## **RECORD OF TOWN MEETING**

March 13, 1945.

At a legal meeting of the inhabitants of Weare, on the 13th day of March, 1945, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon.

The meeting was called to order and the Warrant read by the Moderator, Alfred Osborne.

Also the posting of the Checklist by the Supervisors.

Whole number of names on the Checklist 865.

Article 1. Proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The Moderator called for a recess for 30 minutes.

Met after recess and proceeded to ballot for town officers.

The whole number of ballots cast, 348.

### **For Town Clerk**

Frank H. Peaslee had 321 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

### **For Town Treasurer**

Henry T. Osborne had 313 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

### **For Selectman for Three Years**

Samuel D. Chase had 169; George A. Waterman had 177, and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

### **For Road Agent — North Division**

William H. Wheldon had 162; Charles F. Bennett had 173, and was declared elected by the Moderator.

### **For Road Agent — East Division**

Bernard L. Phelps had 274 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

### **For Road Agent — South Division**

Frank A. Philbrick had 270 and was declared elected by the Moderator and in open meeting took the oath of office by law prescribed.

### **For Overseer of the Poor**

Samuel D. Chase had 286 and was declared elected by the Moderator.

### **For Auditors**

Theodore W. Flanders had 296; Charles F. Eastman had 296; Harold W. Felch had 280, and were declared severally elected by the Moderator.

Article 2. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$8,000 to defray town charges.

Article 3. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk cast one ballot for Elwin L. Hardy for Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Elwin L. Hardy elected a Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

Article 4. Upon motion of Scott F. Eastman, voted that the Clerk, cast one ballot for Helen Dearborn for Trustee of the Library for three years. This being done the Moderator declared Helen Dearborn elected a Trustee of the Library for three years.

Article 5. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer to raise the sum of \$10,000 for repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50 per cent for winter roads. George A. Water-

man offered an amendment that \$1,000 of the summer money be used to cut bushes. The motion as amended was carried.

Article 6. Upon motion of Gerald H. Hight, voted to raise the sum of \$100 for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 7. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones that we allow the same discount on taxes as last year. Chester W. French offered an amendment to allow 3% on all taxes to August 1st, 1945. The motion as amended was carried.

Article 8. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that it be left with the Selectmen.

Article 9. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of \$1,418.56 for Class V highways.

Article 10. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of \$900 for the Weare Fire Department.

Article 11. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 12. Upon motion of Theodore W. Flanders, voted to raise the sum of \$450 and instruct the Trustees to put additional insurance on the Library building.

Article 13. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to raise the sum of \$250 for use at Chase Recreational Park.

Upon motion of George M. Gunn, voted to take up Article 23 at this time for discussion.

Upon motion of Frank E. Davis, voted to return to Article 14 at this time.

Article 14. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to dismiss the Article.



Article 15. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$1,545.00 as a Post-War Project on State Aid Roads.

Article 16. Upon motion of Gordon W. Porter, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 17. Upon motion of Charles F. Carter, voted to dismiss the Article.

Article 18. Upon motion of Fred C. Jones, voted that the Selectmen be authorized to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 19. Upon motion of Charles F. Carter, voted to raise the sum of \$100.

Article 20. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to raise the sum of \$200.

Article 21. Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to raise the sum of \$200.

Article 22. Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted that the Article be voted on by ballot. On a ballot vote 106 voting in the affirmative and 34 in the negative the article was carried.

Article 23. On a ballot vote 219 voted in the affirmative and 18 in the negative and the article was carried.

Article 24. Upon motion of Frank E. Davis, voted that the Moderator appoint a committee of five to report at the next Annual Town Meeting to make recommendations for improvements at Chase Recreational Park.

May 26th, 1945, Committee appointed by the Moderator, are as follows: Frank E. Davis, Samuel D. Chase, Dorris D. Eaton, Hazel J. Grant and George A. Waterman.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that the Moderator fill vacancies on the Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted to give Samuel D. Chase a rising vote of thanks for his services in obtaining additional land at Chase Recreational Park.

Upon motion of Charles F. Eastman, voted that Gerald H. Hight be a committee to report at our next Annual Town Meeting on the needs of a new building for the Fire Department.

Upon motion of George C. Sawyer, voted to sell the Tramp House to Ren. W. Philbrick for one dollar (\$1.00).

