THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, including three selectmen, one for three years, one for two years, and one for one year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 117, Laws of 1917, on a section of the Cheshire Road so called and to raise the amount, of money required by the state or take any action relating thereto.

5. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the hearse.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day or take any action thereon.

8. To see if the town will vote to procure markers for

the Soldiers' graves and to raise a sum of money to pay for the same, and choose a person or persons to have the matter in charge, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see if the town will vote to choose some person or persons to see about the destruction of the brown tail moth or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay for breaking roads or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town.

12. To act upon the proposed amendments to the constitution submitted to the people by the constitutional convention.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise money to repair the Town Hall chimney, or take any action thereon.

14. To see if the town will vote to build or procure a road drag and raise money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:—

I submit my second annual report as superintendent of schools. I wish to first speak of your local school conditions and then to call attention to some of the features of the organization that has developed to carry out the provisions of the law of 1919.

The scarcity of teachers throughout the school year 1919-1920 was serious. Teachers could be had for city and village schools, though not all of these were well qualified, but in many cases none could be found for the schools remote from railroad stations or large villages. It was only through the generous spirit of Mrs. Ware that we were able to have a school at East Sullivan through the spring until schools began to close elsewhere, and her service deserves special recognition. Increased salaries for teachers, with the general decrease in demand for women employees in other occupations, has improved the situation a little, so that at the opening of schools last fall we were able to secure better qualified teachers for rural schools and to engage them on a yearly contract.

The progress of the children in school was seriously interrupted last year by the changes in teachers and by the long vacations caused by these changes and by the severity of the winter. Their progress this year has been more satisfactory and we anticipate much better results throughout the year. Last year the schools were open an average of thirty-one weeks, the total enrollment was 38, the average membership

23, the average attendance 21, and the percent of attendance 91. The state average in percent of attendance was 92.

The improvements that were planned in the schoolhouses were made only in part, owing to the scarcity of labor at the time when the work had to be done, and the cost was greater than was anticipated because wages were higher. However, some improvements were made and the rest of the work that was planned will be undertaken at the first opportunity, but more money will be needed to complete the necessary work. The work planned will bring these buildings up to the minimum requirements of the State Board, and this is a requirement that must be met now in order for you to secure state aid this year. It was found that the proposed jacketed heater would cost considerably more than the \$100 that was appropriated, but a special jacket for the common box stove has proved very efficient in many schools, and this can be had for about \$30 and a new stove for \$39, and we expect to have such an equipment in one of the schools before the end of the winter. After this is done and both schools are in condition to meet the minimum requirements, a progressive plan of improvement should be adopted, to be carried out in the next few years on one building at a time until both are in thoroughly satisfactory condition. Such a plan should include new floors, modern desks, new maps and other equipment, and suitable room and equipment for some work in agriculture, carpentry, cooking and sewing.

For an extended discussion of the working of the new school law I must refer you to the biennial report of the State Board of Education, but for the benefit of many to whom that report is not available I will summarize some of the most important features. The State Board has authority under the law to "make such rules and regulations as may seem desirable to secure the efficient administration of the public schools," and the law further provides that "it shall be the duty of the school boards and employees of school districts to

comply with the rules and regulations of the state board.” Accordingly such rules and regulations have been prescribed and the most important among them are in substance as follows :

1. The School Board shall elect the teachers upon recommendation of the superintendent and fix their salaries; employ janitors and other necessary employees; authorize purchases; provide approved schoolhouses and proper transportation; prepare a budget of expenditures and, in state-aided districts, keep accounts in a prescribed manner; hold meetings as often as once in two months, require the superintendent to be present, and keep record of transactions; perform all other duties not specifically committed to the superintendent; and upon recommendation of the superintendent determine the subjects of instruction.

2. The Superintendent shall be nominated by the joint board of the union and employed by the state board and he shall give his entire time to the performance of his duties; he shall enforce the rules and regulations of the school board and of the state board and the laws relating to school attendance and employment of children, reporting violations of these and other laws affecting the welfare of children to the proper officers; he shall direct and supervise the work of the teachers and janitors and have the necessary authority to make such direction effective; nominate all teachers; select and purchase textbooks and supplies in accordance with the rules of the school board and the state board; keep records and make reports of his doings; remove any teacher or other employee found to be immoral or incompetent, subject to the law provided for such cases; provide for temporary vacancies, and secure fuel and other supplies immediately needed if the school board fails to do so; admit pupils to school in accordance with the laws of the state and the rules of the state board, assign them to classes and grades, and promote them in accordance with their attainment.s

3. The Programs of Studies prepared by the State Board are accepted and approved, and a standard school shall be equipped with books, supplies and apparatus sufficient to perform the work outlined in them. Regulations have been set for the required subjects and minimum standards in the first three grades, and are in preparation for the next three grades.

4. Health and Physical Welfare. Every district shall employ a school physician who shall make at least one annual examination of the pupils, report defects found to the parents, and with the teachers and superintendent labor to secure remedial treatment. The superintendent shall see that physical exercises and drill have a place in the school program, and he shall examine school buildings and surroundings, recommend to the school board such changes as are needed, and if unable to make such recommendations effective he shall report to the Commissioner of Education and to the State Board of Health.

5. Shortened School Year. The law prescribes that all schools shall be maintained for at least thirty-six weeks in each year, but it also provides that special permission may be given by the State Board upon application of the School Board of the district to reduce the number of weeks. Unless such permission is given, "it is then the duty of the Commissioner, if any school board should fail in its duty, to direct the superintendent in charge to continue the schools. The expenditures may be paid from the funds of the State Board of Education and reimbursement for money so advanced by the State Board must be provided for by the district at a special meeting or at its next annual meeting." (This regulation was adopted July 20, 1920.)

The distribution of the Equalization Fund is made by the State Board, on the basis of carefully prepared budgets of proposed expenditures submitted by the School Boards and Superintendents, and in accordance with certain established principles in order to assure a fair and impartial apportionment. In general, the expenditures proposed are considered on the basis

of the average requirements of the state and of the expenditures while each district had made in previous year. The amounts allowed by the State Board under each item of the budget in your district is shown in the financial statements following this report. State aid is not given for the "overhead" expenses of the district, but only for "maintenance" of the required schools, including expenses of instruction, expenses of operating the school plant, minor repairs and expenses, medical inspection, transportation, and elementary tuition.

In closing, I would express my appreciation of the uniform cooperation and consideration given me in my work and wherever I have come in contact with the School Board and citizens.
