8. To see what action the Town will take regarding a water supply for all purposes and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see what action the Town will take regarding the purchase of a road roller and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see what action the Town will take regarding the street light on Hobbs road near residence of O. B. Leavitt and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see what action the Town will take regarding appropriating the sum of \$600. for the purchase of fire hose.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board of North Hampton :

I hereby submit to you my third annual report of the schools of North Hampton.

I believe the past year has been one of progress in many ways.

We were fortunate in retaining three of our four teachers for another year of service. Miss Chase resigned to accept a position in Portsmouth. Her place has been filled by Miss Marcia Hartford. All of our teachers are young, energetic teachers, giving the best of themselves to the service of our pupils. They are all anxious to render better service and all are taking a course of lectures on methods in Arithmetic by your superintendent. They should receive and I believe are receiving good support from the parents and citizens in general.

We have been striving to make the conditions under which our teachers and pupils work more favorable.

The condition of the floors of the school rooms and of the toilets in general has been much more satisfactory. The light in two of the rooms could be improved by the use of white curtains which roll from the bottom. Then when the avoidance of bright sunlight upon the desks of the pupils compelled the drawing of the curtains there would still be sufficient diffused light through the white curtains.

The attendance, as shown by the weekly attendance bulletins, has been fairly high but there are still some cases of unnecessary absence, and of absence due to unavoidable sickness.

Colds are still too prevalent, and many of these cases could be avoided if parents knew how to take the right precautions.

Again many cases of illness are due to the poisons injected into the body from bad teeth, diseased tonsils

and adenoids. Wise physicians advise parents to have the teeth of their children examined by a dentist twice each year. A better opportunity to do this would be furnished if a dental clinic were held once a year in our schools.

Further a school nurse would bring to the notice of the parents the cases of diseased tonsils and adenoids which need attention. I recommend that the services of a school nurse be secured for at least one day in every two weeks. This would render our school work more effective.

The serving of a hot lunch at noon has been continued with good results. Where so large a proportion of our pupils necessarily remain at school over the noon hour, such a lunch would seem a necessity. The aid of the Parent-Teacher association in fitting up the school lunch room, in furnishing athletic materials for the healthful sports of both boys and girls, and in many other ways, is thoroughly appreciated.

Believing that a sound character in our youth is the very foundation of our nation, and that the school has some responsibility in promoting this, the State Educational Department has issued a very helpful book upon "Character Education". This should help the schools to do their part in the strengthening of the bulwarks of our nation in this direction.
