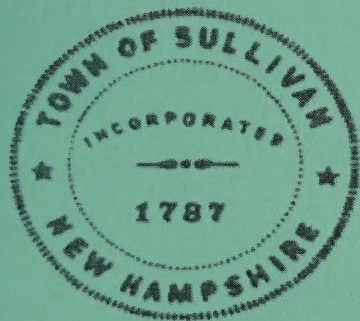

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Sullivan Board of Selectmen would like to acknowledge and applaud all of the Sullivan Town employees, Department Heads and Volunteers for their hard work over the past year. We would like to express a special thanks to the volunteers who selflessly, in the spirit of the State of New Hampshire, keep government running efficiently without compensation and without creating a burden for the taxpayers. Special thanks to all of you who serve on Boards, Committees, or who help to beautify the Town and preserve its rural nature.

These difficult economic times continue and despite the decrease in Town receipts and the State of New Hampshire sharing less of its revenues with municipalities, the economic health of the Town of Sullivan continues to remain strong. If it were not for the volunteers the burden on each of us would be greater.

We continue to see heavy taxes levied by the County and there does not appear to be an end in sight. As has been historically the case, the Monadnock Regional School District continues to take the lion's share of your tax money, as if they were entitled and you have an endless supply. These two particular segments of government are either unwilling to share in the pain that this recession has brought or they just don't care about you. So, your attention to issues on the ballot and how you spend your vote are critical and our only defenses against these runaway segments of our government. Despite those words, we in Sullivan have a number of causes for celebration so to mention a few.

We have continued to receive grants for worthy projects in Town saving taxpayers a significant amount. Most recently, a new wood fired boiler has been installed at the town garage. This boiler will provide comfortable heat in an economical manner. It has been sized for the future so expansion of the garage will not require an additional heating plant.

The energy committee and in particular Ann Sweet deserve our thanks for diligently pursuing this boiler project. Our energy committee has continued to explore ways to spend reasonable sums of money now in order to provide the taxpayers with long term savings in the future.

Our Highway Department has continued on its path of continual improvement and is still the best in the area. Thanks Randy and Paul!!

The Sullivan Fire & Rescue department is an asset to the community and has been the "most improved department" over the last decade and a half. Fire apparatus is exceptionally expensive; yet, the department has led the town to having some of the best equipment in this area of the state with the minimum of financial pain. Good work to all of our firemen.

All of our other departments from the Police Department to the Library have likewise improved our Town and our lives in a most thoughtful and efficient way.

The Committee studying alternative ways to educate our children has done a magnificent job. They have plans to save you money while improving your children's education and their life, please support them.

Our Volunteer Boards do much of the heavy lifting required by Federal and State Regulations & Mandates. They are the backbone of New Hampshire Volunteer Government. These volunteers work in the background with little thanks and praise. So, now let me make a Plea for more volunteers. If you look at the names of the board members listed in the Town Report, you will notice the same names often appearing on more than one board and certainly appearing year after year. Most of our boards have positions which are vacant. If you think that you might be interested in how Town Government works, why not get involved, join one of the boards and become a part of that government. Let your voice and thoughts be heard while being part of the solution.

The Sullivan Board of Selectmen pledges to do its part in keeping your taxes under control. We see a good future for the Town and wish all of our citizens a healthy and prosperous 2012.

Warrant 2012

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, Tuesday the 13th day of March, next at 11:00 A.M. of the clock to act upon the following by written ballot: The polls not to close before 7:00 P.M.

Article 1

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2

To see if the Town is in favor of changing the term of the Town Treasurer from one year to three years, beginning with the term of the Town Treasurer to be elected at next year's regular town meeting. RSA 41.26b (Majority vote required)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, Wednesday, the 14th day of March, next at 7:00 P.M. of the clock to act upon the following subjects:

Article 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$213,948 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. (Majority vote required)

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$244,960 for the maintenance of town highways and bridges for the ensuing year. The Selectmen recommend \$246,460. (Majority vote required)

Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$110,000 for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. (Majority vote required)

Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$44,025 for the operation of the Police Department. The Selectmen recommend \$48,175. (Majority vote required)

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$34,250 for the operation of the Fire and Rescue Department. (Majority vote required)

Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$26,010 to provide and maintain Public Library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds, as provided. (Majority vote required)

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Bituminous-Surfaced Roads. (Majority vote required)

Article 10

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Highway Equipment. (Majority vote required)

Article 11

To see if the Town will vote to direct the school board of the Monadnock Regional School District to conduct a study of the feasibility and suitability of the withdrawal of the Town of Sullivan from the Monadnock Regional School District and to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$10,000 for the legal and other expenses arising out of the withdrawal process. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 12

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$9,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Repairs to Town Buildings. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 13

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$7,400 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Police Cruiser. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 14

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$6,300 for the care and maintenance of Town Cemeteries. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 15

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$5,350 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Department Vehicles. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the Selectmen recommended sum of \$5,000 to establish a capital reserve fund for the refurbishment of the Town Library to increase its energy efficiency and reduce its cost. Not recommended by budget committee. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 17

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Breathing Apparatus. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation of the Town. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Forest Fire Equipment/Liability Trust Fund and authorize the Selectmen as agents to expend the fund. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,700 for the operation of the Conservation Commission. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,575 for the operation of the Planning Board. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,000 for the operation of the Recreation Committee. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Land Conservation. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 24

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$400 for the operation of the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 25

To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of Agents and Committees as printed within the Annual Town Report.

Article 26

To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting, and to listen to opinions of a purely advisory nature as regards the conduct of Town affairs for the ensuing year.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Town of Sullivan officially adopted a budget committee in accordance with the provisions of NH RSA 32:14. The budget committee is "to assist voters in the prudent appropriation of Public funds: (RSA:32:1). The budget committee analyzes the appropriation requests from the selectmen and various town departments in such detail as to determine the annual amounts necessary to properly manage town affairs and still keep the tax load manageable. After conferring with the selectmen and department heads, the budget committee prepares a recommended budget and holds a public hearing. The public hearing is an opportunity for taxpayers to learn about the department's requests and the budget committee's recommendations and to request consideration for additions or deletions from the proposed budget. After the public hearing the budget committee adopts its recommended budget and it is posted with the annual meeting warrant.

The Sullivan Budget Committee consists of Peg Martin, John Bolles, Bill Lindamood, Dave Jakway and Al Merrifield, chairman. This year's budget review began with an organizational meeting on January 17, 2012 with the Selectmen's administrative assistant, Karen Luebke. The budget committee received the department requests and selectman's recommendations and set a time to meet with the heads of the larger departments. On January 23, 2012, the budget committee met with Chris Pratt, Library, Karl Wheeler, Police; Mike Blanchard, fire; and Randy Smith, highway for detailed explanations of their appropriation requests. On January 31, 2012 the budget committee met with Selectman Mark Paquette and reviewed the selectmen's requests and proposed budget. The budget committee drafted its recommended budget and set a public hearing for February 9, 2012. The public hearing was held with three members of the public and department representatives present. After the public hearing the budget committee further reviewed the requests and public comments and adopted a recommended budget to be placed before the Town Meeting. This year's recommended budget seeks to maintain the level of service provided in recent years. It provides a small increase in wages for town employees and officers for the first time in two to three years and continues to fund the capital reserve accounts.

The budget committee thanks the department heads and the Selectmen's Administrative Assistant for preparing the annual budget appropriation requests and their cooperation during the review process.

Planning Board

The Sullivan Planning Board had a very uneventful year in 2011. We only had one planning project and one driveway permit come before the board in 2011.

In May we completed a Site Plan Review for a retail gift shop at Hollow Oak Farm on Centre St.

In October we processed a driveway permit for an existing lot on Centre St. where a new house was being constructed.

We welcome anyone who would be interested in serving on the Planning Board. We still have openings.

SULLIVAN FIRE & RESCUE and FORESTRY

2011 was an average year for emergency calls, with a total of 80 calls, and a very active year for training.

Our Mission Statement; "To provide the best service possible to the Town of Sullivan through continuous improvement in training, certifications and equipment".

Sullivan Fire & Rescue is very active with weekly training and meetings, maintaining our equipment in a constant state of readiness and various events to further support our community. We invite you to stop by on Wednesday nights for a visit and new members are always welcome.

