# A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHER AND EDITOR

Over 100,000 square dancers from every state and many foreign countries have attended the National Square Dance Convention during the past twelve years. Perhaps you were one of them. Or maybe you're planning to attend your first National this summer in Long Beach, Calif.

Either way, you'll want to know more about the National Convention. What is it? When is it held? Where is it held? Who sponsors it? Why is it held?

The National Square Dance Convention is recognized everywhere as the world's greatest square dance event. Each year it attracts greater attendance and participation as more and more dancers find that it is a superb place to enjoy dancing to the very best callers, participate in panels and clinics on every phase of their hobby, hold reunions with friends everywhere, enjoy fine exhibitions, make it a part of an outstanding vacation for the entire family, and have lots of real fun.

Since 1952, when the first Convention was held in Riverside, Calif., a different city has hosted the National each year during the summer months. Any city with adequate facilities and organization is eligible to bid for the Convention.

Conventions are awarded to square dance organizations or federations which in turn provide a city and place for the Convention. Two publications, "Policies for Holding a Convention" and "Bid Procedures", outline full details for holding a Convention and are available from all Executive Committee members.

The National Executive Committee (see cover) is a group composed of past General Chairmen of the National. This group has the responsibility of locating and selecting cities and or-

ganizations to host future Conventions and advising selected cities to assure a successful convention.

These men sacrifice thousands of hours and sizeable sums of their personal money to assure the success of this event. No one is paid. This is entirely a voluntary undertaking.

Likewise, delegates to the Convention pay their expenses and staff members are not compensated for their efforts. If anyone were paid, the cost involved would prohibit the Convention from operating in the black.

Square dancers salute these men for their untiring efforts and successful promotion of the National Square Dance Convention.

The 13th National Square Dance Convention, which will be held in Long Beach, Calif. from July 23-25, will be one of the best ever. The Convention Committee has been hard at work for several months to plan and promote this Convention.

You'll be able to dance on 150,000 square feet of wood floor in one central location — the spacious Long Beach Municipal Auditorium, within sound of the Pacific surf.

You can register for this event now by completing and mailing the Advance Registration Form which was published in the January 1964 AMER-ICAN SQUARES. Get your Registration in early to insure your good time at the 13th National Square Dance Convention in Long Beach.

# WHERE ARE WE GOING?

All dancing is fun with good leadership. Good leadership is our problem now. It will be our problem in the future.

As one method for helping our movement and to help forestall the doom criers, let me suggest that it is not the basics that are bad, but our presentation of them. For example, the basic allemande thar is not used in every dance and generally not more than two or three times during an entire evening.

However, our teaching and presentation of any new basic is quite different. When we teach allemande thar for the first time, we review it over and over that first night, perhaps as many as ten times. The next night we review it again and maybe ten times more. We continue this every night, night after night, until we are sure our dancers would know it even in their sleep. Then we continue to call it once or twice a night the rest of their dancing experience.

Did your caller give any of the recent basics the same chance to be successfully learned? If he did, I'll bet you liked that new basic. People only pretend to dislike things that they don't know well enough to feel comfortable doing.

More likely though, your caller used it once or twice on one night. He might have remembered to do it the next night or he might have not. Maybe six weeks later he got it out and dusted it off again.

He forgot that he called it perhaps five times and didn't really teach it as it should have been taught. With the average amount of absenteeism and with the hit or miss programming of the average caller, it is quite likely that a fourth of the floor might have never been there for the original teaching.

I suggest that every caller in introducing any new basic must do the following.

1. Give your dancers the same

amount of chance to learn every new basic you choose to teach, just as you did in teaching them right and left grand. You can do this easily if you will program any new basic for six weeks or more, if necessary. In this way any new basic will become just as much second nature as ladies chain.

