8/15/54 to 10/8/06

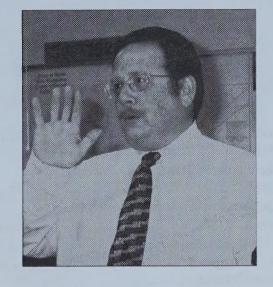

In October, Weare lost a dedicated public servant who was well-loved in the community. Leon G. Methot, 52, died Sunday, Oct. 8, 2006, following a courageous battle with cancer.

He was born August 15, 1954, in Manchester to Robert J. and Marie Rose (Deziel) Methot. He attended Trinity High School where he met and married his high school sweetheart, Denise.

Mr. Methot was in the National Guard, serving for almost 10 years before joining the regular Army in 1991. He served in Kuwait in Operation Desert Storm. He previously worked for several alarm and electrical companies in the area.

He was a former Weare firefighter and was a volunteer on the Weare Rescue Squad. He was on the Board of Selectmen for three terms. He was a member of the zoning board, planning board and finance committee. He was a proud father and a devoted husband.

Mr. Methot was a former Cub Master and assistant basketball coach at Villa Augustina School.

He was predeceased by a son, Leon G. Methot Jr., who died in 1975.

Family members include his wife of 32 years, Denise (Gameline) Methot; three sons, Leon D. Methot of Weare, Lance Methot of Goffstown and Lucas Methot of Manchester; his parents of Manchester; four brothers, Norman Methot of Manchester, Donald Methot of Manchester, Henry Methot of La Luz, N.M., and Philip Methot of Weare; three sisters, Muriel Allaire of Palm Bay, Fla., Diane Roberge of Manchester and Anita Boisvert of Goffstown; many nieces and nephews and great-nieces and great-nephews.

You are hereby notified to vote at the Center Woods Elementary School in said Weare on Tuesday, March 13, 2007 beginning at seven o'clock in the morning, and ending at seven o'clock in the evening to elect officers of the Town by official ballot, to vote on questions required by law to be inserted on said official ballot and to vote on all Warrant Articles as accepted or amended by the First Session.

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year. (By Official Ballot)

ARTICLE 2

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 2</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To propose (a) increasing the minimum lot size to 5 acres and the minimum frontage requirement to 250 feet in the RA zone and (b) providing a 20% "density bonus" for cluster developments in the RA zone?

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 3

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 3</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To remove the sentence that reads "Any residential use shall conform to the requirements of Table 1-1." from Articles 24.5.1 and 25.5.1? (Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 4

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 4</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To add a new Article 34 entitled "Sign Ordinance?" (Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 5

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 5</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To repeal Article 15-A referred to as the Planning Board's Growth Management Ordinance, in its entirety?

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 6

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 6</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To add two sections, 28.9 entitled <u>Buffers</u> and 28.9.1 entitled <u>Exceptions</u> to Article 28 which will read: <u>Buffers</u>: A buffer of native vegetation with no ground disturbance allowed except for planting shall be maintained within 25 feet of all jurisdictional wetlands. In forested areas no more than 50 percent of the basal area shall be removed in any 10 year period. <u>Exceptions</u>: Buffer distances are not required within the right of way for any proposed Class V or higher road or any related Class V road construction and/or maintenance activities. This section does not apply to any forest management or agricultural activity?

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 7</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend the flood plain ordinance as necessary to comply with requirements of the National Flood Insurance Program? (Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE 8

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 8</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 30-A.3.1.1 to read as follows: The Board finds that any proposed structure in the proposed development (a) is more than 600 feet from the centerline of Mt. Dearborn Road and (b) will be sited or screened by vegetation so as not to be visible from any point on Mt. Dearborn Road throughout the year and (c) meets all relevant requirements of 6.1.4, OR?

ARTICLE 9

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 9</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend the Town of Weare Zoning Map by modifying the zoning of 7.5+/- acres, Tax Map 404 Lot 171; and 57.5 +/- acres, Map 407 Lot 39, said parcels being located on Buckley Road, to change from Rural Agricultural (RA) to Residential (R)?

ARTICLE 10

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 10</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend the Town of Weare Zoning Map by modifying the zoning of 35.4 +/- acres, Tax Map 412 Lot 12 (Sub 1); and 2.67 +/- acres, Map 412 Lot 12 (Sub 2), and 2.55 +/- acres, Map 412 Lot 12 (Sub 3); and 2.49 +/- acres, Map 412 Lot 12; said parcels being located on Colby Road, to change from Rural Agricultural (RA) to Residential (R)?

ARTICLE 11

Are you in favor of <u>Amendment No. 11</u>, as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: In order to preserve open space and our rural character, as well as reduce property taxes, shall the Town vote to amend its Zoning Ordinance (a) to increase the minimum lot size in the Rural/Agricultural District to 5 acres and the minimum frontage requirement to 250 feet, while (b) providing a 10% density bonus for cluster developments?

(Not Recommended by the Planning Board)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate, as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Four Million Three Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Seventy-Eight Dollars (\$4,345,078.00). Should this article be defeated, the Default Budget shall be Four Million Two Hundred Fifty-Four thousand Six Hundred and Twenty-Two Dollars (\$4,254,622.00) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised Operating Budget only.

ARTICLE 13

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thirty Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-Four Dollars (\$330,334.00) to be added and allocated to the previously established Capital Reserve Funds as shown in the chart below.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Shall the town raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) to replace the Fire Department forestry truck and any needed equipment to properly outfit the vehicle, with said funds to come from the existing Fire And Rescue Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 15

Shall the Town establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 to be known as the Highway Communication Fund for the purpose of purchasing Highway/Public Works Department communication equipment including a base station and mobile radios, and raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) to be placed in this fund, and authorize the Board of Selectmen as the agents to expend from this account for its intended purpose. (Majority vote required).

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.02

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 16

Shall the Town establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 to be known as the Library Development/Consultant Fund for the purpose of assisting the Library Trustees and volunteer committees through the library development process to come up with the creation of a building plan, and raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$15,675.00) to be placed in this fund, and authorize the Library Trustees as the agents to expend from this account for its intended purpose.

(Majority vote required).

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.02

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 17

Shall the Town establish a Revolving Fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h, for the purposes of facilitating recycling at the Town Transfer Station. All revenues received from fee-based recycled items at the Town Transfer Station will be deposited into this fund, and the money in this fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered part of the Town's General Fund Unreserved Fund Balance. The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all monies in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon order of the governing body, and no further approval is required by the legislative body to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose for which the fund was created. Should this article pass, The Transfer Station Operating Budget would be reduced by \$39,000.00 for fiscal 2007 calendar year.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$375,000.00) for road reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the \$375,000.00, the sum of Two Hundred Twenty-Three Thousand Two Hundred Seventy-Three Dollars (\$223,273.00) would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (Pursuant to RSA 235) with One Hundred Fifty-One Thousand Seven Hundred Twenty-Seven Dollars (\$151,727.00) to be raised by taxation.

Anticipated tax impact \$0.17

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 19

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,000.00) to have a Town Buildings needs assessment conducted to assess, among other things, the current condition of Town facilities, how they are suiting the needs of the community, and to anticipate and plan for the future needs of the Town and how to most efficiently and cost-effectively meet those needs. This will be a <u>non-lapsing</u> appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will not lapse until the needs assessment is completed or by December 31, 2009, whichever is sooner. (Majority vote required).

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.04

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 20

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty One Thousand Six Hundred Dollars, (\$21,600.00) to acquire the services of a part-time professional planner through the Regional Planning Commission's Circuit Rider Program for one year only?

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.02

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 21

Shall the Town approve the cost item contained in the collective bargaining agreement reached between the Board of Selectmen and the American Federation of State County, and Municipal Employees (AFSCME) Union (police employees) inclusive of the following increases in salaries and benefits at the current staffing level:

and further to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Two Thousand Seven Hundred Forty-Six Dollars (\$42,746.00) for the current fiscal year, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. The \$42,746.00 sum for 2007 includes salary funding retroactive to October 1, 2006, per the agreement.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.05 (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 22

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-Two Thousand Dollars (\$52,000.00) for the purpose of hiring one (1) additional full-time Weare Police Officer. The stated amount will cover a nine-month cost of salary, benefits, uniforms, equipment and training. If approved, future funding for this position will be included in the Weare Police Department operating budgets.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.06

(NOT RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 23

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-Nine Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$49,850.00) to hire two (2) per diem EMTs to staff the ambulance 8 hours a day 7 days a week from July 1st to December 31st. If this Article is approved, future funding for this position will be included in the Weare Fire Department operating budget.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.06

(NOT RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 24

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the previously established Community Access TV Equipment Capital Reserve Fund? Said amount is the equivalent of a portion of the sum the Town receives each year from the Cable franchise fees.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 25

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for cemetery improvements. This sum to be withdrawn from Cemetery Trust Funds Cy Pres Account.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 26

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000.00) and to fund this appropriation by authorizing the withdrawal of said sum from the Town Forest Account, said sum to be used in combination with the Conservation Fund for the acquisition of new Town Forest land.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to allow the Conservation Commission to secure the contracted services of a New Hampshire Licensed Forester to prepare management plans, prepare timber harvests, and provide timber harvest oversight for Town forests, and to fund this appropriation by authorizing the withdrawal of that sum from the Town Forest Account.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 28

Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing fireworks for the 2007 Weare Patriotic Celebration. This warrant article has been designated by the Board of Selectmen as a Special Warrant Article so that the funds, if approved, may not be transferred for any other purposes.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.007

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 29

Shall the Town modify the elderly exemptions from property tax in the Town of Weare, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers, to be as follows: \$70,000.00 for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$90,000.00 for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, and \$300,000.00 for a person 80 years of age or older? To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 3 consecutive years prior to April 1st, own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by such person's spouse, they must have been married to each other for at least 5 consecutive years. In addition the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$33,000.00 or if married, a combined net income of not more than \$44,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$80,000.00, excluding the value of the person's residence and land up to 2 acres.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 30

Shall the Town modify the Disabled Exemption for any person who is eligible under Title II or Title XVI of the federal Social Security Act for benefits to the disabled to receive a yearly exemption on the assessed value, for property tax purposes, of his or her residential real estate in the amount of \$60,000.00? To qualify the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years prior to April 1st and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$13,400.00, or if married, a combined net income of not more than \$20,400.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$35,000.00, excluding the value of the person's residence and land up to 2 acres.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Shall the Town rescind the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict 95% of revenues from special police details to expenditures for the purpose of paying the police officers to provide contracted detail service?

