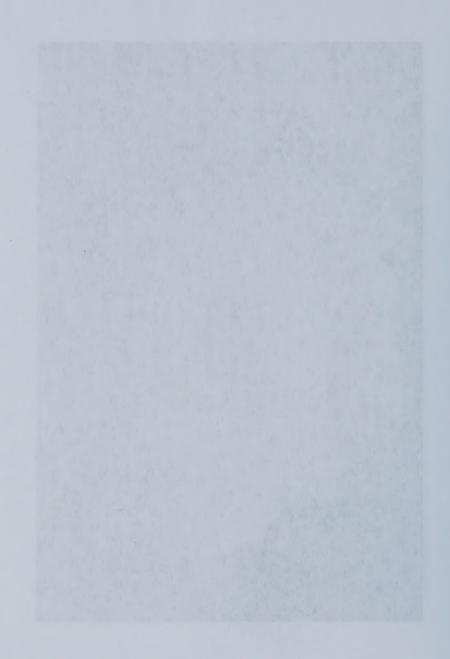


Randy Scholl 2012 1919 in November 26, 2017 20 Years of Service

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

It is hard to believe that 2017 has come and gone. Here are some of the highlights, in no particular order.

Fiscally, it was a good year for the Town of Sullivan. Last March taxpayers voted to raise \$723,304 to fund general operations as well as to acquire \$8,000 of breathing apparatus and put \$10,000 toward an addition at the highway garage. An additional \$66,500 was set aside in Capital Reserves.

By State law, the general rule in municipal budgeting is a Town can only spend money if it has been appropriated. So, in the case of Sullivan, no more than \$723,304 could be spent on general operations by the combined departments between January 1 & December 31, 2017. Taking it one step further, our local spending policy is that individual departments must stay within their budgets. From time to time unexpected circumstances arise and it becomes necessary to use other unspent funds to absorb an over expenditure. Even though this was the case during 2017, the Town still ended the year with a surplus. Unspent funds go to the bottom line and in effect, remain in the "unassigned fund balance" until used for another purpose, like funding a special project in the next fiscal year or reducing the 2018 tax rate.

Speaking of tax rates, over the last couple of years the Selectmen have used some unassigned fund balance to reduce the Town's portion of the tax rate. In 2017 the tax rate was projected to be \$33.71 (town portion \$11.16) but by using \$100,000 from fund balance, the rate ended up at \$31.80 (town portion \$9.25). In 2016 the tax rate was projected to be \$33.49 (town portion \$10.92) but by using \$100,150 from fund balance, the rate ended up at \$31.59 (town portion \$9.01). It is important to remember that fund balance is not just a means to reduce taxes. General accounting standards recommend municipalities, regardless of size, maintain an unassigned fund balance equal to no less than two months of regular general fund operating expenditures.

As of late, our most difficult task comes in finding a qualified Road Agent. As it stands right now, the Selectmen can appoint a Road Agent to the end of the unexpired term of the previous elected individual, which is March 2019. On this year's warrant the Selectmen are recommending the position of Road Agent be changed from elected to appointed. If passed, the potential pool of qualified candidates is expanded and the Town may have a better chance to fill the position.

As of this writing the Selectmen are going through the second round of receiving applications for the Road Agent position. The first round was restricted to qualified residents since the position is elected. There were two viable candidates but neither accepted the job.

In late March 2017 the Town entered into an agreement with Diluzio Ambulance to provide primary emergency medical transport services to Sullivan residents. Very recently it came to the attention of the Budget Committee and Selectmen that there may be a need to enter into an agreement for secondary transport services with the City of Keene. Secondary transport services are used in the case where a paramedic is necessary but not available through the primary service. Overall this does not happen frequently and even when it does happen there is no guarantee a paramedic would be available through the secondary service. The current proposed budget does not include an appropriation for secondary service but if it is the desire of the Town to do so, approximately \$5,500 would need to be added. The \$5,500 includes a \$1,600 annual cost plus an estimate for unpaid bills and intercept fees. (Note: Sullivan is responsible for any unpaid secondary ambulance service bill. An intercept fee is where the secondary service provider responds but the patient is not transported). The Budget Committee instructed the Selectmen to research this issue more closely over the next year.

A review of the Diluzio Ambulance call log indicates they were dispatched to Sullivan 29 times between April 1 and December 31, 2017. Of those 29 responses there were 16 transports to another facility.

The Cheshire County Sheriff's Department will be providing police services again during 2018. Over the last year they did have a staffing shortage which resulted in less patrol hours. Since the Town pays by the hour, reduced patrol meant the budget was not fully spent.

Last year the Selectmen contemplated writing a local animal control ordinance. Based on discussions with State officials it was decided a local ordinance is redundant and that our policing authority uses New Hampshire RSA 466:31 as the enforcement tool for unrestrained dogs.

Thanks go to Leslie Casey, Planning Board Chair, who was instrumental in bringing the condition of Centre Road to the attention of the State Department of Transportation (DOT). The paving project, completed in late fall, has greatly enhanced travel, reduced wear & tear on vehicles, improved ditching and filled in potholes. During preparation for repaving, the DOT brought a significant culvert problem to our attention. The culvert runs under Centre Street and continues under a portion of the Fire Station addition. Approximately \$5,000 has been included in this year's budget (building maintenance & repair) to fund this project.

Through the efforts of Administrative Assistant Kate Fuller the Town was presented with a "Risk Management Excellence" award by its insurance carrier, Primex. By achieving a set of best practice standards the Town enjoys a discount on property liability insurance, worker's compensation and unemployment compensation rates. Kate is also responsible for obtaining competitive pricing for fuel and other services which results in tax dollar savings.

In July 2017 the Town learned it would be receiving additional highway block grant money due to the passage of Senate Bill 38. These funds are intended to be used in addition to locally budgeted projects. Following a required public hearing in October the Selectmen voted to accept the \$33,289.92 to be used in accordance with applicable State statutes. Through the recommendation of Road Agent Randy Smith, the funds have been earmarked to resurface Hubbard Road.

