RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

March 14, 1944

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 14th day of March 1944 at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by the Moderator, Alfred Osborne.

Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors. Whole number of names on the Checklist, 847.

Letter from War Finance Committee read by the Moderator, as follows:

March 11, 1944

Mrs. Frank N. Sawyer, Chairman
Weare War Finance Committee
Weare, New Hampshire

DEAR MRS. SAWYER:

The War Finance Committee congratulates you and your workers on your achievement in the Fourth War Loan which found New Hampshire citizens making home-front history. Our men and women on the fighting-fronts will be proud to know that we went over the top here at home by investing 52 million, 194 thousand dollars in them and in victory.

This historic and generous participation in the war may well be regarded as a fitting memorial to the leadership of our State Chairman, the late Winthrop L. Carter.

The final figures for the sales attributed to your community are shown on the attached slip. They constitute a very real contribution to the life and stability of your town as well as a contribution to winning the war.

In recognition and appreciation, we are enclosing a War Service Certificate for your community. Since this award is given to all the citizens of your town, it seems most appropriate that it be presented on Town Meeting Day. Will you be good enough to ask your local Moderator for some time at the opening of the meeting so that this certificate may be read and announcement may be made of your town's accomplishment in the drive. In this way the whole matter could be incorporated in your Town Report.

I want to thank you again personally for your share in the success of the Fourth War Loan.

and were declared elected by the Moderator.

Article 2. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$8,000 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Upon motion of James L. Hills, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Scott F. Eastman for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Scott F. Eastman elected a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Dorris D. Eaton, Trustee of the Library for three years.

This being done the Moderator declared Dorris D. Eaton elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of \$6,000 for repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.

Article 6. Upon motion of Clarence S. Still, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 7. Upon motion of J. Arline Porter, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

Article 8. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted that the discount on taxes be the same as last year.

Article 9. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted that we accept state aid and raise the sum of \$708.18.

Article 10. upon motion of Gordon F. Boynton, voted that we raise the sum of \$800 for the Weare Fire Department.

Article 11. Upon motion of Gerald H. Hight, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, voted to raise the sum of \$200 for new books for the library.

Article 13. Upon motion of Frank E. Davis, that we raise the sum of \$100. George A. Waterman offered an amendment to the motion that we raise the sum of \$50. The motion as amended was carried.

Article 14. Upon motion of Forrest Dearborn, that we raise the sum of \$50.00. On a division vote 40 voting in the affirmative and 53 in the negative the motion was lost.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$40 for use at Chase Recreational Park.

Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted that the Selectmen be instructed to get a deed of the land as soon as possible of the Chase Recreational Park.

Article 15. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted that the article be indefinitely postponed.

Article 16. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of \$500.

Article 17. Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted to dismiss the article.

Article 18. Upon motion of Gerald H. Hight, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 19. Upon motion of Clarence E. Leeds, voted to raise the sum of \$100.

Upon motion of Gordon F. Boynton, voted that the Trustees of the Trust Funds have charge of spending this money.

Article 20. Upon motion of Gordon F. Boynton, voted that we raise the sum of \$300 for repairs of the Town Office.

Article 21. Upon motion of Clarence E. Leeds, voted to dismiss the article.

Article 22. Upon motion of Charles H. Stafford, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for water holes.

Article 23. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that we raise the sum of \$300 to build a bridge as stated in the article, and when completed it is to be turned over to Mr. John G. Wilson with a provision to keep gates or bars at entrance and assume all liability that may occur from the same.

Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted that the Selectmen see that the Honor Roll is erected before Memorial Day.

Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that a complete list of all men and women from the town serving in the armed forces be printed in the 1944 Town Report.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the county of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, and continue balloting until 6:00 p. m., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.
4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.
5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads.
6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
7. To make provision for the collection of taxes.
8. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise

and appropriate the sum of \$1,418.56 to be used with the sum of \$5,674.23 to be furnished by the State.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weare Library.

13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for use at Chase Recreation Park.

14. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and set aside as a capital reserve a sum of money, not to exceed \$1,545.00, for State Aid Roads as a post war project.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the repairs to school buildings.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust control.

18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries, especially soldiers' graves.

20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on water holes.

21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

22. To see if the Town will vote to appoint, or elect, one Road Agent for the Town of Weare, beginning 1946.

23. To see if the Town will vote to support the United States membership in a general system of international cooperation such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks conference. Having police power to maintain the peace of the world.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

Alarms numbering 38 were answered by the Weare Department during 1944. This is an increase of 10 fires over the previous year and equals the high fire record of 1941.

