### OBAMA HAS ADVANTAGE IN FINAL NH POLL

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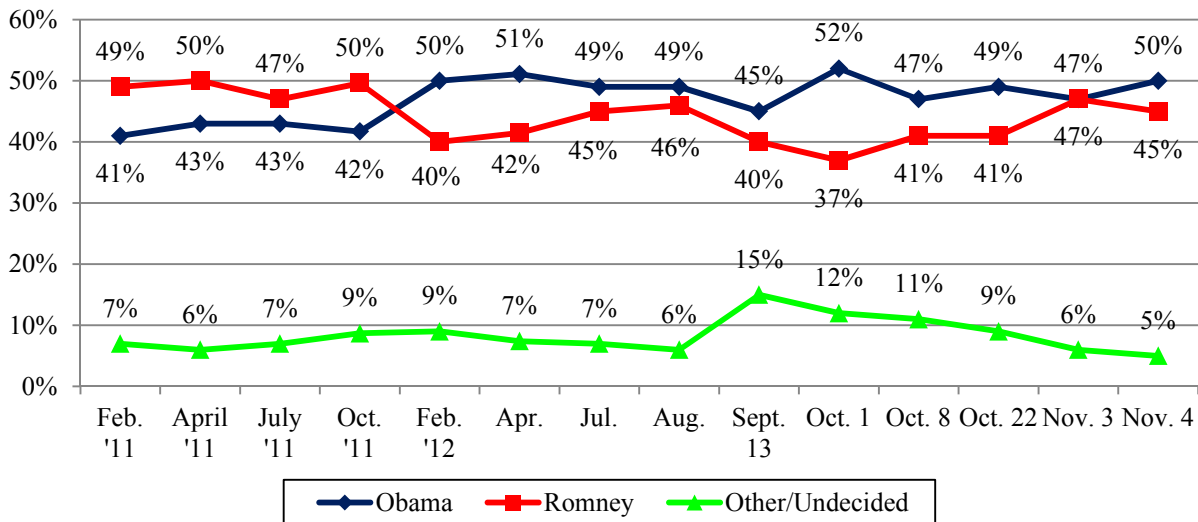
DURHAM, NH – President Obama holds a small advantage over Mitt Romney in the final WMUR Granite State Poll. Democrat Maggie Hassan holds a significant lead over Republican Ovide Lamontagne in the race for Governor. The First Congressional district is a dead heat, but Democrat Anne Kuster is positioned to win New Hampshire’s Second District seat.

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll\*** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred and eighty-nine (789) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between November 1 and November 4, 2012. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.5 percent. Included was a subsample of 366 likely voters in the NH First Congressional District (margin of sampling error +/- 5.1%), and a subsample of 423 Second Congressional District likely voters (margin of sampling error +/- 4.8%).

### 2012 Presidential Election

Over the final weekend before the November 6 election, President Barack Obama has opened up a small advantage over former Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney. In the final Granite State Poll before the election, 50% of likely New Hampshire voters say they will vote for Barack Obama, 45% say they will vote for Romney, 1% will support another candidate, and 4% are undecided.

 (Likely 2012 General Election Voters)**



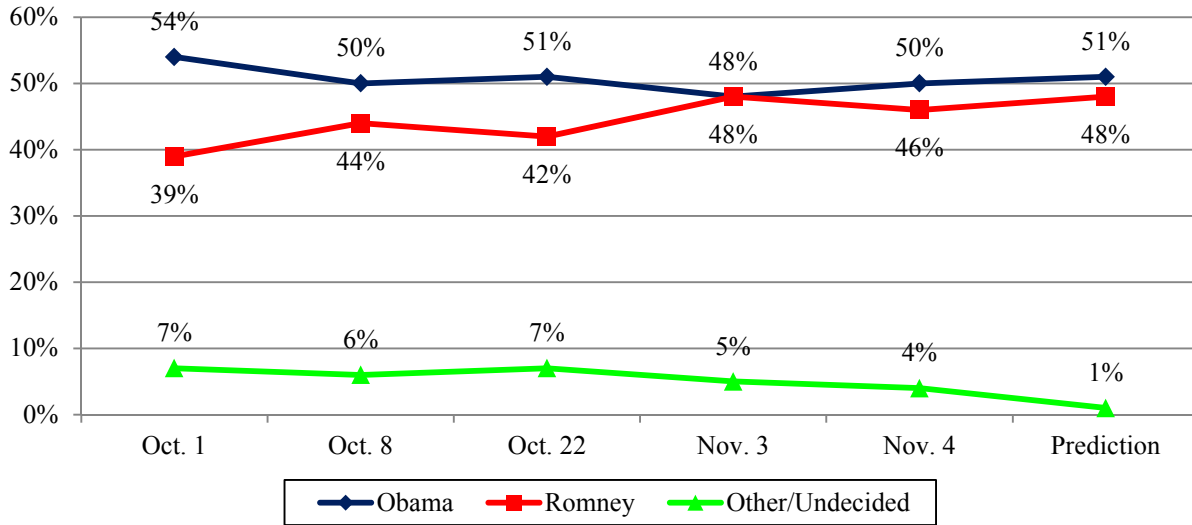
When undecided voters are asked which candidate they lean toward, 50% support Obama, 46% support Romney, 1% for some other candidate, and 3% remain undecided.