Having met its purpose, the Energy Committee dissolved in 2017. This volunteer committee formed in 2009 helped identify areas of energy conservation and improvements to reduce energy costs. Though not all inclusive, some of the measures taken have been furnace replacement at the Library and Town Hall, installation of programmable thermostats, insulation of the hatch access and mail drop at Town Hall, patched holes in the drywall and obtaining competitive fuel prices. Their efforts aided everyone to be more energy conscious and helped save tax dollars.

In December a resident requested the Selectmen include a warrant article for property tax exemptions for solar, wind and wood-heating equipment. If passed at Town meeting, properties with qualifying solar energy system equipment (RSA 72:61) or qualifying wood heating energy system equipment (RSA 72:69) may enjoy an exemption in the amount equal to 100% of the assessed value of the equipment, up to 10,000.

Throughout the year the Selectmen handle a variety of other duties like building permits, exemption, credit & current use applications, citizen complaints, garbage nuisances, legal matters, annual budget creation, monitor expenses & revenues, set tax rates, generate tax warrants, prepare required state reports and appoint individuals to certain positions. None of these duties would meet completion without the dedication and assistance of employees, other elected officials, volunteers, and members of boards and committees. Though not said enough, thank you, thank you, thank you. None of it is possible without each and every one of you.

If you've ever thought about participating at the local level, want to implement change or simply have some time on your hands, think about running for office or serving on a committee or board that interests you.

- Article 16: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Bridge Maintenance and Repair. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)
- Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Salt/Sand Shed Construction. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)
- Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for deposit into the Forest Fire Fighting Liabilities & Equipment Expendable Trust Fund. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)
- Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Town Library Energy Efficiency Capital Reserve Fund created in 2012. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)
- Article 20: To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Library Expansion Capital Reserve Fund created in 1996. Said funds, with accumulated interest to date of withdrawal, are to be transferred to the municipality's general fund. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)
- Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,392 to be added to the Forest Fire Fighting Liabilities & Equipment Expendable Trust Fund, with the sum of \$7,392 to come from unassigned fund balance (this represents a reimbursement from the Town of Stoddard for assisting in a brush fire in 2016). The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Article 22: To see if the Town will vote to have the Highway Road Agent appointed by the Selectmen instead of by election.

Article 23: Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:61-64 inclusively, which provide for an optional property tax exemption from the property's assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property, which is equipped with solar energy systems intended for use at the immediate site. Such property tax exemption shall be in the amount equal to 100% of the assessed value, up to 10,000, of qualifying solar energy system equipment under these statutes. (Majority vote required)

Article 24: Shall the Town adopt the provisions of RSA 72:69-72 inclusively, which provide for an optional property tax exemption from the property's assessed value, for property tax purposes, for persons owning real property, which is equipped with wood heating energy systems intended for use at the immediate site. Such property tax exemption shall be in the amount equal to 100% of the assessed value, up to 10,000, of qualifying wood-heating energy system equipment under these statutes. (Majority vote required)

**Article 25:** To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of Agents and Committees as printed within the Annual Town Report.

Applicants should also consult Article III. C for the property dimensions, setbacks, and density requirements; and Article V for building permit requirements.

Community Planning Ordinance, Article XI, Definitions, (Seasonal Dwelling Unit) would read as follows:

Seasonal Dwelling Unit. Any structure intended for shelter or housing, meant for casual and intermittent occupancy (not greater than nine (9) consecutive months); not the principal place

of abode for owner, tenant or occupant. See also, "Dwelling Unit."

### Passes with 50 votes, I so do declare.

**Article 4:** ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE IV, GENERAL PROVISIONS, J, (PERMANENT FOUNDATIONS), BY REPLACING: BOCA National; WITH: New Hampshire?

### Passes with 47 votes, I so do declare.

**Article 5:** ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE III, USE APPLICATION, C.7, (AREAS AND DIMENSIONS FOR STRUCTURES AND/OR BUILDINGS) AS FOLLOWS:

### III.C. Areas and Dimensions for structures and/or buildings:

- 1. The minimum lot area is 2 acres.
- 2. The minimum lot width at the building line is 200 feet
- 3. The minimum lot depth from the front property line is 200 feet.
- 4. The minimum lot width at the road frontage is 200 feet on a class V or better road.
- 5. The minimum set back from the highway right of way is 50 feet.
- 6. The minimum set back from adjacent property lines is 20 feet.
- 7. The maximum density allowed (including multifamily developments, and with the exception of one attached or internal Accessory Dwelling Unit) is one dwelling unit for every two acres.
- 8. The minimum total interior living area for a <u>Principal</u> Dwelling Unit shall be 700 square feet, of which not less than 600 square feet <u>shall be</u> on one level.
- **9.** The minimum total interior living area for an Accessory Dwelling Unit <u>shall</u> be 400 square feet and its area <u>shall</u> not exceed the area of the principal dwelling unit.

### Passes with 44 votes, I so do declare.

Article 6: ARF YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE IV, GENERAL PROVISIONS, H, (ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS) AND ARTICLE XI, DEFINITIONS (ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT) AS FOLLOWS:

### Community Planning Ordinance Article IV.H would read as follows:

- H. Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs). One internal or attached accessory dwelling unit per single family dwelling will be deemed a permitted accessory use for all single family dwellings.
  - 1. An internal or attached ADU shall be permitted for all single family dwellings, subject to the following:
    - a. Only one internal or attached ADU shall be permitted for each single-family dwelling,
    - b. the ADU shall have an independent means of ingress and egress, or shall have ingress and egress though a common space such as a shared hallway to an exterior door,
    - c. in order to be considered attached, there must be a common wall between the principal dwelling unit and the ADU, and

- d. provision shall be made to meet local and State regulations for adequate water supply and sewage disposal service, and all other local regulations.
- 2. A single <u>detached</u> ADU located on the same lot as and incidental to the principal dwelling unit shall be permitted for lots of 4 or more acres. A maximum of two <u>detached</u> ADUs located on the same lot as and incidental to the principal dwelling unit shall be permitted for lots of 10 acres or more. An approved septic system design is a prerequisite to construction.

