REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

The members of a health board in a country town should consist of a physician, a lawyer and a business man, thereby combining the prompt decision of the physician, the deliberate opinion of the lawyer, with the public viewpoint of the business man. Three average men of these callings will usually have no difficulty in harmonious action on any subject when it is desirable to accomplish the best results. They should invite and be willing to listen to complaints of any character, to make inquiry and investigation and then to apply forcibly the proper remedy to relieve existing conditions. To them all sorts of complaints will be referred. Citizens who are ignorant of sanitation or laws of health tell the board what they ought to do or ought not to do in any instance that may occur, but are very indignant if some smell or disease is definitely traced to their premises. However, a proper health board will accomplish results, protect the community against itself, and individuals against themselves, without friends to favor or enemies to punish. All should be of the same class and treated alike as far as the spread of contagion or sanitation are concerned.

Quarantine is established for the protection of the public and is attended with more or less loss and discomfort to the afflicted family or person. Conditions vary much and no rule can be established just how far assistance should be given, but the law cannot be considered as an insurance against loss when in quarantine. Medical attention should be provided when needed when the parties are unable to employ a physician. Antitoxin should be promptly and freely furnished by the town, both for curative and prophylactic purposes. A nurse should be furnished if needed and the family is unable to pay for her services. A claim by the wage earner for time lost should not be allowed but financial aid may be provided as seems reasonable to the board. In cases of scarlet fever and typhoid the sale of milk from the premises is prohibited and a compensation for milk not sold should not be allowed. Complete disinfection

of the premises following certain communicable diseases should be accomplished by the board and no part of the expense should be borne by the parties involved, but paid by the town. Costs while in quarantine must be charged to the incidental expenses of the town and not to any pauper account unless persons aided are already paupers.

The board of health attended a conference of state and local boards of health at Concord in March, 1914, and received much instruction on sanitation and public health. To us the most important paper and discussion was upon "Free-flowing, Tight, Sanitary Sewage Tanks." The plans proposed the construction of a rectangular cement tank, underground and air tight, one six feet long, four feet wide, and four feet six inches deep being of a sufficient size for a house accommodating fifteen people. The inlet to be lower than outlet, a gas space of twelve inches between cover and contents, cover to be without vent. This tank when properly constructed is practically guaranteed to take care of all sewage without odor or inconvenience of any kind. Details of the construction of these tanks, which seem to have satisfactorily settled the problem of sewage disposal in the country, can be obtained by applying to the board.

The general health and sanitary conditions in our town the past year have been far above that of the average country town. Our excellent water supply, and our extensive system of sewers contribute in no small degree to the health of our community. The board wishes to recommend to the inhabitants of the precinct the use of Silver lake water, connection of their dwellings with the sewer and the installation of water closets. It is the opinion of the board that no well should be used or cesspool allowed within the limits of the precinct.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The school year embraced in this report closed July 15, 1914. The treasurer's report is for the fiscal year ending Feb. 15, 1915.

Thirteen schools were maintained an average of thirty-two weeks in this school year. The total number of children in the district between the ages of five and sixteen years, September 1913, was 168: 78 boys and 90 girls. The largest enrollment of pupils in any school was 30 and the smallest 2. Seventeen of the eighth grade pupils were admitted to the high school at the beginning of the current school year.

We consider ourselves fortunate in being able to procure for our schools, teachers who look upon the traditional methods of school teaching and school government as having exceeded their years of usefulness, and have qualified themselves in up-to-date methods in harmony with child nature and child ability. We are well pleased with the results of the year's work. Our teachers have been interested, animated and faithful, and good progress has been made. We want to do more and better work. We want to add to our curriculum some work in elementary agriculture, elementary domestic arts, and manual training. We believe something can be accomplished in this new work without retarding progress in the fundamentals.

Parents and citizens by visiting the schools and manifesting a friendly interest in the teacher's work and the children's efforts will add a stimulus to both teacher and pupil to do more and better work.

More than the usual expense has been put into repairs of the one-room, rural schoolhouses, an effort being made to make them more attractive, more comfortable and more sanitary. We hope the new schoolhouse at Davisville will be completed before the end of the current school year. When it is finished we want all of the citizens of the town to inspect it and take notice of the conveniences provided for carrying on the elementary principles of vocational work; to observe that light is admitted to the main room from high windows at the backs and left of pupils when seated, and that sanitation is as well provided for as conditions will permit.