And when undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to vote for, the final prediction is 51% for Obama, 48% for Romney, and 1% for other candidates

There is a pronounced gender gap -- Obama leads among women by 58% to 40% while Romney leads among men, 53% to 42%. There is also a religious divide -- among regular church goers, Romney holds a 60% to 38% lead while Obama leads by 60% to 35% among people who never attend church services.

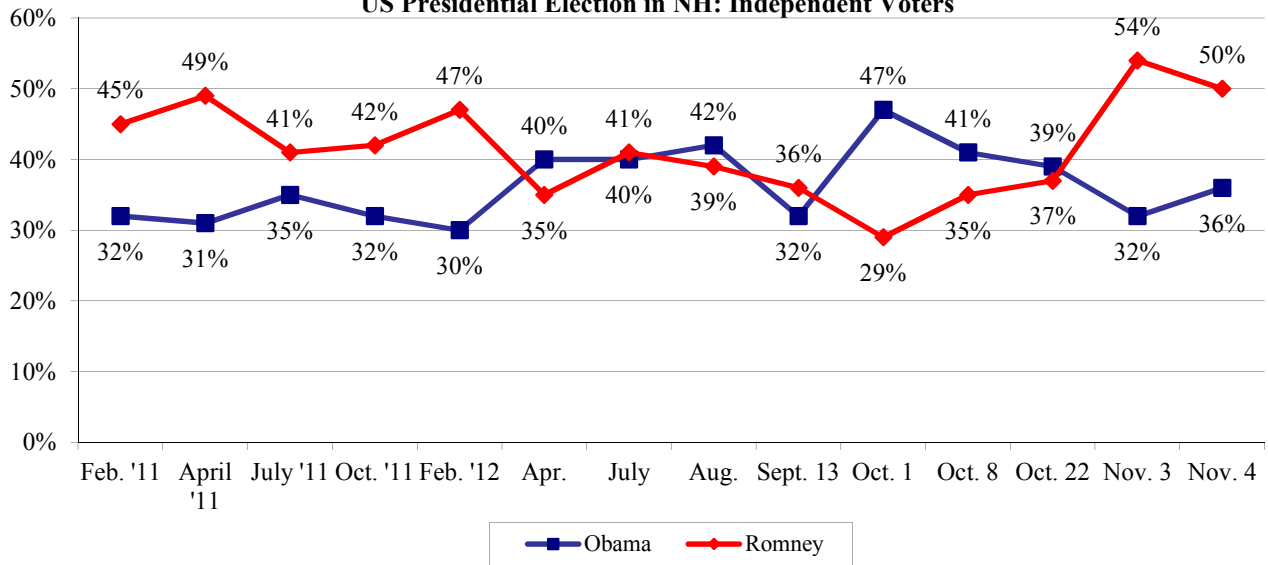

(Likely 2012 General Election Voters)**



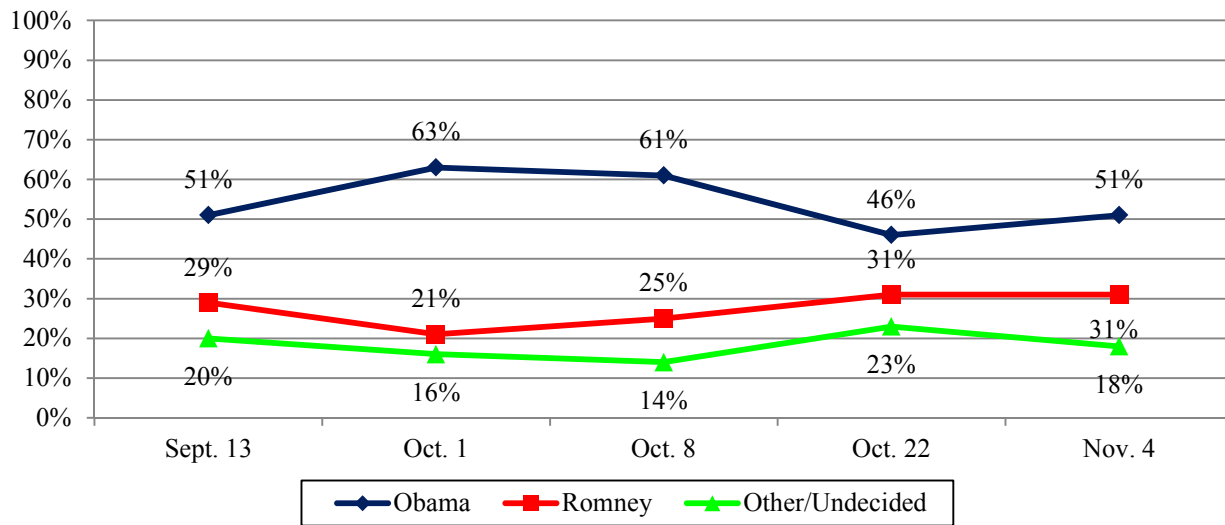
Both candidates have secured their bases -- Obama currently has the support of 94% of New Hampshire Democrats, and Romney has the support of 94% of Republicans. Independents are breaking to Romney -- 50% say they will vote for Romney while 36% say they will vote for Obama.