Chimney fires numbered 17, building fires 9, brush fires 9, automobile fires 2 and rubbish fires 1. The increase in the number of building fires resulted from the ignition of several brooder houses from brooder stoves or their operation. These fires can be prevented by extra care in operating such stoves. Keep equipment clean and in good repair and watch for over-heating of stoves and the falling of live coals into the litter. There are a great number of brooders used in town and the highly inflammable nature of these buildings generally resulted in a total loss to the owner.

The 9 forest or brush fires which were extinguished during 1944 is by far the greatest number of this type of fire occurring in Weare in any one year. These fires were nearly all the results of burning rubbish out of doors without considering the possibility of the fires spreading to surrounding grass or woodland. Fortunately these fires were quickly discovered and prompt action taken to extinguish them.

These fires were all caused by burning without the necessary permit of the forest fire warden.

Before burning rubbish or brush call the forest fire warden. The law requires a permit before any fire may be kindled in the open except when the ground is covered with snow.

The person kindling a fire in the open is responsible for the costs of suppression and all damage done. Play

safe, ask for a permit. Burn only under proper conditions and in safe places.

Monthly meetings were held during the year and were well attended. The Auxiliary Department, composed of older high school boys, rendered valuable assistance on many of the fires. Several training sessions were held for both the regular and auxiliary departments.

Response to fires has been good but the loss of several more members of the department by induction into the armed forces has made it very difficult to maintain the strength and efficiency of the department.

A siren has been procured for East Weare village and 200 feet of hose has been added as well as some pieces of small equipment. Considerable work was done to improve the condition of equipment and buildings of the department.

Labor conditions made it impossible to do our regular improvement work on water holes. Fences were repaired and a survey of the water supplies of the town was made.

The cooperation of the people of Weare is deeply appreciated at this time when war conditions make it so difficult to carry on. The department hopes to be able to render even more efficient service in the future.

We urge all to make every effort to prevent fires from starting and above all, continually be fire reminded.

DEAR SIR:

The last Legislature enacted a law suspending all State Aid Construction on Class II highways until the termination of the present war and for six months thereafter. Therefore, there are no state funds available for Class II construction for the year 1945. However, it is the desire of all concerned that the unimproved mileage of Class II roads on the Orange System be completed as soon as possible.

With that in mind, would your town care to raise any money this year for this purpose, the same to be set aside for future construction when state moneys became available?

This year, your town is eligible for Town Road Aid. At the close of the war, however, the statute of 1941 will be in effect—that any town with the unimproved Class II highways on the Orange System must expend its State Aid money on this Orange line until it is completed, and the towns cannot have Town Road Aid during that time. Therefore, if funds can be raised at this time to match State funds which will become available later, it might hasten the time that your town would again become eligible for Town Road Aid.

You would have been asked to raise \$1,545.00 this year if the State Aid Law had not been suspended.

REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

During the year, 1944, our town was exceptionally fortunate in that we were entirely free from any cases of Infantile Paralysis. Communicable diseases were at a very low ebb in Weare throughout the entire year.

One case of Spinal Meningitis was reported; prompt and expert attention cleared this case up in record time.

The dump situation became troublesome during the year, but was taken care of as promptly as possible, and today we enjoy a well organized dump. The residents of Weare must have a dump, in fact with the various divisions making up our town more than one dump is necessary, but the residents of Weare must realize that the dump problem rests equally upon the residents and the Board of Health. Dead fowl, unhatched eggs, dead animals and other objectionable refuse should be burned. The residents of Weare must deposit their refuse at the dump proper, and not along the road and path leading to it. The cost of caring for the dump is paid for by your taxes. Help keep the cost down by proper disposal of your refuse.

Colds are the basis of most illness. If you have a common cold, stay at home, go to bed, rest. Cough, sneeze or expectorate in your handkerchief if you must, it prevents spreading disease. Do not attend large gatherings, movies, card parties, dances or other public functions when you have a cold or feel a cold coming on. Let's all try to make Weare the healthiest town in New Hampshire.

Art. 12. On motion of George Sawyer, voted that we raise the sum of \$200.00.

Art. 14. On motion of Theodore W. Flanders, voted that this be left with the School Board.

On motion of Frank H. Peaslee, voted that it is the sense of this meeting that the School Board have inserted in the Warrant next year an article to see if the Agricultural course be changed to a Commercial course, and appropriate money for the same.

On motion of Edith Turner, voted that we pray for our boys in the service. The Lord's prayer was repeated in unison.

