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A MESSAGE FROM THE PUBLISHER AND EDITOR

Square dancing is fun! More people are dancing today than ever before. It is true that the total number of people in the national square dance picture increases each year. It is also true that more square dancers are dancing rather than rat-racing or jerking around the square.

Dancing, by definition, means rhythmic moving to music. If you move to the music when you do a square, you are dancing. If you are not with the music, you simply are not

dancing.

As square dancing matures, many avid dancers put their efforts toward improving their dancing skills rather than merely learning each new basic that is created.

Sharp callers, likewise, teach their beginners to dance smoothly with the music. They know that dancers who enjoy square dancing will mature into regular square dance hobbyists.

It is only common courtesy to allow the ladies the privilege of twirling or not twirling on the end of a promenade, during a grand right and left, or

at any other time.

Twirling can be beautiful if it is done gracefully and in time to the music. However, many ladies resent being pulled and twisted through a tip.

People who are exposed to roughhouse type dancing soon drop out of the square dance picture. Or to put it another way, don't be the jerk on the end of an allemande left.

The 13th National Square Dance Convention will be held in Long Beach, Calif. this month. About 20,000 dancers are expected for this event.

Joan and Norm Holloway, Convention Chairmen, are featured on our cover this month. Square dancers everywhere salute the Holloways for their contributions to the movement as National Convention Chairmen.

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

SMO-0-0-0-OTH SQUARE DANCING

In my travels I have noticed that some clubs have a definite, almost natural, ability to glide across the floor to the beat of the music, while other clubs are completely unaware of any music whatsoever.

The only answer of course is the fact that *someone* was able to transmit to the first group of dancers the wonderful satisfaction of moving to music. An adverse situation holds true for the second group of dancers. This *someone* can only be the club caller or instructor.

First and foremost, a caller must have a good sense of music and rhythm before he can transmit this feeling to the dancers. His selection of music is highly important for it provides the beat and tempo for the dance.

His commands must be given in a manner so as not to rush the dancers but also so as not to make them hesitate. Each command should be given to complement the preceding one, thus allowing the dancers to orient themselves comfortably.

A smooth caller will strive to fashion his dances into flowing routines of constant, comfortable movements.

The best place to teach smoothness is in new dancer classes. The caller must teach not only the mechanics of square dancing, but he must teach his dancers to move to the music, to feel the music, to dance. Each new basic new dancers learn should be emphasized with the teaching of courtesy and smooth execution of that basic.

Some classes know all the mechanics of certain basics, know them fluently, and yet when another caller sets the same basics to music and rhythm, these same dancers fall apart at the seams. Why? Because they were never

taught the graceful movement of dancing a specific basic.

Some classes completely aware of music and smooth dancing fall apart because a caller has no sense of rhythm, timing, or dance tempo. Callers? Maintain and instruct your classes longer if necessary to implant into your dancers this prime ingredient. Square dancing is dancing.

Next on the totem pole of smooth square dancing are the dancers themselves. It is of utmost importance that a dancer knows his basics well so as not to hinder the teamlike efforts of the square.

As you feel the music and the beat, shuffle your feet to that beat, striving to keep your feet dancing as you execute each command. The click, click, click of smooth shuffle steps, the flowing patterns, put together in style by dancer and caller make a beautiful sight to see and a pleasure to dance. This can only be called *smooth square dancing*.

Other factors involved in smooth square dancing are: (1) The condition of the dance floor. (2) The size of the square. Control the size of the square in relation to the tempo of the dance; tempo slow - enlarge square; tempo fast - decrease square. (3) The dancers must have a desire to dance smoothly and fluently and strive to learn.

So you can see, no one or two ingredients make smooth square dancing. Smooth dancing is a combination of several factors. Much of the load rests on the shoulders of the callers and instructors who constantly are working with so many wonderful square dancers.

SQUARE DANCE

A top-rated Canadian radio program, a teen hootenanny, miniature club banners, and "tandem squares" highlight the feature news from across the square dance miles this month.

The changing face of the square dance picture is one of progress, enthusiasm, and fun, so let's take a look into the kaleidoscope and see what's keeping dancers busy.

From Saskatchewan, Canada comes the good news that "Square Dance Notebook", a Monday evening, 6:30 to 7:00 p.m., broadcast over Radio Station CBK, rated a very close second in a recent survey of program popularity.