Refer to Article V for building permit requirements. Applicants should also consult Article III.C for the proper dimensions, setbacks, and density requirements.

and Community Planning Ordinance Article XI, Definitions, (Accessory Dwelling Unit) would read as follows:

Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU). A residential living unit that is within or attached to, or detached from, a single-family dwelling that is the principal dwelling unit, and that provides independent living facilities for one or more persons, including provisions for sleeping, eating, cooking, and sanitation on the same parcel of land as the principal dwelling unit it accompanies. This may also be referred to as an accessory apartment, camp, cabin, in-law apartment, bunkhouse, apartment, cottage, caretaker's apartment or other similar name.

#### Passes with 46 votes, I so do declare.

**Article 7:** ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE XI, DEFINITIONS, (DWELLING UNITS), AS FOLLOWS:

**Dwelling Unit.** A building or part thereof designed for residential occupancy providing complete independent living facilities for one or more persons that includes permanent provisions for living, sleeping, eating, cooking and sanitation. A Principal Dwelling Unit is an allowed residential structure to which an accessory building or accessory dwelling unit is subordinate.

#### Passes with 50 votes. I so do declare.

Article 8: ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE IV, GENERAL PROVISIONS, BY ADDING:

- N. Alternative Development. Alternative development shall be granted only where the Planning Board finds that such development will be superior to conventional development in
- 1. Preserving open space for agriculture, conservation or recreation,
- 2. Preserving historic, archeological, and cultural features located on the site,
- 3. Utilizing natural features of the land,
- 4. Preserving those areas of the site that have the highest ecological value (for example, wildlife habitat and water resources),
- 5. Locating buildings and structures on those portions of the site that are the most appropriate for development and avoiding developing in areas ill-suited for development such as areas that have excessively steep slopes, and
- 6. Allowing more efficient provision of public services; and at least equal to a conventional plan in other respects.

Alternative development of lots 20 or more acres in size and other methods of preserving open space are specifically allowed. Alternative development will require that the landowner provide a minimum of 2 acres per principal dwelling unit. In the determination of such additional acreage requirement, wetlands shall not be calculated. Minimum lot width at the road frontage shall be 200 feet on a class V or better road, and the minimum setback from the highway right of way shall be 50 feet. Under such development plan, individual lot size may, at the discretion of the Planning Board, be less than 2 acres, but only in such circumstances as ownership of additional land held in common, and adjacent to the subject lot, provides a minimum of 2 acres per principal dwelling unit.

BY ADOPTION OF ARTICLE 8, THE CLUSTER HOUSING ORDINANCE WOULD BE DISCONTINUED. Passes with 44 votes, I so do declare.

**Article 9:** ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE V, BUILDING PERMITS, A, (When Required) and ARTICLE V, BUILDING PERMITS, C, (Accessory Building Permit) AS FOLLOWS:

#### Community Planning Ordinance Article V, Building Permits, A, (When Required) would read as follows:

**A. When Required.** A building permit shall be required for all dwelling units, <u>including ADUs</u>, seasonal or permanent. A building permit shall also be required to erect or place any type of building or other structure, <u>attached or detached</u>, which will be over <u>400</u> square feet. A permit shall not be required for normal repairs to, or redecoration of, a building. <u>Exemption from permit requirements of this ordinance shall not be deemed to grant authorization for any work to be done in any manner in violation of the provisions of any other laws or ordinances of this jurisdiction.</u>

and Community Planning Ordinance Article V, Building Permits, C (Accessory Building Permit) would read as follows:

**C.** Application for an Accessory Building Permit. Written application for a building permit, over 400 square feet shall be filed with the Board of Selectmen or their agent to include size and location on the lot. Applicants should also consult Article III.C for the proper dimensions, setbacks, and density requirements.

Passes with 33 votes, I so do declare.

**ARTICLE 10:** ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF AMENDING THE COMMUNITY PLANNING ORDINANCE ARTICLE VII, ADMINISTRATION AS FOLLOWS:

#### VII. ADMINISTRATION

The Board of Selectmen shall administer the provisions of this Ordinance in the name of the Town. The Selectmen may appoint an agent to administer this Ordinance. The fire chief or his/her designee shall have the authority to make inspections in accordance with NFPA 101 - The Life Safety Code to determine the condition of dwellings located within the town in order that the health and safety of the occupants of all dwellings and the general public shall be safeguarded. The Health Officer shall have the authority to conduct sanitary investigations into complaints and nuisances that may endanger public health. Whenever a health officer knows or has cause to suspect that any nuisance or other causes of danger to the public health is in any building or enclosure, he/she may obtain an administrative inspection warrant under RSA 595-B,

which may include, when necessary, authority for forcible entry. Remedies provided in RSA 676:15 and RSA 676:17 are hereby made available to the Selectmen except that no fine shall exceed \$100.00 per day for each day a violation continues.

#### Passes with 30 votes, I so do declare.

**Article 11:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,246 for **General Municipal Operations** for the ensuing year. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Selectman Laura Merrifield wanted everyone to know that this warrant article also includes the ambulance cost of the Diluzio Ambulance service only. The selectmen were asked to check out other options for the ambulance as Keene ambulance service has risen in cost over the last few years.

Fire Chief Al Henry rose and said everyone should have gotten the letter the fire company sent out. They are worried that if we go with Diluzio Ambulance he is not sure of the coming future. Would Keene Ambulance back us up if needed? Keene Ambulance service is \$9,724 more that Diluzo's.

An amendment was made to increase the Selectmen's budget an extra \$9,724.00.

Marsha Cook asked if either ambulance would refuse service to us no matter which one we choose. Al Henry said Maybe.

Steve Hamilton spoke and said our population is mostly now older citizens. We need reliable service.

Al Henry spoke and told of an automobile accident on Route 9 and Keene Ambulance showed up and helped retrieve the person out of the car. Diluzio ambulance probably would not have.

Marsha Cook stated that this was not an ambulance's job. Normally when Keene Rescue shows up are they fire fighters or EMT's? Response was could be either one.

