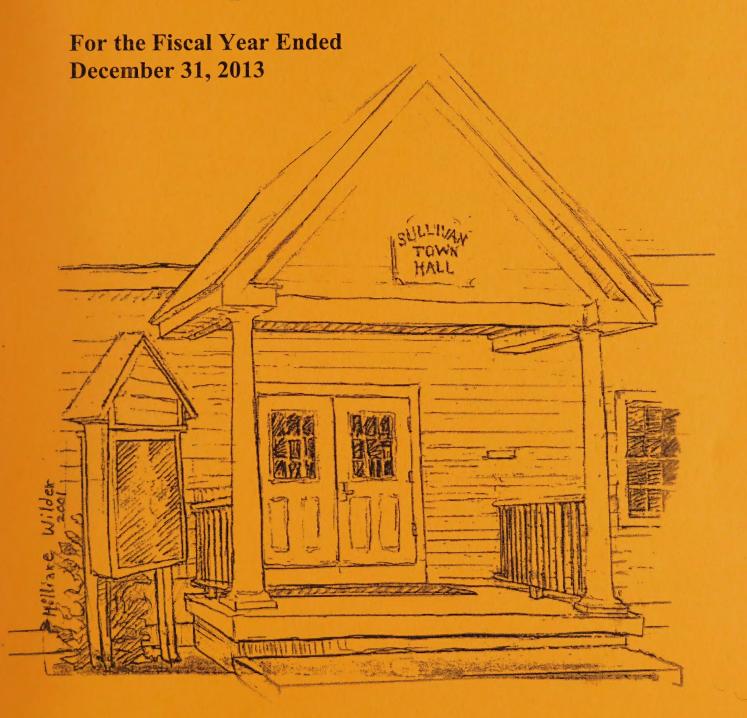

Board of Selectmen

The Board of Selectmen, Mark Paquette, Laura Merrifield and I, would like to extend our sincere thanks to all members of this community who participate in our town government. Thank you to all of the department heads, town employees and the many volunteers who contribute countless hours to making the Town of Sullivan such a great place to live.

Despite all the challenges faced in a struggling economy our town maintains a strong economic outlook for 2014. Although there are a number of factors that contribute to this, a large part of it is due to the diligent oversight of the budgets by the department heads, as well as scrutiny by the Budget Committee and the Board of Selectmen. Good Joh and Thank You to All.

One of the major accomplishments in 2013 was the completion of the new Ferry Brook Bridge. From the start of the construction in March to its completion at the end of July, our Road Agent and Administrative Assistant spent many hours working to maneuver through all the challenges of dealing with State and Federal regulations required to complete the process. The year 2013 also brought the closing of the Sullivan Elementary School, the withdrawal from the Monadnock School District and the formation of our own SAU. Now our children can experience an educational journey which will include the Nelson Elementary School, Keene Middle School, and Keene High School. Although the Selectmen were not directly involved in the process of separating from the Monadnock Regional School District, we believe it was a huge undertaking spearheaded by a group of townspeople dedicated to the cause. Thank you to the members of the Withdrawal Committee and to our newly formed School Board Committee. Good luck to all of our students in their new surroundings. We hope they have endless opportunities in their future of lifelong learning.

Another notable event occurring in September of 2013 was the unanticipated resignation of Karl Wheeler, after approximately 40 years of serving as the Chief of Police in Sullivan. The Board immediately began the task of researching the different options for the town's Police coverage. As a result of our research and after conducting a public meeting the Selectmen determined the best choice for the town was to contract with the Cheshire County Sheriff's Department. We encourage you to read the Police Departments report for additional information on the decision making process and the details on the coverage the Sheriff's Department will now provide. On behalf of the Board of Selectmen, I would like to thank Karl for his many years of service to this town and wish him good health and prosperity in the years ahead.