In the afternoon to midnight time slot, "Notebook" draws the largest listening audience with the exception

of the "National News" show.

Noreen Wilson, who writes "Notebook" and is also its radio voice, plays the latest square dance records and advises callers, teachers, and dancers where they can purchase the new releases. Sponsor for the show is the Saskatchewan Power Corporation. Grenn, Inc. supplies Miss Wilson with a great number of the records she uses.

Mail response to "Square Dance Notebook" is enthusiastic from listeners not only in Saskatchewan but in the station's fringe areas of Manitoba, Alberta, North Dakota, and Montana.

Buckeye state, Stan Burdick keeps the dancers in the Sandusky, Ohio area really jumpin'. News bits and pieces from Stan's headquarters at the Sandusky YMCA include the growing popularity there, as in many parts of the country, of the sing-a-long square dance. Stan's last sing-a-long benefited the Y World Service Organization.

Sandusky dancers seem to have hit on a terrific idea for recruiting new teen square dancers by sponsoring hootenanny dances to draw initial groups. Publicity for these and other activities is one of the ideas behind the "Y Square Dancer" a news sheet distributed free to Buckeye dancers on request.

Another note is that a full-page of the Sandusky Register was devoted recently to a photo story of the city's square dancers. Well-done publicity such as this gives square dancing in general a healthy lift and also acts as a prime recruiter of new dancers.

■ Jamborees and conventions keep popping up wherever square dancers gather to add even more to an already active hobby. The National Guard Armory in Columbus, Nebraska was filled to capacity when Harold's Squares presented their eighth annual

festival.

Bob Brundage was at the mike for the feature dance. An area callers jamboree was emceed by Ted Elbracht. Dena and Elwyn Fresh were in charge of the rounds for the day and the introduction of an "Impromptu Round Dance Program" was a festival success.

■ Out New England way, the New Ocean House in Swampscott, Mass. hosted the New England Square Dance Convention that drew 2,000 northeastern dancers. Sponsors for the two-day jamboree were the New England callers' and dancers' associations, NECCA and EDSARDA.

Fifty callers and round dance leaders were on the program that included special halls set aside for round danc-

ers and the teen-age set.

■ We're always on the look-out for news from square dance clubs about special activities or projects. This month we'd like to devote this last part of the kaleidoscope to the friendly Merry Squares of the Hilltop Barn in Bloomfield, New Jersey.

Marty Winter is the caller for this lively group that square dances one night a month and round dances another evening. Highlight of a recent dance was Marty's calling of "tandem squares" where two squares dance as

one unit with two couples in each numbered position, one behind the other.

The "outside" square, for instance, can promenade single file while the "inside" square makes an eight-hand star. Also, the "inside" square couples can work with those of the "outside" set in a figure such as "inside head couples pass thru, right and left thru the outside two."

Dancing "tandem squares" is a tricky job and the caller doesn't have such an easy time of it either. But the fun is doubled and dancing "tandem style" is a marvelous diversion from the evening's regular program.

Merry Squares also send us an idea that might solve the "lost banner" problems of so many clubs. When clubs in the Bloomfield area visit another group, they are presented with a miniature of the host club's banner, rather than the banner itself. This plan saves wear and tear on the original club banner and at the same time lets the visiting club take home a miniature that can be permanently displayed.

We keep a sharp eye wide open for new and novel ideas and welcome news and feature articles from any club or association. If your group is active, enthusiastic, and enjoys the the unusual, keep your eye on the kaleidoscope in future editions.



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
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CHOREOGRAPHY

Stan Burdick's "X" formation of square dancers in double sets has caused a lot of further exploration for this change of pace type dance.

While nobody has come up with a satisfactory way of setting up the squares in this formation, there have been several good suggestions for dissolving the double sets into their own individual sets, keeping every dancer in his or her original position in the square without the dancers being made aware that it was happening.

From Harry Jeffries of Alexandria, Ind. comes the following idea which works like a charm. After using your tip of "X" formations with the dancers and you are ready to separate them into individual sets for singing calls, try the following:

Couples three and four substitute Inside sides California twirl Two side ladies chain Sides dive thru, double pass thru Cross trail, behind the heads star thru Double, double pass thru (eight couples)

First couple left, second couple right Third couple left, fourth couple right Center two right and left thru, full

turn

To the outside two, right and left thru Allemande left (in your own set) . . .

