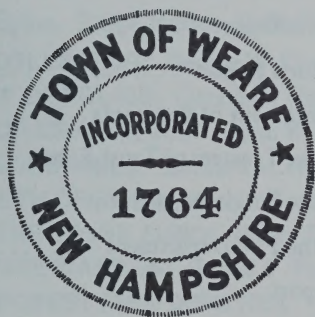

Town Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Scott F. Eastman at 1:15 p.m. It was voted to dispense with the reading of the articles in the warrant at this time. It was voted to close the polls at 10:00 p.m. The adjourned school meeting was called to order to vote on school officers.

ARTICLE I: To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Recommendation of the Finance Committee was \$23,150.00. On a motion by Bernard Phelps, Jr., duly seconded, it was voted to raise and appropriate \$23,150.00 to defray town charges. Vote in affirmative.

ARTICLE IV: To make provisions for the collection of taxes.

A motion by Wendell Colburn that the provision for collection of taxes be left with the Selectmen was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow on behalf of the Town in anticipation of taxes, said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1967, and to issue notes therefor in the name of the Town at such rate of interest and payable at such time and place within one year as the Selectmen may decide.

It was moved and seconded that this article be accepted as printed in the warrant. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE VI: To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on taxes.

It was voted in the affirmative to dismiss this article.

ARTICLE VII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of highways and bridges, and to take any other vote in relation thereto.

Finance Committee recommended the amount of \$12,000. for Winter roads and \$8,000. for Summer roads.

Motion by Richard Perkins, duly seconded, that this article be accepted as per the recommendation of the Finance Committee. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE VIII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for General expenses of the Highway Department.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$8,000.00.

It was moved that \$8,000.00 be raised and appropriated for general expenses of the Highway Department. Vote in affirmative.

ARTICLE IX: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,766.79 to be used with the sum of \$11,778.60 to be furnished by the State, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction, and Betterment Aid.

It was moved and supported that this article be adopted as printed in the Warrant. Vote affirmative.

ARTICLE X: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Police Department.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$1,500.00.

A motion by Wilder D. Tenney, Jr., and seconded, that \$1500.00 be raised and appropriated for the Weare Police Department was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XI: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Fire Department.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$4,000.00

A motion by Leon Taylor to raise and appropriate \$4400.00 for the Weare Fire Department was discussed by George Welch, Gerald Hight,

Leon Taylor and others and after a questionable vote, the Moderator called for a standing vote:

YES - 109 NO - 5

ARTICLE XII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

Finance Committee recommended \$800.00.

Everett Chase moved that \$800.00 be raised and appropriated for the care of cemeteries. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XIII: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Band Concerts.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$400.00.

Motion by Wendell Colburn that \$400.00 be raised and appropriated for Band Concerts was voted in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XIV: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Weare Public Library.

The Finance Committee's recommendation was \$500.00 for expenses, and \$500.00 for installation of toilet facilities.

George Arnold moved that \$500.00 for expenses and \$500.00 for installation of toilet facilities be raised and appropriated.

Jackson Reade made an amendment, seconded by Wilder D. Tenney, Jr., that it be let out to competitive bidding. (Amendment accepted).

After discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XV: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

Upon a motion by Wilder D. Tenney, Jr., it was voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the observance of Memorial Day. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XVI: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Safety Program.

\$200.00 was recommended by Finance Committee.

It was moved that \$200.00 be raised and appropriated for the Water Safety Program. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XVII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$476.00 for the support of the Concord Hospital.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$476.00.

Florence Flanders made a motion, duly seconded, that the sum of \$476.00 be raised and appropriated for the support of the Concord Hospital. The motion was thoroughly discussed and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XVIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Rust.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$150.00.

A motion to raise and appropriate \$150.00 for White Pine Blister Rust was discussed at length and the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XIX: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Rescue Ambulance.

After explanation by Gerald Hight as to the condition of the vehicle and the service provided, Wilfred Brunette made a motion, duly supported, that \$1,000.00 be raised and appropriated for support of the Rescue Ambulance and any unspent surplus at end of year be put in a fund for purchase of a more modern vehicle.

Vernon Wood made an amendment that any unspent balance be carried over to the next year. After discussion, the vote was negative and the motion was lost.

David Whitaker then moved \$500.00 be raised and appropriated, with an amendment by Vernon Wood that any balance after expenses be carried over to next year. Vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE XX: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five to examine the possibility of restoring the Town Hall, and to report to the next annual Town Meeting.

