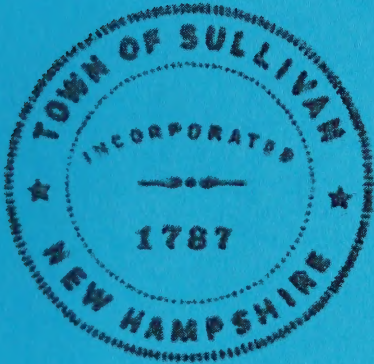

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Board of Selectmen believes that 2012 has been a challenging year for the Town of Sullivan. During the Spring of 2012, the town suffered major infrastructure damage to roads and bridges due to the May 29th flood. Another major hurdle for the town was withdrawing from the Monadnock Regional School District (MRSD) and forming our own school district. With the loss of Robert Thayer who serviced the Town of Sullivan for many years as a selectman, Gary and I are working hard to continue guiding the town. Robert's leadership will be greatly missed.

The flood left many of our roads and bridges impassible. Thanks to the hard work of Randy Smith and Paul Yawarski, our roads and all the bridges except for the bridge on Ferry Brook Road are repaired. FEMA provided 80% of the funds needed to make repairs to our roads and bridges, but even with this assistance our town is responsible for 25%, which represents over \$100,000.00. The town appreciates our emergency management and fire departments for their outstanding efforts in keeping our community safe while many of our roads were impassible for an extended period of time.

The Town of Sullivan has successfully withdrawn from the Monadnock Regional School District. Many hours were spent by the Sullivan Withdrawal Committee studying the options available to our community. As a community we are committed to providing the best education for our children for the best price. Under the direction of our temporary School Board the decision was made to send our children to Nelson Elementary, Keene Middle School (starting grade 7) and Keene High School. In March the town will vote to elect School Board members. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered their time both on the Sullivan Withdrawal Committee and our temporary School Board.

In the upcoming year our town will need to work hard to tighten up our spending to pay for unforeseen costs associated with a variety of situations. Flood costs and expenses related to becoming our own school district will be a challenge for us to raise/allocate funds for. The town of Sullivan will need to buy back the Sullivan School building's upgrades which are estimated at \$185,000.00 per our withdrawal agreement. Legal fees for the withdrawal have far exceeded the original \$10,000.00 appropriated last March. The town will also have to pay for the polling that was required for each town to vote on our withdrawal from MRSD. I caution our town about spending monies on unnecessary expenses so that we can responsibly pay off our debts.

May of our town buildings had repairs done this year. The library was painted and repairs made to the sills. The town hall also had repairs done to repair rot, replace doors and flood lighting was upgraded for safety reasons and cost efficiency.

Sullivan volunteers are an important asset to the community. All our boards, commissions and committees have continued to support and protect our community this year. I want to encourage our citizens to consider becoming a candidate for our school board. Working together our combined skill sets will make a difference to our children's education. The Board of Selectmen would like to thank our administrative assistant Karen Luebke who works diligently for our community.

Article 2

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$215,710 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$251,930 for the maintenance of town highways and bridges for the ensuing year. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$70,000 for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$57,500 for repairs to roads/bridges as a result of the May 29th, 2012 flood. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$43,920 for the operation of the Police Department. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of 32,150 for the operation of the Fire and Rescue Department. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$26,460 to provide and maintain the Public Library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds as provided. *(Majority vote required)*

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Bituminous-Surfaced Roads. Selectmen recommend \$15,000. *(Majority vote required)*

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Highway Equipment. *(Majority vote required)*

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$9,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Repairs to Town Buildings. *(Majority vote required)*

BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Town of Sullivan officially adopted a budget committee in accordance with the provisions of NH RSA 32:14. The budget committee is "to assist voters in the prudent appropriation of Public funds" (RSA 32:1). The budget committee analyzes the appropriation requests from the selectmen and various town departments and, for the first time the school district, in such detail as to determine the annual amounts necessary to properly manage town and school district affairs with the goal to keep the tax load manageable. After conferring with the selectmen and department heads and the school board, the budget committee prepares its recommended town and school budgets then holds public hearings. The public hearings are an opportunity for taxpayers to learn about the department's and school district's requests and the budget committee's recommendations and to request consideration for additions or deletions from the proposed budgets. After the public hearings the budget committee adopts its recommended budgets which are posted with the annual meeting warrants.

