Board of Selectmen

Richard M. Hotchkiss, *Chairman*

The Board of Selectmen, Cheryl Labadie, Bob Thayer and I, believe the 2008 was a reasonably good year for the Town. However, like the rest of the state and country, we have suffered the effects of high petroleum prices during the summer months and now our citizens are bearing the results of the huge economic downturn.

Our roads were improved, our police kept us secure, our emergency management department undertook new tasks, and the fire and rescue department along with the library continued improvements individually. For a small town, we have a number of departments that provide our citizens with outstanding services, possibly the best in the state. All of our other boards, commissions, and committees supported and protected our community. We thank all the board and committee members for their service to the town.

Fiscally, the town continues to remain in good shape. Our entire town and all of its departments operate on budgets which absorb only a small percentage of your tax dollar. I am pleased to report that the town departments have done a great job of working within their budgets. We had been able to hold a fairly consistent tax rate for the past five years, but this year the town saw a substantial increase. The cost of petroleum related products (diesel fuel, propane, fuel oil, asphalt, etc.) and transportation (for sand, gravel, and road salt) hit our town buildings and highway department budgets very hard. The reduction in anticipated income also contributed to the increase in the local tax rate. It is through the responsible and conscientious efforts of our town department heads and a number of you good citizens who have worked on a voluntary (without pay) basis that enabled the town to keep the rate increase under control. As you may know, energy and road material costs are areas over which we have little influence. Sharp increases in these costs and this winter's weather have not given us much relief. We anticipate that most of these costs will remain high and this is reflected in the 2009 town budget. The 2009 town budget and warrant also reflect a continued need to provide emergency electrical power at town buildings and the future need of our highway department to replace the aging 1989 Chevrolet "heavy plow truck".

The December 2008 ice storm that left some residents without power for eleven days put new pressures on our town departments and those departments responded magnificently. Providing warm shelter, food and water were prime objectives for our fire and rescue department volunteers. Not only were they able to meet those

objectives, but they also shuttled generators around town to help our neighbors run heating systems to prevent freezing damage to their homes. Our volunteers were great!

A number of years ago the citizens of Sullivan responsibly recognized that departments would occasionally have very large needs and, to lessen the impact, started a number of capital reserve funds. These funds enable the town to have all or a portion of the required money set aside when such need arises. This good planning and saving by Sullivan's citizens had made the town's response to these needs possible and with minimum impact on the town tax rate. Last year the town was able to acquire a new vehicle for the police department at a very advantageous price. In the near future, the highway department will need to utilize this fund to replace the aging heavy plow truck. We urge you to continue to support these beneficial capital reserve funds.

We call on the citizens of Sullivan to carefully review the regional school district warrant and, with your votes, continue to restrain the school district spending because it represents the greatest portion of your tax dollar and is the largest contributor to your tax bill and its increases. As you know, this year's school district spending nearly "broke the bank" here in Sullivan. We send a special note of thanks to Mary Hull for devising a plan to minimize the impact of these large tax increases on our citizens.

As you may know, Sullivan has a volunteer government where participation is primarily for the benefit of the general citizenry. Some positions offer token compensation but the real reward of these jobs is the knowledge that you have helped your neighbors and made improvements to our community. During 2008, there continued to be an increase in the interest and participation of our citizens in the various functions of town government. These citizens have found that their participation makes a positive difference and that everyone benefits from an increased level of participation. For 2009, there are a number of positions in our government and its boards which need to be filled. I encourage our citizens to become more active participants. For the investment of a few hours each month, you can make a difference in your community and our town. Anyone interested in participating in town government should contact the Board of Selectmen.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, Wednesday, the 11th day of March, next at 7:00 P.M. of the clock to act upon the following subjects:

Article 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$166,280 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum \$234,230 for the maintenance of town highways and bridges for the ensuing year. The selectmen recommend \$236,885. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$70,000 for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$44,880 for the operation of the Police Department. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$36,200 for the operation of the Fire and Rescue Department. The selectmen recommend \$39,000. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended maximum

sum of \$25,000 from the fund balance (surplus) for the purpose of paying costs incurred during unforeseen town-wide emergencies and natural disasters. These funds will only be expended with the approval of at least two selectmen, the emergency management director, and the department head requesting the funds. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$23,477 to provide and maintain Public Library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds, as provided. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 10

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Bituminous-Surfaced Roads. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 11

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Highway Equipment. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 12

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$11,000 for the purchase of new Rescue Tools for the Fire and Rescue Department. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 13

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$6,300 for the care and maintenance of Town Cemeteries. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 14

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$6,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Repairs to Town Buildings. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 15

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$5,400 for the operation of the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management. The sum of \$5,000 to come from the fund balance (surplus). The balance of \$400 to be raised from taxation. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$5,350 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Department Vehicles. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Police Cruiser. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,000 for the purchase and installation of Emergency Back-up Generators and Equipment for town buildings and for Emergency Power Connections for the town emergency shelter located to the United Congregational Church of Sullivan. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Installation and/or Repair of Dry Hydrants. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Breathing Apparatus. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Forest Fire Equipment/Liability Trust Fund and authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend the fund. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$1,575 for the operation of the Planning Board. The selectmen recommend \$1,625. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 24

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,500 for the operation of the Conservation Commission. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of

\$1,000 for the operation of the Recreation Committee. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 26

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Land Conservation. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 27

To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of Agents and Committees as printed within the Annual Town Report.

Article 28

To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting, and to listen to opinions of a purely advisory nature as regards the conduct of Town affairs for the ensuing year.