- THE CALLS -

SFR responded to a total of 80 calls for Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Fire & Rescue, Mutual Aid as well as non emergency Service calls. Of these calls, 23 were for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for trauma and non trauma incidents which accounted for the majority of responses, 21 Mutual Aid Calls to other communities and 36 Fire, Rescue & Forestry calls.

Not reported in the call log are the numerous requests for other services. Several wood stove installation inspections at the request of homeowners or their insurance companies, and the annual fire safety inspection of the Sullivan School.

The department maintained an average response time of 7 minutes. The response time is the elapsed time from the moment we are paged to the time we arrive on scene. Calls average in length from 1 hour on an EMS call and up to 12 hours on fire related calls.

- THE TRAINING -

In 2011 Al Jones recertified as an EMT Basic; Mike Blanchard and Al Henry recertified as First Responders; JR Guyette became an EMT Basic and Fire Fighter 1; Leif Jackson, Eric Kazlouskas and Josh Dotson became First Responders.

All members participated in our required annual Blood Borne Pathogen and SCBA training. CPR and AED recertification was also completed in 2011. Members also participated in regional training, spring and fall sessions at Meadowood Fire School, in house training and drills, and our annual Forestry Training. Our in house training included Auto Extrication drills, SCBA training, pump training and EMS training.

- THE DEPARTMENT -

The Sullivan Fire Company (the non profit organization of SFR) also had a number of fund raising activities last year. These included the Pumpkin Festival and our annual yard sale. From these funds, the Company again set aside funds to further help offset the Department budget and assist individuals in the community. In 2012 the Sullivan Fire Company will donate \$5,000 towards the purchase of a Pulsoximeter that is also capable of detecting levels of carbon monoxide.

I would like to welcome new members Amy Monroe, Phylis Evelyn and Zach Burke.

The Company participated in the Keene, Claremont and Bellows Falls fire prevention parades, again bringing home a number of trophies. Members of the Sullivan Congregational Church along members of the department hosted the September meeting of Cheshire County Forest Fire Wardens Association.

- EQUIPMENT UPGRADES -

In 2011 we upgraded numerous items in our inventory. Additional pagers were purchased along with additional turn out gear. The electrical power to the station was also upgraded with the installation of 400 amp service, new pole and transformer. This upgrade has eliminated many of the ground fault problems we had in the station.

- LOOKING AHEAD TO 2012 -

I have reviewed all of the emergency services warrant articles for Fire, EMS, Forestry and Emergency Management such as capital reserves and trust funds, and have kept them at a level that supports the department needs allowing for future growth or equipment replacement.

In closing I would like to express my gratitude to you our residents for your continuing support of Sullivan Fire & Rescue Department, the membership for their continued dedication to the Town, to the member's families, the Selectmen, and the Police and Highway Departments.

Highway Department Report

January, February, March 2011

The beginning of 2011 was good, gravel roads stayed frozen. Brush piles in Jewett Park were burned. Hazard trees were cut on South Road. January 12th we had an 18 inch snow storm, with small accumulating snow storms every other day for the rest of the month. Vehicles were maintained between storms.

The first two weeks of February was a busy weather pattern, snow with some freezing rain mix. Much time was spent moving snow with the grader and backhoe. New hinge pins and bushings were installed on the front bucket of the John Deere backhoe.

March 6th-7th brought 3.2 inches of rain with rapid snow melt, water running everywhere. Mud season stone was purchased from Henniker Crushed Stone and Metcalf Stone. Potholes in pavement were filled. Weight restrictions were placed on roads March 14th. We began placing stone in the worst sections of the gravel roads on March 17th. The last week of March was spent doing minor repairs to trucks and the backhoe from a very busy winter season. We had only one week, February 14-20th that we had no storms. Roads thawed very slowly the last 2 weeks of March, temps in the 30's and windy.

April, May, June 2011

April 1st we had a 3 inch snowstorm and a dusting on April 2nd. More maintenance was done on the Chevy dump truck, John Deere grader and John Deere backhoe. Sanders, plow frames and wingpost were washed and hung up. Crushed stone continued to be placed on gravel roads as needed. The road rake was brought out and serviced. The first grading and raking of the season began April 11th. Paved roads were swept, potholes filled, culvert markers were straightened, and turnarounds were leveled. The wheel rims and dump bodies were sanded down, primed and painted on both trucks.

