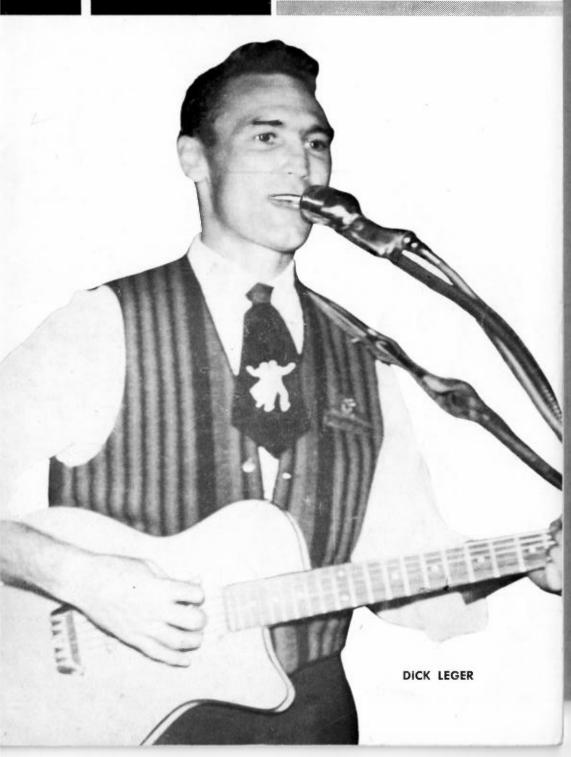

# random thoughts on square a

# square and round dancing

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All square dancers that have learned how to dance were still dancing today?

Fifty per cent were still dancing today?

Twenty-five per cent? . . . Twenty per cent?

Limbo! How low can we go?

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All callers would call to the whole floor of dancers?
Fifty per cent of the callers would?
Twenty-five per cent? . . . Twenty per cent?
Limbo! How low can we go?

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

Everywhere, everyone were dancing the combination of the same twenty basics?
Everyone were dancing the same thirty basics or less?
Everyone were dancing the same fifty or a hundred?
Crazy, man! How high can we go?

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All dancers were callers?
All callers were dancers?
Everyone liked music so much they'd step on it . . uh, call on it . .
Oh, well, just realize it's there to do both!

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All callers were calling at danceable tempos of 124 to 136 beats a minute?

All callers were calling at tempos between 116 and 144 beats a minute?

All callers were clipping along over 144 and cutting time to boot? Walk, don't run! I mean, run, don't walk! . . . uh . . . do something! Don't just stand there!

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All clubs would let the caller run everything?
All callers would let the clubs run everything?
We forget who's running what . . .
And just dance!

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All square dancers would help the beginners' classes?
All levels would help the beginners reach their own level?
All classes would end up square dancers?

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

All clubs were doing the same square dancers' rounds?
All square dancers were round dancers?
All round dancers were true square dancers?

Wouldn't it be nice if . . .

Everyone danced for fun and pleasure?

Everyone danced for challenge and fun?

Every challenge was to dance? Every dance was a challenge . . . to have fun!

thought to the square and round dance picture in the past, at the present, and looking to the future, I would like to present some ideas that I think would help to stimulate constructive thought for a blue print of things to come. These thoughts are based on sixteen years of calling, dancing, and teaching in this wonderful activity.

I believe in square dance clubs.

I think square dancers should join only one club and give it their 100 per cent support. They should, however, feel free to visit any other clubs they might wish to, without obligation.

I think that a caller should be the basis around which a democratic club is formed. A club caller should not be just a "hired hand" without any voice in that organization which he is helping to build. Because he, alone, has sight of the whole floor of dancers, programming and "level" should be his responsibility and his judgment should prevail. He, of course, should appreciate constructive criticism and any help he can get to "spark up" a dance.

I do not believe in round dance clubs or festivals that feature only rounds and no squares. These are doing more harm than good to the whole movement, just as a square dance would be the cake without the frosting if no rounds were played. This is separating the two, and I personally don't feel that they were meant to be separated.

In my opinion, only square dancers' rounds should be taught in the square dance clubs. With good leadership, rounds will be selected always with the majority of square dancers present in mind.

Round dancing helps people to become smoother square dancers and should definitely be a part of every program. The use of mixers, both in classes and in clubs, is very beneficial in introducing square dancers to rounds.

The importance of a federation of clubs, with a callers' association to balance it, cannot be stressed too much, the aim being co-operation, not competition. The working together of these organizations promotes a wholesome exchange of ideas and common understanding.

I hope that in the not too distant future the flow of new material could be released by our national magazines at the same time. This material first having been co-ordinated in such a way that every caller would have the benefit of knowing that before it is released, it had gone through a thorough testing, and found to be choreographically correct.

Also, I would like to see a nation-wide survey made to determine which thirty basics are the most popular. These we could retain as the foundation for the square dance movement. From this point on, everything new in the way of ideas could be termed "gimmicks" and given numbers 1, 2, 3, etc.