Mary Hull spoke and told about the remarkable services that Diluzio Ambulance gave to her late husband and they really went over and beyond the call of duty.

Bonnie Blanchard is concerned that Diluzio may not provide all the training that Keene Ambulance provides or if there is an extra cost to it.

Selectman Laura Merrifield said she compared the two contracts and Keene does provide added training and Diluzio provides basic training.

Al Merrifield stated that the Keene ambulance's bill about doubled last year.

Hillaire Wilder asked about the road accident again.

Al Henry stated that Diluzio will not help to remove people from the vehicle, only transport.

Mary Hull spoke and said the 911 rescue would come to the scene and they would help with that.

Going back to the amendment: Motion made and seconded. Amendment was defeated by ballot

vote, 19 yes and 22 no.

Motion made and seconded to accept Article 11 as written. Article 11 passes as written, I so do declare.

**Article 12:** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$436,684 for **Highway Operations** for the ensuing year, said appropriation to be offset by the State Highway Block Grant in the amount of \$54,885. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 18 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Reconstruction and Resurfacing of Bituminous-Surfaced Roads. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Al made a motion to amend Article 22 by adding an additional \$14,300 to bring the total to \$25K

Motion made on amendment and seconded, discussion.

Marie Robinson asked why it wasn't written up that way to begin with.

Laura Merrifield explained they are trying to balance the budget and the Budget Committee and the selectmen decided that \$10k was appropriate. Plus the fact that the two police cruisers have now been sold and they should be deciding where to divide the funds. A good possibility would be between the Road Agent's budget and the Fire Department. That was explained to the fire department previously.

The amendment was defeated by a show of cards 11 yes and 27 no.

Article 22 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 23: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Town-wide emergencies. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 23 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Land Conservation. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 24 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Master Plan Update. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 25 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the Capital Reserve Fund for Bridge Maintenance and Repair. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, discussion.

Marsha Cook asked if the Bridge maintenance and repair is under the road agent's budget?

Chris Pratt explained that on this article, the money would be going into Capitol Reserve for future repairs.

Article 26 passes as written, I so do declare.

**Article 27**: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for deposit into the **Capital Reserve Fund for Salt/Sand Shed Construction**. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, discussion.

Question was asked what we have been using all along to cover the salt and sand.

Laura Merrifield answered, Plastic has been thrown over it. The State would like to see it covered.

Article 27 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for deposit into the Forest Fire Fighting Liabilities & Equipment Expendable Trust Fund. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 28 passes as written, I so do declare.

**Article 29:** To see if the Town will vote to raise the price of cemetery lots from \$100 to \$200 for purchasers who either currently reside in the Town or had resided in the Town within five years prior to their purchase of the lot; for the purchasers who have not resided in the Town during the prior five years the price of a cemetery lot will be set at \$500. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

**NOTE:** The rationale for the increase is that the cost of maintaining cemetery lots has increased since the \$100 price was originally set many years ago. The price increase is more consistent with the prices charged for cemetery lots by other towns. The rationale for charging non-residents a higher amount is that the Town covers the costs to maintain cemetery common areas from taxes paid to the Town by residents. The effective date would be 30 days from the date of passage.

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 29 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to establish a Cemetery Maintenance Expendable Trust Fund pursuant to RSA 31:19-a, to be funded by the sale of cemetery lots pursuant to RSA 289:2-a, along with any interest gained thereon, for the maintenance of cemeteries; and further to name the Cemetery Trustees as agents to expend from this fund. The selectmen and budget committee recommend. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 30 passes as written, I so do declare.

Article 31: Shall the Town of Sullivan vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 72:28-b, All Veteran's Tax Credit? If adopted, the credit will be available to any resident, or the spouse or surviving spouse of any resident, who served not less than 90 days in active service in the armed forces of the United States and was honorably discharged or an officer honorably separated from service and is not eligible for or receiving a credit under RSA 72:28 or RSA 72:35. If adopted, the credit granted will be \$250, the same amount as the standard or optional veteran's tax credit voted by the Town of Sullivan under RSA 72:28. (majority vote required)

Motion made and seconded, discussion.

Marsha Cook asked exactly what is the credit for?

Laura Merrifield explained that previously only certain veterans received the credit due to the dates they served in the service. This will allow all veterans to receive this credit who have served not less than 90 days in active service and was honorably discharged. The credit would be applied to their property taxes. This would impact the town's cost by approximately and additional \$4,000.00.

Article 31 passes as written, I so do declare.

**Article 32:** To see if the Town will vote to accept the Reports of Agents and Committees as printed within the Annual Town Report.

Motion made and seconded, no discussion.

Article 32 passes as written, I so do declare.

**Article 33:** To transact any business which may legally come before this meeting and to listen to opinions of a purely advisory nature as regards the conduct of Town Affairs for the ensuing year.

Chris Pratt gave his praises to the Highway Department for battling this snow storm. And Brian Houghton who continually kept the town's offices and buildings open. It was a continuous battle. (Applause)

Laura Merrifield thanks David Beers for stepping up and taking on the Selectmen's role for the time he did. She then welcomed the new Selectman Jeffrey Burbank. (applause)

Roger Sweet stood up and said that both Ann and himself have been in town since 1933. He then expressed his feelings to this special town, that even through our differences, we always stand together. And as an example, he was offered help by Mark Jackson and Chuck Moore to open up his driveway up so they could get back home safely after the snow storm. Extra thanks to the Sullivan Fire Department also. (Applause)

Chris Pratt then asked for help putting the chairs back carefully as the floors have been refinished.

Town Meeting was adjourned at 8:35 PM.

The Sullivan Budget Committee consists of Al Merrifield, John Bolles, Dave Jakway, Marsha Cook, Mike Blanchard, Joe Lewandowski (Selectmen's Representative), and Paul Bolduc (School Board Representative). This year's budget review began with an organizational meeting on December 5, 2017. The first order of business was to elect Al Merrifield as Chairman. The committee established a meeting schedule for review of the Town and School budgets with a joint public hearing to follow on January 23, 2018.