The results of the March 11, 2008 Articles 2 through 6 ballot results were read:

Article 2: SHALL THE TOWN ADOPT A TAX EXEMPTION FOR THE DISABLED, UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF RSA 72:37-B? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$60,000. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly as a principle residence, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$20,000 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$30,000; and own net assets not in excess of \$50,000 or, if married, combined net assets not in excess of \$75,000 excluding the value of the person's residence.

Article 3: ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THE ADOPTION OF AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO THE SULLIVAN COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE AS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD AND GENERALLY DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: Amend Article III.A.3 to change the permitted use "animal husbandry" to "small-scale animal husbandry"

Article passes, I so declare.

Article 9: To raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$65,000 for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. The selectmen recommend \$70,000. An amendment was made to raise and appropriate \$70,000. Motion made and seconded. Amendment passes. Motion made and seconded, voted, by hand vote, to adopt the article as amended. 42 YES, 25 NO. Article passes, I so declare.

Article 10: To raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$43,900 for the operation of the Police Department. The selectmen recommend \$47,750. An amendment was made to raise and appropriate \$47,750. Motion made and seconded. Amendment passes. Motion made and seconded, voted, by voice vote, to adopt the article as amended. Article passes, I so declare.

Article 11: To raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$39,425 for the operation of the Fire Department. The selectmen recommend \$39,775. Motion made and seconded, voted, by voice vote, to adopt the article as written, sum of \$39,425. Article passes, I so declare.

Article 12: To raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$21,815 to provide and maintain public library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds, as provided. The selectmen recommend \$22,315. An amendment was made to raise and appropriate \$22,315. Motion made and seconded. Amendment passes. Motion made and seconded, voted, by voice vote, to adopt the article as amended. Article passes, I so declare.

Article 13: To raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$9,000 for the purchase and installation of emergency back-up generators and equipment for town buildings and for emergency power connections for the town emergency shelter located at the United Congregational Church of Sullivan. Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the legal proceeding commenced by the Sullivan Selectmen in the Superior Court, Cheshire County, No. 07-E-0207, entitled "TOWN OF SULLIVAN, *Petitioner*, vs. MONADNOCK REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT, *Respondent*." (Submitted by petition) Discussion on Article 34, motion made and seconded to adopt Article 34 as a written secret ballot. Motion passed. By written secret ballot: 37 YES, 48 NO. Article fails, I so declare

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to withdraw the Request made by the Sullivan Selectmen by letter from Attorney Beth Fernald, dated October 22, 2007, to the New Hampshire Department of Revenue Administration that it conduct investigations of the Monadnock Regional School District regarding certain therein specified matters relating teachers' pensions and two other alleged improprieties. Becky Cummings stated that all comments are allowed for submission to the Newsletter; both sides of the story are allowed and will be printed.

Barbara Arguin stated that the teachers would like the Town to work towards getting together as a district.

Chip Woodbury expressed gratitude to Paul and Randy for all the work they do on the roads.

Alice Garrapy thanked town voters for their consideration of Monadnock Regional School District contracts; she will receive a raise.

Barbara Atwood expressed her gratitude for the help received from the Fire and Rescue Department.

Michelle Babcock gave thanks to Al Henry and Scott Lake for his time and services repairing the newly donated brush truck that was donated to the Fire Department.

Al Henry thanked fire department volunteers for their service and support, the City of Keene, J&L Auto Body, Tire Warehouse, Dave's Automotive, John Bolles, Brooks Construction, David Ford, Northeast Emergency Apparatus, and the Town for its support.

On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, Cheryl Labadie presented a gift to Lois Woodbury in appreciation of her 43 years of service to the Town.

Cheryl Labadie thanked Dick Labadie for his year of service.

Motion to adjourn, seconded and passed.

An account was set up with the vendor Baker & Taylor to take advantage of the large discount available to NH libraries through the state contract. Subscriptions to review journals were dropped as another way to cut costs. Access to this type of information is available through the Internet and other sources. We also purchased our first encyclopedia on DVD-ROM. This was significantly less costly than a print edition and came with an online access, free for one year.

The Board of Trustees updated the personnel policy to include vacation and holiday compensation. The board decided the librarian's personnel records will be kept on file at the Town Hall.

The library acquired a second computer and purchased a printer for the librarian's use in the office. This will permit the librarian to still accomplish some of her tasks while the public uses the other computer. The trustees looked into creating a network to connect both computers, but that has not yet happened. Our dial-up internet connection has been spotty and is frequently disrupted. We are looking into upgrading to a faster type of connection.

The Mutual Aid call box connection has failed a number of times during the year. A battery was replaced, yet it continued to fail to connect with the Mutual Aid computer. The electrician checked the box and the alarm system. He believes our problem is with the phone connection and not with the call box or the alarm system.

The switch to the front outside light needed to be replaced and the bathroom sink has trouble with leaky faucets. We had expected that the front door was going to be replaced, but that has not yet happened.

In May the librarian attended the NH Library Association's spring conference. The theme was *Innovate in '08; Library Basics and Beyond*. There were a number of workshops designed specifically for small libraries and the librarian came away with many new ideas that are easy to implement. One goal is to make our library more of a community center, especially with the downward turn in the economy.

This summer, fifteen children registered for the summer reading program. This year's theme was *G'Day for Reading* with a focus on Australia. We kicked off the program with Ribby of the Keene Swamp Bats. We also tried having activities for teens

only. They were not well attended. The Friends of the Library sponsored a closing party with an Olympic theme. iParty in Keene and TwinkleTown Miniature Golf in Swanzy helped provide prizes for our readers of all ages.

