REPORT OF TOWN MEETING

March 8, 1949

A meeting of the inhabitants of the town of North Hampton qualified to vote in town affairs, duly notified and holden in the Town Hall, in said town, the alphabetical list of voters having been posted and inscribed on back there of by the supervisors of the Check List, was called to order at ten o'clock in the forenoon by the Moderator, Wilbur S. Drew, who declared the polls open for the election of Town Officers.

Laura Taylor, Helen Shrock, Edwin Peek and Thomas Whenal took oath of office as Election Officers.

A vote was taken to keep polls open one half hour after the conclusion of the business meeting.

At one o'clock in the afternoon the business meeting was opened by the Moderator Wilbur S. Drew, reading the warrant and taking up the articles in the warrant.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

On motion of William Fowler it was voted the Selectmen act as Assessors for the coming year. William Fowler moved and it was so voted the Selectmen act as Overseers of the Poor.

On motion of Richard Goss. Thomas B. Whenal was re-elected Fence Viewer.

On motion of George Carter. Albert E. Locke was elected to be Sealer of Weight and Measures. William Fowler moved and it was so voted that Warren and Morris Lamprey be elected Public weighers.

James Leavitt moved and it was voted Raymond O. Hobbs, Richard Goss and Russell D. Moulton serve again as Surveyors of wood and lumber.

Article 2. On motion of James F. Leavitt this article was passed over until other articles had been taken up.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Gordon Dow so moved and it was a vote.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$243.50 for town road aid, the state to contribute the sum of \$974.01. William Fowler moved we vote this article as read. It was a vote.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of erecting on the Library land, a suitable monument for the bronze plaque dedicated to the Veterans of World War II.

William Fowler moved the \$500 be raised, it was so voted. James F. Leavitt moved and it was a vote the same

committee (Raymond O. Hobbs, Ruth K. Leavitt and George G. Carter) continue and the matter be left in their hands to secure such a Memorial as they see fit.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to locate a street light on the last pole on Woodland Road going North from Atlantic Avenue. (By Petition).

Elliot Stevens moved a light be placed at this location. It was so voted.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway known as "Little Road" as now constituted, leading in a southerly direction from Atlantic Avenue towards Mill Road over land of W. H. and Eva G. Norton. (By Petition).

Forrest E. Knowles moved the road be discontinued. The vote was ten in favor and eighteen against. The article did not pass.

Article 8. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to repair the water holes that are used for fire protection.

William Fowler moved and it was voted to do this.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at public auction or private sale, for the best price obtainable, the land containing the old town gravel pit on the Lafayette Road near the Rye line, and give a deed for the same to the purchaser.

Mr. Fowler moved the article be passed as read. It was a vote.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell at public auction or private sale, for the best price obtainable, all or any part of the town's surplus or out of date machinery.

William Fowler moved the article pass as read. So voted.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell at public auction, for the best price obtainable, all or any part of the property acquired by the town at a tax collector's sales for non-payment of taxes, and to give deeds for the same.

James F. Leavitt moved Article be passed as read. Vote yes.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the use of the total of \$9,900. appropriated in the years 1945 and 1946 as a capital reserve fund for the construction and acquisition of a water works system, together with all accumulated interest thereon, for the purpose of procuring the construction of a new water main to supply water, from the Hampton Water Works Company's Main, to the Junction of Pine Road and Atlantic Ave., and thence westerly toward the Lafayette Road; and to appoint a committee of five to be known as the Water Committee and to include the Selectmen and two other persons to be named by the Moderator, with full authority to negotiate with the Hampton Water Works Company and Public Service Commission and others, and to make all necessary contracts for carrying out said purpose, including full authority to pay all necessary expense to the extent of said Capital Reserve Fund and accumulated interest. (By Petition).

William Fowler moved article pass as read.

James F. Leavitt moved four persons instead of two be appointed to act with Selectmen as the Water Committee. The vote was carried.

Patrick Casey added and moved that all money over cost go back into Capital Reserve Fund.

This vote was also carried.

The Water Committee appointed by moderator.

The Selectmen, James F. Leavitt, Philip Boothby, Gordon S. Dow, Edward R. Hale.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to install not over five new hydrants, at the discretion of the Water Committee, on such new water main as may be constructed from the Hampton Water Company's main to the junction of Pine Road and Atlantic Ave., and thence westerly toward the Lafayette Road. (By Petition).

