

Also that they publish the total valuation of the town, embracing the number of horses, oxen, cows, sheep and all other stock; the number of acres of land, and the names and amount of each individual's taxes, and the names and amounts of all abatements; all to be embraced in the town report, and to be distributed to the voters at least five days previous to town meeting.

ANNUAL REPORT
—OF THE—
SCHOOL BOARD.

The following report and general condition of schools in the town of New Hampton is respectfully submitted:

The amount of money for the year was sufficient to support each school twenty-four weeks. It was thought best to make only two terms as nearly equal in length as possible.

The spring term beginning April 27 and closing June 26, earlier than was intended on account of the warm weather.

The fall term beginning August 31 and continuing fourteen weeks, making a total of twenty-three weeks. Although the amount of money would warrant another week, we found that it would make too long a term to give general satisfaction.

School No. 12 after having kept one week was closed on account of scarcity of scholars. Three were sent to Bristol as tuition scholars, at an expense of \$9.35, while the cost of the

school for the remaining thirteen weeks would have been sixty-five dollars. In all probability the school will be good size next term.

School No. 5 was twice closed on account of diphtheria. The whole number of weeks for second term being only ten and 4-5. With these exceptions, all had twenty-three weeks and made good progress in studies.

The course of study prescribed by the board of 1890 has, as was hoped, proved to be of value to the school training.

This year schools have more nearly approximated the course than formerly. At the close of the present school year, in nearly all schools, there were classes which passed a satisfactory examination of text books studied, and are ready to enter the spring term of '92 in advanced standing. We can safely say, within our knowledge of school work, there has never been so large a number of pupils fitted for a higher grade. The present year numbers eighteen who have gone out from our town schools to more advanced institutions of learning.

The complete School Chart placed in each school in 1890, embracing aids to oral and text-book instruction in all branches usually taught in our public schools, is an encyclopedia in itself. The board feel that these Charts are invaluable in the school-room, and wish every town through out New England might adopt them. Our teachers bear testimony to their merits and in the hands of efficient instructors, this school help soon pays for itself. We are glad that New Hampton can boast of an instrument so well adapted to the wants of our public schools.

The text-books belonging to the town are properly marked and labelled with printed instructions to the pupil in regard to care of the book. We have also placed in the hands of each teacher a "Text Book Record", that a strict account of books loaned may be kept and their condition recorded, thereby holding the scholar responsible for the care and return of the same at close of the term.

We think much credit is due our teachers and that every

school in town has been a success. There are many things to be taken into consideration to make up the perfect whole. Among them are the requisites of a good teacher, one who is well informed on general subjects and not confined to imparting knowledge to the verbage of the text-book in hand. One who believes that the lesson assigned should be reviewed in advance of classes taught. The teachers employed, with one exception, were teachers of experience and all of good scholarship. Three were graduates from New Hampton Institution, one from Tilton Seminary, and one from Lowell High School with two years study at Wellesley.

And here we wish to ask teachers to be more accurate in filling out registers. Of the whole number sent in for the year, very few were absolutely correct. A little care exercised in the matter will save the board much time and extra labor. Since our town and State reports are based on registers, it is necessary that the figures be exact.

It is a self evident truth that punctuality is an essential to success in every undertaking. With this established fact in view, we feel that the united efforts of parents and School Board should cooperate with teachers in removing from our schools such obstacles as tardiness and irregularity of attendance. In some cases these faults have become so habitual as to greatly depreciate the value of term's work. Absences amounting to 1542 days must prove a detriment to the children.

In our own behalf and that of the children, we extend a vote of thanks to the persons who so kindly contributed the American flag for the village school grounds, and as it waves to the breeze, we hope the donors may be made happy by seeing patriotic principles inculcated in the minds of the youth who are permitted to pass under its folds.

The chairman, in closing her services as a member of the board, wishes to extend thanks to parents, teachers and scholars, for the uniform kindness received in the discharge of her various duties during her three years' work.