We held our tenth annual contest with the Town of Gilsum to see which town could read the most pounds of library materials over a six-week period. Sullivan won with 558 lb. to Gilsum's 527.5 lb. Gilsum hosted our annual ice cream social this year and the *Coveted Ice Cream Cup* is at the Sullivan Public Library for another year.

In August, the trustees put a moratorium on new book purchases for the remainder of the year to be sure there would be funds for gas and electricity through the year.

In September, the librarian was able to attend a conference put on by the Children's Literacy Foundation (CLiF). The theme was *Making Your Library a Community Center*. Many ideas were discussed by several panels and there was much audience participation.

The Friends of the Library held an open house at the library. They explained what it is to be a Friend of the Library, and how the Friends support the library.

We had storyteller Greg Pratt come for Halloween. This was a town-sponsored program with the Selectmen approving funds from the Recreation Committee, freshly popped popcorn from the Fire Department, and support from the Friends of the Library. Cathy Sims gave up time to decorate the library and Mary Heath made cloth treat bags for the children. Thirty people attended this program.

In December, Sheila Swett Thompson gave a program about her grandfather Perley Swett and signed copies of her newly published book, *Perley: the True Story of a New Hampshire Hermit*. Just over fifty people attended this standing room only program.

The Third Thursday Book Group has continued to be well attended through the year. The group is open to any adult who would like to come, whether for one or two discussions of interest or all of them. The library supplies books in several formats as they are available, so there is no need to purchase a book in order to participate. The group meets the third Thursday of the month at 7 p.m.

The library, like the rest of the town, lost power during the ice storm. We stayed closed until the electricity was restored. The building sustained no damage during that time.

Our library continues to be a member of the Nubanusit Co-op. The video collection shared by co-op members is still well received by our community.

Home Health Care and Community Services continues to provide quarterly health clinics at the library in January, April, July, and October. The October flu shot clinic is especially well attended.

The Board of Trustees meets at 7 p.m. on the second Thursday of the month at the library and the Friends of the Library meet at 7:15 p.m. on the first Thursday of the month, with no meetings in January or July.

Town Forest

During 2009, the conservation commission will have the Winch Forest Plan updated in anticipation of a timber improvement cut in 2010, the tenth year after the last cut.

Randy Smith, Road Agent, has a wetlands permit to replace the culvert where Meeting House Brook crosses the beginning of the Old Stoddard Road, just behind the firehouse.

Jewett Park

On November 15, Randy Smith, Roger Sweet, Eric White, and Hillaire Wilder cut brush and mowed brambles in the southwest corner of Jewett Park. Because of the December ice storm, there are fallen trees and branches which must be cleaned up in 2009.

Historical walks

Chris Pratt has joined efforts of the conservation commission to identify and protect historical assets to the town. To that end, he led two walks in 2008. On May 17, a goodly number of townspeople tramped up Hubbard Hill, visiting cellar holes and sites along the old Cannon and Osgood Roads, ending up at the oldest standing house in town on Price Road. On October 25, a group of hikers followed clues on the Wadsworth map (1905) in an effort to find the cellar hole near which Mrs. Nash was murdered by Daniel Corey (see History of the Town of Sullivan, Vol. 1, p. 360). Although the site evaded these hikers, a group two weeks later found the cellar hole of Mrs. Nash's son, using a mapping strategy developed by Bob Switzer, who videotaped Chris Pratt's recounting of the history for the town archives.

Roadside trash cleanup

More than 40 people scoured Sullivan roadsides on May 3 to remove almost half a ton of unsightly trash. Although cheerful about the labor, the volunteers expressed their frustration that thoughtless drivers could mar the attractiveness of the town's country roads.

Scrap metal day

The Sullivan Fire and Rescue Team collaborated with the conservation commission on September 20 and 21. Thanks to the energy of volunteers who picked up scrap from donor homes and the donors who brought scrap to the town barn, there were 3.6 tons of light metal, 6.5 tons of heavy metal, 29 propane tanks, and 440 pounds of aluminum to sell to Scrap-It for \$1,943, divided between the fire and rescue department and the conservation commission.

Hazardous waste days

The Town continues to support the opportunity for Sullivan residents to take their polluting paints, oils, and other contaminants threatening to the environment to the Keene transfer station for proper disposal. Everyone in town

should take advantage of the several dates posted for this disposal.

Wetlands issues

The commission, as mandated by State law, reviewed applications for five road culvert replacements and the dry hydrant on Otter Brook at the foot of Centre Street. The commission also reviewed a number of Intents to Cut, looking for potential wetlands problems loggers might encounter, and accompanied planning board members of boundary walks. The commission should also be notified of driveway permit applications.

Invasive species in Sullivan

On June 14, the commission conducted a walk for residents around the town center. In that small area, the following invasive species were seen: Japanese knotweed, burning bush, honeysuckle, Japanese barberry, oriental bittersweet, autumn olive and glossy buckthorn. An article in the newsletter by Christa Patterson outlined the problem and suggested actions residents might take to reduce this growing problem for fields and forests.

Energy committee

In accord with the vote of Town Meeting in March of 2007 supporting national efforts to address the issue of climate change, the formation of an energy committee was encouraged but has yet to be formed. Data on energy use by town departments in 2005 has been collected for analysis by Cool Monadnock. It is hoped a committee will be formed in 2009 to assess what steps might be taken by the town to reduce energy consumption.