If a gimmick, through usage on a national scale, should remain in constant popularity, it could replace one of the "lesser-used" basics. Thus there would always be a standard number of basics to teach a class, or to use in combinations in a club, and the gimmicks would retain their place as merely "spice" for any program.

Last, but not least, is music — the most important aspect in square and round dancing. The pattern of the dance, no matter how easy or difficult, should be timed to the music. In square dancing, it is the only common denominator between caller and dancer. How well each does his part, with the music as his guide, makes the difference between frustration and pleasure •

Variety is the spice of life, in square dancing as in other phases of living. This cliche, time worn though it may be, is proven once again in the reports of special dance events thoughout the country. Square dance "specials" are as plentiful as those on TV (and no re-runs). Many unusual features are included in them.

Round Dancing seems to be drifting away from Square Dancing toward Ballroom Dancing. Here's a plea to . . .

LET'S KEEP
ROUND
DANCING WITH
SQUARE DANCING

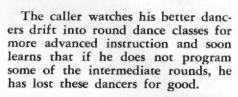
Good round dancers dance a smoother and more rhythmic square. Square dancing with round dancing is an excellent combination. They complement each other.

As round dance teachers, may we express a few of our personal opinions on the subject . . . you need not agree. Round dancing is drifting away from square dancing. There is a trend to-award ballroom style, Latin rhythms, English quicksteps, modern swing, and exhibition routines, which only specially trained round dance teachers are qualified to teach.

This puts the caller in a difficult position. Even the finest caller cannot be expected to be a professional round dance instructor. He has enough to do to keep up with square dance figures and calls.

He wants to promote round dancing along with square dancing. So he teaches the simple rounds. But his square dancers, who are enjoying all the new and advanced square dance figures, also want newer and better rounds at the square dance.

They are no longer satisfied with "Jingle Bell Rock" and "Left Footers One-step".



These callers do not have the time to learn all the favorite square dance rounds. They cannot teach even the better ones in the few minutes allotted at the square dance. So the round dance club or class is a very necessary part of the square dance program.

Here the caller and the round dance teacher should work in closest harmony. In round dancing there are three distinct levels of dancing. Beginner and low-intermediate for the square dancer. High-intermediate and advanced for the round dancer. High-advanced for those who want to dance all the intricate and challenging routines. (The latter, while, equally important, does not fit into the square dancing picture. It is usually in round dance clubs.)

To keep round dancing in square dancing, we encourage our dancers to attend square dances and to join in all the square dance rounds. If it happens to be "Tennessee Two-step" or ("Golden Gate Waltz",) it gives them an opportunity to show what styling and grace can do for the simple rounds.

Too often we see the advanced dancers sit and refuse to dance these easier routines. This makes the less experienced dancers feel that they are being watched and criticized by experts. Knowing that they are not yet ready for exhibition dancing, they become very self-conscious. It could be the end of their round dancing career. So, please dance with them, no matter how simple the dance is. They will love you for it and you will find it great fun.

Then, there is the eager beaver "show-off" who persuades the caller to put on a record of one of his most difficult routines. Two or three couples will glide onto the floor to show their great dancing ability. We feel that this is in poor taste at a square dance. Let everyone dance. That's what they came to do.

Now we do not wish to convey the idea that there is no place for the high-advanced dancer. There is a place for this level with all the challenging rhythms and exhibition stylings that represent a beautiful mastery of the dance. These people usually prefer to dance at the club level. But even in round dance clubs, the level of dancing should be kept to favor the majority. Each dancer should seek the club that fits his ability. When dancing becomes hard work, it ceases to be fun.

Many excellent dancers do not care for the present trend toward ballroom dancing. They prefer to stay with good round dancing at an advanced level. There is a place for all. Unfortunately many round dance teachers have only ballroom experience. These teachers are leading our round dancers away from round dancing as we know it. Eventually these dancers quit square dancing entirely.

Round dance teachers should give better cooperation to the caller if round dancing is to remain a part of square dancing. As members of the Yucaipa Square Dance Club, we give one hour of round dance instruction before the square dance every Saturday night.

We teach, re-teach, and walk thru the popular dances requested. Then we program them between tips at the square dance later. Since this club has mostly out-of-town guest callers, they are happy to have us program the round dance part of their program for them. Our one hour gives us a good idea of the ability of the round dancers attending.

We program accordingly and usually fill the floor for every round. The callers assure us that this relieves them of a great headache. Our club recently awarded us a beautifully framed "Certificate of Appreciation" for our contribution to round dancing at the square dance club.

Our final plea is to the wonderful choreographers who compose such lovely routines. Please give the square dancer some good rounds that the caller as well as the dancer can do. Let's keep round dancing with square dancing where it belongs •

### CHOREOGRAPHY

Several requests have been made to break down the movement Illegitimate Chain. The final analysis shows that this is an arky all eight chain without a courtesy turn ending. The all eight chain movement starts with a right hand to the same sex, pull by, left to the other sex (opposite) with a forearm turn to go into the next command.

