TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sums of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the town will accept state-aid construction of Class II road known as the Sullivan Center Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$256.50.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate any money to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate any money to provide watchman and additional police protection due to the war emergency.
7. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate any money for the use of the town health officer and board of health due to the war emergency.

8. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

9. To see what sum of money the town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate \$500 for the payment of the Snow-Plow note.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$20 for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to help stamp out the white pine blister disease.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the removal of snow from the highways.

17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for electricity in the town for the ensuing year, or take any action relating thereto.

18. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to sell any property that they may acquire by Tax Collector's deed during the ensuing year.

19. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action thereon.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
