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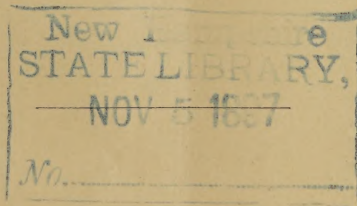

The foregoing is a plain description of the work during the year. In the main, the progress has been very satisfactory to the Board of Education; but in a few instances we wish it could have been different. Among the pupils there is no distinction, but that achieved by merit. Habits of order and punctuality, respect for and obedience to, properly constituted authority, are essential to every pupil. The road to a common school education, is free to all; the high, the low, the rich, the poor, all have the same privileges, and it is wisdom to take no advantage lest you fall by the way. Blessings that we daily enjoy are not always appreciated. When free from pain we are apt to forget the hours of suffering. There are many things for which we should never cease to be thankful, and our free school system, is one; but yet many give it hardly a passing thought. Its advantages come not to us as the rain and sunshine, but by constant effort and care. "They builded better than they knew." What a wise provision our public school system proves to be! Children should be educated for the duties and responsibilities of intelligent citizenship. The boys of to-day, will be the men tomorrow, make the laws and execute them. Parents and guardians are responsible to a great extent for the progress made in our schools. Teachers without a proper interest and influence of the parents, cannot succeed, and if you look for and obtain a profitable school, it will be the exception, and not the rule. We do most respectfully urge all to unite with the teacher and committee in the interest of the children's education. If mistakes have occurred, we hope to profit by them in the future.

Teachers do not realize the importance of filling out their registers properly; we referred to this last year, and in the future we hope there will be no cause for complaint. Be alive to your work, your calling is an honorable one, make yourselves indispensable, be constantly on the alert for new ideas, prove them, all that is good adopt, keep along with the advance, don't be "old fogy." We must have bright and energetic instructors. Avail yourselves of the advantages of the Institute. These things are imperative for success.

What we said in regard to school houses last year, is applicable at the present time. There has been no special change. The houses in No. 1 and 6 are in a very bad condition, and your School Board recommend that the school district raise a sufficient amount of money to build a house the coming season at a central point to accommodate the scholars in that locality. We also realize that a house ought to be built for No. 8 and 12, but it may not be advisable to raise money to build more than one this year, from the fact that we are laboring under the burden of heavy taxation. There should be money raised to repair the house in No. 16, and shingle the house in No. 15. We can't afford to let our houses go to ruin for want of shingles, even though they are not now occupied, for they may be needed at some future time.

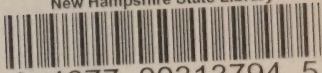