- 2. Present any new basic from all conceivable get ins and outs. In teaching square thru, teach it from home position, from lines of four, from a double pass thru formation, from chicken plucker formation, and from a wheel around. If dancers are to really know a new basic, they must have the same chance of really learning it.
- 3. Make one more test before picking any new basic to teach. Wait out a new basic until you find something on it from at least three sources around the country. Of course, if you have a workshop group, you can try a new basic as soon as you get it and then teach only the better ones to your regular groups.
- 4. Consider why you should teach every new thing that comes along just because it is new. Why not be a little choosey? Why not pick only the three or four basics a year that become popular?

Square dancing has progressed from the single visitor square, such as "Pop Goes the Weasel", to single couple squares of the "Birdy In the Cage" type. From here it progressed from the pick up two figures to lines of three figures and then to two couple work figures such as "Arkansas Traveler".

For several years we had a rash of star figures such as "Texas Tornado" and goal post figures such as "Pass Thru and Around One". All of the goal post figures ended with cross trail thru, left allemande. Next came lines of four figures. Many have been the variations and new basics on the lines of four.

There has been a trend toward meshing and intermixing of lines, circles, goal post, and star patterns. In these, while the individual dancer reacts to a command, the group of eight is moving in a meshing pattern. Individually the single dancer works no

harder than before, but the group as a whole has perhaps moved through a rather complicated maneuver.

I have tried to show that, rather than destroying square dancing, new basics have through the years aided its growth and added to its vitality. So let not the doom criers prevail. They have always been with us and always will be. Certainly we should be concerned with the interest and opinions of others, but these must be evaluated with a cool head and rational thinking.

To panic and emulate Chicken Little, crying that "The sky is falling — the end of the world is near," each time something different is introduced simply is not reasonable. This kind of thinking can be more detrimental in the final analysis than any other single factor.

Square dancers tend to seek their own level. Surely with the vast number of groups dancing today everyone should be able to find the type of dancing he enjoys and have the grace to allow others to do likewise.

The purist who wants square dancing to be an ethnic experience in its original form may have difficulty, because there never was a single, static phase of its history. It varied from region to region, person to person. It has evolved, as our society evolved, from the simple to the more complex. Perhaps for this reason it has survived over the years. Who is to say at what point this evolution should stop?

We can be proud of the dual aspect of our hobby. Though its roots are inextricably wound in the history of our country, it is not a thing of the past. Rather, it is a vital, growing, everchanging experience, adaptable to the varying interest and emotional needs of the people who are its substance.

Leave the doom criers to their lamenting and looking backward. The rest of us, knowing and appreciating the various facets of square dancing, can give it strength. It will not be destroyed as long as there are people who love the heart beat of its music and its many-throated calls ringing across the years to link the past with the future.

# CURRENT SQUARE DANCE "FADS"

Square dancing today is so widespread an activity and has so many participants that it can no longer be termed a fad. Within the scope of the activity, however, there have arisen new developments which fit Webster's definition of fad: a custom followed temporarily with great zeal. Some of these fads may last long enough to "grow" out of the definition. Others will pass with the changing times. Here's news of several current ones.

One of the "hottest" popular fads is the cruise or tour. In August 1963, Dolores and John Campbell of San Carlos, California led a tour of Europe that began in Prestwick, Scotland, and included Edinburgh, London, Paris, Lucerne, Rome, Munich,

Cologne and Amsterdam.

Each stop was filled with sightseeing at famous landmarks, shopping, and some dancing. Members of the tour danced in Essex, England with Tommy Cavanaugh, and at Churchill Gardens with Viv Canon, Charles Vest, Al Green, and Jerry Howell. By request of their guide, John Campbell called without music and the group danced at the Hall of Mirrors in Versailles for all the other visitors.

Air Force members and their fami-

lies at SHAPE headquarters in Evreux, France played host to the group at a dance with Ben Wilson, Andy Gibson, Jim Knox, and John Campbell calling. A welcome treat here was the American coffee served after the dance. In Munich the dancing was done to tapes but the tour members enjoyed it and included rounds, too.

They went on to dance in Heidelberg Castle before beginning the final lap of their tour. All the members of the group were Californians but Mary and Joseph Klatel of Cleveland, Ohio,

who reported their activities.