Voters continue to think Obama is most likely to win reelection. When asked who they think is more likely to win the 2012 presidential election, 51% think Obama will win reelection, 31% think Romney will win, and 18% are unsure of the outcome.

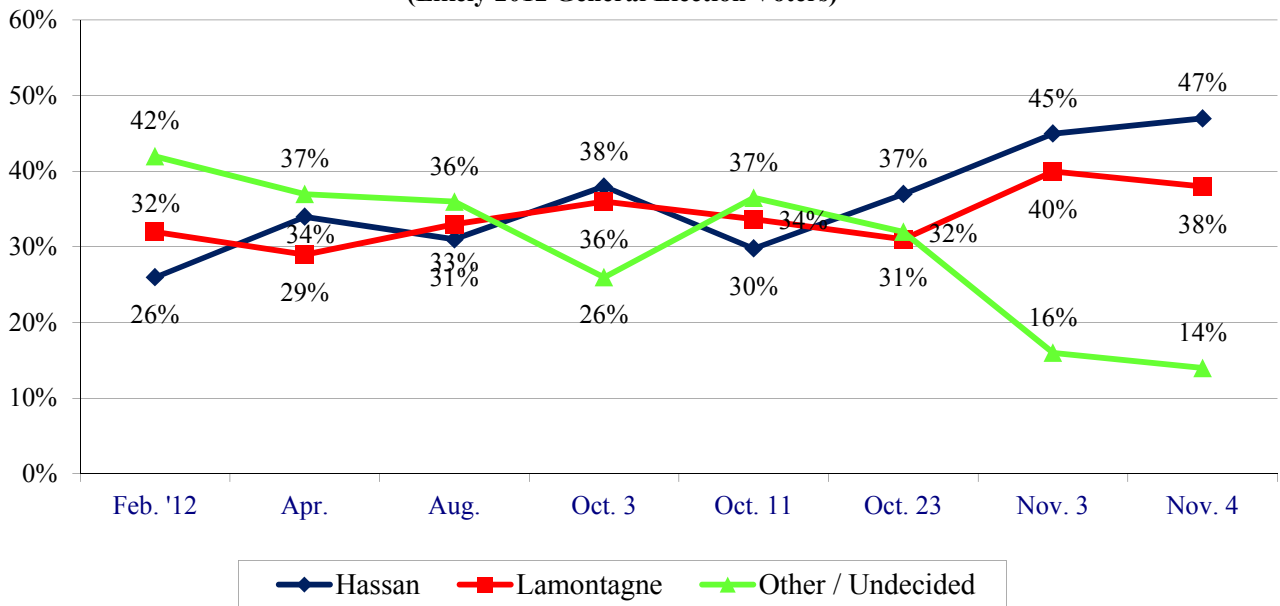
**Who Will Win the Presidential Election?

**NH 2012 Gubernatorial Candidates**

Democrat Maggie Hassan has opened a statistically significant lead over Republican Ovide Lamontagne, but more than one in ten likely voters remain undecided. In the most recent Granite State Poll, 47% of likely general election voters say they would currently vote for Hassan, 38% prefer Lamontagne, 1% favor Libertarian candidate John Babiarez, 1% favor some other candidate, and 12% are undecided.