On December 12, 2017 the Committee reviewed the department budget requests as follows:

**Cemetery**: The increase, from \$6,300 to \$11,800, in the Cemetery operating budget is attributable to planned extensive tree removal and headstone restoration. The headstone restoration involves the process of assembling the broken stones on the ground and building a frame to prevent further deterioration. Since the headstones requiring the restoration predate perpetual care, it becomes the Town's responsibility to maintain them. It was noted the Town would be receiving approximately \$1,600 from perpetual care to offset cemetery expenses.

**Library**: An increase in the Library operating budget is attributable to a correction in the number of hours worked. The hours were understated in 2017.

**Conservation:** The operating budget remains the same for the coming year. A contribution in the amount of \$1,000 to the Land Conservation Capital Reserve was requested. This account funds may be used to acquire land or land rights.

**Planning:** The operating budget remains the same for the coming year. Printing/published and postage expense are dependent on how many land use applications are made to the Planning Board. Unspent funds are returned to the general fund. A contribution in the amount of \$1,500 to the Master Plan Update was requested.

**Recreation:** The Recreation Committee held a potluck and Santa visit on December 9. A little over \$780 was expended with unspent funds returned to the Town.

**Highway**: The operating budget request is less than 2017. It was recognized that work planned for in the coming year may not be completed. It was agreed to leave the budget close to what was originally submitted knowing that unspent funds would be returned to the general fund.

The special project account slated Hubbard Road for reconstruction at a cost of approximately \$168,000. Due to the receipt of \$33,000 in unanticipated highway aid, the net cost for 2018 would be \$135,000.

Of significance there were two major rain events in 2017 that required immediate road repair. The total cost of \$13,302 was absorbed in the highway department operating budget.

Capital Reserve contributions requested include: \$15,000 for Highway Major Equipment; \$10,000 for Reconstruction/Resurfacing; \$5,000 for Bridge Maintenance and \$5,000 for Salt/Sand Shed construction.

On December 19, 2017 Committee reviewed the department budget requests as follows:

**Fire:** While many of the line items in the operating budget are unchanged, there is an overall increase from \$29,200 to \$33,027. The increase is attributable to a subscription for "Spotted Dog", an enhanced dispatching system; expected transmission servicing on all the trucks plus brake & rust work on the Brush truck; and equipment sensor replacement.

A special warrant article in the amount of \$12,500 to purchase breathing apparatus was requested. These funds would be used with existing Capital Reserve funds to acquire 4 or 5 air packs.

Capital Reserve contributions requested include: \$2,500 for Forest Fire Fighting Liabilities & Equipment; \$2,500 for Breathing Apparatus and \$25,000 for Fire Department Vehicle. The Selectmen recommended \$10,700 for the later.

Ambulance Stand-by fees were discussed. The budget committee directed the Selectmen to investigate costs associated with a secondary advanced life support service with City of Keene Fire Department.

**Emergency Management:** The operating budget is unchanged from the prior year. It is planned that information guides or pamphlets will be produced in the coming year.

**Police/Humane Society:** Policing services are provided by the Cheshire County Sheriff's department. They provide 17.5 hours of patrol and other services to the Town. This year's increase is due to wage and benefit changes.

Humane Society expenses are incurred when animals from Sullivan are turned in at the shelter and not claimed by their owners.

**Selectmen:** Overall the Selectmen's budget is up by about \$9,800 over last year. The following line items increased.

- Executive: 1.5% cost of living wage increase for town hall employees (an increase for highway and library employees is reflected in each respective wage line); hourly wage increase for the administrative assistant and two librarians
- Election: additional election in 2018 accounts for a slight increase.
- Financial: anticipates the updating of tax maps, increased costs for dues and sending the tax collector/town clerk to two out-of-town training sessions

- Building Maintenance: anticipates the replacement of a culvert near the fire station, septic pumping and furnace cleaning
- Fire Mutual Aid: increase due to staff and operating costs
- Health Agencies: funding for 6 health or human service agencies who demonstrate a direct benefit to Sullivan residents

Other line items including annual assessing services, legal & audit, property insurance, ambulance stand-by fees and welfare assistance remain the same or are decreased.

Capital Reserve contributions of \$2,300 for Revaluation; \$9,000 for Town Building Major Repairs and \$2,500 for Town-wide Emergencies were requested.

On January 2, 2018, the Committee met to review the School budget and develop its recommendations for the public hearing.

It was explained the overall budget, including capital reserves, is increasing from \$1,714,358 (2017) to \$1,762,223. While the cost of regular and tuition and special education tuition is down about \$30,000, costs for student support services (nursing and summer programs) have increased by about \$21,000 and transportation services has increased about \$67,000.

For budgeting purposes, the student census is approximated as follows:

The current balance of the special education expendable trust is slightly over \$150,000 and the school board is requesting an additional contribution of \$25,000 from fund balance and \$25,000 as a special warrant article.

The budget committee voted to put forward the Town budget as recommended by the Selectmen and the School budget as recommended by the School Board.

On January 23, 2018, the Budget Committee held a joint public hearing for the school and town budgets. The budgets for both entities as well as the warrant articles were reviewed and the public had an opportunity to learn how the budgets were developed and to ask questions. Further discussion ensued regarding information gathered on the potential cost of obtaining secondary advanced life support services. The purpose of the secondary agreement would be to provide, if possible, paramedic services in the event a paramedic (through Diluzio) was unavailable to respond to a Sullivan incident. For purposes of estimating the cost, the annual

fee plus an allowance for any unpaid bills as well as an intercept fee (where the secondary provider responds but does not transport) was used. The annual estimated cost would be \$5,500.

Immediately following the public hearing the budget committee voted to approve the School budget as proposed by the School Board and the Town budget as proposed by the Selectmen. Overall, the School budget is increasing from \$1,714,358 (2017) to \$1,762,223 and the Town's budget is increasing from \$807,804 to \$809,581.

The budget committee wishes to extend its thanks to the staff, selectmen, department representatives and school board for preparing the annual budget requests and for their cooperation during the review process.