The minutes have been read.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Weare:

The present school year opened with an enrollment of 105 in the five elementary schools and 93 in the high school building,—52 in the senior high and 41 in grades 7 and 8. These figures represent decreases of 17 in the elementary schools and of 16 in the senior high, with an increase of 10 in grades 7 and 8. At the present time the North Weare School is the only school operating with a small enrollment, the remaining schools being at near capacity.

Several teacher changes were necessary during the summer months. At the high school Miss Barbara M. Joyce of East Bridgewater, Mass., was engaged to teach home economics and Miss Elizabeth Sawyer of Weare the French and English. Considerable difficulty was experienced in securing a social studies and mathematics teacher, but, after a period of substitute teachers, Mrs. Pearl L. Lambert of Manchester (formerly of East Weare) was engaged. With a background of many years of successful teaching in Farmington, Mrs. Lambert has become a valuable addition to the High School staff.

In the South Weare School Mrs. Freda Connor of Goffstown replaced Mrs. Helen Gutterson, but due to home conditions Mrs. Connor was forced to ask for her release in mid December. (At this writing no permanent replacement has been obtained.) Mrs. Reita Davis of Weare Center took over the East Weare School, and Mrs. Doris C. Morse of Henniker the North Weare School. Mrs. Ruth Comstock and Mrs. Nellie Perrigo returned to the Center and Sugar Hill Schools respectively.

Early in January it was considered advisable to close the Sugar Hill school and transport the children to the East Weare school. Since both groups were relatively small, such consolidation could be made without overcrowding the East Weare school.

With the supply of teachers at the zero point, I feel that the Weare schools are more than fortunate in their teaching staff. In these days of teacher shortages rural communities are at a disadvantage, and to be able to employ a staff such as we now have is a fortunate situation.

The teacher situation for the future is anything but encouraging. With but a third as many teachers being trained in our teacher training institutions, and with every available teacher now being employed, it is doubtful if we will be able to take care of the normal turnover of teachers this coming year. As far as the situation throughout the state is concerned there are several obvious conclusions to be drawn. In the first place teacher salaries must be sufficiently attractive to retain every teacher now in service, and to draw into the field other potential teachers. Furthermore, undoubtedly, many town will have to resort to further consolidation of schools, for it is obvious that very shortly there will not be sufficient teachers to handle the number of schools now in operation.

All of the pupils in our schools with the exception of the South Weare school are having the benefit of a noon lunch program with the assistance of the War Food Administration. (The shifting of teachers at the South School made such a program impossible.) Mrs. Edith Purrington, Mrs. Reita Davis, and Mrs. Doris Morse are preparing the lunches at the high school, East, and North Weare schools respectively. With the Center school youngsters participating in the high school program, between 80 and 100 pupils are served each day at the latter school.

Due to war conditions, books and supplies have been difficult to obtain. With publishing houses subjected to quota restrictions, deliveries of workbooks have been delayed five and six months. The teachers have, however, done an exceptionally fine job under the circumstances, and their fine spirit of cooperation is to be commended.

At the end of this report you will note the statistics for the year 1943-44. In most cases the per cent of attendance is quite acceptable, but the tardiness record is one of which we can not be proud. I realize that many of our pupils have long walks to school, but, when we consider the numbers which are transported, it would seem that we could expect a better tardiness record. Good teaching and proper books and equipment cannot accomplish the proper educational goal if youngsters are not in school regularly. I feel that the parents should do all in their power to cooperate in our endeavor to secure more punctual and regular attendance.

There is also included at the end of the report a five-year table which gives a picture as to the enrollment trends in the various schools for the past five years. During that period we have had a steady decrease in the numbers of pupils in our elementary schools. It would seem, however, that with larger numbers in our lower grades, we could expect that the low point had been reached and that we might expect a slight increase in the next few years.

In closing I should again like to express my appreciation to the teachers for their fine spirit in these difficult times, and to the School Board for its cooperation and interest in the affairs of the schools of Weare.

**REPORT OF HEADMASTER
WEARE HIGH SCHOOL**

Mr. Lewis Foote,

DEAR MR. FOOTE:

I hereby submit the annual report of Weare High School.

Fifty-two students enrolled at Weare High school this past September. This was sixteen less than a year ago. The principal reasons involved for this decrease were transferrals to other schools; a smaller group entering, and boys leaving to enter the armed forces. Only three have discontinued their schooling.

The Junior High enrollment has increased this year due to the shifting of all seventh and eighth grade students to the one central building.