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 32

Shall the Town establish a Revolving Fund pursuant to RSA 31:95-h, for the purpose of funding police special details. All revenues received for police special details will be deposited into the fund, and the money in the fund shall be allowed to accumulate from year to year, and shall not be considered part of the town's general fund unreserved fund balance. The town treasurer shall have custody of all moneys in the fund, and shall pay out the same only upon order of the Board of Selectmen and no further approval is required by the town meeting to expend. Such funds may be expended only for the purpose for which the fund was created.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 33

Shall the Town designate the 608 acre Eastman Conservation Area as Town Forest in accordance with RSA 31:110 to be managed by the Weare Conservation Commission? (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 34

If the Weare Conservation Commission can obtain ownership, shall the Town authorize addition of approximately 64 acres obtained by the Weare Conservation Commission from Map 404, Lot 130 to the Chevy Hill Town Forest in accordance with RSA 31:110 to be managed by the Weare Conservation Commission pursuant to RSA 31:112, II; to authorize the Conservation Commission to convey certain conservation easements to a qualified land trust such as the Piscataquog Watershed Association or Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests?

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 35

In order to prevent any future development on land intended for conservation, shall the town authorize the Weare Conservation Commission and Weare Board of Selectmen to convey into conservation easements for any town forest and town conservation lands with a qualified land trust such as the Piscataquog Watershed Association or Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests?

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 36

Shall the Town rescind Article 31 adopted at the 1981 Town Meeting which authorized the Weare Historical Society to use the Stone Memorial Building for purposes of storing, preserving and acquiring artifacts pertaining to Weare's history but required the

Historical Society to pay the costs of maintaining the Stone Building, and instead to authorize the Weare Historical Society to use the Stone Memorial Building for purposes of storing, preserving and acquiring artifacts pertaining to Weare's History with the Town to bear all costs of maintaining the building, thus allowing the Historical Society to utilize it at no cost.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 37

Shall the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell to Tim and Sheila Savaria two parcels of land along NH Route 114 to which the Town acquired title through the Last Will and Testiment of Mildred E. Hall, and to allow the Selectmen to negotiate all aspects of said sale, including the sale price. These parcels are shown as the northerly and southerly tracts of Tax Map 408-190 on a plan entitled "Boundary Line Agreement Plan, Land of SHB Properties, LLC, Russell P. and Carol A. Bernard and Tim and Sheila Savaria, Tax-Map Lots 411-152, 408-168, and 408-190" dated February 16, 2006 and recorded at the Hillsborough County Registry of Deeds as Plan 34581.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

ARTICLE 38

In order to provide year round equitable public access to Horace Lake, Public Waters of the State of New Hampshire, managed by New Hampshire Fish and Game for year round trout fishing, shall the Town approve opening either the Chase Park Boat Launch or the old boat launch adjacent to Chase Park for boat launching during ice off conditions and access to the ice during ice on conditions daily from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset and provide reasonable access to parking either in the park or [on] roadside.(by Petition)

ARTICLE 39

Town of Weare Deliberative Session Minutes 2006 February 4, 2006

The meeting opened at 10:10 AM by the Moderator, Neal Kurk. The Pledge of Allegiance was lead by Fire Chief, Robert Richards. Immediately following the Pledge of Allegiance the Moderator asked the Town Clerk, Evelyn Connor for the reading of the Town residents that have past in the last year and then to remain standing for a moment of silence.

The rules for today's meeting will be per Garfield Jones Parlimentary Procedures at a Glance as interpreted by the chair, plus 10 additional rules, etc.

Introduction of the front table: Town Attorney Laura Spector, Selectman Joseph Fiala, Donna Osborne, and Heleen Kurk, Vice Chair Leon Methot and Chair Laura Buono. Sitting on the other side of the table: Town Clerk, Evelyn Connor, recording secretary, Tina Laramee, and on cable, Brad McCauley. A special thanks to Brad and other members of the cable committee for setting up the equipment and televising the meeting. The meeting is not on Channel 6 but on Channel 17.

The chair recognized the Finance Committee as being present with Theresa Lamson as the Chair and Jonathan Dowst as Vice Chair. The Moderator asked that one of them come forward and speak about the committee obligations, Mr. Dowst volunteered. He explained that the Finance Committee's main goal is to try to minimize the financial impact to the citizens of Weare when reviewing each article as presented. The committee had a meeting prior to the deliberative session with the Board of Selectmen to hear about new information of an accounting error that impacted the final revenue dollars column in the proposed budget. Due to this new information, the Finance Committee present at the deliberative session will finalize their decisions on the warrant articles and address each article when discussed based on the financial needs and minimization of tax impact to the Town.

The Moderator asked if anyone were interested in serving on the Finance Committee or any other committee to please sign up at the front of the room or at the town office.

The Moderator introduced Peter Buono, Director of the Community Emergency Response Committee (referred to as C.E.R.T.). Peter stated that they are looking for volunteers and if anyone was interested or wanted information about the committee he was stationed at the back of the room.

The Moderator then asked Laura Buono, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen to give the State of the Town Address.

Laura opened with how many present were from out of state? She then said, "if we knew you were coming we would have built you a hotel". 2005 was a year of transition for the Board of Selectmen. In March, they welcomed two new Selectmen: Joe Fiala and Donna Osborne. In May/June, the Board was faced with an open Finance position and the resignation of the Town Administrator. She talked about Chief Gregory Begin being an asset to the town and the selectmen held coffee hours to meet with voters informally and how the selectmen had increased their visibility at events such as the Patriotic Celebration and Old Home Days. She commended the board for recognizing the need for change. Laura then recognized the different boards, committees and employees for their support during this past year. She talked about the bottom line increase due to shifted expenses and the increase of prices

in oil, electricity, postage, and road salt. She spoke about the residents having a vital roll in the community.

The Moderator recognized Selectman Heleen Kurk who presented Laura with a plaque thanking her for her years of service and dedication to the Town of Weare. The plaque read: Laura Buono Selectman 2003-2006, Chairman 2004-2006, with gratitude and appreciation for your knowledge, commitment and service to the Town of Weare. Laura received a standing ovation.

The Moderator stated that Articles one through twenty-three are not amendable and, therefore, will not be taken up at this meeting. He then asked if there were no objection, we would waive the reading of the warrant in its entirety and read each one as it is taken up for discussion. There being no objection, the reading of the Warrant was waived.

At this time, in accordance with the sense of the 1994 meeting (Article 38) the chair offers the privilege of addressing the meeting, when called upon to do so Town Council Laura Spector and Building Inspector Charles Meany, who are not registered voters in Weare, unless there is a motion to deny them the privilege. Hearing none, the privilege was granted

The Moderator began by reading ARTICLE 24: Shall the Town raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Million Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,800,000.00) for the purchase of the Ferrante Property, to protect the Town's rural character and natural resources by conserving land; further to authorize the issuance of not more than Seven Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$700,000.00) in bonds and notes under and in compliance with RSA 33:1 te. Seq. as amended; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, obtain and accept Federal, State, private donations, or other aid, if any, which may be available for said project and to comply with all laws applicable to said project; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue, negotiate, sell and deliver said bonds and notes and to determine the rates of interest thereon and the maturity and other terms thereof; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept a sum not to exceed Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) from the Conservation Fund for the purpose of completing this purchase; to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept a gift from the Mildred Hall Trust in the amount of Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000.00); to authorize the Board of Selectmen to convey certain conservation easements to a qualified land trust such as the Piscataguog Watershed Association or Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests; and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take any other action or to pass any other vote relative thereto. (3/5 Vote required) (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

The Moderator has taken a public position to this article and would step down if requested. No objections heard, the Moderator will continue.

Steve Najjar was recognized to speak to this Article. The 600 acres of land is located in the northern part of Weare on the Henniker line. It connects to ~12,000 acres of protected wildlife land. Migratory birds and much wildlife inhabit this area. The Appraisal for the land resulted in a value of \$2,025,000, so the town price of \$1,800,000 is a fair price. If the land is sold to a developer a potential 100 houses could be placed on this land which could be a potential tax impact of \$1,300,000 or more. Not to mention the burden placed on the school systems, the Town government, highway, police, and fire departments. There are numerous other supporters of this article besides the Weare Conservation Commission: the Mildred Hall Trust, the Board of Selectmen, the Finance Committee, Goffstown Fish and Game, NH Fish and Game, Piscataquog Watershed Association, the Russell Foundation, and the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests. If you would like further information contact the Conservation Commission.

Terry Knowles was recognized to speak to this Article on behalf of the Mildred Hall Trust. Mildred Hall left her estate in trust to be utilized by the Town for improvement of the town. The \$800,000 should be spent to support this open space as a memorial to Mildred Hall. We also need to remember that the largest State of NH public works project, the expansion of route 93, leaves Weare in the path of targeted growth, therefore, development is forthcoming. This open space would provide protection of some open/rural space. As a reminder, the tax impact for passing this article is a minimal \$0.18 for the first year that will continue to go down, reaching \$0.09 after 20 years.

Terry Shannon was recognized to speak to this Article. She mentioned that the bottom line is this is a protection plan for Weare's School Systems and to help minimize the cost of town services. She believes this is a perfect piece of land to be protected.

Mr. Flanders was recognized to speak to this Article. His family was the original owners of the Ferrante property. This property will be money in the town's pocket.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to this Article. Rarely do we get such an opportunity to protect property with such minimal impact to the taxpayers. If developed will cost tax payers more money. Additional private funds may come in to lower further the tax impact to the taxpayers, making it at most a \$0.18 tax impact of this article. Members of the Goffstown Fish and Game have stated their support and will donate money to this article to protect the hunting/wildlife land.

Leon Methot stated that the board is committed to put this into a conservation easement so it can never be developed, possibly a sports field but nothing else. He also mentioned that the town would be able to forest the land to generate timber cut revenues.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the mentioned easement. He asked if the land would ever be able to be built upon should the town ever want to develop it in the future. Mr. Methot said once land is put in a Conservation Easement it can never be removed or developed later.

Dell Rice of Pine Hill Road was recognized to speak to this Article. He supports this article. He would like to keep some of Weare with land that is not developed.

Joe Fiala spoke that the town will be in need of a Forestry Agent, to walk the land in the future, should the article pass.

Forrest Esenwine thanked the Ferrantes for their offer of the property to the town.

