SCHOOL REPORT

To the Parents and Citizens of the Town of Sullivan:

We hereby submit the report of our schools for your consideration. Please bear in mind that this is a report for one and one-half years as there was no report given in last year's town report. This report commences with the spring term of 1917 and ends August 31, 1918.

From a careful study of the registers for this period we find some things to commend and some we are sorry to have to report.

With the exception of one term in one school we have had the same teachers in the same schools during the whole period.

Our teachers have all been exceptionally good ones and we were sorry we could not retain them longer. We were also sorry the parents have not backed them up a little better by seeing to it that their children have attended a little more closely to their school work.

Good teachers are very hard to get now, so when we do get them we should use every possible effort to keep them.

Our registers show too many absent marks, dismissal marks and tardy marks to be very satisfactory even to a casual observer, to say nothing about how the ones most concerned may feel about them.

We remember that last winter was an exceptionally severe one, yet some of the children who live the longest distances from school were constant in attendance. As one little fellow said if he could not get through a snowdrift he could lie down and roll over it.

So we feel in duty bound to say a word of commendation for the ones who made the greatest effort to be in school every day possible.

Some new books have been bought and more are needed. A new flag pole will have to be provided for school No. 4.

We would recommend the following sums to be raised for the next school year:
