## SCHOOL REPORT

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### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of North Hampon :

I herewith submit to you my thirteenth report as Superintendent of your schools.

The current school year began on September 9, 1942, with an enrollment of ninety-seven. Sixteen of these were at the East School in grades one through six. Eighty-one registered with the three teachers at the Center School. During the November vacation, the East School was closed when the teacher and the pupils moved to the Center School. There are now four teachers with two grades each in one building.

At the close of the previous school year Mr. Stuart Carter resigned to teach in the schools of Berlin, New Hampshire. The School Board has employed Mr. Philip Brown as principal of its school. Mr. Brown comes to us from Tufonboro where he was in charge of the consolidated school. We have every reason to believe, both from his past work and from the few months he has been with us, that his administration will be successful.

The success of a school depends upon its teachers. The long established custom of North Hampton is to build a staff of teachers trained for their special grades with an understanding of the interests of the townspeople and their children.

The results of this policy are evidenced by the definite route our children follow while in our schools. There is no purposeless detouring since each teacher under-

stands the methods of the preceding teacher and progresses along the same path. This is one definite advantage of a constant staff. All encouragement must be given our teachers to remain with us.

Mrs. Louise MacKenzie introduces the pupils to their first social contacts. She helps them to live with others, to be a part of an established organization. This is surely teaching the fundamentals of democracy. Her pupils are making their usual rapid progress in reading accurately and understandingly the books of their grade level.

Mrs. Mary Naves, building upon previously laid foundation, completes the study of the mechanics of reading and introduces the children to its independent application. The efficiency of her work is proven by the excellent work books completed by the pupils. Arithmetic is emphasized in the fourth grade.

The fifth and sixth grades are in charge of Mrs. Olive Parker. It is her obligation to teach the children to become independent readers, instruct them in the practical application of the arithmetic processes learned in the lower grades give them an understanding of the history of their own country and open to them a wider view of the entire world through the study of geography and other social sciences. Parents, school officials and children know well that Mrs. Parker is doing exactly these things. Her work is altogether commendable.

The report of the school nurse is included herewith. It is with much satisfaction that I report our improved physical examination. Heretofore the attempt to examine each pupil every year has compelled a lighter examination. Now a thorough physical check-up is given each pupil at least twice during his school life in the elementary grades. Parents certainly will favor the

new policy, the more so since it is supplemented by check-ups of all children by the school nurse.

Mrs. Geneva Southwick has been employed to supervise music in our school. She is a trained supervisor with valuable experience in schools of the west. We are certain she is doing well by our children. Our thanks are due Mrs. Howard Hobbs, who carried on the music instruction until a certified teacher could be obtained.

Of necessity, the war will bring changes to our schools. There will be changes, not so much of subject matter as of emphasis. There is a definite need that more time be devoted to geography of the entire world. New maps are now available which show the northern hemisphere. By use of this, the future interrelations of the different parts of the world are more clearly seen. The air routes, trade channels of the future, can definitely be traced. Our pupils will be better world citizens because of this map and its study.

The army tells us that a definite program for physical fitness must be an important part of our activities. Although this work must be done mainly in the secondary schools, the elementary grades must do their part. Care must be taken that our pupils have suitable physical exercise, that they understand the fundamental rules of health and that they guard their own welfare by exercise, rest and food, each in the right proportion. It is one duty of the schools to see that this is understood by the pupils. This will not be a group program, but must be based upon the need of each individual. Some pupils will need much exercise, some will need little. Sometimes a better balanced diet. The individual must be the keynote of this program.

As part of our obligation to guard the health of our children, "penny milk" is now available to all the pupils

of the school. By arrangement with the Agricultural Marketing Administration, the milk dealer is paid the producer price for his milk by the national government. This makes it possible for the dealer to sell milk to the pupil for one cent per half pint. Pupils are not limited to one half pint each. The eagerness with which the milk is bought proves its worth.

The schools are willingly fulfilling their part in waging a successful war. The teachers and pupils are buying war bonds and stamps — regularly. Three national registrations, those of sugar, gasoline and oil, have been entrusted to the teachers of the nation. It seems probable that War Ration Book Number Two will also be distributed by the schools. The children in both elementary and high schools have worked long and diligently in the gigantic task of collecting the metal and rubber so badly needed by our armed forces.

You, as a board, have always governed your decisions by the welfare of the children. You have always been helpful to me as superintendent of your schools.

## NURSE'S REPORT

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To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of North Hampton, N. H.