The Finance Committee utilized a spreadsheet to determine the tax impact either way and voted in favor of this article 6 to 4. Article 24 was moved to the ballot as printed.

The Moderator then stated that a motion was made to suspend the rules of the deliberative session to proceed to article 48 next. A two-thirds vote is needed to carry the motion forward. A count of 123 – yeah's versus 23 no's was obtained to proceed to Article 48.

The Moderator read Article 48. Shall the Town of Weare create a trust fund for legal expenses pursuant to RSA 31:19-a, accept donations into this trust fund, and appropriate the funds in this trust as a nontransferable appropriation for legal expenses related to the purpose of taking for "Public Use" by eminent domain, as defined by the Supreme Court of the United States in the "Kelo et al. v City of New London et al." decision on June 23, 2005, a certain parcel of land consisting of 8.08 acres located on Cilley Hill Rd., Map 406 parcel #21, also known as the Souter Property, for the development of an

Inn, and shall the Town create a second trust fund for acquisition expenses, accept donations into this trust fund, and appropriate the funds in the second trust as a nontransferable appropriation for just compensation to the owner of the property, and other related expense?

Shall the Town of Weare take for "Public Use" by eminent domain, as defined by the Supreme Court of the United States in the "Kelo et al. v. City of New London et al." decision on June 23, 2005, a certain parcel of land consisting of 8.08 acres located on Cilley Hill Rd., Map 406 parcel #21, also known as the Souter Property, for the development of an Inn, or take any action related there to?

The Moderator has taken a public position to this article and would step down if requested. No objections heard, the Moderator will continue.

Joshua Solomon was recognized to speak to this Article. He stated that we all must try to protect our constitutional rights. It is the unjust decision by the legal/judicial systems that dwindle away at our rights as citizens. When individual states signed on to the Constitution that meant that states have the right to enforce or act alone to govern their states as they see fit for the governing of the rights of the people. He feels the Supreme Court has defied the 5th Amendment with the passing of the Kelo decision, allowing the state of Connecticut to chip away at the freedom of the people. So as not to forget our rights, the Free Staters are sending a message to the government, that even though the action they are trying to take goes against conventional wisdom, the message being sent is not an act of defiance but as a message that we will not forget our 5th Amendment Right to own land and protect our land. He asked Representative Neal Kurk what NH laws are being amended to protect Mr. Souter's home. Currently there are no laws to protect this. They have seen from various other states other acts of citizens losing properties to government for similar purposes as in Connecticut. Free Staters are hoping to send a national message that we won't uphold eminent domain law to take citizen's land. All eyes are watching what will happen in Weare to protect 6000 people in Florida losing land for a shopping mall, and a neighborhood in New London, Connecticut. They are hoping this will encourage the rest of the country not to accept eminent domain over the rights of a citizen to own property.

Joe Fiala was recognized to speak to this Article. He stated that there are three things he would like to offer as a rebuttal to Mr. Solomon. The first is the money to be collected from taxes for this article would simply be used to sue our own town. Second, no town trust fund can accept private trust funds to pursue an endeavor such as this. Thirdly, it is just wrong to take any ones property for spite and this board is not in favor of taking anyone's land in the Town of Weare.

Keith LaCasse was recognized to speak to this Article. He thanked the Selectmen for remaining professional about the matter. He offered a rebuttal to Mr. Fiala and said the money will not be used to protect the town against a Law Suit, it is only to protect the town if Mr. Souter sues the town.

Walter Bohlin was recognized to speak to this Article. He motioned to amend this article to add the word "not" in three places to negate what is stated in this article (not create a trust fund, town not create a second trust fund, not take Souter's property). He feels this is not the way to address the Supreme Court, there are other ways to go about it that is not revengeful nor a game. As a little town we should be proud that we have a Supreme justice from this town. We should leave it up to our legislature to address this matter. The motion was seconded, the article has been amended.

The Moderator asked for further discussion on the Bohlin amendment. Gary Hopper, Chairman for the Committee for the Protection of Natural Rights, was recognized to speak to the motion. Petitioned Articles are a citizen's right, to appeal to the people and is their right to express

their opinion. We should leave it up to the town's people to vote on this article as was. He feels that we can't leave it up to our legislature, because they have dropped the ball and will let it die due to lobbyist. Let's leave it up to the voters to decide.

The Moderator recognized Laura Buono, and she stated that we are not responsible for what happens in other states only for what we want to happen here in Weare. It is our legal right as residents to amend this article during the town Deliberative Session.

Terry Knowles was recognized to speak to the motion. The only money we can put into trust funds is tax-payer money to cover RSA 319A trust. The Town of Weare knows what eminent domain means. As a result of the flood of 1938, we lost much of our lands to protect us and abutting towns, with the building of the Hopkinton dam. An inn is for private use not a public use of eminent domain taking of property. So who will own the inn? If a private sector owns the inn, then this is not the correct use of eminent domain.

Jim Thomson was recognized to speak to the motion.

Frank Bolton asked for clarification, that the proposed amendment to the article negates the article? The Moderator confirmed this to be so. Mr. Bolton went to school with David Souter and regards the Souter family as being compassionate. Therefore, he is in favor of the amendment for he opposes the article.

Frank Campagna not a legal person but opposes the amendment. He doesn't like the original article but the original article does not affect him, but the decision could affect our children/grandchildren. If the original article passed, it would show the state legislature that "we aren't going to take it anymore". The person whom we are taking their land is irrelevant. This is just to send a message to our government. If everyone is supposed to be doing the right thing, why do we need an Ethics Committee?

Paul Morin was recognized to speak to the motion. He is in favor of the amendment. There should be no punishment of our justices that uphold our laws. They were doing their jobs and made a decision based on the facts presented.

Matt Esenwine was recognized to speak to the motion. He is not supportive of the amendment because adding the 3 "nots" will confuse the majority of the voters that are not present in the room. The voters know in their head there is an article on the ballot and if not read correctly by the voter, they would be voting the wrong way.

Denise Doherty was recognized to speak to the motion. We can't be concerned about other states, we as NH residents need to be concerned about what happens here in Weare. This is a vindictive approach and should not be utilizing Weare to get their way. We need to vote based on the facts. NH legislation has come up with five separate bills to protect the citizens of NH and other states should follow suit. If you are not happy with the law, call your local representative to get educated on what the facts are, not opinions. She is in total support of amendment to the article. We need to leave it up to the voters.

Paul Dosher was recognized to speak to the motion. He agrees with Matt Esenwine that the article is already confusing enough as is. Changing it may confuse the voters not present. He would like to add further amendments that would clarify this lengthy article.

John Lawton was recognized to speak to the motion. As citizens we need to step forward to send a message to our government that we aren't going to take it anymore. We should not amend the article, we should present the original article to go before the voters and let them decide. Wants clarification on a "NO" vote and what it would mean.

Lisa Wilbur was recognized to speak to the motion. Please let all the voters decide on the original article not on the amended article.

Bill asked for clarification on what a yes/no vote would mean on the amended article. A yes vote means the town should not create town funds and will not take Souter's property. A no vote would mean that the voters disagree and do not want town to take Souter's property. However, in either case no affirmative direction is possible; the Board of Selectmen can't act on the vote. With this clarification in mind, he is not in favor of the amendment.

Joseph Sole in favor of the original article; again changing it will just confuse the voters.

Jon Dowst feels the whole town should be allowed to vote on the article, not just ~120 voters.

Moderator has a request for secret ballot; the voters present will decide whether to accept the amended article as the one that will be placed on the ballot for Mar. 4th. Please go to the rear table to obtain your ballot and to be registered. The Supervisors of the Checklist present were: Jan Proctor, Diane Lamb, Margo McLeod, and Pat C. Gareri. The ballot counters are: Peter Buono, Marge Burke, Tom Reynolds, and Don Rogers.

The final count on the secret ballot: yes - 94, no - 59. The amended article has been passed.

Mr. Dosher was recognized to speak to the article. He proposed another amendment to article 48 to read: "Shall the town (1) ask its Selectmen not to use their eminent domain powers to take David Souter's home for an Inn, and (2) to urge the Governor and legislature to adopt a statute and/or amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution to forbid eminent domain takings that would result in transfer of land or property to private interests for economic development purposes?"

David Getting was recognized to speak to the motion. He is in favor of the Dosher amended article.

Matt Esenwine was recognized to speak to the motion. He is in support of this amendment because it clarifies the meaning of the article. He questions, however, why did we decide to move this article ahead of other articles.

Jim Thompson, Chairman of the Weare Economic Committee, was recognized to speak to the motion. He is in favor of this amendment. Laws discussing eminent domain are confusing and this amendment clarifies what the article is actually trying to do. The original article was simply for revenge, the Dosher amendment sends a clear message to legislature.

Gary Hopper supports this amendment which clearly shows what the town wants to send as a message.

Craig Knowles asked for a point of clarification, would the amendment replace the previous article? The Moderator answered, yes and it also replaces the other amendment to the article.

Joe Fiala stated that the Secret Ballot, that we just did as a town, hides from all how we voted. He commends David Souter for doing a public vote.

The Moderator asked if there were any further discussion or questions on the Dosher Amendment to Article 48? There was none. Being so, he asked for a vote to accept the amendment: by unanimous vote the amended article shall appear on the ballot.

ARTICLE 25: Shall the Town raise and appropriate, as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Four Million One Hundred Fifty One Thousand Three Hundred and Thirty Three Dollars (\$4,151,331.00). Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be Four Million Six Hundred and Eighty Four Dollars (\$4,000,684.00) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only.

Leon Methot – motioned to amend the total expenditure to read \$4,047,018 in order to correct it due to an overestimate of the anticipated revenue. We need to adjust expenditures by ~\$100,000. The specific location is the library budget line.

Laura Buono – as a board their job is to try to balance out the budget, trim from other departments add to other departments and to help with fixed costs: fuel, electricity, etc.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to the article. He is concerned that we have had an error that has happened over the last few years. Don't we have auditors to catch this and if so why do we still employ them?

Laura Buono responded with even though our actual revenues are typically higher than our estimated revenues, we do not want to overestimate our revenue. The auditors don't audit our estimated numbers which is why it hasn't been picked up.

Moderator clarification of the issue – the Selectmen have to determine estimated revenue, for the current year based on past years. In previous years it was overestimated due to adding in 100% of current use tax not 25%, per correct accounting practices. This brings the estimated revenue value for 2006 to be \sim400,000$.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to the motion. Who is responsible for proper revenue allocation of the monies to the conservation commission? He wants clarification as to why the mistake has been carried forward. The board has found the problem, is there something in place to ensure this mistake won't happen again.