(Likely 2012 General Election Voters)**

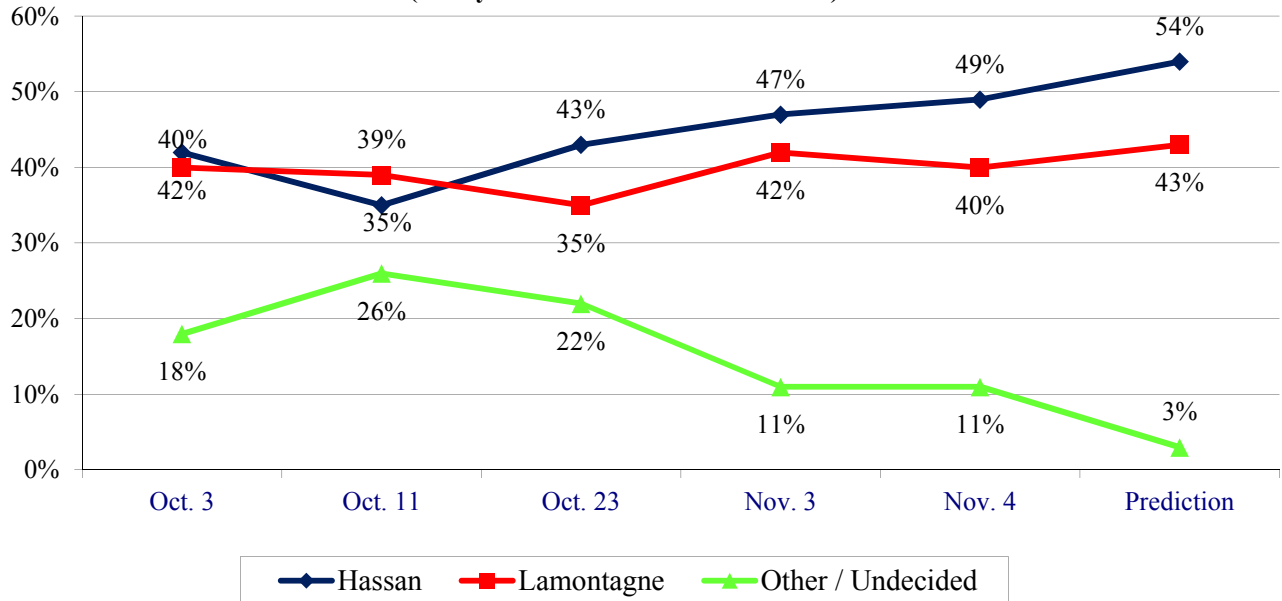


When undecided voters are asked which candidate they lean toward supporting, 49% of likely voters say they will vote for Hassan, 40% for Lamontagne, 1% favor Babiarez, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 9% remain undecided.

And when the remaining undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to vote for, the final prediction is 54% for Hassan, 43% for Lamontagne, and 3% for other candidates.

Hassan has a small advantage in crossover voting with 9% of Romney voters saying they will vote for Hassan while only 3% of Obama supporters say they will vote for Lamontagne. There is also a gender gap favoring Hassan – she leads by 23 percentage points among women while Lamontagne leads by only 7 percentage points among men.

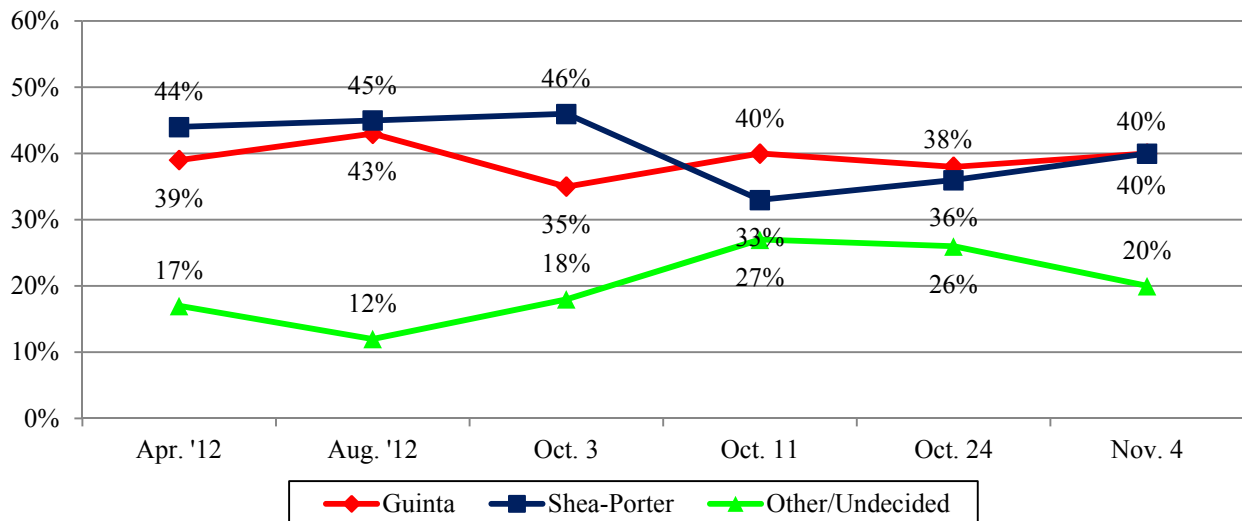
**NH Governor: Lamontagne vs. Hassan -- With Undecided Voters Probed**

**First Congressional District**

The race in New Hampshire’s First Congressional District remains too close to call. Incumbent Republican Frank Guinta is tied with his 2010 opponent Carol Shea-Porter. Currently, 40% of likely First C.D. voters say they will vote for Guinta, 40% will vote for Shea-Porter, 3% support Libertarian Brendan Kelly, 1% support some other candidate, and 16% are undecided.

