#### **TOWN WARRANT**

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its State Aid and Trunk Line roads.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

7. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

14. To see what action the town will take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for observance of Old Home Day or take any action relative thereto.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness

17. To see what action the town will take in regard to rebuilding some of its bridges, raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

18. To see if the town will vote to use the Australian Ballot system in the election of its town officers or take any action in relation thereto.

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19. To see what action the town will take relative to the removal of snow from other than "traveled roads of the highway."

20. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to insure its town trucks.

21. To see if the town will vote to establish a Municipal Court within its confines, raise money for same, or take any action relative thereto.

22. To see if the town will authorize its Selectmen and Treasurer to issue to the Hillsboro Guaranty Savings Bank in settlement of the Town's present indebtedness, its notes bearing 5% interest, as follows:

Four notes of \$3,000.00 each payable serially, beginning December 15, 1936, and one \$800.00 note due December 15, 1940.

23. To see if the meeting will decide by a two-thirds majority vote that it is necessary and wise to reconstruct the old stone bridge over the Contoocook River in the Village of Henniker about one mile from the birthplace of Edna Dean Proctor, and thereby authorize the use of such portion of the principal and accrued income of the trust fund established under Paragraph Second of the will of said Edna Dean Proctor as may be needed to pay for one-half the cost of such reconstruction, the other half thereof to be supplied by the State.

24. To see if the town will vote to apply for State Aid to pay for one-half the cost of reconstructing the old stone bridge over the Contoocook River referred to in the preceding article.

25. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting and raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the same.

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#### **HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT**

During the past year there has been several cases of scarlet fever, mumps, measles and one case of diphtheria, none of which were fatal, in Henniker.

Have placed cards on thirteen houses as the law demands and quarantined five houses, and fumigated such places as needed to be. Have recorded eight certificates of vaccination.

Collected water in six places and milk in eight places and sent them to the Laboratory of Hygiene, examined one hospital and nursery and signed certificates for the continuance of each.

Examined conditions of dead animals in two places and ordered proper burial of them. Each complaint has been looked into and proper action taken.

Mr. Edwin J. Foster of Plymouth, N. The gift from Mrs. Levi French of twelve carefully chosen girls' books was very acceptable. She also brought a tax collector's book dated 1825, which is the oldest one we have. This was when Deacon George Connor was tax collector.

Paul Hooper presented four boys' books.

We are grateful for all that adds to the use and interest of the Library.

The "Story Hour" for the children began the Saturday following the observance of book week, and is held every Saturday afternoon at two-thirty. This Story Hour in no way suggests school-work, but is a pleasant time for the chi dren, in which they get acquainted with the library and the proper use of it and learn to enjoy coming to it.

In May a party was held in the Azalea Park which was ideal for that purpose only that a guard had to Le posted to prevent any of the little ones going too near the bank of the river.

l will add that in addition to the circulation recorded we have been able to borrow from the Boston public Library nine books for Mr. L. M. A. Roy who needed books more technical than could be obtained in New Hampshire, also from New York, Interbranch Loan Division we received thirty-one for Mr. Roy. It was gratifying the cordial and friendly interest shown in procuring just the books desired, and willingness to loan them even to those outside of their state.

We are sincerely grateful to all who contribute help and gifts to the Library and take this opportunity of saying "Thank You."

It is gratifying to note that the record of tardiness, of which we have had no reason to be proud for several years, is noticeably improving. The Quaker Street and Hemlock Corner schools were the only two that could be seriously criticized in this respect, having over four tardinesses per pupil.

This present year, the enrollment of the primary room at the Central school is still so large that an assistant teacher is necessary. Among the rural schools, there are three that are very small this year—Westboro Corner, Quaker Street, and Hemlock Corner.

#### Our High School

With an increase in enrollment ranging from a maximum of ninety last year to a total of one hundred eight this year, we are fortunate to be out of the crowded Central building and into the spacious and adequately equipped Cogswell Memorial structure. One cause for the increase in number of pupils is probably the attractiveness of our new surroundings and broad courses, since several tuition pupils from Bradford have joined us.

Some of the features of the new school which are vastly superior to former facilities are the mechanic arts department, the home economics rooms, and the science laboratory. The latter is equipped with water, gas, and electrical outlets so that all experiments necessary for the science courses may be conveniently done.

Our school has qualified for Federal aid under the George-Reed Act this year. This law provides limited funds from the Federal government for those schools teaching home economics which are willing to meet certain requirements. The essential changes for Henniker are the lengthening of class periods to ninety minutes and the assignment of certain home projects to girls taking home economics, these projects to be carried on throughout the year under the supervision of the teacher.