Jon Dowst to address this matter: glad the board found the accounting error, the change is correct accounting. Finance committee believes there is room for improvement with the auditing group.

Joe Fiala reported that the auditor's report is available to the public and that the board recognizes there are areas for improvement.

Tina Pelletier was recognized to speak to the motion. We are losing sight of the point of an estimated vs. actual. The auditors only review the final books.

Paul Marsh was recognized to speak to the motion. Speaking as the Treasurer of the Library funds, what we are asking the town to fund is less than what we will be expending.

Terry Knowles was recognized to speak to the motion. RSA 32, budget in gross, states that no matter where the money comes from, even if from a private source, we need to inform the tax payers/town. We are letting the town authorize the library to spend what comes from private as well as public monies.

Paul Marsh is asking that line FF remain as originally stated in the article. He is asking for a minor change to be \$167,231 after all due to a minor gross revenue adjustment, therefore, the default value needs to change to \$164,221.

New motion to amend total expenditure to \$4,050,829 estimated revenue to be \$2,583,883, due to change in Library's line FF. Therefore, the new default number is \$4,000,182.

Walter Bohlin was recognized to speak to the motion. It is inappropriate to ask to approve a reduced budget without checking with other departments and without the advice from the Finance Committee. I oppose the reduction in the budget to delay the vote until all can ensure the numbers are right.

Jon Dowst was recognized to speak to the motion. The Finance Committee did meet with the Selectmen this morning, prior to deliberative session, to discuss options with the budget. The Finance Committee agreed with this amendment to determine where the Selectmen can find an extra \$100,000 from other department budgets.

Dick Butt was recognized to speak to the motion. He questioned whether the \$140,000 for the Avitar contract needs to be offset by taxation? Shouldn't this be a separate warrant article? The Selectmen said the money will come from the surplus fund to cover the contract.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the motion. \$140,000 will be taken from the surplus fund to offset the Avitar contract. There are three other articles taking money from the general fund that add to ~\$90,000. So when we set the tax rate in 2004, we ended up with 6% that would be retained for surplus. When determine what final amount we want to put in the surplus fund then stick with that number and return the rest to the taxpayers. Per his calculations the current proposed budget is a 7.6% increase over last years 3% increase, when does the rise stop? In previous years, the Finance Committee and the voters did not pass budgets with such large budget percent increase. So how does the Selectmen justify taking more money out of the general surplus account.

Carl Knapp was recognized to speak to the motion. He is concerned that the budget will be cut too much that we won't be able to adjust the numbers to meet the budget.

The Moderator called for a vote to accept the amended budget. The I's have it.

Dick Butt was recognized to speak to the motion. He would like the article amended to bring to voter awareness where the sum of \$140,000 for the Avitar contract is coming from and what money will need to be raised by tax dollars.

Jon Dowst to address Mr. Butt's amendment. The article should be worded to correctly state the amount that needs to be raised from taxation. Mr. Butt accepts the amended wording from the Finance Committee.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the motion. The default budget is now higher that the proposed budget by use of the surplus funds. This is not an accurate reflection.

Jeff Shain was recognized to speak to the motion. He stated that taking money out of a surplus budget is a legal matter that needs to be considered when setting the tax rate.

Joe Fiala addressed the voters present at the session to reject this amendment, to stick with the Methot amendment and go forward. The Moderator asked for a show of support. The no's have it, the Butt amendment is not moved. The article will move to ballot as proposed by Mr. Methot.

ARTICLE 26: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000.00) for road reconstruction and resurfacing of roads. Of the \$350,000.00, the sum of Two Hundred Twenty One Thousand Two Hundred Forty Five Dollars (\$221,245.00) would be received from Highway Block Grant Funds from the State of New Hampshire (Pursuant to RSA 235) with One Hundred Twenty Eight Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty Five Dollars (\$128,755.00) to be raised by taxation. (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.297

Carl Knapp was recognized to speak to the Article. This article is to pay for resurfacing/construction costs of the current roads in town. Due to traffic increase and the weather, the roads have taken a beating. He urges support of this article.

Jan Racico, 20 Woodbury Road, was recognized to speak to the Article. She appreciates her paved road. She supports this so others can have a paved road.

Finance Committee voted 10 to 0 in favor of this article.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 27: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000.00) to cover the costs of the Town's participation in one (fall) local Household Hazardous Waste Collections in the year 2006, if approved this would become part of the Transfer Station operating budget. (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.033

Carl Knapp was recognized to speak to the Article. The State of NH is not giving us any funds to supplement this drive, therefore, there will be only one in the fall.

Finance Committee voted 10 to 0 in favor of this article.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 28: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Five Thousand Dollars (\$85,000.00) for the purpose of hiring 2 (two) additional full-time Police Officers. (The cost stated includes 9 Months of salary, benefits, uniforms, equipment and training, if approved this would become part of the Police Departments future operating budget.) (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.204

Chief of Police, Gregory Begin was recognized to speak to this Article. There is a dire need for two additional officers so we can have 24/7 coverage for the town. The state police have been great at assisting the town for coverage during the night hours, but that means waiting for an officer attempting to get to Weare quickly. The Chief has had coverage on Friday and Saturday nights utilizing current officers by extending their hours an additional three hours. The national standard states there should be 1.5 officers per thousand citizens, if we roughly use two per thousand, this means 17 officers are needed in the town. We are currently staffed with 9 or 10 if we include the chief. This population count does not include the increase during summer time due to campgrounds. We also need to consider the size of this town. The police need to cover a rather large geographical area.

Bill Beaupre was recognized to speak to this Article. He is not in support of this article and feels that it is premature. We need to give Chief Begin more time to evaluate for himself the situation in Weare.

Bill Buono was recognized to speak to this Article. He is in support of article.

Tom Reynolds was recognized to speak to the Article. He supports the article. Previous police chiefs have tried to get an increase in the police department as well, therefore, Chief Begin does not need to wait to re-evaluate the situation.

Frank Bolton was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to point out an accounting error. The realistic number for an annual accounting of the budget will be increased by \$120,000. The value presented in the article is only for a 9-month time frame.

Matt Esenwine was recognized to speak to the Article. He supports the article due to the case that Chief Begin made. Weare is bigger, has less coverage by state police, we double the population during the summer, we need more coverage.

Finance committee, original vote was to not support. A revote, after meeting with the chief and discussing the safety needs this morning, was in favor of this article 7:1.

Jan Racico was recognized to speak to the Article. She is in support of this article. Her husband died of a heart attack due to lack of police coverage in town. If we had 24/7 coverage the police would have been able to respond to her family's 911 Call to escort the ambulance, that was lost, directly to her house. Weare is not a small town and must think of ourselves as a larger community that needs proper coverage.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to the Article. He disagrees with Bill Beaupre. He feels there is a lot of crime in the town and the criminals know we have no coverage after midnight. We have a right to have the proper coverage. The addition of two officers is not enough but it is a start. The town is growing and we can't afford to jeopardize the town this way.

Sherry Butt-Dunham was recognized to speak to the Article. She believes it is time to support this article. We are does have crime, accidents, and medical emergencies after midnight! We need further coverage.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to this Article. He has an issue with "free rides" home by officers of the Police department. The resource officer and the Deputy Police Chief, who supposedly can use town vehicles to answer calls after midnight, are not in actuality doing so. Why hasn't this happened to relieve the Chief from responding to so many of these calls. Frank also wanted to point

out that the total cost of two additional officers is actually more than \$120,000, they will increase the Police Department budget for supplies, gas, etc.

John Lawton was recognized to speak to this Article. He has lived here for 28 years and can't believe how much the town has grown (from population of ~3500 to ~9000 now) as well as the town government in order to meet the demands of the increased growth. He wants to know how we stop the growth of the town and the budget and the need for budget increases.

Jan Racico was recognized to speak again. She pointed out that we are not a small town anymore. She pointed out that it will cost us only ~\$40/year to support this article.

The Moderator made the motion to stop debate on the article, it was seconded. The article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 29: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars, (\$30,000.00) to purchase a replacement vehicle for the Building Department, the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) will be withdrawn from the General Fund Surplus. (This item is part of the Town's Capital Improvement Plan.) (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

Charles (Chip) Meany, Building Inspector was recognized to speak to the Article. He was asked by the Selectmen to obtain a price quote for a 4x4 truck, bottom line with no incentives.

Finance committee voted 10:0 to not support the purchase of the vehicle due to the need to support other pressing issues.

Carl Knapp was recognized to speak to the Article. He feels the town should spend the money to buy the vehicle for the Building Department. The mechanics at the Highway Department are spending so much time to keep the current vehicle in running condition (just barely).

Mr. Rice was recognized to speak to the Article. He is in support of a truck. The mud and the rough roads justify the fact that the inspector needs a better vehicle to do his job. He also pointed out that the Building Department also provides a good source of revenue to the town. Therefore we should provide the building inspector with the tools he needs.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the Article. He pointed out that last year's article was for a lease of \$19,000. He would like to amend the article to be for \$20,000. He also would like to know the longevity of the vehicle.

Chip responded with that 5-8 years would be the longevity, leaving the vehicle with some trade-in value. He also stated that \$20,000 would be sufficient to purchase a vehicle.

David Roy was recognized to speak to the Article. He is in favor of a truck. He stated that he could see, as well as hear, the current vehicle coming for miles.

Paul Marsh was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to know how much it will cost the town to get rid of the current vehicle. Then he would like to know how much it would cost to equip the new truck as needed.

Chip responded that he has received numerous offers for the current vehicle. As for the cost to equip the new truck, it would be included in the purchase price.

The Moderator called for a vote on the amended article. The amendment passed by unanimous vote. The article will appear on the ballot as amended.

ARTICLE 30: Shall the Town raise and appropriate an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to replace the Fire Chief's vehicle, the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) will be withdrawn from the General Fund Surplus. (This item is part of the Town's Capital Improvement Plan.) (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

Robert Richards, Fire Chief, was recognized to speak to the Article. He feels that a used vehicle would be sufficient to replace the current vehicle. He simply wants a front-wheel drive, mid-sized used car.

Finance Committee in favor of the vehicle.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the Article. He is concerned as to what type of vehicle can be bought with \$10,000 and how long would it last?

Chief Richards responded that he has talked to other towns and they were able to find a perfectly good used vehicle for about \$10,000.

