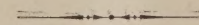

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the town of New Hampton, in the county of Belknap in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said town, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of highways.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise towards the payment of the town debt.
5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the payment of tuition for the children of the town, in High Schools and Academies.
6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the decoration of soldiers' graves.
7. To see how much money the town will vote to raise to advertise the natural resources and advantages of New Hampton.
8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the celebration of Old Home Week.

9. To see if the town will vote to discount four per cent. on all taxes paid before June 15 of the current year.

10. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire money at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent. and pay the present town debt, the notes not subject to taxation if held by residents of the town.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

We believe that our schools the past year will compare favorably with those of preceding years.

We have had two terms of ten weeks each in ten divisions of the town. The law of our state requires each town to maintain its schools at least twenty weeks each school year, and no town can receive any portion of the literary fund unless it has complied with this requirement. We barely cleared the law as to the length of schools the past year, closing them before the money was all expended, because the attendance in many of the schools was so very small.

A large part of our scholars are small and many of them live a long distance from the school-house and it is difficult for them to attend school regularly more than twenty weeks in a year. The traveling is usually poor until about the first of May, and ten weeks from that time carries us to hot weather. Many parents object to having the fall term begin before the first of September, and, in ten weeks from that time the weather is cold and the traveling bad; therefore, unless parents will make a greater effort to help their children to school and to have them more regular in their attendance, it seems useless for the town to provide more schooling than the law requires.

And yet, with no more than twenty weeks of school in a year, only a small proportion of the children in town will be able to avail themselves of the benefit of the law enacted at the last session of the New Hampshire legislature, compelling towns to pay the tuition of any child who wishes

to attend a high school or academy, and who is qualified to enter one of the regular courses of such school.

As we have one of the very best institutions of learning in our town, we should not neglect to provide the means that will enable the average scholar to obtain a good education.

To this end we urge parents and guardians to make an earnest endeavor to have the children in school every hour they possibly can.
