



(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the Twelfth (12) day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

During the past year 99 new books have been added to the library and these are classified as follows: juvenile fiction 22, juvenile non fiction 5, adult fiction 54 and adult non fiction 18. The library now contains 288 volumes of juvenile fiction, 74 of juvenile non fiction, 1,560 of adult fiction, 1,203 of adult non fiction and a reference collection of 715 volumes, making a total of 3,300 volumes.

Meeting a pressing need the library has been catalogued under the Dewey Decimal system. A large number of books, no longer of use to the library, were discarded at this time, thus giving our bookstacks some much needed space. This work was in charge of Miss Lillian Perkins, who was sent to us by the State Library Commission and a portion of whose salary was paid by the Federal Government under a C. W. A. appropriation. She received much assistance from our librarian, Mrs. Alice C. McFadden and a corps of volunteer helpers, all of whom generously gave their services without any compensation. The total expense of this work to the town was approximately \$170. We found it necessary to provide space for some of our reference books in the upper story of the building and this made necessary structural changes costing about \$45. A little more work of this nature remains to be done the cost of which is included in the item "Repairs and Miscelianeous" in our budget for the coming year.

In accordance with a vote of the town the library is now

open two afternoons in the week instead of one as formerly. As a result there has been a considerable increase in circulation and the issues now are about 132 each week.

The following periodicals are now provided for the reading room: Harper's, Scribners, American, Good Housekeeping, Reader's Digest and Child Welfare.

SCHOOL REPORT

THE REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of North Hampton:

I, herewith, submit to you my fifth report as superintendent of your schools.

Standardized tests are the modern yard stick for measuring the efficiency of instruction in the school room. Tests of this type given in your schools during the past year showed the work of the pupils to be above the average of schools of comparable rating. If further proof is needed the reports of the work done in Portsmouth Junior High School during the present term furnish it. Of a total of seventy-three marks earned by this group during the first two marking periods the entire seventy-three were passing grades. It is a source of much satisfaction to report that the special emphasis given to the subject of English, last year, resulted in a class average of seventy-nine for these pupils during their first term in Portsmouth. This year we shall devote special effort to the practical application of Arithmetic computation. Our children know well the simple processes of Arithmetic but occasionally find difficulty with practical problems. I believe this work can be strengthened, as have the English and Reading departments.

The work of the first three grades is primarily the teaching of Reading. Parents have repeatedly expressed satisfaction with the progress of their children in learning to read. During the past two or three years pupils have read four months ahead of their grade, so that frequently children are reading books of the next grade in March of the year previous.

The statistical report shows the percent of attendance to be 95% the same as last year and, as last year, the East school leads by a margin of three percent. This is a remarkable record since it is particularly difficult to maintain a high percentage in a small school. Only the whole hearted interest of teacher and pupil together with the cooperation of parents could bring about such a result.

The desks at which many of your children sit are handicaps to the work of the school. The tops, in many cases are unfit to write upon. A large number of the seats are unadjustable. To require children to sit five hours a day at desks improperly adjusted and unfit for use is not productive of the best results. Practically all new installations of desks now consist of the movable type. Seats are no longer screwed to the floor. The new school provides opportunity for group study and for informality of procedure. Movable desks, while more expensive per unit, than the old fashioned fixed variety, can be moved from room to room as occasion requires and, for this reason, a smaller number of units may be bought.

The report of the school nurse merits careful reading. It states results accomplished but it cannot show the hours of work she has devoted to the welfare of our children. Through her efforts, federal money has been secured for the correction of many serious defects. The federal government is, this year, furnishing milk to underweight children. It is expected that this distribution, to eighteen children in North Hampton, will continue throughout the vear.

Frequently information is sought by former pupils, and by parents of present pupils, as to the work done in our schools during previous years. The same information is always asked whenever pupils move into another school system. It has sometimes been difficult to obtain the required data. For this reason the seven school boards of this supervisory union have purchased a permanent record system to be kept in the superintendent's office. This will keep, in permanent form, a complete record of the work done by each pupil in these towns, during the years he attended our schools. Not only will scholastic attainments be recorded but such information as will help future teachers to understand the pupil. Records of standardized tests, of health conditions, when properly kept, will aid both teacher and pupil to adapt future work to individual needs. I believe this is an important means of guaranteeing to each boy and girl a consistent rate of progress, free from the delays of adjustment which might otherwise occur.

May I again express my thanks to the school board for continued help and guidance in the duties of my office. Such help must result in more effective work throughout the entire system.