There were 100 children examined with 54 more or less serious conditions found. Of these, 41 were definitely corrected during the year, through the co-operation of parents or clinics.

The dental clinic was held as usual. 52 children received treatment. 22 children received dental care from their own dentist. The Parent-Teacher Association has given substantial help to the dental clinic.

Hot lunches were served during the winter months.

No serious epidemics in the schools appeared last year. There was a good response to the appeal to parents to attend to the vaccination of their children before the opening of school in the fall. 24 visits were made to the schools.

I wish to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Gillmore, the School Board, teachers, Parent-Teacher Association, and parents for their splendid co-operation with my work.

## SCHOOL DOCTOR'S REPORT

To the School Board of North Hampton, N. H.

The Board this year adopted the method of examination of school children found effective in other towns.

A very thorough examination of grades 2 and 6 insuring that a check can be made later in the school life of each child so that defects found when they were examined in Grade 2 could be remedied before they leave the primary grades.

Judging from the comparatively few defective tooth conditions found, I think parents seem to be conscious of what ill effects may be caused by defective teeth and are helping to remedy this condition very well.

We did find quite a few not only enlarged but diseased tonsils and these should be attended to.

One other condition which I feel should have more attention is the matter of poor posture and **improperly fitted** shoes which in many cases is the cause of poor posture. Improper shoes are often the cause of "Fallen Arches" later in life, a condition which may cause great inconvenience or disability and I would urge parents to see that children are not allowed to wear shoes which show any great amount of wear on either side of the heel. Frequent inspection of the shoes and repair of any excessive wear will well repay the attention given.

# SEACOAST REGIONAL ASSOCIATION

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The Seacoast Region of New Hampshire consists of the towns bordering on the seacoast and tidewaters of the **State.**

These communities have common interest in economic betterment, in regional problems, and in necessary adjustments to changing conditions brought about by war emergencies.

The New Hampshire Seacoast Regional Development Association is the accredited organization through which this and other regional communities are brought together in combined efforts to attain their related objectives of development and improvements.

It serves the individual interests of the Community to the extent of its facilities in accordance with expressed desires of the Community.

There are five Regional Associations in New Hampshire.

The Seacoast Association organized in 1934 and incorporated in 1936 is the official State Co-ordinating agency for the Seacoast Region. The Executive Secretary is the only paid official and his salary is provided for by State appropriation administered by the State Planning and Development Commission under certain rules of procedure.

Consistent with the State Statute, City and Town appropriations, requested on an approximate basis of one one hundredth of one percent of net assessed valuation or less than 10 cents for a thousand dollars, are used for publicizing the resources of your community. Each com-

munity has representation on the Board of Directors and its representative citizens serve as members on committees.

The Association works in co-operation with Regional City and Town, State and Federal Departments and Officials, the State University Extension Services, the New England Council Chamber of Commerce, Farm, Industrial and other accredited organizations and has established contacts, brought about conferences and surveys and gathered information necessary to determining the needs of the Region. This work has contributed to developments and considerations which could be realized only through co-operative effort.

Promotional publicity, not only through publications but through personal contacts, conferences, information service and otherwise has brought year round business. The farm and the factory as well as the retail business, the professional and other services, and the resort business are all recipients of added income resulting from this work. Of added importance is the maintenance of tax producing property and individual benefits of employment.

In view of the necessary planning for the post war period this promotional work assumes more importance than ever.

Evidences of the work of Association officials and the various committees are most apparent but difficult to publicize. Bridges have been built, new highways constructed, others improved, funds are available for coastal protection and bridge construction when priorities permit. Industrial plants have received war contracts. Some of the needs of this vital defense area have been recognized by the Federal Government; some added transportation facilities have been provided; information on the population has been presented for purposes of securing adequate ra- has been presented for purposes of securing adequate ra-

development are in progress; development of fishery resources are in prospect and consideration is being directed to forestry and farm conservation needs.

The recently released report "A Plan for the Development of the Seacoast Region" prepared by the State Planning and Development Commission represents much time and work of the officers and committees, together with that of the State Commission.

The factual findings of this report have been proven to be of particular value for Federal and local use in the present emergency and with continued studies will be of the utmost importance for guiding future planning.

Copies of the report have been sent to Boards of Selectmen, City Officials and individuals who are contributing to the overhead expense of the Association.

The Association stands on its record of accomplishment with equal consideration for the interests of all regional communities and it is obvious in view of increasing demands for service that the value of regional co-operation is important to everyone.