Walter Bohlin was recognized to speak to the Article. He feels that it is inappropriate to send the Fire Chief out in a toy car.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 31: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$353,500.00) to be added and allocated to the previously established Capital Reserve Funds as shown in the chart below.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.849

Jon Dowst, head of the CIP, was recognized to speak to the Article. The committee asked for a 5-10 year plan by taking the existing equipment the town has and what is needed to maintain or to be replaced at this time frame. The goal is to have a normal schedule of ~\$400,000-500,000 sitting in an account to average out the expenses over time rather than having highs and lows.

Finance Committee voted 10:0 in favor of this article.

Joe Fiala was recognized to speak to the Article. He has attended capital improvement seminars that state this is a better way to address CIP for the town.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 32: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) to be added and allocated to the previously established Capitol Reserve Maintenance Trust Funds as shown in the chart below, of the \$70,000.00 the sum of \$50,000.00 will be withdrawn from General Fund Surplus with the balance of \$20,000.00 to be raised by taxation.

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.048

Leon Methot was recognized to speak to the Article. The request for money this year is to upgrade the Town Offices which needs more than just windows. The building also needs insulation and updates to comply with Life Safety codes.

Finance Committee voted 8:0 not in favor of this article; the money can be better spent elsewhere for now.

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to point out that the town will get a one time savings for energy improvements from this article. Therefore he is in favor of this article.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the Article. He wanted to know if it is merely coincidental that the town is also receiving a \$90,000 FEMA grant?

Laura Buono responded that yes it is just coincidental.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 33: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-lapsing (2 years) non-transferable sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to commission a Cost of Community Services as requested by the Planning Board.

(RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.036

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. This study is needed to determine impact fees of new developments.

Finance Committee has no recommendation since there is no dollar value.

Paula Brensingner was recognized to speak to the Article. She would like to amend the article to correct the wording to state "Cost of Community Services Study" (add the word study). The Moderator stated this is not needed; the article will be adjusted to add the word "study".

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the Article. He discussed that we have a master plan in place that is supposed to help with impact fees.

Leon responded that there are three parts needed to implement impact fees:

- 1. A master plan
- 2. A cost of community services study
- 3. I can't remember the third item.

Moderator asked if there were any further discussion. There was none and the article will be presented on the ballot with the addition of the word study.

ARTICLE 34: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) to purchase Supplementary Death and Disability Insurance for the Fire Department (Note: This item is not included in the operating budget. If approved will become part of the Fire Department's future operating budget.) (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.014

Robert Richards, Fire Chief, was recognized to speak to the Article. In order to keep costs the same, the premiums didn't go up. However, the benefits were reduced. If these firefighters are willing to put their lives on the line then this additional benefit is worth it for the firefighters and their families.

Finance Committee has no recommendation the vote was a tie 4:4.

Joe Fiala was recognized to speak to the Article. He feels this is cheap money for good additional coverage, and the Selectmen are in favor of it!

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 35: Shall the Town raise and appropriate Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000.00) to be drawn from the revenues produced by the Cable franchise fees and place this amount into the previously established Community Access TV Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.038

Paul Hague, Vice Chairman of the Cable Committee, was recognized to speak to the Article. This money comes from franchise fees from the Cable Committee. Upgrades are needed in order to serve the town better. With the upgrade, others in the town can utilize the equipment.

Finance Committee voted 3:4:1 not in favor of the article.

Laura Buono was recognized to speak to the Article. She presented an amendment to the article to clarify the wording only. She is still trying to accomplish the same means.

"Shall the Town raise and appropriate Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000) from the town's general fund surplus, which amount represents the revenues produced by the cable franchise fees, and place this amount into the previously established Community Access TV Equipment Capital Reserve Fund?"

Evelyn Connor was recognized to speak to the article. It is important for the voters to see what happens at these meetings and this is the only means, along with the media and other citizens.

Paul Marsh was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to know whether the article amount is from the franchise fees or from taxes.

Laura Buono responded that it is from franchise fees.

Pat Meyers was recognized to speak to the Article. How come, if the money is coming from the general funds, there has been a net \$0 impact.

Laura Buono responded that it is due to the non taxable franchise fee.

Frank Campagna was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to amend the amount of the Article to \$54,000.

The Moderator asked for further discussion. There being none he called for a vote; the vote was in negative, the amendment failed.

Matt Esenwine, member of the Cable Committee, was recognized to speak to the Article. The money will be used to automate the system and improve the system for betterment of the system and the viewing audience.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no further motions to amend.

ARTICLE 36: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) for cemetery improvements. This sum to be withdrawn from Cemetery Trust Funds as provided by RSA 31:22a (cy pres), and to designate the Cemetery Trustees as agents to expend. (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.00

Donald Burke was recognized to speak to the Article. He stated that this is a bargain to the town and highly recommends it.

Finance Committee recommends this article, unanimous vote.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 37: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-lapsing (2 Years) non-transferable sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) to replace and rehabilitate windows at the Weare Public Library,

Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000.00) to be withdrawn from the Library account, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) to be raised by Taxation and to designate the Library Trustees as agents to expend. (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.0024

Chris Hague – the windows in the old and new section are in disrepair. This money will fix some of the windows. It is a start to fix the problem.

Finance committee in favor 10:0

ARTICLE 38: Shall the Town raise and appropriate the non-transferable sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing fireworks for the 2006 Weare Patriotic Celebration. (**RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.0144

Evelyn Connor was recognized to speak to the Article. This event is put on annually as our only town wide celebration.

Finance Committee is not in favor would like to see the money spent for obtaining the two additional police officers instead.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 39: Shall the Town establish a General Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund to be known as the Stewardship Fund under the provisions of RSA 31;19-a for the purpose of maintaining Conservation Easement Open Space, raise and appropriate the sum One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and to designate the Conservation Commission as agents to expend. (RECOMMENDED by Board of Selectmen)

Anticipated tax impact = \$0.0024

Andy Fulton, Vice Chairman Conservation Commission, was recognized to speak to the Article. He stated that he is not sure what this article is all about.

Leon Methot responded that it is in reference to Article 2, Zoning Board to place fees, this committee would then have the responsibility to appropriate the money as they see fit.

Finance Committee is not in favor by unanimous vote.

Heleen Kurk was recognized to speak to the article. She would like to amend the amount to state \$1. The motion was seconded.

Finance Committee is now in favor of the article by a unanimous vote.

Moderator stated this article would be presented as amended on the ballot since there are no further motions to amend it.

ARTICLE 40: Shall the Town adopt a Code of Ethics, which applies to all Town Officers, Elected Officials, Appointed Committee Officials/Members and all Town Employees? (A full detail of the proposed Code is available in the Town Clerk's Office during regular business hours and on the Town web site at www.weare.nh.gov)

Heleen Kurk was recognized to speak to the Article. In order to have a Code of Ethics for the town, it needs to be voted on by the town. The town does not have a problem right now; it is just that the town should have a policy in place. There is no money needed now. Next year there will need to be an elected committee which at that point there will need to be money in the budget.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 41: Shall the Town establish a Heritage Commission in accordance with RSA 673 and RSA 674?

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. This commission will act upon and have the ability to advise and purchase lands etc. for the betterment of the town.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to know how far is this going to go in this town? Has there been a problem with government telling people what to do with their property?

George responded that this is not what is being proposed, this is only a Heritage Commission that will advise the town.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 42: Shall the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint five citizens as members of the Heritage Commission pursuant to RSA 673;4-a and RSA 673;5 and to appoint up to five alternate members.

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. This article is just to establish a number of members that will be on the committee.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 43: Shall the Town approve a 30/60 day demolition or removal delay, in order to provide time to see if it is possible to save historic structures from demolition or removal.

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. This is just that a sign be posted so the town would be made aware (concerned citizens, the heritage commission, if passed) of a pending demolition. This allows a 30 day delay to give time. If the Building Dept. receives objection, then hold demo for another 30 days to discuss.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 44: Shall the Town create a Bicycle/Pedestrian Path Committee, to develop a long term plan for the Town of Weare and to check into sources of funding.

George Malette was recognized to speak to the Article. He stated that this would be a safer way to get around.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

ARTICLE 45: Shall the Town place into Conservation two (2) Town owned parcels in the Dustin Brook headwaters to be managed by the Weare Conservation Commission as natural open space. Said parcels have no road frontage and are designated as Map 401- lots 92 and 118 containing 12.84 and 13.75 acres respectively.

Andrew Fulton was recognized to speak to the Article. This land is in a unique natural area, known as Chipmunk Falls. These are two land-locked parcels which would be a good idea to place in conservation.

Moderator stated the article will be presented as is on the ballot since there are no motions to amend.

Joe Fiala took a moment to thank Neal Kurk for being the Moderator for the past 22 years, and that we will miss him next year. Neal has elected to step down as Moderator to be able to be heard on the floor instead.

ARTICLE 46: "In order to protect the public health, wildlife, soils, surface waters, and groundwater of the Town of Weare, the Town hereby adopts by reference as a Health Ordinance, the regulations of the state of New Hampshire, Env-Ws 800 and Env-Ws 1600 regarding the use and disposal of sewage sludge, biosolids and septage." The proposed ordinance shall give, the Town, through the office of the Health Officer, the ability to:

- review all sewage sludge/biosolids and septage land application projects in the Town of Weare:
- issue immediate cease and desist orders to halt any sewage sludge/biosolids or septage project that is creating a public nuisance, health concern, or is in violation of strict state laws; and
- comply with RSA 485 and fulfill the Town's responsibility to provide a secure outlet for locally-produced septage. (by **Petition**)

Chris Bolton was recognized to speak to the article. He and Mr. Ludders have worked out a proposal for Article 47 and would like to eliminate his originally proposed Article 46 but we need to be assured that Article 47 would be changed to what they agreed to. The Moderator stated that we cannot simply remove the article from the ballot.

Heleen Kurk moved to suspend the rules and take up Article 47 first then back to Article 46. The Moderator called for a vote to suspend the rules and the vote was approved by the two-thirds vote needed.

ARTICLE 47: To protect the health and welfare of residents, and to protect the surface and groundwater resources, wildlife and other natural resources of the Piscataquog River watershed in Weare, the stockpiling and land application of treated municipal sewage sludge that can be legally land applied, industrial paper mill sludge (short paper fiber), septage, and EQ solids and EQ filtrates derived from septage, shall not be stored in contact with the ground or in any way that allows runoff to reach the ground, spread, injected or in any way deposited on the ground in the Town of Weare.