Conservation education

One of the mandates of conservation commissions is education. The periodic walks in town respond to that mandate. Contribution to the cost of a naturalist educator in the Sullivan School for the last several years responds to that mandate. The Natural Resources Inventory should be completed in 2009, and it will make available to all maps and descriptions of natural resources. A bulletin board was built and installed by Eric White just inside the entrance to the town hall to post pertinent information about conservation issues.

Membership

The Sullivan Conservation Commission welcomes new members and interested citizens to its meetings, usually held the second Tuesday of the month at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

Because Eric White was elected chairman at the November meeting, this annual report was compiled by the previous chairman, Roger Sweet.

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

2008 Annual Report

This year the Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC), along with other NH Local Advisory Committees, was honored with the *President's Volunteer Award* in April, and the *Spirit of NH Volunteer Service Award* in the State and Local Government category in November for our efforts to advise the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) and our communities on actions and issues to protect and manage the Ashuelot River. This year also commemorated the 20th Anniversary of the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program. The Ashuelot was designated as a protected river in 1993. ARLAC members, nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of DES, have been educated in a broad array of issues associated with the River and its watershed. It is the hope of the committee to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

This year we performed site visits and submitted comments on 10 projects occurring in Washington, Keene, Swanzey, Winchester, and Hinsdale; 2 NH Department of Transportation projects; and actions on state land in Keene and Winchester. Letters of support were submitted for a NH Office of Energy and Planning grant to the town of Marlow for development of a Natural Resource Inventory, and in support of the final report of the DES Ashuelot Pond Drawdown Study. Comments were submitted to the Silvio Conte Comprehensive Conservation Plan. ARLAC continued to follow legislation and rulemaking, supporting changes to the Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act, and HB 384 safeguarding surface waters by requiring more stringent reporting of failed septic systems on lakes and rivers. We also supported the passage of the comprehensive Alteration of Terrain rules established late this year. We continued participation as a member of the NH River Restoration Task Force and support the removal of the Homestead dam which has been delayed for another year. This year Keene adopted parts of the 2006 Ashuelot River Corridor Management Plan into its Open Space Ordinance.

The Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program in conjunction with the DES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP) continued for its eighth season. Ten sites were sampled from Washington to Hinsdale. Analyses were done for temperature, pH, total phosphorus (TP), dissolved oxygen, turbidity, conductivity, and metals with the City of Keene donating lab services to analyze samples for cadmium, copper, lead and zinc. ARLAC members, working with community volunteers collected samples monthly from May through September. E. coli samples were obtained monthly in July, August and September. Additional sampling in Swanzey was funded by the Swanzey Conservation Commission to assess TP and E.coli in W. Swanzey. Data are available online at <http://academics.keene.edu/pegglest/AshuelotRiver.htm> or <http://des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wmb/vrap/ashuelot/index.htm>.

In October ARLAC co-sponsored a cleanup of the River from upstream of Ashuelot River Park to the Thompson Covered Bridge in Swanzey as part of the Source to the Sea cleanup. A total of 204 volunteers removed 3,976 pounds of garbage plus 25 shopping carts from the River. Also this fall NH Protected River signs were purchased and posted in Marlow, Swanzey and Hinsdale.

ARLAC heard presentations on the results of The Nature's Conservancy's culvert study, which found most dams in the watershed and 20% of culverts are a severe barrier to the movement of species in the streams; Keene State College students' study of coal tar pollution in Mill Creek; and the Society for the Protection of NH Forests' plans for land conservation within the Ashuelot River watershed.

General Government

Budget Committee **Al Merrifield, Chairman**

The Town of Sullivan officially adopted a budget committee in accordance with the provisions of NH RSA 32:14. The purpose of the budget committee is "to assist voters in the prudent appropriation of public funds" (RSA 32:1). The budget committee analyzes the appropriation requests from the selectmen and various town departments in such detail as to determine the annual amounts necessary to properly manage town affairs and still keep the tax load manageable. After conferring with the selectmen and department heads, the budget committee prepares a recommended budget and holds a public hearing. The public hearing is an opportunity for taxpayers to learn about the departments' requests and the budget committee's recommendations and to request consideration for additions to or deletions from the proposed budget. After the public hearing the budget committee adopts its recommended budget and it is posted with the annual meeting warrant.

The Sullivan Budget Committee consists of Al Merrifield, Barbara Atwood, Keith Martin, Cindy Brooks, John Opacki, and Cheryl Labadie (Selectmen's Representative). This year's budget review began with an organizational meeting on October 8 with the election of Al Merrifield as chairman and John Opacki as secretary. The Budget Committee requested information on the current fiscal year expenditures to date and to receive the Selectmen's recommendations by December 1 to allow adequate time for review. During meetings in December 2008 and January 2009, the budget committee met with the department heads and selectmen for detailed explanations of their appropriation requests. A public hearing was held on February 3, 2009 at 7 p.m. in the town hall with two members of the public, department representatives, and selectmen present. On February 12, 2009 the budget committee met and adopted its recommended budget.

The budget committee wished to express its appreciation to the department heads, selectmen and staff for their diligence in preparing their annual budget appropriation requests and their cooperation during the review process. They are to be commended for "holding the line" during this difficult economic time.

Cemetery Trustees **Mary Hull, Ron Hull and Kevin Wheeler**

The town is now maintaining three cemeteries. We hired Royal Green Landscaping for the upkeep on the grounds. They have been doing a very good job. Granite posts and white chain link were installed at the front of the Sullivan Centre Cemetery. The elm trees, with thanks to Roger Sweet, all seem to be doing fine. They will look magnificent when they reach full growth.