After explanation by H. Talbot Pearson of this article, Mr. Pearson moved that the article be adopted as printed in the Warrant. Vote was affirmative.

Committee: Wendell Colburn, Chairman; Sylvia Brown, Winifred Ilsey, Doris Nelson, John H. Reade, Gerald Purington, George M. Sawyer and Vernon R. Wood.

ARTICLE XXI: To see if the Town will vote to establish the office of Building Inspector, fix his compensation and authorize his annual appointment by the Selectmen.

It was moved and supported that this article be dismissed. Discussion followed. Howard Ineson explained that this was not a part of Zoning. Further discussion followed. The vote was affirmative and the article dismissed.

ARTICLE XXII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to repair and redecorate the Town Offices.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$600.00.

Upon a motion by H. Talbot Pearson, and seconded, to raise and appropriate \$600.00 for repair and redecoration of the Town Offices, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the expenses of the Planning Board.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$200.00.

A motion by James Nichols, and supported, to dismiss this article brought discussion by Mrs. Sara Connell, Gordon Brown, Raymond Rogers and others. The article was dismissed on a voice vote which was questionable. A written ballot was requested by Vernon Wood. The result was YES - 107; NO - 58; and the article was dismissed.

Recessed for Voting - called to order at 10:00 p.m.

ARTICLE XXIV: To see if the Town will vote to affiliate with the Merrimack Valley Region Association, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the same.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$50.00.

Upon a motion by Gordon Russell, Jr., \$50.00 was raised and appropriated to affiliate with the Merrimack Valley Region Association. Vote affirmative.

ARTICLE XXV: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,044.24 for the balance due on the re-appraisal of the Town, and take any other action in relation thereto.

After explanation of this article by Vernon Wood, Robert Black moved that \$3,000.00 be raised by taxation and the balance of \$3044.24 be paid out of the general fund. After some discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXVI: To see if the Town will vote to require all departments to acquire a purchase order from the Selectmen before purchasing any equipment or supplies in excess of \$50.00 (Emergency repairs excepted).

It was voted in the affirmative to adopt this article as read.

ARTICLE XXVII: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Moderator to appoint a committee of five persons, to study the salaries and wages of all personnel employed by the Town, and to report its findings and recommendations to the 1968 Annual Town Meeting, or take any action in relation thereto.

Committee: Walter Hodgman, Chairman; Forrest Dearborn, Harold Thomson, John Downes and Jessie Vint.

Jackson Reade moved that this article be accepted as read. Vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXVIII: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500.00 to maintain and supervise Chase Recreational Park, for the use of Weare taxpayers only.

No recommendation from Finance Committee.

Richard Perkins moved that this article be dismissed. Discussion followed.

Marion Russell gave an explanation stating the expenses average \$2500.00 annually. After more discussion, the vote was negative and the motion was lost.

Gordon Russell, Jr., then moved that the article be adopted as written in the Warrant and that \$2500.00 be raised and appropriated. An amendment by Joseph Brennan that it include residents of Weare was accepted by Gordon Russell, Jr.

This was discussed thoroughly and the vote was questionable. A paper ballot was called for: YES — 53; NO — 88. The motion was lost.

Wilfred Lahey then moved that action be postponed to the next

Town Meeting, an investigation be made by the Park Committee as to the position of the State relative to the matter and report to the next annual Town Meeting. Discussion brought out that the State could take the boat landing area for public use or part of the Park area for a new landing and loading area. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXIX: To see if the Town will vote to put the supervision of the town dumps up for bids.

It was moved and supported that the supervision of the town dumps be put up for competitive bidding and that the term of the contract be for three years, and an amendment was accepted that the North Weare dump be left where it is.

After discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXX: To see if the Town will establish a Town Conservation Commission, as set forth in R.S.A. 36A.

It was moved and supported that this article be adopted. Vote was affirmative. Committee: H. Talbot Pearson, Chairman; Henry Tiffany, Chester W. Colburn, Edward Gallagher, George L. Merrill, Wilfred E. Lahey and Joseph A. Souter.

ARTICLE XXXI: To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a new grader, and take any other vote in relation thereto.

Finance Committee's recommendation was \$20,000.00 on bonds over an 8-year period.

After an explanation by Eldon Townes, Road Agent as to the condition of the old grader and the necessary repairs needed, it was moved and supported that \$20,000.00 be raised and appropriated for the purchase of a new grader to be paid for over a period of eight years. After discussion, the vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE XXXII: To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Wilfred Brunnette asked a question pertaining to dogs which was answered by Gerald Hight.

