


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Extremist or Moderate?

WHEN I was first introduced to this hobby of ours I was strongly impressed with the idea that square and round dancing were one and the same. I had been indoctrinated to the principle that both were necessary for dancers to achieve a solid background and that callers used both squares and rounds to program an evening of enjoyable dancing.

The smoothness, rhythm, and timing found in round dances helped the dancers in learning the intricate maneuvers of square dancing. The two blended together to create the desirable qualities in the average dancer. A successful combination of the two seemed to insure that new dancers would remain in the total dance picture for years rather than just months.

How does this picture compare with the one we see today? As a traveling caller in the midwestern and eastern parts of the country I have noticed some definite trends. Although these trends are not cause for alarm, they deserve careful thought and consideration.

In square and round dancing we have extremes, just as we have in national government and other phases of public interest. Also, though, like these other groups, we have a dominant middle-of-the-road contingent. These moderates are the majority members of the square and round dance movement.

Dancers move from the middle-ofthe-road group to one of the extremes, either all round dancing, shunning square dancing, or vice versa. Once a dancer has reached an extremist group, he seldom turns back to the middle-of-the-road. So it is with the moderates that we must work to achieve a well-balanced recreational form for square and round dancing.

The middle-of-the-roaders are the most important, and yet the most neglected, sector of the square and round dance activity. Also, in this group, the best results in the way of progress and dancing pleasure can be obtained.

In the not too distant future, if square and round dance extremists continue to grow in numbers, the two activities will go their separate ways. This has already happened in some areas, but it does not have to spread.

I have many friends in both extremist groups as well as many who are moderates. It would be impossible to get them all happily together, but through thoughtful discussion many problems could be overcome.

As a final thought, consider whether square dancers are leaving round dancing or whether round dancers are leaving square dancing.

UP? UP? UP? Grown Up? Dancing grown Up? Round Dancing grown Up? Has round dancing grown Up?

We have witnessed the concurrent growth of square and round dancing over the past 15 years. We seriously question the validity of the frequent expressions by callers and leaders that round dancing is an integral part of the square dance movement.

It appears that whether anyone likes it or not, round dancing has become emancipated from square dancing. Leaders in both activities can do one of two things: (1) cooperate with each other; or (2) continue their activities separately.

In the first instance, square dancers and callers should practice their avowed profession that round dancing is a part of the square dance activity. Callers should either teach rounds themselves or hire a round dance teacher to do it for them.

Too many square dance callers regard the evening as *theirs* for promoting square dancing. They grudgingly give time and no thanks to the round dance leader who devotes his time and effort to teaching the square dancers the rounds for them.

Just as square dancers welcome the challenge in more involved figures, so are round dancers no longer satisfied with the monotonous step, close, step, of the two step or the reach, step, close, of the waltz.

Perhaps we are talking of a small minority of dancers in either or both groups who represent the elite. We observe round dancers who feel superior to square dancers because of a fancied or deservedly real feeling of greater accomplishment. It does appear that the natural talent of good timing gives anyone an edge in either activity.

We feel that the leaders in both groups should persist in their endeavors to give dancers the full measure of fun to be had in complementing both activities.

Perhaps this square/round dance alliance has been frequently expressed by round dance leaders in an effort to

secure a source of prospective round dancers. Round dance leaders need not fret. With the so-called high level square dancing being forced on dancers, the smooth and easy pleasure of round dancing is coming into its own.

Round dance teachers usually spend more time as a team preparing themselves to teach and demonstrate a round dance than most callers spend in memorizing a directional call.

It appears noteworthy that many square dance callers are poor dancers, while most round dance teachers must be skilled in order to survive as leaders.

Square dancers themselves should display the common courtesy expected by others by clearing the floor for the round dancers and being reasonably quiet when a round is being taught.

If a square dance club or caller really want a *balance* of squares and rounds, they should take to heart the Thornburgs' little rhyme:



Fifteen minutes for a tip of squares Five minutes for a round Don't balance out on any scale That I have ever found.

We do not intend to say that square and round dancing are not related activities. We do feel that each activity has become so advanced in its own field that all callers and leaders should realize that neither one depends wholly on the other.

Round dancing is now a full grown activity. There are a growing number of round dance clubs, magazines, and exclusive round dance institutes available for those who have outgrown the apron strings that have tied them to square dancing.

Few people have the talent, time, or inclination to work at being top level in both square and round dancing. However, for those who really love the challenge, have the talent and time for both, round dancing offers the ultimate in dancing pleasure and accomplishment.