The Sullivan Budget Committee consists of Peg Martin, John Bolles, Bill Lindamood, Dave Jacway and Al Merrifield, chairman. This year's budget review began with an organizational meeting on January 15, 2013, with the Selectmen's administrative assistant Karen Luebke and school district representative Stephanie Jacques-Kline. The budget committee received the town department requests and selectmen's recommendations and met with the selectmen on January 29, 2013 and heads of the larger departments (Library, Fire, Police, Highway) on February 5, 2013 to review their requests. After the meetings the budget committee drafted its recommended budget and set a public hearing for February 12, 2013. After the public hearing the budget committee adopted a recommended budget to be placed before the Town Meeting. The school district also set a public hearing for February 12, 2013. After the public hearing the budget committee met with school district representatives on February 19, 2013 to further review the requests and public comments and adopted a recommended budget to be placed before the School District Meeting

This year's recommended town budget seeks to maintain the level of service provided in recent years. It provides a small increase in wages for town employees and officers but cuts back in a number of areas, such as funding some of the capital reserve accounts, to offset the unexpected expense of the flood in May, of which \$55,000 is included in this year's budget.

This is the first school district budget to be prepared by the school board and reviewed by the budget committee. The recommended budget funds some one-time expenses that will cause the school tax rate to rise this year. Without these costs and with more experience with actual costs, future budgets are expected to decline.

Planning Board

The year started off with the appointment of a new chairman following the expiration of Bob Switzer's term as chairman and his decision to resign from the board after serving 13 years of dedicated service. Bob continues to serve the Town in other capacities.

In June the Board reluctantly accepted the resignation of Michelle Degree after 9 years of service to the Town. The Sullivan Planning Board currently consists of Ann Sweet, Secretary, Dave Jakway, Laura Lewandowski, Mark Smith, Kevin Wheeler, Gary Patnode, Selectman's Representative and Steve Hamilton, Chairman. We can always use new members. Volunteer, support our community.

During the year we had two lot line adjustments. In August the Board reviewed and approved a lot line adjustment between the properties of Steven and Carol Sullivan and the Sullivan Center for Sustainable Agriculture. In January the Board reviewed and approved a lot line adjustment between William Paju and Joseph Fitzpatrick.

The main focus of the Planning Board during this past year and the next two years going forward is and will be the update of the Master Plan of 2005. The Land Use Regulation 674:3 requires towns to update their Master Plan every 5 to 10 years. The Master Plan is a document that serves to guide the overall character, physical form, growth, and development of a community. It provides guidance to local officials making decisions on budgets, ordinances, capital improvements, zoning subdivision matters, and other growth issues.

During the past year the Board began discussions on the update of the 2005 Master Plan in March. To date we have reviewed, made updates and revisions on the following chapters: the Introduction, What is a Master Plan, History and Location, Goals and Objectives, Housing, Economic Environment, Land Use in Sullivan, and Land Use and Conservation.

A new state requirement to the Master Plan is a Vision Statement. To help the Board in developing and writing a Vision Statement for the Town we distributed a survey form at the Special School Election on November 27th and we also included the survey in the January/February edition of the Town Newsletter. It is not too late to help us out by completing the survey and returning it to the Town Hall.

A special thank you and appreciation goes out to the following:

Chris Pratt, our Town Historian for rewriting the History chapter which covers over 200 plus years.

Switzer for inputting all the updates and changes in digital form.