As callers gain experience and knowledge of square dance choreography, they become more and more conscious of the possibilities of moving dancers around in the square in more than one way to accomplish the same end results.

The surprise allemande left which straightens out the set into a normal right and left grand seems to be the jubilant point in every square dance tip. Sometimes the possible allemande left is too apparent to the more experienced dancer and so a change at this

point can be challenging.

The following simple variations will greatly enhance your ability to keep the floor on its toes and listening. Remember to use the movement which will complement (alternate hands) the preceding one, perhaps cancelling out all hands with a no-hand movement like do-sa-do.

From an eight chain thru position with the heads facing their corners for a possible left allemande, call the fol-

lowing:

1) Star thru, right and left thru, star thru, left allemande . . .

2) Star thru, square thru 3/4 around,

left allemande . . .

3) Four hand star once around (exactly), girls turn back, left allemande . . .

4) Swing thru double, cross trail thru, U turn back, left allemande . . .

By doing a right and left thru, dive thru from this set-up, the heads have their backs to their corners' partners and you can then call the following:

- 1) Square thru 3/4 around, left allemande. . .
- 2) Box the gnat, half square thru, right and left grand . . .

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
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
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4) Star thru, cross trail thru, left allemande . . .

3) Right and left thru, pass thru, left

allemande . . .

The possibilities become endless as you learn more about other move-

ments and their equivalents. By apply-

ing each piece in various ways as long as they remain comfortable to do, you can change every piece of every dance to the level that your floor is capable of dancing.

CALLERS' QUESTIONS

"SCOTTY" FOGGO, Seal Beach, Calif .: "I have been using the 'spread the wheel' idea for several months. . . . Presented it to the Square Dance Callers Association of Southern California

as 'wheel and spread'.

"Because of the present popularity of 'wheel and deal' figures, just as soon as the caller says 'wheel and . . .' the dancers automatically start into a wheel and deal and the 'spread' follows very easily and smoothly. The term 'spread and wheel' requires the dancers to be on the alert and to think for a moment before they decide what the caller wants them to do. . . ."

Thank you, Scotty, for the numerous examples you sent us using your "wheel and spread" idea. The "spread the wheel" idea shown in the May, 1964 AMERICAN SQUARES first came to my attention toward the end of the year through Jim Lees of Nottingham, England. I felt that the terminology possibly followed the "stack the wheel", "spin the wheel" ideas.

In workshopping the idea using the command both ways, the consensus of opinion was to use "spread the wheel" and leave the "wheel and something" command to the much used "wheel and slide," "wheel and square thru", and "wheel and something" idea of Marty Winters as reported in the November 1962 and again in the August 1963 AMERICAN SQUARES.

It is so very interesting to observe

and explore square dance choreography ideas as one thought leads to another with seemingly no end of "new basics" in sight. There are so few new basics, mostly new twists given a new name. Yours is a good one, however, and should stay in the square dance picture.

BOB JOHNSON, Long Beach, Calif.: "I plan to start a strictly arky workshop sometime in the future in addition to the many other classes and clubs. . . Do callers in your area use this much now? . . . Would like this type of material to try out here where they don't seem to use it."

Thank you for the nice letter, Bob. I thought this question of arky material might be of interest to our readers since "arky style" square dance choreography has become more prevalent in other areas across the country in re-

cent years.

For the uninitiated, arky square dance choreography depends upon position dancing rather than people. For example, men move in the direction normally taken by the ladies and ladies move in the normal traffic pattern of the men.

The most simple version would be when two couples turn back during a right and left grand while the others continue in the normal direction. This would result in having two men and two ladies moving around in the wrong direction.

Another example, when meeting partners on a right and left grand, heads turn back (side couples balance two counts but don't turn back), pull by so that the same sex meet for an arky allemande, all go back to original partners and start another right and left grand moving forward in the direction now faced.

An ordinary daisy chain becomes a real challenge when normal traffic patterns are reversed for two couples while the others continue in a normal fashion.

From here the ideas can become numerous, all dependent upon the position of the dancers in relation to their normal positions.



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FIGURES AND BREAKS

GRAND SWING THRU FIGURES by Red Porter, Pasadena, Texas

Heads lead right, circle to a line Right and left thru Grand swing thru, balance Grand swing thru Cross trail thru, left allemande. . .