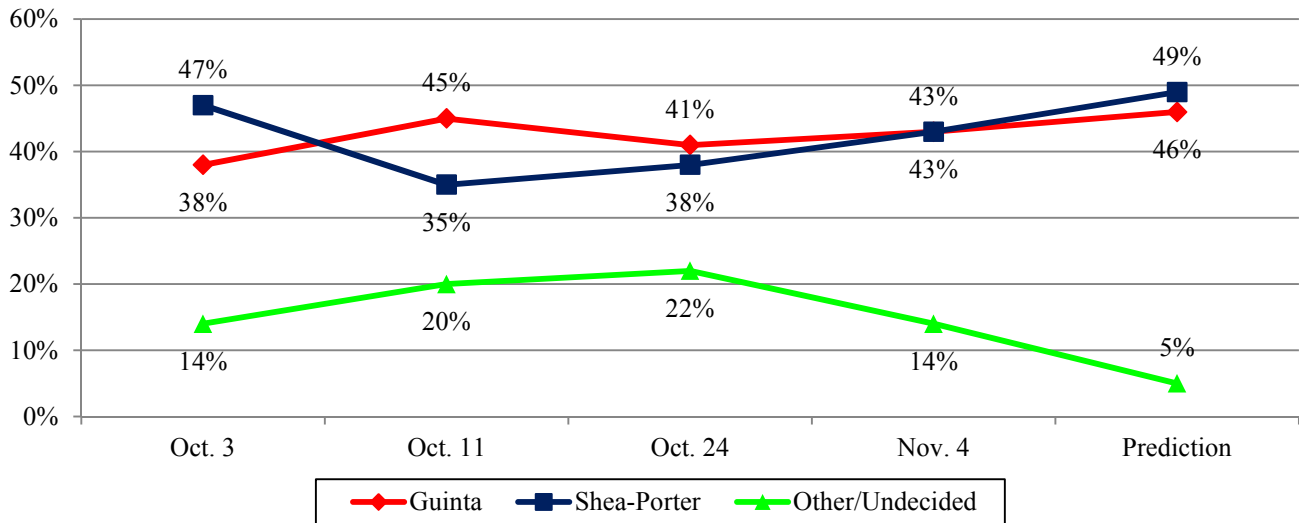
**NH 1st Congressional District - Guinta vs. Shea-Porter**

When undecided voters are probed about who lean toward supporting, the race remains tied, with 43% of likely voters saying they will vote for Guinta, 43% for Shea-Porter, 3% for Kelly, 1% for some other candidate, and 10% remain undecided.

When the remaining undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to support, the final prediction is 49% for Shea-Porter, 46% for Guinta, and 5% for other candidates.

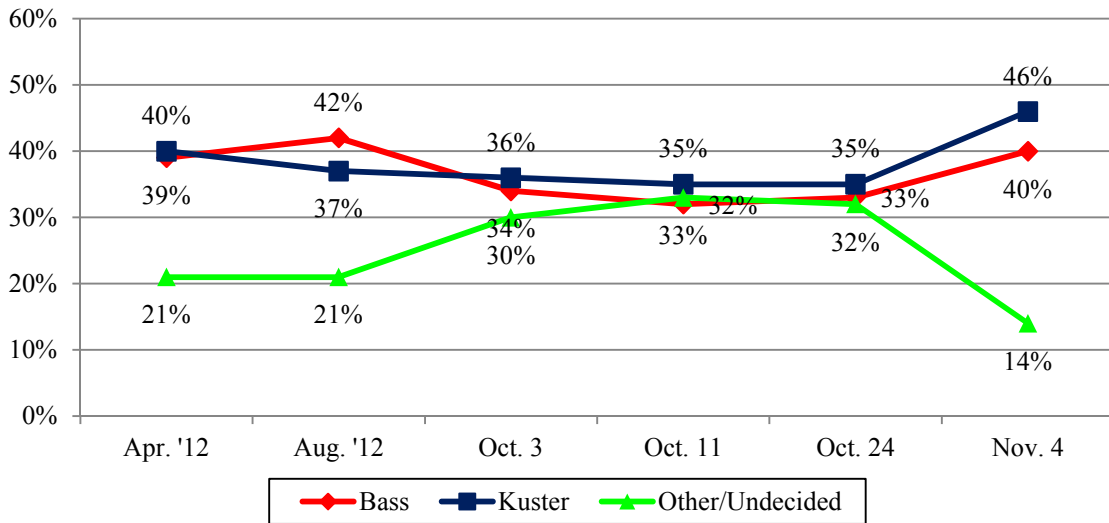
**NH 1st Congressional District - Guinta vs. Shea-Porter - with undecided voters probed