Ann Sweet for her tireless commitment and dedication to the Town. Her efforts and support during the 2005 update of the Master Plan has continued during the 2015 update. Her efforts in gathering all the necessary data is greatly appreciated.

SULLIVAN OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

Again in 2012 the Town experienced another heavy rain storm that left all but a few roads seriously damaged. Within a day the May storm devastated roads and left many residents stranded at home for days. The Sullivan Office of Emergency Management opened the Emergency Operations Center at the request of the Fire Department to monitor conditions and report them to the State Office. Sullivan was one of the hardest hit towns in the area. This was confirmed during a meeting and a tour of the town with Governor Lynch and representatives from NH-Office of Emergency Management, FEMA and the NH-DOT.

Our Highway Department along with a number of local contractors worked endlessly to get our roads passable again. Due to an illness, I was unable to deal with much of the aftermath such as the FEMA meetings or paperwork so our Road Agent, Randy Smith, took the lead and did a fantastic job. We all thank you Randy.

Continuing (annual) updates were made to the Emergency Operations Plan, Hazard Mitigation Plan and the POD plan.

In 2012 saw an increase in emergency calls, with a total of 102 calls and again we experienced a significant rain storm that devastated many town roads.

Our Mission Statement; "To provide the best service possible to the Town of Sullivan through continuous improvement in training, certifications and equipment".

Sullivan Fire & Rescue is very active with weekly training and meetings, maintaining our equipment in a constant state of readiness and various events to further support our community. We invite you to stop by on Wednesday nights for a visit and new members are always welcome.

- THE CALLS -

SFR responded to a total of 102 calls for Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Fire & Rescue, Mutual Aid as well as non emergency Service calls. Of these calls, 43 were for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for trauma and non trauma incidents which accounted for the majority of responses, 18 Mutual Aid Calls to other communities and 41 Fire, Rescue & Forestry calls. During the May Rain Storm the members manned the Emergency Operations Center and responded to 8 dispatched Flood related calls and numerous requests for assistance in a two day period.

Not reported in the call log are the numerous requests for other services such as home inspections at the request of homeowners or their insurance companies or for the State, and the annual fire safety inspection of the Sullivan School.

The department maintained an average response time of 7 minutes. The response time is the elapsed time from the moment we are paged to the time we arrive on scene. Calls average in length from 1 hour on an EMS call and up to 12 hours on fire related calls.

- THE TRAINING -

All members participated in our required annual Blood Borne Pathogen and SCBA training. CPR and AED recertification was also completed in 2012. Members also participated in regional training, spring and fall sessions at Meadowood Fire School, in house training and drills, and our annual Forestry Training. Our in house training included Auto Extrication drills, SCBA training, pump training and EMS training.

In closing I would like to express my gratitude to you our residents for your continuing support of Sullivan Fire & Rescue Department, the membership for their continued dedication to the Town, to the member's families, the Selectmen, and the Police and Highway Departments. As many of you know for the past 14 months I have been dealing with an illness and recovering for numerous surgeries. I would especially like to thank Capt. Mike Blanchard for stepping up and filling in for me.

Police Department

It is that time of year again, when we are asked to sum up the past year for informational purposes. I would like to share with the citizens of Sullivan some of the issues that the Police Department has faced in 2012.

We received over 124 calls at the station, 370 calls at my home, over 300 emails and over 1000 fax transmissions. These numbers are almost double what 2011 brought.

Additionally we handled 9 motor vehicle accidents and assisted NH State Police and Cheshire County Sheriff's Department on 4 other accidents in Nelson, Sullivan and Roxbury. We responded to several fire and rescue calls.

Domestic disturbances totaled 5 for 2012 resulting in 3 arrests.

We were able to purchase a new 2013 Ford Explorer Police Interceptor as the old 2002 Ford Crown Victoria was in poor condition.

Aaron Collette will be attending the Part-Time Police Academy in July 2013 and currently volunteers with the Sullivan Police Department.