A feature of the work done by the home economics department is the serving of hot lunches to from forty to fifty pupils who carry their dinners to school. This service is usually started about Thanksgiving, and continues during the cold months. It is extended also to the youngsters from the Central building. By careful buying and planning, we have made a uniform price of two cents for a cup of hot cocoa and three cents for a basic dish such as beef stew, meat and mashed potato, macaroni and cheese, or some kind of nourishing soup. Pupils who prefer to bring milk, vegetables, or other produce instead of money are given credit at market prices for their contributions. The maximum charge of five cents per meal is probably the lowest price for which quality food, well cooked and served hot, can be obtained in any school.

The mechanic arts department engineered an interesting experiment at Christmas time when many broken and discarded toys were rounded up, repaired and repainted, and distributed with the help of local ministers to make numerous children happy. There is a great opportunity for practical work to be done outside the school shop by boys taking the mechanic arts courses. Repair work of various kinds, or even the erection of a small building such as a henhouse or garage, could be done by the boys for any parent or neighbor who desires such work, and is not in too great haste to see it completed. Such work would be done on the home grounds, supervised by the instructor. Opportunities and suggestions of this sort will be welcomed.

Attempt is being made in those classes whose nature permits, to focus the attention of the students upon world problems. One class is including in its work a day by day study of the progress of the World Disarmament Conference recently begun at Geneva. Co-operation and friendly international understanding are being encouraged by the development of an International Friendship Club, the Henniker unit being but one of hundreds of such clubs located throughout the world. Through corrspondence with our foreign neighbors we hope to learn much of value concerning the manners, customs, and problems of other countries.

The school has undertaken a varied and wholesome physical education program during recesses of fall and spring. Mass games are conducted; among them soccer, tag football, field hockey, and volley ball. Some track events are also conducted, and several meets have been held with neighboring schools. Such a project as a general field day with about a half dozen nearby small high schools competing is now under consideration for next spring.

A tennis court, just back of the new school, has been constructed with the help and co-operation of townspeople and school folk. Much work has been done in an effort to convert the court into a skating rink this winter, but unusually warm weather has so far blocked its final success. The lack of a good gymnasium is keenly felt during the winter, especially by those who remain at school during the noon hour.

#### MUSIC SUPERVISION IN RURAL SCHOOLS

For several years the Central school has had the benefit of the services of a music supervisor. This year, through the co-operation of three school districts, Henniker, Weare and Dunbarton, we have a full-time supervisor who has charge of the rural schools as well as the high and elementary schools in the village. Miss Lucile Thompson, a graduate of Keene Normal School, serves in that capacity, spending two days of each week in Henniker, two in Weare, and one in Dunbarton. She has proved herself a very capable teacher, and her services are much appreciated by teachers and pupils.

#### THE GEORGE WASHINGTON BICENTENNIAL

February 22 of this year marked the two hundredth anniversary of the birth of our first President. To plan a fit commemoration of the event, there has been appointed by act of Congress the George Washington Bicentennial Commission, which stands ready to co-operate with educators and other local workers in a celebration which shall last from February 22 till Thanksgiving Day, 1932.

Much material has been prepared by the Commission and is available for the use of teachers. Celebration of this anniversary should include special instruction in schools regarding the life of Washington, as well as public programs in his honor.

#### Possible Economies

In these days of economic depression and falling prices, every item for which public money is spent needs to be carefully scrutinized. No doubt many who read this report would be pleased to learn of specific ways in which the cost of our schools could be decreased.

Year by year, as the school board's budget is made out, each item is studied with care, and set at the lowest reasonable figure. This year's requests do not differ much from those of a year ago. Prices of school supplies are somewhat lower, and fuel can be bought for less; but these represent only minor items.

In the matter of school repairs, it is good policy to choose one building each for a thorough job, such as was done at Westboro Corner a year ago, leaving the other schools with as little work as is essential to get along. In a time when money must be saved more carefully than ever, such a program of school improvement can be postponed for a year. This, however, is not actual saving; it is only postponed spending. Most of Henniker's one-room schools are scattered and small. Our Central building, now that it houses only elementary grades, has room to spare. The only way I can see to make a substantial decrease in cost to ourselves without lowering the quality of our school work, is to maintain fewer schools, transporting more pupils and employing fewer teachers. I am not convinced that this would be a wise thing to do in Henniker; but I am quite sure that it would be possible to decrease the cost of our schools by this method.

#### CONCLUSION

Many people during the past year have co-operated willingly and loyally to help make our school work effective. To all these, grateful acknowledgment is made.