In this ordinance treated municipal sewage sludge that can be legally land applied means Class A sewage sludge, Class B sewage sludge, Class B biosolids, and compost derived from such sewage sludge or biosolids.

This ordinance applies to Class A sewage sludge and Class A biosolids products sold by the bag. This ordinance prohibits all forms of land application, including, but not limited to incorporation, injection and topdressing. (by **PETITION**)

Dick Ludders was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to propose an amendment as follows:

Shall the Town amend the health ordinances by adding the following sections: The stockpiling and land application of treated municipal sewage sludge that can be legally land applied, industrial paper mill sludge (short paper fiber), septage, and EQ filtrates derived from septage are not allowed in the overlay district two hundred and fifty feet (250') from the normal high water line on each side of the Piscataquog River in the Town of Weare.

In this ordinance treated municipal sludge that can be legally applied means Class A sewage sludge, Class B sewage sludge, Class B biosolids, and compost derived from sewage sludge and biosolids.

In this ordinance, land application shall include but not be limited to, incorporation, injection, and top dressing.

The provision of this section shall not apply to biosolids that are sold for home gardening use in consumer packages registered as fertilizers under RSA 431:4 and that weigh 100 pounds or less. (by **Petition**)

The amendment was moved and seconded by Leon. The amendment was done to reverse the blanket band on sludge. Instead it allows distance criteria (setbacks) to waterways.

Paul Walsh was recognized to speak to the motion. He would like to know if this is only limited to the Piscataquog River or can we include tributaries, etc.

Dick Ludders responded that if you enact limitations stricter than what the state has in place, then septic disposals can't be brought to Concord which would then cost the town more money to transport waste elsewhere.

Andrew Fulton was recognized to speak to the motion. Speaking on behalf of the Conservation Commission, they wouldn't object to the new language.

Chris Bolton said the state language for dealing with septic waste does indeed encompass other waterways.

Forrest Esenwine was recognized to speak to the motion. He asked for clarification/definition of certain words in the article. Mr. Ludders clarified that animal manure is not part of this article.

The article now reads "Shall the Town address the issue of sludge biosolids, and septage that was the subject of this

petitioned Article #46 through the adoption of Article #47, a compromise which the petitioners of each article have agreed to support".

Moderator asked if there would be any further discussion. There being none Article 46 is moved to the ballot as amended.

Article 47 was discussed previously.

ARTICLE 48 was discussed earlier in the day.

ARTICLE 49: Shall the Town raise and appropriate up to the sum of Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) to pave the access road from Rte 114 and the parking area in between the football and soccer fields at Bolton Memorial Fields. (by **PETITION**) (**NOT RECOMMENDED** by Board of Selectmen)

Evelyn Connor was recognized to speak to the Article. She stated that the field is not ready for paving because it is not completed.

Finance Committee voted 10:0 not in favor of this article.

Leon Methot was recognized to speak to the Article. He would like to propose to amend the dollar amount to \$0. Ms. Connor seconded the motion.

Tom Reynolds was recognized to speak to the motion. He wanted to point out that this was not an article petitioned by Parks and Recreation. Some members may have signed the petition. The road eventually will need to be paved. We would take the money if given to us. The amendment was voted on and passed. The Moderator asked if there were any further amendments to this article. There were none. The Moderator stated Article 49 is moved to the ballot as amended.

ARTICLE 50: To transact any other business, which may legally come before this meeting?

Thank you was the topic of this last article. Thank you to the Finance Committee, the Cable Committee, the Moderator Neal Kurk, the Board of Selectmen but especially for the voters that took the time and spent the day here to support our town.

Bookkeeper / Finance Clerk

For the past eighteen months I have held a dual role as both Tax Collector and Finance Clerk. I worked mornings in the Tax office and afternoons in the Finance office. On September 18, 2006, the Board of Selectmen interviewed and awarded me the position of full-time Bookkeeper/Finance Clerk. I went to work sorting through a lot of old records that have been taking up valuable space. I have also been working with the department heads to discuss streamlining of certain procedures and accounting practices.

In February 2006, with the help of Advanced Data Systems, the Town's new finance software was installed. The new software is working out wonderfully. The software allows me to email reports off to the Board and departments as needed. Paychecks have been enhanced with clearer definition of deduction and accrual information. One feature left to get up and running is the integration between the finance and the tax collector. This feature will allow daily deposits and warrants to automatically merge into the general ledger, alleviating manual journal entries.

On a personal note, I went back to college December 2005 to finish the Associate Degree that I started many years ago. At this time I am carrying a 3.78 grade point average and will receive my Associate in Accounting in January of 2007. Going back to school was something my late husband Matt and I talked about before he passed away in October of 2005. I have not regretted the decision to go back to school. In fact, I am registered to continue starting in April 2007 toward my Bachelor of Science in Accounting/Finance.

Diane Lamb has taken over the position of Tax Collector on a part-time basis. It has been a very easy transition as Diane had already been working in the Clerk's office covering for both the Town Clerk and myself since the latter part of 2005. Diane asked me to be her Deputy Tax Collector and I accepted.

I am looking forward in 2007 to using the education I have gained through my degree along with the new finance software to further streamline and organize the finance office of the Town.

Town Clerk's Report 2006

It seems like only a short time ago that I was hired to be your Town Clerk. Beverly Herman was about to retire, it was at an election and she asked me if I would be interested in applying for the position. I replied I didn't have any knowledge in that area, as I had been a Bank Manager for several years.

Beverly said you know how to handle money, budgets and you are a people person: you will make a good Clerk. I applied and was fortunate enough to be hired in December of 1991. In March of 1992 you elected me and have elected me every three years since then. I will be running again in 2007 and hope you think I am deserving of your vote again this year. One thing Beverly said was that I would learn something-new everyday. She was so right.

Times have changed. We have a checklist that is centralized with the State. We are sending out a form to update our checklist information. To save on postage they are in with your motor vehicle letters. If you would fill them out and return them to us, we will update your information in our computer. It only has to be done once. If you are not a registered voter, this form is not for you. Please come in to the office with identification and proof of residence and we will register you. If that is not convenient you may register at the polls in March.

Our office has a new face in it; Diane Lamb is the Tax Collector and is only working 30 hours instead of the 40 of the previous Tax Collector. Diane was a floater to help with vacations and sick time. She has been trained by the state to process Motor Vehicles. Maureen is my Deputy and the three of us are here to assist you in anyway that we can.

The Passports have become growing revenue for us. We have the applications here in the office or you can get them on line. You must submit either a previous U.S. Passport or a **Certified** Birth Certificate, two color current pictures 2"X2" with a light background. Adults 16 or over need a driver's license or picture ID. Children under 14 must be accompanied by parents/guardian(s). The fee for adults is \$67.00 in a check for the U.S. Dept. of State and \$30.00 for the Town of Weare. Children under 14 are \$52.00 to the U.S. Dept of State and \$30.00 for the Town of Weare. Each application must have its own check for the U.S. Dept. of State. The Town can be combined if more than one application is being filed at the same time.

No appointment is necessary but we do ask that you come in the office at least one half hour before we close. The process only takes a few minutes here in the office and the passport will be returned to you in about six weeks. It is important that you plan ahead for your trip.

We have increased the dog license fee by \$1.00. The expense of paper and licenses has increased and we need to keep up with that. The increase will be effective with licenses for 2007. New licenses are available after January 1, 2007. All licenses are due by the end of April. There are penalties that are in place beginning June 1, 2007 for all unlicensed dogs. The fine is \$25.00 plus \$1.00 a month. Please do your best to avoid these fees by licensing your pet(s) on time.

We will hold our Rabies Clinic in March and you will receive a notice of the date and time.

Once again I want to say thank you for electing me your Town Clerk and we will be the best to serve you and keep this office a place you want to visit.

Building Department

The year 2006 brought a new vehicle to the department which has enabled us to work more effectively and efficiently, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank the citizens for their vote to obtain the vehicle. The growth ordinance enacted by the citizens of Weare is now going into its second year and builders are effectively transitioning into the flow of available permits. Mechanical inspections for furnaces and boilers now include wood stove installations and are being inspected by the Fire Department. The Fire Department and Building Department are now jointly reviewing "Commercial" plan applications as well as cistern compliance issues, and sprinklers. The Weare Police Department has also worked closely with the Building Department with ongoing legal matters relative to illegal "junkyards" operating in the Town.

The Building Department has also hired a new Secretary, Wendy Rice, who is transitioning well into her new environment. Wendy has previous Engineering and "CAD" experience and has attended a seminar on how to deal with unruly and abusive clientele.

The Building Department is looking forward to another busy year, in 2007, even though the number of new housing permits is limited by the growth ordinance. The volume of building is actually staying somewhat constant with housing being replaced with additions, remodeling, sheds and swimming pools. The Building Department has again slightly restructured itself to allow for "in office" time for the Building Inspector's availability to help citizens with building questions and to help facilitate the permit process.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES

Without question, this year has been a great challenge for the Cemetery Trustees due to extreme weather conditions.

Two cemeteries, Collins and Oil Mill, had serious flooding during the May floods, resulting in wall failures and headstone disruption. The rebuilding and repairing, to bring these cemeteries back to acceptable conditions will be costly and time consuming. This work is scheduled to begin in 2007 and will take up to two years to complete.

In November, a huge, old pine tree in Pine Grove Cemetery fell victim to the high winds. It was blown over ending up across Buzzell Hill Road, taking down three sections of the rail fence of the East Weare Cemetery.

In spite of these weather complications, our contractor, Bruce Richards, Sr. of Cutting Blade, kept the grass mowed and trimmed as well as accomplishing the spring and fall cleanups in a timely fashion.

Again this year, we were able to secure the services of inmates from the Hillsborough House of Corrections for three weeks. Their projects included:

Stone wall building, tree and brush cutbacks at Pine Grove

Cemetery,

Dismantling existing front wall, tree and brush cut backs at Sugar

Hill Cemetery,

Tree and brush cut backs at Eaton, Center Square, Pine Grove, East

Weare, and Johnson Cemeteries,

Building a walkway into Center Square Cemetery,

Setting of two granite posts at the entrance to Pine Grove Cemetery.

The Trustees are grateful to Rob Gordon, Trustee, for the donation of the two granite posts that were installed at Pine Grove Cemetery.