#### **PLANNING BOARD**

The Sullivan Planning Board consists of Dorothy Miles, Secretary, Laura Lewandowski, Peter Miles, Ann Sweet, new member Milton Trimitsis, and Leslie Casey, Chairman. Mark Smith, previously a full member, opted to become an alternate member of the Board. The Selectmen's representative to the Board rotates on a quarterly basis among the three Selectmen.

This year Ann Sweet stepped down as Secretary, after serving in that capacity for over 20 years alongside several different chairmen. Mrs. Sweet's conscientiousness and meticulousness as Secretary were exemplary. She brought vast knowledge and experience to her role, and we extend our sincere thanks to her.

Several amendments to the Community Planning Ordinance (CPO) were approved by vote at the Town Election in March, and immediately adopted. One set of amendments pertained to new NH statutes on Accessory Dwelling Units, or "ADUs" (RSA 674:71-73, effective June 1, 2017). Sullivan's CPO already allowed for detached ADUs, but had to be amended to bring it into compliance with the new statutes and to clarify definitions.

Another amendment to the CPO, new section IV.N (Alternative Development), allows for alternative development of large parcels of land (20 acres or greater) through an approach other than subdivision, consistent with the goals of Sullivan's Master Plan of preserving open space, including those areas of the site that have the highest ecological value (for example, wildlife habitat and water resources). By adoption of the amendment, the obsolete Sullivan Cluster Housing Ordinance (1992), was discontinued, and the Selectmen and Town Clerk were notified to that effect.

CPO amendments intended to safeguard health and safety were also approved: the requirement for building permits was expanded and clarified, and the authority of the town Fire Chief and Health Officer to enter one- and two-family dwellings for investigations or inspections under certain circumstances was articulated. Finally, "housekeeping" amendments helped to improve organization and wording of the CPO.

A minor boundary line adjustment was approved by the Planning Board following a public hearing in July, resulting in small piece of land being conveyed to accommodate two existing sheds. It was noted by the Board that the setback from the property line for one of the sheds was less than the 20 feet stipulated in CPO section III.C6 (Areas and Dimensions for structures and/or buildings), but the Board agreed to waive the requirement in this case. Three driveway permits were approved, one of which is for a proposed new driveway.

Ann Sweet and Leslie Casey continued to serve as Commissioners to the SWRPC. Both were able to participate in the winter meeting of the Commission. Leslie Casey, Dorothy Miles, and Peter Miles participated in training at the NH Office of Energy and Planning's spring conference, which was found to be quite valuable. Chairman Casey also continued to serve on the regional Transportation Advisory Committee. That committee is undertaking efforts to persuade the State to allocate more transportation funds to rural highways in our region, such as Centre St.

The Town of Sullivan maintains three cemeteries and the Town Monument grounds. We have East Sullivan Cemetery, Sullivan Cemetery and Four Corners Cemetery. The Town Monument is at the crossroad of Centre St. and Church St.

The Cemetery Committee handles the purchases of the cemetery expendable trust, perpetual care trusts and oversees the maintenance of all three cemeteries. Mowing of the cemeteries and the monument is done at approximately two week intervals.

This year due to large amounts of rain and wind the cemeteries have suffered fallen trees and limbs plus damage to many of the older monuments. We have begun the research and now plan to go ahead and start the preservation on the heavily damaged stones.

#### SULLIVAN FIRE & RESCUE AND FORESTRY

2017 was a year that saw an increase in Fire, Rescue and Forestry calls both in town and mutual aid. The most dramatic increase was the number of Motor Vehicle Accidents the department responded to: 11 as compared to 3 in 2016. These calls outnumbered our EMS calls for the first time in many years.

Our Mission Statement; "To provide the best service possible to the Town of Sullivan through continuous improvement in training, certifications and equipment".

In 2017 the department again saw a decline in membership due to members moving from the area or moving on to other endeavors that do not allow the time necessary to serve. The department is in serious need of volunteers to fill many capacities and especially for those interested in becoming certified Firefighters or EMS providers. As always we invite you to stop by on Wednesday nights for a visit to get to know the members, check out "your" equipment and ask questions.

We would like to thank Maya King for her many years of service to the Department. Maya left us to continue with her career but most importantly to be a new mom.

#### - THE CALLS -

SFR responded to a total of 90 calls for EMS, Fire & Rescue, Mutual Aid as well as non emergency service calls. As in past years the department responded to a wide range of emergencies from service calls & automatic fire alarms to serious EMS calls and Fires. The following is the list of those calls:

Fire – Structure = 2
Fire – Auto Alarm = 8

Fire - Dryer = 1

Fire -CO = 1

Fire – Chimney = 1
Fire – Odor Investigation = 1



Fire/Rescue – MVA = 11

Fire/Rescue – Special Service Calls = 3

Fire/Forestry – Trees & Wires = 21

Fire/Forestry – Smoke Investigation = 3

EMS – Medical Calls = 3

In 2017, we saw a significant increase in motor vehicle accidents (MVA) both on Route 9 and on Town Roads. The most notable was an accident on Route 9 where a tractor trailer ended up on its side dumping the entire load of finished lumber. Fortunately the driver was not injured however Route 9 was closed for several hours as the scene was cleaned up.

Not reported in the call log are the numerous requests for other services such as occupancy permits, burner inspections and permits and home inspections at the request of homeowners, their insurance companies or from the State.

#### - TRAINING -

All members participated in our required annual Blood Borne Pathogen and SCBA training. CPR and AED recertification was also completed. Members also participated in regional training, in house training and drills, and our annual Forestry Training. The department continues to participate with the Towns of Harrisville and Nelson in monthly EMS training.

We would like to congratulate Paul Bolduc for completing Fire Fighter 1 certification.

#### - EQUIPMENT & TESTING -

In 2017 the annual NFPA pump testing was done as well as flow and fit testing of our MSA Breathing Apparatus. Our Jaws of Life as well as our cascade compressor also received their annual service.