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Weare in the county of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Weare on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Trust Funds for three years.

4. To choose by separate ballot one Trustee of the Library for three years.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges, reserving 50% for winter roads. Also to include Road Agent's salary.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

7. To make provision for the collection of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V highways, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,570.98 to be used with the sum of \$6,283.90 to be furnished by the State.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weare Library.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,575.00; the State to furnish \$3,150.00, to be used for the construction of State Aid Roads. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of neglected cemeteries, especially soldiers' graves.

16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be expended on water holes.

17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for band concerts.

18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to securing a resident physician, and raise an appropriate sum of money for the same. Also take any other vote relating thereto.

19. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of highway equipment. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.

20. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for painting and repairing the Town Hall.

21. To see if the Town will discontinue the practice of placing wreaths on soldiers' graves. Also to take any other vote relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to increase the compensation of the Town Officers and employees to 75 cents per hour.

23. To see if the Town will vote to have one janitor for all of the Town buildings at Weare Center, and vote to raise and appropriate the money for same.

24. To see if the Town will vote to secure a bus line and take any other vote relating thereto.

25. To see if the Town will vote to join the Merrimack Valley Region Association, and raise and appropriate the money for same.

26. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and make appropriation to cover the expense of such an audit.

27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for white pine blister rust.

28. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

---

During 1945 the Weare Fire Department answered 27 alarms. While this number is less than the year before, the loss was greater and the nature of the fires more serious.

There were 14 chimney fires, 5 building fires, 1 brush fire, 1 fire in rubbish, 2 fires at the town dump, and 2 false alarms. The department was called out of town twice for one building and one brush fire. The trend in building fires this year seems to be from chicken houses to dwelling houses.

Of the 5 building fires, 4 were started from chimneys and funnels, either burning out or becoming overheated. The practice of keeping chimneys clean and to remedy dangerous conditions in chimneys and funnels cannot be overemphasized. If you are in doubt as to the condition of your chimneys and funnels, play safe and have repairs made at once. Don't take chances of losing your home. To prevent fires occurring is just as important a function of a fire department as putting them out.

Only 1 brush fire occurred this past season. Keeping brush fires to this low number reflects credit on the people of Weare in being careful with fire, and burning, only, with permission of the Forest Fire Warden.

The work of the department was deeply appreciated at a large forest fire in an adjoining town.

The meetings of the department held monthly were well attended. Several drills were held and the auxiliary was maintained with these older school boys giving assistance at several fires. Several more of our members have been taken into the armed forces. Many of the members who had been in the service have returned to town and it is hoped that they will come back into the department.

It has been difficult to carry on without these men as they held many of the key positions in the companies.

During this past year we have finished the station at East Weare. A cement floor was put in, the building insulated inside, and hose racks built. It is now possible to heat this station when the equipment must be serviced, the hose dried and repacked after use.

One hundred feet of new booster hose was purchased as well as hose fittings, back pack pumps, coats, and electric lanterns.

A siren was purchased for South Weare Village and will fill a gap in our siren system in that section.

Flags were presented to the Center and East Weare Companies and flag poles were put up at both stations so they might be displayed.

The members of the department had an honor roll placed on the Center Station. Thirteen members having been in the armed forces.

A survey of the water holes was made, some fences repaired and brush cut. We could not hire labor to clean out or do other improvement work. These water holes are in good condition and it is hoped that others may be added where they are much needed.

At the last town meeting the matter of a new fire station at Weare Center was brought up. A new station would be very desirable as the location of the present one is very dangerous and it is difficult to heat. We hope a station can be built when conditions make such a project practical.

The department appreciated the support received this past year and hopes for continued success and cooperation.

## REPORT OF HEALTH OFFICER

---

During the past year, your Health Department has accomplished an outstanding feat in regards to the "Dump" situation. The North Weare dump is in excellent condition; the East Weare, Boston & Maine station hole has been burned over and cleaned up. This hole is not a public dump, and never was intended as such. All this has been done at the Taxpayer's expense. We have practically no enforceable laws regarding Town Dumps except the Public Nuisance law. This law is one of the most difficult to enforce because it necessitates the appearance in court of one neighbor against another, and when we have to live together year in and year out it is seldom possible to apply this law.