The Selectmen are planning some minor renovations in the town office in 2014. The room that was previously used as a Selectmen's office, currently being used as a storage area, is set to become a Selectmen's office again. This will help the Selectmen in the completion of ongoing collaborative projects and provide a place to work between meetings. We hope this change will also make us more accessible to the townspeople between meetings. Staffing changes will also be occurring in 2014. We are currently reviewing applications for a new Administrative Assistant after receiving notification that Karen Luebkeman will be leaving her position in the spring. We would like to thank her for all the work she has done for the town. I would like to note that one area in our budget has seen a substantial increase over the past year; this area is our legal expenses. We are fortunate to live in a town where we are not overburdened by rules and regulations. However, there are town ordinances and State Statutes that we are required to follow. As a Board we must enforce these rules and regulations which we try to do in a reasonable and non-biased manner. We ask that you visit the Town of Sullivan website and under the Planning Board section you can reference a list of documents, there you will find most of the Town's regulations and permit requirements. Always

feel free to contact the Selectmen or Board Members if you have any questions. A substantial amount of money was spent in 2013 addressing issues which involved a failure to comply with regulations in our Community Planning Ordinance. Many problems, which eventually lead to costly legal fees, could be avoided simply by following these rules and regulations and by being considerate as to how your actions may affect your neighbors.

Lastly, we encourage those of you who are not currently volunteering their time to the town to consider doing so in 2014. Much of our town's ability to function effectively is due to the many residents who volunteer their time and in doing so they become an intricate part of the town's government. Volunteering saves taxpayer dollars and also gives each person a better insight and understanding as to what it takes to make Sullivan the town we are so proud to call our home!

Warrant 2014

To the inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, Tuesday the 11th day of March, next at 11:00 A.M. of the clock to act upon the following by written ballot: The polls not to close before 7:00 P.M.

Article 1

To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, Wednesday, the 12th day of March, next at 7:30 P.M. of the clock to act upon the following subjects.

Article 2

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$219,229 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year. Selectmen recommend \$219,804. (Majority vote required)

Article 3

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$256,881 for the maintenance of town highways and bridges for the ensuing year. Selectmen recommend \$257,381. (Majority vote required)

Article 4

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$85,000 for the reconstruction and resurfacing of bituminous-surfaced roads. (Majority vote required)

Article 5

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$31,985 for the operation of the Fire and Rescue Department. (Majority vote required)

Article 6

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$400 for the operation of the Sullivan Office of Emergency Management. (Majority vote required)

Article 7

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$36,350 for the operation of the Police Department. (Majority vote required)

Article 8

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$150 for services provided by the Monadnock Humane Society. (Majority vote required)

Article 9

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$26,724 to provide and maintain the Public Library services, and authorize the Library Trustees to receive and use supplemental funds as provided. (Majority vote required)

Article 10

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,943 for the operation of the Conservation Commission. (Majority vote required)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee recommended sum of \$1,600 for the operation of the Planning Board. Selectmen recommend \$1,225. (Majority vote required)

Article 12

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,000 for the operation of the Recreation Committee. (Majority vote required)

Article 13

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$6,300 for the care and maintenance of Town Cemeteries. (Majority vote required)

Article 14

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$1,500 for the Operation of the Trustee of Trust Funds. (Majority vote required)

Article 15

To see if the Town will vote to <u>discontinue the Insurance Trust Fund</u> created in 1987. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the town's general fund. (*Majority vote required*)

Article 16

To see if the Town will vote to <u>discontinue the First Response Fee Trust Fund</u> created in 1998. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the town's general fund. (*Majority vote required*)

Article 17

To see if the Town will vote to <u>discontinue the Town Wide Radio Capital Reserve</u> created in 1997. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the town's general fund. (Majority vote required)

Article 18

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Revaluation of the Town. (Majority vote required)

Article 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Highway Equipment. (Majority vote required)

Article 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Forest Fire Fighting Liabilities and Equipment Trust Fund. (Majority vote required)

Article 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$9,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Major Repairs to Town Buildings. (Majority vote required)

Article 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$3,500 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Breathing Apparatus. (Majority vote required)

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$5,350 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Fire Department Vehicles. (Majority vote required)

Article 24

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the selectmen recommended sum of \$15,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Bituminous-Surfaced Roads. Budget committee recommends \$10,000. (Majority vote required)

Article 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the budget committee and selectmen recommended sum of \$2,500 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Town Library Energy Efficiency. (Majority vote required)

Article 26

To see if the town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1 for the purpose of paying costs incurred during unforeseen town wide emergencies and natural disasters to be known as the Town Emergency Capital Reserve Fund, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 to be placed in this fund and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend. The selectmen recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required).

