TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town hall in Sanbornville in said Town of Wakefield, on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March next, at Nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the Trunkline and State-aid Roads.

5. To see what sums the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the suppression of the White Pine Blister Rust and Gypsy Moth.

6. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a Public Health Nurse to be employed by the Red Cross organization.

7. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in the support of Libraries, and where it shall be expended. 8. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper celebration of Old Home Week.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000) to be expended on Lovell Lake Road if the State shall appropriate a like amount.

10. To see what sum the Town will vote for Stateaid and Trunk-line construction.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) to be expended on a Highway near the Easterly and North-easterly side of Lovell Lake if the State will appropriate a like amount.

12. To see what action the Town will take relative tr relocating and widening that part of the Lovell Lake Road at the junction of the same with the State Boulevard in Sanbornville, and what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate therefor.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Library has been open three days a week throughout the year, afternoons and evenings, and on Sunday afternoons in the Winter Season.

At the March town meeting it was voted to discontinue the old town Library known as the "Wakefield Free Library". This gives us one organization which simplifies the work of administration.

The circulation for the year was 7706, an increase of 2669 over last year's record. The division by classes is as follows:

The attendance has been 7357. Average for weekdays 68, and for Sundays 11. The number of books added during the year was 344. A great many of these books were gifts. Farnham, Mr. George Smith and the Public Library of Newark, N. J.

Our reading table has been supplied with 26 of the current magazines. We have also The Carroll County Independent, The Granite State News and The Congressional Record.

The number of borrowers recorded for the year is 386; of this number 147 are from out of town.

During the summer Miss Katherine Litch, a trained Librarian gave us good help on the catalog. Miss Barbara Lang worked with Miss Litch.

Miss Marjorie Hatch has been the regular assistant

throughout the year. Since the first of November Miss Elizabeth Tucker has been doing regular work and Miss Helena Houde has been a substitute worker.

The Summer peolpe are using the Library more and more as time goes on and seem to appreciate the privilege of the reading room.

A typewriter has been purchased for our work. It is a great help.

The death of Mr. William M. Sanborn in October means a loss to the Library. Mr. Sanborn was Treasurer of the Board of trustees and a faithful worker.

During the summer it was necessary to procure three new teachers to fill vacancies. Mr. George A. Doe, a graduate of Bates College, was placed in charge of grades seven and eight at Sanbornville; Miss Valna I. Lover, Keene Normal School 1926, has succeeded Miss Nelson at Wakefield Corner; and Mrs. Francse S. Ross has returned to East Wakefield School after an absence of one year..

The exterior of the Grammar School building at Sanbornville has been painted. New heaters have been installed at Wakefield Corner and East Wakefield. Some interior painting has been done at Union. Slate blackboards have been placed in the Union building and in the primary building at Sanbornville to take the place of the badly-worn hylo-plate boards installed when these buildings were erected.

All buildings are now in good condition. Hereafter one building should be thoroughly renovated each year. The others will require only such attention as will be covered under the head of minor repairs.

Health work in the schools was under the direction of Mrs. Anna E. Clow until Jan. 1, 1926. Since that time Mrs. Agnes T. Weeks, R. N., has been in charge of this work. Her report will follow.

At the time this report is written, a dental clinic is being held at Sanbornville. It is hoped that many children in need of dental treatment will be benefitted by this clinic. An opportunity is offered for them to have dental work done at reduced rates, and the Red Cross is ready to give some assistance in case of need.