The ice storm in December left tree damage around the boundaries of the cemeteries. This problem is being addressed and we will meet with representatives from FEMA again this spring.

Planning Board

Subdivisions approved

Community Planning Ordinance changes

Application for a building permit must now show location of wetlands (Article V.B.5); a definition of Forestry was added to Article XI.

An issue of regional impact

On Old Concord Road, a large property straddles the town of Sullivan and Nelson. The owner applied to Nelson for a subdivision in March. The Nelson Planning Board failed to inform the Sullivan Planning Board that this was a proposal with regional impact. During several subsequent Sullivan planning board meetings the issue was discussed. At the October meeting of the Sullivan planning board, a formal hearing was held on a proposal for a right-of-way to the Nelson subdivision through the Sullivan property on Old Concord Road was approved with several conditions limiting development of the Nelson lots and stating the Sullivan's approval of the right-of-way "shall not be construed as addressing the status of the owners' remaining property in Sullivan, which is not developable."

Funding for the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program

As a result of a new State law, all deeds, mortgages, and discharges filed with the County Registry of Deeds shall be accompanied by a check for \$25 made out to the State of New Hampshire -LCHIP.

Meetings and membership

The planning board seeks additional members. Meetings are held on the first Wednesday of every month at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

Tax Collector Mary Hull

The job of tax collector has been a welcoming challenge. I have enjoyed learning the laws and the tax process. I have updated all current tax data in the computer and the system is running great.

We all know that this was a very difficult year for property owners. I was glad to be able to work with the Selectmen and come up with a couple of options to help residents meet their tax obligations.

Public Safety

Emergency Management

Neil "Al" Henry Jr., *Director*

For all the events and activities that took place over the past year, 2008 will best be remembered as the year we had that "ice storm". But before we discuss that, here are a few of the other events that took place this past year.

- Work continued on the regional All Hazard Health Plan (AHHP) which began in 2006. The Point of Disbursement (POD) members continue to meet regularly and work continues on our POD site plans.
- Sullivan's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), rewritten in 2007, was accepted and put to the test in December during the ice storm.
- In 2009 we are required to update our Hazard Mitigation Plan. The updating process will begin shortly. We received a \$5,000.00 grant from the State in order to contract with an independent firm to assist with the plan update.
- In 2008 I was honored to be named the North East States Emergency Consortium's (NESEC), Emergency Management Director of the Year. The NESEC in comprised of seven states, CT, ME, MA, NH, NJ, NY, RI and VT. NESEC develops, promotes, and

coordinates comprehensive "all-hazards" emergency management activities throughout the Northeast. This includes all phases of emergency management: preparedness, response, recovery, and mitigation. I was nominated for this award by our NH Homeland Security & Emergency Management field representative Jeremy Laplante for the work I had done on Sullivan's EOP along with developing a template of the plan and resource lists to be used by other rural towns.

THE ICE STORM

To begin, I would like to sincerely thank all the volunteers who helped with our emergency operations: cleared roads, supplied food, or those who kept a watchful eye on our neighbors. We are now in the recovery phase and have met with representatives from FEMA and the State. The next step is to compile a list of all the expenses incurred and submit our claim forms for public assistance for the town. Unfortunately, the State did not qualify for individual assistance to homeowners who have damages

related to the storm. To keep a *very* long story short, the following is just a synopsis of the ice storm events.

The event started at approximately 0200 hours on Friday, December 12 when the first report of power outages in Sullivan occurred. At 0551 hrs the fire department was dispatched to the first of fourteen calls that day. The Sullivan Emergency Operations Center (EOC) was opened at 0630 and remained staffed for the next eleven days. The fire department would go on to handle a total of 32 emergency calls. The highway department would also have to deal with two snowstorms and avoid power crews as they tried to plow snow.

Throughout Friday and into late Saturday evening the highway and fire departments worked to open the roads so that emergency vehicles could pass. On Friday the EOC immediately contacted Mutual Aid and requested an automatic response to all of East Sullivan, Valley Road, Centre Street to the fire station and for portions of Hubbard Road for any fire or EMS related calls. By Friday evening we had cleared Centre Street and cancelled the automatic mutual aid response.

During the morning of Saturday, December 13, the EOC opened a shelter at the town hall by wiring a small portable generator. This generator was only large enough to supply heat. Water for the toilets was trucked over by fire department members. By Tuesday we obtained a second generator to supply power to the town offices. The EOC requested 20 cots from the State, which we never saw. Instead, with the help of our POD members we were able to obtain eight cots from our regional medical cache. The EOC began to monitor residents with special needs, road conditions, weather conditions and began to survey the damage to power lines. Members of the fire department went to Keene to pick up bottled water and we began to search for additional generators. Water was distributed at the fire station and delivered to those who could not get to the station to pick it up.

On Sunday we obtained additional portable generators and got these out to individuals around town with special needs. Throughout the event we continued to redeploy the generators as folks got their power back.

During the rest of the first week, the EOC monitored the situation, participated in daily briefings with the State EOC and PSNH, cleared trees, and kept generators running. Members of the fire department went pole by pole to survey damage. The EOC then forwarded this information to PSNH, which helped dramatically with power restoration. We were

advised by PSNH that they could no longer call their efforts restoration but rather they were now looking at this as a reconstruction effort.