Article 27

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,500 per year for four years as compensation and recognition for long standing service by our retired Chief of Police, Karl Wheeler, during his 40 years of service. Not recommended by the Budget Committee or the Selectmen. (Majority vote required)

Article 28

To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of Agents and Committees as printed within the Annual Town Report.

Article 29

To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting and to listen to opinions of a purely advisory nature as regards the conduct of Town affairs for the ensuing year.

Budget Committee

The Sullivan Budget committee consists of John Bolles, Dave Jakway, Peg Martin, Bill Lindamood and Al Merrifield. This year's budget review began with an organizational meeting on January 9, 2014, with Selectmen Laura Merrifield and School Budget member Stephanie Jacques-Kleine. The first order of business was to elect Al Merrifield as Chairman. The draft town budget documents were distributed and a meeting schedule was adopted to review them.

On January 16, 2014, the Budget committee reviewed the proposed budgets for the Library with Chris Pratt, the Highway Department with Randy Smith, the Selectmen and Police Department with Gary Patnode, Mark Paquette and Laura Merrifield. This year's requests include a two percent cost of living increase for town employees.

On January 23, 2014, the Budget Committee reviewed the proposed budgets for the Conservation Commission with Eric White, the Planning Board with Steve Hamilton, the Cemetery with Mary and Ron Hull and the Fire Department with Al Henry. Anne Sweet, representing the town energy committee, supported the capital reserve request for funds to complete the Library energy project.

On January 30, 2014, the Budget Committee reviewed the proposed School District budget with Stephanie Jacques-Kleine, Toni Ellsworth, Risa Keene and Ken Dassau. As the school budget year runs until June 30, 2014, many figures for the first year are tentative at this time. Future budgets should have the advantage of more experience to aid in budget preparation. The Budget Committee would like to see next year's School District budget proposal in a format similar to the Town's with a line item break-out of expenses.

On February 13, 2014, the Budget Committee held a public hearing for the school and town budgets. Present were School Board members Stephanie Jacques-Kleine and Paul Bolduc, Selectmen Gary Patnode and Laura Merrifield and seven members of the public. The school budget and warrant articles and the town budget, warrant articles, capital reserves and a petitioned warrant article were each reviewed in detail with good discussion from the public. After the public hearing adjourned, the Budget Committee approved their recommended budgets. The recommended town budget seeks to maintain the level of service provided in recent years. It provides a cost of living increase for town employees and officers. The school budget reflects a decrease from last year's one-time expenses and fewer students attending Monadnock District's schools.

The Budget Committee thanks the Selectmen and School Board for preparing the annual budget appropriation requests and their cooperation during the review process.

Sullivan Fire & Rescue and Forestry

2013 saw a decrease in emergency calls, with a total of 78 calls, the majority were medical related.

Our Mission Statement; "To provide the best service possible to the Town of Sullivan through continuous improvement in training, certifications and equipment".

Sullivan Fire & Rescue (SFR) is very active with weekly training and meetings, maintaining our equipment in a constant state of readiness and various fund raising events to further support our community. We invite you to stop by on Wednesday nights for a visit and new members are always welcome. Elections of Officers were held at our December meeting with the following results.

- THE CALLS -

SFR responded to a total of 78 calls for Emergency Medical Services (EMS), Fire & Rescue, Mutual Aid as well as non-emergency Service calls. Of these calls, 27 were for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) for trauma and non-trauma incidents which accounted for the majority of responses, 25 Mutual Aid Calls to other communities and 26 Fire, Rescue & Forestry calls.

Not reported in the call log are the numerous requests for other services such as home inspections at the request of homeowners or their insurance companies as well as from the State for home inspections for example, foster care. Even though the school has been closed, I received a request from the Monadnock School District to complete the annual fire safety inspection of the Sullivan School. This was prior to leaving the district.