The road to the North Weare dump is in good condition the year round. Mr. Sam Buzzell is there at regular hours for the purpose of assistance in the proper disposal of your refuse and the care of the dump. Some of our residents still insist in throwing their refuse just inside the gate and along the road to the dump proper. Many times the names of offenders appears on tags, labels and letters disposed of in this fashion. If this continues your Board of Health will be forced to take drastic steps to prosecute these offenders and protect the taxpayers who have enough civic pride to abide by the dump regulations.

At each of the Post Offices in Weare is posted the State Board of Health Chart on communicable diseases. You will note thereon "Chicken Pox," "Measles" and "Mumps." During the past year Weare has had a lion's share of these diseases. As you will note, from the chart, no contagious disease card is necessary and no quarantine, except for the patient. This is not in keeping with the ideas of your Health Officer, but is the State Law. Your Health Officer is not appointed by the Town; his name is recommended to the State and his appointment comes from Concord, and he in conjunction with the three Selectmen constitute your Board of Health.

During the past year your Board of Health has not had one report from any attending physician regarding the three diseases mentioned above.

The water situation at all the schools was checked and a report is in the hands of your Health Department on all of the sources of Public Supply.

These reports showed an abominable condition of the drinking water at the schools; however, conditions are being rectified as fast as possible.

The drainage system in the Town of Weare is another important matter. Septic tanks and cesspools must be drained properly or our drinking water situation will be in a deplorable situation throughout the entire town. East Weare is only 13 miles from Concord State House, North Weare 15 miles, and Manchester is less than 14 miles from South Weare. Both these cities are overcrowded and with the return of automobiles, tires and gas the "Weares" will be the logical suburbs of these cities and we must look ahead to this end, and institute proper health regulations.

It is with this in mind that I hope to have embodied in the Town Warrant a set of Local Health regulations, to be acted upon by the residents at the annual Town Meeting. If these regulations are not presented in time for the warrant, I am in hopes the townspeople will demand a presentation of this matter at the meeting.

Intestinal Flu and other stomach disorders have been on the upswing for the past few years, due, no doubt, to the amount of poison spraying done by the farmers to protect their crops. All fruits and vegetables should be thoroughly washed before using. The promiscuous use of D. D. T. in the field will have devastating effect on the bee population and without bees there will be no pollination and consequently no crops. The use of D. D. T. in dust form, oil solution or wettable solution is extremely dangerous unless you have a thorough knowledge of its application.

**REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS**

---

To the School District of Weare:

I hereby submit my annual report as superintendent of the schools of Weare.

The current school year opened with but little change in the enrollment figures in the elementary and high schools. We were fortunate in having return to us for another year practically the same teaching staff as of the previous year. At the High School Mr. Dodds, Miss Batchelder, Mrs. Lambert, and Miss Joyce returned, and Marion L. Clark of Kingston, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire in 1945, was secured to replace Elizabeth Sawyer in Languages. In the several elementary schools Mrs. Morse, Mrs. Davis, and Mrs. Comstock returned for another year, and Mrs. Verna Sawyer who was at the South Weare School for some time last spring returned to that school. We are indeed fortunate in these days of teacher shortage to have experienced teachers in our elementary schools.

For a report on the work at the Junior-Senior High School I refer you to the report of Headmaster Dodds, which follows. There is but one addition I would like to make and that concerns certain curriculum adjustments which had to be made as a result of circumstances existing in these difficult days.

It was not possible to employ a teacher of English who was also qualified according to state standards to handle the course in French. For that reason it was necessary for such pupils to be enrolled in the Extension Division of the University of Nebraska. The material provided by that institution is quite adequate and is being used in many of our smaller high schools throughout the state when it has not been possible to employ teachers in certain fields. Obviously such an arrangement is not ideal,

but it is on the whole a satisfactory substitute for the normal program.

At the School District meeting held last spring, the desire was expressed to add Bookkeeping to our High School program of studies. This we attempted to do, but as no teacher on the present staff could be certified for the assignment, it was not possible to carry out the wishes of the district meeting. We will, however, keep that fact in mind, and as soon as the personnel is available, it will be incorporated in the program.