In 2017 we replaced at least 4 SCBA air bottles; purchased new hose and a hose tester; replaced out dated turnout gear and helmets as well as purchased Nomex Forestry Pants.

In 2018 we are looking to start replacing our out dated breathing apparatus. We currently have 11 SCBA packs in service. Only one pack meets the NFPA 1981 standard (this is the oldest standard allowable by NFPA) all of our other packs are to the 1997 standard or older and per the NFPA standard need be retired. Even with costly upgrades these packs are no longer covered under warranty. To date I have been keeping these packs in service with salvaged parts but that supply has begun to dry up.

New Technology. In 2017 the Fire Company donated a new call alerting system called "Spotted Dog". This new system does not replace our standard fire pagers but it does provide us

additional information such as who is responding to the call and their time of arrival based on their GPS location. We can also view a map of the call location and directions both on our phones and in the station on a large monitor along with other features. The Fire Company donated \$1,500.00 from our fund raising activities to provide this system to the Town that includes a large screen monitor, new computer, software and misc. hardware.

In closing I would like to express my gratitude to you our residents for your continuing support of Sullivan Fire & Rescue Department and to the membership and their families for their continued dedication and support of the department.

#### 2017 Annual Report

The Cheshire County Sheriff's Office continues its standing commitment to provide the Town of Sullivan, New Hampshire contracted police services. This commitment has benefitted both entities over the years and the relationship between the community and the Sheriff's Office has been very positive.

For part of 2017, the Sheriff's Office was down several deputies and due to this shortage; duties and responsibilities had to be divided among deputies, bringing the average weekly patrols down.

In 2017, as we normally do, we saw some decreases and increases in our services (some of the decreases are attributed to being short staffed):

589 Calls for Service, decrease of 39.7% (2016 = 978)

109 Motor Vehicle Stops, decrease of 74% (2016 = 423)

16 Accidents, increase of 60% (2016 = 10)

11 Investigations, increase of 50% (2016 = 9)

6 Arrests, increase of 50% (2016 = 4)

716 work hours, decrease of 5.3% (2016 = 756.25)

Lieutenant Caleb Dodson will continue to oversee Sullivan contracted police services, assisted by Deputy Peter Bowers and Deputy Leonard Emond.

We will continue to provide contracted police services that are fiscally responsible, within budget and thoughtful to the needs of the Town.

I look forward to continue our service to the Town of Sullivan in 2018.

#### **HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT**

Thanks are extended to Paul Yarowski and Brian Houghton who have done a really great job plowing, sanding and salting the roads over these last few months. They are both to be commended for their willingness to keep things running at the highway department while a search is undertaken for a new road agent.

Paul was appointed as acting Road Agent and Brian has been assisting him on an as-needed basis during the winter months. While the Selectmen hope to appoint (at least until March 2019) a road agent, Paul and Brian will do their very best to ensure that road maintenance and all the other jobs fulfilled by the highway department will continue in the manner Sullivan residents have become accustomed to.

During the past year, the library has continued to thrive. The Sullivan Public Library served approximately 2000 patrons through-out the year with in-person visits; 110 patrons through Overdrive (downloadable audio materials); and 10 new patron registrations. It has also been active serving as a community center hosting presentations by local groups especially in the area of senior health care services. Since 2016, certified yoga instructor, Agnes Marks, has been holding 'gentle yoga' sessions on Tuesday afternoons from 4:30 – 5:45 pm. During 2017, the building has been used by town committees as their meeting place. The library is also a drop-off point for the Sullivan Food Pantry. The generous donation of non-perishable food items for our neighbors in need is greatly appreciated.

The full implementation of the "Book Store" model has gradually taken place over the course of the year with some modifications made to facilitate ease of use. Patrons seem to have made the adjustment with minimal inconvenience. Our collection has grown with the purchase of 125 new titles. Thanks to the generosity of our patrons and a local library, we have increased the collection by over 575 titles through donations especially in our Large Print and Audio Book sections.

The library is part of the statewide NHU-PAC system and can, therefore, offer patrons the service of Inter-Library Loans. This system gives patrons access to the collections of all the libraries in the state. Most requests can be filled within a week's time.

This year saw the addition of another book club at the library. The new Cookbook club meets on the first Tuesday of the month. The other two existing book clubs meet on the second Saturday and the third Thursday of each month. The drop-by Saturday Conversation Café meets each week from around 9:30 – 11:00 am.

#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Our annual spring roadside cleanup was once again, a great success. Hard working volunteers collected trash and debris scattered along our roadsides. Afterward, a community luncheon at the Sullivan Congregational Church was a much appreciated reward.

Hazardous household contaminants can be disposed of, free of charge, at the Keene Transfer Station. Drop-off dates for 2018 can be found listed later this spring, in the Keene Sentinel, town newsletter and on the town's website.

The commission has maintained funding for a naturalist educator from the Harris Center to teach at the Nelson School, which continues to be a favorite program with the students. We supported the multi-town water quality testing program for the Ashuelot River, which helps to monitor water quality along this waterway.

The Commission reviewed several "intent to cut" and DES culvert replacement applications again this year.

The Sullivan Trail Committee cleared a loop trail on Winch Hill and is working with several private landowners to create a loop trail around the center of town. Hopefully, the trails will be completed this coming Spring. The goal is to establish Jewett Park as the center of these trails which will be of varying lengths and abilities.

We are saddened with the sudden passing of longtime resident, commission member, and friend, Randy Smith. He had a great passion for the land and an intimate knowledge of our town. His compassion for all and dedication to our community will be greatly missed.

Our meetings are open to all and we welcome anyone interested in attending or becoming a member. Meetings are held the third Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m. in the town hall. Check out our bulletin board for upcoming workshops, hikes, and other things of interest in the Monadnock area. Copies of Sullivan's Natural Resource Inventory can be purchased upon request or signed out at the library.

## **Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee**

#### 2017 Annual Report

The Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee (ARLAC) was established in 1994, one year after the Ashuelot River was enrolled into the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program. Members are nominated by local municipal officials and appointed by the Commissioner of the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES).

