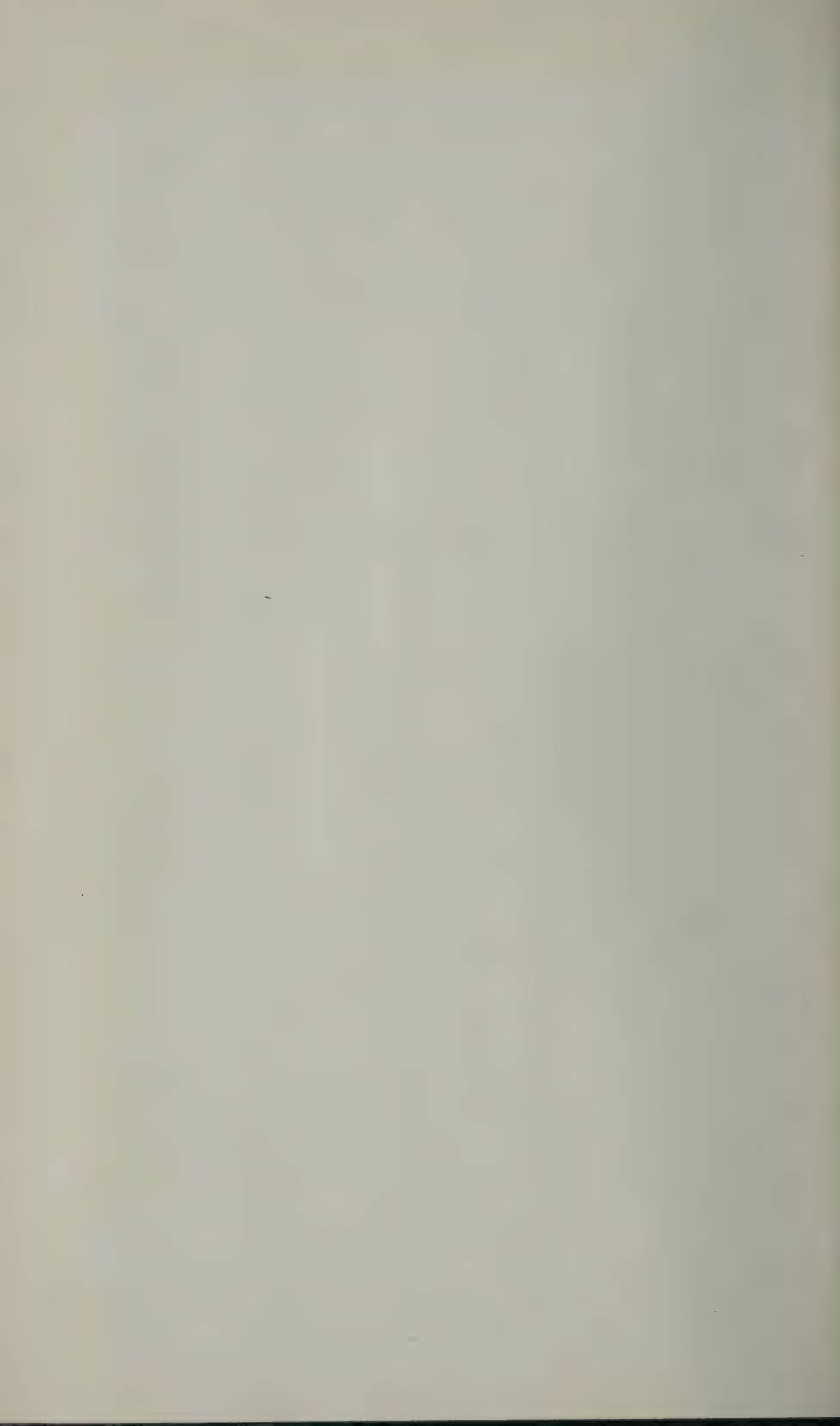