May 9th Weight restriction was lifted from the town roads. The annual NH DOT Road Inventory Collection Map was reviewed, revised and returned. The Highway Department took the trash from the Town Cleanup to Keene Recycling, 940 pounds of trash, 28 tires, 3 TVs and 1 computer monitor. The backhoe's two front buckets were prepped and painted along with the Chevy dump truck's push frame, plow frame, fuel tank, battery box and hydraulic tank. Grading continued on gravel roads. Sanders were oiled for the summer.

June 9th a heavy thunder shower hit with trees and wires down around town with some power outages. The next two days were spent chipping brush. June 15th work began on Gilsum Road. Culverts were cleaned, some brush cut, rocks moved, some banks sloped.

July, August, September

The ditches on the paved portion of Gilsum Road were cleaned. Potholes on paved roads were repaired. The bridges on Old Concord, Valley Road and Price Road were washed and sealed. Some rocks on Hubbard and South Road were dug out and replaced with gravel and asphalt. On July 20th we began cleaning ditches on South Road. Jeff and Cindy Brooks gave the department 4 dump truck loads of wood they had in their field, thank you. July 16th – August 2nd trees on South Road were cut in preparation of road construction.

August 3rd I started mowing roadsides with a rented boom mower. Paul Yawarski continued work on South Road shoulders, digging rocks and stumps. August 10th and 11th John A. Bolles Construction was hired to remove large stumps and rocks from the South Road construction area. On August 28th Hurricane Irene came through Sullivan with 4.6 inches of rain and minor damage to roadways. Paul made the necessary repairs as I continued mowing roadsides.

We had 5.3 inches of rain in three days, September 5th – 7th. Roadside mowing was completed on September 8th with 172 hours on the mower. A culvert on Ellis Road was replaced and the shoulder stiffened with trap rock. Repairs were made to Cross Road, pavement that had been damaged from the spring thaw. Three loads of scrap metal culverts were recycled and money turned in to Selectmen. On September 19th full attention returned to the .66 miles of South Road construction area. More rocks were dug out of roadway, more shoulders reshaped. Two culverts were replaced. Existing pavement edge was marked and measured. On September 29th Allstates Paving reclaimed (ground) pavement, it rained 1.8 inches that day. September 30th the department graded and compacted reclaimed area.

October, November, December 2011

Two more culverts were replaced on South Road on October 5th-6th. Pavement was cut at both ends of reclaimed area. October 11th-12th 1,360 ton of RAP (recycled asphalt product) was hauled from the Town Barn by John A. Bolles Construction and placed on South Road. October 13th another 859.07 tons (44 tri-axle loads) of gravel was placed on top of the RAP. October 14th 482.82 ton (20 loads) were placed on the southern end of construction up to power lines. Two driveway culverts were replaced as part of the construction to ensure proper water flow. On the 20th of October we began constructing the 1,240 feet of underdrain needed to help dry subsoils on the midsection of the construction area. October 27th we got 3 inches of snow, most of which melted from the roads. October 30th it snowed 20 inches of heavy wet snow.

November 2nd, Henniker Crushed Stone delivered 799.52 tons (34 loads) of gravel to midsection of South Road construction area. On November 8th the 1240 feet of underdrain was completed. Potholes were repaired again on paved and gravel roads. Five hundred cubic yards of winter sand was purchased from E. Edwards of Hillsboro, mixed with salt and covered. November 22, Henniker Crushed Stone hauled 191.70 ton (8 loads) of gravel to upper Boulder Road, paid for by the Town of Stoddard under a new agreement between the towns because of the increase in traffic. This agreement is annually. November 23rd 4 inches of snow/ rain.

December 1st ditches were cleaned on sections of Hubbard Road. December 6th – 7th we had 1.8 inches of rain and the 8th we had 3 inches of snow, again water, water everywhere. It is extremely tough plowing on saturated, unfrozen gravel roads.

On December 20th the wood boiler from the Energy Grant was delivered. Paul dug a trench for the heating pipe from the woodshed to the barn, 7 feet deep, 130 feet long. Henniker Crushed Stone delivered 237.73 ton (10 loads) of gravel to the southern end of South Road construction area. Here are the material totals for South Road construction area:

Some ditches and waterways were cleaned on Apple Hill, Valley Road. December 31st ended the year with a bit of freezing rain. As always sand is available for Sullivan residents driveways and walkways at the Town Barn for the winter season.