During this event the EOC and fire station hosted many out-of-state power and tree crews. In total, we met nine different crews that came from as far away as Michigan, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Maine, New York, Maryland and Canada. These crews were amazed at the amount of damage in our area as well as frustrated that they could not do more. By the fifth day, supplies of transformers, poles and fuses had been nearly depleted and many crews had to wait as additional equipment was brought in from out of state. Due to just the sheer magnitude of this event, it took a long time for all the crews to receive instructions for specific work to be completed. At one point, the Michigan crew was at the fire station having lunch and complained that they were tired of sitting around at the fire station (their staging area in Sullivan). They wanted their next assignment. With a little begging and a few Sullivan Fire and Rescue baseball caps, power was finally restored to two homes across from the station.

Throughout the remainder of this event, the EOC and town shelter remained open. There were finally closed when all power was restored in town.

As I said previously, this is only a synopsis. By town meeting I hope to have a final after action report complete and available for those interested.

2008 WARRANT ARTICLES

On this years warrant you will find three articles related to Emergency Management.

The first is \$5,400 for the Sullivan Emergency Management budget. This year our operating budget returns to the \$400 level, but the warrant article includes the \$5,000 state grant for the purpose of updating the Hazard Mitigation Plan.

The second article requests the town to add an additional \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing emergency generators for the town hall, highway garage, fire department and emergency shelter. Last year the Town voted to appropriate \$9,000 for the project. The original intention was to install stand-by generators, but the cost was too great. Instead, we will purchase large portable generators and equipment. This \$2000 will help complete the project.

The third article requests the town to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw up to \$25,000 from the general fund balance for use during town-wide emergencies and natural

or man-made disasters. The purpose of this article is to allow for the payment of costs incurred during these emergencies without affecting operating budgets or forcing the town to hold a special meeting. During the ice storm, for example, the highway department had to pay approximately \$900 to remove a tree on the Boulder Road. As things stand now, this expense came directly from the highway department operating budget as did overtime costs and other supplies or services. After a declared disaster,

such as the ice storm, a percentage of these costs will most likely be reimbursed by FEMA. The intent of this article is not to pay for what is considered normal operating costs, but rather those costs beyond normal operations. Additionally, these funds would not be dispersed unless the expenditure is approved by two Selectmen, the emergency management director and department head requesting the funds.

Fire and Rescue Department/Forest Fire Service

Well, where to begin? To be honest, I would rather be out dealing with ice and trees than writing reports. As I write this report, many of us are still recovering the December 2008 Ice Storm. And yes, I am still writing those reports. Still in need of completion are the Ice Storm After-Action Reports and paper work for FEMA reimbursements. Needless to say it was another busy year for the town, the fire and rescue department and forestry. For ice storm details, please see the Emergency Management report.

Again in 2008, new members joined the department and a few members moved on to other departments. This year we welcomed new members Joe Andrews, Les Jackson, Leif Jackson and Mary Ioannou. We also had two new members join our Explorer Post.

Looking ahead to 2009 our Mission Statement remains the same: "To provide the best service possible to the Town of Sullivan through continuous improvements in training, certifications and equipment". The Sullivan Fire and Rescue department is very active with weekly training, meetings, equipment checks (to maintain our equipment in a constant state of readiness) and various events to further support our community. We invite you to stop by on Wednesday nights for a visit. New members are always welcome.

THE CALLS

The Sullivan Fire & Rescue Department (SFR) experienced another record setting year with a total of 112 emergency calls for Emergency Medical Service (EMS), Fire, as well as non-emergency service calls. Of these calls, 29 were EMS



for trauma and non-trauma incidents, 27 mutual aid calls to other communities and 56 fire-rescue calls, which accounted for the majority of responses. On the Forestry side, Sullivan's crew responded to a major brush fire in town on Route 9 which involved mutual aid from six other towns. SFR responded to 31 calls alone during the ice storm from December 12 through 23.

Not included in the call log are the numerous requests for other services. Provided were four wood stove installation inspections at the request of homeowners or their insurance companies, one home fire safety inspection and an oil burner permit inspection. The forest fire wardens issued over 60 fire permits in 2008, many of which were for seasonal campfires.

The department maintained an average response time of seven minutes. The response time is the elapsed time from

the moment we are paged until the time we arrive on-scene. Calls average in length from one hour for an EMS call and up to twelve hours for fire related calls. During the eleven days we dealt with the ice storm, the fire station was manned 24 hours a day.

As you can see from the logs, SFR handles a wide variety of calls throughout the year. The mutual aid calls included responses to Keene, Nelson, Gilsum, Stoddard, Harrisville, Marlborough, Walpole and Hillsborough. Our response to Hillsborough (a staging area) was as part of a Strike Team from Cheshire County that responded to the Tornado Event in July.

THE HOURS AND WAGES?

During 2008, members logged over 4,463 man-hours in

response to emergencies, trainings and the general operation of the department. To put this into another perspective, at \$12.00 per hour, this time amounts to \$53,556 that was donated to the town by our volunteer members. This does not include the expenses our members incur for traveling to and from calls, training or other operations. Nor does it include lost wages or vacation time used when members leave or miss work to respond to town or participate in training.

A brief editorial comment: What Wages? On the fourth day of the ice storm, a resident phoned the station and was already disgruntled with the weather, PSNH and I suppose life in general. He had just read the informational letter and wanted to know when PSNH was going to get his power back on, why some people had power and he did not, and what I was going to do about it. I explained the situation as best I could with the information we had received from PSNH that morning. I do not believe that my answer was what he

wanted to hear based on his comments that followed. He then asked "how much is it costing us for you to pay these guys to keep the Fire Station open 24 hours a day?" Before I could answer, he hung up the phone.

So sir, if you happen to read this report, I would like to finish our conversation. My answer would have been and remains zero! The cost to man the station was the burden of our members, not the town. The members of SFR chose to be a *volunteer department* and we do not receive compensation for any of our activities, with the exception of the State cost shared forestry calls. For many of us, our compensation comes from the support and kind words we receive from our residents throughout the year.