The stone wall at Sugar Hill Cemetery was completely rebuilt, professionally by Andy Spielberger of Mended Wall Stone Masons of Weare. The dismantling of the old wall by the inmates saved the town considerable money on this project. The wall was done in a farm wall restoration style in keeping with the original wall built over two hundred years ago.

For his Eagle Scout project, Ken Stephens, a Boy Scout from Weare, painted fourteen new signs for the cemeteries, reset some headstones that had been tipped over or uprooted and installed a hook on the wooden gate at Sugar Hill Cemetery. The Trustees are grateful to Ken for his work.

It was a busy year. We, the Trustees, hope the results are visible. We also thank Judy and Don Rogers for their commitment to the town cemeteries. Their knowledge of plot locations, rules and regulations and their interaction with funeral directors is invaluable. This is part of their stewardship to the town.

While people will respond to others in need without the training, one goal of the CERT program is to help them do so effectively and efficiently without placing themselves in unnecessary danger.

During the past year Weare has formed a Citizen Corp Council. The Council consists of the Town Administrator, a Selectman, Chief of Police, Emergency Management Director, Road Agent, a Fire Department designee, a member from the Board of Fire Wards, the Director of CERT, two businesses and one resident. This council provides oversight and guidance of Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) and other Citizen Preparedness programs within Weare, and if applicable, with area communities.

The first CERT training class provided the town with ten trained volunteers. These volunteers assist the Police and Fire Departments by opening a shelter, assisting with traffic and road closures when called upon.

Weare CERT will continue to train and are at the ready to assist the Community.

Weare Conservation Commission

2006 ANNUAL REPORT

The Weare Conservation Commission (WCC) has had a very busy, successful and exciting year. WCC members and friends hit the ground running in January, conducting a vigorous voter information campaign leading up to the Town Meeting in March. Weare citizens listened to the arguments and chose to support land conservation. A strong favorable vote for Article 24 authorized the use of a bond in combination with other funds to purchase an ecologically valuable 600-acre parcel in north Weare. A significant portion of the funding came from the Mildred Hall Trust allowing the bonded amount to be greatly reduced. With the critical pledge of support, what began as the Pine Hill Forest Project became officially known as the Charles and Ethel Eastman Conservation Area, named in honor of the parents of the late Mildred Hall. There was no time to relax after Town Meeting because there was still plenty of work to be done. Steve Najjar did a fantastic job of pulling five funding sources together for the closing in July. A conservation easement, to be held by the Piscataguog Watershed Association, is being drafted to permanently protect the property. Once the easement is finalized, NH Fish and Game will release the \$50,000 grant the department pledged toward the project. The WCC continues to work closely with the Mildred Hall Trust Advisory Committee (MHTAC) on a range of issues including location of the public access point(s), parking, and signage. The MHTAC will arrange for placement of a stone monument in memory of the Eastman's, who once called this part of town home. Work will continue into the future as trails are discussed and devised. Thorough assessments of biological resources and physical features are envisioned and a management plan for the property will be drafted.

Although the Eastman Conservation Area has been the high profile activity for the WCC in 2006, we have had other irons in the fire as well. The Weare Open Space Committee (WOSC) has firmly established itself as a subcommittee of the WCC, and has been pursuing other land protection opportunities which hopefully will come to fruition in the months ahead. A landowner contact letter was drafted and mailed this fall as part of an on-going effort to provide Weare landowners with knowledge of the land protection options available to them. The WOSC has strengthened relationships with local and state conservation organizations such as the PWA, the Russell Foundation, and the Society for the Protection of NH Forests, all of which have given crucial professional and technical support to our volunteer efforts.

Land conservation projects may be the primary inspiration and motivation for many WCC members, but the day to day work of the WCC often means working to minimize the impact of continued aggressive residential development in our town. Thanks to the fine leadership of former WCC Chair Tom Carr and new WCC Chair Andy Fulton, there is a strong and effective working relationship with the Weare

Planning Board at the advisory level. The WCC appreciates the Planning Board's openness to ideas and suggestions on wetlands issues, cluster subdivisions, and the open space features therein, and environmental concerns regarding residual pesticides, to mention just a few. The WCC has also made great progress in 2006 towards operational integration with the Town Land Use Department. We greatly appreciate the assistance.

We are extremely fortunate to have all seven full member seats occupied by active veteran commissioners. Alternates are in short supply however, and we would be delighted to welcome new volunteers. Currently, WCC members form the core of the WOSC. We would welcome volunteers who choose to serve exclusively on the WOSC. Also, if you enjoy hiking or just like to be active outdoors, but are not interested in and/or available for evening meetings, we could use your help monitoring our Town conservation lands.

Many people and organizations contributed and continue to contribute to this successful year, especially with the Eastman Conservation Area effort, and the WCC is grateful for all the help. Special thanks must go to the MHTAC and to the voters of Weare, as well as the local businesses that supported the voting day effort.

Finally, we say a fond farewell to Selectman Leon Methot, a conservation supporter who was always there with the answer to the question and glad to help. We will miss him greatly.

WEARE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Weare Economic Development Committee met once per month during 2006. The committee began the year with the proposal of warrant articles for voter consideration in regards to zoning changes. Many of the zoning changes fell in line with suggestions by the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission (SNHPC) within the Town's Master Plan. The warrant articles proposed minor changes signage, lighting and buffer zones. The articles were discussed at length and revised in joint meetings with the Weare Planning Board, and all met with voter approval.

Other items suggested by SNHPC within the Master Plan were outlined at each meeting and discussed, such as:

- 1. Enhance and Connect the Villages
- 2. Formulation of Integrated Town Center Plan
- 3. Possible Mt. William property expansion
- 4. Create a Planned Business/Office Park

Many of these tasks can seem overwhelming to a volunteer committee. The committee realizes however, that these tasks may take years to formalize. However, we all fully believe that initial planning is critical to the eventual completion of any of the items. The committee welcomed the return of the Weare Center Advisory Group, and hopes to support their efforts in suggesting a Town Center Plan.

The need for Weare to join a Regional Economic Development Corporation was brought to our attention by personnel at the State of New Hampshire Department of Economic Development. Weare is one of only a few towns who do not belong to a corporation, and participation will be beneficial from grant possibilities to education for committee members. It will be a task we hope to complete in 2007.

The committee also was involved in looking into more possible changes to zoning requirements of signs, specifically temporary signs. With the Board of Selectmen's support, a public input session was held in order to develop a plan of action. After hearing comments and suggestions, the committee feels that there is a desire from the public to change some of the existing regulations, for example restricting some temporary signs, while increasing size parameters for some businesses. However the Committee felt there was a need for more public input and debate before changing existing regulations. This will be on the committees' agenda for 2007.

Committee members include Jim Thompson, Alice Morris, Art Siciliano, Heleen Kurk, Cheryl Elliott, with George Malette, and Scott Becker as alternates.

Weare Finance Committee Year-End Report December 1, 2006

At the time of this writing, the Finance Committee has 8 members and has been meeting every Monday evening (as well as other nights as necessary) to review and discuss the budgets of the Town of Weare, the Weare School District, and John Stark Regional High School. Two subcommittees were established this year, per our charter: one focused on the town budget process, the other on the schools.

As in past years, we concentrated on working with individual departments and their respective department heads to formulate an acceptable proposed budget. We also developed a comprehensive yet easily understood informational piece that was distributed to the citizens of Weare, not only outlining the committee's recommendations but also explaining the impact of those recommendations. The final report from the committee will be inserted into the town-wide mailer that is sent to the voters.

The Finance Committee, as the voice of the Weare taxpayer, has worked to attain acceptable – and thereby passable – budgets; the committee does not want the town or schools to have to operate under default budgets, but does want to see a minimal tax impact, if any. Last year, the Finance Committee supported two major proposals, the purchase of the Ferrante property and the bond for a new Weare Middle School. These represent a major impact on the taxpayers of Weare but were proposals the committee felt were not only acceptable but necessary.

The Finance Committee takes note of last-minute issues in the budget presented at the February 2006 Deliberative Session as well as other long-standing accounting practices; in light of these issues, the committee continues to advocate for improved accounting controls and oversight.

We will again have a number of warrant articles for both the town and schools which will have an impact on the budgets, and will therefore have much to consider; regardless what the warrant holds in store this year, we hope that through our efforts, the taxpayers of Weare can be informed voters when they go to the polls.

This last year was fairly wet throughout the spring and summer months, however we finished the season with an active fall fire season. In order to meet an increased demand for services, the Forest Protection Bureau was reorganized into three regions with smaller Forest Ranger Districts and over the last several years we have added two Forest Rangers. The fifteen state fire towers were the first to report on many fires throughout the state and they completed many other projects on the low fire danger days. The state implemented a program called Tower Quest to help citizens learn about fire towers and the need to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. The United States celebrated Smokey Bear's 60th birthday in 2004, and celebrations were held throughout the state. Under State law (RSA 227-L:17) a fire permit is required for all outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow. The New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services also prohibits the open burning of household waste. Citizens are encouraged to contact the local fire department or DES at 1-800-498-6868 or www.des.state.nh.us for more information. Safe open burning requires diligence and responsibility. Help us to protect New Hampshire's forest resources. For more information please contact the Division of Forests & Lands at (603) 271-2214, or online at www.nhdfl.org.

Fire activity was very high during the first several weeks of the 2006 fire season, with red-flag conditions issued by the National Weather Service and extreme fire danger in many sections of the state. The largest forest fire during this period occurred in late April and burned 98 acres. The extremely dry conditions in spring resulted in over twice the amount of acreage burned than in all of 2005. Our statewide system of fire lookout towers is credited with keeping most fires small and saving several structures this season due to their quick and accurate spotting capabilities. Fires in the wildland urban interface damaged 6 structures, a constant reminder that forest fires burn more than just trees. Homeowners should take measures to prevent a wildland fire from spreading to their home. Precautions include keeping your roof and gutters clear of leaves and pine needles, and maintaining adequate green space around your home free of flammable materials. Report Health and Welfare

The past year was a busy one for both the Health and Welfare Departments. Health issues this year were Triple EEE (Eastern Equine Encephalitis, West Nile Virus (WNV) and the Avian flu. In March a public forum informational session was held on Triple EEE and the West Nile Virus. Public Health Veterinarian, Jason Stull and Arborviral Specialist, Dianne Donovan did an excellent job in informing the public about these diseases and prevention techniques.