Gordon Dow moved article be adopted as read. It was a vote.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the change of the purpose of the total of \$8,000.00 now held as a capital reserve fund for the construction or reconstruction of the Town Hall and for Fire Station, and town buildings in accordance with the votes of the town in years 1944, 1945 and 1946, together with all accumulated interest thereon, from said purposes to that of the construction of a new School building, to be expended under the direction of the North Hampton School Board in connection with the New School building to be built in this town by the School district. (By petition).

Gordon Dow moved this article be indefinitely postponed. It was a vote.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Mr. Fowler moved article 2 be taken up at this time. Voted.

Gertrude Hobbs asked for more money for Memorial Day that a fitting dedication for the new memorial tablet could be held. On motion of Mr. Fowler the allotment for

Memorial Day was raised to \$200.00. George Carter moved budget with additions be accepted. It was so voted. Entire budget being \$44,258.50. On motion of James Leavitt it was voted to allow a 5 percent discount on taxes paid before such a date as the Selectmen shall designate.

Gordon Dow moved and it was voted the Old Water Committee be discharged.

The Moderator appointed the same Budget Committee.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Business meeting called at one o'clock.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. On petition of William P. Fowler and ten other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) for the purchase of approximately 2.08 acres of land from Fred C. Leavitt to be added to the Center Cemetery from the north end of his field to a depth of about 201.2 feet so as to square up the cemetery, and to authorize the Treasurer of Trust Funds to negotiate the purchase in question in behalf of the Town.

5. On petition of Lewis D. Haven and nine other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the town will vote to authorize the use of accumulated interest, not to exceed \$500.00, on Capital Reserve Fund number one (consisting of \$8,000.00 established for the construction or reconstruction of the Town Hall and-or Fire Station) for the purpose of obtaining preliminary plans and estimated costs of a new Fire Station, and to appoint a committee of seven, to include the Selectmen and four other persons to be named by the Moderator, to carry out said purpose and report at a Special or Regular Town Meeting.

6. On petition of Maude Plumb and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to locate a street light on New Road between the residences of Mr. Raymond O. Hobbs and Mr. Allison Allen, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

7. On petition of John Berlin and nine other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see what action the Town will take regarding the installation of a street light on South Road near the residence of John Berlin, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

8. On petition of Philip T. Boothby and thirteen other legal voters of the Town of North Hampton:

To see if the Town will vote to install a street light at Cuses Hill on Post Road in front of the residence of Philip T. and Luella S. Boothby, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see what action the Town will take with regard to raising and appropriating a sum, not to exceed eight hundred dollars (\$800.00), for the purpose of purchasing

land to be used as a Town Dump and doing the necessary work to make it accessible ; also to appoint a committee to consummate the same.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

School Report

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the town of North Hampton qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on Friday the 10th day of March 1950, at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to discontinue the East School as of the date of this meeting, the new school being now virtually completed; and to authorize the School Board to proceed at once to sell or dispose of the East School land and buildings (schoolhouse and woodshed) on such terms as the Board shall approve, and to execute deeds therefor in the name of the District, the proceeds to be used for the new North Hampton School.

9. To see if the District will vote to discontinue the Center School at the close of the current school year and on the completion of the new school.

10. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to sell or dispose of the Center School Building (including Centennial Hall) and all or any parts of the land owned by the District at that location, on such terms as the Board shall approve, and to execute deeds therefor in the name of the District, the proceeds to be used for other school purposes.

11. To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,825.00 as a deficiency appropriation for the current school year covering \$1,000.00 for tuition and \$3,825.00 for interest on bonds.

12. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of North Hampton: I herewith submit to you my twentieth report as Superintendent of your schools.

These twenty years have seen many changes in your school. The September enrollment of pupils in 1930 was 76. The September enrollment this fall is 136, with late registrations increasing this number to 138. When considered over the entire picture, the increase has been uniform until the past two years, when we find the lower two grades serving 47 pupils in place of 16 in 1930. This enrollment made necessary the separating of grades one and two. The room for grades five and six now has 37 pupils. Our new building came none too soon.