(Set up with right hand lady) Heads lead right, circle to a line Grand swing thru Box the gnat Cross trail thru, left allemande. . .

Head ladies chain right One and three half sashay Head gents step to the right that way Make lines of three Go up and back the three of you Do a grand swing thru, balance Back out and circle eight Reverse single file Men turn back Dixie grand, right, left, right, left allemande. . .

TWO ARKY by Larry Brockett, Los Alametos, Calif.

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

NEW BASICS

EVERYBODY CHAIN

On call everybody chain, the four ladies chain across the set where they are courtesy turned and chained back. While the ladies are doing this, the head men face right, give right hands to the side gents, pull by in time to courtesy turn the ladies coming into



those positions.

After putting the ladies back in again, head gents chain right, side gents chain left once more. Four changes brings everyone back home with their partners. When starting with opposites, only two changes are needed.

EXAMPLE

All around the left hand lady, partner left hand swing

Everybody chain, four ladies chain, head gents chain right

Turn the girl and everybody chain
Four ladies chain, head gents go right
Turn the girl and everybody chain
Four ladies chain, head gents go right
Turn the girl and everybody chain
Four ladies chain, head gents go right
Walk all around the left hand lady . . .

LOOP-THE-LOOP by Verne Callahan, Flint, Mich.

From lines of four, ends turn in, separate and "loop" back in behind arching couples who have in turn

dishragged under to reverse facing direction. Equivalent to ends turn in and substitute.

EXAMPLES

One and three will pass thru
Separate and go around two
Hook on to the ends is all you do
Go forward eight and back with you
Pass thru and loop-the-loop you do
Center four go right and left thru
Turn on around and pass back thru

Just promenade and don't slow down Heads wheel around and right and left thru

Turn on around and star thru
Draw the line, then pass thru

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

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PUSHING

MacGregor 1025 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Bob Van Antwerp

Good for Bob! Here's a nice patter workshop with swing star thru and a number of not-so-tricky calls set to a boogie beat that MacGregor can be proud of. Buy it for three reasons: hear a good caller, use the instrumental side to call anything, use the sheet of material.

WHY DO THEY ALWAYS SAY NO Windsor 4830 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Max Forsyth

Better not say "no" to this disc! Real hot band, good figure smartly composed for intermediates, and a "gone" Forsyth especially wired for sound effects (gravel voice, high octave flights). Sounds like he's calling this at the fever pitch point in midprogram, just before refreshments. And callers, you'll need a ladder to reach this pitch!

DON'T LET YOUR DEAL GO DOWN

Jewel 124 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Louis Calhoun

We don't know what the deal is, but the quality of this one is right up there. So Jewel, don't let that deal go back down. Calhoun complements the cadence capably for a comfortable dance.

CALIFORNIA HERE I COME Top 25081 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Paul Moore

We haven't heard from Paul for a spell, but it was timely for this Ohioan to reappear and spark a movement to the Convention state. Good dance, new wrinkle. Use the break any old three times between the figures.

IS YOU IS

Top 25080 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Ralph Kinnane

Never know what'll come out of that Al Russ band next—blues, dixieland, razzmatazz—all treated with the right beat to keep dancers happy! This is half the battle for any caller, Kinnane or "Anyname" can come through nicely with this one.

LOUISIANA SWING

MacGregor 1026 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Vera Baerg

We'll accept another Louisiana Swing like this with an updated figure, rollicking rhythm, and that Baerg bounce. She's clear, on the beat, and on key. Encore!

WHERE THE RED RED ROSES GROW

Swinging Square 2318 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Bill Saunders

Whattaya know! Of all the revivals of ten year oldies, here comes one we'd almost forgotten. It flourished then on Windsor and it'll flourish again on this Merrbach production. You'll want a copy for the mood and maybe one to give to grandmaw.

BRIGHTEN THE CORNER Blue Star 1732 — Instrumental Square Dance/Calls by Andy Andrus

Here's another old Sunday School rouser that was bound to wind up on a square dance platter one of these days. Andy handles it dandy, and although there's a slight choppy feeling at times, most callers can preach a good message with it and brighten all corners of the halls.

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We were so very pleased to see Charlie Baldwin's picture on the May 1964 AMERICAN SQUARES cover. This square dance caller has been coming to Moncton for our Jamborees for the last four years. He has done wonders for this recreation here in the Maritime Provinces.

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
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