We look forward to serving the people of Sullivan in this new year of 2013. 2012 Highway Department Report

Jan – Feb

Jan 3rd, ARC Mechanical came and began to install an outside wood boiler at the Highway Garage. The wood boiler was a result of Sullivan's Energy Committee study and subsequent government grant awarded to the Town of Sullivan to reduce Sullivan's energy consumption. The first firing of the wood boiler was January 18th. ARC Mechanical completed installation on the wood boiler on January 19th. The wood boiler and installation cost was \$53,000. The Highway Department cost with labor and materials was \$9,223.39.

January had many small snowstorms and freezing rain events. Temperatures in the 50 degrees on January 24 turned gravel roads to mud. Equipment was serviced the first 2 weeks of February. Gravel roads stiffened back up and were leveled with the grader.

February 24, Henniker Crushed Stone delivered 286.65 ton of stone for mud season. The rain and freezing rain events outnumbered snowstorms for February.

March – April

The Highway Department met with paving companies to get prices for paving the portion of South Road that was reconstructed last year. F.W. Whitcomb's was the low bidder. We had 4 days of snow, Feb. 29-March 3rd then it turned to rain. Weight restrictions were placed on roads March 7th. March 8th was 50 degrees and temperatures climbed to the 60 degrees on March 14th. These temperatures for so many days set the stage for the worst mud season in a long time, nearly one end of the gravel road to the other. It was as frustrating for us as it was for residents. Grading, raking and adding crushed stone continued through the duration of mud season. The 3rd week of March was in the seventies and eighties. By April 5th gravel roads were back to normal, dry, dusty and tough to grade. Road weight restriction was lifted April 9th. Sanders were oiled and put away for the season. Ditches were cleaned on South Road at Woodbury's Hill. Phil's Tree Service was hired to cut trees on Valley Road, Hubbard Road, and South Road. It took several days to clean up brush and wood.

May – June

Town Cleanup trash was taken to Keene Recycling . 1,100 pounds of trash, 1 computer monitor, 18 tires and 2 batteries. Work resumed on the South Road construction area. Stumps were pulled, more underdrain was installed, ledge was blasted, culverts were replaced, brush was cut, 51 triaxle loads (1,181.59 tons) of gravel was added. South Road was ready for paving May 25th. Tuesday, May 29th the Flood of 2012 began and within four hours 11 of Sullivan's town roads along with sections of NH DOT's

Centre Street and Route 9 were closed. With the help of several local contractors stranded Sullivan residents were able to get out by the evening of May 31st. F.W. Whitcomb called to see if they could come pave South Road. We had to cancel paving at that point because of the storm damage. On June 8th all contractors were done. Damaged roads were passable. Time was needed to assess roads and figure out where we were financially. Work continued by Sullivan Highway workers only.

June 19th, S.W. Cole Engineering was hired to do a Hydraulic Analysis and Wetland Permit for Ferry Brook Bridge. Karen Luebke and I went to the first FEMA meeting at the Keene Library on June 27th. Sullivan Fire and Rescue volunteers donated their time to help flush culverts with the fire truck that were plugged with gravel.

July – August

Along with the flood of water came a flood of paper work. The first meeting with FEMA's Project Administrator for Sullivan, Doug Dowie was July 11th. The next three days were spent going over each damaged road. We covered repairs already completed, and repairs that needed to be completed. Repairs that Sullivan Highway could do without costing money continued while FEMA was making assessments. One day a week for 6 weeks was spent cutting, splitting and piling wood so the wood boiler would have dry wood to burn next winter.

August 2, Doug Dowie of FEMA delivered some of the Project Work Sheets. Final flood repairs could begin on some roads. Along with the Project Worksheets came some assistance funding of 75% of the total cost of each road. The final meeting with our FEMA representative was Aug. 22nd. FEMA's total Flood Damage Assessment was \$408,176.66. The Town of Sullivan would have to come up with approximately \$100,000.00 of that, so frustrating! Met with paving companies to get bids on paving flood damaged areas. The bids came in a lot higher than FEMA estimates. The progress on Ferry Brook Bridge was coming along painfully slow, losing optimal weather conditions for replacement this year.