The only major change in the elementary schools was the semi-consolidation of the Center and North Weare Schools. The Center School was over-crowded a year ago, while the enrollment at the North Weare School was rather small. By consolidating three grades in each building (grades 1-3 at North Weare, and grades 4-6 at the Center), not only was a more even distribution obtained, but a much more satisfactory teaching situation provided. At these two schools we now have three instead of six grades in each, and it is evident that a far finer type of teaching is being done than was possible a year ago. I realize that the item of transportation is not ideal for the youngsters at the Center, but I am firmly convinced that the finer teaching results obtained under this arrangement far offset the disadvantages of transportation.

The consolidation of grades such as was mentioned above is also in line with procedures which are being carried out in all parts of the country. With a continued scarcity of teachers it is imperative that the rural communities take steps to make the teaching positions as attractive as possible. It is no longer a question of consolidation over non-consolidation, but a question of being able to maintain schools with properly qualified teachers. It is today practically impossible to hire teachers to come into a rural town to teach rural schools of six or eight grades per room. There are at this moment several

schools in nearby towns that have been closed for want of a teacher. The more attractive the teaching situation in Weare, the more likely we are to have good teachers and good schools.

May I express my appreciation to the teachers, School Board, and townspeople for their fine spirit of cooperation in school affairs.

**REPORT OF HEADMASTER  
WEARE HIGH SCHOOL**

---

Dear Mr. Foote:

Following is the report of the Weare Junior-Senior High School.

School opened with eighty-six pupils enrolling: forty-nine in high school and thirty-seven in junior high. There has been a rather heavy percentage of dropouts since the opening of school, primarily due to lack of sufficient interest in or desire for an education on the part of the pupils.

This problem becomes more serious when we realize that in many cases those who drop out have the ability to do good high school work. This same factor is present to a rather alarming degree even among students still in school—the “just-get-by” student, interested more in passing than in getting the most from his subjects. Many students who become disciplinary problems in the school or home have this type of attitude.

It cannot be overemphasized that one of the greatest contributions which parents can make, from the time their children enter school until the task is complete, is to instill in the student's mind a definite desire to secure a good education. Learning is most often, if not always, the result of a desire to learn.

The school's part in this problem is more that of providing sufficient variety of courses to give every student a chance in his or her desired line. Like any other small school we have a hard time establishing such a curriculum. Our courses are pretty much the basic necessities and do not allow much opportunity for a student to select courses within their range of ability and aptitude. How-

ever, I still feel that our basic courses are the ones the majority of students should be taking, and that their problem is one of realizing the necessity of these courses before they are beyond school age.

We have added one important new social studies course to the curriculum this year; that of World Problems. It is hoped that it will cause students to think of problems on a world basis, become more conscious of and better informed about these problems, and help create a realization that people the world over have one common task—that of working together for the good of all.

Facing the fact that we do have problems as a school I can sincerely say that, considering the problems and their causes, we have one of the finest groups of students. If they can keep the perspective which many of them have at present, in spite of their exposure to a time and age group which has the worst juvenile delinquency record in our nation's history, they can become valuable leaders of the future.

I have asked each faculty member to comment briefly on his department and include same in this report.

### **Report of Junior High School**

During the year 1944-45 the enrollment was increased by transporting all pupils of the seventh and eighth grades from all districts to this school. While this made somewhat larger classes, forty pupils in all, it has been beneficial for all the pupils. Before this, some did not come to the Junior-Senior High School until ready for the ninth grade. By this arrangement they have had an opportunity to become adjusted to working with larger groups and have enjoyed the privileges this school can offer—cooking and sewing, athletics, student organizations, hot lunches, and assembly programs.

Because the majority of Junior High pupils come on busses there is not much opportunity after school to work with individuals who get a little behind with their work,

so it is very necessary for these pupils, particularly, to do more home study and keep up with their work. There is, however, some opportunity for individual help during study periods and pupils are urged to avail themselves of this opportunity.

The attendance record for the majority has been good, the poor attendance coming generally from a few who habitually have a poor record. We find that poor attendance is one of the most important factors toward low grades and failures.

We are trying to make Junior High as efficient as possible and we appreciate the parents' cooperation in sending children to school regularly and seeing that they do a reasonable amount of studying at home. (Leona M. Batchelder).