Proceeded to count ballots. Newly elected Officers present were administered the Oath of Office.

Voted to adjourn at 2:00 A.M. March 15, 1967.

**TOWN HALL RESTORATION
Report of Committee
(Article 20, 1966 Warrant)**

The Town Hall, proudly perched, and of sturdy construction on ledge, standing in the Center is not the first town house erected in Weare. The present building was erected in 1837 in conjunction with

the Universalists, they in turn agreeing to pay for the second story and to provide their own furniture, etc., this enabling them to have a church. Much lumber from the first town house was incorporated into the present structure by agreement. The actual cost to the town was to be kept under \$1000 - and it was.

The committee appointed by Moderator Scott Eastman "to examine the possibility of restoring the Town Hall" met and voted unanimously that it should be restored.

Thoughts ran generally to restoring the original condition wherever possible, except for the second story. This will call for; a) refinishing floors, b) repainting interior, c) probable installation of Ozite carpeting in front hall, with a small amount just inside the double-doorway to hall entrance, d) decided improvement in both rest rooms, e) removal of portions of the present metal ceiling and exploring the possibility of restoring the original plaster ceiling.

This last, plus the refinishing of the floor would probably be the two major projects as the underpinning is reported in good shape and the building is well roofed. The sheds, the committee feels, are an integral part of the Town Hall and should be repaired and restored. A drastic cleaning-out would be the first order of business, especially upstairs, where some minor repairs are also needed.

Repairing and refinishing the old settees and replacing the seating now used is suggested. It being rather doubtful that many meetings or gatherings would take place in cold weather (there being more convenient places available in town) we feel the wood-burning stoves should be improved on, or replaced by similar ones reflecting the proper period, if possible.

Weare has a beautiful Town Hall and it should be a proud factor in the lives of our townspeople. We see it unkempt but still proud. We feel it can be a place of beauty where townsfolk could take pride in holding a wedding reception, a reunion or similar affair.

It is not a small project nor do we claim it to be inexpensive. We would do what we could to obtain "helping funds" through the Historical Society, but we look on this as a rare possibility.

If the Town wishes to pursue the suggested objective of the committee and sees fit to raise a sum of money to start, the committee will do its utmost to see that the money is well spent. It is our feeling that we should pursue our goal over a period of years and pay as we go.

Two new social agencies are now making their services available on the spot to Weare residents.

OPERATION HELP provides information to needy families about specialized social services available to them. A qualified field worker is at the Town office twice a month. Harold Thomson is able to supply details and make appointments.

The Southern New Hampshire Legal Services Association has an attorney at Town office every Thursday from 1:30 to 3:30 to provide free legal assistance to low-income families.

Both these programs are federally financed.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE POLICE DEPARTMENT

One hundred sixty-eight cases were handled by the department in 1967, besides many calls of no record.

Breaking and entering cases were fewer than last year. Larceny ran about the same. Summer places and stores were again the places where these incidents occurred.

Money, tools, firearms, an automobile, and musical instruments comprised most of the articles taken. If you close up your camp or summer home take all valuable articles with you. Breaks in camps and unoccupied places are next to impossible to prevent, and almost as difficult to solve. The automobile has given all kinds of people from most anywhere the chance to pull off such crimes and disappear, leaving no evidence on which to start an investigation.

More than ever the police need the assistance of citizens in noting and recording the registration numbers of strange or suspicious cars, and the reporting of suspicious persons or incidents they notice. Beware of magazine salesmen, and all strangers attempting to sell you any articles or services. Get identification and call the police for information on such persons. We read every day of people who have been the victims of frauds.

A cold, rainy season cut down on the need for night patrol of the town. A check of our recreation areas is necessary on nights of good summer weather. Many outsiders come to these places for so-called beer parties and to cause disturbances. Teenage drinking is one of our problems. So far no local cases of drug abuse have been brought to our attention. Groups of young people have come to Weare from our neighboring cities to hold drinking parties. A rural town is looked upon, by them, as a place to do what is not allowed in a large community.

We have need of patrol work done in the hours between midnight and morning, but men who must hold down jobs cannot be up all night doing police work.

Our patrol cost \$305.56 and consisted of 150 hours and 1683 miles.