The following is a consolidated breakdown of the calls the department responded to in 2013:

Brush Fires-Mutual Aid: 4 Cover Assignment-Mutual Aid: 3

Auto Fire Alarms in Sullivan: 1

In the list above MVA stands for Motor Vehicle Accidents with or without injury. Mutual Aid calls are when SFR is called to assist other towns. Our primary Mutual Aid towns include Keene, Nelson, Gilsum, Stoddard, Harrisville and Marlow. Last year the majority of our mutual aid calls were to Keene and Stoddard. For service calls these could be anything for pumping a flooded basement, clearing the house of smoke from a backed up wood stove to the cat in a tree call. Yes, we do get called to help get Kitty out of the tree. This list is just a grouping of the calls and no two calls are ever the same.

The department maintained an average response time of 7 minutes. The response time is the elapsed time from the moment we are paged to the time we arrive on scene. Calls average in length from 1 hour on an EMS call and up to 12 hours on fire related calls.

- THE TRAINING -

All members participated in our required annual Blood Borne Pathogen and SCBA training. CPR and AED recertification was also completed in 2013. Members also participated in regional training, spring and fall sessions at Meadowood Fire School, in house training and drills, and our annual Forestry Training. Our in house training includes Auto Extrication drills, SCBA training, pump training and EMS training. Starting in 2014 the department has joined with the Towns of Harrisville, Nelson and Stoddard for monthly EMS training. This will be a two year program for recertification of all of our EMS personnel. By the end of the second year, our members will have completed all of the required continuing education hours and refresher courses necessary for recertification.

- FOR THE GOOD OF THE TOWN -

Over the years the department has been involved with various fund raising activities. In the past we have donated money back to the town in the form of equipment. Some of this includes funds for the new Brush Truck \$14,000 and the Thermal Imaging Camera \$5,000. In 2013 the fire company purchased and donated to the town a Massimo Meter for EMS. This meter will measure pulse rate, the percentage of oxygen in a person's blood as well as the percentage of carbon monoxide. The cost of this unit was just over \$5,000.

-FORESTRY-

Just as a reminder, Fire Permits are required for ALL types of outside burning. This includes brush piles, camp fires and portable fire pits. When the ground is covered with snow, fire permits are not required and burning may take place at any time of the day. All campfire permits issued in 2013 expired on Jan. 1, 2014 and must be renewed. Fire permits are available from the wardens at no cost to you and may be obtained from one of our Wardens. The Fire Wardens for 2014 are:

Police Department

On September 18, 2013, Chief Wheeler announced to town officials that he would be resigning from his position of Police Chief, effective at midnight, on Friday September 20th. The board would like to thank Karl for his many years of service to the town.

Finding the town with no certified police official, the Selectmen entered into a short-term agreement with the Cheshire County Sheriff's Department to provide interim services. During this period of time it allowed the Selectmen an opportunity to develop a list of options, identify what services the town needs, estimate costs, and take public comments at a meeting held at the town hall on December 17th.

During the interim period beginning September 2013 thru December 2013, the Sheriff's Office handled the following:

- 98 Calls for Service
- 18 Motor Vehicle Stops
- 4 Accidents
- 1 Investigation
- 0 Arrests
- Provided 44.5 hours of Police Services
- 36 Site/Building Checks

At the Selectmen's meeting on December 23, 2013, the Board reviewed all of the options and made the decision to have the Cheshire County Sheriff's Department provide contracted police services to the Town of Sullivan. The contract will cover a one year period that began on January 1, 2014, and will continue through December 31, 2014. The total cost for the annual coverage is "not to exceed" \$35,000.00.

The Cheshire County Sheriff's Department will provide the following:

- 1. The Sheriff will act as Chief of Police for Sullivan;
- 2. The County will provide, on average, 17.5 hour a week of police services;
- 3. Services may include, but are not limited to:
 - Patrols
 - Criminal Investigations
 - Prosecution
 - Town Special Events
 - Natural or man-made disasters/emergencies
 - Criminal record checks for pistol permits
 - The County will review and enforce applicable town ordinances

If you have any non-emergency questions you can contact the Sheriff's Department during their office hours of Monday thru Friday 8am to 4pm at 352-4238. For all emergencies please call 355-2000 to reach the Cheshire County Dispatch Center or 911 and either the Sheriff's Department or the State Police will be dispatched.