**Second Congressional District**

In New Hampshire's 2<sup>nd</sup> Congressional District, Democrat Ann Kuster holds a small advantage over incumbent Republican Charlie Bass. Currently, 46% of likely voters say they plan to vote for Kuster, 40% support Bass, 2% favor Libertarian candidate Hardy Macia, 2% support some other candidate, and 10% remain undecided.

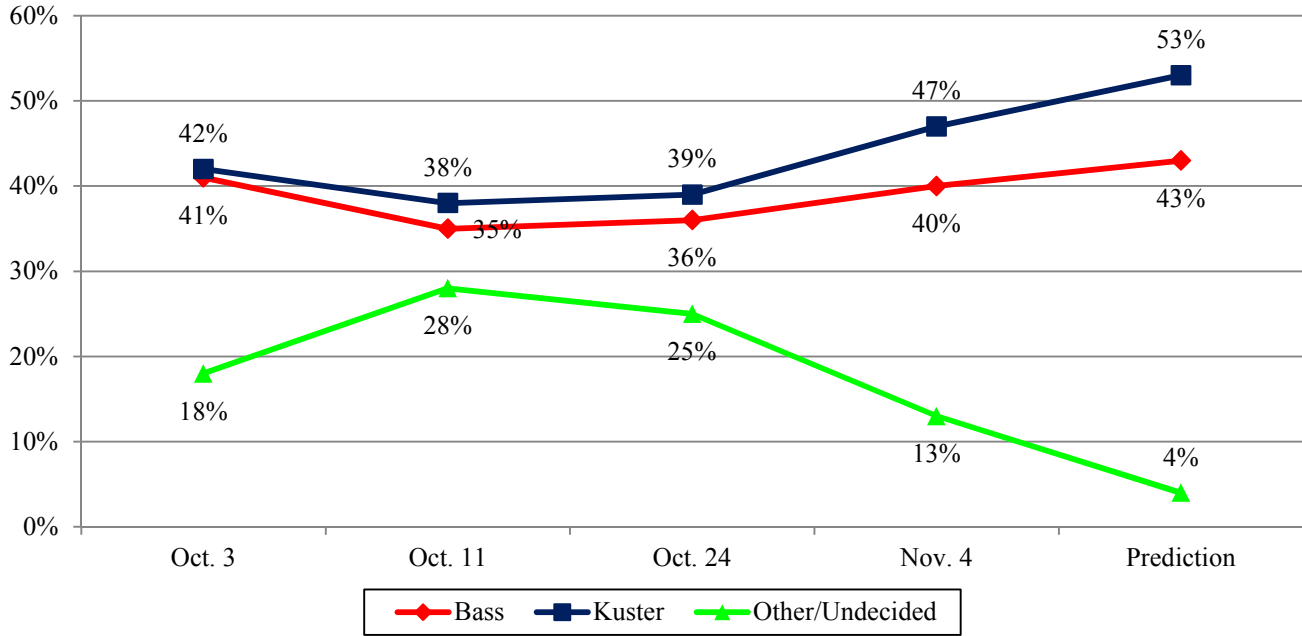
**NH 2nd Congressional District - Bass vs. Kuster

When undecided voters are probed about which candidate they lean to supporting, 47% of likely voters say they will vote for Kuster, 40% for Bass, 2% favor for Macia, 2% for some other candidate, and 9% remain undecided.

When the remaining undecided voters are allocated to the candidate they are most likely to support, the final prediction is 53% for Kuster, 43% for Bass, and 4% for other candidates.