Public Library

This past year an industrious weeding of the adult collections was completed. Some materials had been in our collection for fifty years and never circulated! It was necessary to make room for new items. The shelves look much neater and it is easier to locate books.

The library offered electronic books via the NH Downloadable Book Consortium. Sixteen unique individuals downloaded a total of 180 items this past year. Our wireless high speed internet connection was opened for public use. Our members are accessing the electronic databases from EBSCOhost and Newsbank from home. Passwords for these resources may be obtained at the library and links to them are available on the library's web page.

The water heater developed a leak and was replaced. The carpets were professionally cleaned. Floodlights with a sensor were added to the front entrance to the building. New storm windows were purchased and installed over the windows in the original section of the building.

The library co-applied for and received a \$350 Kids, Books, and the Arts Grant with the Gilsum Public Library. Fifty-eight people attended Michael Zerphy's July 7 performance at the MRSD summer program held at the Gilsum school. The audience ranged in age from two to sixty and everyone laughed and had a nice time.

Summer reading programs were offered for all ages. Eleven children, twelve teens and nine adults participated. A total of 412 books were read. We also held our annual competition against Gilsum to see which town can read the most pounds of library materials. The Coveted Ice Cream Cup is in Gilsum again.

The librarian continued to provide library outreach services to our schoolchildren at the afterschool program and at the summer day camp program held in Gilsum. The book group for adults continues to meet on the third Thursday of the month. The library has extra copies of the books on hand for each discussion and new people are always welcome to attend any of the discussions.

HCS has changed the way it provides its community outreach services, so we did not have the usual blood pressure clinics this year; they did provide a flu shot clinic at the library.

The library continues to be a drop off location for nonperishable items for the community pantry.

The library is grateful for the continued support of the community.

Conservation Commission

In April more than 40 volunteers helped pick up 940 pounds of trash along our roads; 165 pounds of recyclables were separated out before taking the trash to the dump. The volunteers enjoyed a luncheon at the town hall afterwards.

The commission provides the town residents the opportunity to dispose of their hazardous household contaminants, free of charge, at the Keene Transfer Station. Drop-off dates for 2012 can be found listed in the Keene Sentinel and on the town's website.

We were part of a multi-town water quality testing program for the Ashuelot River again this year. This testing helps monitor the water quality along the river which located a source of contamination in Keene that is currently being cleaned up.

The conservation commission continues to fund a naturalist educator from the Harris Center to teach at the Sullivan School each year.

The new management plan for the town forest was completed in 2011 by forester Swift Corwin. Incorporated into the new plan is the management of the timber stands for future harvests while improving wildlife habitat and promoting the multi use aspects of the forest. A new hiking trail in the town forest that could connect to other trail systems in town is planned for 2012.

Last spring the commission hosted a presentation by the Cheshire County Conservation Commission on forming town Agricultural Commissions. The talk was attended by a half a dozen farmers from Sullivan and surrounding towns; several towns have chosen to form commissions.

In June the commission hosted a workshop on habitat improvement and toured a local property to view and discuss the ongoing improvements.

The Natural Resource Inventory that was published by the commission in 2010 was adopted into the upcoming Master Plan by the Planning Board.

There were two wetland permits addressed by the commission and seven notices of Intent To Cut were reviewed this past year.

Trail maps and wildlife and bird viewing checklists can be found at our bulletin board in the town hall for those interested. Check the board often for upcoming workshops, hikes, and other things of interest in the Monadnock area.

Our meetings are open to all residents and we welcome anyone interested in coming to a meeting, or becoming a member. Meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the town hall.