There is an increasing interest over the entire state for the children in the elementary schools to successfully complete the eighth grade work and pass to the high school and take a full course of four years there. We earnestly hope that the parents and children of this town will become enthused by the benefits to be derived from a high school course, and that at least eighty per cent. of all the school children in town may complete the work of one of the four-year courses in Simonds Free High School. Make the effort and you will succeed.

Allow us an appropriation for a school year of thirty-six weeks and we will guarantee that our teachers will qualify for promotion at the end of the year all the normal children who have been regular in attendance.

SIMONDS FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The last annual report of the Simonds Free High School covered the time to Feb. 15, 1914. This report begins at the date the last report closed. No changes were made at this time of teachers or the courses of study, and the work of the school was carried on satisfactorily, under existing conditions, to the end of the school year in June.

Commencement exercises were held at the town hall on Thursday afternoon, June 18. The graduating class consisted of four members: Clara Annette Cressy of Bradford, Ralph Josiah Loveren of Hancock, Edwin John Andrew and Carl Russell Flagg of Warner. All having completed the English-Commercial course, besides having shown proficiency in manual training, were presented with diplomas. Rev. Whitman S. Bassett, chaplain of the N. H. state prison, entertained the large audience with an excellent address on the subject, "Hard Places." Randall's orchestra of Boston furnished inspiring music. The annual reunion of the Alumni association held in the evening was largely attended. Arthur Fischer of Boston gave an excellent rendering of the delightful play, "The Fortune Hunter." Randall's orchestra, six pieces, gave a charming concert and furnished music for dancing.

In order to keep pace with the tendency of the times and to better serve the educational interests of this locality, the faculty of the school had carefully prepared two new courses of study which were approved by Henry C. Morrison, state superintendent of public instruction. At the beginning of the current school year, the curriculum embracing four courses was adopted, viz, Latin-Scientific, English-Commercial, Agronomy, and Domestic Science. The work in manual training done by the boys is under the instruction of the teacher of agronomy; work done by the girls is supervised by the teacher of domestic arts.

At the close of the school last June, Miss Burdette, a thoroughly competent teacher, left her position on account of changes in the curriculum.

During the summer vacation extensive repairs were made in the interior of the school building. In the assembly room the old plastering was removed and steel ceiling and wall board were substituted. The badly worn Carolina pine floor was taken up and a hardwood floor was laid in its place. The taste and skill of the painter made the room attractive in appearance. The floor was finished in its natural color, and the wainscotting and casings were dressed with varnish. The wall board was painted a delicate shade of green. The steam pipes and radiators were dressed with aluminum paint. The ceiling has a light steel-gray appearance. The walls and ceilings of the rooms and passage ways on the first floor and the corridors leading to the second floor were improved by paint and varnish.

The first term of the current school year commenced Tuesday, September 8th. The services of Prof. George H. Harmon, principal, and Mrs. Florence T. Davis, teacher of the commercial course, were secured at the close of the last year. Harlon C. Dyke, B. S., a graduate of the University of Vermont last June, was hired to take charge of the agronomy course. Miss Amy H. Edmands, B. A., a graduate of Middlebury College, was engaged to have charge of the domestic science course.

The faculty as now constituted is individually carrying on his or her work with best results. Some of the work done by Mr. Dyke and Miss Edmands is as follows:

WORK IN AGRONOMY.

Shop work: Broom holders, necktie holders, hammer handles, coat hangers, test-tube racks, cupboards, brackets, skis, drawing boards, picture frames, ice boxes, germination boxes, pie-pan racks, sleds, bookcases, filing boxes, repair of school furniture. Project in process of construction: Forge shop, 25 by 20 feet, 9 foot posts, stone foundation.