The Ashuelot River Water Quality Monitoring Program continued for its seventeenth season, in conjunction with the NHDES Volunteer River Assessment Program (VRAP). ARLAC members, working with community volunteers, participated in a spring training session, leading to monthly sampling May through September. The Ashuelot River is classified as "Class B" meaning it is considered suitable for fishing, swimming and other recreational uses.

- We sampled 11 sites along the River's 64-mile length, and 3 sites along the South Branch in Swanzey.
- We obtained E. coli samples from June through September and Total Phosphorous samples in August and September.
- The cost of lab analyses was covered by contributions from Conservation Commissions along the River and NHDES. A generous donation from the Filtrine Manufacturing Company enabled the purchase of new pH meters.
- Over 135 hours were logged by18 volunteers. New volunteers are always welcome!
- A quick look at this year's results:
  - **E. coli:** most samples met the "Class B" level for surface waters with values well below 100 MPN/100 ml from Washington downstream to the Stone Arch Bridge in Keene. At Rte 101 and downstream there were higher numbers especially in August when we had a heavy rain. September sampling showed Class A levels throughout. Numbers are frequently high after heavy rains and increased run-off.

pH levels: results continue to be acidic with most readings below the standard of 6.5, especially in the upper reaches of the Ashuelot north of Keene.

**Total phosphorous:** Generally samples showed low levels, but a single high reading was obtained in Marlow in September.

Dissolved oxygen, chloride, turbidity and specific conductance remained within the standard with specific conductance increasing from Keene and downstream.

As mandated by DES, **ARLAC reviews and comments on state permit applications** within the river corridor that have potential impacts on the river. Included this year were ten Wetland or Shoreland projects in the towns of Washington, Marlow, Surry, Swanzey, Winchester, and Hinsdale. We continue to follow the progress and reports regarding the West Street Dam and

proposed hydro station in Keene, and have begun the review for FERC recertification of Nash Mill Hydro in Marlow.

We strive to educate ourselves on a broad array of issues associated with the river and its watershed. We hope to be a resource that works well between the interests and concerns of the citizens in the watershed and State authorities. Members participated in the state LAC annual workshop and regional and state-wide meetings covering topics such as NH Instream Flow Protection rules, DES listed impaired rivers, and flood resiliency and stream restoration. Members also viewed a Trout Unlimited educational video on "Basic Stream and River Functions". College student projects offered useful insights about the river and its habitats. We reviewed a report on the pH and conductivity graphs by a NHTI student. We also reviewed research done by KSC students on wildlife corridors along the Ashuelot in Keene and Swanzey. Dr. Denise Burchsted presented student obtained data on microplastics in the river.

The **Annual River cleanup** took place September 15 and 16 in conjunction with the Connecticut River Conservancy's Source to the Sea Clean-up. ARLAC co-sponsored the event with the Cheshire County Conservation District and the City of Keene. 76 volunteers collected over two tons of trash in Marlow, Keene and Swanzey.

We continue to have a Facebook presence as the Ashuelot River Local Advisory Committee. ARLAC meets the third Tuesday monthly at 7 P. M. at the Keene Public Library. We invite citizens and town officials to contact their local ARLAC representatives with any concerns or interest in participating as a town representative.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Sullivan Sullivan, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, major fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Sullivan as of and for the year ended December 31, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

### Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. As a result of the implementation of GASB Statement No. 72, the Town disclosed its investments in accordance with the fair value hierarchy. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

#### Other Matters

Management's Discussion and Analysis – Management has omitted a Management's Discussion and Analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by the missing information.

Other Information – Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Town of Sullivan's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual fund schedules are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual fund schedules are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCIES

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Sullivan Sullivan, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the governmental activities, general fund, and aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Sullivan as of and for the year ended December 31, 2016, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the Department's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Town of Sullivan's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and, therefore, there can be no assurance that all such deficiencies have been identified. In addition, because of inherent limitations in internal control, including the possibility of management override of controls, misstatements due to error or fraud may occur and not be detected by such controls. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the following deficiencies in the Town of Sullivan's internal control to be significant deficiencies:

### Cash Reconciliations

The reconciliation of the general fund bank account prepared by the Treasurer is not compared to or reconciled with the one prepared by the Town's outsourced accounting function. There was a variance between the Treasurer's reconciliation and the general ledger cash balance at December 31. State RSA's indicate that it is the responsibility of the Treasurer to keep suitable records of all transactions and it is a best practice to reconcile the Town's general ledger to the Treasurer on a monthly basis. This lack of control can cause an increased risk of misstatement of cash balances. We recommend that the Treasurer prepared reconciliation and the reconciliation prepared by the contracted accounting function be compared and reconciled to each other on a monthly basis. Any variances noted between the two should be investigated and corrected. Alternatively, the Treasurer may delegate reconciliation responsibility to the contracted accounting function with the approval of the Board of Selectmen, but must review and formally sign off on the reconciliation provided that she is in agreement with the noted amounts.

Management's response: The Town has formulated an updated Excel spreadsheet that incorporates all of the reconciliation categories used by Municipal Resources Inc. Now that the Treasurer and the accountant are using the same groups of data the general fund bank account has matched for both reconciliations on a monthly basis.

Town of Sullivan Independent Auditor's Communication of Significant Deficiency

### Adjusting Journal Entries

While documenting the internal controls over adjusting journal entries it was noted that supporting documentation for entries made is not included to support/backup adjustments, and the entries are only accepted as part of the whole financial packet and not on an individual basis. We recommend that all adjusting entries made be provided to the Board in the monthly financial packets and that these packets be kept organized and on file at the Town Hall for inspection. We further recommend that all supporting documents/backup for entries be provided with adjustments made in order to facilitate an adequate review of the entries made. Finally, we recommend that the adjusting entries be approved by the Selectmen on an individual basis and that documentation of this approval be evidenced with signatures on the entries themselves.

Management's response: The Town has created a journal entry form that will be initiated every time a journal entry is necessary. The forms will be collectively reviewed by the Board of Selectmen on a quarterly basis so they can be aligned with the detail report.