Yes, round dancing has indeed grown up.

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

CHOREOGRAPHY

Some further thinking has been passed on to me by Jack Lasry, Miami, Fla. regarding the slip and wheel idea introduced by Larry Dee, Rosemont, Pa. in the September 1964 AMERICAN SQUARES. Jack suggests that we not only slip and wheel and deal, but that we slip and *anything* that flows comfortably.

This follows the thoughts explored when Marty Winter, Cresskill, N.J. first introduced wheel and slide, wheel and circle, wheel and *anything* that the center people could do in this case.

From a two-faced line (one couple facing north adjacent to one couple facing south), the center two turn half way with each other (forearm turn or elbow hook) and then unhook to do something with the waiting ends as *couples*.

Rather than only a wheel and deal to end up facing, the thought was to cast off, wheel across, or circulate (as couples). Some of Jack's examples were slip and bend, slip and circulate, and slip and wheel across.

Exploration in this vein of thought has been interesting and fruitful. Your editor feels that ideas such as these might continue the trend in square dance choreography to keep certain dance movements from being too limited, thereby creating more new names for movements that might only be variations of the original idea. This has been true in the exploration of such movements as fold, circulate, and swing thru. Other ideas being explored are variations of spin the top and cloverleaf and these will be passed on to you in the near future.

Ĥere are the examples Jack sent along for our readers.

SLIP AND BEND

One and three square thru, four hands round to the outside two

Do-sa-do to an ocean wave and rock it

Ends (in line) trade places, centers turn alone

CALLERS' QUESTIONS

MILTON LEASE, Palm Springs, Calif.: "Every popular accepted figure in the past has been enlarged upon: wheel and deal, star, cross, swing, dixie daisy. These are all trademarks to cue and identify movements.

"Spin the top is a delightful changeof-pace movement that breaks the continuity of so-called 'march' dancing. Its circle action offers variated spice... It might become a tiresome rubber stamp wave ending ... so am offering an avenue of escape for natural entrance into other movements.

"I am enclosing examples of several appendaged spin figures, using the spin the top movement, except that only the ending is varied: spin star thru, spin star twirl, spin the gnat, spin allemande, spin paso, spin the daisy, spin to a thar, and spin to a grand."

Thanks a million for the many fine examples, Milton. We enjoyed workshopping them.

I agree that the spin the top movement doesn't have to end in a balance but can go into another figure unless orientation of the dancers is needed, i.e. swing thru, spin the top, balance. We have advocated this constantly with the swing thru movement.

Incidently, I have always felt that spin the top was an outgrowth of the swing thru family and not a possible parent of a new family. The spin the top movement would possibly be as much as a dancer could remember as a swing thru variation since it does take about six counts without any wave balancing before or after.

The consensus of the dancers' reaction to your new terms was that the command could be given to spin the top, star thru, California twirl instead of spin star twirl. Since the dancers need a ten count time period to execute the movement, why not prompt them during the time needed?

This was true of the other terms also. The six count movement of the spin the top allowed plenty of prompting time, and no new nomenclature need be involved.

SEVERAL SOURCES: "What is your reaction to the turn thru movement that some callers seem to be using at their dances?"

I have been aware of the movement for the past half year, although I'm not sure of the author's name. For those not familiar with the term, turn thru means to turn your opposite with a forearm turn to reverse your traveling direction. Turn thru is equivalent to box the gnat, pull by.

Even though I have danced turn thru many times the feeling is prevalent that it is an unnecessary square dance term.

The "thru" family is large enough now, especially when you realize that even supposedly known terms are not danced correctly all the time. Note the variations in dancer reaction to the ending of the command to cross trail thru. Are the dancers facing out in a half sashayed position alongside their partners with their backs to the couple they were facing? Or are they now on a bias facing to the right or left from their original position? And what is the ending position of your dancers after the command to four couples pass thru?

My main objection is to the fact that turn thru is another step in the rat-race direction of dancing—a quick way to turn back for movementmakers so that they can beat the caller to the next command.

So who needs a square thru when all you have to do is pair off and wait?

I guess I fight all new square dance nomenclature until it proves itself to be of additional value to choreography in the positioning of dancers in general and not only in special cases. The new dancers have more than enough to learn now. Being open minded and exploring everything can still mean the actual acceptance of only a very few chosen, practical, lasting ideas.

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
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
