

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wakefield in the in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wakefield on TUESDAY, the TWELFTH day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of Highways and Bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Trunkline and State-aid Roads.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Public Health Nurse to be employed by the Red Cross Organization.

6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Libraries and where it shall be expended

7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the proper celebration of Old Home Week.

8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for State-aid and Trunk-line Construction.

9. To see what action the Town will take relative to leasing or purchasing Road Equipment and to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the same.

10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Street Lighting in the villages of Sanbornville, Wakefield Corner, Union and East Wakefield.

11. To hear the report of the Town Forest Committee.

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt Chapter 27 of the New Hampshire Public Statutes relative to the manner of conducting Town Elections, otherwise known as the Australian System.

13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### Librarian's Report

The Library has been open the usual week days, throughout the year. It has not seemed necessary to resume the Sunday opening this winter.

The circulation for the year was 6,756. The attendance 5,843 and the number of borrowers 451. These figures, except for attendance, show an increase over our last year's report.

We receive each year a box of books from the Free Public Library of Newark, New Jersey, and we are receiving, for the second year, books from the Carnegie Endowment Fund. The number of books catalogued for the year was 255. The number rebound, 39.

The magazine tables have been regularly supplied with 25 of the current magazines. These, the most in fact, were gifts to the Library.

Many of our borrowers are summer people. The resident borrowers from near-by places, not in the v.llage, come from the following localities: Brookfield, Burleyville, Center Ossipee, East Wolfeboro, Effingham, Granite, Madison, Milton Mills, Oak Hill, Province Lake, Stoneham, South Wakefield, Union and Wolfeboro.

We have been able to send a good number of books and magazines to the Carroll County Farm. Also a number of books have been given to the Union Library.

Our assistants, Miss Olive Fogg, and Miss Marjorie Hatch have continued their faithful work throughout the year.

A story hour, for the school children, was started in the Fall, and proved to be a very popular venture.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all the friends who have helped in any way with the work.

There is no change in our corps of teachers for the present year. All are experienced teachers and are doing good work.

The expenditure for necessary general repairs this year has exceeded our estimate. This is due to the fact that it was found necessary to replace the boiler in the Sanbornville Primary Building with a new one, thus adding between four hundred and five hundred dollars to the amount that would otherwise have been expended. It will be necessary to appropriate a somewhat larger amount for repairs next year to restore this draught upon our general balance.

The Primary Building at Sanbornville was renovated during the summer vacation. Both buildings at Sanbornville have been wired and equipped with electric lights. All buildings in the district which are in use are now so equipped.

# HEALTH WORK

You will note from the report of the school nurse, which follows, that very successful toxin-antitoxin clinics were held last Spring. A large majority of all the pupils received this treatment for protection against diphtheria. Parents in general co-operated heartily in this work.

The recent epidemic of measles in Sanbornville made it necessary to close the schools there for two weeks. At the time of this report the schools are open again and the pupils from the guarantined families are gradually returning to their school work. It will be necessary to run these schools later into June than usual in order to complete our full school year.

In May 1928 a series of toxin-antitoxin clinics were held under the direction of the State Board of Health. Treatments were given by Dr. Weaver, who is associated with the State Board of Health, and Dr. Alfred Balch. Both doctors have had considerable experience along this line. Nearly all school children received this treatment and many children of preschool age.

In November a case of scarlet fever developed at East Wakefield. Several children having been exposed were excluded from school. Some of these children received a preventative dose of scarlet fever antitoxin. No more cases appeared.