Highway Department

January - February

This year began with repairs on the 1987 John Deere Road Grader engine, along with minor repairs of the 1989 Chevrolet Dump Truck. The Ferry Brook Road was still closed south of Ferry Brook from the 2012 flood. K.A. Stevens contractor of the new bridge was very slowly continuing with the project. Mid January gravel roads thawed and had to be graded and raked to smooth ruts. The weather continued the pattern of subzero to snow then thawing and rain most of the winter. On January 30th crushed stone was purchased from Mitchell Sand and Gravel. The crushed stone was used the next two days as the temperature rose to 50 degrees. When the temperature dropped back to normal we were left with frozen culvert pipes and ice flows. February 6th and 7th Phil's Tree Service was hired to cut trees on Ferry Brook and South Road. Feb. 8th we got 18 inches of snow with blowing and drifting the next few days. The vehicles and sanders require attention from the busy workload they had had, so much freezing rain to snow or snow to freezing rain. Phil's Tree Service came back to South Road on Feb. 18th for one more day of tree cutting. February was one of the busiest months we have ever had at the Highway Department.

March-April

Winter still continued with snow, rain and mud. The wood and brush was cleaned up on South and Ferry Brook Roads. The weight restriction was placed on town roads March 7th. Crushed stone was placed on gravel roads where it was needed, mud season was here. We got 10 inches of snow on March 19th. Grading and raking of gravel took place as weather permitted. On March 29th K.A.Stevens poured concrete for the northern footing of the Ferry Brook Bridge. We cut, split and piled wood for next year's heating season. The wood shed was full April 5th. K.A. Stevens poured concrete on the northern abutment wall April 5th. We got 2 inches of snow April 12th along with some sleet and freezing rain. By Sunday April 14th most gravel roads had stiffened back up. That was one moth of mud season. April 15th some bridge steel was stolen from the worksite on Ferry Brook. K.A. Stevens poured the southerly footing April 16th and the southerly abutment wall April 18th for the Ferry Brook Bridge. The potholes were filled on paved roads. Paved roads were swept, turn-arounds were leveled out from winter plowing. Met with Dave Eckman about Ferry Brook Bridge inspection. Weight restrictions were lifted on April 29th. The trash from Town Cleanup was taken to Keene Recycling on April 30th. 1700 pounds trash, 62 tires, 1 t.v. Snow equipment and sanders were serviced and put away for the season.

May-June

Grading, raking and cleaning ditches on gravel roads was in full swing. Too much attention was needed at the Ferry Brook Bridge site. The design, elevation, skew, inferior building materials, workmanship, cost over runs were a headache to all who were involved. Some culverts were replaced on Bowlder Road. Several loads of scrap metal were taken to Scrap-it and money given to the Selectmen's Office. On May 10th the deck was poured on the Ferry Brook Bridge. The Highway Department cleaned up wood debris on

both sides of Price Road Bridge and fixed some abutment stones also. We had graded and raked all gravel roads several times. From May 22nd – May 25th we had a total of 4.1 inches of rain. We spent those rainy days out cleaning ditches, only received minor damage. The hazy hot humid weather with 90 degrees returned May 31st. Some culvert pipes that were still partially plugged from the 2012 flood were flushed again. On June 11th Mike Blanchard of the Sullivan Fire Department came with the fire truck and helped all day to get the most stubborn culverts clear. Thanks Mike! Pot holes were repaired again on paved roads and some waterways were cleaned. Several days of cutting and chipping brush on Ferry Brook Road while the road was still closed was completed. On June 27th Lafayette, Inc. of Vermont installed guardrails on Ferry Brook Bridge. The Highway department did a few days of final cleanup.