### **Home Economics**

The Home Economics classes of Weare High School are having a busy and successful year. As the high school classes are alternated, this year the juniors and seniors are studying Home Management, concerning various duties and factors dealing with the successful managing of the home. For one of their class projects, the girls have just remodeled and refinished a miniature house. This is only one of the interesting undertakings of the class.

The freshmen and sophomores have a course in textiles and clothing. Not only do the girls learn clothing construction and care, but the manufacture and buying of clothing and factors of good grooming.

The Junior High School girls have completed their work in foods concerning nutrition as well as planning, buying, preparing, and serving attractive meals. The second half of the school year is devoted to clothing selection, construction, and care.

The girls are encouraged to carry out home projects in relation to their class work, and in which they acquire

practical application. Educators have proved that people learn by engaging in the activity to be learned, and that is the objective of the Home Economics course. (Barbara M. Joyce).

### English

The English program for Weare High School students has been set up in such a way as to meet the desires of students who need a more thorough knowledge of the structure of the English language. Experience has shown that the prevailing lack of this knowledge is a serious handicap in lifetime situations, and we are endeavoring to remedy this situation by a thorough study and review of grammar. Several units of work involving the fundamental grammatical principles and forms have been used, with applications of such principles constituting units in written expression.

Oral expression is an important phase of the English curriculum, and it is extremely vital because correct oral expression strengthens a student's self-confidence and clears his mental processes. With the aid of the **Reader's Digest**, the junior and senior classes have corrected several weak points betrayed in everyday speaking activities. This contemporary magazine has proved itself to be invaluable because its centers of interests arise from real life situations which oftentimes are within the experience of the student.

To further the interest and perfection of oral expression, we have organized a dramatic club. Officers have been elected and a constitution has been set up, stating the objectives of the organization. The second half of the club year will be devoted to play production, which will stimulate self-confidence in the individual and cooperation within the group.

The literary phase of the English program covers several units of the year's work. The literature in the classroom is not only the study of the older and worth-

while classics, but also the best in current literature. Book reviews have stimulated interest in specific fields of interest in several instances, whereas, in other instances the students have developed a wider field of comprehension. (Marion L. Clark).

### **Mathematics**

This year we are offering General Mathematics, Algebra I, and Algebra II, for high school students; all of them being elective subjects. In all these classes you get some seniors, some juniors and sophomores, of varying ages and abilities; this makes quite a difference in the results.

All students need some mathematics, because mathematics enters into many problems in everyday life, whether at work, at home, or at play. I think possibly there is a need for more students to have more mathematics, at least, enough so that they are sure of the fundamentals and how to apply them in other work at school, and, after they leave school. There seems to be a tendency for quite a few students to get help from others—I think this is a poor procedure because oftentimes the work is done for them by the helper and the student doesn't actually know how to do it himself—this, I consider, more harmful than helpful. Each student should attempt to do his own work, getting necessary help from the teacher. In mathematics a student should feel free to ask about anything he doesn't really understand, for in that way a teacher can find out the weak spots in his mathematics and help him. (Pearl L. Lambert).

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

---

The school nurse submits this report for the school year, September, 1944 through December, 1945.

About two hundred pupils were examined in the fall, and the parents were notified of any defects found.

Dr. Fraser examined all of the pupils in the High School, giving special attention to those wishing to play basketball.

The following report shows the number of pupils affected at the time of the examination:

Defective vision 35. Number of defects corrected 28.

Defective teeth 120. Number of defects corrected 85.

Diseased tonsils 30. Number of defects corrected 15.

Thirteen children had chicken pox.

Twenty-one children had mumps.

One child had a fractured collar bone.

One child had a fractured leg.

There were two appendectomy cases.

Three children were given the Patch test, and all were found negative to tuberculosis.

On May 2, 1945 the audiometer test was given. Nine showed a slight hearing loss.

This year all schools have had hot noon-day lunches, with the exception of South Weare.

In view of the increased number of cases of diphtheria in this country the State Department of Health and the State Board of Education are combining their efforts to prevent, as far as possible, any spread of diphtheria by an intensive program of immunization by establishing clinics which will reach every community.

Those children through the fourth grade who have had one treatment are advised to have the second one, and babies from the age of six months on should all be protected by this procedure of immunization.

January 10, 1946 will be the date of our first toxoid clinic, followed in about one month with the second.