THE TRAINING

In 2008 Dave Eccles completed Fire Fighter I training, Matt Moore, Nate Hardy completed Fire Fighter II training, and Scott Lake and Al Jones completed additional EMT-B Courses. Congratulations Dave, Matt, Nate, Scott & Al!

All members completed the required annual blood borne pathogen, SCBA, CPR and AED trainings. Members also participated in regional training, spring and fall sessions at Meadowood Fire School, in-house training and drills, and our annual forestry training. The in-house training included additional live-fire and smokehouse training, auto extrication drills, SCBA training, pump training and EMS training. Each month many hours are devoted to fire and EMS training and department operations. A majority of this time is spent on various training rotations with our equipment in order to meet your expectations for service and to meet the required certifications at the state and national levels. During 2008 our EMS training and equipment was put to the test on a number of occasions during critical medical calls with very positive outcomes.

THE DEPARTMENT

The Sullivan Fire Company (a non-profit organization of SFR) held a number of fundraising activities last year. These included a booth the Pumpkin Festival and our annual yard sale. From the funds raised, the Company set aside money to contribute towards the completion of our new brush truck and to further help offset the department budget. We continuously seek out the best pricing on equipment that we must purchase and actively submit applications for grants.

The Company also purchased uniforms and participated in the Stoddard Old Home Day Parade and the Keene, Claremont and Bellows Falls fire prevention parades, again

bringing home a number of trophies for best marching unit and apparatus.

EQUIPMENT UPGRADES

In 2008 we added or upgraded numerous items in our inventory. On the fire side we added five new SCBA bottles, a rescue air system, accountability boards, one set of turnout gear (in addition to those purchased through the 2008 warrant article), miscellaneous fittings, strainers and adapters. We also had to purchase twenty reflective highway vests which are now required by the Federal DOT. Another major purchase was the installation of a Jacobs Braking System (Jake-brake) on the tanker.

As all of our fire and EMS reporting must now be completed "on-line", we installed satellite internet. In 2008 Mutual Aid installed a new software system called Fire House. This system will allow us to keep all of our records on one system and send our reports to the State and the National Fire Incident Reporting System. When using "dial-up", one medical report would take at least an hour and twenty minutes to complete. With the new satellite system, we have been able to cut this time down to about 15 minutes. As we get the satellite hardware up to speed, the system will also be shared by other town departments.

On the forestry side we purchased an additional chain saw, which experienced a lot of use during the ice storm, as well as various fittings and adapters.

For EMS equipment we purchased a second backboard and straps as well as replaced AED pads and medical supplies.

A large part of the department operating budget each year is spent on vehicle repair and preventative maintenance. Not only is it our intent to keep the fleet in the top operating condition, but also to extend the life of the apparatus.

We would also like to thank Gary Patnode for his help with hydro-testing all of our SCBA cylinders.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2009

Each year we strive to make improvements to our facility, apparatus and most importantly, training and services. Our station makeover is still in progress and will continue during 2009. We will be dressing up the sheetrock, painting the walls and ceilings in the bays, finishing the woodwork around the radio room, and finally striping the floors in the truck bays.

This year you will see a small decrease in our operating budget. I have also looked at all of the emergency services warrant articles for Fire, EMS, Forestry and Emergency Management such as capital reserves and special articles, and have adjusted them to reflect the economic times we are now facing. As a whole, these articles will be about \$10,000 less than in 2008.

In this years town warrant you will see a request for \$11,000 to purchase new rescue tools and equipment. If approved, these funds will be used to purchase the "jaws of life", hydraulic rams and associated hoses and equipment. Again this year through the generosity of Scott & Susan Lake and their company, Northeast Emergency Apparatus, they have offered this equipment to the town at a significant savings. This savings is approximately \$22,000 or 70% of the cost of new equipment. Scott and Susan obtained this equipment from a dealer that had gone out of business and it was used only for demonstration purposes (not put into service). This equipment will replace our existing set of jaws (that was donated to us a number of years ago) due to the lack of serviceable parts available. This is an opportunity that we will not see again so we ask that you look favorably upon this request.

You will also see a warrant article to place an additional \$2,000 in the Dry Hydrant Reserve. These funds will be used to replace the dry hydrant located at the Route 9 and the Centre Street Bridge. Last year the town appropriated \$5,000 for this project and it went out for bid. Upon receiving the bids, we found that we had underestimated the repair costs by approximately \$1500 to \$2000. The wetland permit was finally approved late last year. If this article is approved, we will start the replacement process in the spring.

In closing I would again like to thank the membership for their continued dedication to the town and this department. I would also thank the members' families, the Selectmen, the Police and Highway Departments for their support.

Finally, my thanks to you, for your continuing support of Sullivan Fire & Rescue.

Police Department

It is that time of year again, when all department heads have to sum up the past year in a report. For the police department, it is mostly the same each year. We received over 500 phone calls, 628 email messages, and over 1,000 fax transmissions. We also handled 426 calls for service, 23 automobile accidents along with one vehicle that just slid off the road, and served several restraining orders and subpoenas. Several arrests were made for other local police departments.

Most of the calls we manage are usually a simple respond, handle the situation and are dealt with in one to three hours. But there are some calls that can take much longer. A recent call that we were dispatched to sent us to handle a person out of control. A sheriff in the area was dispatched to assist. Upon the three of us entering the residence to find that the house had been trashed. We took the subject into custody and since the subject was not able to return we began the long process of evaluation at the emergency room. By the time the subject had been examined by the physician, received test results, and a decision made as to where to subject would stay that evening, the response time to this one call took seven hours.