July - August

On July 2nd the Highway Department pulled the barricades and the bottom half of Ferry Brook Road was opened to through traffic. We didn't advertise it, but it sure didn't take long for the parade of traffic to come. July 3rd another flash of heavy rain. Sullivan received only minor damage compared to some towns to the west. Needless to say the next week would be spent repairing washouts on Boynton Road, Corey Mine Road, Gilsum Road, Cross Road and Bowlder Road. Hours and material lists were compiled to submit to FEMA for a second year in a row. More pictures, measurement, phone calls, repairs third week of July. With most repairs done, we went back to South Road finished fixing roadsides at several homes that were affected by the recent reconstruction as promised. We did the final grade and chloride on several gravel roads. Replaced another culvert on South Road. On July 30th Phillip Gladu donated his time to make welding repairs to the Chevy Dump truck and JD Backhoe. Thank you Phillip! On July 31st construction began at Dunn's Hill on Bowlder Road. Steep banks were lowered and sloped. August 6th I met with a FEMA representative for final review of Ferry Brook Bridge. August 13th Department of Labor came to inspect all Town facilities, only a handful of improvements were needed at the Highway Garage. August 14th went to FEMA meeting at the Keene Library for the July 3rd washouts. Two sections of Bowlder Road were re-graded. The salt shed interior walls were cleaned with a salt neutralizer twice. On August 27th a 4 foot culvert on Gilsum Road was replaced, it was a long day to get the road open before nightfall, final repair to the headers and asphalt were finished the next day. Work resumed at Dunn's Hill on Bowlder Road. Brush was cut, ditches were cleaned.

September - October

September 3rd Town employees went to a Blood Born Pathogen seminar at the Town Hall as mandated by the New Hampshire Department of Labor. September 4th Arlington Paving came to reclaim (grind) the existing pavement on Dunn's Hill. Culverts were replaced, large rocks were dug out of roadway, fabric, drainage, and gravel was added. September 12th we got 3.5 inches of rain. Minor scours of ditch lines. Brook's Hill on Ferry Brook Road got it the worst. Stone was purchased to repair the ditches. On September 13th Arlington Paving milled 1 ½ inches of asphalt from 2,000 feet of Valley Road. The millings were taken to Dunn's Hill and graded into the road base. On September 17th Arlington Paving paved 1,500 feet of Dunn's Hill on Bowlder Road, two courses approximately 440 tons of asphalt. They also repaved

the 2,000 feet of Valley Road with approximately 380 ton - that was a long day. We fixed driveways that were affected by the paving, pulled up stakes and cones.

The salt shed interior walls were sealed with an asphalt sealer. A section of underdrain was installed in Cross Road to dry up a vein of water in the roadway. This is the second one that's magically appeared since the 2012 Flood. Three culverts were replaced on the upper section of Bowlder Road. One of the culverts appeared to be an old riveted smokestack possibly from an old steam boiler.

On September 26-27th hardpack was placed on the shoulders of the new pavement on Bowlder and Valley Roads. Eight loads of gravel were added to upper Bowlder Road, purchased by the Town of Stoddard by our annual agreement.

On October 2nd I met with Richard Nicoletti of FEMA. We went over the July 3rd storm damage. Several roads were re-graded after a hard summer. Salt and road sand was ordered to be ready for the upcoming winter season. We got winter sand covered on October 10th. The Highway Department received the as-built Mylar of Ferry Brook Bridge. It was delivered to NH DOT Bridge Engineer for inspection by their department. Both trucks were serviced and repairs done for the winter season. On October 23rd we improved a drain on Old Apple Hill that had given us ice problems in the winter, then October 24th we repaired a similar one on Cross Road. The sanders and plow equipment was serviced and ready for winter.

On October 29-30th ditches were cleaned of leaves with the leaf blower. Both trucks were oil undercoated.

November - December

Problem ditches were cleaned, and many hills and corners on gravel roads were graded. A new bumper mounted light bracket for the F550 snow plow was made. We have had a tough time with the plow lights breaking while mounted on the fisher plow. We fired up the woodboiler for the first time November 12th. A used 2004 International dump truck with snow equipment was purchased from S.G. Reed, Inc. of Claremont, N.H. We have been looking for a replacement of the 1989 Chevrolet for a while. The Chevrolet was purchased used in 1999 and has given us service for the past 15 years. More leaves were blown from ditches with the leafblower. Bruce Beliveau was hired to sort out the 2-way radio problems we had. We had several dustings of snow and freezing rain events before Thanksgiving. That's a nice way to ease into winter. We get to test equipment before getting a severe Nor-easter. The first week of December we worked on 2004 International dump truck. We checked fluid levels, controls and manual. The second week of December, 4 events of freezing rain and dustings of snow. The first plowable snow was December 15th of 8 inches. December was a very active weather month requiring a lot of sand and salt.

