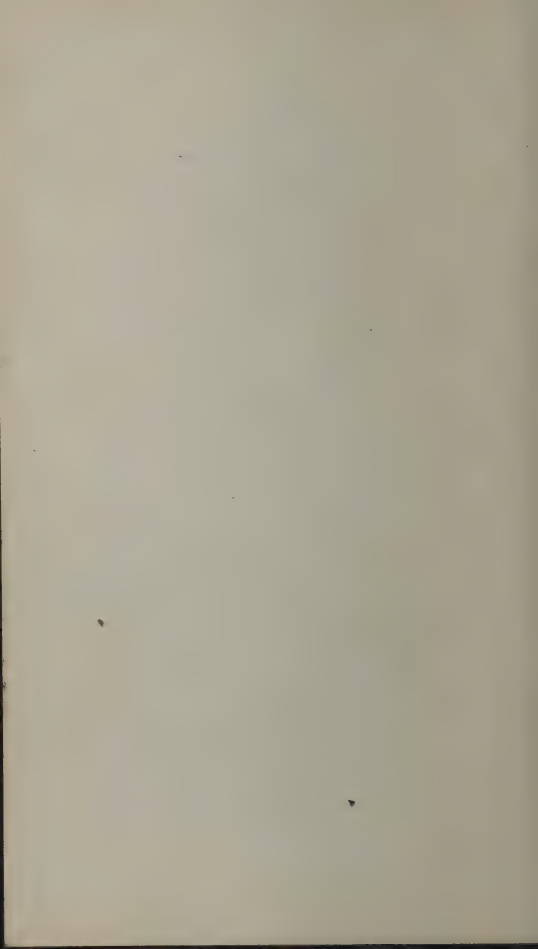

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the Town School Board and to the Prudential Committee of the Simonds Free High School:

I submit herewith the second annual report combining the activities of the Town School System and of the Simonds Free High School for the year ending June 30, 1922.

### Organization

To secure extended departmental instruction in high school and to relieve congested conditions in the graded school building, where fifty pupils were enrolled in grades one and two, and thirty-nine pupils in grades five and six, the high school courses were re-organized on the 2-4 year basis of a six year course. The seventh and eighth grade teacher thus eliminated from the Town School System was added to the High School staff.

This organization gives to pupils who must leave school at the end of the eighth grade contact with both men and women teachers. It also provides for the same pupils two years of departmental work in every-day science, one year of concrete algebra and arithmetic, and the same amount of time devoted to the application of geometry in the solution of arithmetic problems of dimension. Twice a week practical woodworking is given to all boys; and simple sewing and cooking to all girls in the seventh and eighth grades. The study of United States history and civics is emphasized in both of these grades. Organized drills are continued in geography, grammar, music, penmanship and spelling. A broader language sense and keener appreciation of form values in our mother tongue are gained by early acquaintance with a foreign language. To those pupils who do not intend to pursue a classical course of study the utilitarian value of spoken French is greater than that of classical Latin reading. For this reason instruction in spoken and written French is given in both years of the junior work.

The re-opening of senior high school courses in agriculture and home economics has met with a response both in this and in neighboring towns. I wish to commend the teachers in charge of these courses for their interest and success in securing co-operation from the homes and other community sources.

The maintenance of only six grades in the elementary schools of the Town School System reduced the cost of teachers' salaries in several rural schools and made possible the re-opening of the Melvin School.

The dental inspection of pupils in the Town School System was made by Dr. Louis I. Moulton of Concord, assisted by Mrs. Mabel N. Hope. Through the generosity of Mr. Edward Hartz and other individuals the lunch room at the graded school building was equipped as a dental laboratory. All pupils from the rural schools were conveyed to this dental room for inspection. This increased the efficiency of Dr. Moulton's work and reduced the expense to about two-thirds the cost of the previous year. Of the children needing cleaning or extraction of teeth, fourteen percent were treated at the time of the inspection. These treatments were made upon requests signed by the individual parents who paid a small fee for the treatment.

### Instruction and School Activities

The changes in instruction in the six grades below the Junior High School were confined to the language and geography courses of grades five and six. New and up-to-date textbooks were introduced in both of these courses. Intensive oral drills in the fundamentals of technical grammar were given equal emphasis with written composition. Much black-board drill in analysis has been used to advantage with pupils who intend to begin the study of a foreign language in the seventh grade.

Geography study in the fifth grade has included North and South America; with intensive study of the United States and its commercial relations with Canada and with the leading countries of South America.