Officer Leslie E. Jackson joined the police department in April and has been a great asset. A new four-wheel drive Ford Explorer was purchased and equipped with funds from the capital reserve fund for police cruiser. The new vehicle is in-service but awaiting decals.

We would like to extend our sincere appreciation for the Sullivan Fire and Rescue Department for their assistance in directing traffic at the accident scenes. If you are in need of assistance from the police department, call 911 for an emergency, 847-3100 for the police station, 355-2000 for Cheshire County Dispatch, 847-9728 for my home, or 762-4885 for Leslie Jackson.

Highways and Streets

Highway Department Randall Smith, Road Agent

January/February/March

The first three months of 2008 were the busiest that I have experienced during the eleven years I have served as Road Agent. Snow or freezing rain events occurred every few days for several weeks. We were able to make it through the winter without any major equipment breakdowns. In February we ran out of sand for the roads and had to order 400 cubic yards. With the increased demand for road salt nationwide, we were unable to receive deliveries which meant that we were without salt for some of the storms and ice layers began to accumulate on the road surfaces. During the brief intervals between storms, time was spent checking and maintaining vehicles, plows and sanders.

Weight restrictions were posted on town roads March 14. With the generous donation of equipment and time by Clark-Mortenson Insurance and Rebecca Hull, a computer was installed at the highway garage.

April

Winter's grip began to disappear during April. The plows and sanders were serviced and put away for the summer as gravel roads began to thaw. Potholes on the paved roads were patched, 1 ½" of crushed stone was applied to portions of gravel roads and the grading and raking of gravel roads began. By the end of April, all gravel roads had been graded at least once.

May

Weight restriction signs were removed May 1. We met with Tim Garceau of Southwest Region Planning Commission to look over the Sullivan road inventory maps. The road inventory maps are used by the State of New Hampshire Department of Transportation to determine the allocation of Highway Block Grant funds for each municipality within the State. Gravel roads were graded a second time. 1,180 pounds of trash was brought to the Keene Recycling Center which had been collected during the Conservation Commission sponsored town roadside clean up.

Correspondence was sent to both NH DOT Bridge Design and NH DOT Planning and Community Assistance to include the new bridge on Price Road in the NH DOT Biennial Inspection list of Sullivan bridges. Sullivan now

has five bridges that are over 10' span length that are required to be inspected every two years.

June

The snowplows and Ford F550 dump body were sandblasted and painted. The highway garage door opening was widened and Keene Door installed a new garage door on the north side of the garage. A final grading and application of chloride was completed on gravel roads. Vandalized and stolen street signs were replaced.

July

Grader shimming of some paved roads began. Heavy rains forced us to repair ditch-lines on many roads in town. 240 cubic yards of sand were purchased to be used for sand sealing. On July 29, Allstate Asphalt arrived with 6,200 gallons of oil. With help from the towns of Nelson and Harrisville, Church Street along with sections of Cross, Valley, and Boulder Roads were sand sealed. The process of sand sealing seals the pavement in order to keep water out of voids in the pavement and prolongs the life of the pavement.

August

Grader shimming was resumed on sections of South and Gilsum Roads. On August 13, Pike Industries paved a 1,900' section of South Road (Woodbury's Hill), a 1,190' section of Gilsum Road (Paquette's Hill), and another section of Gilsum Road (Cannon's Hill). A total of 841.71 tons of asphalt was used. The new pavement was shouldered with gravel. Rocks were dug out of the gravel portion of Gilsum Road, gravel was added and the road re-graded. The road broom axle was repaired by Forrest Robinson Machine Shop.

September

Two more sections of South Road along with two sections of Gilsum Road were grader shimmed. These four sections had become extremely rough during the spring thaw. Recycled Asphalt Product (RAP) was added to Jenkins Lane and Rugg Road and the two roads were re-graded. Several days were spent preparing and assisting the Conservation

Commission during their scrap metal drive. A total of 1,003 cubic yards of winter sand was purchased, mixed, piled and covered.

October

Potholes on gravel roads were filled. Some dead trees along the roadsides were cut. The woodshed was mostly filled. The transmission was removed from the Chevy dump truck at the highway garage. The transmission received new bearings and races were replaced with generous volunteer help from Kevin Wheeler and Rick Hotchkiss. New front brakes were installed on the Ford F550. A portion of the roof on the highway garage was stripped and replaced with metal roofing. The first snow flurries of the upcoming winter season were sighted October 22. Heavy rain on October 26 sent us back out to repair ditch-lines and plugged culverts.

November

Some ditch-lines on South Road and Gilsum Road were cleaned. Short sections of gravel roads were repaired with the use of the grader. Snowplow equipment was readied

for winter. Mike and Jane Brown of Valley Road donated 12 large concrete blocks to the highway department and Ed Csenge & Son provided their delivery. Thank you for your generosity.

December

Ditch cleaning along Gilsum and Hubbard Roads continued. The first plow-able snow fell December 7. Thursday, December 11 welcomed a daylong accumulation of freezing rain which continued through the night. By 2:00 a.m. December 12, trees, tree limbs, and wires were down throughout town. Many days of clean up followed and will continue into the spring of 2009. The task was eased with the help of the Fire Department and many Sullivan residents. Paul and I thank you very much. Your hard work is appreciated! The month drew to a close with numerous snowstorms which covered all of the ice storm debris. The year ended as busy as it began.
