## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

---

The progress in the schools during the past year was good. Not all the conditions were to our mind, but probably that could not be.

Four teachers were employed, all of some experience, though limited, with one exception. We believe each one worked faithfully in the discharge of her duties.

There were fifty-one scholars registered during the year and three schools were maintained. In the spring there were schools in Nos. 1, 4 and 5. In the fall and winter in Nos. 1, 2 and 4. There were twenty-seven weeks of school divided into two terms, a spring term of eleven weeks and a fall and winter term of sixteen consecutive weeks, except in No. 1, where the sixteen weeks was divided into two terms of eight weeks with a vacation of one week.

The improvement in No. 4 school has been so marked during the tuition of Miss Fitzgerald we make special mention of it. She has the faculty for stimulating and keeping up a great degree of interest and her discipline is very good indeed.

The school in No. 1 gave an entertainment in the winter term, and with the proceeds bought useful articles, including a steel mat for the entry of the schoolhouse, a waste basket, a pencil sharpener, etc., for which they should be commended. It is not the first time in which that school in a like manner has purchased needed articles for their schoolroom.

The register for the year shows a deplorable number of absent and tardy marks, which attest to somebody's unfaithfulness.

New reading books were purchased in the spring, exchanging old books as far as consistent.

New maps were bought for three schools by the advice of the state superintendent, Mr. Morrison.

While the schools are diminishing in number every year the cost does not diminish in the same proportion. The wages of teachers are higher and the cost of the small supplies is not small in the aggregate.

One man who has had much to do with schools for many years says "Providing books for all scholars is all right, but I don't believe in the furnishing the small supplies such as pencils, paper and ink." By this method a factor is lost for training children in economy, which is very much needed in these days.

Undoubtedly if those things were provided by the parents the cost would not be one-half as much per scholar. What costs nothing is not of much value. We believe there are cases where more is wasted than used.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

[L. s.]

To the inhabitants of the town of Sullivan in the county of Cheshire, in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Sullivan; on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of schools.

4—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges or take any action relating thereto.

5—To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

6—To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the hearse.

7—To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action relating thereto.

8—To see if the town will unite with the town of Nel-

son in purchasing a new steel bridge to replace the wooden one at the Nelson and Sullivan line, and raise money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

9—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for a monument to be placed on the original town corners of Keene and Gilsum and town line of original Packersfield, and choose a man to expend the same or take any action relating thereto.

10—To see if the town will vote to have an itemized report of each tax payers' property, both resident and non-resident.

11—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay for sheep killed and damaged by dogs in addition to that received from dog license in 1906.

12—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a new hearse or repair the old one or take any action relating thereto.

13—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase a new stove for the town hall or take any action relating thereto.

14—To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road from highway opposite the house of Chas. F. Jewett through the town farm pasture and land of H. C. Rawson to road leading from Gilsum road to Charles Locke place, also road from Gilsum road to Charles Locke place or any part thereof or take any action relating thereto.

15—To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees heretofore chosen and take any action relating thereto.

16—To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
