

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

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at one of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.
- 3. To see what action the Town will take regarding the accepting of State Aid for roads.
- 4. To see what action the Town will take regarding the accepting of State Aid for Post Road and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars for the same.
- 5. To see what action the Town will take regarding the building over of a part or whole of Atlantic Ave. with a hot top surface and appropriate money for the same.
- 6. To see what action the Town will take regarding the purchase of a road grader and scarafier and appropriate money for the same.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take regarding the the appropriating of the sum of \$600. to finish the payment on the gravel loader now rented by the Town.
- 8. To see what action the Town will take regarding the organizing of a company of twelve men and appropriate money for the same.
- 9. To see what action the Town will take regarding the appropriating of the sum of \$400, for the suppression of the White Pine Rust.

- 10. To see what action the Town will take regarding taking over permanently the street lights in the Precinct for six months of each year by including them in an addendum to the present town lighting contract and in future contracts and appropriating money for the same.
- 11. To see what action the Town will take regarding the blasting out of the ledge on Mill Road north of Witch Bridge and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see what action the town will take regardthe boulders to the memory of the late Maj. Gen. Henry Dearborn and Col. Abram Drake and appropriate money for the same.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

During the past year 59 new books have been purchased and of these 40 were fiction. The library now contains about 2850 volumes, of which about 1640 are fiction. The same magazines have been provided for the reading room as last year.

The library building will need painting this coming year and there will be some minor interior repairs. The estimated expense of this work is included in the last item of our budget.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of North Hampton:

I hereby submit to you my second annual report as superintendent of the public schools.

The most noticeable feature of the year has been the complete change of the regular teachers. Two of our teachers resigned to be married and the other two resigned and accepted positions in Rhode Island and New York State.

We have endeavored to select as your teachers, young women of character, intelligence and training. We are pleased to note evidences of a better understanding between the parents and the teachers, and I am confident that this will produce better results educationally.

Believing that our pupils should have school rooms that are well-ventilated, well-heated, well-lighted, sanitary, and a pleasure to the eye, we have endeavored to improve our school-rooms in these respects.

Our rooms are fairly well ventilated, though the windows have to be used for this purpose. Care and thought on the part of the teachers and janitors can make this a fairly satisfactory method.

The lighting of our schoolrooms is comparatively satisfactory. The fact that two of our schoolrooms have only south windows renders it difficult to admit sufficient light on sunny days without allowing direct sunlight on the pupils' desks.

The heating of our schoolhouses leaves little to be desired, although the jacketed stove at the Little River school is inclined to give off too much heat rather than too little.

As a School Board you have done your part in making our schoolrooms attractive to the eye, by paint and kalsomine during the summer vacation.

The condition of the toilets and the dust on the floors have left much to be desired in the way of making

the sanitary conditions of our schools acceptable. After much effort I am glad to report these conditions as improved, and bidding fair to become satisfactory. The well from which the children obtain their drinking water has been thoroughly cleaned out and the water tested and found safe for use.

With a view to strengthening the pupils' knowledge of the fundamental branches, French has been dropped from the curriculum of the Junior High School.

A new and thoroughly modern method of teaching reading has been introduced into the first grade.

Convinced that it is preferable that first-grade pupils attend two short sessions each day rather than one long session, these pupils are required to attend both the forenoon and afternoon sessions but are dismissed early from each session.

As of assistance in the promotion of the pupils and as a guide in knowing the quality of work to be expected of each of the pupils, an intelligence examination was again given to grades five to eight.

The issuing of the monthly bulletins and the attendance bulletins, has been continued.

The serving of a hot lunch at noon in the Centre school is proving very acceptable to many of the parents.

I am pleased to report that the Parent-Teacher association is helping in many ways to make our work in the schools more effective. Among other things they have repaired the playground apparatus and purchased new tables for the lunch room.

I desire to renew my recommendations of a school nurse and of a dental clinic. The cost of these would be very small and the value of the results would be great.

I desire to thank you as members of the School Board and the citizens in general for your co-operation.