Experiments conducted in agronomy: To show that soil is largely of rock origin; to show the effect of gravity upon soil transportation; to illustrate the abrasive work of ice in soil formation; to illustrate the abrasive effect of moving water in soil formation; to show that plant life tends to form soil from rocks; to show that animal life has a bearing upon soil-making; to indicate the difference in origin, formation, nature and uses of soils; per cent. of air in soil; to show water capacity of different soils; to show the percolation or downward passage of water; capillary rise of water in soils; to show how roots take moisture from soil; to show how soils may be tested for acidity; to determine if moisture is necessary for germination; to prove

that the absorption of water by the seed enables the seed to perform work; to ascertain the effect of temperature on the germination of seeds; to ascertain the effect of soluble salts on the absorption of water by the seeds; to show the bad effects of an excessive application of soluble fertilizer salts on soils in which the seeds have just been planted; to show that oxygen is necessary for the germination of seeds; to observe the effect of the depth of planting upon the germination of seeds; fall plowing.

Experiments to be conducted: Study of potato tuber; potato scab; variation in potatoes; preparation of Bordeaux mixture; germination tests of corn; study of characteristics of grain of corn, butt and tip kernels of seed corn; vitality of seeds; large vs. small seeds as crop producers; to prove that the elements, nitrogen, potassium and phosphorus, are necessary for the growth of plants; mixing of fertilizers; to compare the fertility of soils and their corresponding subsoils; to determine the plant foods lacking in various soils; a study of the different crude fertilizers; to study methods of sampling soils; to show effect of puddling on the structure of soils; to show effect of freezing and thawing on soil structure; running trial drainage lines.

Field experiments to be carried out: Various experiments using hot-bed; spring plowing; lime experiments; experiments using various amounts and kinds of fertilizers; showing value of seed selection; such matters as cultivation, tillage, harvesting, and study of market conditions to be given due consideration.

WORK IN DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

Canning and preserving: Pickled pears, peaches, tomatoes, green corn, crab apple jelly, green tomato pickles, canned apples, grape juice.

Cooking: Clear and thick soup, buttered and cream toast, griddle cakes, baked, boiled, mashed, and steamed potatoes, beef stew with dumplings, omelet, macaroni and cheese, vegetable, fish and fruit salads, fried fish, salmon soufflé, white and brown bread, corn cake, muffins, baking powder biscuits, cottage and Indian puddings, one-egg cake, gingerbread, cookies, coffee, cocoa, tea. Served four luncheons. Made a fireless cooker.

Sewing projects by entire class: Dish towels, dish cloths, aprons, caps, holders. Drafting.

Sewing projects by individuals: Combination suit, chemise, corset cover, waist, pillow cases, sheet, towels.

The enrollment of pupils at the opening of the fall term was 74, 45 girls and 29 boys. Present enrollment, 69, 40 girls and 29 boys. The number of tuition pupils is 36. Number of Warner pupils admitted to the freshman class, 17. Number of pupils in the courses: Latin-Scientific, 13; English-Commercial, 29; Agronomy, 14; Domestic Science, 10; special, 3. Number in the senior class to graduate next June, 6, 4 girls and 2 boys.

The lyceum conducted by the students is teaching its members how to conduct an organized body. It stimulates sociality. It is a means of restful recreation and improves the members in preparing recitations, essays, papers and arguments and presenting them before an assembly. The programs have been very interesting.

The general interest in athletic sports should be encouraged. It is conceded that good results are derived from contests and that a high per cent. of those who excel in athletic exercises also excel in class work.

A few conveniences for indoor class work are needed. The laboratory room is too circumscribed for the indoor experimental and class work in agronomy, and without doubt the membership of this course will be more than doubled next year.

The ten enthusiastic young ladies find that the outfit for the little kitchen provided for practical domestic science work leaves them very little room to receive and execute the instructions of Miss Edmands.

To obviate these difficulties without great expense, there is ample space in the upper part of the school building that could be utilized. This problem can be solved by finishing in this space the two rooms needed and constructing a stairway leading to them. With this accomplished, the laboratory will be relieved of its present congested condition and the commercial room now overcrowded by the typewriters can be relieved by returning the stands and typewriters to their former place in the room given up for domestic science work.

We want to suggest to every pupil now attending the high school that the benefits derived increase in a tenfold ratio year after year to the completion of a four years' course. Stay and receive your reward.

The school is in an excellent condition. The business is being carried on industriously by teachers thoroughly equipped and well adapted to their work. A spirit of activity and contentment seems to pervade the school. We believe it will be for the best interests of our high school to retain the services of

the present teachers for the coming year if they can be induced to remain.