(Likely 2012 General Election Voters)**

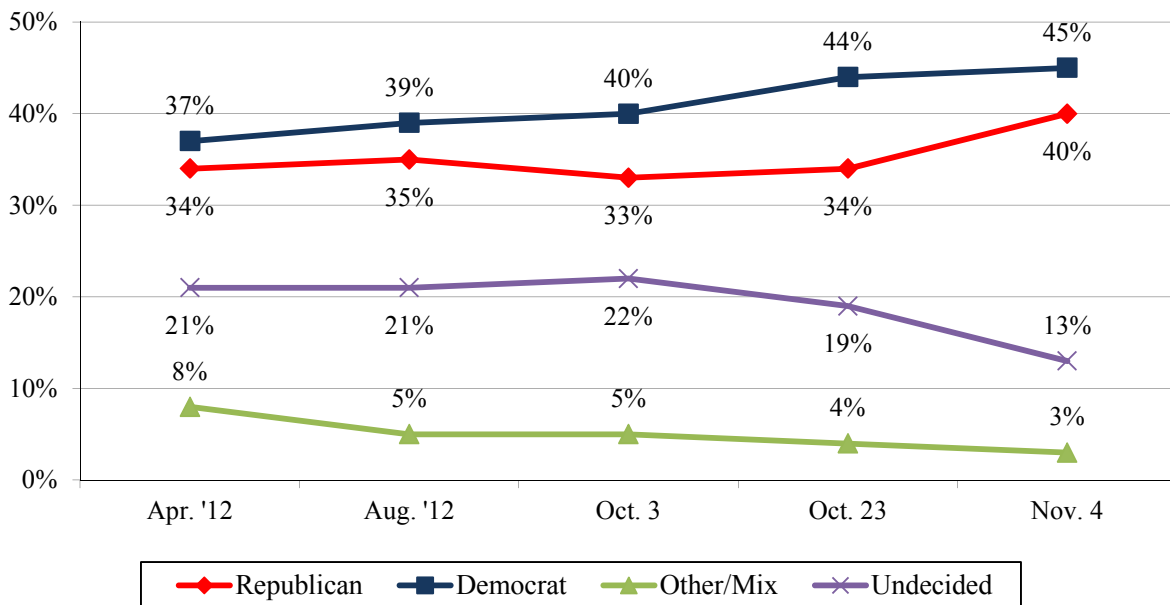


**New Hampshire House of Representatives**

Turning to the New Hampshire House of Representatives, 44% of New Hampshire likely voters with say they will vote for Democratic candidates, 38% for Republican candidates, 2% supporting another party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 16% undecided. When undecided voters are asked which candidate they are leaning toward, 45% of all voters say they will vote for Democratic candidates, 40% for Republican candidates, 3% will vote for candidates of a third party or a mix of Republicans and Democrats, and 13% remain undecided.

Based on an evaluation of past “generic ballot” polling in New Hampshire and actual election results, these results would translate into 201 seats for Republicans and 199 seats for Democrats

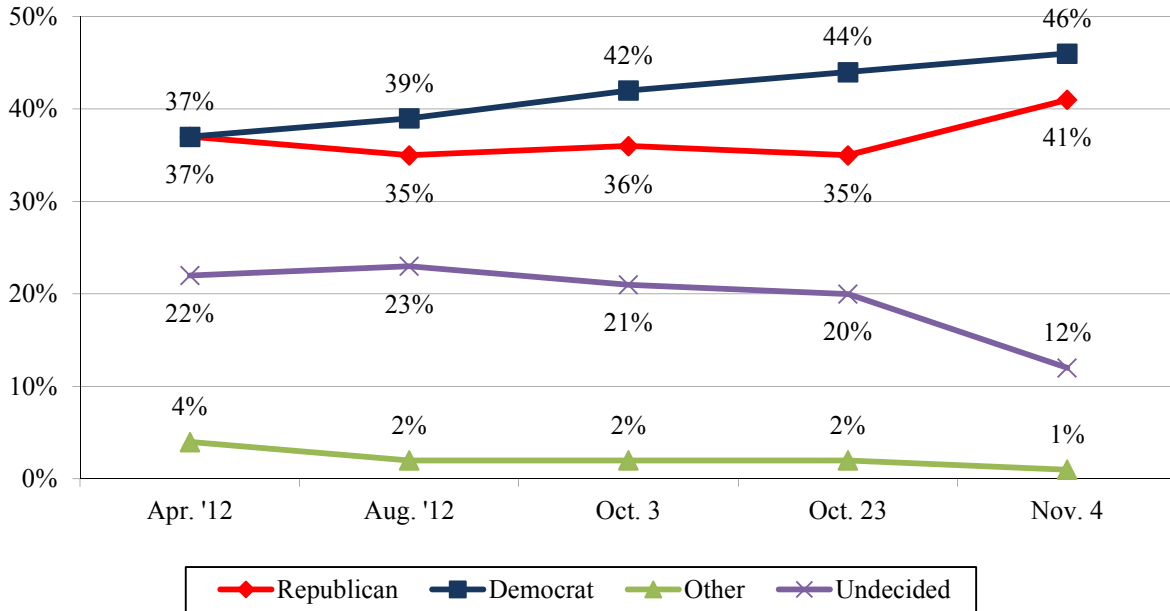
**New Hampshire House of Representatives Generic Ballot**



## New Hampshire State Senate

New Hampshire voters are also more likely to say they will vote for Democratic candidates for New Hampshire Senate than Republican candidates. Currently, 44% of likely voters say they will vote for the Democratic candidate from their district, 39% support the Republican candidate, 1% favor some other candidate, and 16% are undecided. When undecided voters were probed about which party they were leaning toward supporting, 46% say they will vote for the Democratic candidate in their district, 41% favor the Republican candidate, 1% prefer some other candidate, and 12% remain undecided. Based on an evaluation of past “generic ballot” polling in New Hampshire and actual election results, these results would translate into 12 seats for Republicans and 12 seats for Democrats.