Sept. – Oct.

Final flood repairs continued on gravel roads, with the flood damaged pavement repair bids coming in higher than we had anticipated. In discussions with the Board of Selectmen, we realized we would have to do those repairs also. Sullivan Highway began pavement repairs on Sept. 13 and finished on Oct. 2nd. Our focus returned to South Road construction area and on Saturday the 13th of October, F.W. Whitcomb began to pave. Paving was completed Monday Oct. 15th. After being delayed by the flood it was finally complete. A total of 1,815.24 tons, 76 dump truck loads of asphalt in two days. Flood repairs on gravel roads resumed only to be interrupted by Hurricane Sandy. Strong winds and a two day rain total of 3.2" only caused minor damage. Some tree parts down and ditchline scouring. Some Sullivan residents were without power for up to five days.

Nov. – Dec.

The final flood repairs began on Boulder Road, digging out culverts, fixing culvert headers that were washed out, adding gravel and grading. Five hundred cubic yards of winter sand was purchased mixed with salt and covered. K.A. Stevens of Newport, NH was the low bidder for the Ferry Brook Bridge Replacement, but was still considerably more than FEMA estimates. We met them on site Nov. 9th to further discuss the project. The corrected wetland permit for Ferry Brook Bridge Replacement was finally received. Pot holes were filled around Town. Leaves were blown from ditches on most roads. Gravel paid for by the Town of Stoddard was added to the upper section of Boulder Road and leveled with the grader. Bore testing of soil was done at Ferry Brook Bridge site. Trees were cut and brush was chipped around bridge site. We began shouldering the new pavement on South Road Dec. 3rd and finished Dec. 7. K.A. Stevens moved equipment in to Ferry Brook Bridge and began some site work. Some sections of gravel roads were graded and raked because of thawing temperatures several times in December. The first plowing was Dec. 17th. Dec. 19th underdrain was placed in Cross Road to fix a water problem. Two snow storms the last week of December ended the year.

There are so many Paul and I would like to thank for helping the Highway Department get through this year:

Sullivan Fire and Rescue, Mike Blanchard, Matt Burke, Rick Plankey, Erik Kazlouskas, Scott Lake, and Joe Andrews helping flush out all the plugged culverts in town.

J.A. Bolles Construction, Ed Csenge & Son, Hubner Bros. Construction, Rawson Construction, Del Oullette and Son, Tim Sargent, Town of Nelson Highway Department, for helping repair the flood damage.

Shelia Smith for all the nights and weekends going through truck and time slips.

The Sullivan residents for being patient while flood repairs were being made.

The flood this year really set the Town of Sullivan back. First, financially and secondly with the premature deterioration of the roads. Valley Road was the only good road in town, now even that is reduced to patches. Many of the gravel roads affected are at a lower elevation than before the flood. It will take many years of work and resources to slowly get back to pre-flood condition. That is the toughest realization to accept. We would much rather see that much money going to improve roads rather than patching old rough roads. I hope for a better year in 2013.

Public Library

The library building underwent an exterior renovation this past summer and fall. The sills on the east and west sides of the building were badly damaged and were replaced. The carpentry work was completed by Earl Creasy. A number of damaged trimboards and clapboards were replaced. The shutters which had been in grave disrepair have been removed. The building was scraped and painted by Stebbins Painting.

The other large project the building underwent was the replacement of the ballasts and lamps for more energy efficient ones. The Energy Committee and the Friends of the Library met with the trustees to discuss the possibility of addressing some of the results of the audit that had been done on all of the town buildings and a savings program through PSNH Small Business Energy Efficiency Solutions and LighTec. The costs not covered through the project grant were paid by the Friends of the Sullivan Public Library.