A change is coming about in our Radio setup. The State Police frequency we are on at the present time, is to be phased out by the FCC. We will be obliged to get new radios to tie us in to the State Police and other towns. This Radio link is very important to our operation. We shall need two new mobile radios on the high frequency band, allocated for this new network. The cost will be about one thousand dollars. This change does not affect our local radio setup.

An additional mobile radio of more power was purchased to be used as our base station. Also a much needed typewriter was bought.

We regret the resignation of Robert Noss, who served several years as a police officer. Percy Carter was appointed and is a good officer. The

present pay rate is far below that paid for such service. A change must be made if this work is to be done.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WEARE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

The number of fires in Weare in 1967 were again a substantial reduction from the average of late years. Several buildings lost or badly damaged, however, set a high point for fire losses over many years. Two of the fires which burned homes were discovered by passersby, no one being home. A night barnfire and one involving the whole upper part of a house when discovered were difficult to control. An exploding pot burner oil heater involved a small house almost instantly, taking the lives of two persons.

Brush fires were few. The largest, started by sparks blown from a dump, burned about 5 acres of wood land.

Types of fires were: Building 7, Chimney 6, Brush and Grass 6, Dump 6, Motor Vehicle 2, Campfire 1, Mop 1, Smoke in house 1. Two of these fires were out of town. Faulty wiring, overheated stove, exploding oil burning heater and sparks from a chimney started the building fires. Brush fires were set by: Lightning, fishermen, dump, and burning without permit. It is unlawful to burn anything in the open without a permit from the Forest Fire Warden, except when the ground is covered with snow. Get a permit for any burning of brush or rubbish.

House Trailers are a problem when on fire. They are difficult to extinguish and hazardous to occupants. Make sure the heating system is in good condition and works properly. Beware of fumes or smoke. In cold weather check doors frequently to be sure they are not frozen shut from ice formed by condensation. Beware of faulty heat cables underneath.

The Red Network operators answered about 300 calls during the year; Fire Department 30, Rescue Squad 23, Police 114, Forest Fire Warden 2, Power Failures 2, For Information 74, Wrong Number 18, and others for Civil Defense, Messages, etc. We express our appreciation to the operators who make our emergency service function. At least one of the operators is on duty at all times but may have to come a distance to answer the phone. Hang on and be ready to give correct and necessary information when you call. The operators cannot think for you.

The Rescue Squad answered 23 calls. Many calls were for accidents in, or around the home. Motor vehicle accidents and heart cases were the remaining emergencies. Our Ambulance is old and obsolete and needs to be replaced. The place where it is kept is a distinct handicap to giving good service. In cold weather we have to tow it to start it, in spite of a battery booster, and motor block heater. A more modern used vehicle should be provided with a better place to keep it, if this service is wanted by the people.

Twelve monthly meetings and numerous drills were held during the year. We have good equipment, but it takes trained men to operate it. We should have a Tank Truck capable of carrying 1000 gallons or more of water. Sufficient water is most always our biggest problem. At one fire we laid over 5000 feet of hose. This type of operation takes time. We need more willing, interested men who will spend some time training, and will be available when needed. In the daytime we have very few men to respond to alarms.

Equipment added during the year was: 300 feet of 1½ inch hose, a 1000 gallon folding relay tank, an auxiliary power oil burning heater, 3 pairs of boots, and several hand lights. Truck No. 4 had new front tires and head gaskets installed. Minor repairs were made to other trucks.

The Ladies' Auxiliary assisted at fires by supplying hot food and coffee. A Christmas Party and Strawberry Festival were well attended by the members.

Good practices in fire prevention have, no doubt, been responsible for the reduction in the number of fires in Weare in the years of 1966 and 1967.

Look your house over for fire hazards. Have defects in chimneys, fireplaces, and funnels repaired promptly. Dispose of inflammable waste materials. Periodic servicing of oil heating equipment pays off in safe operation and reduced fuel costs.

Keep matches away from children. Many fires result from small, pre-school children, experimenting with matches and fire. Use fire resistant materials in construction of homes. Have your electric wiring checked over for defects or overloaded circuits. The above were the causes, or added to the seriousness of the fires of the past year.

The Department appreciates the cooperation we have received from the people of Weare during the year.

This lack of responsibility on the part of a few people hurts everyone. Let's work together to prevent the start of those unnecessary fires by observing the following rules:

1. No burning between 9:00 A.M. - 5:00 P.M. and then only with a per-

mit from the Forest Fire Warden.

2. Take all debris and waste to the town dump.
3. Keep a clean, safe town dump.
4. Close supervision of children in regard to use of matches.
5. Exercise care with smoking material - use the ashtray.