I believe that this change has worked out reasonably well. These students are becoming accustomed to having a number of teachers rather than one and adjusting to the personality problems that come from associating with larger groups and older students. There is sometimes the disadvantage of less opportunity for individual help because of the increased number in classes.

It is very encouraging to be able to report that our attendance records have definitely improved over last year and would be considered excellent at present. Our chief attendance problem this year has been that of supplying necessary agricultural labor from a small group of high school boys. While this does not count as an absence in the register, it still creates problems of make-ups for both teachers and students and tends

to decrease the amount of material that can be covered as well as lowering the quality of work done by the individual pupil.

The schedule has been changed this year to include eight forty-minute periods instead of six sixty-minute periods. This has made it possible to offer more choice of subjects and generally tends to make smaller classes.

In concluding this part of my report I would like to make known that we are planning to run a set of regular school classes at the monthly meeting of the P. T. A. held during March. There will be at that time an opportunity for parents and friends to visit classes, see work displayed and discuss with faculty members school problems in which they are interested.

In connection with subjects that you may wish to get more information on and discuss at that meeting, I would like to suggest the following as needs and goals for the school.

The desirability of having more reference material. This would include sets of encyclopedias, up to date map groups and special reference books for various classes.

There is every indication that visual education can make schools more efficient and it would seem desirable, that, as soon as possible, a complete outfit to this type of teaching assistance should be available to the school.

Considerable equipment is being made available to schools at present and more will be as war materials are released. The chief requirement to get this equipment is that the school be able to use it. This means that additional courses should be added to the curriculum whenever it is practical. In this connection I feel definitely that there is and will continue to be a need for another full time teacher to handle regularly scheduled classes and hope that there might be worked

out, a plan, either on a town or union basis to make available selective credits in different types of musical work.

There are many needs along the lines of physical education. We unquestionably do not do enough for any students, especially those who do not engage in varsity sports, along these lines. The idea of a large percentage of physically fit students, who are able to play a number of sports fairly well, rather than a few more experts, seems to be growing in favor. This program would require regularly scheduled classes with sufficient personnel and facilities to handle them.

It would seem to me, that all of these things indicate the need of further consolidation and the increased efficiency which it allows.

These things are mentioned as needs and goals principally for the future. However, along with our more urgent present problems, they can be given some consideration and planning, the chances of making good final decisions should be that much better.

May I express my thanks to you; the School Board and the people of the town of Weare for their co-operative assistance.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

The school nurse submits the following report for the school year September, 1943, through December, 1944:

About 225 pupils were examined and the parents notified of any weakness or defect noted.

The following report shows the number of pupils affected at the time of the regular fall examination:

Defective vision, 30; number of defects corrected, 26.
Defective teeth, 158; number of defects corrected, 45.
Disased tonsils, 25; number of defects corrected, 16.

There have been two cases of chicken pox, one case of scarlet fever, one case of diphtheria, three cases of measles, and five cases of mumps.

Two pupils had an appendectomy.

One pupil suffered a fractured arm.

One pupil had a double hernia operation.

Dr. Fraser examined the high school students giving special attention to those who wished to play basketball

Due to the shortage of doctors we have been unable to take advantage of the heart clinics held the first of every month at the Elliot Hospital. Five children have been under the care of their family physician.

Many of our children have not received adequate dental care due to the same existing condition. We have been unable to have our usual dental clinics which have meant so much to the pupils who have found it difficult to get to the city to their family dentist on account of the gas situation.

When the first two million selectees for the Army were examined dental defects rejected more men than any other defect. To improve this condition, the dental profession is giving special attention for the duration, to high school seniors. The purpose is to attempt to improve the dental condition of our boys and girls in their senior year of school.

I have given a "Victory Corp Dental Card" to each senior and the dentists have agreed to recognize high school seniors on a priority basis and give such pupils a free dental examination. A record will be kept in the high school, of those receiving cards, when they are returned signed by their dentist and what corrections have been made.

The Patch test was given in April, 1944, to all seniors and freshmen. Eight grammar school pupils were also given the test. Later nine of these had a chest X-ray at Dr. Kerr's clinic in Manchester. All were found negative to pulmonary tuberculosis.

In November, 1943, a toxoid clinic was held in the grammar schools.

Dr. Reiner gave twenty-eight children the treatment.

We have been promised the audiometer this spring. This test is to determine whether a child can hear clearly.

The high school and three of the grammar schools are enjoying a hot noon day lunch this year.

124 home visits have been made during this period.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this state 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