Thank you to all who have helped this year.

Public Library

The energy efficient lighting installed at the end of December 2012 has resulted in lower electric bills for the library this past year.

An ongoing project, when patron activity is down, has been cross checking the titles on our shelves against our library holdings in the New Hampshire Union Public Access Catalog and adding the ones that are missing. Instructions on how to search for our library holdings in this online catalog were added to the library's web page.

The library web page was fine-tuned to be more user-friendly.

This spring the decision was made to stop adding videocassettes and books on audiocassette to our collection. They are no longer circulating well and the space can be used for other materials.

There were five children signed up for summer reading this year with one active reader. There was no attendance for story programs. We had noticed a drop in family and student use of the library the past couple of years. The librarian had used the opportunity to read to students at the after school program at the Gilsum School and to bring the summer reading program to the students during the summer program as an outreach to the youth in our community. The Monadnock School District closed that program at the end of June and it had a significant impact on the library's ability to bring services to our youth who are unable to attend library programs at the library.

Patron records went through a large purging process this past summer as records were recorded in a digitized format. If a patron had not visited the library in two years and the librarian was unable to verify that patron's address, the record was closed. This explains the significant drop in the number of registered patrons this year.

There is a small but active book group for adults that meets monthly at the library.

Peter and Jeanne Jeffries of the Walpole Historical Society have been holding genealogy workshops at the library and there is a small group who meets regularly. The library belongs to a consortium and has purchased access to Ancestry Library Edition. In November, we added HeritageQuest. Unlike Ancestry, which must be used at the library, HeritageQuest can be used from home by any of our cardholders.

After watching the days the library is used most often and learning that many Wednesday evenings we had no one using the library, the trustees made the decision to close the library on Wednesday evenings. The two hours were added to Thursday afternoon. Mondays and Thursdays continue to be our most used days.

People continue to use our wi-fi, sometimes in the library and other times when the building is closed.

The library belongs to the New Hampshire Downloadable Books Consortium and this continues to be well used by our patrons.

The library has a small but active Friends of the Library group.

The library is a member of the Nubanusit Cooperative. Every other month we rotate a collection of DVDs. This is a cost effective way to provide a variety of films for our patrons.

The support of our community members, especially in terms of gently used donations of materials, financial gifts and time and talent are very much appreciated.

Conservation Commission

Another successful roadside clean up was held again this spring as 35 volunteers helped pick up 1600 pounds of trash along our roads. Afterwards, the volunteers enjoyed a luncheon at the town hall.

Hazardous household contaminants can be disposed of, free of charge, at the Keene Transfer Station. Drop-off dates for 2014 can be found listed in the Keene Sentinel and on the town's website.

The commission continued to fund a naturalist educator from the Harris Center to teach at the Nelson School. We also supported the multi-town water quality testing program for the Ashuelot River again, which helps to monitor water quality along the river.

The Commission reviewed several "intent to cut" applications and wetland permits again this year. Luckily we were spared the devastation from heavy rains this year.

A member of the commission attended the annual meeting of NH Conservation Commissions and the round of workshops that followed. These workshops help inform members of new policies and issues that commissions may face.

The Commission worked with the Monadnock Conservancy and the Selectmen to establish two conservation easements off of South Rd. forever protecting 215 acres, including several fields with stunning views to the west. The Commission has decided to withdraw this year's submission of the warrant article for the capital reserve fund for "land conservation" as the town prioritizes financial challenges.

This past summer marked the sudden passing of longtime resident and commission member, Christa Patterson. We will remember her for her dedication to our community, her concern for the land- its history and its future- and her endless enthusiasm for sharing her passion for growing anything green.