In the sixth grade the study of New Europe and of Eastern Asia receives the major emphasis. The study of Africa and of Australia and other island possessions is made to articulate with the geography of those countries having controlling territorial and commercial interests. Much attention is given to the drawing of free-hand outline maps and to the clay modeling of topographical maps of all continents and of important and familiar divisions. This work lends itself to daily reading and to the appreciation of current events by developing a more rapid and correct fixation of geographical locations.

Patriotic and community interests, in which both the teachers and the pupils have most generously co-operated, include contributions to the fund for the purchase of a portrait of Lincoln, to be placed by the school children of New Hampshire in the State House at Concord, Memorial Day exercises, the annual drawing and art exhibit, and the program of the community Christmas celebration.

To avoid repetition of the high school activities I wish to call to your attention the report of the Headmaster.

### Recommendations

The past three years have been characterized in New Hampshire by the rapid improvement of heating, lighting and ventilating facilities in one-room rural schools. Warner has in this period been largely exempt from the necessity for such outlay. At Davisville you have one of the best one-room rural



school houses in the state. The school buildings at Lower Warner and Melvins compare favorably with similar buildings in other progressive communities. Because of either small enrollment of pupils or non-use, the buildings at Burnt Hill and Waterloo have not demanded attention.

The increased attendance at Burnt Hill now demands improvement in heating and lighting. I would recommend that, at a cost not exceeding fifty dollars, there be installed a modern jacket on the present stove. There should be a ten-inch fresh air intake to jacket, and foul air exit flue to chimney. There should also be placed in the side of the building facing the road five six-foot windows.

If the use of the Waterloo school house is to be continued, one chemical toilet should be installed and the toilet room made to open directly from the schoolroom as is now provided at Lower Warner. Five six-foot windows should be placed in the east side of the schoolroom. A new floor would also reduce the cost of heating.

Our children attending the village school have a splendid building with excellent sanitary equipment and the services of a janitor whose excellent care of the building recently received mention by one of the deputy commissioners of the state. Your children in one-room rural schools are at least entitled to facilities conducive to health and a sound physique.

I heartily endorse and commend to your attention the recommendations of the Headmaster of the high school, relative to better equipment in the domestic arts kitchen and to added facilities for shopwork in agriculture.

#### Edmund C. Cole

Mr. Edmund C. Cole, the first Headmaster of the Simonds Free High School, died at his home in Warner on March 13, 1922. Mr. Cole had served with rare vision and sympathetic judgment both the educational and agricultural interests of this community. He was for years the Superintendent of the High School and a valuable member of the Town School Board.

After nearly ten years intimate acquaintance with Mr. Cole, I feel that a portion of the words in which Bishop Huntington expressed his educational ideal were very applicable to the man: "fit and ready for all spots and crises, prompt and busy in affairs, gentle among little children, self-reliant in danger,

genial in company, sharp in a jury box, tenacious in a town meeting, unseducible in a crowd, tender at a sick-bed, not likely to jump into the first boat at a shipwreck, affectionate and respectful at home, obliging in a traveling party, shrewd and just in the market, reverent and punctual at the church."

#### Conclusion

In conclusion I wish to commend the teachers for the professional spirit in which they have accepted my criticisms and have adopted suggestions. Also their suggestions have been of value to me. It has been a pleasure this year to share with the School Board, the Prudential Committee and other citizens some part in the progress of your schools.

## Report of Headmaster

To the Prudential Committee:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my first annual report. This report ends January 31, 1923. On the opening of school in September there were several changes in the faculty. The Agricultural instructor took the place of Headmaster and the resulting vacancy was filled by Mr. Bernard Davis, who was formerly the Agricultural instructor at Walpole, N. H. Miss Doris Cushing was engaged to handle the French and Latin Department. Miss Hazel Powlowsky being retained as the head of the Domestic Science Department.

This year was the second year of the Agricultural and Home Economic Courses, and in order that the townspeople themselves might see what was being done in vocational education, a High School fair was held in the Town Hall on October 27, with 103 exhibitors including townspeople and pupils. The exhibits totalled 453. The Judges were Perley I. Fitts of New Hampshire College, Poultry; Norman Whipple of Concord, Vegetables and Fruits; Miss Roberta M. Wright, Home Demonstration Agent of Merrimack County, Domestic Arts.

In the afternoon speakers from out of town talked on various educational subjects. Mr. Peaslee, Agricultural Agent for Merrimack County, and Mr. Walter May of the Department of Education, gave brief addresses. The fair was undoubtedly a success.