The juvenile and young adult book collections were weeded and the shelves appear much neater. The adult and picture book collections are partially weeded.

A new HP computer was purchased to update the one purchased in 2001 that is used by the public; a new flat panel monitor was also purchased. The trustees opted not to purchase speakers. Instead, earphones may be purchased from the librarian if needed.

The Wi-Fi connection was opened to the public and 2 licensed copies of MS Office 2010 were purchased for both library computers.

Due to budget cuts at the state level, the NH State Library had to drop some of its services to public libraries. The databases were affected by the cuts and we no longer have access to Newsbank. The public does have access to EBSCO databases and the library has joined consortiums in order to offer downloadable eBooks and audiobooks and Ancestry.com.

The library co-applied for a Kids, Books and the Arts Grant again with the Gilsum Public Library and we were able to have storyteller Simon Brooks perform at the Access summer program held at the Gilsum School. The program was open to the public.

The library offered a summer reading program this year. The theme for children was Dream Big, Read! For young adults it was Own the Night and for adults the theme was Between the Covers. We also had our annual contest with Gilsum and Sullivan read the most pounds of books this summer The Coveted Ice Cream Cup is back in Sullivan for 2013!

The Third Thursday Book Group continues to be active. The library has extra copies of the month's book and the group is open to the public.

The library continues its outreach to the youth in town by bringing story programs to the after school and summer program at the Gilsum School.

The librarian and trustees are appreciative of the support from our community through the various gifts of time spent

volunteering, gently used reading materials and monetary gifts.

Conservation Commission

Another successful roadside clean up was held again in April as volunteers helped pick up 1100 pounds of trash along our roads. Afterwards the volunteers enjoyed a luncheon at the town hall. Hazardous household contaminants can be disposed of, free of charge, at the Keene Transfer Station. Drop-off dates for 2013 can be found listed in the Keene Sentinel and on the town's website.

Water was one of the major topics this year with the massive rain fall and subsequent flooding in May. The commission worked with the Road Agent, who did an outstanding job coordinating the rebuilding of our roads, and the Selectmen to expedite any permits needed to begin the rebuilding process. The commission would like to thank the town staff, boards, departments and all the contractors who put in many hours towards this daunting endeavor. The roads in Winch Town Forest were no exception and eroded heavily due to the failing water bars and ditches. This happened just as the timber was being marked for the timber harvest later in the summer. Built into the harvest plan was the repairing of these roads. By the first heavy rain in August the grass was up and the new ditches and water bars performed as designed.

Forester, Swift Corwin oversaw the timber harvest and he and his crew did an exceptional job with the cut and road repairs. The almost over-mature Red Pine was cut at the perfect time and yielded a high price at the mill. Though the landscape may look very different today from last spring, the future quality of the forest and wildlife habitat will be greatly improved. The commission sponsored a post harvest tour of the logging operation last fall and a hike through the Town Forest is planned for this spring. Great views of Monadnock and Pitcher Mts. can now be seen above the Meeting House Monument.

The commission continued to fund a naturalist educator from the Harris Center to teach at the Gilsum School this year and helped the ACCESS after school program start worm composting as part of their recycling and gardening programs. We supported the multi-town water quality testing program for the Ashuelot River again, which helps monitor water quality along the river.

Our meetings are open to all and we welcome anyone interested in coming to a meeting, or becoming a member. Meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the town hall. Check out our bulletin board for upcoming workshops, hikes, and other things of interest in the Monadnock area. Copies of Sullivan's Natural Resource Inventory can be purchased upon request or obtained from the library.