In October the 8th annual Weare Health Fair and Flu shot clinic was held at the Center Woods Elementary School, which was attended by approximately 300 local residents. Over 200 residents received flu shots from the Concord Visiting Nurse Association. Also available were many handouts and door prizes from organizations such as the Weare Police Dept., Meals On Wheels, American Red Cross Disaster Truck, Walk New Hampshire, 911, Riverside Tae -Kwan-Do, Curves did muscle strength testing, Goffstown PD Officer Keith Chauvette and his Police Dog, Rex and the always popular Barnstead Fire Department Smokehouse.

Local business donors to the event were Stoneyfield Yogurt, Dunkin Donuts and Abigail's Bakery. Many thanks also go to Center Woods school nurse Pat Macneil as Co-Coordinator of the Health Fair and to Middle School Nurse, Marcia Magdziarz for manning a table and distributing healthy snacks. Special Education Coordinator Linda Ford manned the kitchen with several volunteers from the Center Woods School.

On December 2, 2006, a second VNA flu shot clinic was held and over 85 additional people received flu shots. The VNA provided additional services to over 110 Weare individuals during the past year besides holding a monthly Foot clinic located at Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

Despite an increase in families served this year, the Weare Welfare Department saw a decrease in financial assistance. Southern NH Services provided 396 Weare residents with fuel assistance and over \$80,380.00 in electric assistance was spent on Weare families. Other social service organizations such as Meals on Wheels helped provide 21 senior citizens with low cost subsidized meals.

The Holiday Food Basket Program in coordination with Center Woods School nurse and the Weare Food Pantry volunteers provided over 50 families with food baskets for the Thanksgiving Holiday and 62 needy families received Christmas food baskets besides gifts from the Angel Trees.

The Weare Food Pantry volunteers and donors continue to assist the needy residents of Weare and cost the Weare Welfare department no public funds as all food is donated by residents, churches, local schools, civic organizations and businesses. Many thanks go to all the contributors to the food pantry, as it is truly a community effort. The food pantry is located in the basement of the Town Office Building and is open on Wednesdays from 5:00 to 6:30 pm.

The Health and Welfare Office is located on the second floor of the Town Administrative office building and for Health or Welfare questions or assistance, please contact Donna Meuse at telephone number 529-2572.

LAND USE DEPARTMENT

The Land Use Department is located in the basement of the Town Office Building (the old police station). This department takes care of the Planning Board and Zoning Board of Adjustment roles. Both boards have had another busy year. In October of this year both boards lost a very valuable member, Leon Methot. Leon brought a great deal of humor and knowledge to the table for both boards. Leon was a great asset and will be sorely missed by the board members as well as the Town. I would personally like to say "thank you" to Leon for all of his dedication to this Town, I certainly appreciated it.

The Planning Board consists currently of 9 members. Chairman Paul Morin, Vice Chairman Frank Bolton, Ex-officio Tom Clow, Secretary George Malette, member Mike Palmisano and alternates Steven Lehmann, Carl Knapp, Craig Francisco and Neal Kurk. In 2006, the board has seen several subdivision, lot line adjustments and site plans. During 2006, the Planning Board and Conservation Commission have seen a lot more interaction together, which has been very positive for the Town of Weare.

The CIP (capital improvements program) subcommittee has once again pulled together under the guidance of the Planning Board in an effort to put forth a justified, necessary, responsible CIP program for the upcoming year. The CIP Subcommittee consists of Chairman Paul Morin, Selectman Heleen Kurk, and residents, Monte Brown, Richard Butt, Paul Marsh and Jonathan Dowst. This year CIP began in September of 2006, meeting with department heads, gathering information, prioritizing the requests in an effort to present a good well thought out final plan for the Planning Board and Board of Selectmen to embrace.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment currently consists of 6 members. Chairman David Ruoff; Vice Chairman Ian McSweeney, members Forrest Esenwine, Jack Dearborn, June Purington, and alternate Elwood Stagakis. The Zoning Board heard 22 cases in 2006, which is a slight decrease from the 35 cases in 2005.

Weare residents that might be interested in serving on either the Planning Board or the Zoning Board of Adjustment are encouraged to either attend a meeting or call the Land Use Office at 529-2250 for more information.

I would like to close by thanking the current members of both boards as well as other residents who volunteered their time throughout 2006. These volunteers spend countless hours of their time, both at and away from the meetings. I would also like to extend thanks to Judy Rogers, Chip Meany and Wendy Rice for their help assisting the public while I'm out of the office.

I would personally like to thank the residents of Weare for their patience and understanding. I know that the zoning ordinance and subdivision process can seem confusing, but you are welcome to call or stop by at any time for clarification.

Weare Public Library

This year, library trustees and staff took a long look at the space we occupy at 10 Paige Memorial Lane. The original Paige section and the early '90s addition have maintenance needs. The town's expanding population prompted consideration of the building's useful life as a library.

A blower door test arranged by the town's Building Department showed that air leaks and lack of insulation in the Paige Room funnel damp, cold air to the Sawyer Room, aggravating an air quality problem. Spring dampness created mold on downstairs walls. On rainy days, summer children's programs were held in the adult section.

Our thanks go to Carl Knapp and his dedicated Public Works crew for the hookup of a new well and efforts to install water tanks and filters. Hillsborough County Corrections Volunteers began preliminary landscaping restoration in the well area in May. More will be done in 2007.

The main door was repaired for the last time, according to a locksmith. Prior repairs have proved to be temporary, so trustees wrote a Capital Improvement Plan for door replacement and repair or replacement of windows.

UpCountry Consultants, a New Hampshire firm specializing in small-library space and strategic planning, did a needs assessment study which confirmed what the staff already felt: we're too small and our collection size is 49% below average. Based on accepted library standards, we are 1,949 square feet short of the recommended size for a library in the 6,000 to 9,000 population range. If we had that space, we would not have to remove one book for every new book or audio added to the collection. We circulated 34,974 books, audios, videos and magazines in 2006. Please help us with our space needs by borrowing more in 2007.

Despite these needs, a dedicated, competent staff offers the public attention available only in small libraries. Demand for public access computers remains steady, with 1,252 logons in 2006. A Gates Staying Connected Grant has enabled the library to retain a computer technician for advice and maintenance. Look for downloadable audiobooks shortly.

The Children's Room is busy. Summer Reading Club attracted 188 children from age two through grade 6, who read 3,359 books. Pirate stories and crafts drew 750 participants to ten programs. Thanks go to Carl Knapp, Public Works Director, Detective Lou Chatel of the Weare Police Department, for their lively interpretation of stories and to the parents who value reading and make sure their children have access to library books and programs.

The Friends of the Library and the Golden Lions Club raised over \$2000 at an August book and bake sale. Funds provided the library with passes to Squam Lake Science Center, the MacAuliffe Planetarium, SEE Center, and Kearsarge Indian Museum. Along with the State Library's Kids, Books and the Arts grant, they funded a children's performance by Partners in Rhyme. The Friends sponsored N.H. Audubon's "Wings of the Night," a program featuring a live owl. At that time, the Conservation Commission presented the library with a barred owl, stuffed and mounted. Thanks to artisans Frank Campana and Sylvia Dwyer for construction and decoration of a display case.

Preschool reading programs meet regularly in the Children's Room and an adult book group meets monthly upstairs. This fall, the book group joined WEVO's Laura Knoy for an on-air discussion during the Granite State Stories series. Our thanks to Carole Perkins for again instructing new knitters at the library, to Alice Morris for her lively gardening talks, and to all our regular volunteers.

Our library patrons remain our greatest asset. We look forward to hearing from you, and from non-users, as we plan the future. We need your support. Together we can take the next step toward creating the best twenty-first century library our resources can provide.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

While 2006 did not bring the area a great deal of snow, the Highway Department did spend a fair amount of time salting and sanding the roads for icy conditions.

In May, the Town of Weare, along with a good portion of the State of New Hampshire, was hit with heavy rains and severe flooding. Most of the projects the Department was working on were put on hold so crews could focus on the many washouts of a number of roads and bridges within Town. Due to the extensive damage done by this flood, we applied for FEMA assistance to help defray the costs for repairs. The Town received \$175,198.00 in FEMA assistance relief. This funding went towards materials such as crushed gravel, stone, culvert pipe, and pavement. These projects took a great deal of time to complete, but all areas affected by the storms, were opened by late fall.

Clough Park Road was a major undertaking for reclamation and repaving of approximately six thousand feet. We thank the residents of that area for their understanding and patience during this period.

A great deal of paving was done in Town on several of our roads, along with one of the Fire Stations.

WATER DEPARTMENT

The Water Department took on the task of implementing the installation of a new well in the center of Town during the year. This well serves the library, Stone Building and the Town Hall.

SEWER DEPARTMENT

Upgrades were done at the sewer pump station and are continuing. The new generator is on-line and should eliminate any lapse in service due to power failures.

TRANSFER STATION

The Transfer Station has seen increases in recycling and disposal. We would like to remind all Weare residents that Weare does have a recycling program and ordinance. We thank everyone who has made the effort to recycle and ask those who may have been unaware of the program, to start recycling. For those unaware, there are fees for some disposal items due to the costs incurred by the Town to dispose of these items such as refrigerators, tires and air conditioners, to name a few. Please see the attendants for further rates and disposal areas. The following numbers represent tonnage that was recycled through the Transfer Station through the month of October and/or November of this year:

2006 REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

Weare is a member of the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission which includes the towns of Weare, Goffstown, Derry, Manchester, New Boston, Raymond, Candia, Auburn, Hooksett, Chester, Deerfield, Londonderry and Bedford. The Commission provides its many services to the region under four broad categories: Regional Transportation Planning, Regional Land Use and Environmental Planning, Local Planning Assistance, and Regional Planning Data. The Planning Commission also serves as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the region. As an MPO, it provides a forum for state and local officials to discuss transportation issues and develop an overall transportation plan for the region.

In 2006, SNHPC conducted several planner's round table discussions in addition to the traditional monthly meetings of the commission. They also hosted the Municipal Law Lecture Series, a three night series of seminars for planning board and ZBA members at PSNH in Manchester. Many of Weare's elected and appointed officials attended these lectures.

The commission also undertook several special projects including the first Regional Comprehensive Plan and a Future Land Use Map covering all of the member communities.

Weare is represented at the commission by Paul Morin, Planning Board Chairman, and Ian McSweeney, ZBA Vice Chairman. Meetings are from noon to 1:00 pm on the fourth Tuesday of each month. The commission is headed by Executive Director David J. Preece and the town gets assistance in various areas from Head Planner John (Jack) Munn.