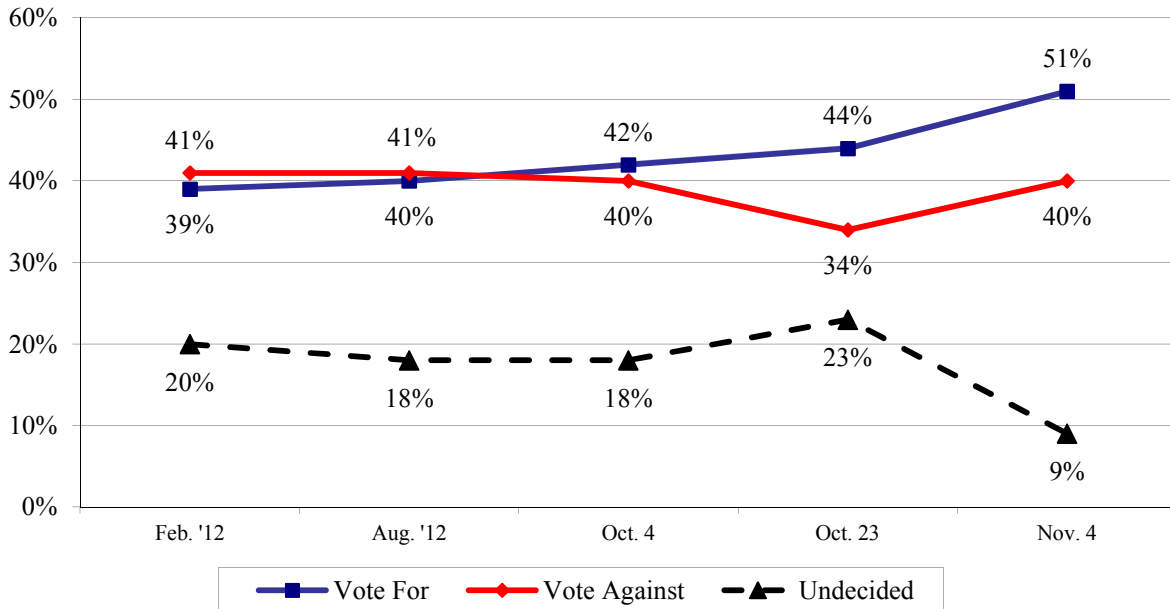
### New Hampshire State Senate Generic Ballot



## Income Tax Amendment

An amendment to the New Hampshire Constitution will be on the ballot this November that will prohibit a state income tax. When asked whether or not they would vote for this amendment, 50% of likely voters said they will vote for the amendment, 38% will vote against it, and 12% are unsure. When undecided voters were probed about which way they were leaning, 51% of all voters said they will vote for it, 40% will vote against it, and 9% remained undecided. But since this amendment requires a two-thirds majority, passage is doubtful. Previous research has shown that most undecided voters vote against proposed amendments.

## Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest **WMUR Granite State Poll** conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Seven hundred and eighty-nine (789) randomly selected New Hampshire likely voters were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between November 1 and November 4, 2012. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.5 percent. Included was a subsample of 366 likely voters in the NH First Congressional District (margin of sampling error +/- 5.1%), and a subsample of 423 Second Congressional District likely voters (margin of sampling error +/- 4.8%).

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households, respondent sex, and region of the state. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response.

A historical analysis was done looking at the results of the “generic ballot” question and the actual number of seats won by Republicans in the New Hampshire House and Senate in the 2000 through 2010 elections was presented at the annual meeting of the American Association for Public Opinion Research Annual (AAPOR), and is available from the UNH Survey Center.

The model developed in this paper used for estimating House seats from the generic ballot question (with undecideds allocated) is:

$$\text{GOP HOUSE SEATS} = -309.034 + (1076.681 * \text{2-party GOP estimate})$$

In the final 2012 Granite State Poll, the two party estimate of House seats for Republicans, 47.4% , is inserted into the formula above. This results in an estimate of 201 Republican House seats and 199 Democratic House seats.

The model developed for estimating Senate seats from the generic ballot question (with undecideds allocated) is:

$$\text{GOP SENATE SEATS} = -24.646 + (76.829 * \text{2-party GOP estimate})$$

In the final 2012 Granite State Poll, the two party estimate of Senate seats for Republicans, 47.3%, is inserted into the formula above. This results in an estimate of 12 Republican Senate seats and 12 Democratic Senate seats.