ENERGY COMMITTEE 2012

- Followed up final paper work with installer of energy efficient boiler at town garage and celebrated Randy Smith's firing up the boiler with interested townspeople on January 28.
- Prepared for Town Meeting approval an article to establish a Capital Reserve Fund to upgrade energy efficiency of the Library: \$5,000. Adopted at Town Meeting March 13.
- Attended March 31 Regional Energy Conference. Jeff Brooks learned about an energy calculator that enables decision makers to determine best timing for an energy savings project. "It is usually better to do projects right away and lock in the savings as soon as possible."
- Learned at a regional energy sponsored by SWRPC in April about Monadnock Energy Resources Initiative to collaborate on installation of solar collectors for hot water, encouraged in particular by Temple Energy Committee..
- PSNH sent its contractor LighTec in September to re-examine the lighting needs of town buildings. The Trustees of the library decided, with funding from the Friends of the Library, to make the energy-saving upgrades, which were completed December 20.
- Met in November with the selectmen to review PSNH recommendations for lighting efficiency upgrades for remaining town buildings. Selectmen decided to wait for experience of the library.
- Energy use for 2012 cost about \$36,000 for the 4 town buildings.

The committee welcomes new members.

Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee

2012 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES). We strive to be educated in a broad array of issues associated with the River and its watershed. We hope to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

The volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program continued for its twelfth season, in conjunction with the DES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP). We sampled twelve sites along the River's 64-mile length, as well as three sites along the South Branch in Swanzey, for temperature, pH, total phosphorus, dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. The costs of testing equipment and lab analyses were covered by contributions from Conservation Commissions along the River, Trout Unlimited, and DES. ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading into a five-month effort of monthly sampling May through September. E. coli samples were obtained June through September. River water quality improvement is noted by a continuing decline in total phosphorus, but E. Coli data continue to be inconclusive. The pH readings were slightly higher (less acidic) this year, but conductivity was generally higher. Data can be viewed at <http://des.nh.gov/organization/divisions/water/wmb/vrap/data.htm>. This year, Hinsdale high school students joined us for a day of monitoring, and ARLAC gave a presentation on our water quality monitoring program to the Surry Village Charter School. We also presented to the joint committee of the Keene Planning Board and the Municipal Services, Facilities and Infrastructure Committee on the effects of development in Keene on the Ashuelot River water quality.

A mandated task, ARLAC reviews and comments on state permit applications within the River corridor that have potential impacts on the River. This year, ARLAC submitted comments on eighteen projects proposed in Washington, Marlow, Keene, Swanzey, and Winchester. We are also collaborating with the Connecticut River Watershed Council and other stakeholders in reviewing plans for the relicensing of the Bellows Falls, Vernon and Turners Falls dams.

Two ongoing projects are the restoration or removal of the West Street Dam in Keene and the Ashuelot River Stream Crossing Improvement Project (ARSCIP). ARLAC continues to support dam removal based on the environmental benefits demonstrated in other dam removal projects in the Ashuelot and other rivers. We also support the efforts of the Keene Conservation Commission to research the possible effects of dam removal on upstream wetlands and the dwarf wedgemussel. ARSCIP is spearheaded by Trout Unlimited, in collaboration with a number of other stakeholders. The anticipated removal of three severe barriers to fish passage in streams throughout the Ashuelot watershed did not occur in 2012, superceded by restoration work needed after storm Irene. It is hoped that funding will be found to re-instate this project in 2013.

ARLAC hosted presentations on a possible demonstration hydropower project located at the West St. Dam, an upcoming photographic essay of the River, and SWRPC's project assessing the capability of road-stream crossings to withstand flooding. We attended a state-wide meeting of LAC's and continue to work with Keene State College (KSC) students on River projects.

River cleanup took place on October 5th and 6th in conjunction with KSC Community Service Day. More than 300 volunteers participated, removing more than 2,500 pounds of trash and 23 shopping carts from the Ashuelot & Branch Rivers in Keene and Swanzey, and Beaver Brook in Keene.

ARLAC lost one of our members with the passing of Dan Carr in June. We will miss his insights, good humor and dedication. ARLAC meets monthly in the evening of the third Tuesday in Keene. The Local Advisory Committee invites citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives with any concerns or input.