The equipment has been added to and an effort has been made to keep the existing material in as good a condition as possible. The shops and laboratories are well supplied and we now have in both the physical and chemical laboratory, equipment which is equal to most schools in the state. The purchase of a few articles each year should keep us supplied. A careful checking and a complete inventory have been carefully kept with the idea to save as much as possible. The Agricultural class have done innumerable small tasks about the building and I am glad to say that a considerable amount of money has been saved in



this way. We are very much pleased to acknowledge a gift from Miss Charlotte Sargent, who very generously left \$100 to the school to be used for some suitable equipment, and from Dr. L. H. Cogswell, of a very valuable and useful set of microscopic slides. These have proved indispensable in our Nursing and Physiology Course and will be very useful in Biology.

One of the prime requisites of good school work is to have a good plant, cheerful as possible, and in a sanitary and neat condition. The building has been kept clean, neat, and warm and due to the conscientious care and pains taken by our janitor, we have been able to keep school every day during this severe winter when nearly 75% of the schools of this state have been obliged to close for one day or more. Soft coal is being burned this year, and if the experience of two months can be taken as a basis, it seems to be satisfactory in every way. It heats the building quicker and more uniformly and does not make any more dust, and is considerably cheaper.

The aims of the school have been taken up quite fully in the reports of the last two years, and I will therefore not dwell upon them now. There is one matter that I would like to speak of at this time, namely, the work carried out in the last twenty minutes of the school day. The whole school assembles at this time and under the directions of a student-leader, various programs on educational subjects are presented, in which each member of the school takes part at some time during the school year. Whenever possible the townspeople and outsiders come and speak at this time. This year we were fortunate in having as speakers: Professor Van Deuburg, of New York City, who spoke on the great West; and Major George Morrill, State Adjutant of the American Legion, who gave an inspiring Armistice Day address on Americanism and Citizenship.

The graduating class of last year consisted of eleven members and it is with pleasure that I hear of their successes at the various colleges which they are now attending. From reports which I have received, I find their work to be well above the average of school pupils and the people of the town can well feel proud of the products of their High School.

At the present time nine graduates of the school are attending the New Hampshire College at Durham.

In order that you may obtain a better understanding of the various courses, I will at this time give brief reports in regard to each of them.

#### Academic Course

The English department of the high school is well equipped with the familiar classics. While these books should always be the foundation of any secondary school English course, it would be well if the high school might have more copies of some of the better novels and short stories by the more modern authors in order to stimulate and increase the pupils' interest in literary thought and progress of the present day. The Latin library seems to meet the present needs of the pupils. The French library contains a goodly variety of reading material which has to be increased from time to time because of the increasing number of French students.

#### Domestic Science

The Domestic Science Department seems to have quite a complete equipment for a school of its size. The laboratory is badly in need of two new ovens for the oil-stoves. Those in use at the present time are badly warped and allow a large part of the heat to be lost. I would suggest that if new ovens are purchased, that the new ones be large enough to cover two burners, thereby conserving coal and fuel, also time, as the old

ones only partially cover two burners and accommodate but one pan on each shelf.

A range would be a great addition to the laboratory, for it is the type of cooking device used in the majority of homes, and the girls should become familiar with its use.

### Agricultural Department

The work given in the Agricultural Course calls for two kinds of equipment, i. e., that needed to help along the instruction given from text-books, and commonly called illustrative material; while the equipment used in the farm shop work consists of those tools found in the progressive farm shop.

At present, good illustrative material is not very plentiful in the department, but with active co-operation from the school district in the form of a small sum of money, all the needed material could easily be obtained.

Most of the standard reference works on the various phases of agriculture are at hand in the school library and with the collection of agricultural bulletins now being built up by the department, the school is well equipped in this way.

In shop work the various requirements of the state department of education had to be met, so soldering and harness repair kits have been added though incomplete even yet in some details. At present the biggest need in the agricultural shop work is a blacksmith's forge together with the building to house it. With the actual construction of the building being done by the boys taking agriculture, the expense of this equipment could be kept down to the sum expended for lumber, forge, and needed tools.

Enthusiastic response has been given by the boys to the instruction given in agriculture. It seems to fill a need of a certain number of the students, a fact the department would bring to the attention of the people of Warner.

In conclusion I wish to thank the citizens, Prudential Committee, Superintendent, and teachers for their co-operation.