Our meetings are open to all and we welcome anyone interested in coming to a meeting, or becoming a member. Meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the town hall. Check out our bulletin board for upcoming workshops, hikes, and other things of interest in the Monadnock area. Copies of Sullivan's Natural Resource Inventory can be purchased upon request or obtained from the library.

2013 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the State Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES). We strive to be educated in a broad array of issues associated with the River and its watershed. We hope to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities.

The volunteer Ashuelot River water quality monitoring program continued for its thirteenth season, in conjunction with the DES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP). We sampled eleven sites along the River's 64-mile length, as well as three sites along the South Branch in Swanzey, for temperature, pH, total phosphorus (TP), dissolved oxygen, turbidity, chloride, and conductivity. The costs of lab analyses were covered by contributions from Conservation Commissions along the River and DES. ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading into a five-month effort of monthly sampling May through September. E. coli samples were obtained June through September. Data collected generally reflect improvement in River water quality noted by a continuing decline in total phosphorus, generally lower E. coli levels, and slightly higher pH readings, though pH continues to be lowest in Gilsum and the reaches upstream. Collections during the July 3-inch rainfall largely demonstrated the negative effects of run-off on the River: E.coli levels were well above acceptable limits, TP were at levels of concern, and turbidity readings were at their highest. Working with Keene State College, we hope this year to differentiate the sources of E. coli to determine whether they are of human or animal origin. A mandated task, ARLAC reviews and comments on state permit applications within the River corridor that have potential impacts on the River. This year, ARLAC submitted comments on twelve projects proposed in Washington, Gilsum, Keene, Swanzey, and Winchester. We submitted comments to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in support of proposed studies surrounding the re-licensing of the Northfield Mountain and Turners Falls Hydroelectric projects. Issues of concern are migratory fish passage, fluctuating water levels and spread of invasive species. We continue to advocate for River access with new canoe/kayak access being established in 2014 with the Swanzey-Winchester Route 10 bridge construction.

We continue to actively follow the debate regarding the restoration or removal of the West Street Dam in Keene. We await the study reports as commissioned by the Keene Conservation Commission researching the possible effects of dam removal on upstream wetlands and the dwarf wedgemussel. We also met with Keene State College students working on West Street Dam related projects.

We attended a state-wide meeting of LAC's where Swanzey representative, Stephen Stepenuck, received special recognition for his services to the Rivers Management and Protection Program. He, Pablo Fleischmann and Barbara Skuly were also recognized by the NH Department of Environmental Services for their longevity of service.

River cleanup took place on October 11th in conjunction with KSC Community Service Day. More than 100 volunteers participated, removing more than 3,300 pounds of trash and 35 shopping carts from the Ashuelot & Branch Rivers in Keene and Swanzey, and Beaver Brook in Keene.

ARLAC meets monthly in the evening of the third Tuesday in Keene. The Local Advisory Committee invites citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives with any concerns or input.

Energy Committee

The Sullivan Energy Committee in March arranged for a representative of ReVision Energy to talk to townspeople about possibilities for saving energy (and money) by having solar panels affixed to roof or structure set in the ground. Homeowners can benefit markedly from using solar energy, and there are discounts and tax credits to help with the cost. Among the town buildings, the fire station offers the roof with the best angle for catching the sun's rays.

At its June meeting, the energy committee discussed writing an energy chapter for the currently being updated Master Plan. Committee members also talked about encouraging the selectmen to find ways to improve insulation in the town hall and completing insulation in the library.

At its September meeting, the committee listened to Tom Scherpa talk about the energy-saving steps he and his wife had taken when building their new home to reduce energy consumption, including making most of exposure to the sun's warming rays, installation of a geothermal heating system, and making sure electrical fixtures are compatible with LED light bulbs.

At the end of the year, all people in town were invited to a January Button Up workshop in Keene at which many energy-saving adaptations were presented.

Energy usage in the town buildings in 2013 cost \$31,494.

New members of the committee will be most welcome.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Selectmen
Town of Sullivan, New Hampshire

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, the major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Sullivan, New Hampshire as of December 31, 2012, and for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town of Sullivan, New Hampshire's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with evidence sufficient to express an opinion or provide any assurance.