Square dancing has become worldwide because so many Americans are now living on foreign soil. This fact is certainly a boon to tour planners, too. One example of such Americans is that of Zora and Ralph Piper, formerly of the University of Minnesota, now on Fulbright Lectureships in Tehran.

On their way to assume their positions, the Pipers visited Ireland; Edinburgh, where they saw and participated in folk dancing; London, highlighted by visits, one with Maude Karpeles, Honorary Secretary of International Folk Music Council; Berlin, East and West; Warsaw, Peznan,

Prague, Budapest, Sofia, Athens, Cy-

prus and Beirut.

In Tehran after touring and getting settled, Ralph was assigned to National Teachers College and Zora to both the College and the Ministry of Education, where they both will work with physical education. Since the College was late in opening, the Pipers went to Isfahan and Shiran where they conducted an evening square dance program; then to Tahria and Rezaieh, hoping to shoot some Kurdish and Assyrian dances on film. The time was not right but they succeeded in getting tapes with folk music.

Back in Tehran they conduct square dancing for the Iran-American Society and attend bimonthly meetings of an Army club as well as dance

in their home.

Merry Squares, Bloomfield, New Jersey have sent more news via Charlie Bogart about their variety of activities: round dancing, a trick or treat party, and special dances.

This club has passed along a four foot piece of driftwood inscribed, "Del-

ta Drifters, Antioch California, Drifting Eastward". On the back the drift is listed. Starting September 8, 1962, it has passed thru twenty-five clubs, and has now been passed southward.

We hope teenage and family dancing will definitely not be a fad, but a long-lasting part of the square dance picture. Bob Boyd of Granite City, Illinois writes about his work with youth and sends a report of the Teen Festival held last summer in Kentucky with three hundred young dancers.

Included were flyers from several holiday dances, one for a teenage night owl dance, designed especially for youth and the "young at heart", with teenage callers and teachers. Instructors for the local Checkerboards are Gary Greene and Suzanne Boyd. Both workshopped rounds and squares at the Teen Room of the National Convention in Miami.

Many and varied as the current fads are — from world tours to badges earned at home — we hope they fulfill their main purpose: to help square dancers have FUN!

The New Year's crop of new ideas in square dance choreography is already starting to grow. To the people responsible for reporting these new ideas through notes, periodicals, written articles, and the like, this is often problematic.

In order to report or review these ideas correctly, from the author's view-point, the reviewer must know the name of the author, the author's explanation, and his examples. Then proper credit can be given at the time of introduc-

tion of the idea.

One thing is very apparent in this hobby. As soon as somebody introduces a thought to the square dance public, it is in turn passed on and eventually reaches the attention of others whose business it is to report it. Thoughts coming to us second hand become twisted and may not even be what was originally intended by the author.

On the other hand, new ideas fed through normal channels for consideration can become a part of our square dance nomenclature after a thorough exploration as to their versatility, comfort, ease of teaching, and usage through time. In recent years, such movements as dixie chain, square thru, star thru, wheel and deal, and others came to us through these channels.

The latest movements might involve such ideas as fold somebody, swing thru, and all the variations of ocean wave set-ups that have been in use the past two years. We look forward to other creations which will come. Most of these will be tried and shelved after proper and thorough exploration in the experimental stage.

All of the above observations often lead to inquiries from our teachers. They point out that new dancers at one time had only to take ten, fifteen, or a tops of twenty lessons to be able to dance with the best.

Today the theory of thirty lessons seems to be the average acceptable nation-wide. How can you attract beginners into our activity if they have to spend over half a year learning before being accepted into their friends' clubs?

Perhaps a look at our teaching procedures might be in order. We still have the same number of teaching and learning hours in school devoted to such common courses as science, history, and other academic subjects in spite of great strides forward in new ideas and theories in these subjects.

Have you noticed how out-dated your learning theories from high school days have become compared to those of your sons and daughters? The teaching methods have changed. Perhaps our teaching methods in square dancing should be changed in order to cover a more abundant amount of material in the same time period. It would be worth exploring for the sake of our beginners.