The modern toilet facilities are a welcome and long overdue addition to the library. It was the only town building not so equipped until this time.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Weare

I herewith submit my sixth annual report relative to the schools of Weare:

Educational Problems of Weare

The citizens of weare are to be commended for seeking a solution for the educational problems confronting the community presently and in the immediate future.

The school board and building committee under the directives voted by the citizens at the annual school district meeting accomplished what seemed an impossible task by undertaking the construction of the elementary school addition. The board took the initiative after three bids were ruled as not acceptable, one for being in excess of the funds available and the other two for lack of a performance bond accompanying them. Vernon Wood, local builder, was appointed Foreman-builder, and on a salary and percentage of cost basis built the four room addition, two large supply closets and the health room for approximately \$50,000. The citizens had appropriated \$66,000 for the addition. After furnishing the building, it is anticipated that a sum of the appropriation will remain as a surplus.

The result was possible only through a concerted effort on the part of the building committee, the school board, Vernon Wood, the administration and the support of the citizens of Weare.

The addition solved the problem for elementary school space.

Due to the fact that some of the communities voting for the creation of a regional high school voted against the plan, the Weare Junior High School and High School problem remains.

The elementary school addition was planned with the grades 7 through 12 students to be educated in regional schools to be located in a town other than Weare.

We now have two educational problems to solve in the immediate future, (1) to determine how best to educate our junior high and high school students (Weare High School has lost its comprehensive rating) and (2) if the students are to remain in Weare to determine how we can best house the classes.

I am confident that the citizens of Weare will continue to seek a solution that will be in the best educational interests of the Weare students and in the best financial interests of the taxpayers.

Loss of State Foundation Aid

Chapter 198 of the Revised Statutes Annotated as amended in 1957 prescribes the method by which FOUNDATION AID to New Hampshire school districts is to be distributed.

Two basic factors must be considered in determining the amount of state foundation aid to be paid to a school district. The first is the cost of the educational program which must be maintained in a school district. The second is the extent of the resources of that district for meeting the cost of the educational program. As an objective measure, the state foundation aid law specified that the cost of an educational program shall be computed at \$200 for each elementary pupil and \$300 for each high school pupil residing within a district and educated at district expense. The law further specifies that it shall be the duty of the state board of education to adjust the cost of this required program in accordance with the amount appropriated for distribution as foundation aid. This cost shall not exceed the state average costs per elementary pupil of all current expenses of operation as established by the state board of education for the year in which the foundation aid computation is made. This cost is referred to as the "foundation program."

Weare is eligible to receive \$15,809.94 IN FOUNDATION AID FOR THE 1968-69 SCHOOL YEAR from funds appropriated by the legislature in 1967-68 WE WILL RECEIVE \$32,023.84 IN STATE FOUNDATION AID. This represents a loss of \$16,213.90 in Foundation Aid or an increase of \$16,213.90 in the amount to be raised by taxes in Weare in 1968-69.

If the existing statutes were fully implemented Weare would be eligible to receive \$60,623.48 in Foundation Aid or \$44,813.54 more than it will receive under the current appropriation of the legislature.

The loss of income due to loss of State Foundation Aid and anticipated loss of Sweepstakes revenue will necessitate an increase of \$17,233.00 in the amount to be raised by taxes in the 1968-69 school year.

The Weare Central School has a current enrollment of 203 distributed as follows:

It is anticipated that the enrollments for the 1968-69 school year will for a second year in succession require the services of an additional teacher. The seventh and eighth grade enrollments are as follows:

Grade 7 - 35
 Grade 8 - 27
 Total 62

With 91 in the high school and in spite of the fact that we added four elementary school classrooms this year it is evident that additional rooms will be needed if grades 7 through 12 are to remain in Weare.

Through the leadership and efforts of Principal Joseph Dischino, the staffs of the Weare schools have attained a high morale, the calibre of teaching has remained outstanding and the student achievement excellent.

I wish to express my sincere appreciation to the Weare School Board under the commendable direction of Lyhl Perrigo, Chairman, and to the Weare School Building Committee consisting of Charles Brown, Jr., Walter Hodgman and Harold Thomson. I further wish to acknowledge the support and cooperation of Joseph Dischino, Principal, the teachers, pupils and citizens of Weare, as well as the loyal support of the Supervisory Union office staff.

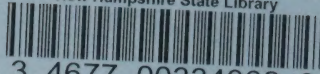