The command to do this movement might be, "head gents chain right, head ladies chain left, go right and left." The next command could direct the dancers, "turn back, go right and left (to original partner)." Or instead of the turn back it could be, "a full turn and on you go, right and left (to original partner meeting across the set from starting point) to a do-paso."

Like all arky figures, this is position dancing. The direction you start the movement is your forward direction (clockwise or counter-clockwise) around the set no matter who you meet to pull by, turn back, allemande thar, or whatever the call might be.

This is the challenge to arky figures, the uncommon experience of men moving in the ladies' normal direction or the ladies moving in the men's normal direction. To expect dancers to swing the same sex, star thru, box the gnat, and the like, becomes "gimmicky" and not in good taste since "dancing" goes out the window and "scrambling" becomes the issue.

True position dancing becomes a real dancing challenge when using the most simple type movements. For example, allemande thars, daisy chains, Suzie Qs, and all eight chains.

Let's get back to the illegitimate chain command. While the actives are following the command, "gents chain right and ladies chain left", the inactives are doing the opposite movement. Gents chain left and ladies chain right. This is how the same sex meet with a right hand to start the "illegitimate" part of the all eight chain.

This is the point of determination of your forward direction and you had better be going in the opposite direction of your partner or you will never meet her again in the figure somewhere. Listen to the call and don't try to "fix" the figure. Have faith in the caller to straighten you out in the end.

Dancers react easily to this type movement if they are led into it. The words of the call above leaves much to be desired but you might use the following:
Head couples half sashay
Square thru across the way
Count four hands
Then all eight chain (the same sex)
Go right and left, then turn back
Go right and left to a do-paso . . .
(Or) Go right and left a full turn and on you go (same direction)

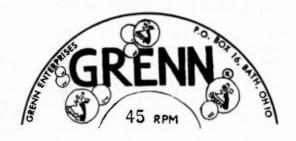
and on you go (same direction)
Right and left, then turn back
Go right and left, allemande thar
Head gents, side ladies right hand
Slip the clutch, arky allemande
Partner right, an arky grand . . .

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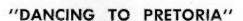
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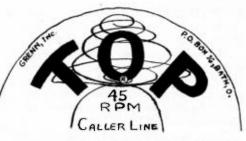
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flip instrumental

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### **CALLER'S QUESTIONS**

SEVERAL SOURCES: "... The square dance couple pictured on the cover of the August AMERICAN SQUARES is in promenade position, but is not in keeping with your 'styling hints' of the man with palms up and the lady with palms down."

We teach man's palms up (like landing fields) so that the lady can "land" on them palms down. This helps to prevent the constant grabbling that sometimes goes on with the left hands during a promenade. You have probably experienced this sensa-

tion.

This general rule also applies to a courtesy turn out of a ladies chain, right and left thru, and even during a swing the man's left hand is offered palm up to let the lady land gently in order to lead (not push) her into the next movement. It's the little courtesies in square dancing that help make the dancer into a smooth dancer. One that everyone enjoys having dance in his set. The most important part of the picture is there. The smiles.

ROBERT BAKER, Oak Ridge, Tenn.: "Dancers are becoming more aware of the flow of dance in square dancing.... Smooth dancing is more enjoyable (and less tiring) than the acrobatic or run 'em to death type of dance. These dancers can dance challenge figures and patterns if properly timed and called."

Bob's remarks are just a sample of the many letters and notes we receive from all over the country regarding "comfortable" dancing without the loss of "challenge" in today's square

dance choreography.

Anybody can call square thrus or right and left thrus so fast that a floor of the best dancers will break (and probably go home early). I have even heard callers remark that they call the same program at a "hot hash" club that they would call at another place only speed up the tempo from 128 to 136 in order to offer challenge to the group.

New callers please take note. The

mark of a beginner dancer is a "clutch" grip on right and left grands even as the mark of a beginner caller is to not allow enough time to execute a basic maneuver. The latest and greatest doesn't make you the best eiher. Be sensible in your choice of matrial to the floor you have before you. Keep at least 80 per cent of the floor happy so that you will be asked to return.

LEE HELSEL, Sacramento, Calif.:
"... The net worth of a figure is not contained alone in what the figure does but in what can be done smoothly following it. To some extent what preceeds it is also important ..."

Lee's observation points once more to the flow of a dance which is lacking at times in some figures. This point of choreography analysis is many times missed by callers who use anything that is new in a mad effort to be the first to introduce something different.

Dancer reaction will determine the popular acceptance of a square dance figure in spite the fact that it works with knives and forks. Mathematically perhaps it may be executed sixteen different ways. But if something along the line just doesn't feel comfortable to people the figure will not be accepted.