By now most of the callers using the swing thru movement know that two swing thrus in a row is equivalent to a right and left thru or can be called as a double swing thru. Just be sure to allow enough time for the dancers to be able to do the call in comfort.

The swing star thru movement introduced last month is proving to be very versatile. An ordinary "heads pass thru" can be called "heads swing star thru, California twirl, swing star thru" as an equivalent. You might try this for a variety in your patter calls.

### CALLERS' QUESTIONS

RUSS BONE, Kankakee, Ill.: "Many dancers mistake awkward choreography for high level dancing. . . . I think the thing most of us work for in calling for strange groups is to keep them dancing by offering enough challenge for the more experienced dancers but still calling the movements in such a way as to keep the less experienced dancers dancing. Smooth (flowing) choreography helps a great deal in doing this because it places the action directly in front of the dancers and has them furnishing the momentum to complete the figure."

Thank you for your observations, Russ. Like you, I believe that a flowing type of square dance choreography adds to dancing instead of being soldier-like drilling. A good example of this "momentum" idea can be found in the call "centers in, cast off", or in the recent "swing star thru" movement which has the star thru following a normal swing thru.

Today's choice of movements can be put together in many ways so there is a constant feel of the "natural" thing to do for the dancers. An occasional "gimmick" type figure, however, is still fun to do. So don't pass over the good ones.

BOB VAN ANTWERP, Longbeach, Calif.: "... About the hand or arm movement during a wheel and deal... I do not like to see arms hooked. I like the forearm to forearm press with the lady's left hand in the gent's right hand. This stops the fight to unlock or drop hands before the double pass thru after a wheel and deal."

I agree, Bob, even to the point of stating that all couple wheeling movements should be done the way that you suggest. These incude cast offs, wheel across, and first couple left (or



right) out of a double pass thru formation.

The exception would be if the call came from a promenade setup in which the heads were told to wheel around (or back track). Then the two-hand clasps would be retained until the next call. Once broken, however, the hand holds revert to inside hands joined only.

In today's square dancing, elbow hook turns are never used. This is a "rough" movement of the past which doesn't add to dancing smoothness unless performed by experts.

BUTCH LITTLE, Grelton, Ohio: "I don't feel obligated to use every new basic that comes along but . . . do appreciate having the basic rules for . . . new material explored and explained before it is put into general practice.

The important thing is not which basic we choose to use . . . but that the basic rule of any given command is fully understood by the folks that teach and use it.

An example of this would be from

a static square 'heads cross trail thru, U turn back' and end up with half the floor in a square and the other half in a double pass thru formation."

A real good point, Butch. If the student hasn't learned, the teacher hasn't taught. Often this can be traced back to the teacher's teacher. It's the basic rules that make the game possible and enjoyable by all the participants, anywhere, and under any conditions.

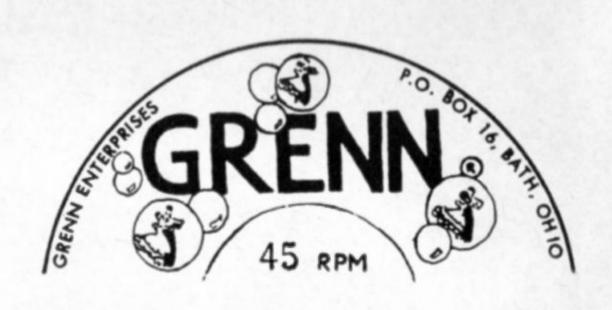

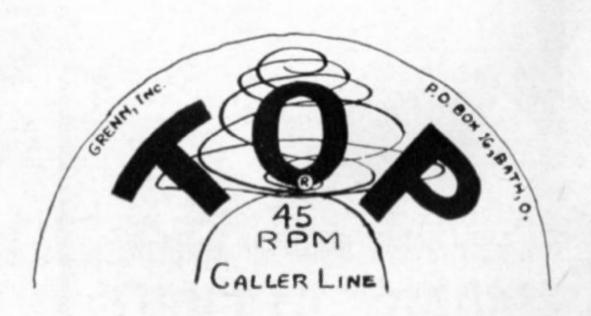