ENERGY COMMITTEE 2011

Since the description of activities published in the 2009 Annual Report of the Town, the energy committee has:

- Supervised the completion of professional audits of two town buildings in preparation for seeking available EECBG/ARRA funds.
- Made recommendations to the selectmen for small steps, based on the walkthroughs, engineered by Jeff Brooks, of town buildings in 2009, to increase energy efficiency in town buildings
- Applied for two EECBG grants in February of 2010, with considerable computer help by Paul Bolduc..
- Been awarded one of the grants: to install an energy efficient wood boiler for the town highway garage
- Considered ways of completing the work suggested in the other grant, a rehabilitation of the library outlined by Eric White's research to make it more energy efficient, with town funds, perhaps through a capital reserve fund established by town meeting.
- Requested in June of 2010 a free audit of electrical equipment in all four town buildings by PSNH and gave the results and recommendations to the manager of each town building
- Welcomed Kill-a-watt , a device for measuring electricity usage in the home, to the town library, purchased by the conservation commission
- Visited two sites to evaluate the effectiveness of efficient wood boilers
- Spent many weeks devising a Request for Proposal for the proposed wood boiler which included very detailed specifications and drawings compiled by Rick Hotchkiss.
- Learned about a new wind turbine which Dennis Noonan, a Sullivan resident, helped develop
- Posted the RFP for the efficient boiler project for the highway garage on July 8, 2011.
- Received one proposal for the project in September.
- Signed a contract for implementation of the proposal in November
- Watched Paul Yawarski., dig the trench for the piping for the boiler at the end of December
- Witnessed the initial operation of the energy efficient boiler Jan. 18, 2012
- Compiled data on energy use by town departments with the help of Karen Luebkmann at the town hall and Tara Germond at Southwest Region Planning Commission, partly to meet a requirement of the grant and partly to create a benchmark for the town to trace its energy use and cost from year to year. Energy use for 2011 cost about \$30,000 for the 4 town departments/buildings. More detailed information (e.g. oil, propane, diesel, electricity use by department) is available from the energy committee.

The committee welcomes new members.

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

Washington Lempster Marlow Gilsum Sullivan Surry Keene Swanzey Winchester Hinsdale
2011 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES). We strive to be educated in a broad array of issues associated with the River and its watershed. We hope to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

The volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program in conjunction with the DES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP) continued for its eleventh season. Twelve sites were sampled along the River's 64-mile length, as well as sites along the South Branch in Swanzey. Analyses were done for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. Contributions from Conservation Commissions along the River and Trout Unlimited added to DES funds to cover costs for testing. ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading into a five-month effort of monthly sampling May through September. E. coli samples were obtained June through September. River water quality improvement is noted by a decline in total phosphorus, but E. Coli data continues to be inconclusive. The increasing acidification of the River continues with a trend of lower pH readings. Data can be viewed at <http://des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wmb/vrap/data.htm>.

A mandated task, ARLAC reviews and comments on state permit applications within the River corridor that have potential impacts on the River. This year ARLAC submitted comments on eleven projects proposed in Washington, Gilsum, Keene, and Winchester. Included in those permit reviews were the Mitchell Sand and Gravel asphalt plant in Winchester and the lagoon closure at Paper Service. We also met with Keene's Planning Department to discuss Keene's request for exemptions to the Shoreline Protection Act and continued to advocate for full shoreland protection.

Two projects continuing into next year are the restoration or removal of the West Street Dam in Keene and the Ashuelot River Stream Crossing Improvement Project. Following the City of Keene's discussion on the possible removal vs. restoration of the West Street dam, ARLAC prepared and presented to the Keene City Council and Conservation Commission a Frequently Asked Questions information sheet to further enhance the debate. The second project is spearheaded by Trout Unlimited (TU). After seeking local input, ARLAC provided feedback to TU regarding culvert restoration priorities for improving stream connectivity in the Ashuelot watershed. It is anticipated that removal of three severe barriers to fish passage will begin in 2012.

To further our knowledge of the environment and the River, ARLAC hosted presentations on Floodplain Forests by Dr. Christian Marks of the Nature Conservancy, and on Air Quality in Southwest New Hampshire by Nora Traviss, Keene State College Professor. Dr. Patrick Eggleston also provided interpretation of 11 years of water quality data.

River cleanup took place over two weekends in October. 25 volunteers removed 1,745 pounds of trash from the Ashuelot River in Keene and Swanzey, and Beaver Brook in Keene.

ARLAC meets monthly in the evening of the third Tuesday in Keene. The Local Advisory Committee invites citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives with any concerns or input.

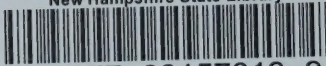