The closing of Little River School brought all of our children into one building, making for a uniform course of study for all our pupils. This was a step in advance. The purchase of playground space was a help, in that it allowed complete supervision of recess and noon periods.

The number of our pupils going on to High School has shown a large increase. The 1930 statistics show twenty-one children enrolled in Portsmouth, Robinson Seminary and Hampton. There were last September 62 North Hampton graduates in High school.

The people of North Hampton, realizing the crowded condition of the school and the inadequacy of the building for modern education, voted a new building which is now constructed. It will house our pupils in a building planned for adequate educational programs. A large playground is one essential. We now have it. The building is well lighted, a matter which is considered of great importance. Provision for an adequate noon lunch is made in all modern buildings.

Education is now "individual centered" rather than "class centered." This necessitates individual projects and group activities rather than class activities. When children work in small groups they should have plenty of room to work as committees or as common participants working toward definite results. This is our educational and natural procedure. It does require that these groups be separated from one another. For this reason, larger classrooms are required. Your new school provides for this method of instruction and should result in more logical thinking and planning on the part of the children. Adults do much work in just this way. It is the business of the schools to train children in the methods by which they will work when they enter the adult world.

Your building is so constructed that additions may be easily made if such should be considered advisable in the future. It is for this reason that the stairs are so constructed that they do not close off the end of the structure.

Health and physical education is a recognized part of school functions. The assembly room will provide space for this work. Regular classes to provide for adequate training should be held here. The auditorium also provides an indoor playroom. The value of play is great. It is in the informality of play that teachers discover much of the characteristics of the individual child. The retiring child, the emotional child and the variety of social behavior among the pupils are frequently discovered here when the formality of the classroom fail to disclose characteristics which are of importance in the teacher's relation with her pupils. The recess periods and noon periods are really laboratory periods whereby the teacher studies her children. Assemblies are another valuable activity in any school. The varieties of learning outcomes are numerous. There is a strong incentive to complete a task when it is to be presented to the entire school. The

assembly programs tie in closely with the more formal school work. The program in our school will be better motivated, more interesting and more complete as the facilities of our new building are used.

The variation in the rate of learning of children is the subject of much study. It is this variation which make the teachers' work difficult. The children at either end of the scale — the slow learner or the rapid learner — are hampered because, of necessity, progress must be geared to serve the greatest number. The experienced teacher can minimize this by varying the assignments for individual pupils. However, she still must function for all children. It is recommended that a remedial teacher or a special teacher be engaged to take of these children who are too far away from the average. Such teachers are now being trained. It would be her duty to help both the slow learner and the rapid learner. It might be possible to hire such a teacher in conjunction with another school district. This would be an economy measure. It would not be as satisfactory as a full-time employee, but would certainly help.

The Parent-Teacher Association is a valuable part of the school family. Its whole interest is the school. With our new building, increased need for the group will be evident. Its help is essential. It is through such an association that the schools may speak to the community.

With the reduction of total state aid for education from \$2,000,000. to \$400,000., North Hampton now receives no state aid. While the result was perhaps not serious, it does mean that \$2,071.44, the amount received last year must be added to the local tax rate.

By order of the legislature, a new formula must be developed. This leaves us in an uncertain position, since we have no idea what aid, if any, may be forthcoming next year.

I am again recommending that North Hampton make

use of the Rinehart Functional Handwriting system in its schools. By means of an expert teacher visiting the school once a month to instruct, and supervise, a uniform system of writing is established. It is a proven method and the cost is not prohibitive.

For an efficient school board, for purposeful teachers and for a fine group of pupils, I wish to express my appreciation. It is a pleasure to work in North Hampton.

A pre-school clinic was held June 1949 with Dr. Bailey as physician. This pre-school clinic is held each year, to allow the mother to have her child vaccinated at a very small cost and have a complete physical examination, thus enabling the parent to have the child ready for entry to school in the fall.

Dr. Bailey had planned to vaccinate the eighth grade, but due to a measles epidemic, only two were done.

Visits are made to the school every two weeks, and home visits are made in sickness and also to explain the physical defects of the child.

Children are examined periodically for skin, hair, vision, and hearing defects.

No dental program has ever been planned, as almost all children have their own dentist and have regular dental care.

The audiometer test for hearing is to be used during the coming month.

At this time I would like to thank the Red Cross Association who have always generously helped me in my work.
